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ABSTRACT

Reflecting the efforts of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) to support the humanities in all their aspects, this report lists federal funds obligated for grants made in the 1987 fiscal year through the Endowment's five divisions (Education Programs, Fellowships and Seminars, General Programs, Research Programs, and State Programs) and through two offices--the Office of Challenge Grants and the Office of Preservation. The report provides brief descriptions of all NEH programs. Special Attention is given to the publication of "American Memory: A Report on the Humanities in the Nation's Public Schools." NEH has established a research center at the University of California at Los Angeles to study the way history is taught in elementary and secondary schools, and has launched the NEH/Reader's Digest Teacher-Scholar Program to provide one-year sabbaticals for elementary and secondary school teachers. In addition, the report includes lists of panelists, senior staff members, and members of the National Council on the Humanities, as well as a financial report for the year and a state-by-state index of grants. 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
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

Dear Mr. President:

I have the honor of transmitting to you the annual report of the National Endowment for the Humanities for fiscal year 1987. It reflects our continuing effort to support the humanities in all their aspects: to encourage education projects, scholarly research, and programs for the general public.

In all three areas, the year 1987 saw the fruition of projects relating to the two-hundredth anniversary of the Constitution. During the bicentennial year, the Endowment's congressionally mandated report on humanities education in the elementary and secondary levels was also completed. With our report, entitled *American Memory*, we hope that we have helped place humanities education on the agenda of education reform.

During the past several years, the importance of improving education in science and math has been widely recognized. *American Memory* argues that teaching and learning in such disciplines as history and literature are also crucial. "Knowledge of the ideas that have molded us and the ideas that have mattered to us functions as a kind of civic glue," the report says. "Our history and literature give us symbols to share; they help us all, no matter how diverse our backgrounds, feel part of a common undertaking."

To improve humanities education in our schools, we recommend changes in curricula, textbooks, and in the ways our teachers are trained and sustained. Through the Endowment's programs, we have also undertaken efforts to help bring these changes about.

During 1987, then, we have laid particular stress on education; we have done so in the sure knowledge that improving the teaching and learning of the humanities in our schools will help forward research in and public appreciation of the humanities as well. The scholars of tomorrow are in our schools today, as are the citizens who will guide this nation well into the twenty-first century. If the lives of all Americans are enriched by an appreciation of the humanities, our country will fulfill the vision of those who gathered in Philadelphia in 1787, a vision, in Madison's words, of "liberty and learning, each leaning on the other for their surest and mutual support."



FROM THE DEPUTY CHAIRMAN

A quick survey of the state of the humanities in America might lead the casual observer to be deeply pessimistic. In colleges and universities the number of students majoring in humanities disciplines remains depressed. Some professional organizations in the humanities do not hesitate to defend narrowness and heightened specialization in the academic realm, or to downplay the necessity of transmitting the great texts of literature to future generations. In our schools we have reports that students know far less than they should about history and literature—that two-thirds, for example, do not know when the Civil War was fought or that half had no idea that Keats or Wordsworth or Byron were poets.

Yet, without denying the validity of those facts, there's some cause for optimism. This past year, for example, saw a number of serious books in the public market—indeed, on the “best seller” list—that argued for a restoration of broad gauged humanities studies at all levels of American education. The reception accorded NEH Chair-

man Lynne Cheney's analysis and defense of the teaching of literature and history in the schools has been widespread and deep. Indeed, if one looks over the grants reported in this volume, perhaps a more salutary view of the health of the humanities might begin to emerge.


In all our divisions and activities we have attempted to keep clearly in mind the need for a restoration of understanding of the humanities at all levels of society. We have, for example, taken seriously our obligation to translate the works of the humanities to the broader public. We have resisted the notion that the great literature, significant events, or fundamental questions encompassed by the humanities can be given to public audiences only in snippets or by adulteration. We have tried to continue to adhere to a standard of excellence without ever confusing excellence with either narrow erudition or with the simply interesting or entertaining.

In our fellowship programs we have continued to seek out scholars whose work holds the promise of interest and significance not only for themselves but for their disciplines and, indeed, across disciplines. In our Division of Research Programs, we have taken great pains to explain that we do not believe words such as “significant” and “important” to be empty. We ask of all such applicants that their work be defended not simply on the grounds of an innovative approach or insight, but that the case clearly be made for the power of the research to illumine major issues, events, or questions of recognizable significance or importance to their peers.

We have not been content with cultivating the humanities in those areas where they already flourish. As this list of grants will attest, our attempts to reach out to elementary and secondary school teachers have all proceeded quite well. Through such initiatives as our Access to Excellence Program, groups and institutions new to the Endowment have found NEH receptive to their proposals. Yet, at no time was any criterion other than worth, merit, or excellence in effect.

All projects selected for support by the Endow-

ment go through a rigorous process of review. Every proposal is subject to the same careful scrutiny. We ask all panelists and reviewers to give us their best professional judgment of the significance, the centrality, and the importance of the projects before them. These criteria apply to research projects that may seem of immediate interest only to scholars as well as to television programs that we trust will be seen by a large segment of the viewing public. Through our efforts, we hope to continue to offer Americans at all levels of society access to the best that has been thought and known.

In sum then, we ask you to view this annual report in the following light: First, how well have we succeeded in helping to restore and transmit the tradition of humanities learning and teaching in all its fullness and complexity? Second, have we been able to present the humanities for the

general public in ways that have truly been enlightening and educational? Third, have we used the taxpayers' money to support scholarly projects of significance and importance, projects that help illumine major issues in humanities research? Fourth, have we made the virtues and uses of the humanities available more widely to new institutions, new scholars, new teachers, new students?

Our answers to those questions will help, I trust, give us a realistic picture of one small portion of the world of the humanities and counteract both bleak pessimism and empty optimism about the state of the humanities in American life.


FROM THE ASSISTANT CHAIRMAN FOR PROGRAMS

In consequence of the insights that informed *American Memory*, the Chairman's report about the state of the humanities in elementary and secondary schools, the Endowment emphasized and expanded its efforts for education during the past year. A primary goal of the Endowment's work on behalf of the humanities in the schools has been to provide opportunities for teachers to learn more about the content of humanities subjects. In addition to seminars and institutes, the Endowment has also sponsored cooperative projects that bring teachers and scholars together within the schools. This past year from the Division of Fellowships and Seminars and the Division of Education Programs, there were more than 120 grants that addressed

needs within the humanities at the elementary and secondary levels.

Good scholarship is the foundation for good teaching, and the Endowment in fiscal year 1987 maintained a healthy commitment to humanities research. Over half of the 2,873 new awards came from the Division of Research Programs and the Division of Fellowships and Seminars and went to individuals, groups, or organizations conducting scholarly research. Increasingly within the stiff competition for these awards, decisions depend upon the extent to which applicants convince evaluators about the significance of the proposed projects. Therefore, the Endowment has begun asking applicants to address questions about the importance of proj-

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ects and the potential differences results could make and for whom.

Certainly vital to the quality of education is the continuing knowledge and commitment of the general public. Public understanding of the humanities is enhanced by public programs that blend the best teaching and best scholarship. More than 1,000 awards from the Division of General Programs supported projects designed for the general public. These new projects provide a rich variety of humanities issues and themes, interpreted by scholars working with museums, historical organizations, public libraries, media producers, and others. Seven hundred ninety-one of these new awards were \$500 matching grants to public libraries throughout every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. These awards allowed the libraries to purchase key reference works and scholarly books about the U.S. Constitution and the constitutional debates at the founding. Many of the libraries in turn sponsored programs that highlighted these newly acquired works.

This one-time-only Bicentennial Bookshelf Program represented the formal close of the Endowment's initiative in recognition of the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. Altogether, from the inception of the initiative in 1982, the Endowment provided \$22.6 million for scholarly research, seminars, institutes, conferences, and public programs about the history, philosophy, and meaning of the U.S. Constitution.

With the close of the bicentennial initiative, the Endowment announced its new effort, the Foundations of American Society. This subsequent initiative encourages scholarship, teaching, and public programming that might examine not only the Constitution and constitutional principles, but as well the historical, philosophical, and cultural themes surrounding the American founding.

A continuing commemorative program initiative honors the forthcoming quincentenary of Columbus's voyage to the New World. The Endowment seeks to support excellent projects

about Columbus and about the interaction of the New World with the Old. Quincentenary applications are eligible in any of the Endowment's program divisions or offices. Thus far, the Endowment has supported approximately ninety quincentenary projects at a cost of \$5 million.

Forty-three grants from the Office of Preservation emphasized the agency's interest in discovering and preserving significant scholarly resources. Work in preservation embraces such varied efforts as the U.S. Newspaper Program, the training of conservators, and the development of preservation priorities within specific collections.

The forty-one new challenge grants provided both incentive and means for humanities institutions and organizations to plan their long-term futures. Those eligible for the Challenge Grants Program include almost all the public, educational, and scholarly enterprises that submit project applications to the Endowment's other divisions.

Like the Endowment itself, the work of the respective state humanities councils supports education, scholarship, and public programming in the humanities. During fiscal year 1987, the state councils made more than 3,700 grants for local and regional projects.

In order to evaluate the 8,030 applications the Endowment reviewed in fiscal year 1987, 143 panels met at the agency; almost 1,000 panelists read applications; and nearly 6,700 specialist reviewers assessed the strengths and weaknesses of proposed projects. Their recommendations informed the decisions to offer \$123.3 million in new awards.

The new awards for 1987 represent some of the best teaching, scholarship, and public programming being done within the humanities. It is with pleasure that the Endowment announces these 2,873 grants.

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INTRODUCTION

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HOW THE ENDOWMENT WORKS

In order "to develop and promote a broadly conceived national policy of support for the humanities," Congress established the National Endowment for the Humanities in 1965 as an independent grant-making agency of the federal government. The Endowment supports scholarly research, education, and public programs in the humanities. Under the act that established the Endowment, the term *humanities* includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following disciplines: history; philosophy; lan-

guages; linguistics; literature; archaeology; jurisprudence; the history, theory, and criticism of the arts; ethics; comparative religion; and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches.

Programs. This report lists federal funds obligated for grants made in fiscal year 1987 through the Endowment's five divisions — Education Programs, Fellowships and Seminars, General Programs, Research Programs, and State Programs—and two offices—the Office of Challenge Grants and the Office of Preservation. Grant listings are preceded by a brief introduction describing the nature and purposes of the programs administered by each division. The grants themselves are listed in alphabetical order according to each grant-making program. Except for the Travel to Collections and Bicentennial Bookshelf programs, grants for less than \$1 000 are not listed.


Public Information. Information about Endowment program and activities can be found in a variety of publications produced by the Office of Publications and Public Affairs. The Endowment's bimonthly magazine *Humanities* features articles by nationally known scholars and writers on current humanities topics, a listing of recent grants by discipline, a calendar of grant application deadlines, a guide section for those who are thinking of applying for an NEH grant, and essays about noteworthy NEH-supported projects. During fiscal year 1987 *Humanities* covered such topics as the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, Chinese studies, the influence of classical Greece and Rome on American political institutions, and musicology.

Matching Funds. To stimulate private support for the humanities, the Endowment uses federal funds to match funds donated from private sources. To date, NEH matching grants have helped generate more than \$852 million in gift funds — almost \$658 million of which has been

generated through the Challenge Grants Program. Matching under the Challenge Grants Program is required in a ratio of three to one for first-time awards: that is, federal funds may amount to no more than 25 percent of total matching costs. Matching under other programs is usually on a one-for-one basis.

In addition to federal matching funds, the Endowment stimulates private-sector support of specific projects by requiring grantees in most programs to commit their own funds for a portion of the costs of a project. In many cases, this amounts to 50 percent of total project costs.

Grants. All applications submitted to the Endowment are reviewed and discussed by peer review panels comprised of scholars and other experts. Panelists assess each application on its own merits and weigh each against others submitted in a particular grant program. In some programs, applications are also evaluated by specialist reviewers in the specific fields addressed by the applications.

Applicants may request summaries of pan-

elists' views. A list of those panelists who generously gave of their time to serve on review panels during fiscal year 1987 appears on pages 153-173 of this report.

Grant applications are reviewed subsequently by the National Council on the Humanities, an advisory board of twenty-six members nominated by the President for six-year terms and confirmed by the Senate. Council members include scholars, professionals, and distinguished members of the public who are recognized for their knowledge and support of the humanities. The National Council meets four times each year to consider the views of reviewers, panelists, and staff members on all grant applications and to make its recommendations about funding. After reviewing 8,030 applications in fiscal year 1987, the council recommended a total of 2,873 grants. Other council responsibilities include advising the Chairman about policies, programs, and procedures. Council recommendations are advisory to the Chairman, who, by law, makes the final decisions on grant awards. A list of council members may be found on page 177 of this report.

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AMERICAN MEMORY

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n August 30, 1987, the Endowment published *American Memory: A Report on the Humanities in the Nation's Public Schools*. Written by Chairman Lynne V. Cheney, this congressionally mandated study noted significant failures in the teaching and learning of the humanities and pointed out how costly these failures are. "A system of education that fails to nurture memory of the past," Cheney wrote, "denies its students a great deal: the satisfactions of mature thought, an attachment to abiding concerns, a perspective on human existence."

Problems in humanities education began many decades ago with a shift away from traditional intellectual concerns and toward training in practical skills. The result today is that we all too often find our schools devoted to "process," the report observes, to "the belief that we can teach [students] how to think without troubling them to learn anything worth thinking about, the belief that we can teach them how to understand the world in which they live without conveying to them the events and ideas that have brought it into existence."

In preparing to write the report, the Chairman held three meetings with an advisory group on history and literature and one meeting with an advisory group on foreign language education. She also visited schools and talked to teachers around the country and, under the auspices of the Woodrow Wilson Center for International Studies, met with heads of humanities organizations and foundations that have supported humanities education.

American Memory identifies several specific causes for the decline in humanities education: a curriculum that focuses on skills at the expense of knowledge, textbooks that contain little meaningful content, and a system of training and sustaining teachers that emphasizes how to teach rather than what shall be taught.

In accordance with the congressional mandate that the report be distributed to the states, copies of *American Memory* were sent to approximately 18,000 superintendents of school districts and

chief state school officers, among other. In addition, the Endowment has received more than 50,000 requests for copies.

In response to the issues raised in *American Memory*, the Endowment has initiated two new programs. Beginning in the 1988-89 academic year, the NEH, in partnership with a fund established by *Reader's Digest* founder DeWitt Wallace, will fund one-year sabbaticals for elementary and secondary school teachers. Depending on the number of qualified applicants, stipends will be provided for one teacher from each state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The Endowment has also announced the establishment of a research center at the University of California at Los Angeles that will study the way history is taught and learned in our nation's elementary and secondary schools. The center will help identify the most effective history teaching methods; evaluate history textbooks and supplemental materials, teacher training, and continuing education; and provide leadership by encouraging the use of this information to improve history teaching.


American Memory makes several recommendations for the improvement of humanities education in elementary and secondary schools:

I. *More time should be devoted to the study of history, literature, and foreign languages.*


- Much that is in school curricula now under the guise of "social studies" should be discarded and replaced with systematic study of history. What goes under the name of "social studies" in the early grades should be replaced with activities that involve imaginative thought and introduce children to great figures of the past.

- Both history and enduring works of literature should be a part of every school year and a part of every student's academic life.

- Foreign language study should start in grade school and continue through high school. From the beginning, it should teach students the history, literature, and thought of other nations.

II. Textbooks should be made more substantive.

- Reading textbooks should contain more recognizably good literature and less formulaic writing.
- History textbooks should present the events of the past so that their significance is clear. This means providing more sophisticated information than dates, names, and places. Textbooks should inform students about ideas and their consequences; about the effect of human personality; about what it is possible for men and women to accomplish.
- In literature, history, and foreign language classes, original works and original documents should be central to classroom instruction.

III. Teachers should be given opportunities to become more knowledgeable about the subjects that they teach.

- In their college years, future teachers should be freed from excessive study of pedagogy so that

they can take more courses in subject areas like history, literature, French, and Spanish.

- Teacher preparation and teacher certification must be independent activities. This will help ensure that education courses taken by prospective teachers are of value to effective teaching.
- Higher education liberal arts faculties must recognize their responsibility for the humanities education of future teachers. Further, these faculties must play a greater role in the continuing education of teachers.
- School districts should invest less in curriculum supervisors, instructional overseers, and other mid-level administrators and more in paraprofessionals and aides who can relieve teachers of time-consuming custodial and secretarial duties. This will help accomplish two important goals: It will give teachers time to study and think; and it will put them, rather than outside education specialists, in charge of what goes on in the classroom.

THE JEFFERSON LECTURE

The Jefferson Lecture in the Humanities is the highest official award the federal government bestows for distinguished intellectual achievement in the humanities. Established in 1972, the lecture provides an opportunity for one of the nation's outstanding scholars to explore in a public forum matters of broad concern in the humanities and to affirm the relationship between the great works of the humanities and the intellectual, moral, and political traditions of our civilization. The lecture carries a \$10,000 stipend provided by the Endowment.

The 1987 Jefferson Lecture was given by Forrest McDonald, a professor of history at the University of Alabama and a noted authority on the Constitution. Previous Jefferson Lecturers have been Lionel Trilling, Erik H. Erikson, Robert Penn Warren, Paul A. Freund, John Hope Franklin, Saul Bellow, C. Vann Woodward, Edward Shils, Barbara Tuchman, Gerald Holton, Emily T. Vermeule, Jaroslav Pelikan, Sidney Hook, Cleanth Brooks, and Leszek Kolakowski.

McDonald, the sixteenth Jefferson Lecturer, discussed "The Intellectual World of the Founding Fathers" in remarks delivered in Washington, D.C., on May 6, and at the University of Kansas in Lawrence on May 13, 1987. In his lecture, McDonald explained the various sources for the founders' ideas and showed how they applied those ideas to the task of creating the Constitution. "To put it bluntly," McDonald said, "it would be impossible in America today to assem-

ble a group of people with anything near the combined experience, learning, and wisdom that the fifty-five authors of the Constitution took with them to Philadelphia in the summer of 1787."

McDonald warned that contemporary efforts to revise the work of the framers are "presumptuous" and "uninformed." He asserted that the framers were products of "America's Golden Age, the likes of which we shall not see again. Departing from what they bequeathed to you and to me is a departure from the path of wisdom and virtue."

McDonald, the author of several books on American history, was one of three finalists for the 1986 Pulitzer Prize in History for his book *Novus Ordo Seclorum: The Intellectual Origins of the Constitution* (1985). In 1980 he received the Fraunces Tavern Book Award for *Alexander Hamilton, A Biography* (1980) and the George Washington Medal of Honor from the Freedom Foundation for *The Presidency of George Washington* (1974).

Before joining the faculty of the University of Alabama, McDonald taught at Brown University and Wayne State University. He recently held a one-year appointment as the James Pinckney Harrison Professor of History at the College of William and Mary. McDonald was a Guggenheim fellow from 1962 to 1963 and is currently a presidentially appointed member of the Board of Foreign Scholarships.

*Excerpts from the 1987 Jefferson Lecture by
Forrest McDonald*

“Are we better off, now that government at all levels is doing just what the Constitution was designed to prevent? . . . Has human nature changed so drastically, or has the genius of America? Was it folly or was it wisdom in the framers to suppose that the people will govern themselves best if left to govern themselves? Was it folly or was it wisdom to maintain that there are limits upon what government can do, and limits upon what it should attempt to do?”

“[The framers] aim was to secure liberty and justice . . . through the instrumentality of a lawful and limited system of government. In the undertaking, they were guided by this principle: the extent to which limited government is feasible is determined by the extent to which the people, socially and individually, can govern themselves.”

“. . . though we usually think of the Constitution as having been designed to overcome the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation by establishing new power, the vast majority of the framers viewed the crisis of 1787 as having arisen from an excess of state government, a wanton and inept use of all governmental power, and a collapse of authority resulting from efforts to govern overmuch.”

“[The framers] faithfully adhered to the principle underlying Montesquieu’s work—to its spirit. For Montesquieu’s grand and abiding contribution to the science of politics was that no form or system of government is universally desirable or workable; instead, if government is to be viable, it must be made to conform to human nature and to the genius of the people—to their customs, morals, habits, institutions, aspirations.”

“(T)he framers were guided by principles but not by formulas. . . . Thus rigid adherence to the doctrine of the separation of powers yielded to a system of checks and balances, and absolute dicta about the indivisibility of sovereignty were transmuted into a brilliant invention, federalism.”

DIVISION OF EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Efforts to improve the teaching of the humanities in the nation's schools, colleges, and universities are supported by the Endowment through the Division of Education Programs. Individual projects vary from one setting to another, but all grants made through the division are directed to the same fundamental objective: to bring more substance, coherence, and rigor to the ways in which the nation's educational institutions transmit our cultural heritage from one generation to the next.

Under the Elementary and Secondary Education in the Humanities Program, the division continued to provide support in fiscal year 1987 for summer institutes and school-college collaborative projects that give teachers and school administrators a deeper understanding of the humanities.

Niccolo Machiavelli, 1469-1527. With support from the Humanities Instruction in Elementary and Secondary Schools Program, the School of Education at Texas Christian University conducted a three-week summer institute for school administrators and principals in 1987 on the ethical and political thought of Plato, Aristotle, and Machiavelli.



At Skidmore College, for example, the division supported a 1987 summer institute on the classics in which thirty secondary school teachers from around the country came together to study Greek concepts of heroism and citizenship as embodied in the writings of Herodotus, Thucydides, Xenophon, Aeschylus, Sophocles, and Euripides. Along similar lines, twenty-five principals and other educational leaders examined the ethical and political thought of Plato, Aristotle, and Machiavelli during a three-week summer institute at Texas Christian University.

Oklahoma State University conducted a four-week summer institute on the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution in which teams of elementary school social studies teachers and library media specialists studied "The Constitution, Its Roots and Significance." Other exemplary institutes took place at Auburn University, "Literary Criticism and Literature for Teachers," and at Colorado State University, "Teaching India and China in the Context of World History."

Meanwhile, a long-term collaborative project involving the University of Oregon and Oregon public school systems drew to a close in 1987 with a dissemination conference on ways of combining the study of literature and history in the teaching of Latin American, Japanese, and Russian culture.

Under the Higher Education in the Humanities Program, the division supported summer institutes for college and university faculty, curriculum revision projects, faculty development efforts, collaborative programs, and other activities to bolster the teaching of the humanities in the country's colleges and universities.

At the University of New Mexico, the English department is currently using Endowment funds to develop a new introductory course on the major texts of the Western tradition. In an attempt to approach the traditional canon from a larger cultural perspective, the department is building the course around six thematic units, each designed to juxtapose several major Western texts with a comparable text from the

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Oriental, native American, or Hispanic traditions. The unit on "The Enlightenment: Reason and Individual Experience," which focuses on writings by Pope, Swift, Voltaire, and Locke, uses the poet Basho's *Narrow Road to the Deep North* to provide a Japanese perspective on the eighteenth-century European literary motif of the journey.

Illustrating a new approach to school-college collaboration, the University of Connecticut is using Endowment support given in 1987 to bring its faculty together with selected high school teachers to share in the teaching of a model Western civilization course. Before the course began, both groups participated in summer workshops on topics such as "The Periodization of Modern European History" and "The Structures of Ancient and Medieval History." Now that the academic year is under way, the faculty and teachers are meeting regularly in seminars on the conceptual problems common to the study of Western civilization at various levels.

In a consortial project involving the graduate programs in religion at three key universities —

the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Chicago, and Harvard University — the Endowment is supporting a national effort to strengthen the role of comparative religion in the liberal arts curriculum. This project includes such activities as a summer institute for college teachers, a summer workshop for scholars to assess the field of religious studies as a whole, and a two-year effort to complete a source book of syllabi, bibliographies, and essays on the teaching of comparative religion. Its purpose is to provide faculty with the tools to offer engaging courses on the place of religion in human civilization.

These are but a few of the imaginative steps now being taken by educational institutions to improve the teaching of the humanities at all levels. Others will be evident in the list that follows.



DIVISION OF FELLOWSHIPS AND SEMINARS

As Sophocles shows in his tragedy *Oedipus Rex*, wisdom does not derive merely from hearing what the oracles foretell. Oedipus heard, but he did not understand. The monuments of humanity's rich cultural heritage — the works of art and literature, the histories and documents of society — stand for us as the guardians at the temple of Delphi stood for Oedipus: They will speak truly, but it is our task to understand. Contemplation of artifacts and art works, careful scrutiny of facts, vivid interpretations of literary works — all these painstaking efforts by scholars and teachers are necessary to decipher the true significance of the human enterprise.

In various ways the Division of Fellowships and Seminars fosters the active study, research, and teaching that interpret and reinvigorate the content of the humanities. In fiscal year 1987, the division awarded 890 fellowships and stipends for individual research by university and college teachers, independent scholars, and student-scholars in colleges and high schools. The division also sponsored 116 seminars for 1,409 college faculty, independent scholars, and teachers in elementary and secondary schools.

Support for previous years' fellowship recipients also reached fruition in the publication of numerous books and articles. Ronald L. Lewis, a professor at the West Virginia University, published *Black Coal Miners in America* (University

Press of Kentucky, 1987), a work growing out of his 1980–81 Fellowship for Independent Study and Research awarded to study segregation in late nineteenth-century southern industry. Professor Jack Wertheimer of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, a 1983 Summer Stipend recipient, published *Unwelcome Strangers* (Oxford University Press, 1987), an examination of the history of East European Jews in Imperial Germany. A 1986 Travel to Collections grant to Professor Daniel Shealy of Clemson University enabled him to travel to archives in Boston and Concord and led to the publication of *The Selected Letters of Louisa May Alcott* (Lit., e, Brown and Company, 1987).

Also in 1987, the division continued to further the President's Initiative for Historically Black Colleges and Universities. A professor of French at Morehouse College in Atlanta, who held a faculty graduate study fellowship in 1986–87 to write her dissertation in French literature at Emory University, earned her Ph.D. in August 1987.

The Travel to Collections Program this year continued to support travel in America and throughout the world. A travel grant enabled one scholar to study Russian paintings in Moscow and Leningrad to determine the impact of European impressionism on Russian art. Another scholar returned to Oxford University's Bodleian Library to follow up his discovery of original copperplates of drawings of colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. Appropriately in this bicentennial year, a Travel to Collections grant enabled a scholar of the U.S. Constitution to pursue his research on "Ideology, Politics, and Society in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, during the Struggle over Ratification of the Constitution" at the state archives in Harrisburg.

The division also supports those who, like the young Oedipus, begin their search for wisdom early. Through support from the Younger Scholars Program, a senior from Stevenson High School in Prairie View, Illinois, analyzed the causes of the decline of late classic Maya civiliza-

tion. A Stanford University student investigated the politics of disenfranchisement in Georgia from 1890 to 1908.

The 1987 Summer Seminars for College Teachers Program offered a wide diversity of disciplines and topics. For example, in "Shakespeare and the Elizabethan Stage" at Northwestern University, a noted Shakespeare scholar helped his twelve seminar participants to visualize — and even to act out — the multiple possibilities of Shakespearean staging. The summer seminar program continues to attract the nation's leading scholars as directors. This year three former seminar directors were named Fulbright Distinguished Fellows. Participants also earn recognition deriving from work initiated and pursued during summer seminars. Professor Jeffrey Brooks of the University of Chicago, a participant in a 1976 seminar, won the Vucinich Prize from the American Association for Slavic Studies for his book on literacy in Russia, *When Russia Learned to Read* (Princeton University Press, 1985). Carroll Parrott Blue of San Diego State University, a participant in a 1985 seminar on film, was awarded a Ford Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowship to make a documentary film on Nobel Peace Prize laureate Ralph Bunche.

The Summer Seminars for School Teachers in

1987 included one at the University of Redlands where the director led a group of American teachers, plus one Hungarian teacher sponsored by the U.S. Information Agency (USIA), in studying the records of the Constitutional Convention and the Federalist and anti-Federalist debate. Across the country, in Concord, Massachusetts, a professor from the State University of New York at Geneseo guided a group of American teachers, plus two USIA participants from Iceland and Chile, in reading the works of Thoreau, Emerson, and Hawthorne.

Whether individually in research projects or cooperatively in seminar settings, scholars supported by the Division of Fellowships and Seminars sought during the tenure of their fellowships and seminars some true understanding of the humanities. But, more important, encouraged by Endowment support, they have continued searching. They learned, of course, that to stop exploring and interpreting humanity's heritage in the belief that one has found the answers can only lead, as it did for Oedipus, to tragic blindness.

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

DIVISION OF GENERAL PROGRAMS

In the belief that the well-being of a democratic society depends in part upon a shared understanding among its citizens of their cultural and intellectual heritage and on the vitality of critical discourse in their common life, the Congress authorized and encouraged the Endowment to foster public understanding and appreciation of the humanities. The Division of General Programs, through the projects it supports, conveys to the general public significant work in scholarship, makes the best in thought and culture generally available, and engages citizens in critical analysis and interpretation of the humanities. The division supports broad public education in the humanities through interpretive exhibitions, radio and television programs, lectures, conferences, printed materials, and reading and discussion programs.

As part of the Endowment's efforts to commemorate the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution in 1987, the division awarded \$500 matching grants to public libraries to help them establish a Bicentennial Bookshelf containing key reference works and scholarly books about the Constitution. Seven hundred ninety-one libraries in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico,

and the U.S. Virgin Islands raised \$500 in 1987 and received an additional \$500 from the Bicentennial Bookshelf Program to purchase these important books. To complement this effort, many libraries also developed their own programs that featured the newly acquired constitutional works.

Through Humanities Projects in Media in fiscal year 1987, the division supported planning, scripting, or production for a variety of television and radio programs focusing on the lives of historically significant Americans. These include writers, such as Eugene O'Neill, Eudora Welty, and Willa Cather; leading figures in the founding period of the nation, such as Alexander Hamilton, Thomas Jefferson, Mercy Otis Warren, John Dickinson, and John Trumbull; and other significant political leaders, such as Henry Clay, Harry Hopkins, and Dwight D. Eisenhower. Other examples include "Edison and the Art of Invention," a television documentary that explores the work of Thomas Edison and the world in which he lived; and "The James Family," a dramatic mini-series on one of America's prominent literary dynasties.

During fiscal year 1987 several programs sup-

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ported by the division in previous years were aired on public television stations. Among these were "Seize the Day," a feature-length dramatization of Saul Bellows's novel; and "Isaac in America," a one-hour program that combines documentary footage of Nobel laureate Isaac Bashevis Singer with dramatized sections of one of his biographic stories, "A Day in Coney Island."

Through Humanities Projects in Museums and Historical Organizations, 1987 grants supported a variety of permanent and traveling exhibitions throughout the country. An award to the University of Florida will enable the museum at that institution to mount a traveling exhibition entitled "Firs! Encounters: Spanish Explorations in the Caribbean and the Southeastern United States." The exhibition will examine Spanish efforts to explore and colonize the southeastern United States, as well as native American responses to those efforts, from 1492 to 1570. The Indianapolis Museum of Art, with Endowment support, organized "The Fantastic Art of Latin America: Visual Imagery and the Quest for Identity in the Twentieth Century," a traveling exhibition that explores the aesthetic, historical, and cultural roots of the imagery that dominates much of twentieth-century Latin American art. Montana State University will plan a program to interpret the Tinsley Homestead, an original 1889 Montana homestead.

Exhibitions that opened during 1987 include

"The Machine Age: The Americanization of Art, 1920-41," a traveling exhibition portraying the image of the machine as the unifying force in American art, architecture, and design in the years between the two great wars; "Miracle at Philadelphia: The Constitutional Convention Bicentennial," an examination of the founding period that attracted more than 450,000 visitors; "William Wordsworth and the Age of English Romanticism"; and "Harlem, My Home: The Harlem Renaissance, 1919-29."

In the Humanities Projects in Libraries Program, a 1987 grant to the New England Foundation for the Humanities will support a series of reading and discussion programs in libraries throughout the region focusing on the framing of the U.S. Constitution as revealed through biographies, original documents, historical writings, and other literature. The State Historical Society of Wisconsin received a grant to conduct a series of reading and discussion programs in cities and towns throughout the state on the era of the American Revolution and the Constitution.

Through Public Humanities Projects, the division funded "The French Revolution and Its Modern Legacy: A Bicentennial Reappraisal," a series of public lectures and film discussion programs providing a comprehensive assessment of the French Revolution and its impact over the past 200 years. Arena Stage in Washington, D.C., received funding to support a series of community symposia and essays to interpret the

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dramatic productions offered by the theater during the 1987-88 seasons and to place the plays in cultural, historical, and literary perspective. Also in fiscal year 1987, the Chautauqua Society of Bismarck, North Dakota, was granted money to support sixteen one-week scholarly residencies over two summers in North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas. Scholars will lead discussions about Thomas Jefferson, Alexander Hamilton, Elizabeth Stanton, Abigail Adams, and Henry Adams.

Through programs dedicated to fostering public understanding of history, philosophy, and the

other disciplines of the humanities, the division reinforces the conception that the life of the intellect and of ideas is fundamental. The health and survival of the democratic society depend, to a critical degree, on citizens who understand the past, who understand their common heritage, and who understand cultures and philosophies of other nations and peoples.







DIVISION OF RESEARCH PROGRAMS

The Division of Research Programs supports advanced scholarly research. Grants made through the division facilitate the preparation for publication of important texts in the humanities, the organization of collections and the preparation of reference materials, the conduct of collaborative or coordinated research, and the development of other scholarly activities through specific regrant programs.

During fiscal year 1987, the division announced several new initiatives and emphases. The Endowment has become increasingly concerned with the problem of intellectual fragmentation. Virtually everything human beings have done or said is worthy of scrutiny, but not everything done or said is equally deserving of such scrutiny. With this distinction in mind, the

division sought in 1987 to support projects of demonstrable intellectual significance and importance.

Also in 1987 the division, through the Editions category, encouraged applications for the preparation of editions of the papers and letters of important American artists. And, in the Humanities, Science and Technology category, applications for the writing of guided studies to important texts in the history of science were encouraged.

Among the grants awarded by the division in 1987 were a Conferences grant to the State University of New York at Albany to conduct a conference on "Doing Philosophy Historically," which addressed the issue of philosophy and historical context; an Editions category grant to

the American Musicological Society to plan a national series of scholarly editions of American music; Tools grants to continue support of several long-term reference work projects, including the *Old Spanish Dictionary*, the *Dictionary of American Regional English*, the *Sino-Tibetan Etymological Dictionary*, and the *Oxford Dictionary of Byzantium*; and a grant in the Access category to the University of Pennsylvania to enhance access to its collection of Mesopotamian materials, the largest collection of such materials located outside Baghdad.

The division's Editions category continued its support for the journals of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. In fiscal year 1987, a grant was made to the University of Nebraska for an eleven-volume edition that will include the journals of captains Lewis and Clark as well as those of the expedition's enlisted men. The project, which receives strong institutional support from the university's Center for Great Plains Studies, is cosponsored by the American Philosophical Society.

In 1987 two awards were made through the Translations category for documents relating to the early history of this country: a renewal grant to the New York State Library in Albany to translate from Dutch the archives of New Netherland, materials of great significance for the study of colonial history; and a grant to the University of New Mexico to continue work on a translation of the journals of Diego de Vargas, which contain important information about the Spanish colonial administration of the Southwest. Both projects have been notably successful in raising private funds.

One of the important emerging topics in American historical scholarship has been the role of businesses in the development of politics and

society. The Access category supported many projects this year to organize collections of materials related to the histories of particular nineteenth-century American railroads. For example, the University of Connecticut was given a grant to provide access to more than 2,500 cubic feet of historical records of the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad. In addition, other projects concerned with important business record collections were funded including an Access grant to the St. Louis Mercantile Library Association for its collection dating back to the settlement of St. Louis. Such collections give scholars the opportunity to explore the relationship between the economy and the development of a particular community.

The Interpretive Research category provided support to the University of California at Berkeley in 1987 for a project on traditional Chinese popular culture, a subject of growing scholarly interest to sinologists not only in this country but to those in China and Japan as well. Another award was made to the University of Illinois to conduct a historical project on Ethiopian land tenure and its social context. Scholars will examine ancient Ethiopian land records to determine the relationship of land tenure to aspects of governance, ownership, and migration.

This year's grants exemplify the division's premise that the intellectual foundation of the humanities is built by scholars who conduct research leading to new knowledge and critical understanding.



DIVISION OF STATE PROGRAMS

State humanities councils were established on the premise that a democratic society is nurtured by an educated populace. By providing the people of their states with opportunities for reflection, reasoned inquiry, and serious discussion with scholars knowledgeable in the humanities, the state councils contribute to the ability of Americans to apply critical intelligence to the decisions that shape civic life. Increasingly, the state councils are encouraging wide public discussion of the place of the humanities in elementary and secondary education and are supporting teacher seminars and institutes to strengthen the teaching of the humanities in the schools.

The Endowment makes annual grants to the state councils through the Division of State Programs. The councils then support, on a competitive basis, locally initiated humanities programs for the people of their states.

To encourage outstanding project ideas and

imaginative leadership, the division again in fiscal year 1987 held a special competition for exemplary projects and permitted councils to use a limited portion of their grant funds to develop and conduct specific projects of their own as an effective way of ensuring that fine humanities programs are available in all regions of the states. Also, the division used discretionary funds to recognize those state councils that are conducting programs of outstanding quality.

For the first time in 1987, small planning grants were made available to state councils to undertake the planning and research necessary in advance of initiating a major statewide or regional project. With support from one of these planning grants, the state humanities councils in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming planned and designed cooperative regional programs for circulation through state council resource centers.

Learning in the humanities flourishes in the public domain when scholars share what they know with the larger community. In 1987 the Delaware Humanities Forum gave support to "Heroes, Heroines, and the Heroic," a series of public programs to explore the concept of heroism in Western and non-Western cultures. The project, which encompassed an interpretive exhibit, twelve public lectures, reading and film discussion series, and a conference, focused on the literary, historical, and sociocultural aspects of heroism.

Also, state councils fostered the intelligent discussion of great works of literature and history with knowledgeable scholars by supporting scholar-led reading and discussion programs for the general public in small and large public libraries and community settings from Rochester, Vermont, to Kanab City, Utah. With a grant from the Kentucky Humanities Council, the Laurel County Public Library in London, Kentucky, hosted "Scholar's Choice," a series focusing on works that included Cather's *The Professor's House*, Austen's *Emma*, Sophocles' *Oedipus Rex*, and Hawthorne's *The Scarlet Letter*, "Ethan



The Utah Endowment for the Humanities developed a series of reading programs complete with a study guide and discussion questions for libraries in communities with populations of less than 25,000.

Throughout the year, programs on the U.S. Constitution and the founding period were initiated or funded by the state councils. The Virginia Foundation on the Humanities and Public Policy conducted twelve five-part series of reading and discussion programs on "The Supreme Court, the Bill of Rights, and the Law," with introductory lectures by A.E. Dick Howard, Henry Abraham, Robert O'Neil, and others. These programs, held at libraries and institutions throughout the state, were based on specific Supreme Court cases interpreting the Constitution. Also, with funding from NEH, the Federation of State Humanities Councils prepared *To Celebrate the Constitution: A Guide for Public Programs in the Humanities, 1987-1991*, a major resource for humanities programs based on the works cited in the Endowment's Bicentennial Bookshelf Program.

The state councils have continued to take an active role in promoting humanities education in the schools by designing projects that build bridges between institutions of higher learning and secondary schools. In the summer of 1987, 150 teachers from more than 100 Connecticut schools participated in institutes sponsored cooperatively by the Connecticut Humanities Council, the Connecticut Department of Education, and several Connecticut corporations. Designed as collaborative activities to bring univer-

sities and their scholars together with teachers in order to contribute to excellence in the teaching of the humanities, these institutes presented the teachers with stimulating substantive work in history, literature, the classics, and the Constitution. The Montana Committee for the Humanities supported three four-week seminars for forty-five high school teachers and administrators on the evolution of the Gothic novel, a study of Rousseau's *Emile*, and the interrelationship between history and literature.

Speakers bureaus and traveling exhibitions enabled state councils in 1987 to make humanities programs available to less accessible regions of their states.

In fiscal year 1987, millions of Americans participated in projects supported by state councils. At public meetings held in various locations in each state, members of the public had the opportunity to comment and make recommendations on the state plan of their humanities council. Since the establishment of the state programs, humanities projects have involved more than 1,500 libraries, 1,200 museums, 1,000 historical societies, and 1,200 colleges and universities. From the beginning, state humanities programs have relied on volunteer councils of citizens whose sense of purpose and commitment to the humanities have provided significant humanities programs for the people throughout their states.



OFFICE OF CHALLENGE GRANTS

Challenge grants improve the program quality and long-term financial stability of nonprofit institutions where teaching, learning, and research in the humanities occur. Challenge grant recipients, which include a wide range of educational and cultural institutions and organizations, must raise from nonfederal funding sources three or four times the amount of federal funds offered and must also demonstrate that Endowment support will sustain or develop a high quality of work that will contribute significantly to the humanities. The program enjoys a very high success rate in securing matching funds—better than 95 percent over the past ten years—and has helped many institutions develop new sources of support that continue to benefit the institutions long after the Endowment grants have ended.

Since the program began in 1977, recipients have reported raising more than \$658 million in new or increased donations in return for \$212 million in federal challenge funds. This figure is well over the amount required by the program's matching provisions.

During fiscal year 1987, the Office of Challenge Grants received 209 applications and made forty-one awards. The applications came from ninety-five institutions of higher education, sixty-nine museums and historical organizations, and an assortment of media stations, public libraries, research libraries, professional associations, university presses, and centers for advanced study.

Among this year's recipients of Endowment challenge grants is Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas. Under the terms of the award, Hendrix will receive \$143,750 from the Endowment if the college can demonstrate that it has raised \$431,250 in nonfederal donations. If successful, this small liberal arts college will have a total of \$575,000 to establish an endowment to provide summer seminars and fellowships for humanities faculty, to support visiting scholars in humanities disciplines, and to strengthen the required curriculum of its collegiate center. As a result of the

grant, humanities programs at Hendrix could enjoy additional support of approximately \$25,000 annually and funding sources for that institution will increase.

Also in fiscal year 1987, the Museum of American Textile History in North Andover, Massachusetts, was awarded a \$325,000 challenge grant for the purchase of furniture, shelving for artifacts, and expenses related to moving to a larger facility. Gift funds of \$975,000 will bring this award to a total of \$1.3 million.

The University of Dayton received a grant of \$300,000 to support the endowment of a chair in the humanities, faculty development, seminars, summer grants, guest speakers and visiting scholars, and library acquisitions in philosophy, history, and English. All these improvements are designed to enhance the newly established core curriculum of nineteen courses for students in the College of Arts and Sciences.

The Iowa City Public Library received a challenge grant of \$125,000 toward a permanent endowment of \$500,000 that will support the continued acquisition of humanities materials. The challenge grant is part of the library's capital drive to build a \$1 million centennial endowment fund.

In Richmond, Virginia, the restoration of a historic house is part of the purpose of a \$400,000 grant to the Valentine Museum. The balance of the \$1.6 million total raised by the grant will establish an endowment to support a curator and an educational officer for this facility.

The generosity of Americans to institutions whose work they value is legendary. This philanthropic spirit is responding to the stimulus of the Endowment's Challenge Grants Program to attain financial security for the humanities in institutions around the country.



A significant portion of the intellectual legacy upon which education and research in the humanities inevitably depends is disintegrating in libraries, archives, and other repositories across the country. Millions of books, manuscripts, and documents are turning to dust because of the acidic content of their paper; and photographs, sound recordings, tapes, and films are similarly threatened by factors inherent to their physical structure. The Office of Preservation was established to help institutions and organizations responsible for these endangered materials confront this national problem.

Since its inception two years ago, the office has provided support for the preservation of knowledge that would otherwise have been lost to future generations of scholars. It has also made grants for the education of preservation personnel, for regional preservation services that enable smaller institutions to maintain their humanities collections, for research intended to improve preservation technology and procedures, and for projects that are designed to increase public understanding of the preservation crisis.

In fiscal year 1987, an award from the Office of Preservation supplied the necessary funding for the American Theological Library Association to launch an extensive program to preserve the contents of 12,000 monographs on religious thought and history published from 1850 to 1910. Sixty-one libraries each subscribed \$300,000 to sustain the operation of this program by purchasing microfiche copies for their collections. Grants have also been made to individual institutions for the microfilming of books and manuscripts deemed essential for research on twentieth-century poetry, on American legal and economic history, on anthropology, on linguistics, and on the history of art, architecture, and music. These projects complement the office's support for the microfilming of Russian language materials at the Hoover Institution, of Latin American documents under the administrative aegis of the Center for Research Libraries, and of brittle

books and journals relating to American history and literature and to East Asian studies drawn from the collections of sixteen members of the Research Libraries Group.


Columbia University received a major matching grant from the Office of Preservation during 1987 in support of the only program in the United States that offers graduate instruction to both conservators and preservation administrators. The Endowment's award will fund the training of twenty librarians so that they can better deal with the complex issues involved in the preservation of large research collections.

A concurrent need to provide training for the existing staff of humanities institutions was recognized by the office's grants to preservation field services at regional and national organizations like the Southeastern Library Network in Atlanta, the Conservation Center of Art and Historic Artifacts in Philadelphia, the Society of American Archivists, and the American Association of State and Local History. The individual consultancies, on-site surveys, and workshops organized on various aspects of preservation practice will reach hundreds of people who must make policy decisions affecting the proper treatment and storage of materials entrusted to their care.

The U.S. Newspaper Program — from which a state may receive successive awards to locate, catalogue, and microfilm its newspaper holdings — continues to be a vital component of the office's work. In fiscal year 1987, Arkansas, Colorado, Illinois, and Missouri joined the program; cataloguing and filming efforts were inaugurated in Georgia, Louisiana, New York, Ohio, North Dakota, Washington, and Wisconsin; and Montana, Nevada, and Utah concluded their newspaper projects. In all, twenty-three states, one territory, and eight national repositories with newspaper titles from most of the fifty states, have participated in the program. The projects continue to discover scores of newspaper titles, and over 65,000 titles are now available in a national

data base that can be accessed by more than 7,000 computer terminals in the United States and abroad.

Fiscal year 1987 marked the completion of a document preservation project financed through the Office of Preservation, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, and the Council on Library Resources. The film, "Slow Fires: On the Preservation of the Human Record," narrated by Robert MacNeil, traces the causes and impact of the ever-widening destruction of our intellectual heritage. Initially broadcast nationally on PBS stations in December 1987, "Slow Fires" is also available on videocas-

sette so that it can be used as the basis for future public programming. The Office of Preservation supports this type of project in the knowledge that the magnitude of the preservation problem demands a commitment by the private as well as the public sector. Both must work together at the local, state, and national level to preserve for the future the works of the past.


