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ABSTRACT

A working paper on U.S. church-related funding for (or sponsorship of) South African programs is presented to guide support-seeking organizations in South Africa to appropriate resources and to inform interested parties outside South Africa about potential resources and ways in which they might cooperate or assist. Information is provided in two sections as follows: (1) U.S. church-related projects by area of program initiative (adult education, advocacy, agriculture, bursaries, business development, church leader development, community development, crisis intervention, detainee assistance, education in the United States about South Africa, emergency relief, general support, health, leadership development, legal representation/education, materials development, nutrition, preschools, private nonracial schools, race relations, refugee education/assistance, research, external scholarships, seminars/conferences, teacher training, technical/vocational training, theological education, and youth programs); and (2) participants in the survey (e.g., Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission, African Methodist Church, African Methodist Episcopal Church, American Baptists Churches USA, Building a New South Africa, Catholic Relief Services, Catholic Theological Union, Christian Church in the USA and Canada, Church of the Intercession, Church World Service, Diocese of New York of the Episcopal Church, Episcopal Church in the USA, Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, National Council of Churches, Riverside Church, Salesian Missions, and Trinity Grants Program). 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U.S. CHURCH-RELATED FUNDING FOR CHANGE IN SOUTH AFRICA

Introduction

The South African Information Exchange (SAIE) was established in late 1986 to develop a knowledge base of information about, on the one hand, educational needs and initiatives in South Africa and, on the other, existing or potential resources to sponsor those initiatives.

In the succeeding years, the SAIE has published surveys of the South Africa-related activities of U.S. foundations, U.S. professional associations, U.S. colleges and universities, U.S. corporations, U.S.-related corporate trusts in South Africa, and U.S. support organizations raising money for South African causes.

Working Paper No. 7 is concerned with U.S. church-related funding for--or sponsorship of--South African programs. The main purpose is to guide support-seeking organizations in South Africa to appropriate resources. A second purpose is to inform interested parties outside South Africa about potential resources and ways they might cooperate or assist.

The contents of the print-out of programs and areas of initiative supplied in this working paper are a record of what these church agencies have done in the past. The user of this working paper is advised to get in touch with the agencies, before applying for assistance, to learn more about their specific criteria. In this way, the church agencies can be protected from being inundated with proposals that do not meet their guidelines and the support-seeking organizations can be saved from wasting precious time and energy on fruitless quests.

Methodology of this survey

Initial survey. In January 1987, the South African Information Exchange began to explore the universe of U.S. church and church-related funding--the sector of the U.S. community with the longest history of involvement with the education, relief, and development needs of South Africans.

As a first step, the SAIE engaged the services of David Mesenbring (now with the Trinity Grants Program) as a consultant to interview some of the principal actors in U.S. churches on the East Coast. This brief (two week) activity had two objectives: to learn about specific South African program initiatives funded by U.S. churches and to formulate a broad list of U.S. church officials knowledgeable about these programs.

Results. At the end of his assignment, Mesenbring identified some patterns on the significance of the churches' role in South Africa.

First, the interviews demonstrated that the main kinds of support provided by the churches were for education and community development. Most of the churches offer some kind of scholarship program for formal and nonformal educational opportunities inside and outside South Africa. Training leadership for community development in South Africa is accomplished both through local training centers and through making available capital funds for construction of community centers in black urban areas.

Second, as to other types of U.S. church support, most churches reached in the research were found to be supporting the South African Council of Churches (SACC). Many offer emergency relief to squatter settlements and general support funds for institution building.

Third, most churches offer some sort of assistance to refugees in the form of scholarships, but he did not find single denominations funding refugee relief on a large scale. Rather, such work is undertaken by international ecumenical agencies. An important exception to this is the Lutheran World Federation, which provides significant support to refugees.

Fourth, Mesenbring's report stresses the denominationalism in the pattern of U.S. church funding: churches tend to fund through their own denominational infrastructure.

Finally, he discovered that there is a new mission trend with potential to "conscientize" Western Christians through exposure to Third World values. For example, he points out that churches are among the first large U.S. institutions to divest themselves of holdings in companies doing business in South Africa. He attributes the motivation for these decisions to the churches' extensive access to representative black opinion in South Africa.

He concluded by reiterating that U.S. churches, which have been significantly involved with program initiatives inside South Africa longer than any other nongovernmental sector of the U.S. community, could be of immense value to others in the United States that have more recently begun to be involved with South African program initiatives. He also emphasizes that the South Africa programs of U.S. churches are invaluablely assisted by a sister institutional infrastructure operating in South Africa that affords them ample access to the consultation with black South Africans that is so crucial for the success of any contemporary South Africa program initiative by foreign funders.

Follow up. Later that summer, the SAIE hired an academic in the mid-West as a consultant to interview some church-related individuals in that region.

The consultant found, from interviews conducted, that some of the mission programs in the United States are maintaining their financial support of educational programs in South Africa, specifically theological education and local community development education, especially in conjunction with refugee work. Other missions directors are more politicized and are calling for more aggressive forms of church action on the role of financial institutions and corporations in South Africa.

While the SAIE did not publish these reports, it did make use of the information about individuals collected by the consultants to develop a list for entry in a database of U.S. churches and church-related groups and institutions involved in South African initiatives.

Working Paper No. 7. In late January 1989, the SAIE wrote to 112 such organizations--church groups, theological schools, private and voluntary organizations--soliciting from them very brief information on the initiatives those agencies were implementing or sponsoring to bring about change in South Africa.

A questionnaire, enclosed with the covering memo, listed 29 different program areas. Respondents were asked to check the appropriate boxes and return the questionnaires. By the first of April, 25 individuals had returned the questionnaire, resulting in a print-out of 142 programs in 27 areas of initiative.

In May, the SAIE sent out a second solicitation to individuals in organizations that had not yet responded, enclosing the print-out of the initial results with a draft introduction and soliciting their participation in the project. Another 14 individuals (making 39 in all and raising the total to 22, programs in 28 areas of initiative) responded to this solicitation.

A third mailing in July, enclosing a manuscript reflecting the cooperation of these additional respondents, consisted of an introduction, a section providing U.S. church-related projects by area of program initiative, and a list of the names and addresses of participants in this survey. Six individuals, representing a further 26 projects, answered this third mailing. The resulting product is Working Paper No. 7--45 respondents; 247 projects.

Once again, users are cautioned not to prepare elaborate proposals until they have investigated further a likely source. This working paper, like the six preceding ones, is aimed at guiding both support-seeking and support-giving organizations to a more effective use of their time and energies as they work toward the common goal of a nonracial, democratic South Africa.
