ABSTRACT

Information on 28 programs supported by the Office of Higher Education Programs and three programs of the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) are provided. In addition to a brief statement of the scope of each program, information is provided on eligibility, the budget and average award amount, and where to write for more information. The FIPSE programs are: the Lectures Program, the Comprehensive Program, and the Community Services and Student Financial Independence Program. Programs under the Office of Higher Education Programs concern: student support services, institutional development, incentive programs, and international programs. The following Office of Higher Education Programs are new: Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program; Strengthening Historically Black Colleges and Universities; Housing and Other Educational Facilities Loans; Minority Support in Science and Engineering Program; Patricia Roberts Harris Fellowships; and Special Service Projects Program. Additional programs include: Educational Opportunity Centers; Talent Search; Upward Bound Program; Law School Clinical Experience Program; Business International Education Program; Fulbright-Hays Foreign Curriculum Consultants; Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowships; and International Research and Studies Program. The purpose of the Talent Search Program is to identify qualified youth with potential for postsecondary education; to encourage them to continue and graduate from secondary schools and to enroll in programs of post-secondary education; to publicing the availability of student financial aid; and to encourage secondary and postsecondary school dropouts to reenter an educational program. Tutorial services are also provided. Participants must be between the ages of 12 and 27 who have completed the sixth grade. In any project, two-thirds of the participants must be low-income first-generation college students.

The Upward Bound Program is for the purpose of generating skills and motivation necessary for success in education beyond high school among low-income youths and potential first-generation college students. The goal of this program is to increase the academic performance and motivational levels of eligible enrollees so that such persons may complete secondary school and successfully pursue postsecondary programs. Services to be provided include: instruction in reading, writing, study skills; personal counseling; academic advice; tutorial services; and exposure to cultural events. Stipends are paid to the youth. No less than 2/3 of participants must be low-income individuals who are first generation college students. Participants must be between 13 and 19 years of age.
Accredited institutions of higher education, public and private agencies and organizations and secondary schools in exceptional cases are eligible to participate in the program.

The Strengthening Program assists eligible institutions of higher education to become self-sufficient by providing funds to improve and strengthen their academic quality, planning, management and fiscal capabilities. Planning grants, renewable development grants, and non-renewable development grants are awarded to two- and four-year, public and private institutions of higher education to enable it to move toward self-sufficiency. Funds may be used for faculty development; funds and administrative management; development and improvement of academic programs; acquisition of equipment for use in strengthening funds management and academic programs; joint use of facilities, i.e., libraries and laboratories; and student services.

MAIGHRILITY.

Eligible institutions are institutions of higher education which (a) have at least 50 percent of the degree students receiving need-based assistance under Title IV of the Higher Education Act (other than loans for which an interest subsidy is paid) or a substantial percentage of students receiving Pell Grants: (b) have lower education and general expenditures than do similar institutions and provide an educational program which awards a degree; (c) be accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association, or making reasonable progress toward such accreditation; (d) have satisfied both the "degree awarding" and "accreditation" requirement during the five academic years preceding the academic year for which it seeks assistance. Also included as eligible institutions are those: which have an enrollment of at least 60 percent American Indian, or 5 percent Alaskan Natives provided that these institutions meet the requirements of (a), (b), (c) and (d); which have an enrollment of 5% Native Hawaiian, Asian American, American Samoan, Micronesian, Guamian, and Northern Marianian, provided these institutions meet the requirements in (a) and (b) above.

The Law School Clinical Experience Program provides assistance to accredited law schools to establish and/or expand their programs of clinical experience for students in the practice of law. The program provides for the following: (a) development of new areas of clinical experience; (b) increase in the number of participating students; and (c) development and implementation of new teaching techniques. Grants are limited to not more than 50 percent of the total cost of establishing or expanding a clinical law program. Costs are limited to expenditures for planning, preparation of related teaching materials and administration; faculty training, payment for the director and other faculty or attorneys directly involved in supervision; travel and per diem for faculty and students; and other related activities in connection with the program.
