ABSTRACT

Fall 1986, "end-of-registration" enrollment data were gathered for the 50 Illinois public community colleges and compared with data from earlier years. Highlights of the analysis indicate that: (1) the colleges enrolled 334,884 students in instructional credit courses, representing a decrease of 4,898 students (1.4%) from fall 1985; (2) full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment was 166,204, a decrease of 0.3%; (3) the proportion of full-time students increased from 28.2% in fall 1985 to 28.7% in fall 1986, with almost half of the full-time students enrolled in pre-baccalaureate transfer curricula; (4) the number of female students decreased 2.1% from 196,812 to 192,752 between 1985 and 1986, while the number of male students dropped 0.6%; (5) minority student enrollment remained steady; (6) the median age of community college students in fall 1986 was 28.0 years, an increase over 1985's average of 26.6; (7) the number of freshmen enrolled in community colleges decreased 5.1% to 176,914, while the number of sophomore students increased slightly from 15.8% of the student population to 16.1%; and (8) nearly 45% of the students enrolled in the fall of 1986 had been enrolled at the same college the previous term. 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HIGHLIGHTS OF FALL 1986 OPENING ENROLLMENT REPORT

1. At the "end-of-registration" in the Fall 1986 term, the 50 public community colleges in Illinois enrolled 334,884 students in instructional credit courses, a decrease of 4,898 students (1.4 percent) from the Fall 1985 term (see page 2).
2. The full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment in the Fall 1986 term was 166,204, a decrease of 470 (0.3 percent) from the Fall 1985 term (see page 2).
3. The proportion of full-time students enrolled in community colleges increased from 28.2 percent in the Fall 1985 term to 28.7 percent in the Fall of 1986 (see page 4). Almost half (45.0 percent) of these full-time students are enrolled in pre-baccalaureate transfer curricula (see page 9).
4. The number of female students decreased from 196,812 in the Fall of 1985 to 192,752 in the Fall of 1986 (a decrease of 4,060 or 2.1 percent). The number of male students also decreased but at a lower rate (142,970 to 142,102 or 0.6 percent) (see page 4).
5. The analysis of Fall 1986 enrollment by ethnic origin showed that minority student enrollment headcount remained steady, maintaining its proportion of total student enrollment from the Fall 1985 term. The distribution for Fall 1986 was as follows: Asian or Pacific Islander, 3.2 percent; American Indian or Alaskan, 0.4 percent; Black, 16.8 percent; Hispanic, 7.2 percent; White, 72.2 percent; Non-resident Alien, 0.2 percent (see page 6).
6. The analysis of student enrollment by age reveals that the median age of community college students enrolled in the Fall term of 1986 was 28.0. This is an increase from a median age of 26.6 in Fall 1985 (see page 6).
7. The number of freshmen enrolled in community colleges decreased from 186,421 in the Fall of 1985 to 176,914 (a decrease of 5.1 percent) in the Fall of 1986. The number of sophomore students increased slightly from 15.8 percent of the student population in Fall 1985 to 16.1 percent of the population in Fall 1986 (see page 7).
8. Nearly 45 percent of the students enrolled in the Fall of 1986 had been enrolled at the same college the previous term. The proportion of students enrolled for the first time increased from 33.6 percent in the Fall of 1985 to 34.6 percent in the Fall of 1986 (see page 8).
9. An analysis of enrollment by instructional program area showed that enrollments in pre-baccalaureate/transfer and general studies decreased in the Fall of 1986. Increases occurred in the occupational/career, vocational skills and remedial/adult basic/adult secondary program areas (see page 8).

STUDENT ENROLLMENT DATA AND TRENDS IN THE
PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS: FALL 1986

INTRODUCTION

Accurate and comprehensive information on community college enrollment is important at the local, state and national levels. This information is used not only to analyze historical enrollment trends but also for planning future programs, curricula, financing, and facility needs. Each college provides the Illinois Community College Board with data on each student enrolled in credit generating courses. These computerized data are used to produce various reports on student characteristics and curricula enrollments in Illinois community colleges. From this centralized statewide student data base, the data needs of both state and national agencies and legislative bodies can be met.

This report focuses on a summary of statewide student enrollment trends and student characteristics in Illinois public community colleges. The analyses are based on Fall 1986 opening enrollments as reported by the colleges at the end of the regular fall registration period (usually the 10th day of the term). These data do not reflect enrollment in courses that begin after the end of the regular registration period. For colleges having two or more modules during a semester, only those students enrolled in the first module are included. Therefore, these enrollments do not include all students who enroll during the fall term. They are, however, comparable counts from year to year and from institution to institution. They are also comparable to fall enrollment data in institutions of higher education throughout the nation.

For comparison with past fall enrollments, summary data for the last five years are presented. In addition to the summary data, a detailed table comparing Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 headcount and FTE enrollments by college is included. Additional enrollment data for each community college will be included in the Fiscal Year 1987 edition of the Data and Characteristics of the Illinois Public Community College System.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT BY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Fall opening headcount enrollment for 1986 (Fiscal Year 1987) was 334,884, and full-time equivalent (FTE) students totaled 166,204. Table 1 compares these enrollment data with similar data for the previous four years. A comparison of student headcount enrollment for 1986 with data from a year ago shows a decrease of 1.4 percent or 4,898 students. FTE enrollment decreased 0.3 percent from 166,674 to 166,204. Compared to enrollments in Fall 1982, headcount has decreased by 13.7 percent and FTE enrollment by 12.2 percent.

Table 2 on the next page provides a comparison of 1986 Fall opening enrollments with 1985 Fall opening enrollments for each community college. Of the 50 colleges, 18 showed increases, 27 showed decreases, and five showed little or no change (≤ 1.0 percent) in headcount. FTE increases were reported by 22 colleges, decreases by 19 colleges, and little or no change by nine colleges.

SUMMARY OF FULL-TIME/PART-TIME ENROLLMENTS

A comparison of Fall 1986 full-time/part-time enrollments with those for the past four years shows that the proportion of full-time students declined to the lowest point in 1985 but increased in 1986 (see Table 3). After experiencing a steady decrease from 30.3 percent in 1983 to 28.2 percent in 1985, the proportion of full-time students increased slightly to 28.7 percent in 1986. The actual number of full-time enrollees increased by 0.3 percent from the same time a year ago while part-time enrollments experienced a decline of 2.1 percent.

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SUMMARY OF MALE/FEMALE ENROLLMENTS

Table 4 presents a summary of male and female headcount from Fall 1982 through Fall 1986. During this period the male/female student distribution has remained relatively constant with females comprising over 57 percent of the total enrollment. However, for the first time in five years the proportion of male students increased very slightly in Fall 1986.

SUMMARY OF ETHNIC ORIGIN ENROLLMENTS

A comparison of Fall 1986 with Fall 1985 shows a decline in headcount in all racial/ethnic categories except Asian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic, and white (see Table 5), which increased by 3.3 percent, 11.3 percent, and 1.4 percent, respectively. Black enrollments continued to decline both in headcount and in their share of the total enrollment. The most noteworthy trend in racial/ethnic enrollments over the last few years has been the declining share of black enrollment compared to the increasing share of Hispanic enrollment. In Fall 1985 blacks represented 17.6 percent of the student population. In Fall 1986 that proportion fell to 16.8 percent. While headcount decreases occurred among American Indian and non-resident alien students, their proportional representations remained the same.

SUMMARY OF ENROLLMENTS BY AGE CATEGORY

The proportion and number of students under the age of 21 decreased in Fall 1986 from 30.0 percent of the total student population in Fall 1985 to 19.8 percent of the population in Fall 1986 (see Table 6). The number of students in all other age categories (excluding the "over 55" category) increased compared to a year ago. Proportionately, these age categories also increased except for the over 55 age group which declined slightly. Thus, as can be expected from these observations, the average age as measured by the median and mean age of the students increased from a median age of 26.6 and a mean age of 30.8 in 1985 to 28.0 and 31.9, respectively, in 1986.

SUMMARY OF ENROLLMENTS BY STUDENT LEVEL

Table 7 summarizes enrollments by student level or classification for the past five years. Freshmen comprised 52.8 percent of all community college enrollments in Fall 1986. This percentage is lower than last year, continuing the trend of the last four years. The number of sophomores, which had increased in 1983 and held steady in 1984, decreased by 11.0 percent in 1985 but increased by 0.6 percent in 1986. The number of high school students enrolled in community colleges dropped drastically in 1986, down 5,862 students from the 1985 level. The number of unclassified students increased in Fall 1986. Their proportion also increased, from comprising 27 percent of the community college enrollment in Fall 1985 to 30.4 percent of the enrollment in Fall 1986. (Unclassified students are defined as students who do not meet minimum requirements for entrance as regular college-level students, including students who are enrolled in adult basic or adult secondary education. Students who already have a Bachelor's Degree or Associate Degree but who are taking courses at the same or lower level also are considered as unclassified.) While there have been some increases in adult and remedial education, examination of the data suggests that some colleges may be coding their incoming freshmen as "unclassified" during the students' first term. If this is occurring, interpretation of student level data is difficult. The ICCB staff is working with the colleges to clarify the definitions and rectify the problem in the future.

SUMMARY OF ENROLLMENTS BY ENROLLMENT STATUS

Community college students are assigned to one of four enrollment status categories. First-time students are entering students who have not previously attended any college. In addition to first-time fall students, students who are enrolled in the fall term attending college for the first time during the previous summer are included in this classification. Transfer students are

those persons entering the college for the first time with academic credit earned at another college or university. Continuing students were enrolled at the college the previous term, and re-admitted students are those who were enrolled at the college previously but not enrolled the previous term (excluding summer). Table 8 presents a summary of the fall student enrollment status from 1982 to 1986. The proportion of students in each of these categories has fluctuated over the five-year period. Since the Fall Term of 1982, the largest proportion of enrollment is comprised of continuing students. The proportion of first-time students has been steadily increasing since 1983. All four categories experienced headcount decreases in 1985; however, three of those four experienced headcount increases in 1986. Thus, the decrease in total headcount in 1986 is due to a decline in the number of continuing students.

SUMMARY OF ENROLLMENTS IN INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

A summary of total student headcount enrollments by instructional program areas from Fall 1982 through Fall 1986 is provided in Table 9. Pre-baccalaureate/transfer and occupational students taking courses but not pursuing a degree are shown as course enrollees and are included in the total program counts. Pre-baccalaureate/transfer and general studies areas each experienced headcount declines in Fall 1986. The proportion of students in the pre-baccalaureate/transfer and general studies program areas decreased to 34.6 and 10.7 percent from 36.2 and 11.9 percent, respectively. Occupational/career, vocational skills and remedial/ABE/ASE areas experienced

increases in both headcount and proportion of students in Fall 1986. It should be noted that the proportion of students in the unknown instructional area decreased through the five-year period, making the proportional changes in the other areas somewhat difficult to interpret when comparing the earlier years with the later years.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Full-time/Part-time Status. Table 10 illustrates the distribution of full-time/part-time attendance of students in different instructional programs in Fall 1986. Overall, 28.7 percent of community college students attend on a full-time basis (12 or more credit hours). A comparison of enrollment status among the instructional program areas reveals that the highest percentage (45.8 percent) of full-time students occurs in the pre-baccalaureate/transfer area. Slightly over 30 percent of the occupational students are full-time enrollees. Vocational skills and general studies students are enrolled primarily on a part-time basis--95.9 and 92.6 percent, respectively.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Male/Female. Examination of male/female distribution in the instructional program areas shows the distribution within the pre-baccalaureate/transfer area (42.6 percent male, 57.4 percent female) to be similar to the overall student population distribution (see Table 11). In each of the instructional areas, females outnumber males. The highest proportion of males (48.6 percent) occurs in the remedial/adult basic/adult secondary education area. The highest proportion of females (65.6 percent) occurs in the general studies area.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Racial/Ethnic Origin. Examination of each racial/ethnic category's representation across program areas shows that the largest percentage of each racial/ethnic group (with the exception of American Indian and Hispanic) is found in pre-baccalaureate/transfer programs. The largest number of Hispanics, 14,136 or 59.8 percent, occurs in remedial/ABE/ASE programs, which includes English as a Second Language instruction. The largest number of American Indians, 465 or 34.3 percent, occurs in the occupational program area.

A comparison of the racial/ethnic distribution within the pre-baccalaureate/transfer program area with the racial/ethnic distribution for all community college students shows that a larger proportion of pre-baccalaureate/transfer students (77.7 percent) are white compared to 70.8 percent white in the overall student population (see Table 12). The proportion of pre-baccalaureate/transfer students who are black and Hispanic is lower than the overall student distribution--14.0 and 3.0 percent compared to 16.5 and 7.1 percent, respectively. Within the occupational program area, white students represent 78.6 percent of the enrollment. The representation of Asians and blacks in the occupational area is lower than their total student representation and their representation in pre-baccalaureate/transfer programs. The racial/ethnic distribution in the remedial/ABE/ASE program area shows a predominance of minority students. Asians represent 6.2 percent, blacks 32.0 percent, and Hispanics 31.2 percent of the remedial/ABE/ASE students compared to a white student enrollment of only 29.4 percent in this area.

Enrollment in Instructional Programs by Age. Within the total community college population, 38.7 percent of the students are less than 25 years of age. Table 13 shows that within the various program areas the percentage of students under the age of 25 is as follows: pre-baccalaureate/transfer--51.2 percent, occupational--38.0 percent, vocational skills--17.0 percent, remedial/ABE/ASE--34.3 percent, and general studies--21.1 percent.

Examination of each age group's representation across program areas shows that 50.3 percent of all students age 17 through 20 and 41.0 percent of all 21 through 24 year old students are enrolled in pre-baccalaureate/transfer programs. The highest percentages of students in the age groups 25-30, 31-39, and 40-55 (37.8 percent, 39.0 percent, and 35.0 percent, respectively) occur in the occupational program area. Over 47 percent of all students over the age of 55 are enrolled in general studies courses. While the largest proportion of students less than 17 years old are enrolled in the pre-baccalaureate/transfer program area (37.0 percent), another 24.4 percent are in general studies programs.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by CIP. The Fall Curriculum Enrollment Report presented in the appendix provides a listing of enrollments by Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes for Fall 1986. Of the 115,746 pre-baccalaureate/transfer (1.1) students, 23,645 are students taking transfer courses but not pursuing a degree (course enrollees). Of the students pursuing transfer degrees, 62,411 are in Associate in Arts, 25,703 in Associate in Science, and 3,987 in Associate in Arts and Science degree curricula.

Of the 113,995 occupational (1.2) students, 15,861 were taking occupational courses but were not pursuing a degree or certificate. Business data programming (CIP 07.0305) continued to have the largest number of program enrollees with 11,381. However, this was a decrease of 1,617 (12.4 percent) from a year ago. The second largest curriculum was accounting and bookkeeping (CIP 07.0101) with 6,616 students--an increase of 445 (7.2 percent) from a year ago. Other curricula with enrollments over 3,000 were associate degree nursing (CIP 18.1101) with 6,214, business administration and management (CIP 06.0401) with 6,206, secretarial (CIP 07.0606) with 4,591, criminal justice administration (CIP 43.0105) with 4,129, child care aide (CIP 20.0202) with 3,895, and electronic technology (CIP 15.0303) with 3,214. In each of these curricula, except business data processing, electronic technology and associate degree nursing, enrollments were higher than they had been in the Fall of 1985. Table 14 shows enrollments in occupational curricula with at least 3,000 students enrolled.
