
ABSTRACT

A resource guide describes the availability of support services for students with learning disabilities at colleges and universities in the state of Connecticut. Designed to help high school guidance counselors, students, teachers, and parents, it is the result of a survey of 41 institutions (public and private community, junior, baccalaureate, and graduate degree granting institutions) throughout the state. Institutions were asked to designate themselves according to a continuum of supportive services available to students with learning disabilities. The following categories were identified: no services available; decentralized and limited; loosely coordinated; centrally coordinated; and data-based. The guide provides only a description of services and is not an evaluation. Several recommendations are suggested for ensuring a good match between student and institutions: research the institution; develop a profile; make contact with the institution; and contact the Division of Rehabilitation Services. A list of resources is appended. Contains 21 references. (SM)


Department of Higher Education

PREFACE

During the late 1970's and early 1980's, several Connecticut colleges began limited attempts to serve the growing number of students with learning disabilities. It was not until 1984, however, that collaborative efforts between consumers, professionals and state agencies fostered the passage of legislation funding two model learning disability support programs.

The University of Connecticut and Housatonic Community College were the grant recipients who were not only to implement first rate comprehensive programs, but also were to model "how to" develop a learning disabilities support program. To that end, the Connecticut Department of Higher Education funded an independent evaluator who helped each school document the process of program development as well as evaluate project outcomes. Evaluations of the programs demonstrated the effectiveness of support services for students with learning disabilities at both two and four year colleges. Data provided in the evaluation report (McGuire, 1986) at the end of the two year grant period indicated that students in each school achieved a mean grade point average of almost 2.7 (B-). More than 90 percent of the learning disabled (L.D.) students served were eligible to return to school the following year. The very positive evaluation findings and the support of the Connecticut Department of Higher Education encouraged both colleges to fund their L.D. programs as permanent student services. Expansion of services in Connecticut beyond these two schools was the next step undertaken in broadening the array of postsecondary choices for qualified students with learning disabilities.

The Connecticut L.D. College Consortium (1986-1988) was formed to replicate the success of the two model programs by encouraging program development throughout the state. The Connecticut Consortium represented a joint effort between the Department of Higher Education and its L.D. Task Force, which developed policy, and the two postsecondary institutions (Housatonic Community College and the University of Connecticut), which provided training and technical assistance to participating two and four year schools. The consortium model promoted cooperative arrangements between institutions in order to maximize the use of existing resources, develop a cost effective approach to service-delivery for each institution, and enhance the ability of colleges in every region to meet the needs of the growing number of learning disabled students enrolling on campuses across the state. These objectives were accomplished through statewide conferences and on-site technical assistance at individual institutions. Consortium efforts between July 1986 and June 1988 resulted in L.D. college program development in many of the public and private colleges in Connecticut. In addition, a grant from the Department of Higher Education to Southern Connecticut State University promoted the development of an ongoing comprehensive program at that institution.

To enhance the progress which occurred from 1984 through 1988, the Department of Higher Education Learning Disability Task Force identified three areas of ongoing need:

- 1) program development at State Technical Colleges;
- 2) transition collaboration between high schools and colleges; and
- 3) public awareness of postsecondary L.D. programs available in Connecticut.

In July 1988, the Connecticut Learning Disability Technical Assistance Center at the University of Connecticut was funded by a grant from the Connecticut Department of Higher Education. The Center has provided on-site consultants at each of the five state technical colleges to foster planning and development of supportive services in those settings. Statewide conferences for both secondary and postsecondary personnel have been sponsored by the Center. This Resource Guide has been compiled for consumers and professionals in Connecticut to foster the match between students with learning disabilities and appropriate postsecondary programs.

It is our belief that the commitment of professionals, parents and consumers to ensure equal educational opportunities beyond high school will enable students with learning disabilities to realize their aspirations for postsecondary education and experience the success they are capable of achieving.

INTRODUCTION

This resource guide is designed to help high school guidance counselors, students, and parents by providing complete and up-to-date information on services for students with learning disabilities at colleges and universities within the state of Connecticut. Forty-one institutions were surveyed, including public and private community, junior, baccalaureate and graduate degree granting institutions. The process of gathering this information involved a brief mail-in questionnaire, followed by a phone interview with the contact person. This guide provides a description of services and is not an evaluation.

The federal law which encourages equal educational access for handicapped individuals at the postsecondary level is Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which states:

No otherwise qualified handicapped individual shall, on the basis of his handicap, be excluded from participation in, or be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity which receives or benefits from Federal financial assistance. (Federal Register, Vol. 42, May 4, 1977)

When searching for an appropriate match between student and institution, the term "otherwise qualified" is of utmost importance. Having a learning disability does not entitle a student to admission to an institution which accommodates such students. At the postsecondary level, it is entirely up to the student to make the decision to self-disclose his/her learning disability. In an effort to ensure a good match between student and institution, use the following guidelines when exploring postsecondary programs:

*Research the institution:

Gather general information from any major guide to colleges and universities (such as Peterson's or the College Board's handbooks) to determine if there is a match in terms of size, location, academic and extracurricular offerings, and competitiveness. Also use this guide to find out information about services for students with learning disabilities.

*Develop a profile:

Gather general information including transcripts, class rank, grade point average (GPA), test scores (SAT, ACT and any achievement scores - taken with extended time limits, if appropriate). Develop a list of accomplishments, such as academic honors and involvement in extracurricular activities. Gather specific information regarding the nature of the learning disability, and what accommodations might be necessary to be successful in college. Include any previous testing, and recent results of testing in the areas of intellectual ability, achievement (math, reading, and spelling), perceptual- motor and information processing. The student should understand and be able to articulate the specific nature of the learning disability in practical terms.

*Make contact with the institution:

Write or call the Director of Admissions as well as the contact person for LD services to request any brochures which are available and to schedule interviews. Try to meet with students who are receiving services.

*Contact the Division of Rehabilitation Services (DRS):

Write or call the local office to schedule a meeting with a DRS counselor.

There are three criteria for eligibility:

- a presence of a disability or disabilities
- vocational limitations caused by the disability
- a reasonable expectation that the person could benefit from services in terms of employment.

Once eligibility is determined, an Individual Written Rehabilitation Program (IWRP) is developed and includes the following:

- a vocational goal
- short-term objectives needed to meet the vocational goal
- services to be provided by DRS as well as other community services
- an evaluation system to measure the effectiveness of the IWRP.

Be prepared for interviews, and be sure to start this process early in order to meet the admission deadlines!!

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

A NOTE ABOUT THE CONTINUUM OF SUPPORTIVE SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITH LEARNING DISABILITIES

Institutions were asked to designate themselves according to a continuum of supportive services available to students with learning disabilities. The following categories were identified:

No services available

Decentralized and limited

No formal contact person; limited services; dependent on sympathetic faculty or staff.

Loosely coordinated

Contact person; personnel generally have no specific LD training; students often referred to other on-campus resources.

Centrally coordinated

Often through Disabled Student Services Office; part- or full-time LD coordinator; generic services available (e.g., taped texts, reduced course load); student self-identification often requires documentation of learning disability.

Data-based

Full-time LD Director; individualized educational plan based on diagnostic testing; tutoring available by trained staff; accommodations coordinated by program staff; liaison with other campus resources.

For your convenience, a description of the level of services indicated by each institution is provided. Some institutions are in the process of developing a more formal program to serve students with learning disabilities, and for that reason they may be at a more advanced level in the near future. It is also possible that an institution currently offers no services because no students with learning disabilities have identified themselves and asked for such services.

The Academic Development Center is open to all students 6 days a week and 1 evening, and offers tutoring on a drop-in or scheduled basis in three areas: language arts, math and related areas, and study skills. Individualized learning plans are developed, and there is a class in study skills/learning strategies (academic preparation for college) for credit. There is an Apple IIe computer as well as tape recorders available to students in the Center. Other campus services available to all students include personal and career counseling, a handicapped student services coordinator, and a computer center with personal computers.

- Course waivers and substitutions are permitted.

The Director acts as faculty advisor for special needs students for at least two years. Individualized learning plans and priority registration are both available. Other campus services available to all students include personal and career counseling, speech lab, and a computer center with both a mainframe as well as personal computers. Students can receive help with writing, math, and reading through the individual departments. The Office of Special Student Services also offers an orientation in June for all special needs students.
