ABSTRACT

This packet includes six statistical profiles of American Indians and Alaska Natives based on the 1980 census, and a report on 1990 census plans for Native Americans. Three general profiles outline statistics on: (1) the American Indian population as a whole; (2) selected characteristics of American Indian men; and (3) selected characteristics of American Indian women. Each of these profiles contains bar graphs illustrating statistics on total population, regional population, media age, ducational attainment, families maintained by men and women, unemployment rates, labor force participation rates, median family income, poverty rates, and occupations. The first profile also provides statistics on population distribution of American Indians in the United States as a whole and in the 10 largest American Indian reservations. "A Statistical Profile of the American Indian Population for the Top Ten States with the Largest Number of American Indians: 1980" compares many of the above items for California, Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico, North Carolina, Washington, South Dakota, Michigan, Texas, New York, and the United States. "A Statistical Profile of the American Indian Population for the Top Ten Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSAs) with the Largest Number of American Indians: 1980" compares data for the metropolitan areas of Los Angeles, Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Phoenix, Albuquerque, San Francisco, San Bernadino, Seattle, Minneapolis, and Tucson. "Educational Characteristics for the American Indian, Eskimo, and Aleut Population in the United States: 1980" details information on school enrollment by age and educational level and on high school and college graduates by age and sex. "1990 Census Plans for American Indians and Alaska Natives" outlines outreach and planning efforts, the tribal and village liaison program, goals for census data products, the local review program, and geographic issues. 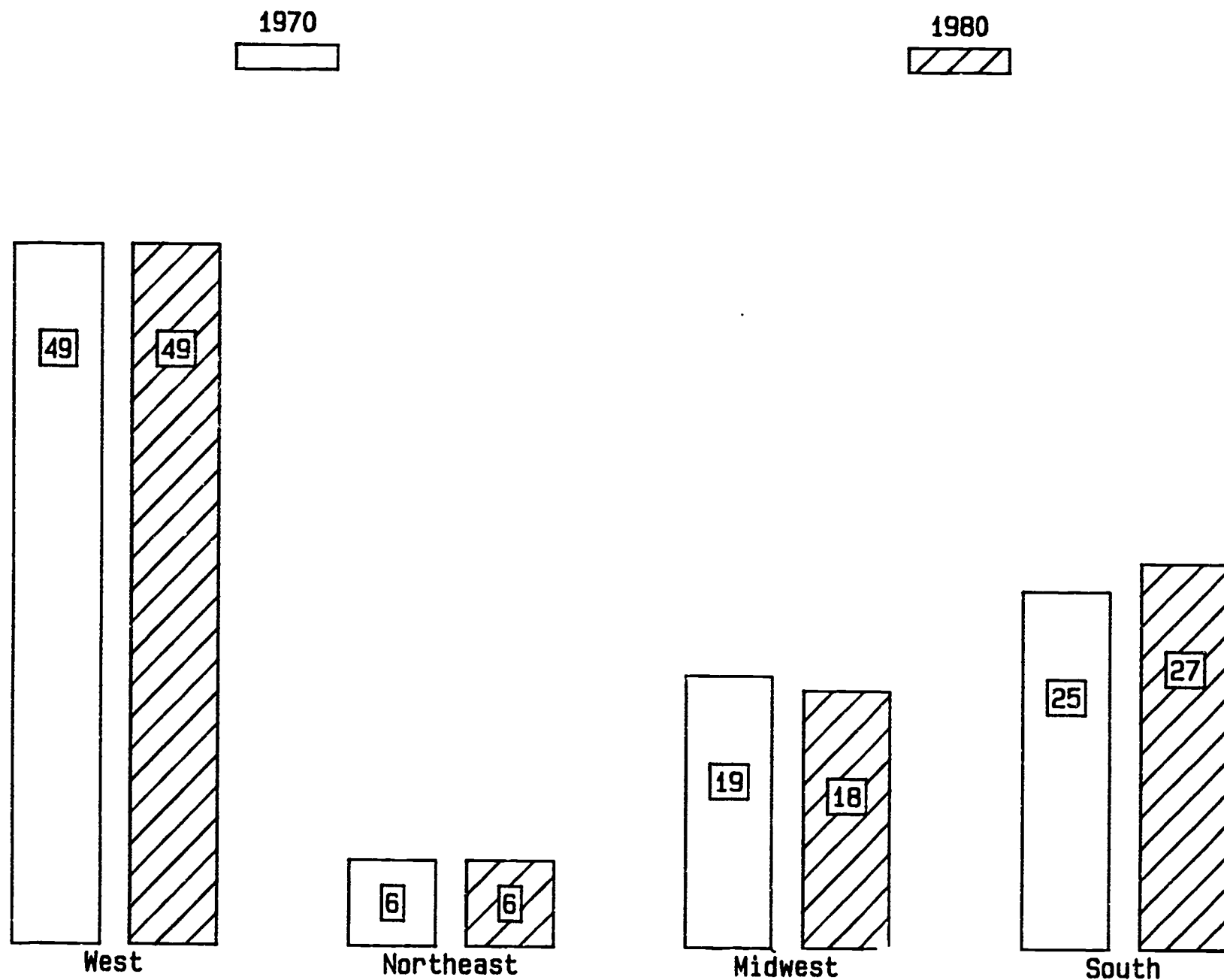

American Indian Population by Region: 1970 and 1980

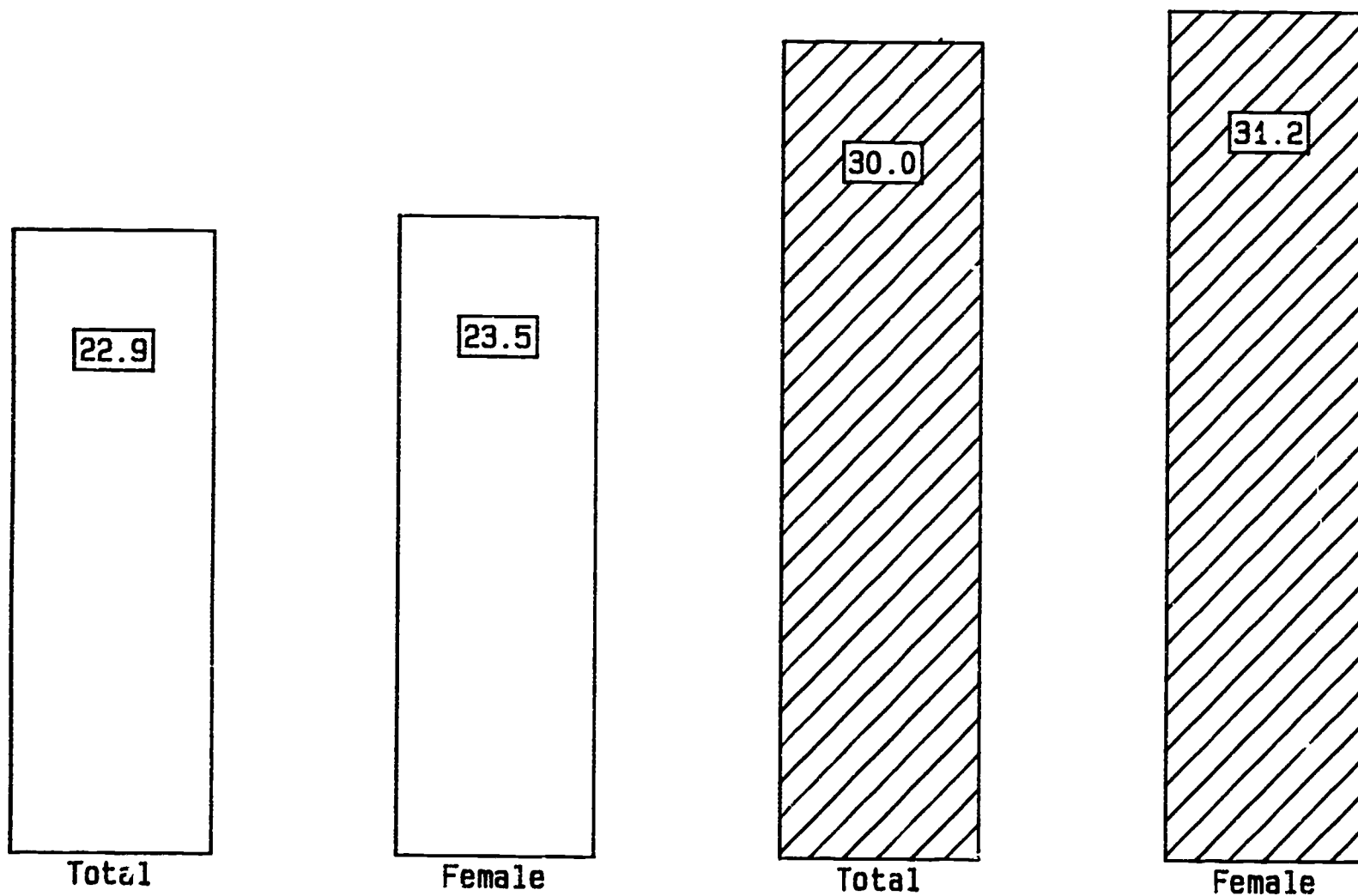


Median Age of American Indians: 1980

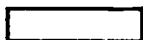

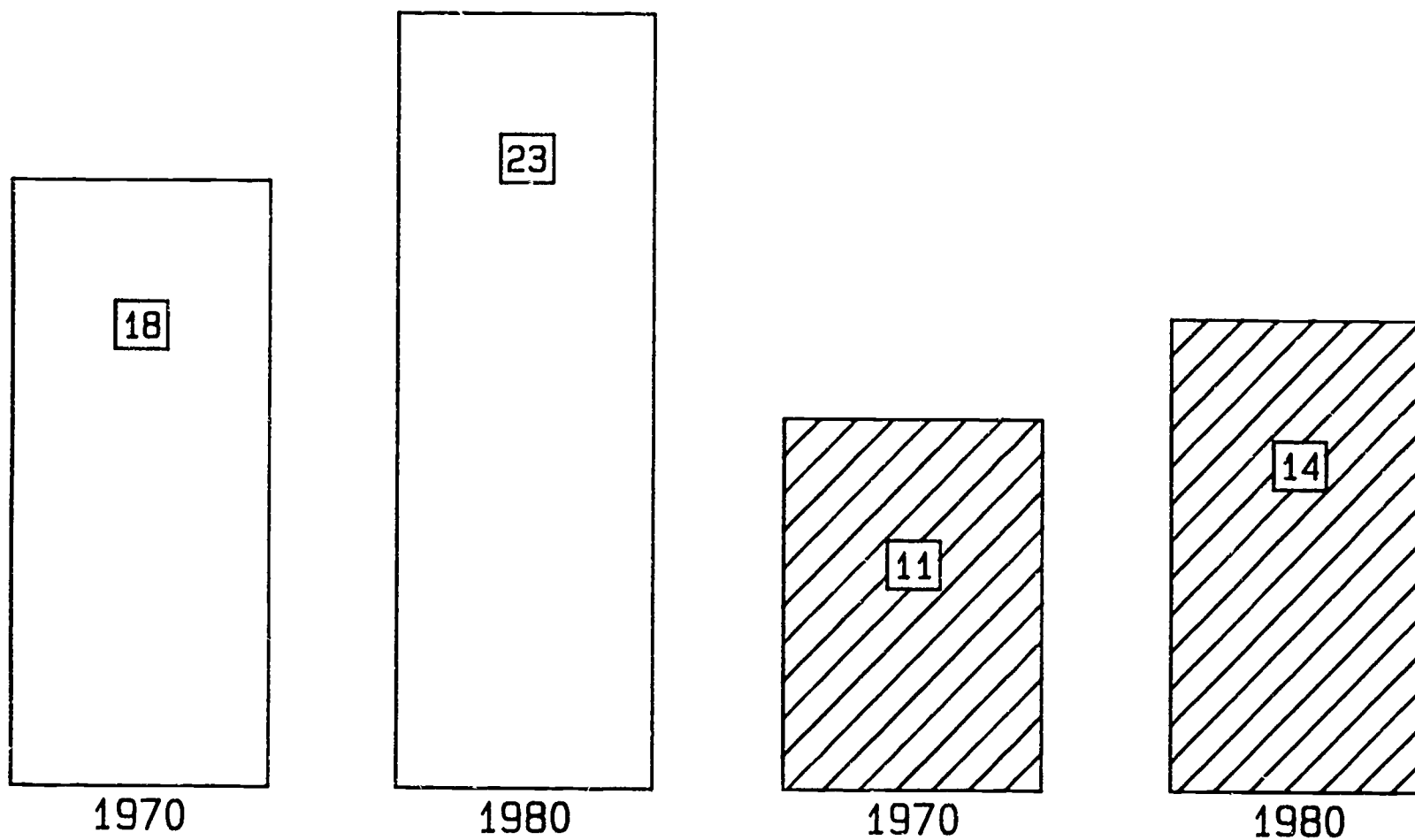


Families Maintained by Women: 1970 and 1980

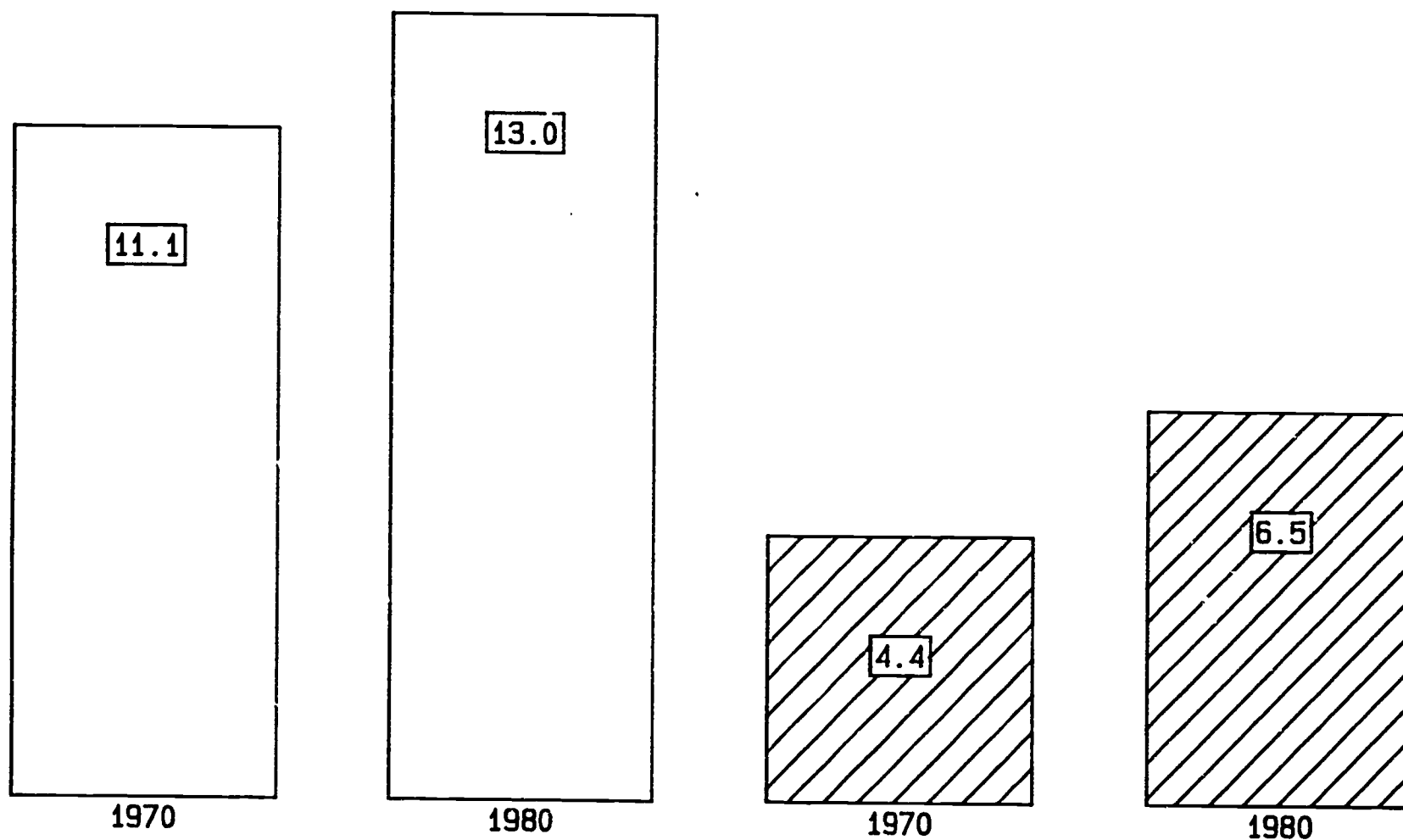


Unemployment Rates for American Indians: 1970 and 1980

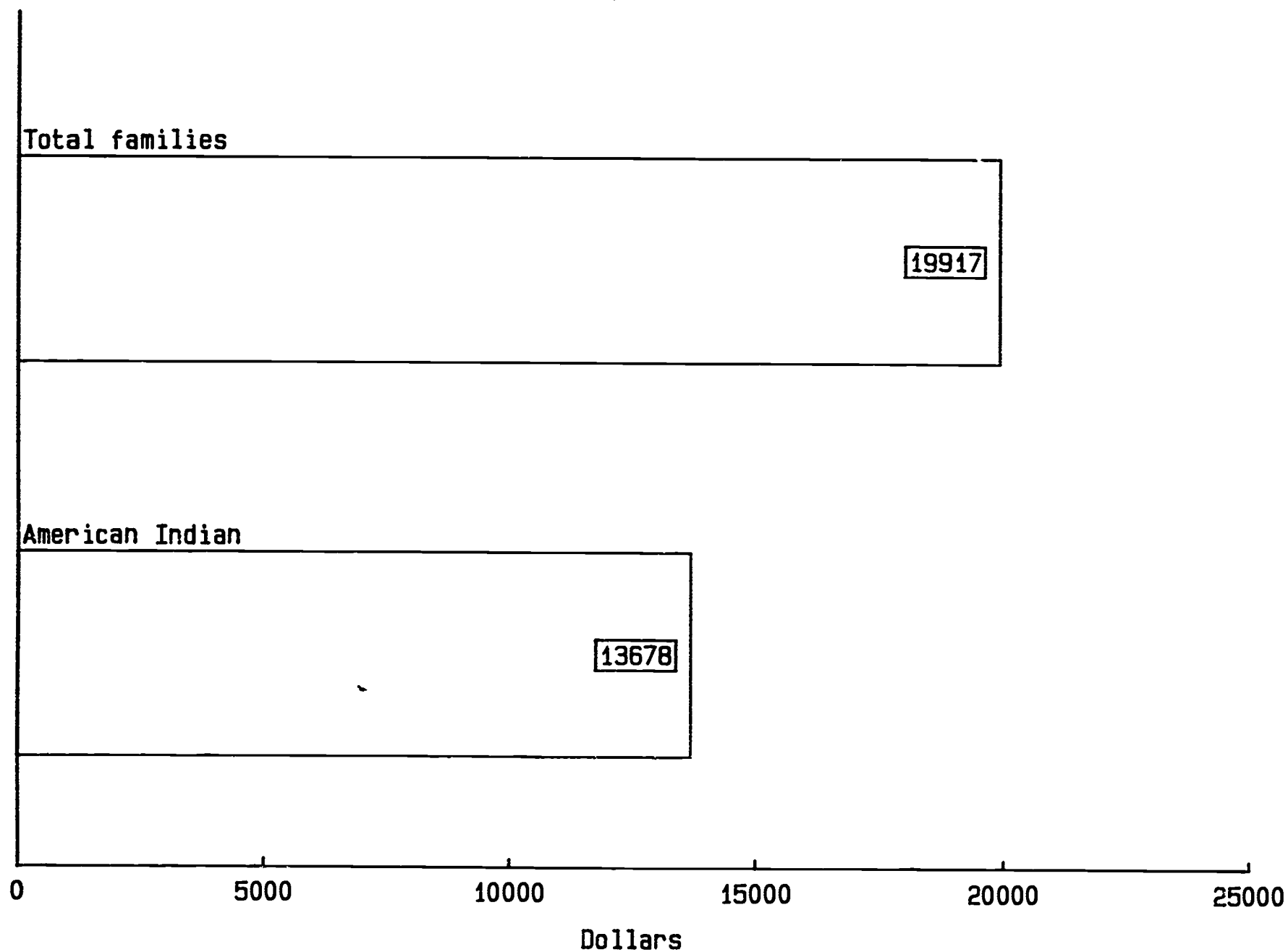

Median Family Income in 1979

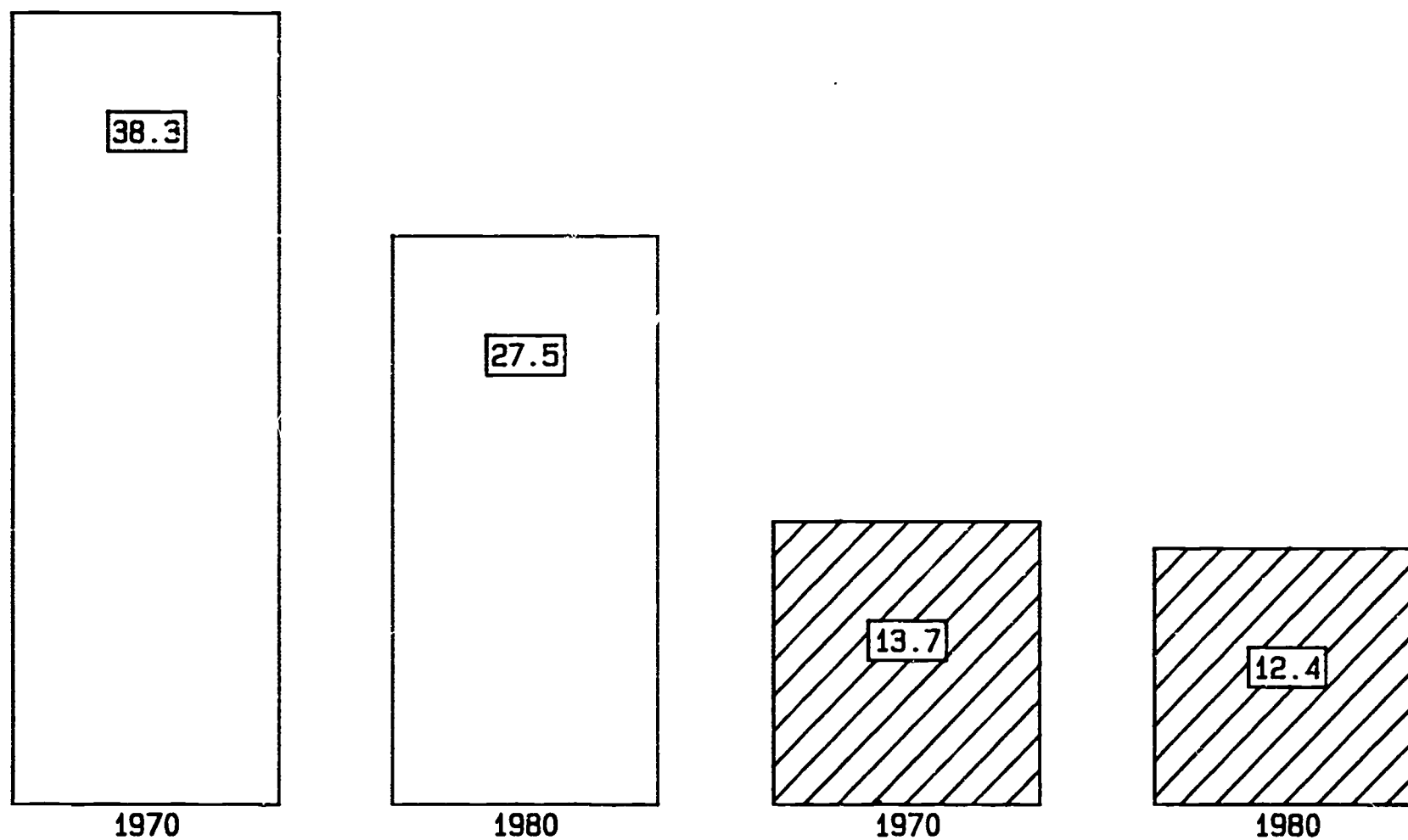


Poverty Rates of Persons: 1970 and 1980

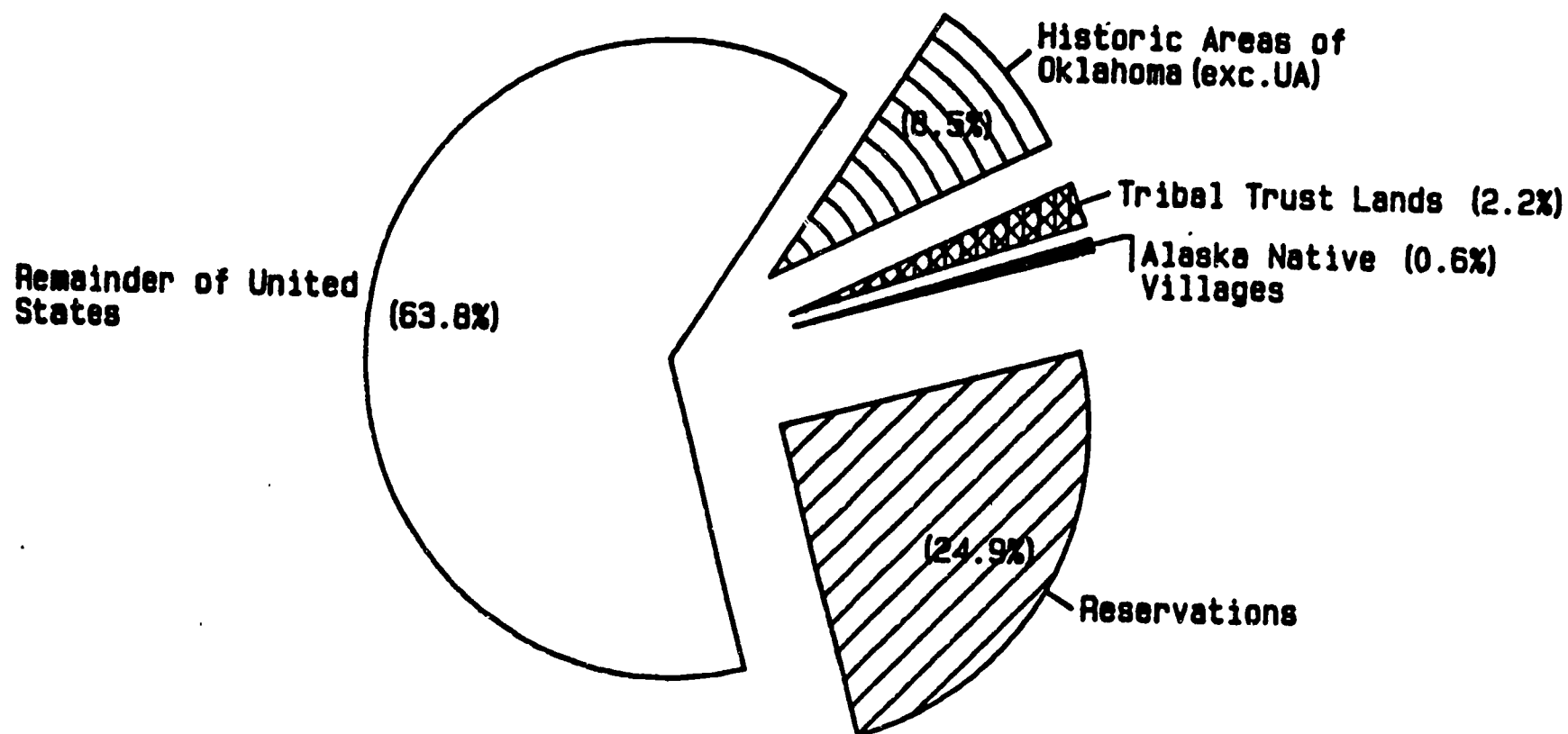

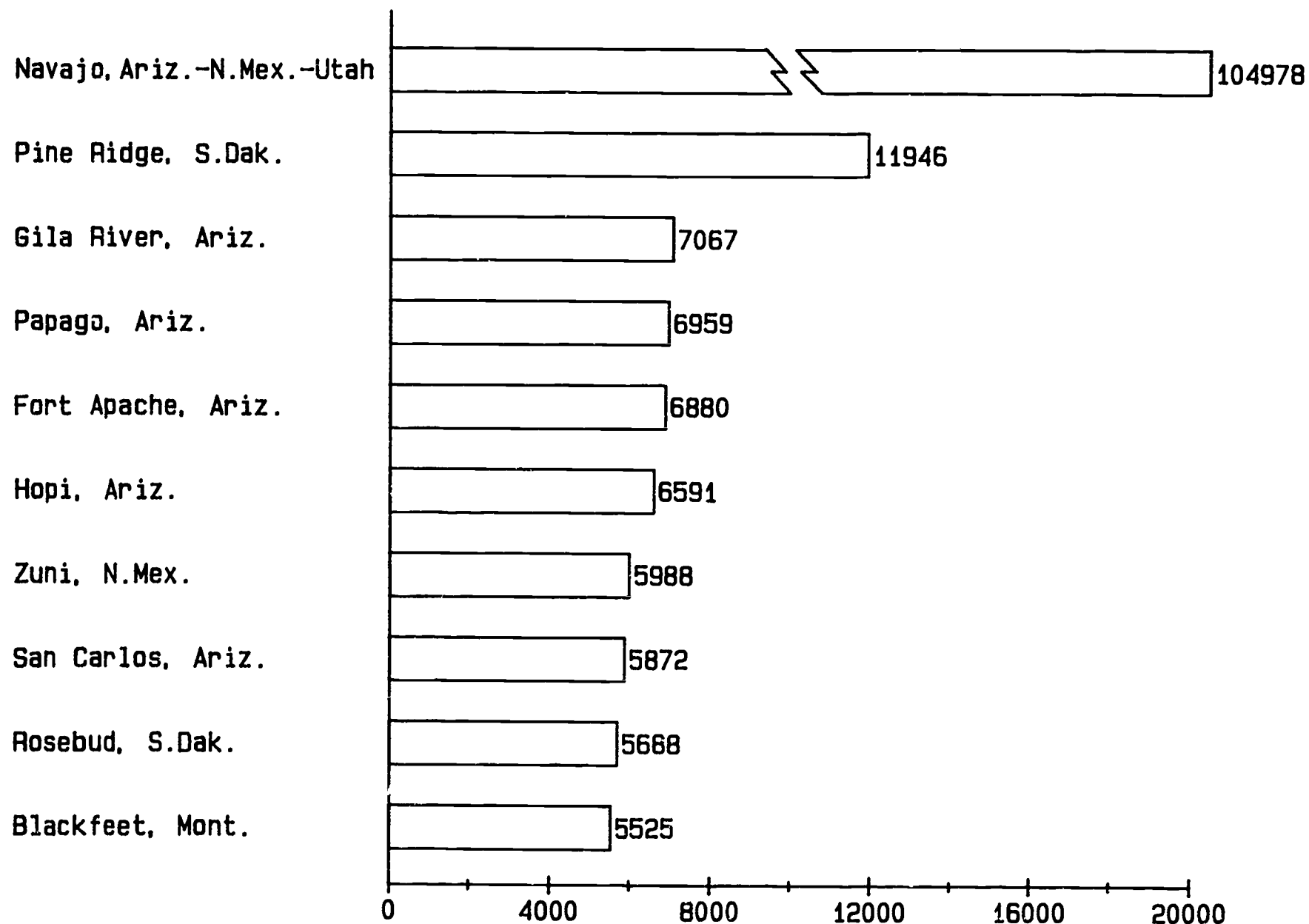

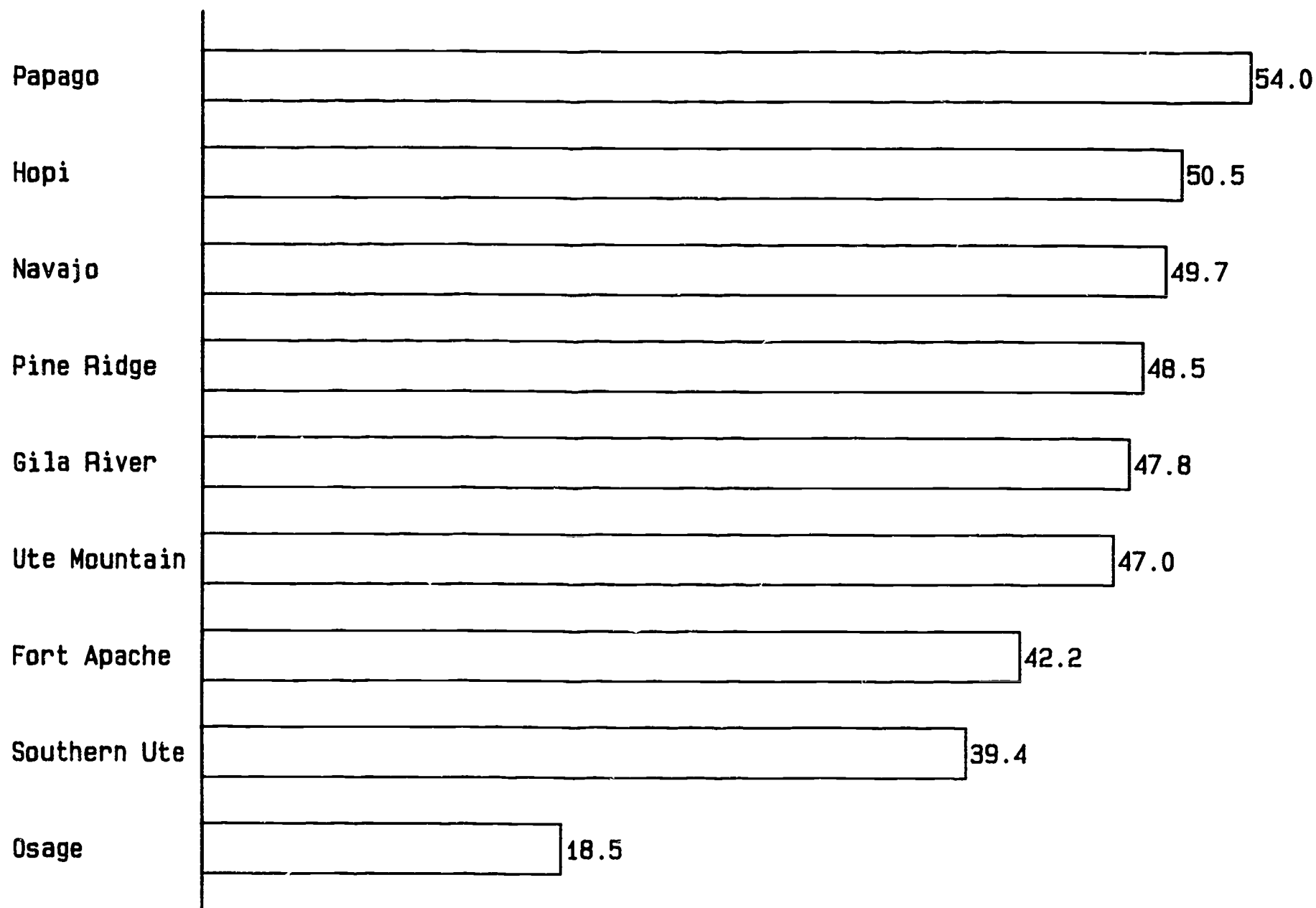
Distribution of the American Indian Population: 1980

Ten Reservations With Largest Number of American Indians: 1980



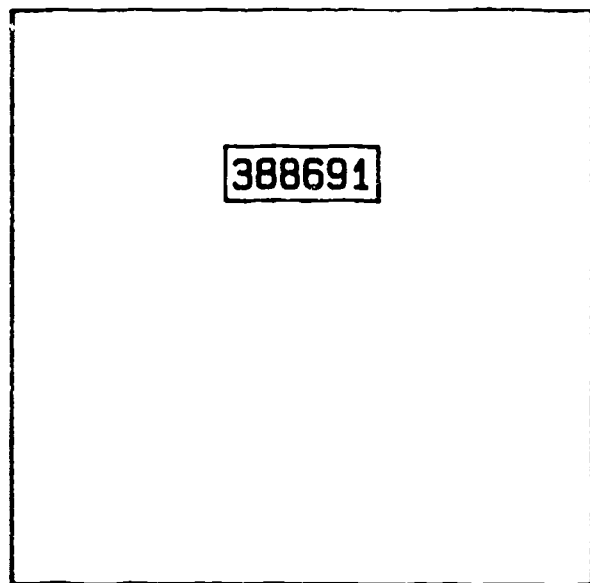
Poverty Status in 1979 of Persons on Selected Reservations: 1980



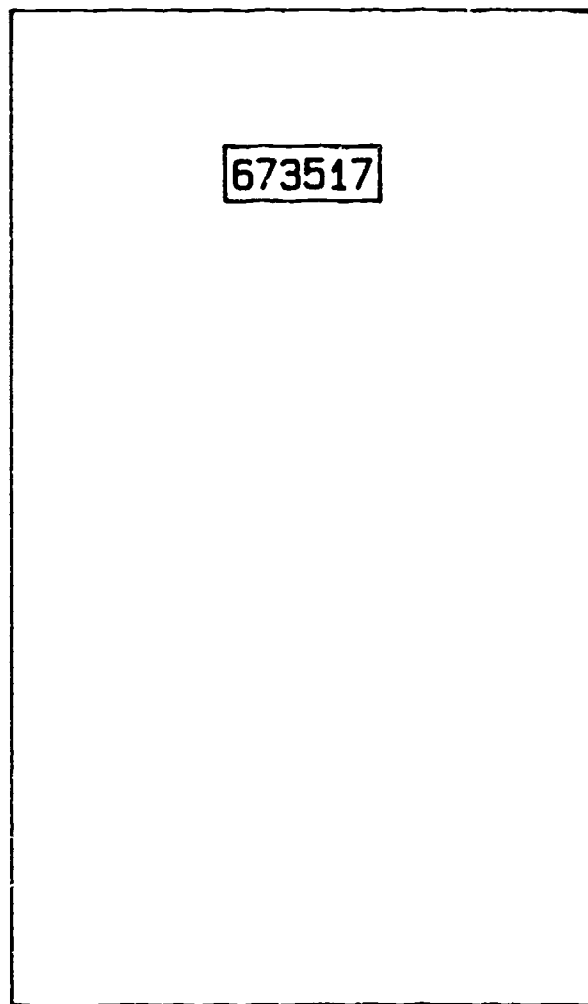

Total American Indian Male Population: 1970 and 1980

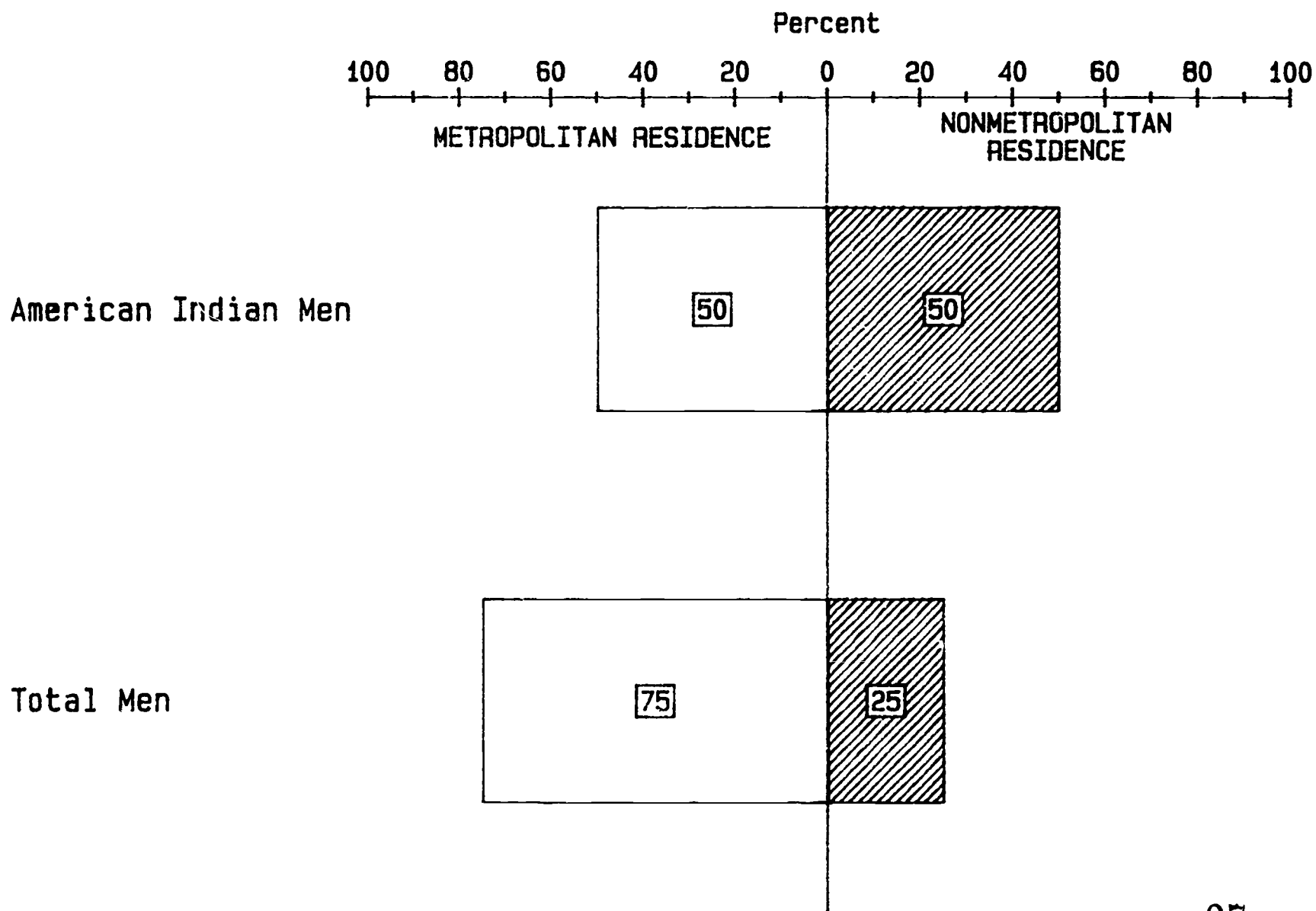

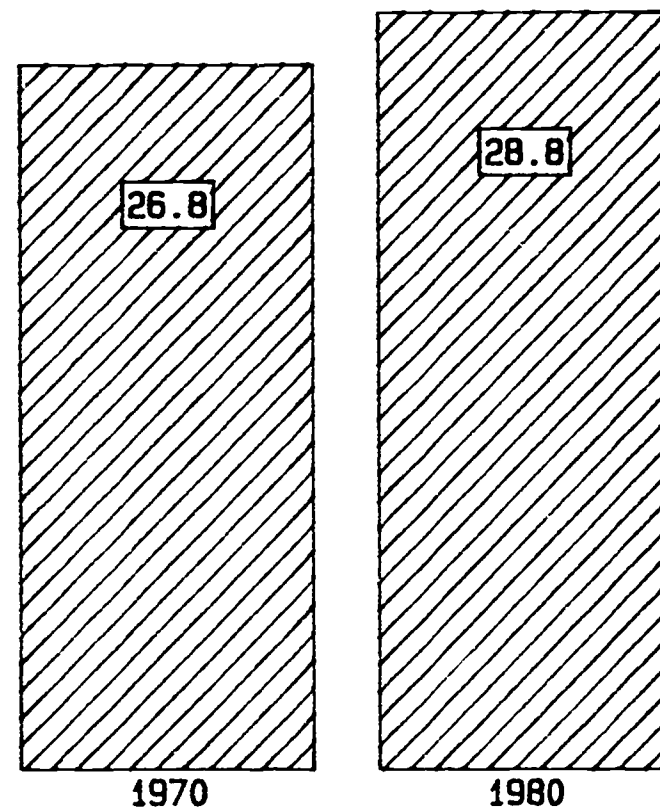
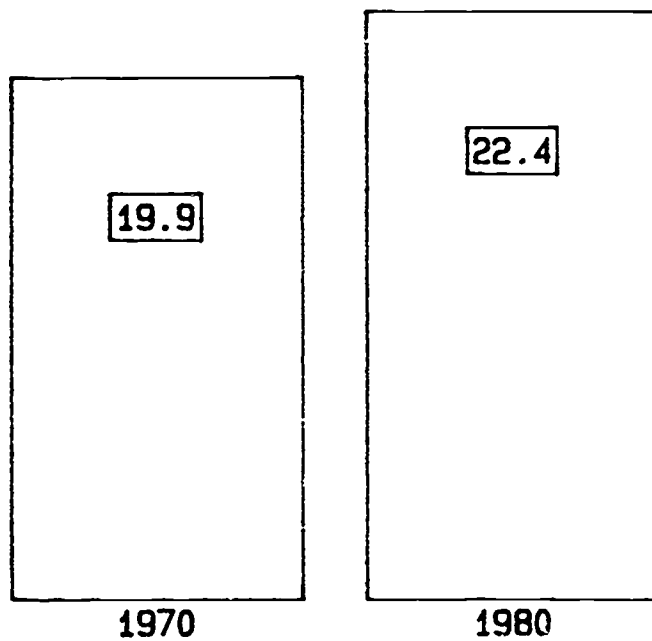


Median Age of American Indian Men: 1970 and 1980

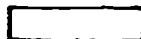

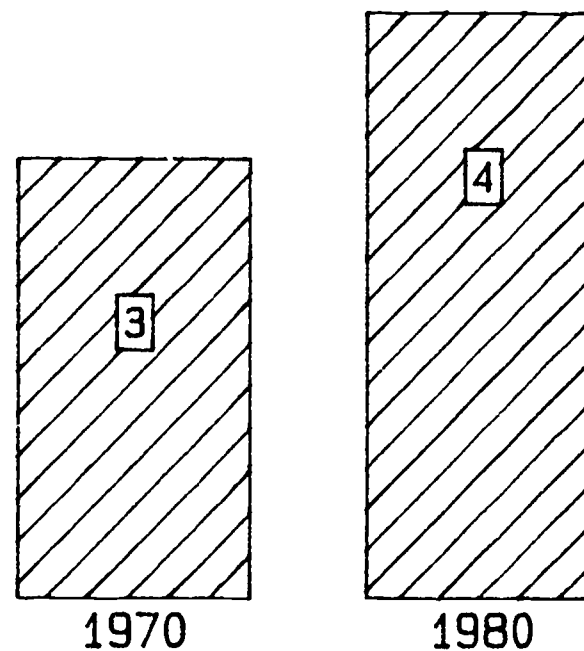
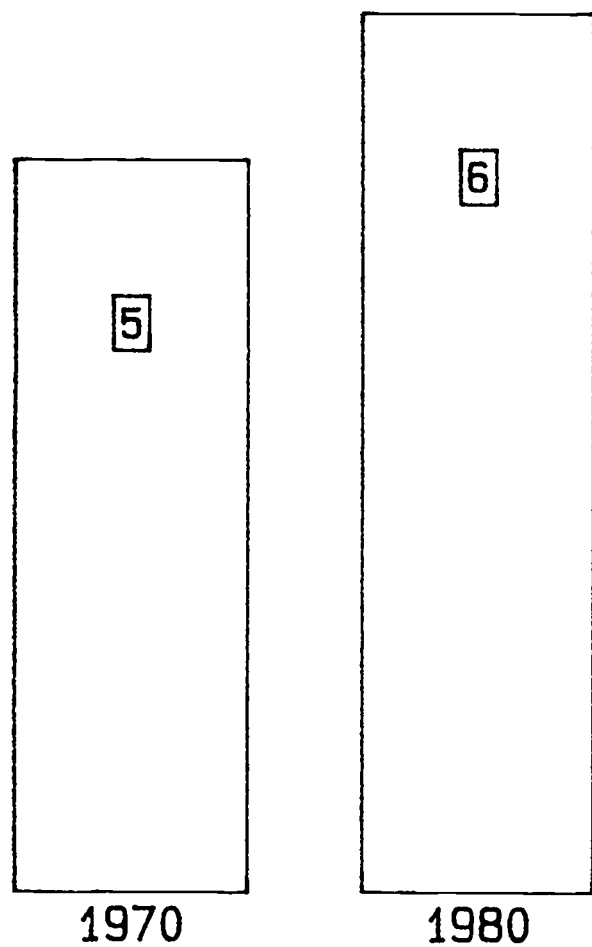


Families Maintained by Men: 1970 and 1980 (Percent of Families)

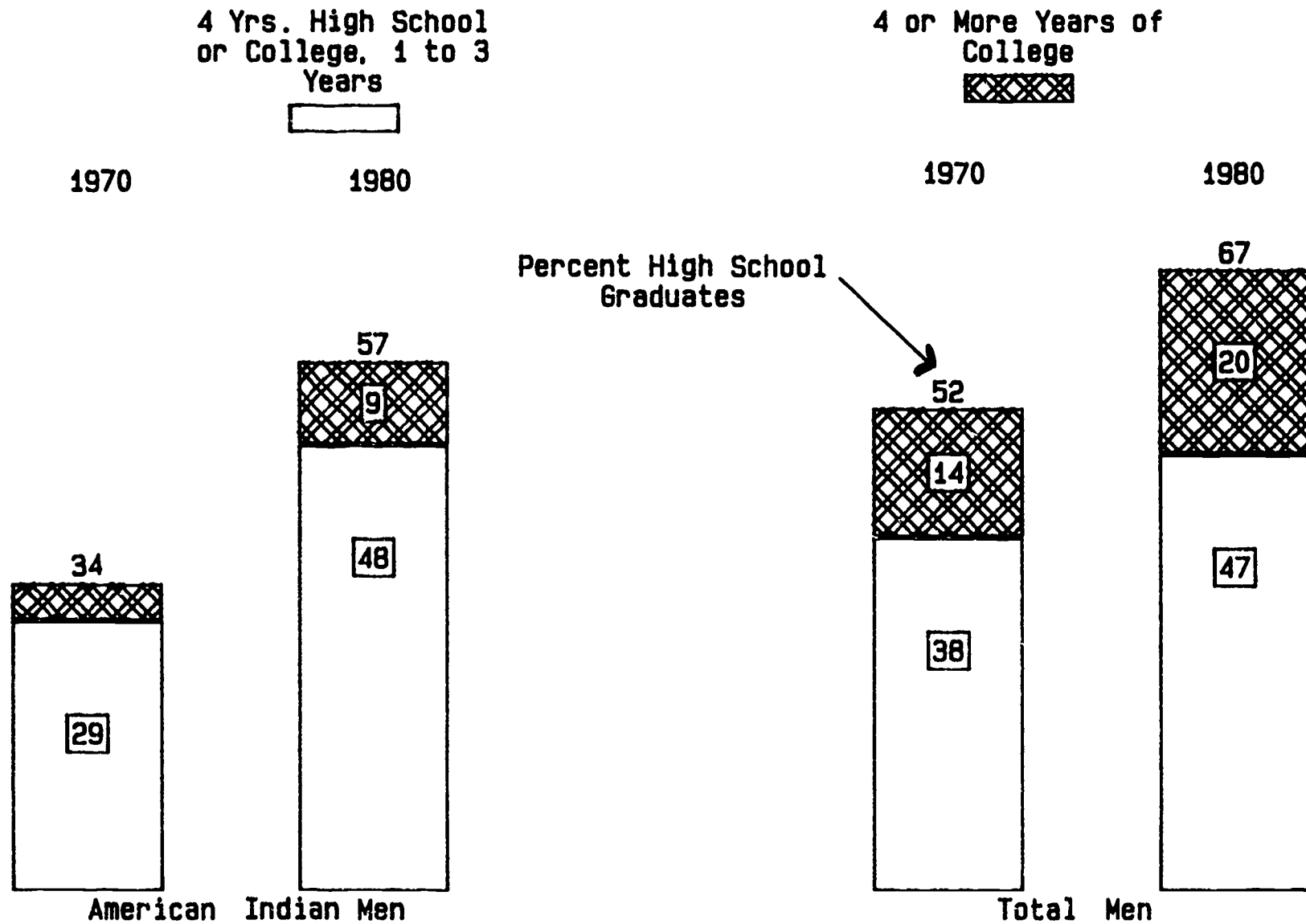

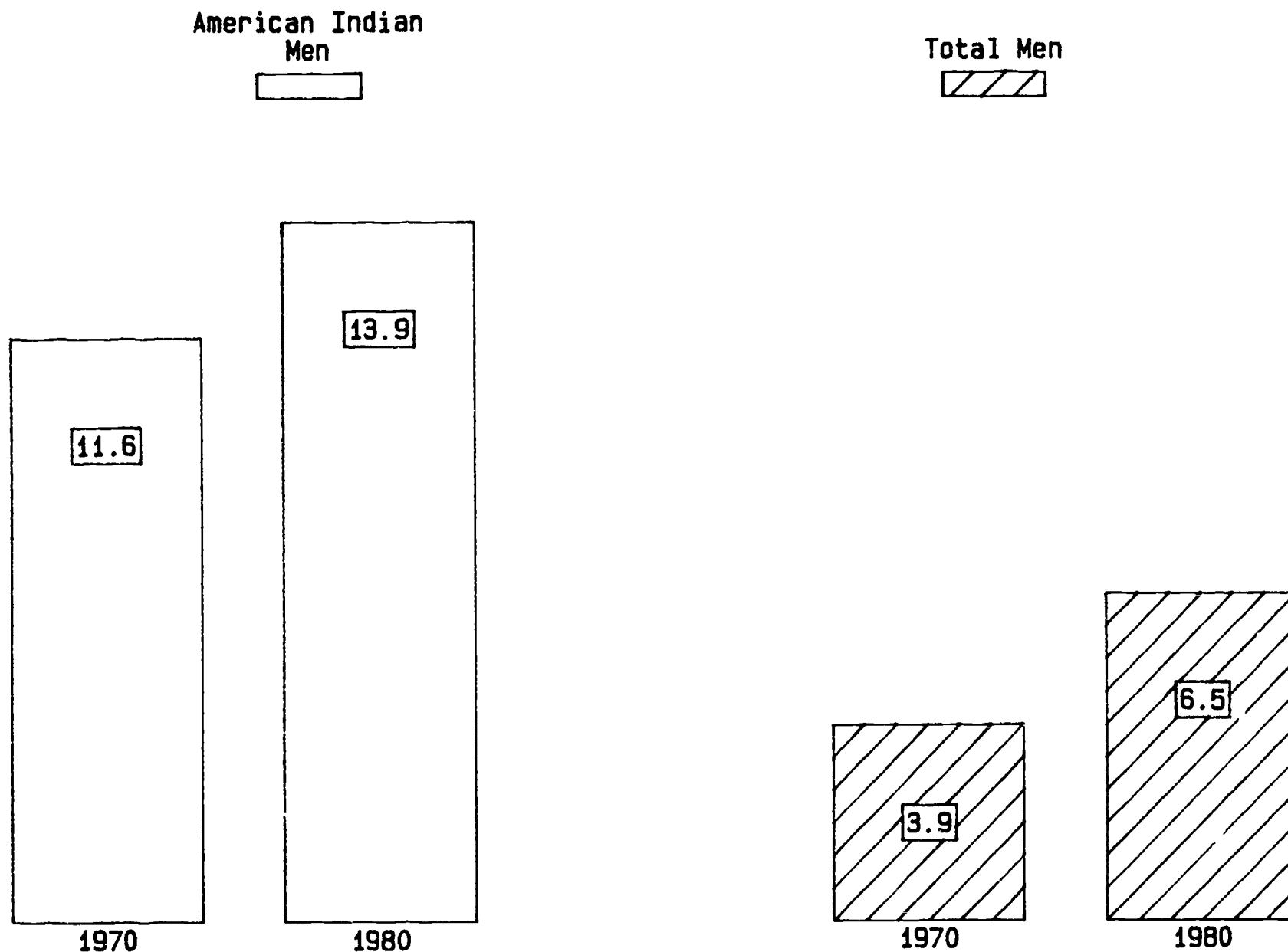

Unemployment Rates for American Indian Men: 1970 and 1980



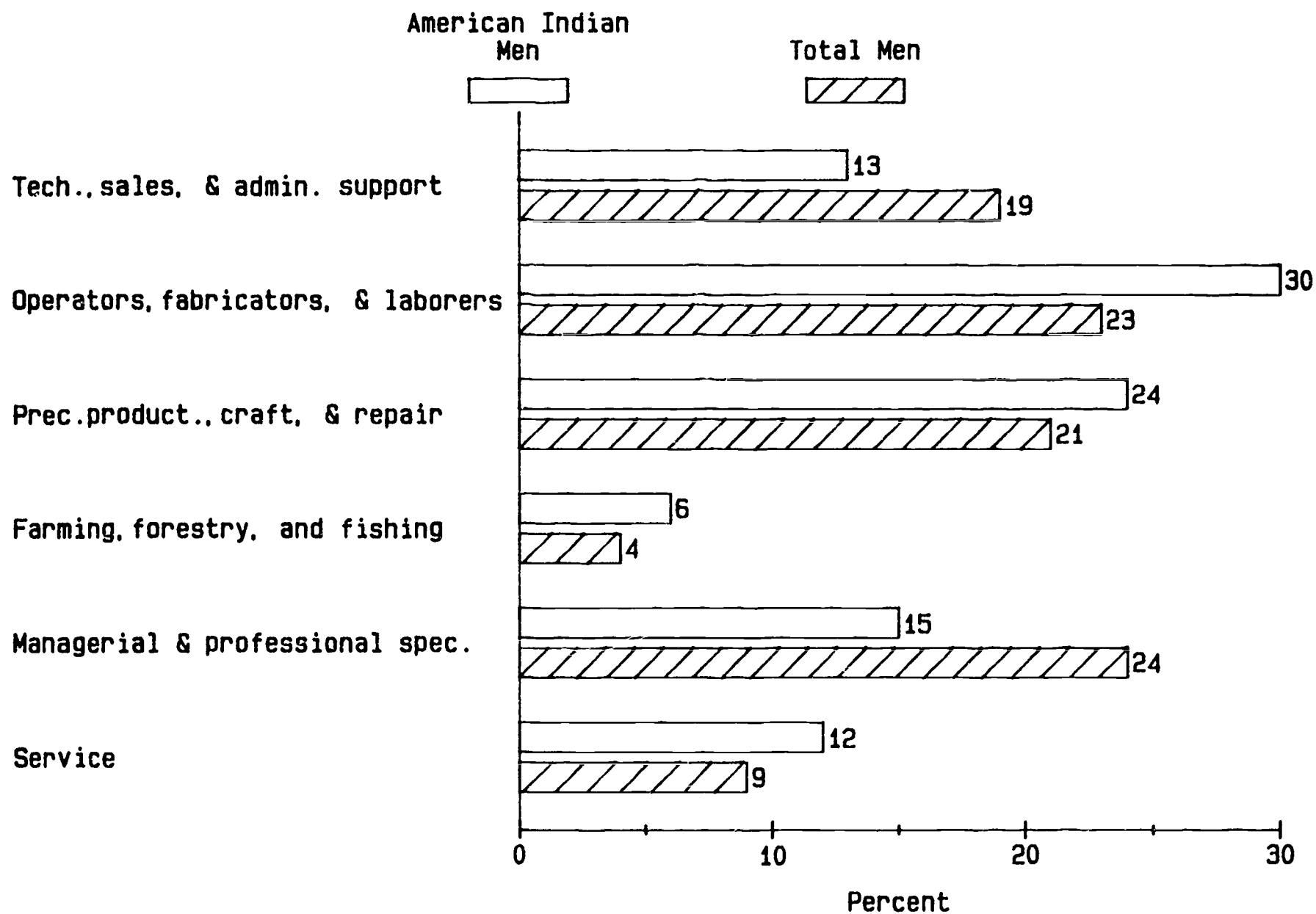

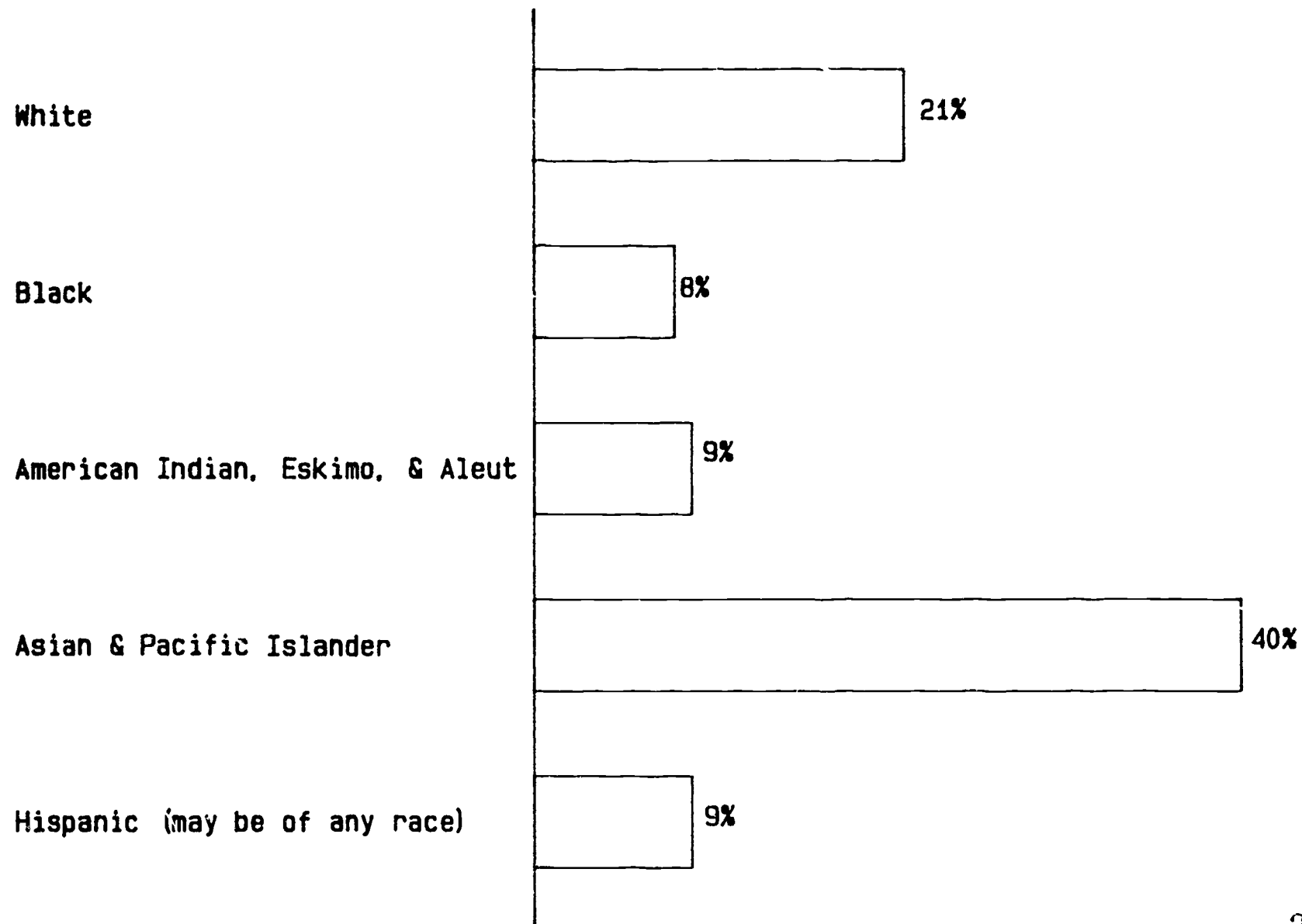

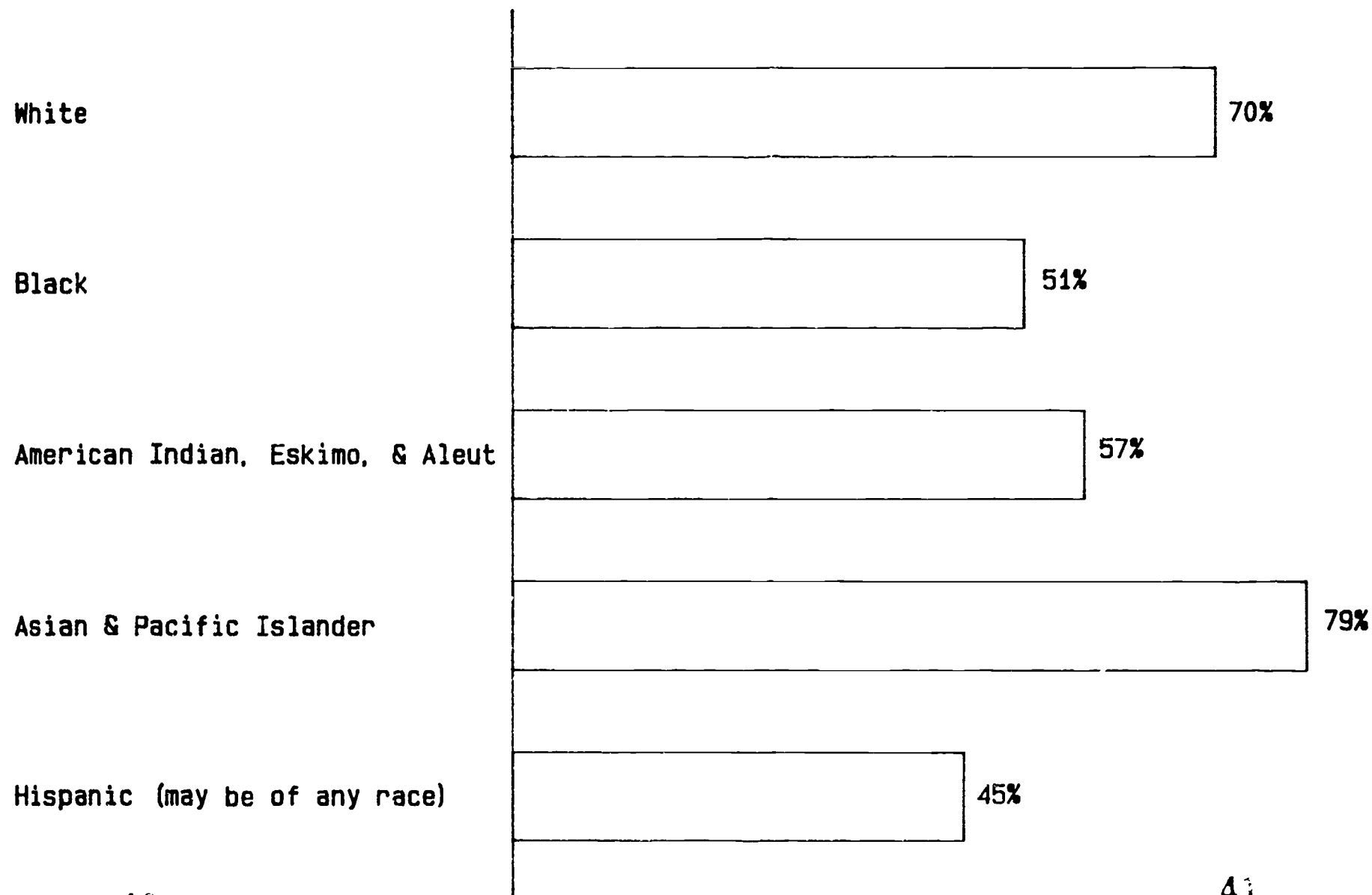
Occupation of American Indian Men: 1980



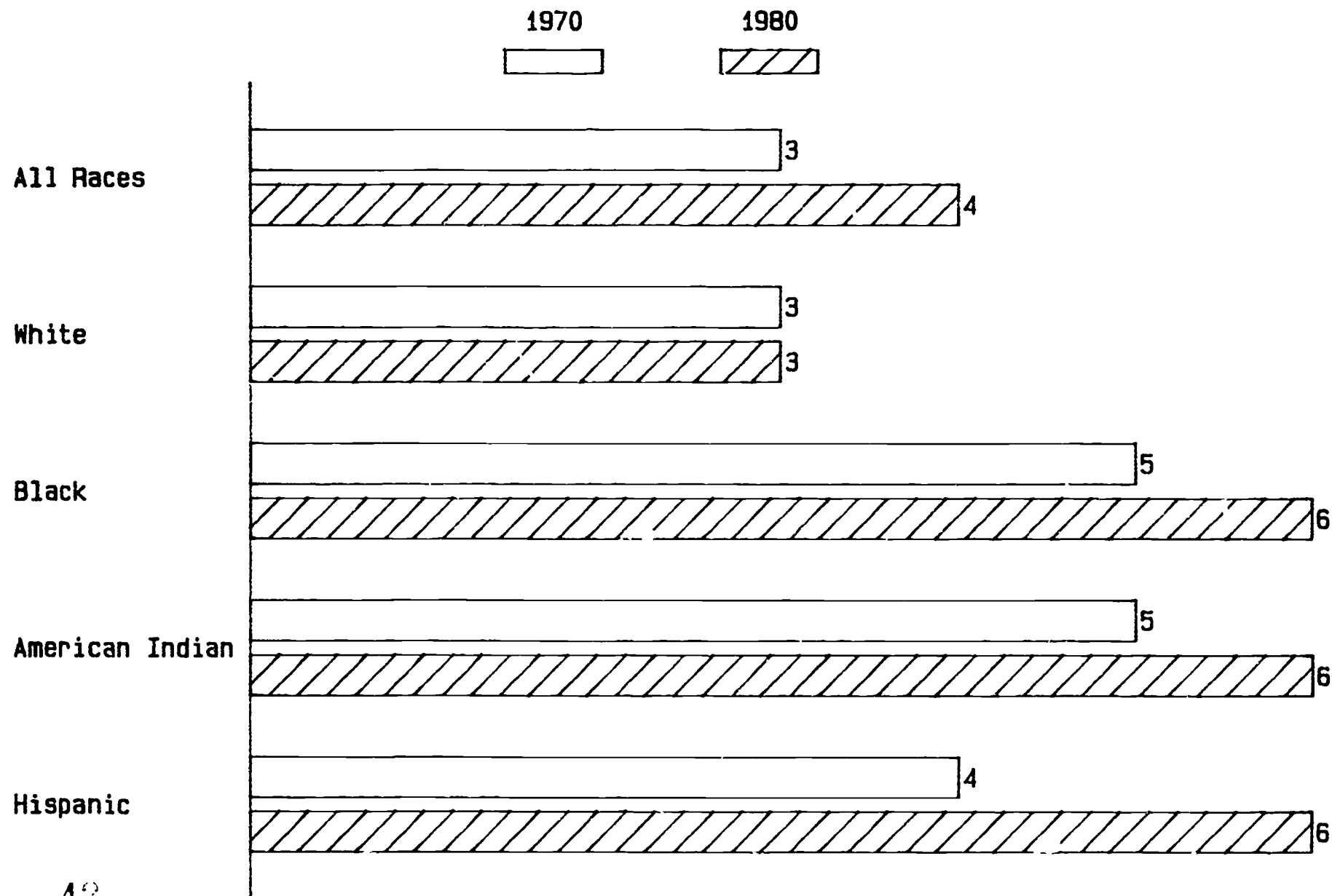
Percentage of Men 25 Years Old and Over With 4 or
More Years of College: 1980



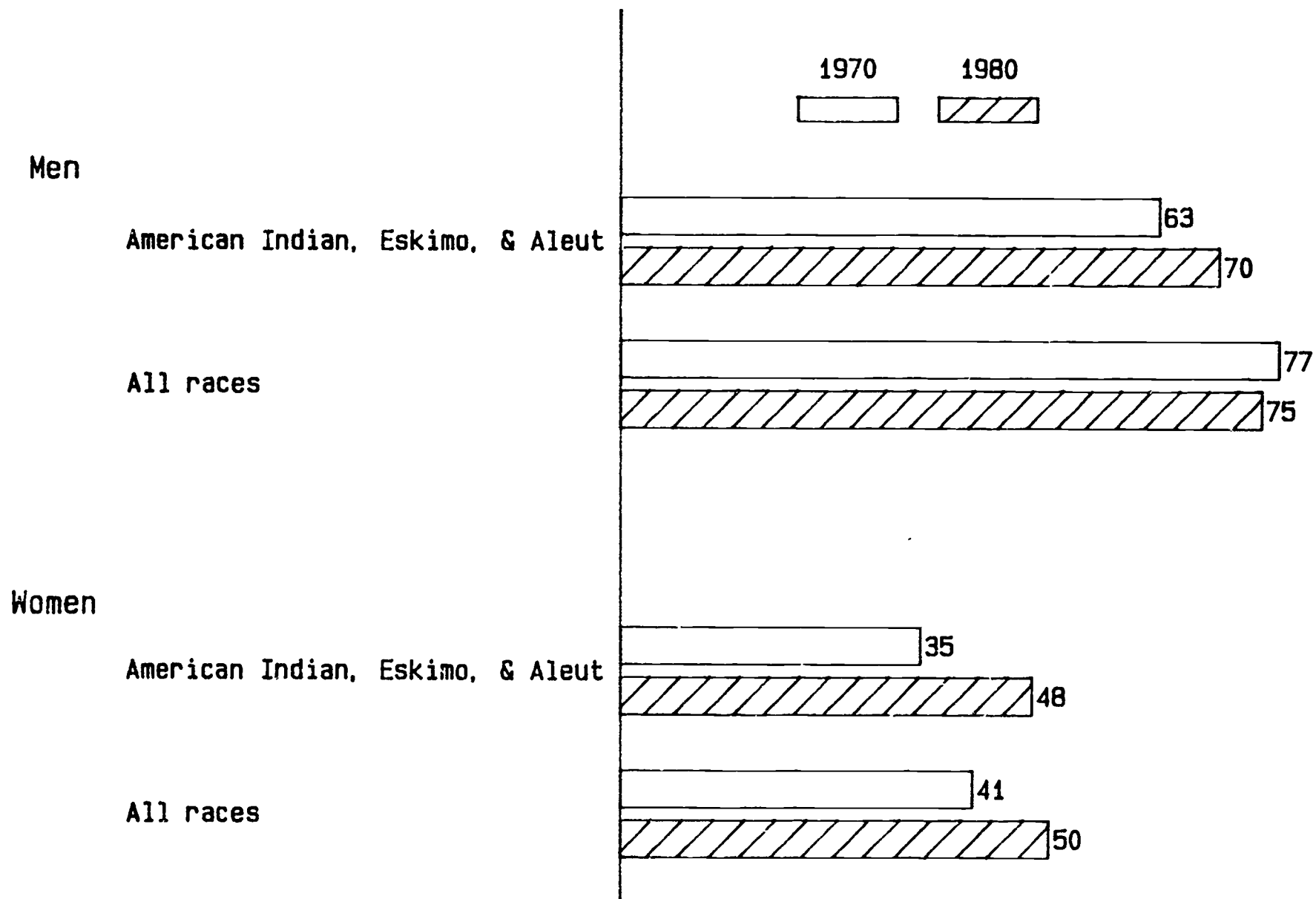
Percent High School Graduates Among Men 25 Years

Percentage of Families Maintained by Men



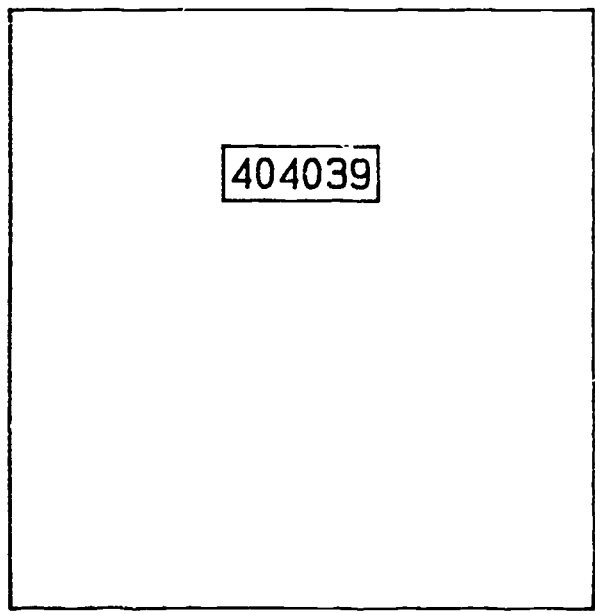
Labor Force Participation Rates for American Indians (Civilian noninstitutional population)

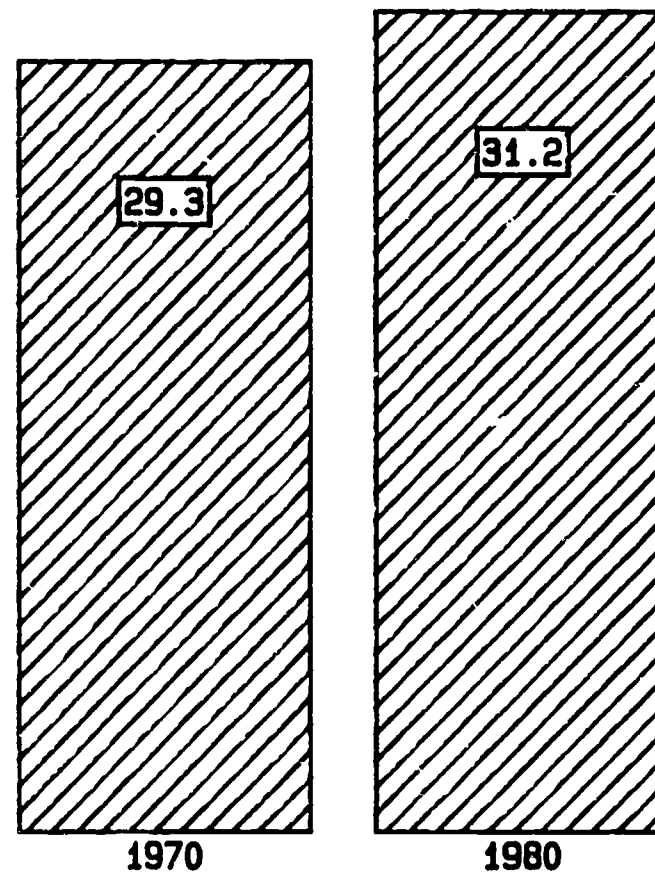
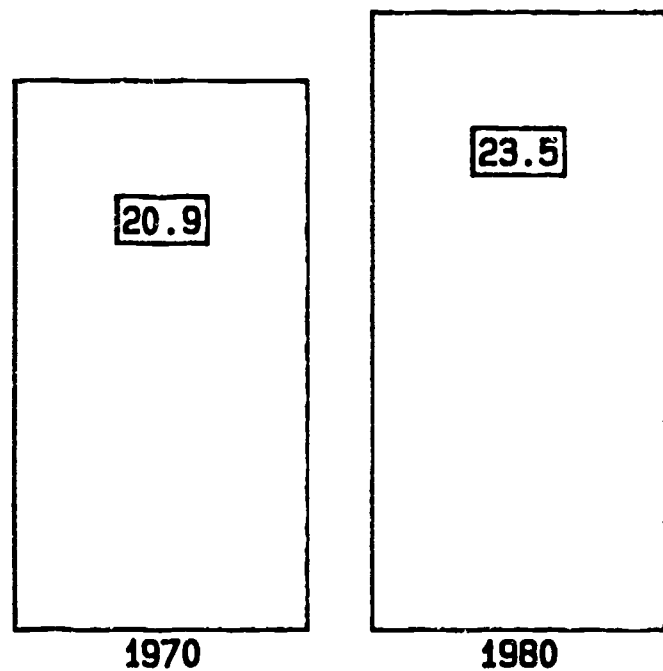


Median Age of American Indian Women: 1970 and 1980

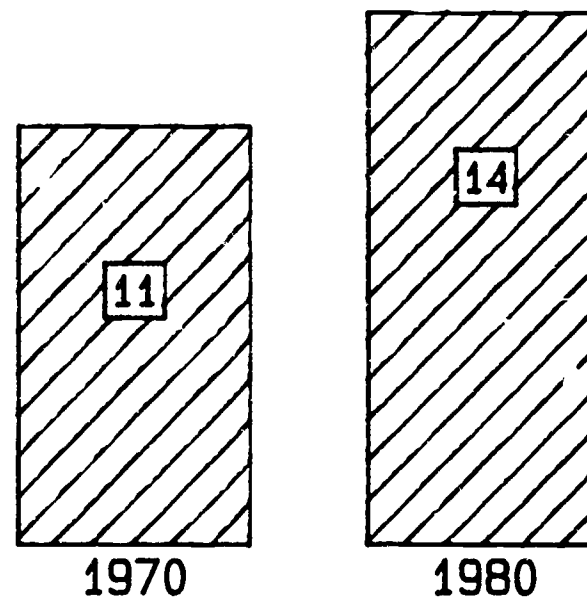
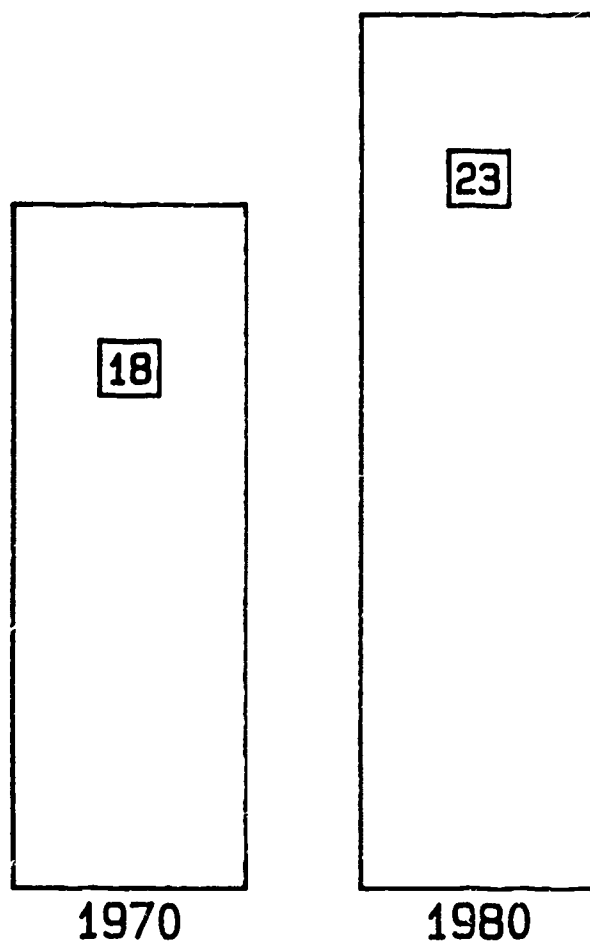


Families Maintained by Women: 1970 and 1980 (Percent of Families)

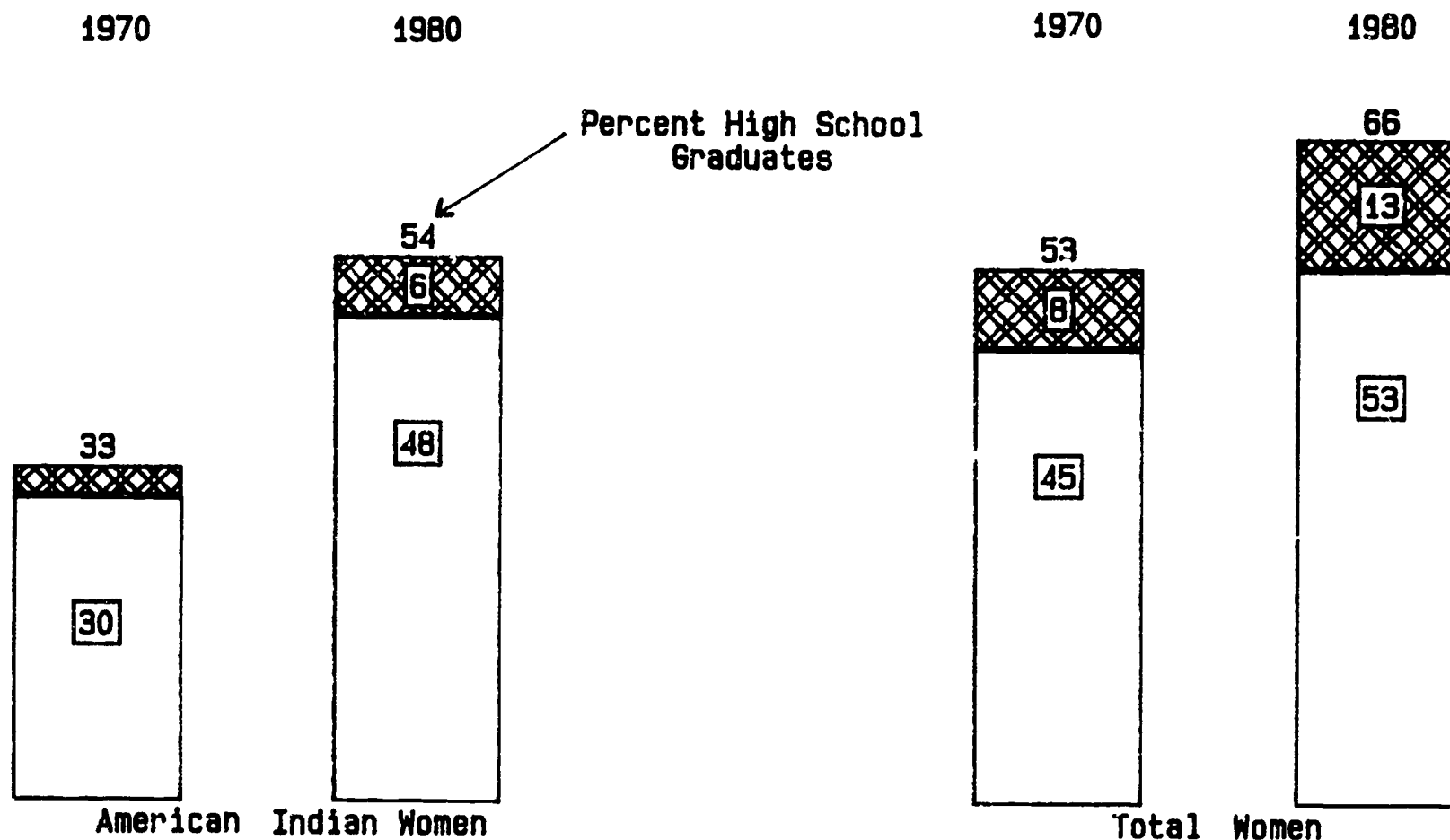

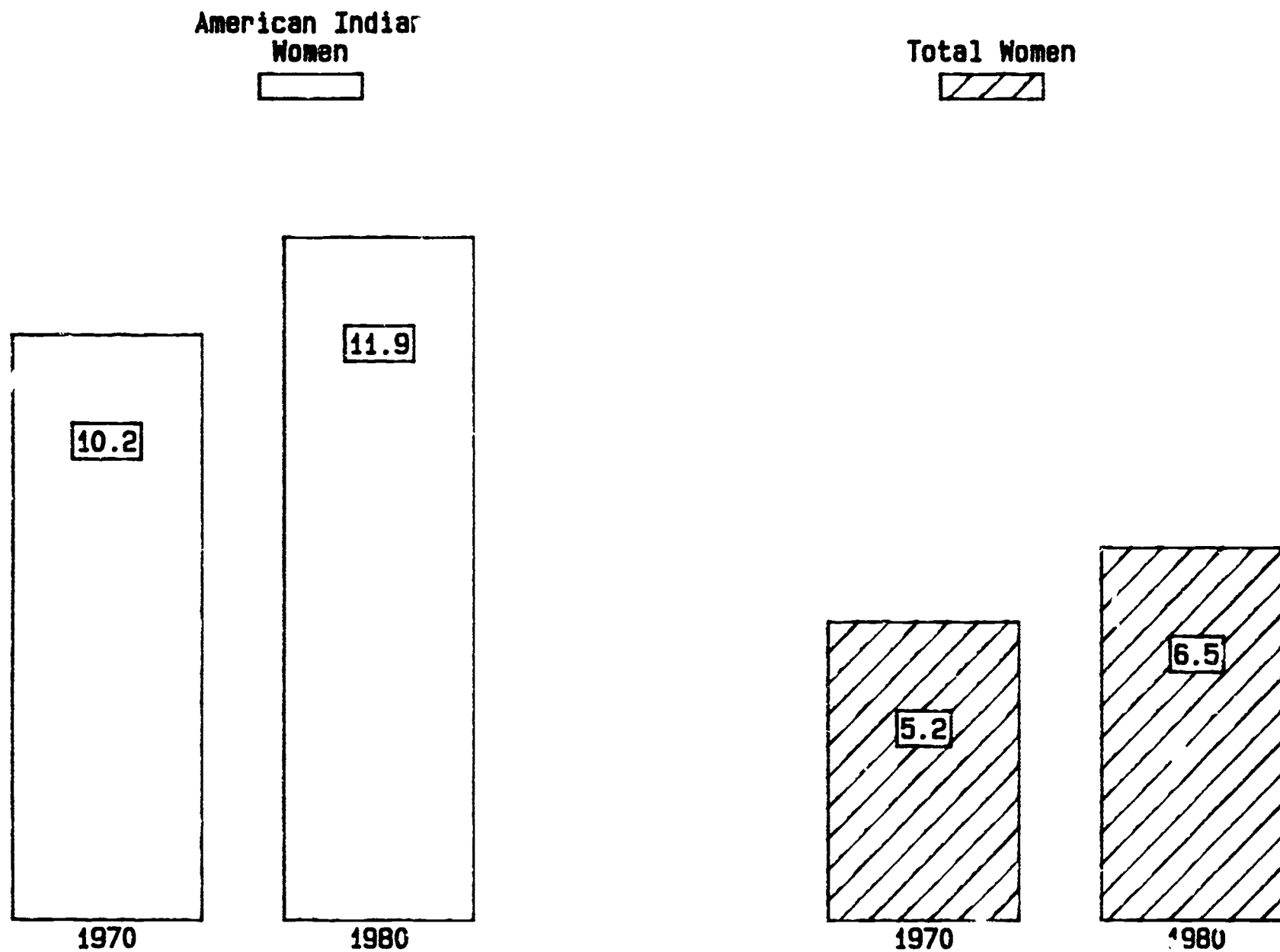

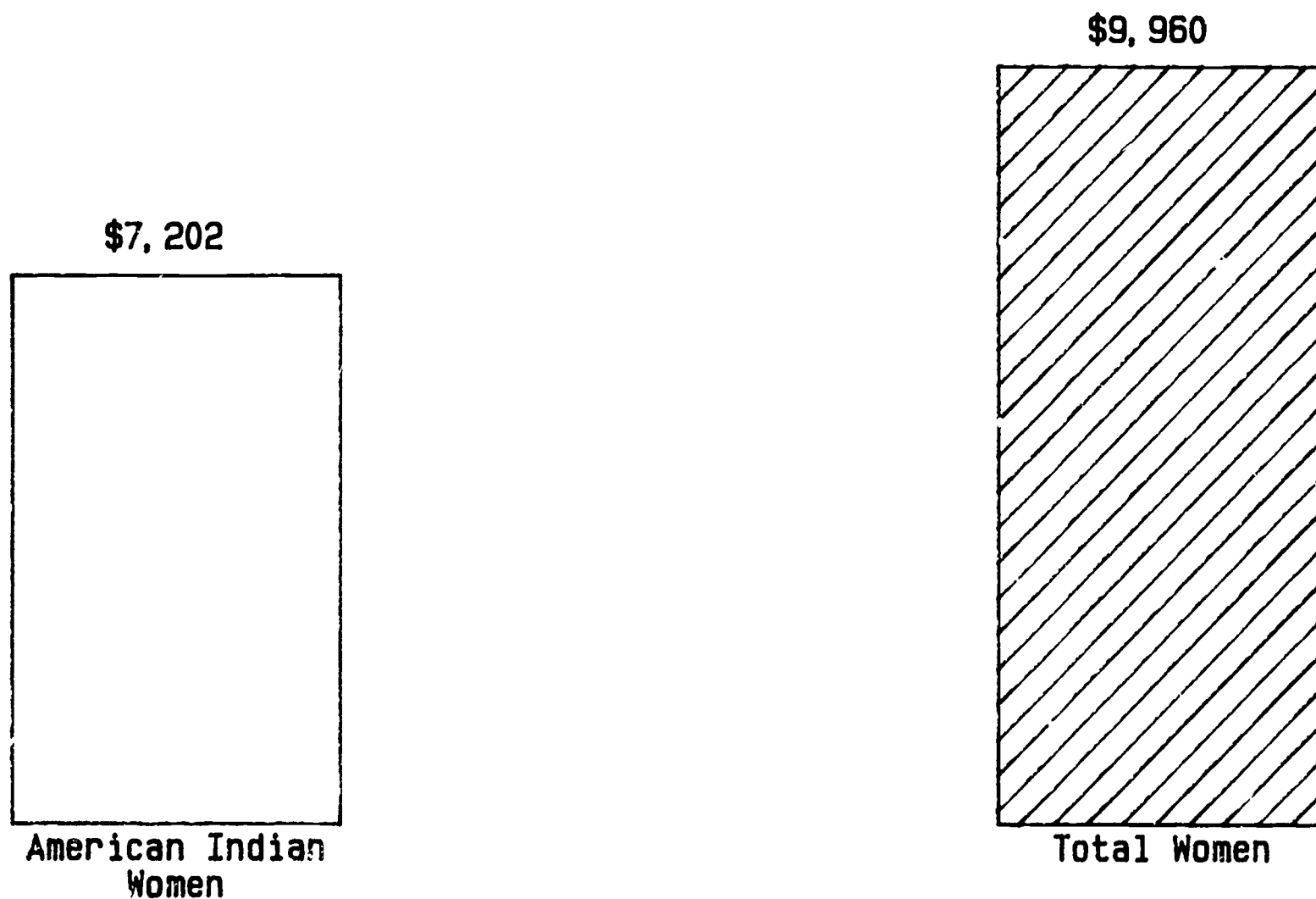
Unemployment Rates for American Indian Women: 1970 and 1980



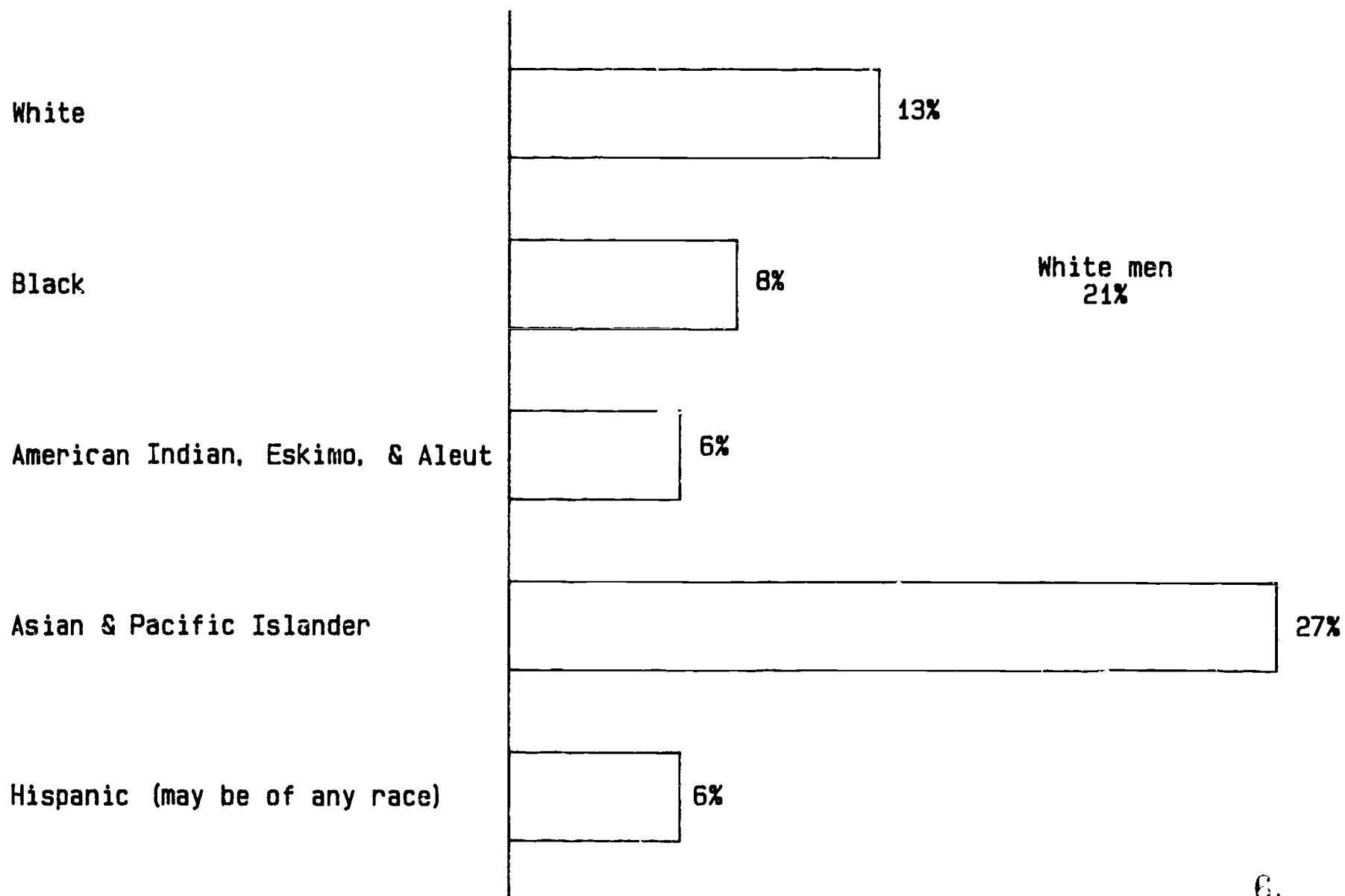
Occupation of American Indian Women: 1980



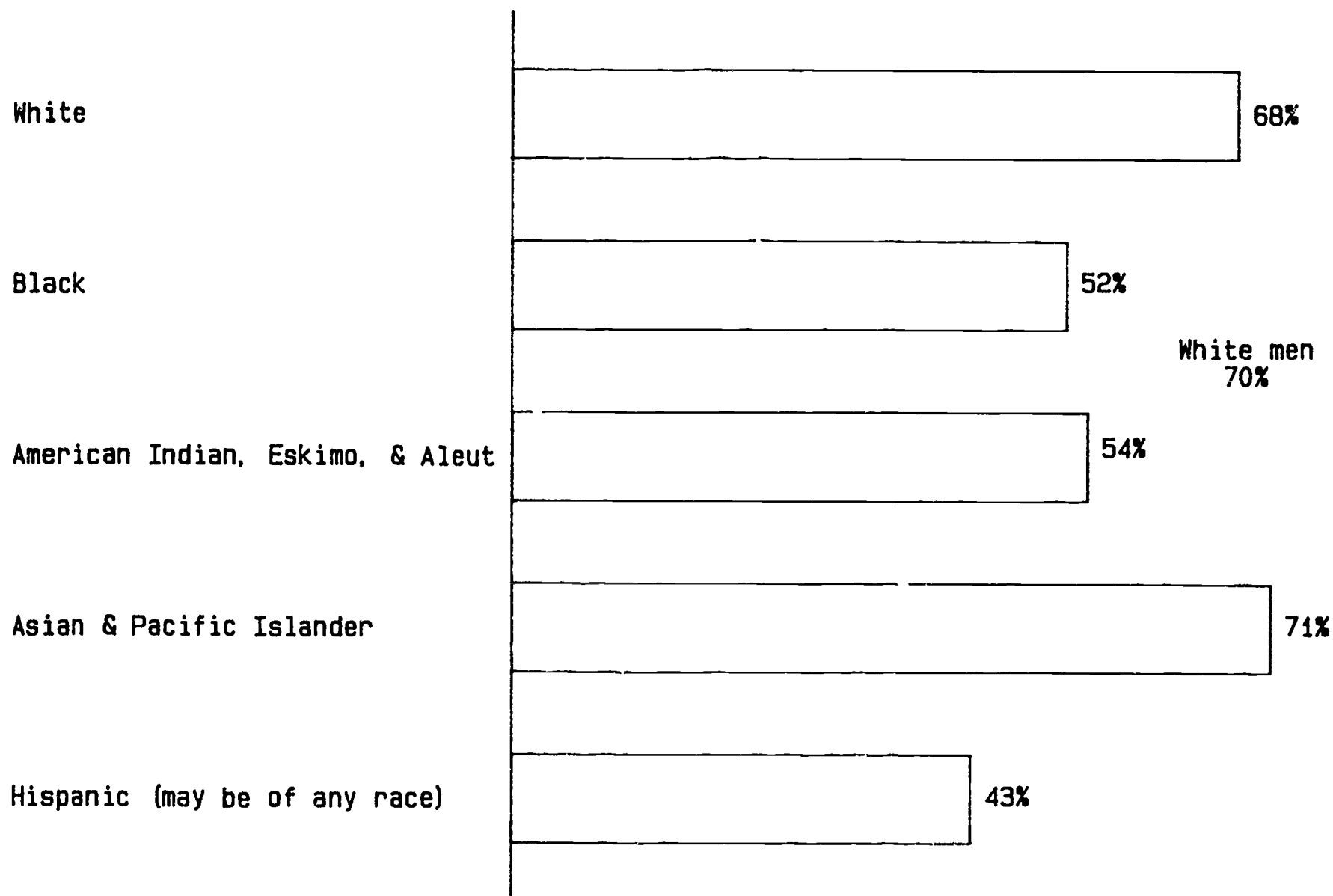
Median Family Money Income in 1979 of Families Maintained by Women: 1980



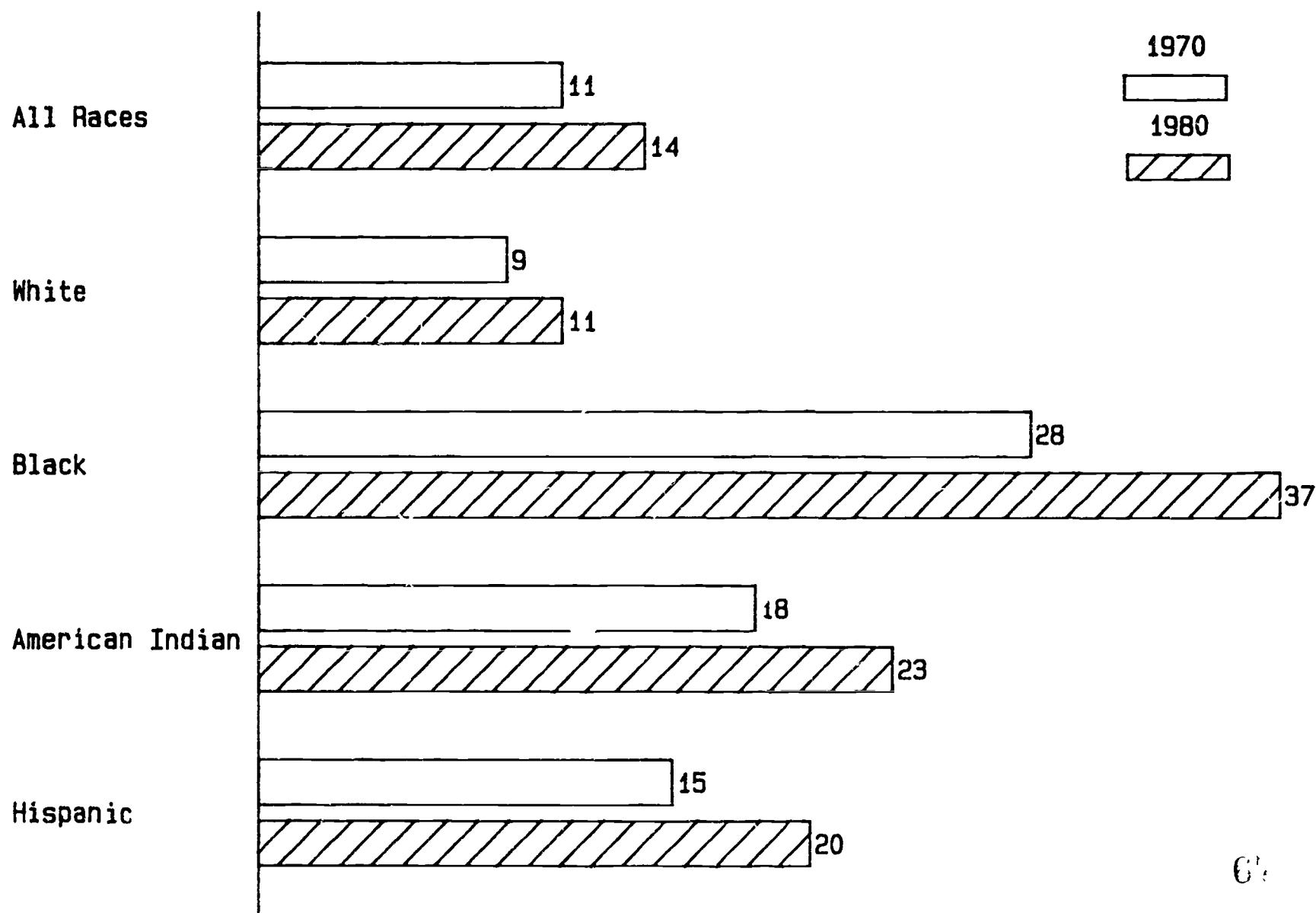
Percentage of Women 25 Years Old and Over With 4 or

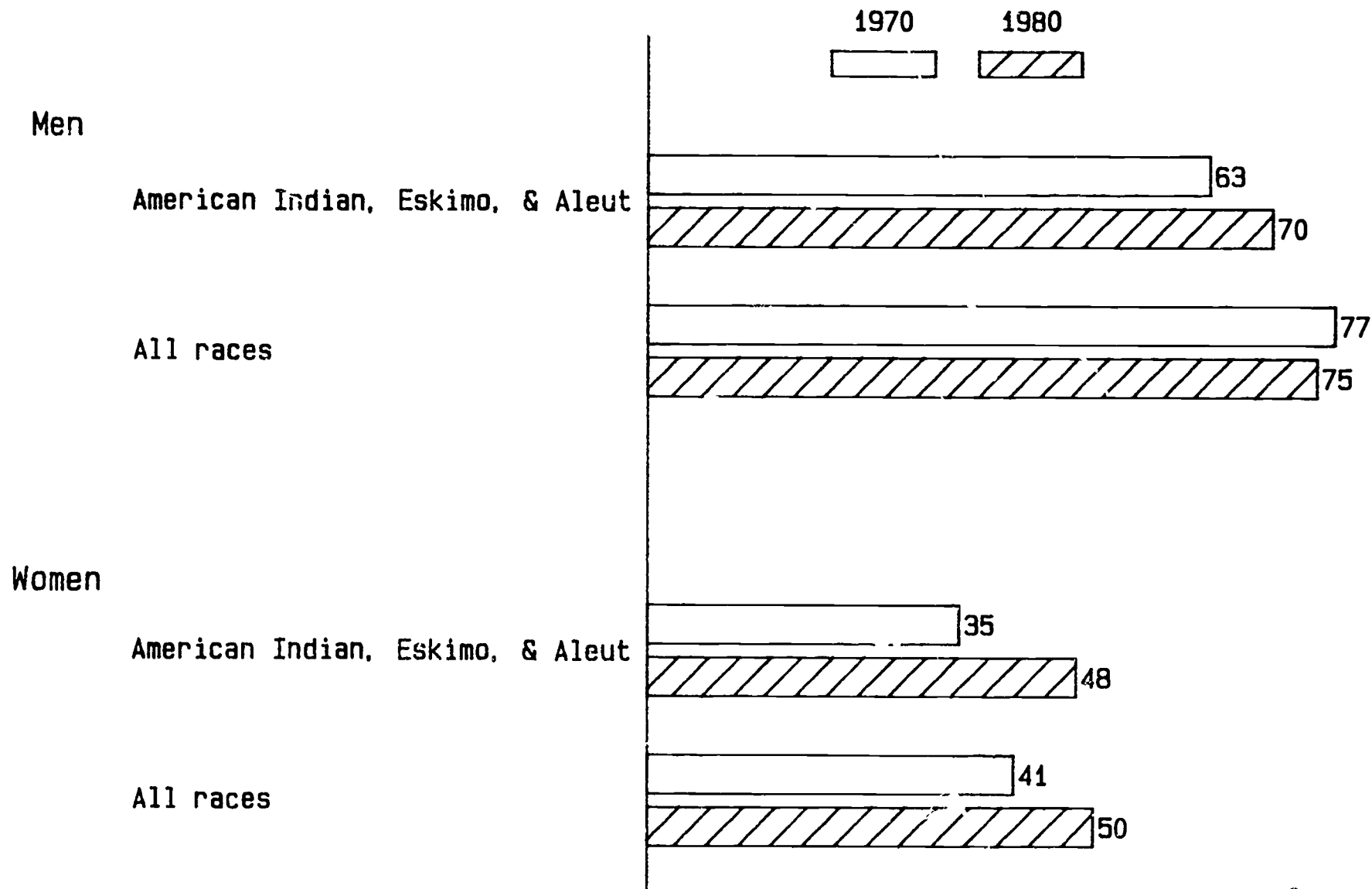

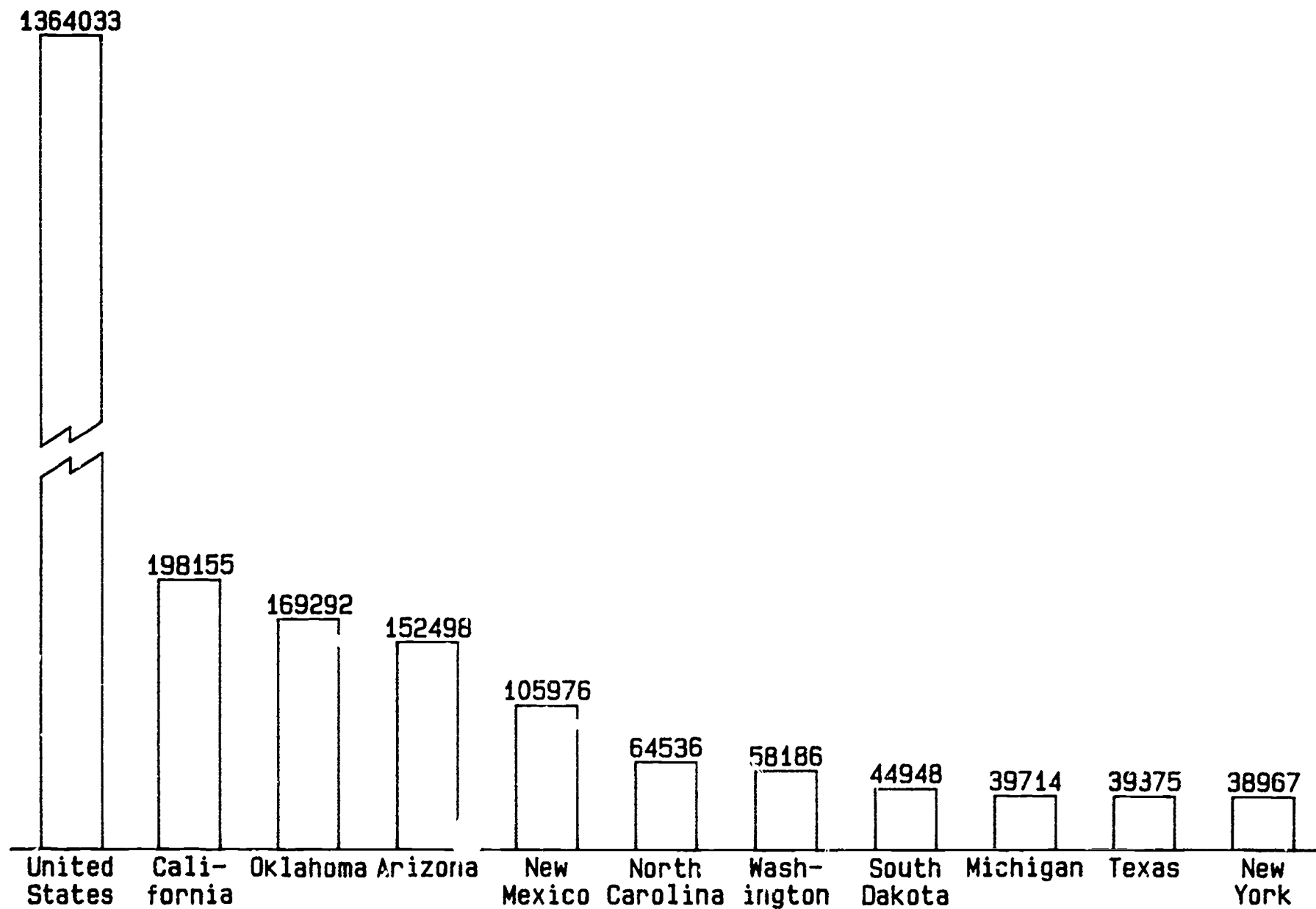
Labor Force Participation Rates for American Indians (Civilian noninstitutional population)



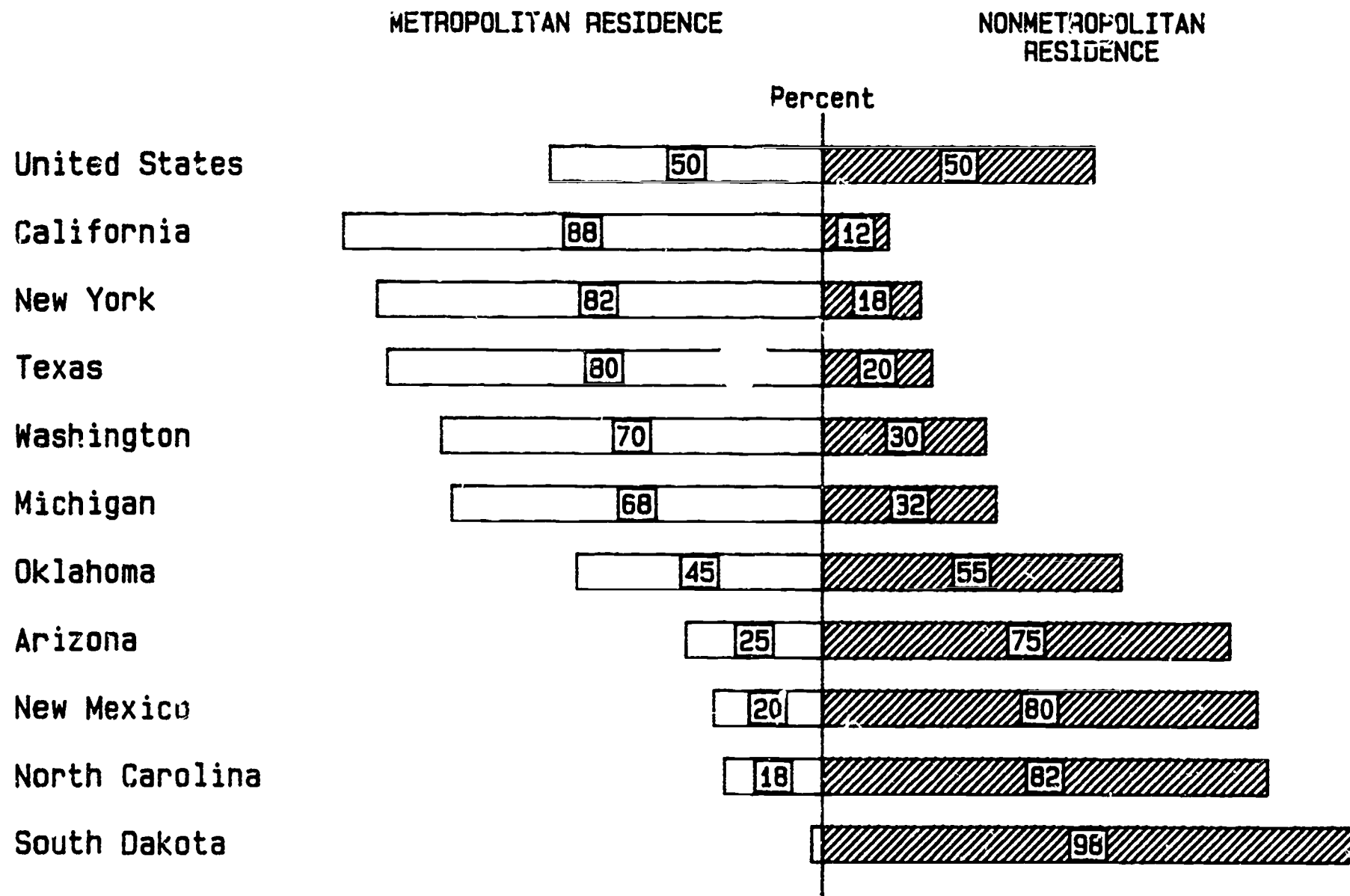

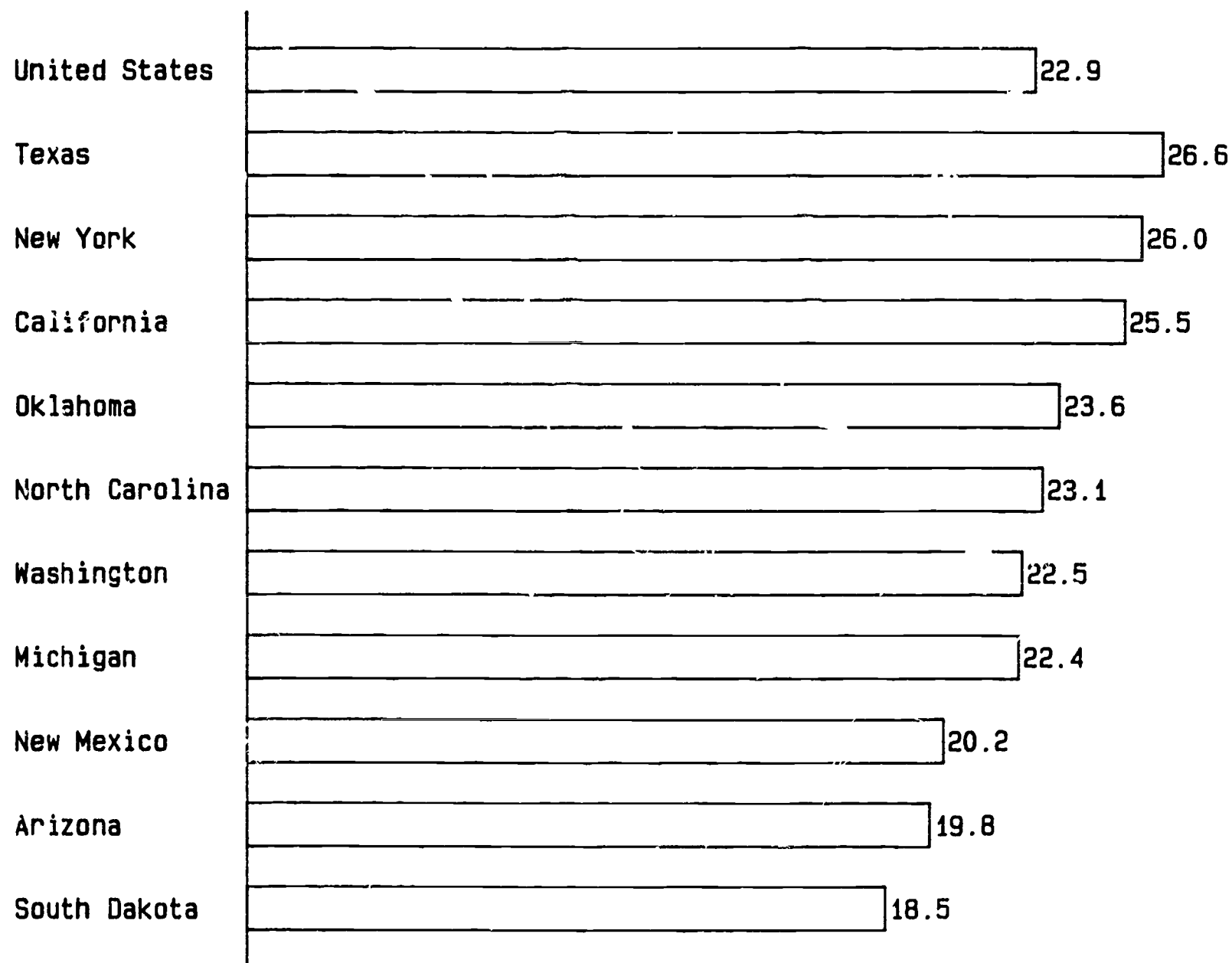
Total American Indian Population: 1980



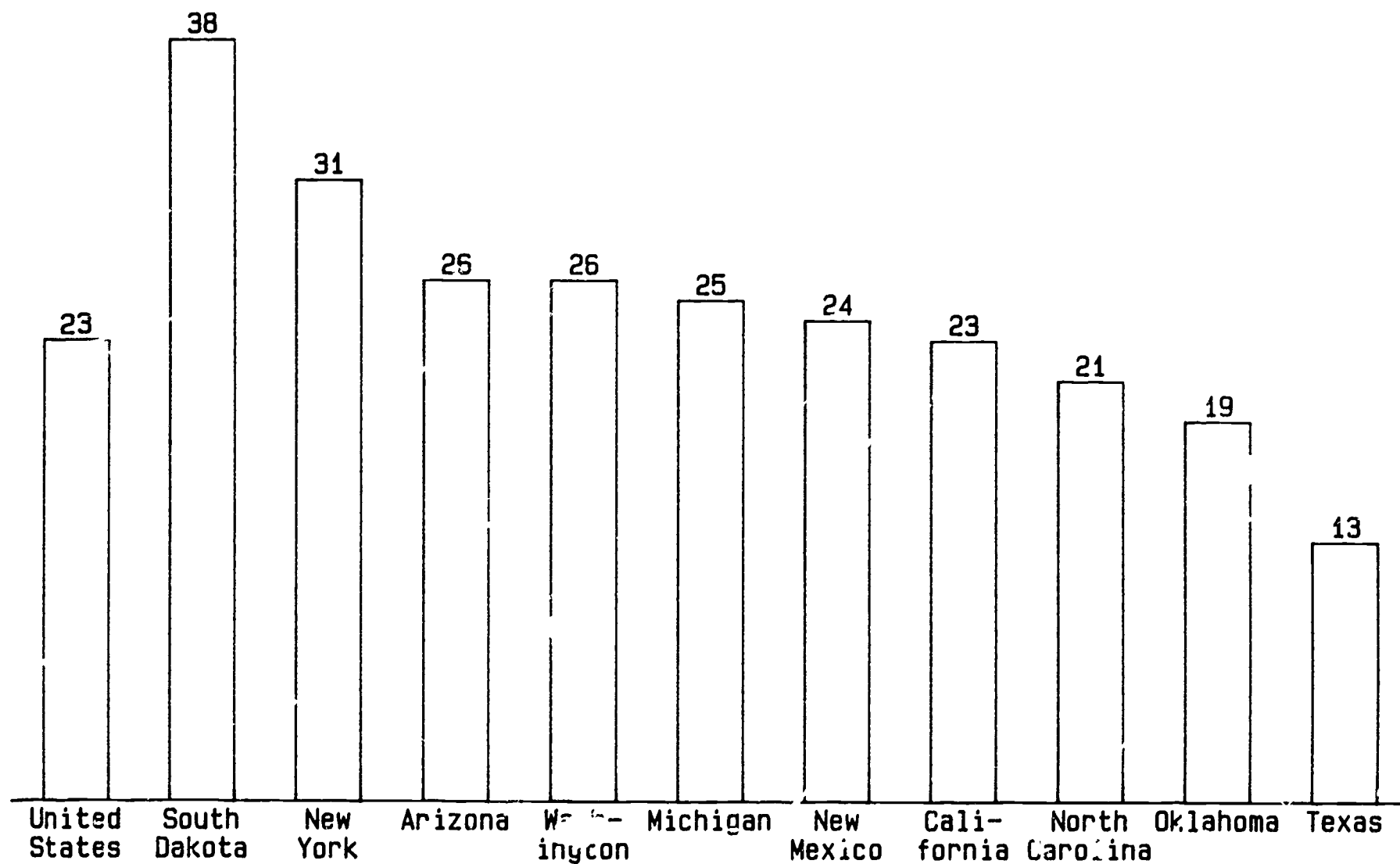
Metropolitan-Nonmetropolitan Residence for the American Indian Population: 1980

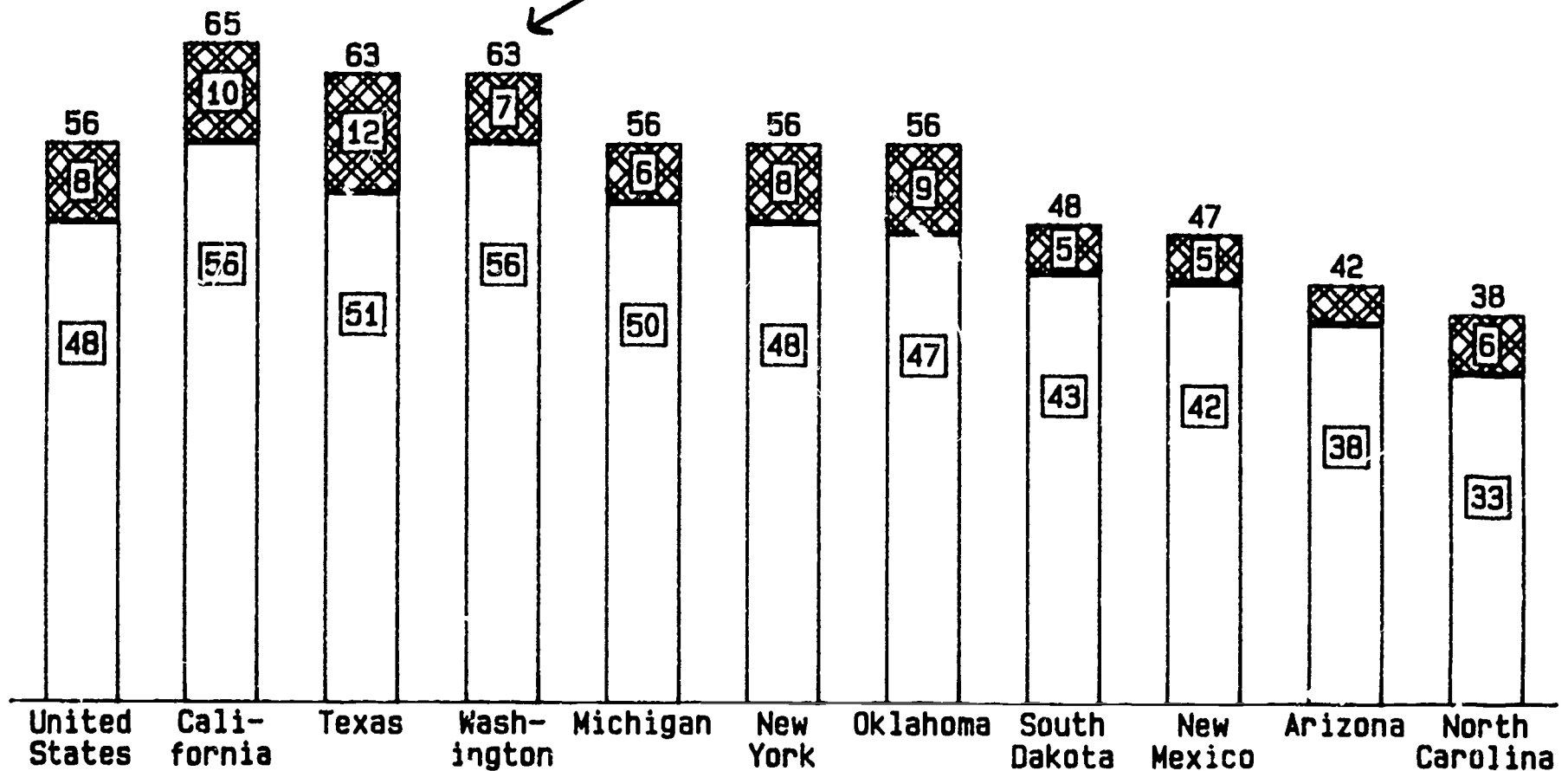

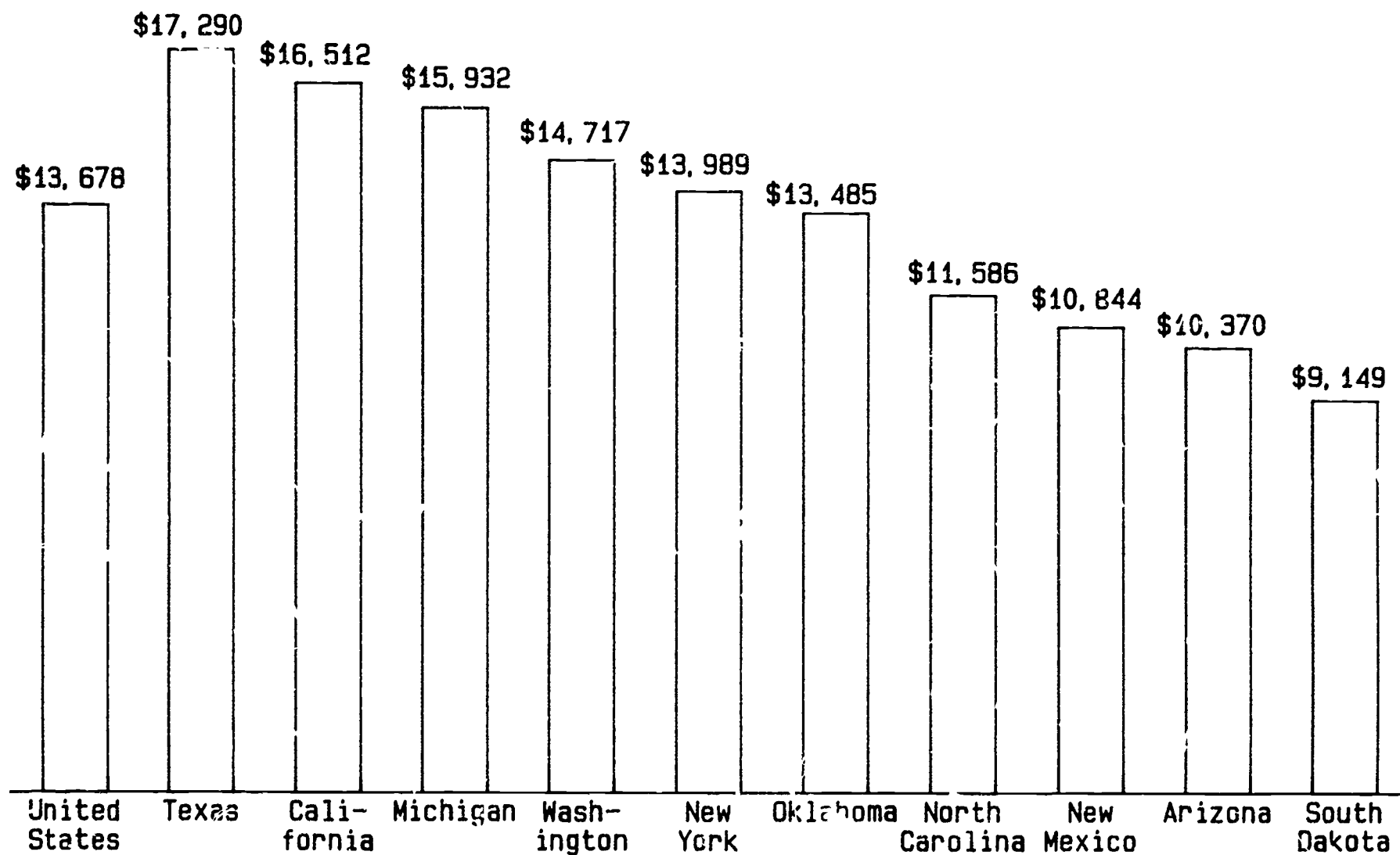

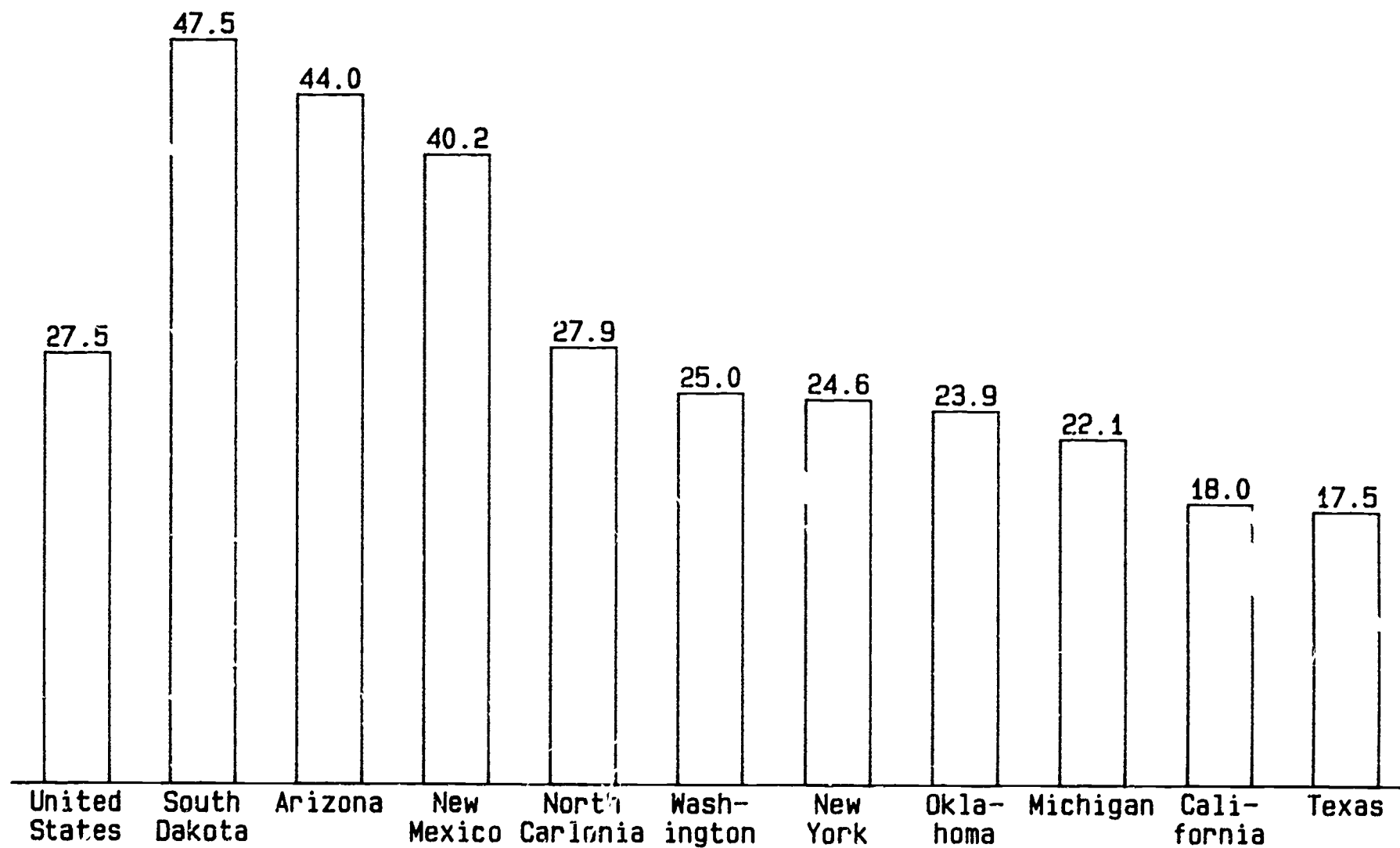
Unemployment Rates for American Indians: 1980



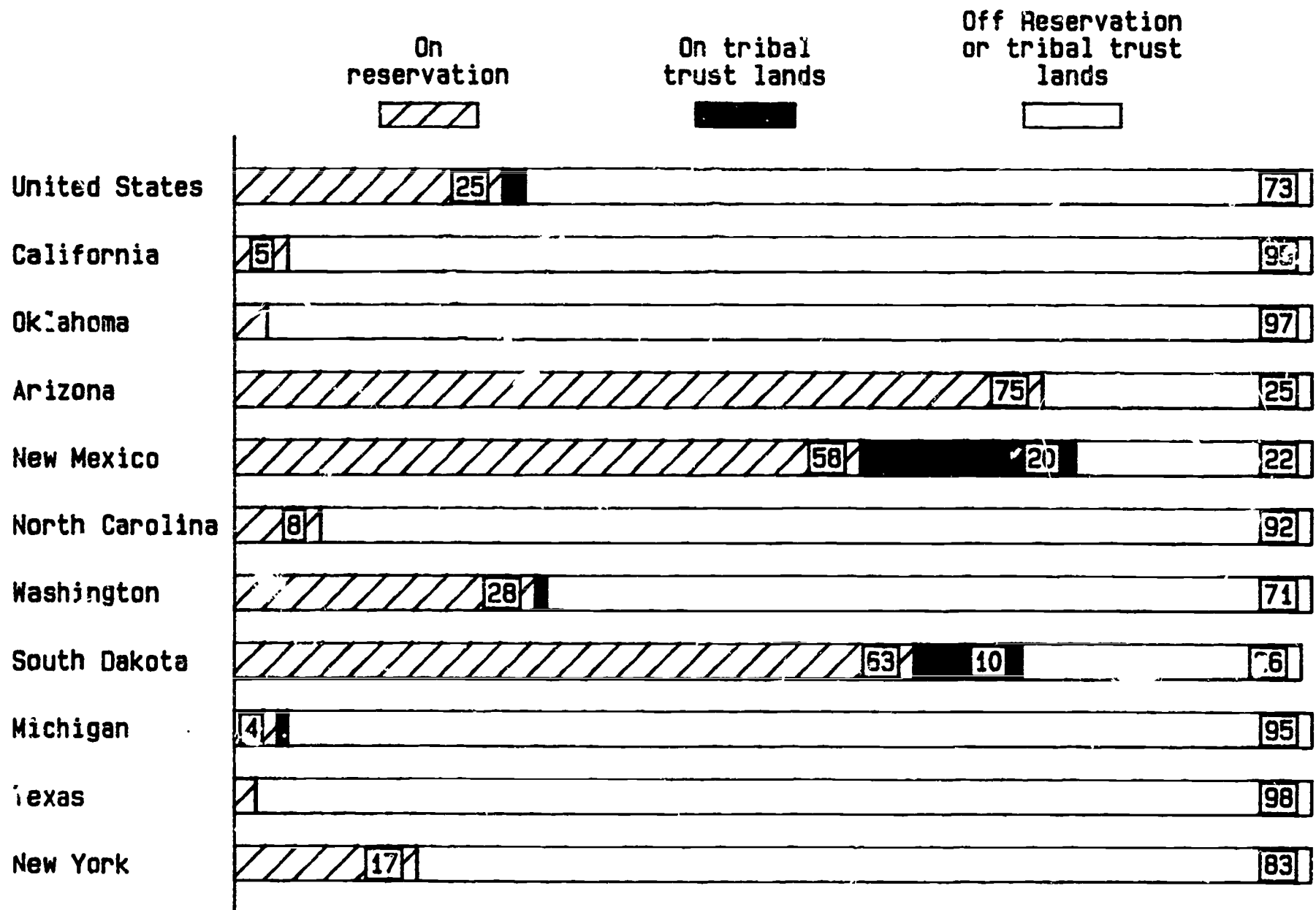
Median Family Money Income in 1979 of Families: 1980



Poverty Rates of Persons: 1980



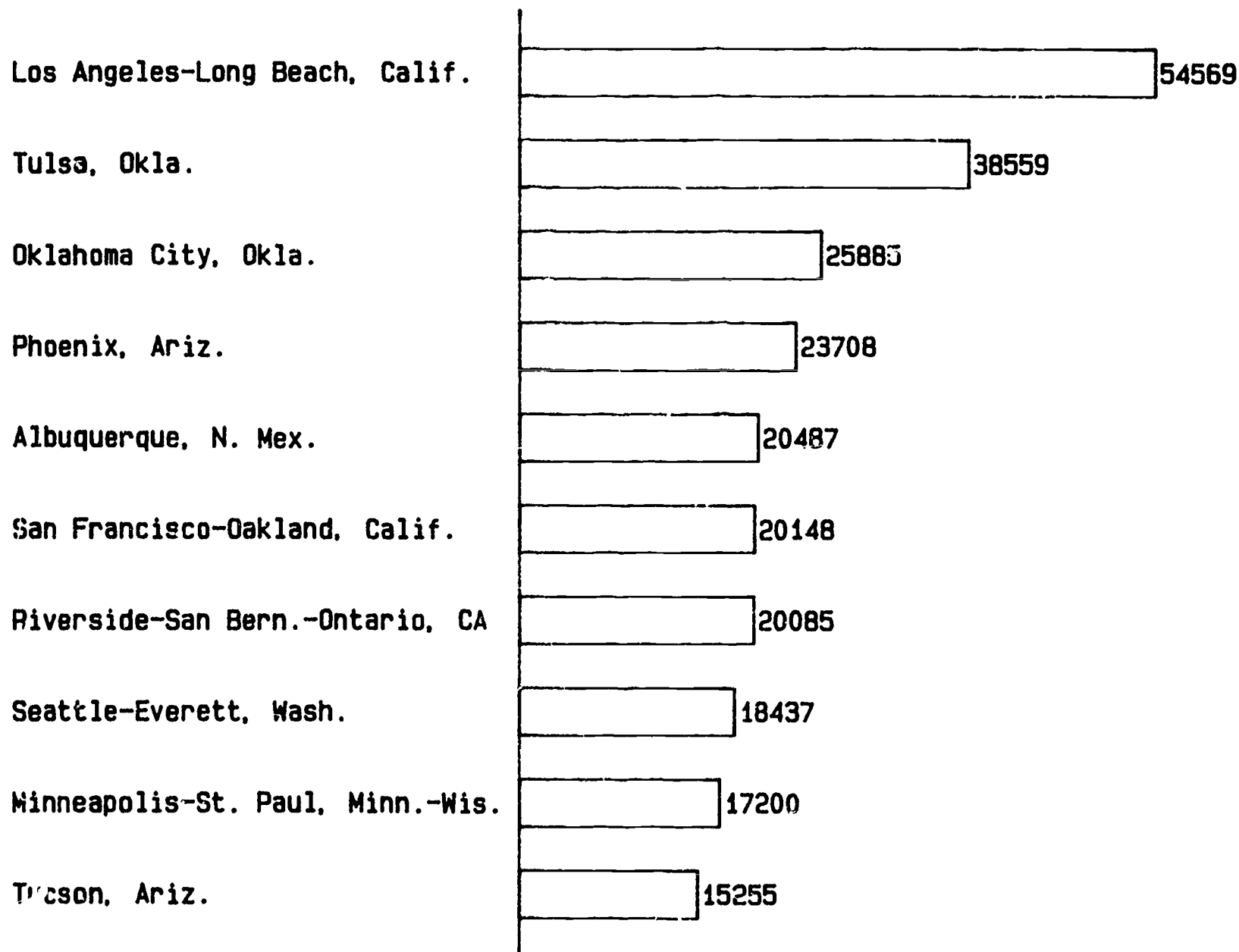
Distribution of the American Indian Population: 1980



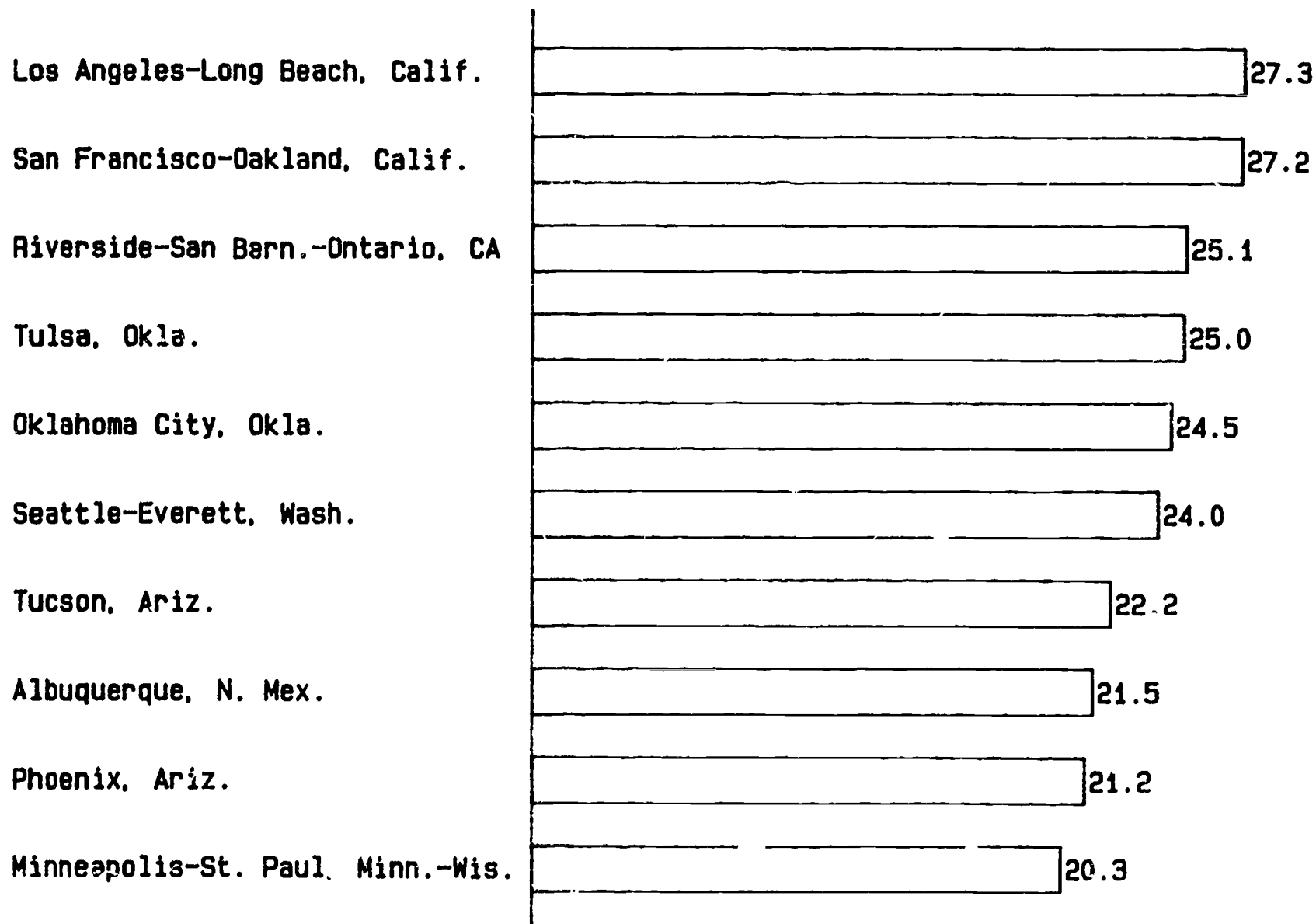

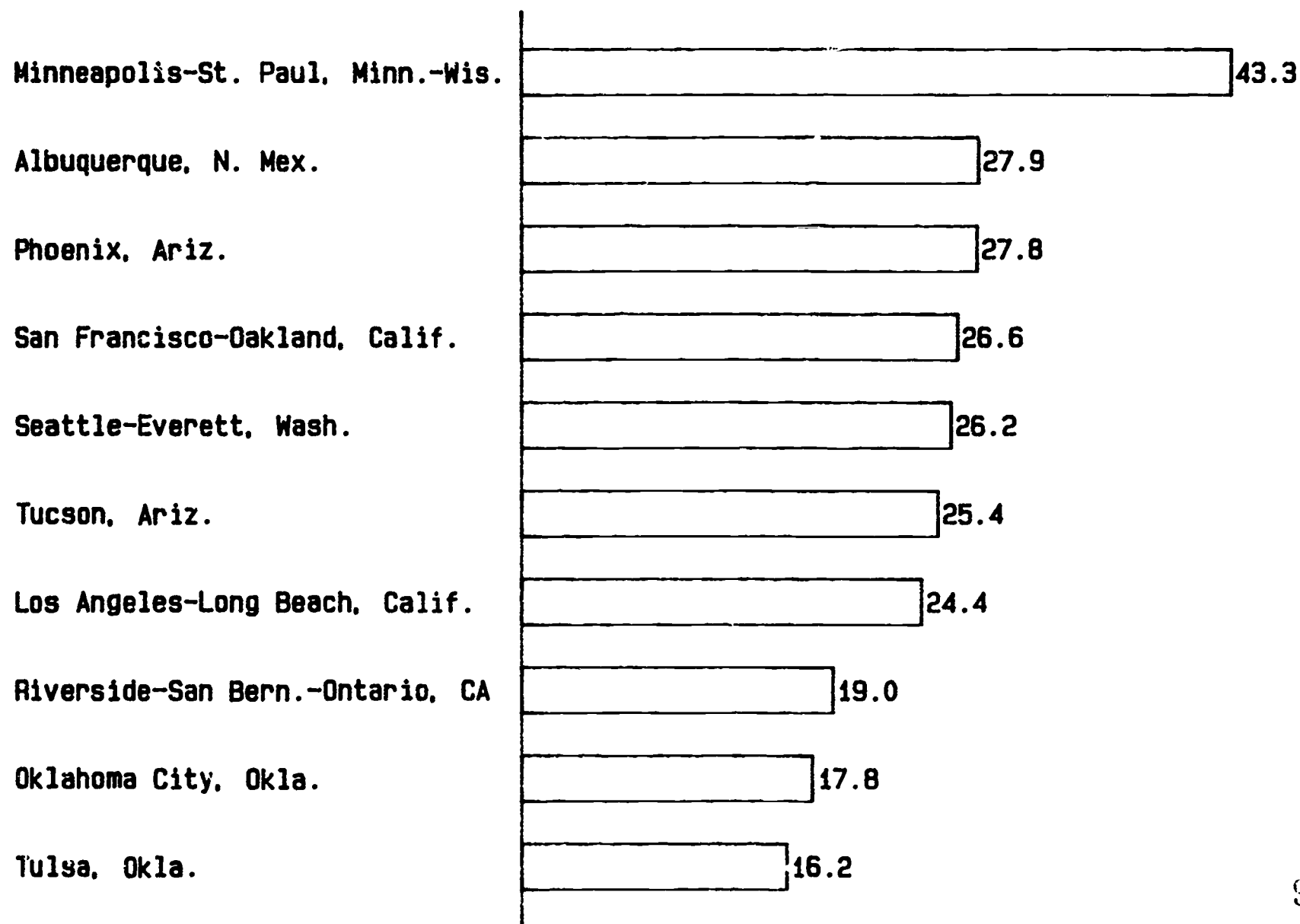
Total American Indian, Eskimo, and Aleut Population: 1980

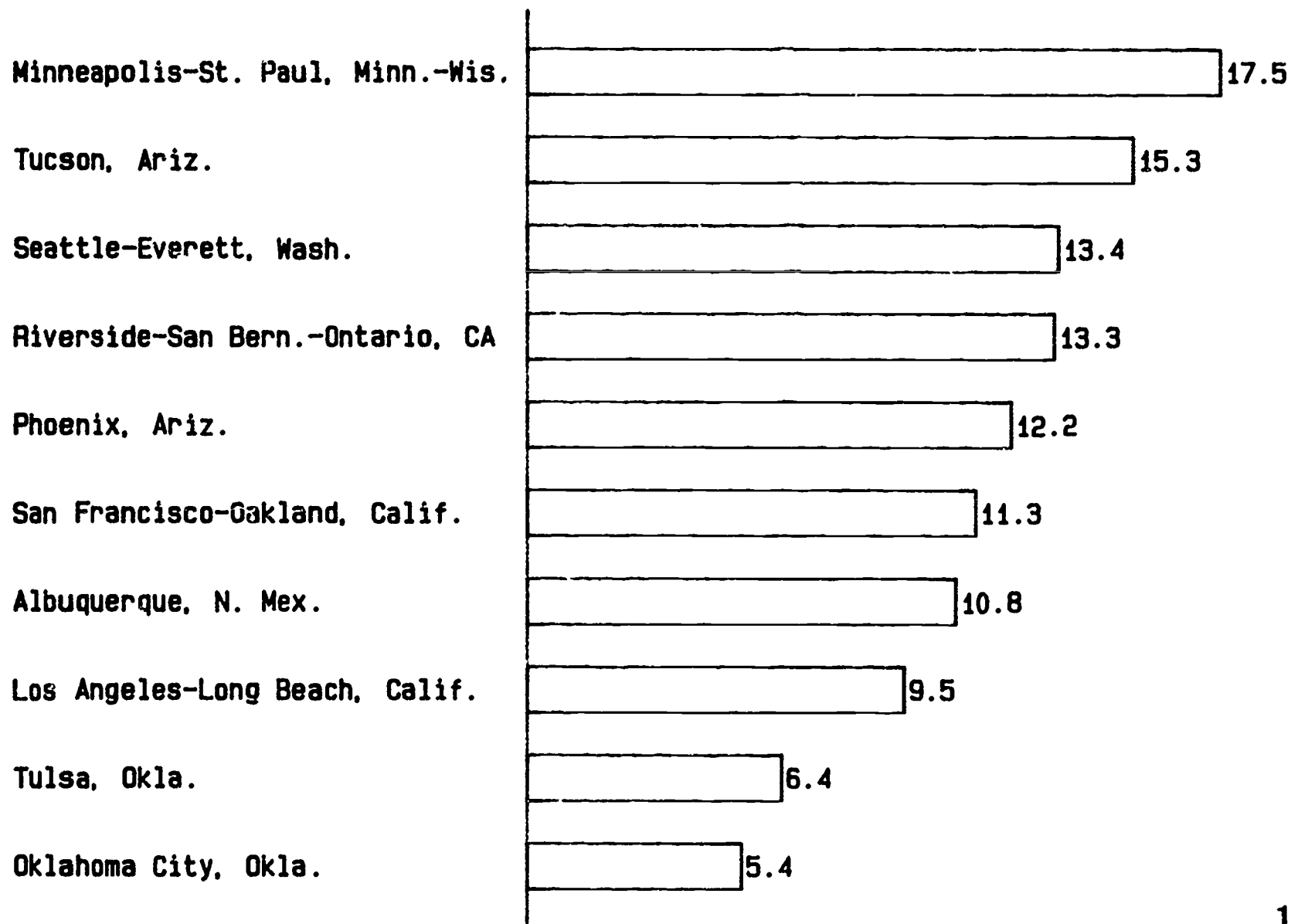

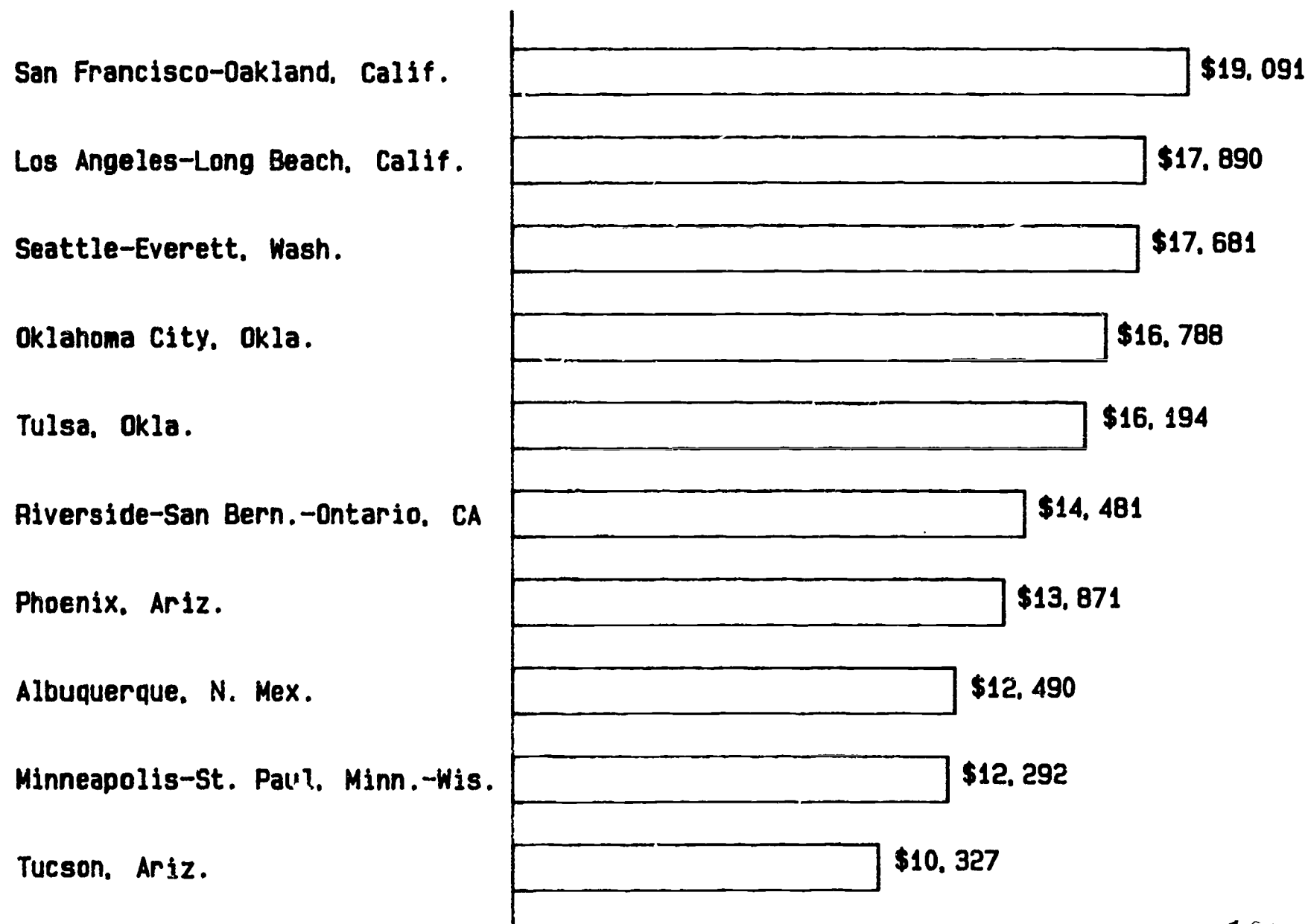

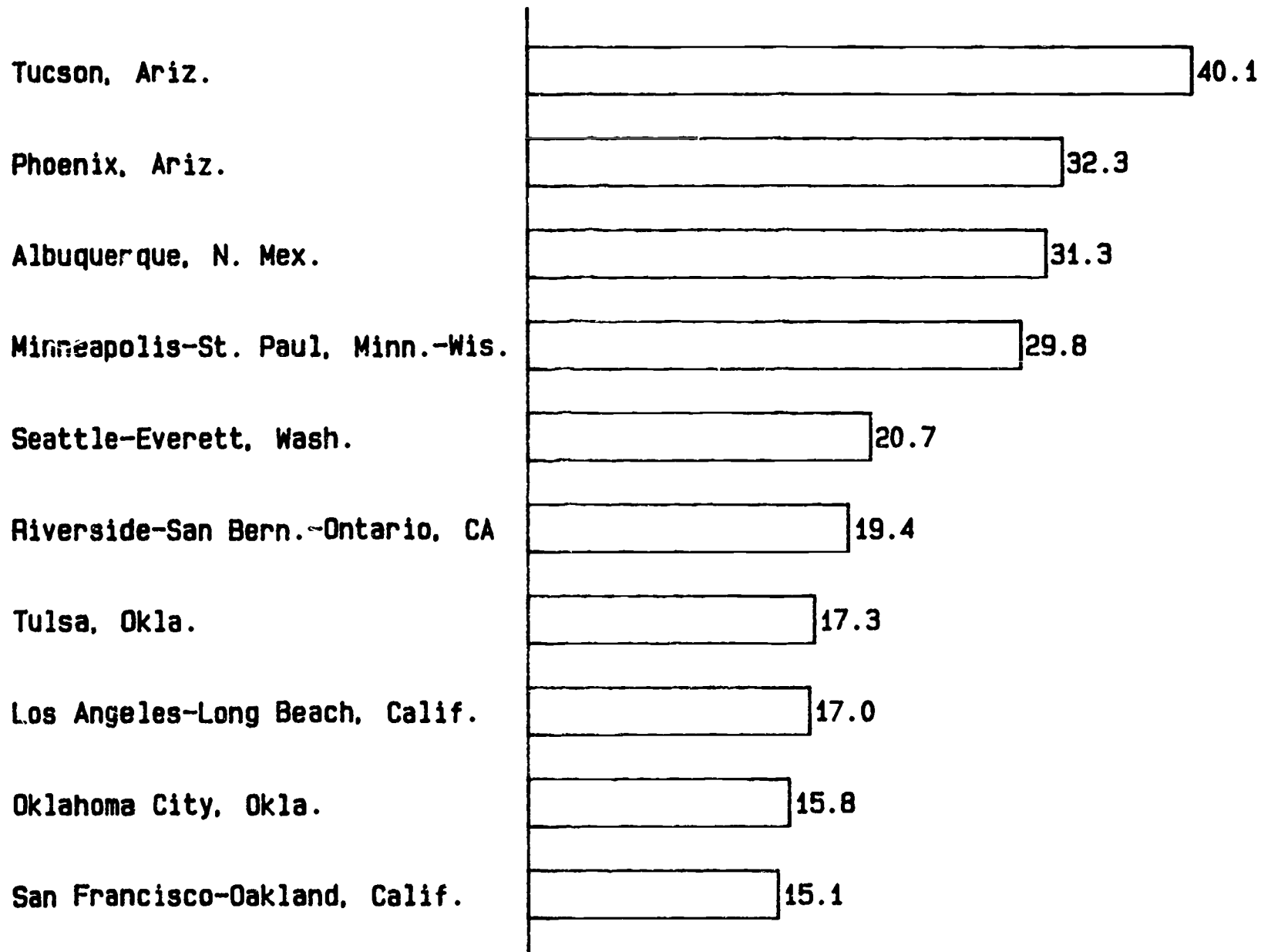
Unemployment Rates for American Indians, Eskimos, and Aleuts: 1980



Median Family Money Income in 1979 of Families: 1980



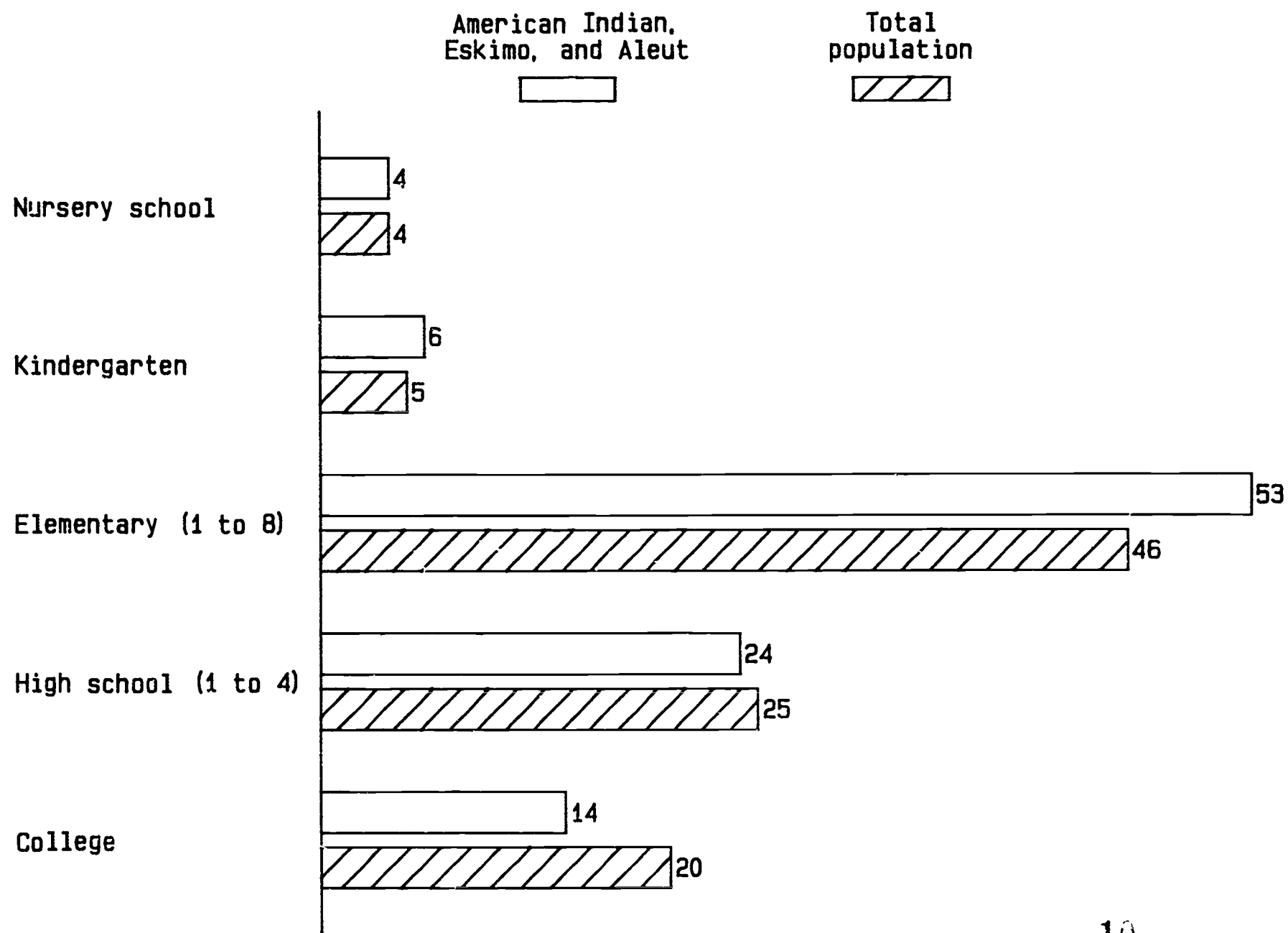
Poverty Rates of Persons: 1980



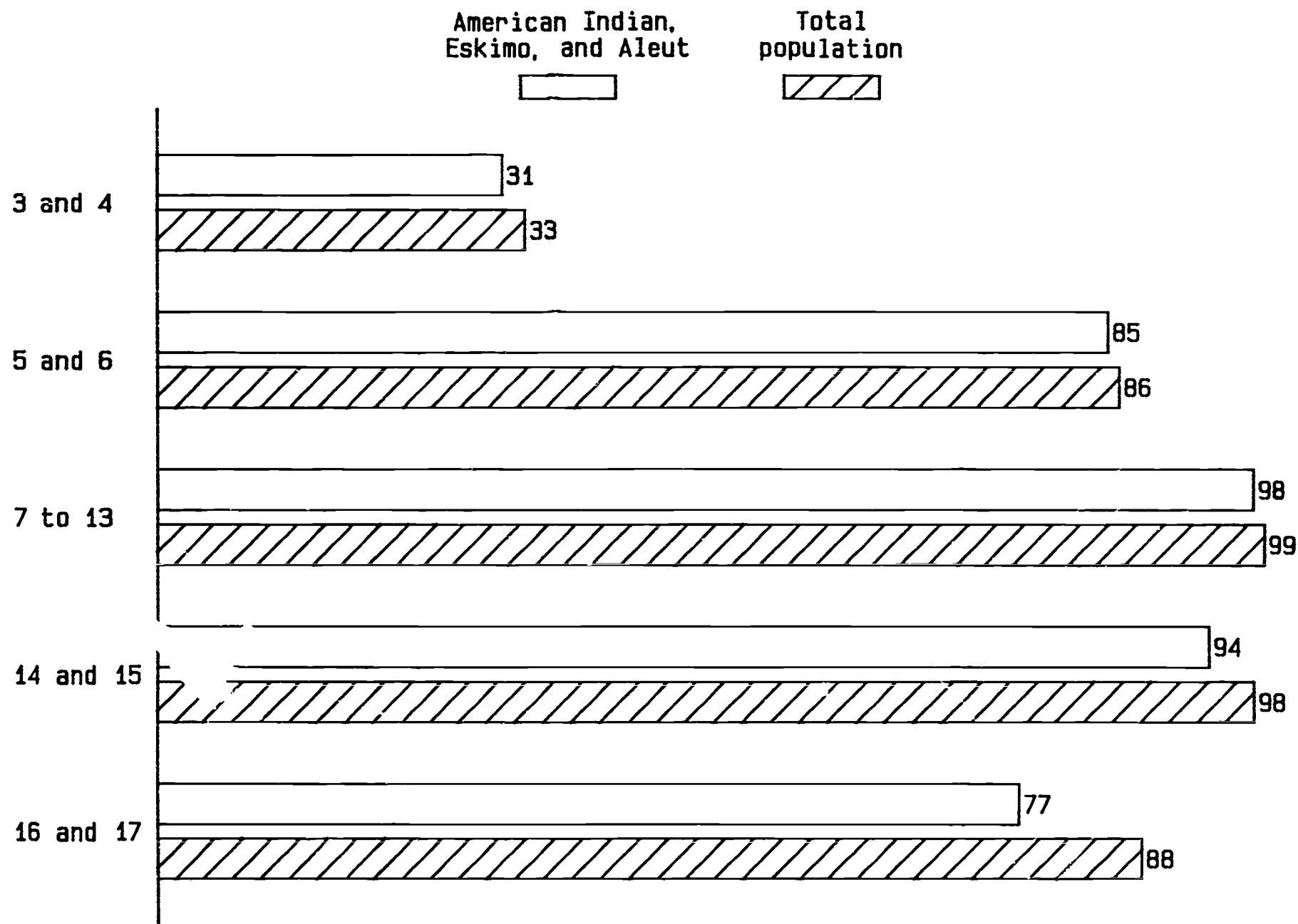

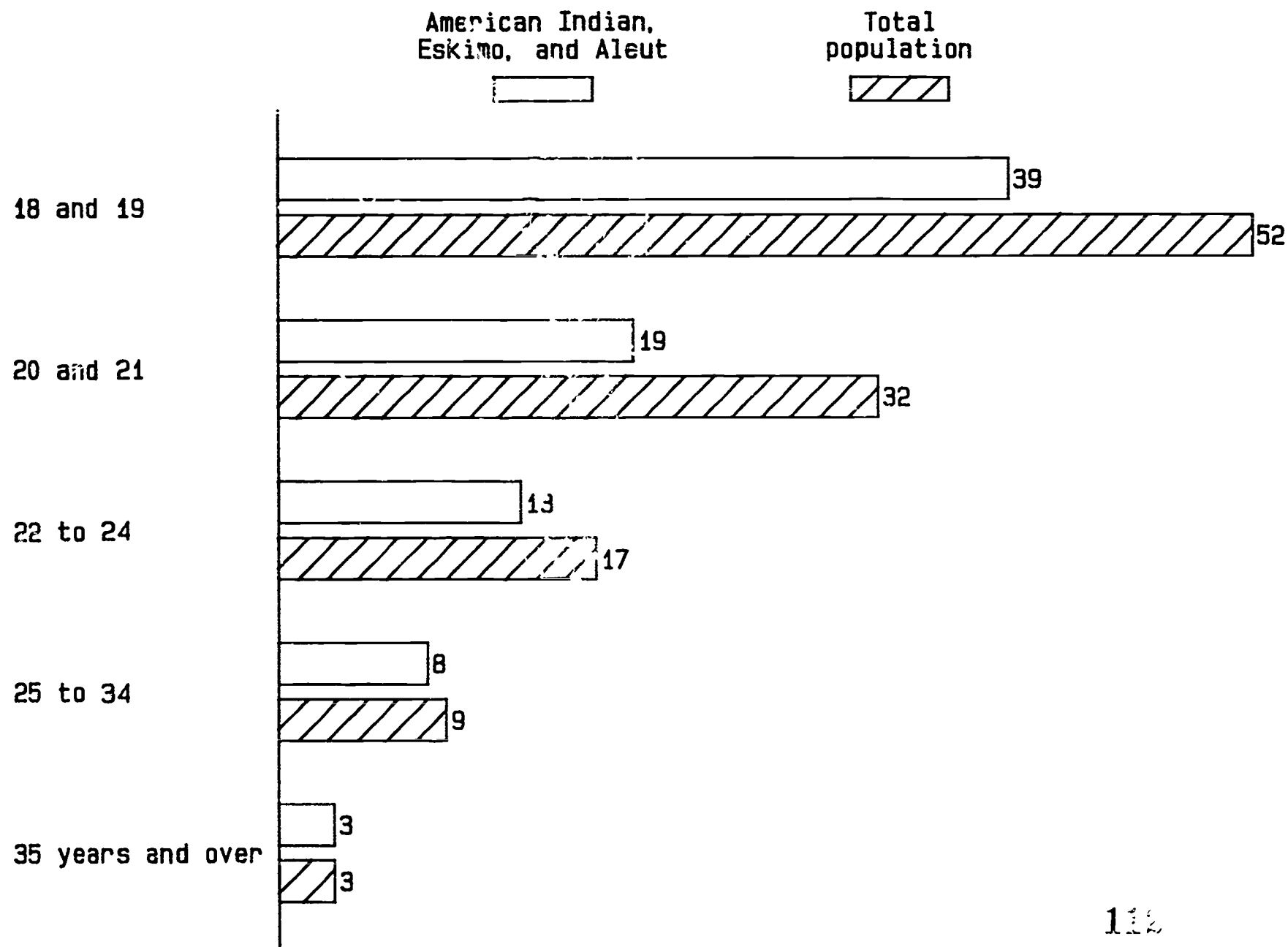
Percent Persons 3 Years Old and Over Enrolled in School: 1980



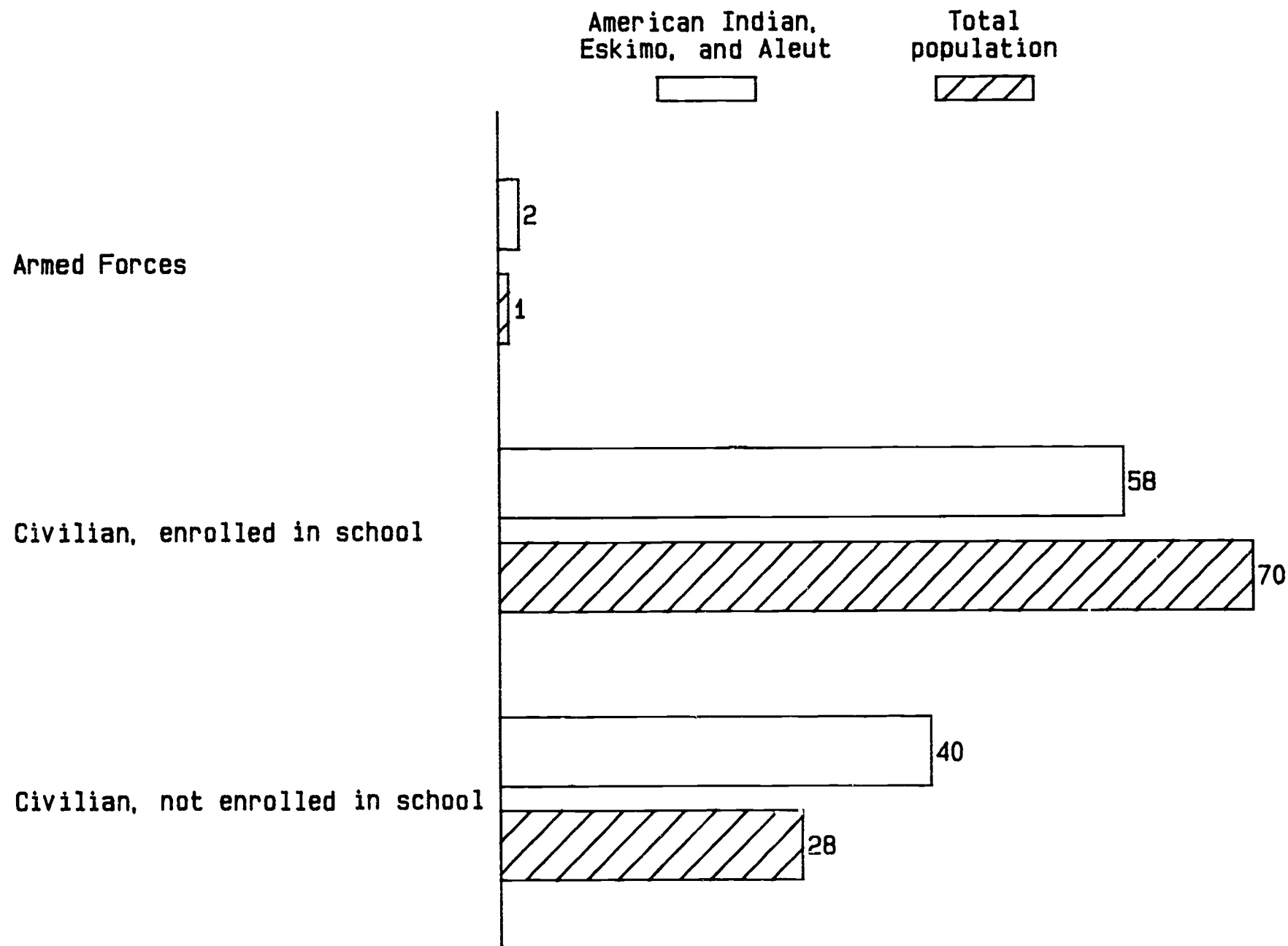
Percent Persons Enrolled in School by Selected Ages: 1980



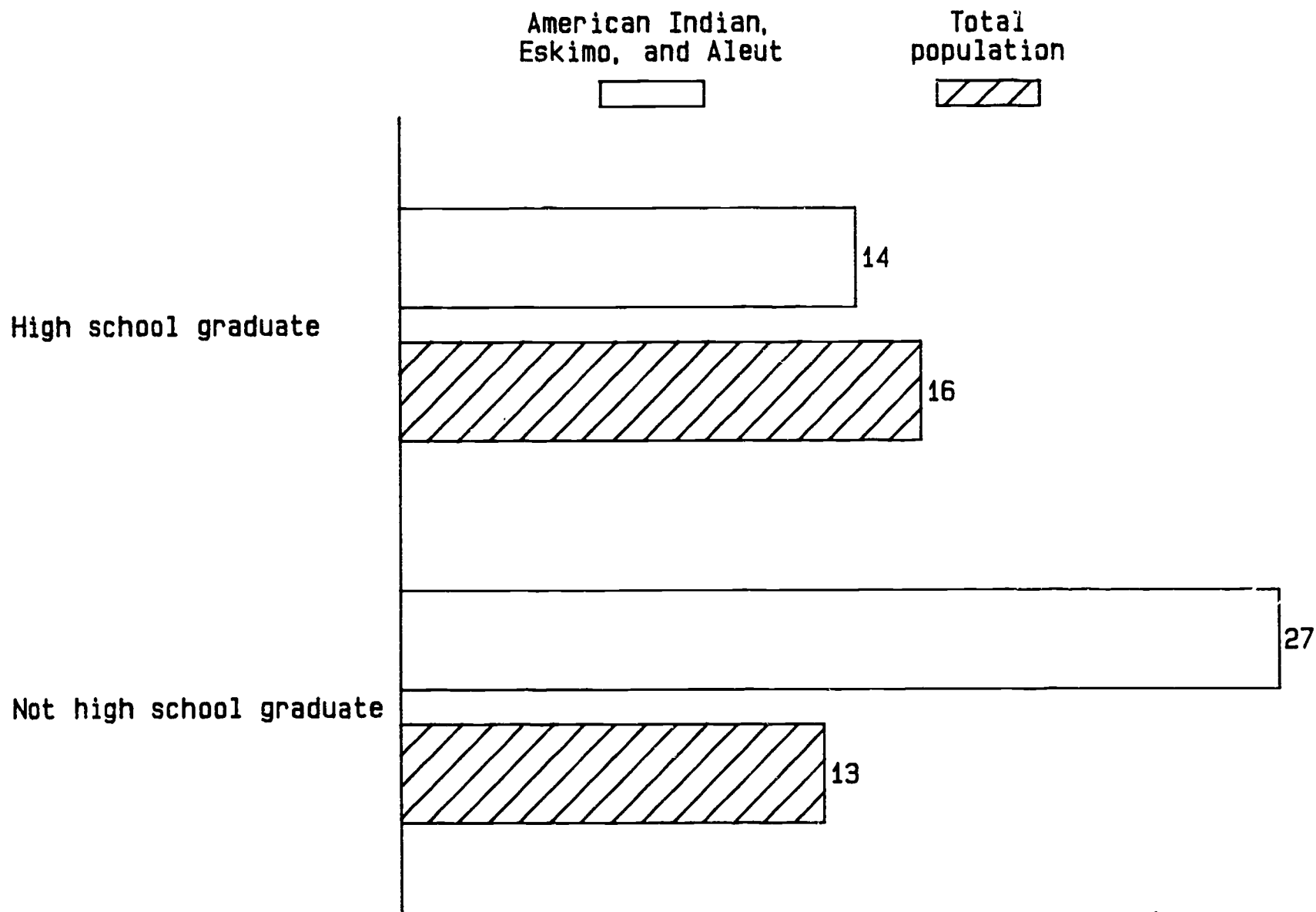
Percent Persons Enrolled in School for Selected Ages: 1980



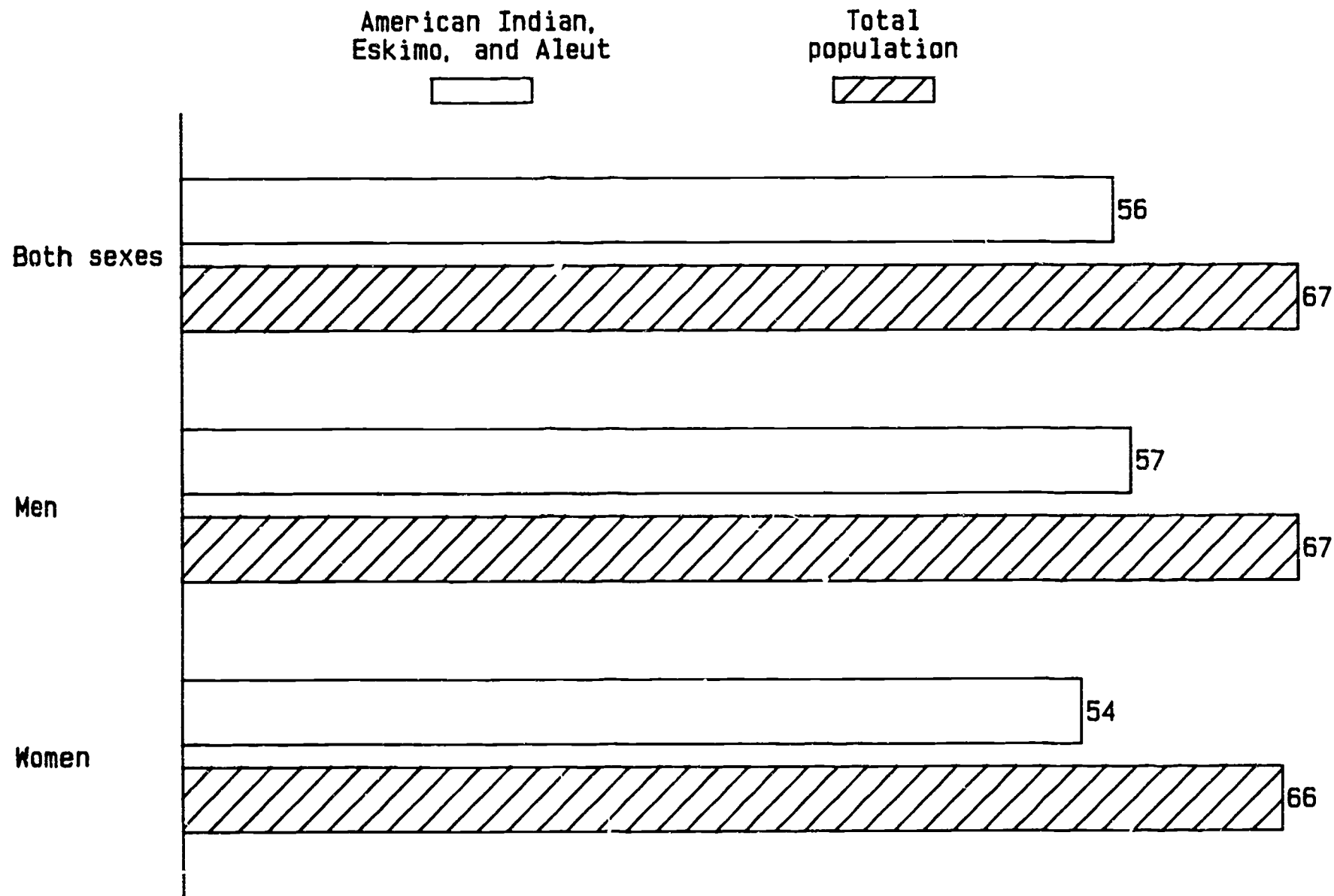
Percent Persons 16 to 19 Years Old by School Enrollment: 1980



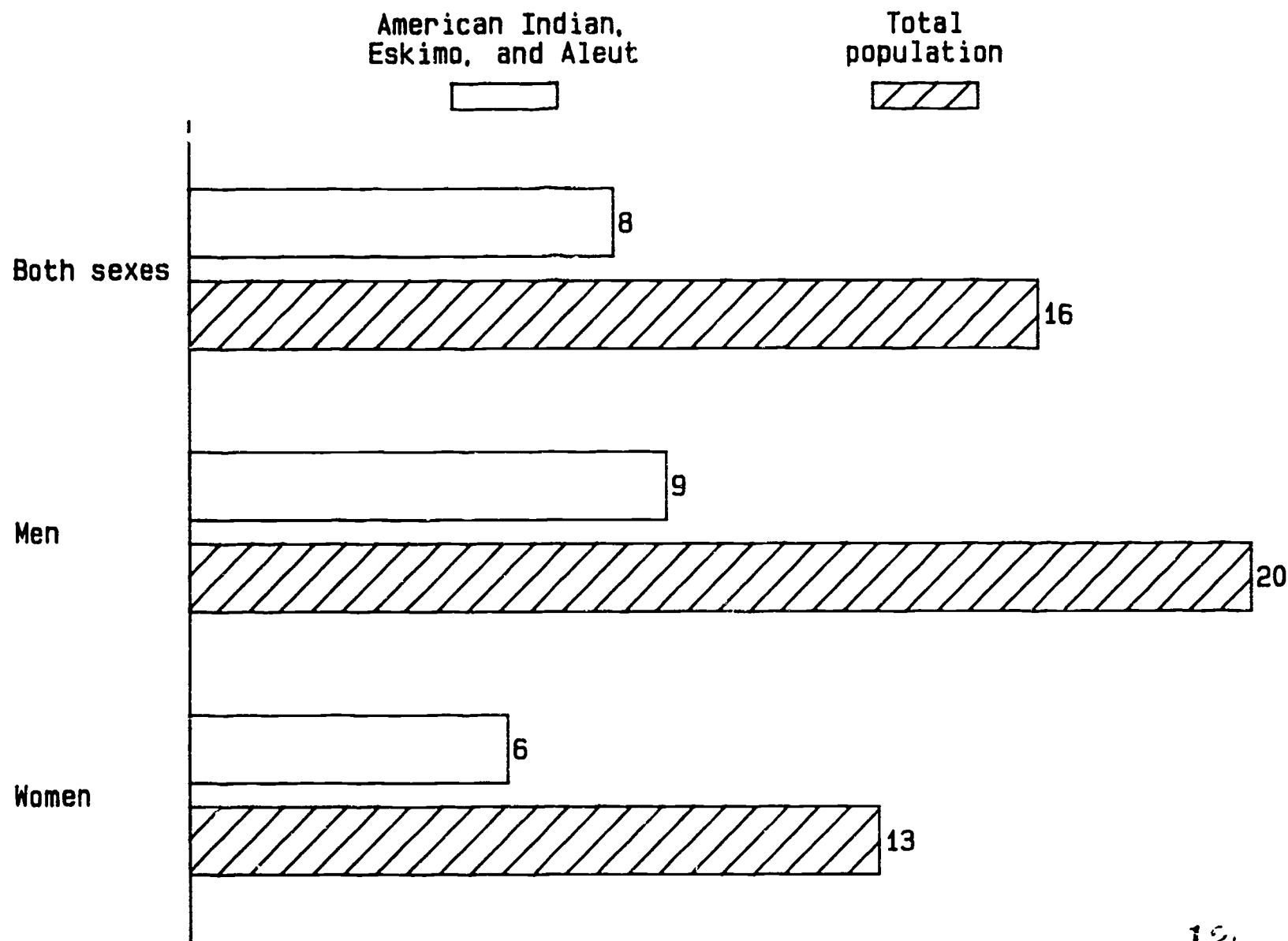
Percent Civilian Persons 16 to 19 Years Old
Not Enrolled in School: 1980



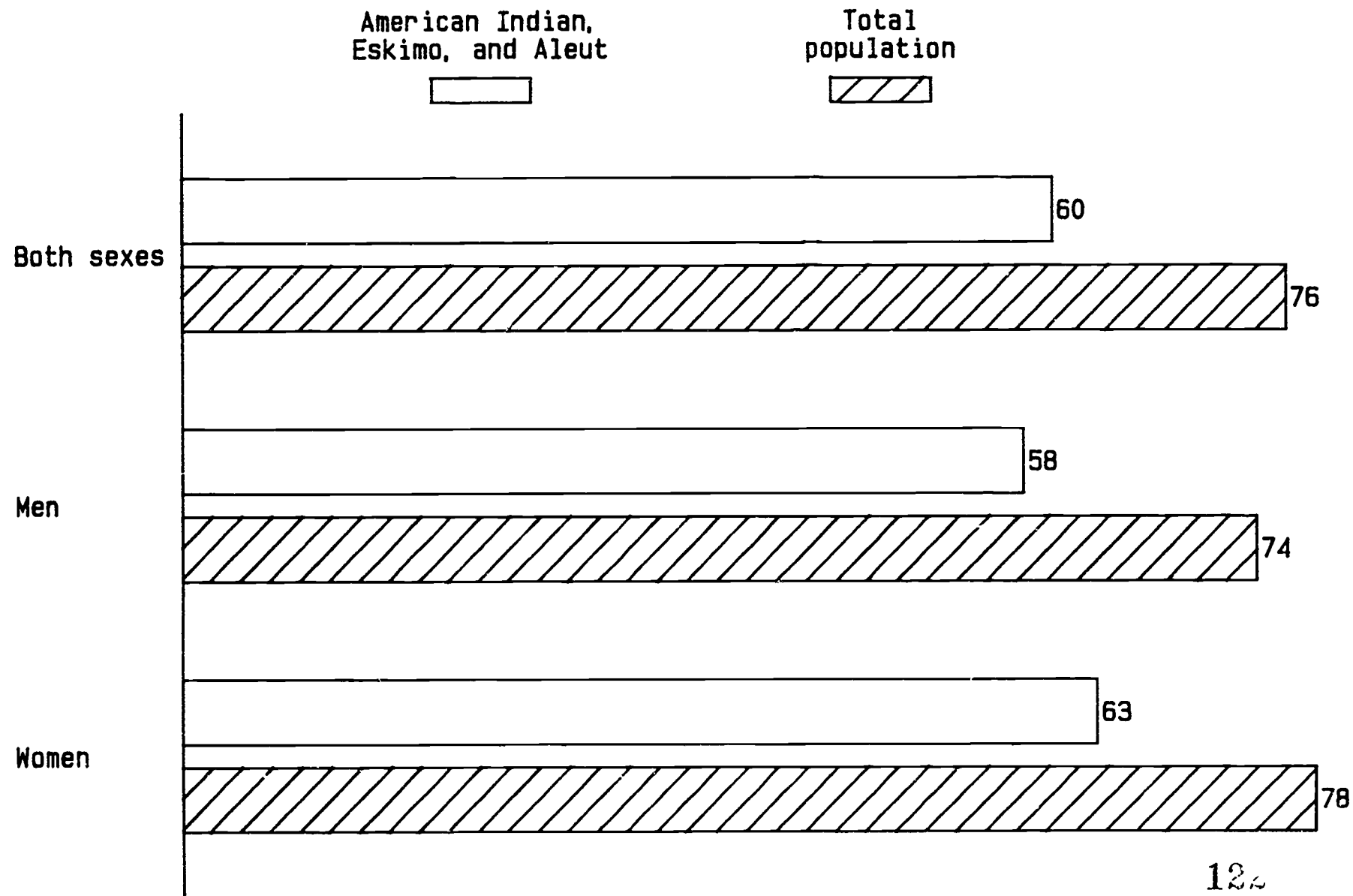
Percent High School Graduates by Sex: 1980
(Persons 25 years old and over)



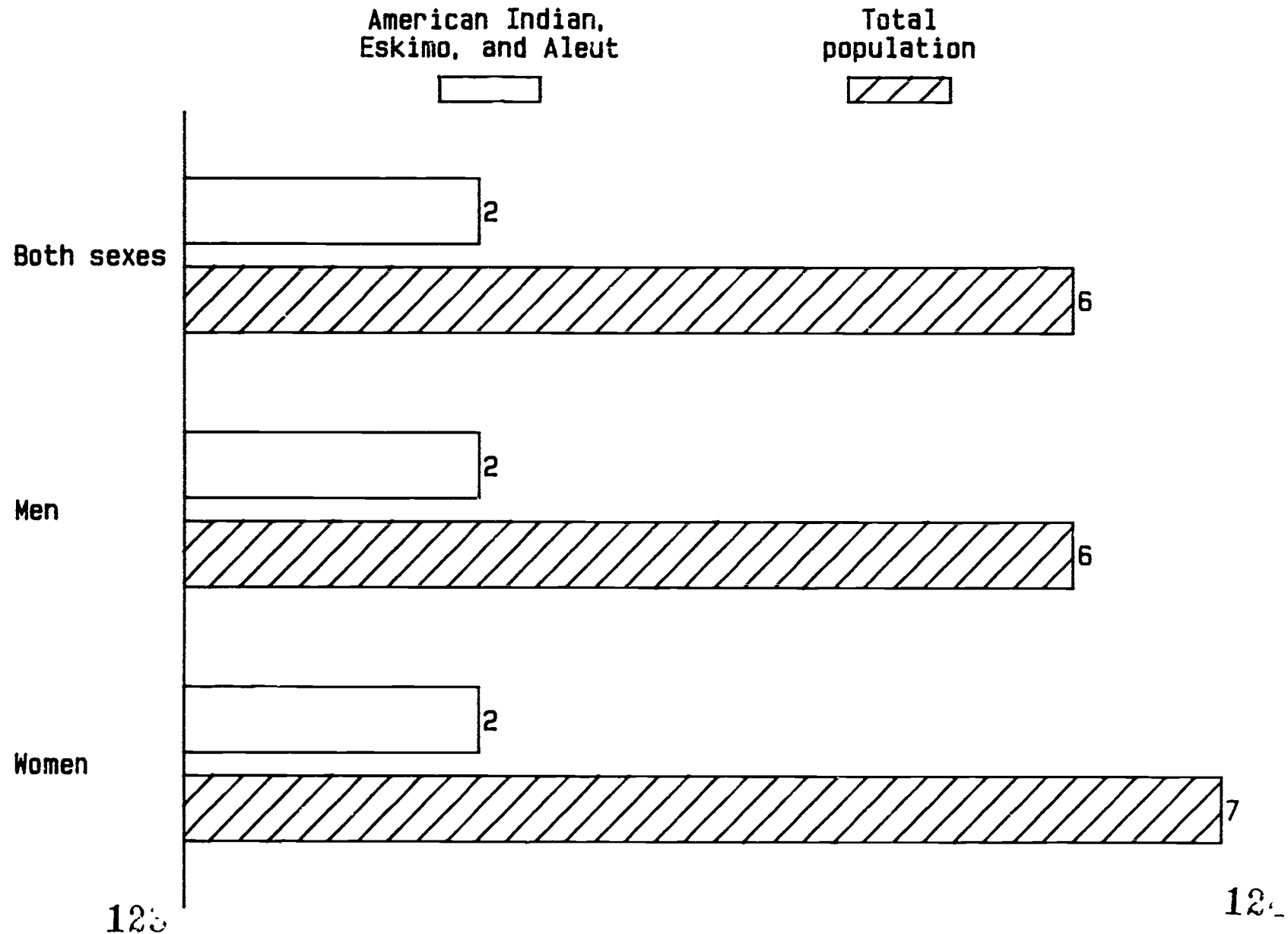
Percent College Graduates by Sex: 1980

TRIBAL AND VILLAGE LIAISON PROGRAM

- PLAN TO ASK TRIBE AND VILLAGE OFFICIALS TO DISIGNATE LIAISON TO WORK WITH CENSUS

TRIBAL AND VILLAGE LIAISON PROGRAM--CONTD.

- INTRODUCE 1990 CENSUS SCHOOL PROJECT
- HELP WITH RECRUITMENT
- PROVIDE QUESTIONNAIRE ASSISTANCE
- HELP RESOLVE PROBLEMS THAT MAY DELAY
ENUMERATION

CENSUS DATA PRODUCTS

- PUBLISH DATA FOR RESERVATIONS AND ASSOCIATED TRUST LANDS IN STANDARD 1990 PRODUCTS
- IN 1980, DATA ON TRUST LANDS AVAILABLE ONLY THROUGH SPECIAL TABULATIONS
- PUBLISH DATA FOR TRIBAL JURISDICTION STATISTICAL AREAS IN OKLAHOMA, ALASKA NATIVE VILLAGES AND REGIONAL CORPORATIONS
- INCREASE TABULATION OF DATA FROM REGULAR CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE
- INCREASE THE ACCURACY OF DATA
- RELEASE DATA EARLIER

LOCAL REVIEW PROGRAM

- FIRST INTRODUCED IN THE 1980 CENSUS
- PROVIDE LOCAL, TRIBAL, AND VILLAGE OFFICIALS WITH PRELIMINARY REVIEW OF CENSUS COUNTS
- CENSUS WILL ASK LOCAL, TRIBAL, AND VILLAGE OFFICIALS TO APPOINT LIAISON
- BEGIN LOCAL REVIEW TRAINING LATER IN 1987
- ADDITIONAL TRAINING IN 1989

GEOGRAPHIC ISSUES

- BUREAU HAS DEVELOPED WORKING RELATIONSHIPS WITH TRIBAL AND VILLAGE OFFICIALS
- CENSUS IS WORKING WITH BIA AND STATES ON BOUNDARY UPDATES AND CERTIFICATIONS FOR RESERVATIONS AND TRUST LANDS
- CENSUS WORKED WITH OKLAHOMA TRIBES TO DEFINE TRIBAL JURISDICTION STATISTICAL AREAS
- CENSUS IS WORKING WITH NONPROFIT ALASKA NATIVE REGIONAL CORPORATIONS TO DEFINE ALASKA NATIVE VILLAGE STATISTICAL AREAS
- CENSUS IS WORKING WITH BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT ON ALASKA NATIVE REGIONAL CORPORATIONS BOUNDARIES
- CENSUS WILL PROVIDE TRIBES OPPORTUNITY TO REVIEW RESERVATION AND TRIBAL TRUST LAND BOUNDARIES
