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**ABSTRACT**

U.S. Bureau of the Census data show that in 1980, Native Americans resided in all but five counties in North Dakota, with the greatest concentration in the counties containing reservations (35.3% in Rolette County, which contains the Turtle Mountain Reservation). Nearly 63% were under 25 years of age; 53.6% of these between 5 and 17. The median age was 19.1 years, nearly 10 years younger than the state median of 28.3 years. Almost 44% of men and 34.7% of women were single. Fertility levels for Native American women were much higher than for North Dakota women in general. The crude death rate mirrored that of whites (8.7 deaths per thousand), but infant mortality was greater among Native Americans. In 1980, 28.7% of all Native Americans in North Dakota aged 25 or over had completed fewer than 9 years of formal education. The labor force participation (52.5%) was lower than the 61.4% statewide for persons aged 16 and over, with 19.2% unemployed, or four times the state rate. The largest proportion (26.2%) of Native Americans were employed in service occupations, with the average income, in 1979, \$12,975, compared with \$20,473 for all families. Almost 40% of all Native Americans were impoverished in 1979, more than three times the level of impoverishment for North Dakota in general. Statistical data are appended. (JMM)

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## HIGHLIGHTS

### Residence

Native Americans resided in all but five counties in North Dakota in 1980 (Appendix Table 1). The highest concentration of Native Americans in the state was centered in counties containing reservations (Appendix Figure 1). Over one-third (35.3 percent) of all Native Americans in North Dakota resided in Rolette County, which contains the Turtle Mountain Reservation. Sioux County had the second highest concentration (11.8 percent) of Native Americans, most of whom lived on the Standing Rock Reservation. A similar proportion (11.4 percent) of Native Americans were found in Benson County, which contains the Fort Totten Reservation.

Specifically looking at Indian reservations reveals that the Turtle Mountain Reservation contained 35.7 percent of the state's reservation population in 1980. In contrast, the small part of the Sisseton Reservation which extends into Richland and Sargent counties contained the smallest reservation population in North Dakota (4.0 percent); all were male.

### Age

Nearly 63 percent of all Native Americans in North Dakota were under 25 years of age in 1980 (Appendix Table 2). A majority of these persons (53.6 percent) fell into the 5 to 17 year age group (Appendix Figure 2).

The median age of Native Americans in North Dakota in 1980 was 19.1 years. This was almost 10 years younger than the median age for residents of the state in general (28.3 years).

Just slightly over half of the Native American population in the state was comprised of adults aged 18 years and over (52.3 percent) in 1980. Elderly (65 years and over) made up only 4.2 percent of the Native American population.

The age distribution of Native Americans on reservations was quite similar to that of the Native American population overall in the state. In general, the reservation population tended to be slightly younger on the average (Appendix Table 3).

### Marital Status

Nearly 44 percent of all Native American men in North Dakota were single in 1980 (Appendix Table 4). In comparison, slightly over one-third (34.7 percent) of all Native American women were single in 1980. These proportions are markedly higher than those of residents in general in North Dakota; only one-third (32.7 percent) of all men in the state and about a quarter (23.0 percent) of all women in the state were single in 1980.

An equal proportion of Native American men were married as were single (43.1 percent and 43.6 percent, respectively) while a greater proportion of Native American women were married than were single in 1980 (42.5 percent and 34.7 percent, respectively). Overall, the percentage of married Native

Americans (42.8 percent) was lower than the proportion of married persons throughout the state (60.7 percent).

The percentage of divorced persons was relatively higher among Native Americans than it was among residents in the state as a whole. Nearly three times as many Native Americans were divorced compared with other residents in the state (10.0 percent and 3.8 percent, respectively). There was a slightly higher percentage of divorced women (11.1 percent) than divorced men (8.9 percent) among Native Americans.

A higher concentration of Native Americans who were single in 1980 was found on reservations as compared with the general Indian population in the state (Appendix Table 5). However, divorce was only slightly less evident on the reservation.

### Fertility

Fertility levels (as measured by the number of children ever born per 1,000 women in the population) for Native American women were much higher than those for North Dakota women in general (Appendix Table 6). In 1980, the fertility level of Native American women aged 15 to 24 years in North Dakota was nearly two and a half times greater than that for women of that age for North Dakota as a whole.

Similar high levels of fertility among Native Americans in the 25 to 34 and 35 to 44 age cohorts relative to the general population were found in 1980. Native American women in North Dakota aged 25 to 34 reported fertility rates of 2,674 children ever born per 1,000 women. Rates for Native American women aged 35 to 44 were 4,823 children born per 1,000 women. This is in contrast to fertility rates of 1,660 and 3,039 children born per 1,000 North Dakota women in general aged 25 to 34 and 35 to 44 years respectively in 1980.

In comparison to Native American women throughout the state, fertility levels for Native American women on reservations were moderately higher for older women (aged 25 to 34 and aged 35 to 44) and slightly lower for younger women (aged 15 to 24). However, the levels were still much higher than fertility levels for women in North Dakota as a whole (Appendix Table 7).

### Mortality

The crude death rate in 1980 for Native Americans in North Dakota was 8.7 deaths per thousand individuals (Appendix Table 8). This rate mirrored the death rate for whites in North Dakota. However, when one focuses on gender, differentials emerge among rates between Native Americans and whites. The death rate per thousand Native American males was slightly higher than rates for white males (10.9 and 9.8, respectively). In contrast, deaths per 1,000 Native American females was slightly lower than the rate for white females (6.48 and 7.49, respectively).

Infant mortality was much greater among Native Americans than whites in 1980. The infant mortality rate for Native Americans was 16.2 per 1,000 children less than one year of age compared with 11.6 infant deaths per 1,000 white children in North Dakota (Appendix Table 9).

## Education

In 1980, 28.7 percent of all Native Americans in North Dakota aged 25 and over had completed fewer than nine years of formal education (Appendix Table 10). Men were the least educated with fully one-third (33.6 percent) of those over age 25 having only an eighth grade education or less. Just under one quarter (24.5 percent) of Native American women had an eighth grade education or less.

Slightly less than half (47.9 percent) of the Native Americans in the state (aged 25 and over) had completed four years of high school. Again, a higher percentage of females compared to males reached this educational level (49.3 percent and 46.2 percent, respectively). Although 16.6 percent of all Native Americans in North Dakota completed some college, only 4.9 percent completed four or more years of college.

Educational attainment levels of Native Americans on reservations in the state were lower than attainment levels for Native Americans overall (Appendix Table 11). Native Americans on reservations were more likely to have had less than a ninth grade education than Native Americans overall (30.9 percent and 28.7 percent, respectively) and less likely to have attended college (17.6 percent and 21.5, percent respectively).

In comparison to other residents of the state and the nation, Native Americans were markedly less educated (Appendix Table 12 and Appendix Figure 3). More than half had not completed high school compared to only one-third of the adults in the state or nation. Native Americans were also less likely to have attended college compared with other adults in the state or nation. Only 5 percent of the Native Americans above the age of 24 completed four or more years of college. The level for the state as a whole or for the nation in general is three times that proportion.

## Labor Force Participation

In 1980, 52.5 percent of all Native Americans aged 16 years and over in North Dakota were in the labor force (Appendix Table 13). This rate was low compared to a 61.4 percent labor force participation rate for all persons aged 16 and over in North Dakota in 1980. Native Americans residing on reservations in 1980, however, were slightly more likely (54.3 percent) to have participated in the labor force in 1980 compared with all Native Americans in North Dakota (Appendix Table 14).

Men were more likely than women among Native Americans to be members of the labor force in 1980, 59.8 percent and 45.8 percent, respectively (Appendix Figure 4). Native American men and women residing on reservations in 1980 showed slightly higher labor force participation rates than Native Americans overall (60.3 percent for men and 48.3 percent for women).

Labor force participation rates for North Dakota's Native American men, both on and off the reservation, were much lower than those for men in general in the state (75.6 percent). However, Native American women on reservations participated in the labor force at a rate (48.3 percent) above that for all North Dakota women (47.3 percent) in 1980.

## Unemployment

In North Dakota, nearly one in five Native Americans in the labor force (19.2 percent) were unemployed in 1980 (Appendix Table 13). This rate was four times higher than the unemployment rate (5.3 percent) for all North Dakotans in 1980. Almost a quarter of Native American men (23.4 percent), aged 16 and over in the labor force, were unemployed in 1980. In contrast, 14.2 percent of Native American women in the labor force were unemployed in 1980.

Among Native Americans on reservations throughout the state, the percentage of unemployed increases to 21.6 percent (Appendix Table 14). Fully one in four men on reservations were unemployed while slightly fewer than one in six women on reservations were unemployed in 1980.

The percentage of unemployed Native American men was almost six times the percentage of unemployed men in North Dakota as a whole in 1980. Interestingly, Native American women reported a lower unemployment rate than Native American men (14.2 percent and 23.4 percent, respectively) in 1980 while North Dakota women overall had a higher unemployment rate than men (4.6 percent and 4.2 percent, respectively).

## Occupations

The largest proportion (26.2 percent) of the state's Native Americans were employed in service occupations in 1980 (Appendix Table 15). More specifically, 9.8 percent of all employed Native Americans were in cleaning and building service occupations excluding household cleaning services, 5.6 percent were in personal service occupations, and 5.1 percent were in food service occupations. Most Native American women were employed in service occupations (34.9 percent) or administrative support occupations (22.7 percent) in 1980. On the other hand, most Native American men were employed in precision production, craft and repair occupations (21.8 percent) or service occupations (19.1 percent) in 1980.

Occupations of Native Americans residing on reservations in North Dakota were comparable to those of Native Americans overall in 1980 (Appendix Table 16). Most residents were employed in service occupations (26.0 percent); the largest percentage were employed in cleaning and building service occupations excluding household cleaning services (8.1 percent). Both men (21.1 percent) and women (31.5 percent) were most likely to be employed in service occupations.

## Income

The average income for all Native American families in North Dakota was \$12,975 in 1979 (Appendix Table 17). Those families residing on reservations in the state had slightly higher income levels (\$13,427) on the average (Appendix Table 18). In comparison, the average income for all families in North Dakota was \$20,473 in 1979.

Nearly one in four (24.2 percent) Native American families in North Dakota made less than \$5,000 in 1979. Close to one-half of the families (48.5 percent) earned less than \$10,000 in 1979 while less than 4 percent (3.9 percent) of Native American families earned more than \$35,000 in 1979.

Similarly, 22 percent of Native American families residing on reservations in North Dakota earned less than \$5,000 in 1979, and 46 percent earned less than \$10,000. In contrast, only 4.6 percent of Native American families on reservations earned more than \$35,000 in 1979.

Earnings among Native American men and women in North Dakota differ markedly. More than 27 percent of the Native American women earned less than \$1,000 in 1979 compared to slightly less than 24 percent of the men (Appendix Table 19). In contrast, nearly 5 percent of the Native American men earned between \$15,000 and \$50,000 in 1979 while less than half of that proportion of Native American women reported such earnings. An interesting reversal in income distribution by gender exists on the Indian reservations in North Dakota (Appendix Table 20). More than twice as many women as men earned incomes above \$15,000, but only half as many women as men earned incomes below \$1,000.

### Poverty

Almost 40 percent (39.2 percent) of all Native Americans in North Dakota were impoverished in 1979 (Appendix Table 21). For those residing on reservations throughout the state, the proportion in poverty exceeds 40.0 percent (Appendix Table 22). This is more than three times the level of impoverishment for North Dakota in general.

Native American children (aged 16 years and under) and elderly (aged 75 years and over) were the most common victims of poverty. Nearly half (46.8 percent) of all Native American children under 16 years in North Dakota were impoverished in 1979 (Appendix Figure 5). A slightly higher proportion (47.1 percent) of children residing on reservations in North Dakota were under the poverty line. More than half (51.6 percent) of elderly Native Americans (aged 75 and over) were impoverished. Elderly Native Americans (aged 75 and over) living on reservations were slightly less likely to be in poverty (48.6 percent).

Female Native Americans were slightly more likely than male Native Americans to be impoverished in 1979 (40.1 percent and 38.1 percent, respectively). This finding held true for Native Americans on reservations with only a slightly higher gap between gender (42.1 percent for females versus 39.6 percent for males).

Almost two-thirds (63.5 percent) of all Native Americans in North Dakota under age 21 lived in poverty in 1979. This percentage remains consistent for Native Americans residing on reservations in North Dakota in 1979 (63.4 percent).




Figure 1. American Indian Reservations in North Dakota, 1980




Figure 2. Age Distribution of Native Americans in North Dakota, 1980





Figure 3. Educational Attainment Levels for Residents in the United States, North Dakota, and Among Native Americans in North Dakota, 1980 (Persons 25 and Over)





Figure 4. Civilian Labor Force Status of Native Americans in North Dakota, By Gender, 1980

PERSONS IMPOVERISHED




Figure 5. Distribution of Native Americans in North Dakota by Age and Distribution of Impoverished Native Americans by Age, 1980

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
