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ABSTRACT

In 1990, a study was conducted on statewide enrollment trends and student characteristics in Illinois public community colleges. The study analyzed fall 1989 enrollments by college, full-/part-time status, sex, ethnic origin, age, student level, first-time/continuing enrollment status, and program. Study findings included the following: (1) at the end of the fall 1989 registration period, the 50 Illinois community colleges enrolled 341,733 students in instructional credit courses, representing an increase of 4.1% over fall 1988; (2) full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment was 174,437, representing a 4.9% increase in FTE students; (3) the proportion of full-time students enrolled during fall 1989 was 30.2%; (4) the number of male students increased at a higher rate than that of females (5.6% vs. 3%), bringing the percentage of males in the total student population to 42.5%--their highest representative in 5 years; (5) a comparison of fall 1988 and fall 1989 headcount enrollments revealed increases among Hispanics (by 19.3%), non-resident aliens (by 6.0%), Whites (by 4.1%), and Asian/Pacific Islanders (by 1.9%); (6) the median age of community college students was 26.9 years, and the mean age was 30.4 years; (7) freshman enrollments increased by 7.5% between 1988 and 1989, while sophomore enrollments decreased by 0.6%; and (8) although 38% of the students were enrolled in baccalaureate transfer programs, only 23.2% indicated that their intent was to transfer. 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HIGHLIGHTS OF FALL 1989 OPENING ENROLLMENT REPORT

1. At the "end of registration" in fall 1989, the 50 public community colleges in Illinois enrolled 341,733 students in instructional credit courses. This constitutes an increase of 13,457 students (4.1 percent) from the fall 1988 term.
2. The fall 1989 full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment was 174,437 for an increase of 8,146 (4.9 percent) full-time students.
3. The proportion of full-time students enrolled during fall 1989 was 30.2 percent. There has been a slow but steady increase in the proportion of full-time students over the last five years. During fall 1989, the baccalaureate/transfer program accounted for nearly one-half (49.1 percent) of the full-time students enrolled in the public community colleges.
4. The number of female students increased by three percent from 190,854 in fall 1988 to 196,578 in fall 1989. The number of male students also increased but at a higher rate (137,422 to 145,155 or 5.6 percent). Males now comprise 42.5 percent of the student population--their highest representation in the last five years.
5. Overall, the number and percentage of minority students enrolled in the community colleges in Illinois increased slightly in 1989. The overall minority increase was attributable to growth among Hispanic students, and to a lesser extent, Asian/Pacific Islanders. While the number of black students increased slightly, the proportion of blacks in the student population decreased to the lowest point in the last five years.
6. The analysis of fall 1989 student enrollment by age indicates that the median age of community college students was 26.9. This represents a slight decrease from the fall 1988 median of 27.0. The mean age was 30.4 in fall 1989 compared to 30.7 in fall 1988.
7. Fall 1989 student-level enrollment data indicate a notable increase among freshmen and a small decrease among sophomores in attendance at community colleges. Freshman enrollments increased from 204,224 in 1988 to 219,596 (7.5 percent) in 1989, while sophomore enrollments decreased slightly from 57,639 to 57,301 (-0.6 percent).
8. Nearly 44 percent of the students enrolled during fall 1989 attended the same college the previous term. The proportion of transfer students while small (4.3 percent) was its highest over the past five years. The proportion of first-time students decreased slightly from 34.7 percent in 1988 to 34.3 percent in 1989.

9. An analysis of enrollment by instructional program area revealed enrollment increases in the general associate, baccalaureate/transfer, occupational, and remedial/ABE/ASE programs. Baccalaureate/transfer remained the largest program area with approximately 38 percent of the students.
10. While nearly 38 percent of the students were in the baccalaureate/transfer area, only 23.2 percent of all students indicated their intent was to transfer. Three-fourths of these were enrolled in baccalaureate/transfer programs. Nearly 33 percent of all students indicated their intent was to prepare for a new career or to improve occupational skills.

INTRODUCTION

Accurate and comprehensive information on community college enrollments is important at the local, state, and national levels. This information is used not only to analyze historical enrollment trends but also for planning future programs, curricula, financing, and facilities. Each college provides the Illinois Community College Board with data on each student enrolled in credit-generating courses. These computerized data are used to produce various reports on student characteristics and curricula enrollments in Illinois community colleges. From this centralized statewide student database, the data needs of both state and national agencies and legislative bodies can be met.

This report focuses on a summary of statewide student enrollment trends and student characteristics in Illinois public community colleges. The analyses are based on fall 1989 opening enrollments for credit-generating students as reported by the colleges at the end of the regular fall registration period (usually the 10th day of the term). These data do not reflect non-credit community education enrollments. Courses that begin after the end of the regular registration period are not included in these figures either. For colleges with two or more modules during the fall semester, only those students enrolled in the first module are included. Therefore, these enrollments do not include all students who enroll at community colleges during the fall term. However, these data provide a point-in-time or "snapshot" of fall term enrollment with counts that are comparable from year to year and from institution to institution. Further, they are comparable to fall enrollment data in institutions nationwide.

For comparison with past fall enrollments, summary data for the last five years are presented. In addition to the summary data, a detailed table comparing fall 1988 and fall 1989 headcount and FTE enrollments by college is included. Additional enrollment data for each community college will be included in the 1990 edition of the Data and Characteristics of the Illinois Public Community College System.

Student Enrollment by Community College

Fall opening enrollment for 1989 (fiscal year 1990) was 341,733, and full-time equivalent (FTE) students totaled 174,437. Table 1 contains comparative fall tenth-day enrollment data for the last five years. The fall 1989 headcount enrollment increased 4.1 percent or 13,457 students over fall 1988. FTE enrollments increased 4.9 percent or the equivalent of 8,146 full-time students. Compared to fall 1985, current headcount increased by 0.6 percent and FTE enrollment was up by 4.7 percent. It is important to note that community colleges' enrollments have grown for two consecutive years and reversed the three years of decline from 1985 to 1987. In 1989, both headcount and FTE were at their highest levels during the five years under study.

Table 2 on the next page provides a comparison of 1989 fall opening enrollments with 1988 fall opening enrollments for each community college. Of the 50 colleges, 36 showed increases, 11 exhibited decreases, and three showed little or no change (1.0 percent or less) in headcount. FTE increases were reported by 39 colleges, decreases by five colleges, and little or no change by six colleges.

Summary of Full-Time/Part-Time Enrollments

Table 3 contains full-time/part-time headcount enrollment data from fall 1985 through fall 1989. The proportion of full-time enrollments increased steadily during these five years. The 103,114 full-time students enrolled in fall 1989 represented a 5.1 percent increase from a year ago and a new high for the five-year period. Part-time enrollments in fall 1989 increased 3.7 percent from the same time a year ago.

Summary of Male/Female Enrollments

Table 4 contains headcount data by gender from fall 1985 through fall 1989. The male/female distribution remained relatively stable with females over this five-year timeframe comprising between the current 57.5 percent and 58.6 percent of the total enrollment and averaging 57.9 percent. The proportion of male students increased slightly from 41.9 percent to 42.5 percent. Male enrollments increased modestly for the second year with the percent and number of male students at their highest level during the past five years.

Summary of the Ethnic Origin of Enrollments

Table 5 contains data pertaining to the ethnicity of community college students enrolled from fall 1985 through fall 1989. A comparison of fall 1988 and fall 1989 headcount enrollments indicates increases among four ethnic groups: Hispanics (19.3 percent), non-resident aliens (6.0 percent), whites (4.1 percent), and Asian/Pacific Islanders (1.9 percent). Contributing to the headcount growth among non-resident aliens are changes in immigration laws that include educational requirements as one of the conditions for persons previously classified as illegal aliens to obtain citizenship status.

The most noteworthy trend in racial/ethnic enrollments over the past five years has been the declining share of black enrollments compared to the increasing share of Hispanic enrollments. Proportionately, black enrollments have steadily declined from 17.6 percent during fall 1985 to 14.0 percent in fall 1989. Simultaneously, the proportion of Hispanic enrollments has gradually increased from 6.6 percent in fall 1985 to 9.6 percent in fall 1989. After a substantial drop in the number of black students attending community colleges between fall 1986 and 1987, black headcount enrollments have stabilized at the lower level averaging 47,367 over the last three years.

Summary of Enrollments by Age Category

Fall enrollments by student age category for the last five years appear in Table 6. The proportion and number of students under the age of 21 has increased steadily since 1987. Fall 1989 enrollments showed the largest proportion (28.0 percent) and number (94,951) of students under the age of 21 during the past five years. The proportion of students between the ages of 21 and 30 declined gradually since 1986. The proportion of students between 31 and 39 declined during the last two years. After experiencing a decrease between 1986 and 1987 to 11.7 percent, the proportion and number of students between 40 and 55 increased in fall 1988 and rebounded further in fall 1989 to a new high of 49,152 (14.5 percent). Over the past five years, the number of students over the age of 55 experienced sharp declines in fall 1985, fall 1988, and again in fall 1989. During fall 1989, the percentage and number of students age 55 and above were at their lowest level of the five-year period. The increase in the number of younger students under 21 resulted in a slight decrease in both the median and mean age of the fall 1989 community college population. The median age went from 27.0 to 26.9 and the mean age from 30.7 to 30.4.

Summary of Enrollments by Student Level

Table 7 contains enrollment data by student level or classification for the past five years. Freshmen accounted for 64.3 percent of all community college enrollments in fall 1989. Freshmen enrollments in 1989 were at their highest level in the past five years. The trend in freshmen representation was for gradual increase between 1986 and 1989. Sophomore enrollments, which increased substantially in fall 1988, lost some momentum with a slight decline (-0.6 percent) in fall 1989. The fall 1989 sophomore enrollment of 57,301 outpaced the five-year sophomore average of 55,242. The number of high school students enrolled in community colleges increased 2.9 percent from the 1988 level. Since fall 1988, high school enrollments have begun exhibiting modest growth after three years of decline. Unclassified students declined both numerically and proportionately for the second year in a row in 1989. (Unclassified students are defined as students who do not meet minimum requirements for entrance as regular college-level students, including students who are enrolled in adult basic or adult secondary education. Students who already have a bachelor's or associate degree but who are taking courses at the same or lower level also are considered as unclassified.) Enrollments in fall 1989 contained the fewest unclassified students during the five-year period under study.

Summary of Enrollments by Enrollment Status

Community college students are assigned to one of four enrollment status categories. First-time students are entering students who previously have not attended any college. In addition to first-time fall students, students who are enrolled in the fall term attending college for the first time during the previous summer are included in this classification as well. Transfer students are defined as those persons entering the college for the first time with at least 12 hours of academic credit earned at another college or university. Continuing students were enrolled at the college the previous term and are attending on an ongoing basis. Readmitted students are those who were enrolled at the college previously but not enrolled during the previous term (excluding summer). Fall student enrollment status data between 1985 and 1989 are summarized in Table 8. The proportion of students in each of these categories has fluctuated somewhat over the five-year period. Continuing students always represented the largest portion of enrollments over the past five years. Until 1986, more than one-half of the students enrolled in community colleges had been enrolled the previous year. Since 1986, continuing student enrollment has seen a decline below the 50 percent mark. Early indications based on fall 1988 and fall 1989 data are that the level of decline may be stabilizing. The proportion of first-time students has remained at just over one-third of the total for the five years under study. The number of transfer students increased by 22.2 percent in 1989 and was at the highest level in the last five years.

Summary of Enrollments in Instructional Programs

Table 9 contains a summary of headcount enrollments by instructional program area for fall 1985 through fall 1989. Baccalaureate/transfer and occupational students taking courses but not enrolled in a curriculum are identified as course enrollees and are included in the total program counts. Two program areas showed substantial increases in the actual number of students enrolled. The occupational area increased by over 7,500 students or 7.3 percent. This growth reverses two years of decreasing occupational enrollments. The increase for occupational course enrollees was greater than that for program enrollees. The general area of remedial/ABE/ASE also increased. The increase of over 6,200 students or 14.2 percent was primarily attributable to increases in the number of ABE students. The largest proportional growth in enrollment occurred in the general associate area with an increase of 36.3 percent or 1,998 students. Overall, baccalaureate/transfer enrollments increased by over 2,500 students (2.0 percent). Transfer course takers actually decreased (-2,717 or -9.9 percent). While occupational enrollments increased, vocational skills enrollments decreased. The vocational skills area registered a yearly decrease (-2,006 or -6.3 percent) in 1989 for the first time during the five years under study. When occupational and vocational enrollments are combined, the net fall 1989 enrollment gain over last year is 5,533 students (4.1 percent). The general studies certificate program experienced a decrease in fall 1989 of -15.0 percent marking the fifth consecutive year of decline in this area.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Full-time/Part-time Status. Table 10 contains the fall 1989 distribution of full-time and part-time student attendance by instructional program. Overall, 30.2 percent of the fall 1989 community college students attended on a full-time basis (12 or more credit hours). A comparison of enrollment status among the instructional program areas indicates that the highest percentage (49.1 percent) of full-time students are enrolled in the baccalaureate/transfer area. Thirty-nine and one-half percent of the baccalaureate/transfer students attend college full time. A slightly higher percentage (41.9 percent) of the general associate degree students enrolled on a full-time basis. Among occupational students 29.3 percent took at least 12 credit hours in the fall term. In combination, 26.2 percent of the remedial/ABE/ASE students enrolled full time. Vocational skills and general studies certificate students continue enrolling on a part-time basis--90.1 percent and 94.4 percent, respectively.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Gender. As illustrated in Table 11, during fall 1989 females outnumbered males in every instructional area. The remedial/ABE/ASE program contained the highest proportion of male (47.5 percent) students. The highest proportion of females (66.5 percent) were enrolled in the general studies certificate program. The male/female distribution within the baccalaureate/transfer area (42.1 per at male and 57.9 percent female) and occupational area (42.6 percent male and 57.4 percent female) mirror the overall male/female distribution.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Racial/Ethnic Origin. An examination of each racial/ethnic group's representation across program areas in fall 1989 as presented in Table 12 indicates that the largest percentages of white (42.4 percent), non-resident alien (41.3 percent), black (31.1 percent), and Asian (29.8 percent) students are enrolled in baccalaureate/transfer programs. The highest percentage of Hispanic (62.2 percent) students are enrolled in ABE programs. Since English as a Second Language courses are included under the ABE program area, the high percentage of Hispanic student enrollments in this area seems reasonable. Overall, Hispanic enrollment increased by 19.3 percent between 1988 and 1989. Their enrollment in ABE programs increased by 27.9 percent compared to a percentage increase of 14.0 percent in baccalaureate/transfer programs.

In the overall student population during fall 1989, the racial/ethnic distribution was as follows: Asian - 3.6 percent; American Indian - 0.3 percent; black - 13.9 percent; Hispanic - 9.5 percent; white - 71.6 percent; and non-resident alien - 0.2 percent. Comparisons of the racial/ethnic distribution contained in the overall student population with each of the eight program areas (e.g., general associate, baccalaureate/transfer, occupational, etc.) will be examined next. In the general associate degree program, Asian (9.8 percent vs. 3.6 percent), American Indian (0.6 percent vs. 0.3 percent), and black (23.7 percent vs. 13.9 percent) students had higher representation than they did within the overall population. In the baccalaureate/transfer area only white students (80.9 percent vs. 71.6 percent) had a higher representation than they exhibited in the overall student population. Likewise, whites were the only group with a higher proportion in the occupational area than the overall student population. In the vocational skills program, three racial/ethnic groups showed higher representation than in the general student population: Asians, blacks, and whites. American Indians, blacks, and whites had a higher proportion in remedial programs than in the general student population. All racial/ethnic groups except whites had higher representation in ABE programs than in the overall community college population. In ASE programs, American Indian, black, and Hispanic enrollments were proportionately higher than they were in the overall totals. White students had a higher representation in the general studies certificate program than in the overall population accounting for 81.7 percent of the enrollments in this area.

Enrollment in Instructional Programs by Age. Overall during fall 1989 within the total community college population, 43.7 percent of the students were under 25 years of age. As indicated in Table 13, the percentage of students less than 25 years of age by program area are as follows: general associate 48.7 percent, baccalaureate/transfer 57.7 percent, occupational 39.2 percent, vocational skills 26.3 percent, remedial 27.8 percent, ABE 32.4 percent, ASE 56.2 percent, and general studies certificate 17.4 percent.

Examination of each age group's representation across program areas indicates that over one-half (54.4 percent) of the students between 17 and 20 and 41.8 percent of all 21 through 24 year old students are enrolled in baccalaureate/transfer programs. The occupational program area contains the highest percentages of students in the 25-30 (36.2 percent), 31-39 (38.2 percent), and 40-55 (35.0 percent) age groups. Approximately one-quarter of the students 55 years of age or above are enrolled in the general studies certificate program. Students 16 years of age and under are concentrated in three programs: baccalaureate/transfer (24.5 percent), vocational skills (22.1 percent), and ASE (17.0 percent).

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by CIP. A complete listing of enrollments by the Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes for fall 1989 is provided in the appendix. Of the 128,246 baccalaureate/transfer (1.1) students, 24,818 are students taking transferable courses but not enrolled in a degree program (course enrollees). Among students in transfer degree programs, 64,912 are in the Associate in Arts, 35,421 are enrolled in Associate in Science programs, and 3,095 are in Associate in Arts

and Science degree curricula. Of the 110,411 occupational (1.2) students, 18,184 of them are taking occupational courses but not enrolled in a degree or certificate curriculum (course enrollees).

Table 14 shows enrollments in occupational curricula with at least 3,000 students enrolled. Business data processing (CIP 07.0305) retained its status as having the largest program enrollment with 7,831. However, business data processing enrollments decreased for the second consecutive year. The associate degree nursing (18.1101) program was the second largest with an enrollment of 7,786. The associate degree nursing program was the fastest growing program numerically (1,005) and percentagewise (14.8 percent) among curricula with enrollments over 3,000. Other programs with enrollments over 3,000 that have grown over the past year include: accounting and bookkeeping (07.0101) with 5,820, criminal justice administration (43.0105) with 4,814, and child care aide (20.0202) with 4,079. Two other programs with enrollments over 3,000 experienced modest enrollment declines: business administration and management (06.0401) with 5,296 and secretarial (07.0606) with 3,240 students.

Enrollments in Instructional Programs by Student Intent. Table 15 contains fall 1989 student intent data by instructional program area. Intent data conveys the student's primary goal that he/she wants to achieve as a result of his/her studies. The intent data are self reported by students when they initially enroll at the college. Some but not all colleges ask students to update this information periodically. An examination of intent data across program areas illustrates the diversity of interests and needs that community college students possess. Two goals represent the aspirations of just over one-half of community college students: 27.3 percent are attending to prepare for a new or first occupational career and 23.2 percent are preparing for transfer to a four-year college or university. The next largest group of students, 13.3 percent, indicate that they were unsure of their goals or that their goals were other than those listed among the seven possibilities that appear in Table 15. Improving present occupational skills was the goal of 10.5 percent of the students. The pursuit of non-career personal interests was the goal of 10.4 percent of all students. The following intent categories were aspired to by less than ten percent of the entire student population: remedying basic skill deficiencies (7.5 percent), exploring courses to decide on a career (4.1 percent), and preparing for the GED examination (3.6 percent).

Examination of student intent by the various program areas reveals some interesting observations. For example, one might anticipate that the majority of students in the baccalaureate/transfer area would indicate their intent is to transfer to a four-year institution. However, less than one-half (47.9 percent) indicated this was the case. Approximately one-fourth (25.2 percent) indicated their intent was to prepare for a new career or to improve present occupational skills. While this does not preclude their eventual transfer, it is an indication that transferring is not their primary intention.

Likewise, one might expect that students enrolled in occupational programs are there to prepare for a new career. Again, less than one-half (49.3 percent) indicated this was their primary intent. Relatively, 14.4 percent of the occupational students enrolled with the intent of improving their present occupational skills. Among occupational students, 11.1 percent intend to transfer to a four-year institution.

Students in the vocational skills curricula are often thought of as primarily interested in short-term training to improve their occupational/job-related skills. Only about one-third (36.4 percent) of the vocational skills students listed this as their intent. Other large contingents of vocational students are preparing for a new or first career (17.7 percent) and pursuing non-career personal interests/hobbies (17.1 percent).

The largest group of remedial students are attending to pursue non-career personal interests and personal growth (34.4 percent). Another 14.1 percent of the remedial students intend to prepare for an occupation. Only 11.3 percent of the remedial students listed remediation as their intent. These data indicate that substantial numbers of remedial students are pursuing long-term goals. Only 4.9 percent were preparing to transfer to a four-year institution.

Less than one-half (44.1 percent) of the adult basic education students listed remedying basic skill deficiencies as their reason for attending. Only one-third (32.6 percent) of the adult secondary education students indicated they enrolled to prepare for the GED test. Another quarter (28.2 percent) intended to remedy their basic skill weaknesses.

Approximately one-half (51.3 percent) of the general studies certificate enrollees are pursuing non-career personal interests.

This examination of intent by program area indicates the diversity of community college students' aspirations. Furthermore, no more than one-half of the students in any program area are pursuing the particular goal that is most often associated with a given major.
