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ABSTRACT

Each year, Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) examines longitudinal data on fall term minority enrollment to identify trends which may be of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities. The study is designed to gather longitudinal minority enrollment data and to examine trends which may assist those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities. The findings of the 1989 study include: (1) 508 minority students enrolled at PVCC during fall 1989, representing 11.4% of the student body; (2) Blacks represented 9.18% of the student body and 80.5% of the minority student population; (3) of the remaining minority students, 62 were Asian or Pacific Islanders, 21 were Hispanic, 3 were American Indians or Alaska Natives, and 13 classified themselves as "other"; (4) between fall 1988 and fall 1989, minority student enrollment increased 8.5% compared to a 6.1% total student enrollment increase; (5) 30.8% of all Black students attending PVCC in fall 1989 were male, 38.1% of all White students were male, and 43.4% of all minority students other than Blacks were male; (6) new Black student enrollment increased 21% between fall 1988 and fall 1989; (7) fewer Blacks than Whites were full-time students at PVCC during fall 1989; and (8) the second-year retention rate was higher for White than Black students. These trends suggest that PVCC is intensifying its efforts to draw and retain minority students, but it is still a long way from meeting its minority student recruitment and retention goals. (JMC)

INTRODUCTION


This is the tenth in a continuing series of reports concerning minority enrollment at Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC). Each report is designed to display longitudinal minority enrollment data and examine trends which should prove of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities.

As in previous reports, all data were obtained from the Student Enrollment Booklets compiled each term by the Virginia Community College System (VCCS) and printed electronically by computer. These booklets consist of numerous tables of data relating to many different aspects of student enrollment within the VCCS. Each table within the Student Enrollment Booklet from which data were obtained is noted within this report.

MINORITY ENROLLMENT

Five-hundred eight minority students enrolled at PVCC during Fall Semester 1989. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the number of minority students enrolled during Fall Semester 1988 by 40, and exceeding the previous record of 484, set in fall 1987, by 24. The percentage of minority students within the student body as a whole was 11.4%, slightly higher than the Fall Semester 1988 figure of 11.1%.

Four-hundred nine, or 80.5%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the Fall Semester 1988 figure by 29, and exceeding the previous record, set in fall 1987, by 17. Black students accounted for 9.2% of the entire student body.



Of the remaining minority students, 62 were Oriental (Asians or Pacific Islanders), 21 were Hispanic, 3 were American Indians or Alaskan natives, and 13 classified themselves as "other."

PVCC fall 1989 enrollment by race (white, black, and minority other than black) is shown in Figure 1. As can be seen in Table 1, Fall Semester 1989 minority enrollment patterns were quite similar to those of previous fall terms. In fall 1989, the percentage of minority students within the entire student body was slightly higher than during the two previous fall terms, and approximately the same as during the two terms previous to

¹As noted in previous reports, a student's racial classification is determined by what he or she indicates on the initial admission form. There are six boxes which the student may check: (1) White; (2) Black; (3) American Indian or Alaskan Native; (4) Asian or Pacific Islander; (5) Hispanic; and (6) Other. After the "other" box, space is provided for comment. Typically, an "other" student is a foreign student, uncertain which box to check. Occasionally, an "other" student is one with a sense of whimsy. On the admission form, students have written such comments as "human" or "Indiana Irish" to justify their "other" classification.

those (Fall Quarter 1985 and Fall Quarter 1986). The percentage of black students within the student body was one-tenth of a percentage point higher in fall 1989 than in fall 1988, but slightly lower than in either fall 1986 or fall 1985.

Normally, minority enrollment patterns differ slightly from overall student enrollment patterns. Between fall 1984 and fall 1985, minority student enrollment increased at a faster rate than either white student enrollment or enrollment in general. The opposite was true between fall 1985 and fall 1986 and between fall 1986 and fall 1987. Between fall 1987 and fall 1988 the enrollment patterns were approximately the same, but between fall 1988 and fall 1989 minority student enrollment once again increased at a slightly higher rate than either white student enrollment or enrollment in general.

STUDENT DEMOGRAPHIC CHARACTERISTICS BY RACE

In previous minority enrollment studies, demographic characteristics of minority students have been similar to those of white students.² The only exception, noted in last year's report, concerned sex. As was the case in fall 1988, fewer black male students than white male students attended PVCC. The opposite, however, was true with respect to minority males other than black. As can be seen in Table 2, 30.8% of all black students attending PVCC during Fall Semester 1989 were male; 38.1% of all white students were male; and

43.4% of all minority students other than black were male. Although the percentage of black male students was lower than the percentage of other male students, the number of black male students actually increased between Fall Semester

1988 and Fall Semester 1989. In fall 1989, 126 black males took classes at PVCC, as compared to 110 in fall 1988.

With respect to age, the mean age of black students was lower by two years than the mean age of white students, but the median age was the same. The mean age of white students was 31; the mean age of black students was 29. The median age of both white and black students was 29. The mean and median ages of minority students other than black were lower than those of either white or black students. The mean age of minority students other than black was 27, and the median age was 25. The mode age of white students, black students, and minority students other than black was 19. Age categories by race for PVCC fall semester students are presented in Table 3.

The PVCC fall semester headcount by race and residence is shown in Table 4. A slightly higher percentage of black students resided within the PVCC service region than did white students. The percentage of minority students other than black residing within the service region was much lower than the percentages of white or black

students. The percentage of students residing outside the service region but within the Commonwealth of Virginia was highest for whites and lowest for minorities other than black. However, a much larger percentage of minority students other than black were classified as out-of-state students than were white or black students.

The fall semester headcount by race and residence for all PVCC service region localities is shown in Table 5.

Most minority students residing within PVCC's service region lived within the City of Charlottesville or in Albemarle County. Seventy-three percent of all black students from the service region, and nearly 90% of minority students other than black, were residents of one of these two jurisdictions. One notable difference between fall 1989 figures and previous fall figures with respect to service region enrollment was that the percentage of black students from the City of Charlottesville decreased, and the percentage from Albemarle County increased. In previous years, both in terms of number and percentage, more black students have resided in Charlottesville than in any other locality. In Fall Semester 1989, however, almost as many black students (both in number and percentage) came from Albemarle County as did from the City of Charlottesville.

As has been noted in previous minority enrollment reports, PVCC has never enrolled as high a percentage of non-whites as reside within the service region as a whole. As can be seen in Table 6, over 18% of the service region population during any recent year is non-white, while less than 12% of the PVCC student population is non-white. Although the gap between service region minority population and PVCC minority headcount percentages narrowed in fall 1989, the figures were similar to those for previous fall terms.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT CHARACTERISTICS BY RACE

As noted in previous minority enrollment reports, differences in white and minority enrollment characteristics often provide indications as to what minority students find attractive about PVCC. Enrollment characteristics examined in this study are attendance (new or returning), status (full-time or part-time), class (freshmen, sophomores, developmental, or unclassified), program (college transfer, occupational/technical, developmental, or unclassified), degree sought (Associate of Arts [A.A.], Associate of Science [A.S.], Associate of Applied Science [A.A.S.], diploma, certificate, developmental, or unclassified), and curriculum (Business Administration, Education, Fine Arts, and so forth).

During most fall terms, a slightly higher percentage of minority students are new and a slightly lower percentage are returning.³ Although this was not true in Fall Semester 1988, it was true in Fall Semester 1989. As can be seen in Table 7, approximately

³New students include first-time students (those who have not attended college previously) and transfer students (those who have attended college previously but have never attended PVCC).

one-third of all white students were new, while slightly over one-third of black students were new, and over 40% of minority students other than black were new. Whatever accounted for the decline in new black students between fall 1987 and fall 1988 was not evident, and new

black student enrollment increased by 21% between Fall Semester 1988 and Fall Semester 1989.

Proportionally, slightly fewer blacks than whites were full-time students at PVCC during Fall Semester 1989. Full-time students were those enrolled in 12 or more hours of course work during the term. As can be seen in Table 8, nearly 19% of all white students were classified as full-time, while only slightly over 16% of all black students were classified as full-time. As has always been the case, a larger percentage of other minority students than of either white or black students were enrolled full-time in fall 1989.

PVCC fall term headcount by race and class is shown in Table 9. Typically, during any fall term, a higher percentage of minority students are classified as freshmen than white students. This was true during fall 1989, but not to the same extent as during fall 1987 or fall 1988. In fact, the percentage of black freshmen decreased by nearly 10% between Fall Semester 1988 and Fall Semester 1989.

Still, the question of black student retention, raised in last year's minority enrollment report, is relevant. Although approximately the same percentage of white and black students are new each year, a lower percentage of black students the following year are classified as sophomores. In other words, black students are less likely to complete their

freshman year of study at PVCC and return the following year as sophomores. This assumption is borne out by retention figures. As noted in the latest PVCC retention study:

For the second consecutive year, the retention rates for full-time white students were higher than those for full-time black students. In fact, the retention rate for full-time black students was considerably lower than the rates for either full-time white students or full-time minority students other than black, a fact which invites further investigation.⁴

PVCC fall term enrollment by race and program is shown in Table 10. During fall 1989, a slightly higher percentage of white than black students were enrolled in college transfer curricula. However, a higher percentage of minority students other than black than white or black students were enrolled in college transfer curricula. With respect to occupational/technical programs, a higher percentage of minority students,

especially blacks, were enrolled than were white students. The percentage of white students classified as developmental was lower than that of non-white students, but it should be noted that there have been problems with respect to classifying students as develop-

mental.⁵ In all, as has usually been the case during fall terms, a higher percentage of minority students than of white students were enrolled in programs leading toward degrees, certificates, or diplomas.

Enrollment patterns by race and degree sought are shown in Table 11. College transfer programs are those leading toward either the A.A. or A.S. degrees; occupational/technical programs are those leading toward the A.A.S. degree, a certificate, or a diploma. PVCC fall term headcount by race and actual curricula is shown in Table 12 and Table 13. These tables are presented to assist academic administrators in assessing minority enrollments within their divisions and programs. However, considerable caution should be exercised when examining these data. In any particular year, very few minority students may be enrolled in a particular curriculum. Because of such small numbers, the statistical reliability of the data is questionable.

CONCLUSIONS

Several disturbing trends were noted in the fall semester 1988 minority enrollment report, and the author concluded:

What these trends suggest is that PVCC is not recruiting as many black students as it should. This is especially true with respect to black males. Also, PVCC may not be retaining as many black students as it should. The college should re-examine its recruiting and retention strategies and intensify its efforts to attract and keep minority students.⁶

Whether as a result of these conclusions, or for other reasons, PVCC has begun to re-examine its recruiting and retention strategies and has intensified efforts to draw and retain minority students. Already these efforts seem to be paying off, as record minority enrollment figures were recorded during Fall Semester 1989, and some of the disturbing trends noted in fall 1988 have been reversed.

Five-hundred eight minority students enrolled at PVCC during fall 1989. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the number of minority students enrolled during fall 1988 by 40, and exceeding the previous record of 484, set in fall 1987, by 24. Four-hundred nine, or 80.5%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the fall 1988 figure by 29, and exceeding the previous record, set in fall 1987, by 17.

The sharp decline in black male attendance at PVCC was reversed. While a 16.1% decline in black male enrollment was noted between fall 1987 and fall 1988, an increase of 14.5% occurred between fall 1988 and fall 1989.

Between fall 1987 and fall 1988, in terms of both number and percentage, there was a decline in new black students. This trend was also reversed in Fall Semester 1989. In fact, in fall 1989, the percentage of black students classified as new was higher than the percentage of white students classified as new.

While these conclusions are encouraging, the perceptive reader should not lose sight of the fact that PVCC still has a long way to go to meet its minority student recruitment and retention goals. The percentage of minority students from each service region jurisdiction has never been as high as that jurisdiction's minority population. Until these percentages are the same, the college cannot claim to be meeting the needs of minorities within its service region. PVCC should be proud of its achievements in fall 1989, but must continue to actively recruit and retain minority students within its service area.



MINORITY ENROLLMENT AT PVCC FALL SEMESTER 1989

Each year the Office of Institutional Research and Planning at Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) publishes a report on fall term minority enrollment. The purpose of the report is to display longitudinal minority enrollment data and examine trends which might prove of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities. This brief highlights the tenth of these reports, *Minority Enrollment Report: Fall Semester 1989* (PVCC Institutional Research Report No. 1-90, February 1990).

Five-hundred eight minority students enrolled at PVCC during Fall Semester 1989. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the number of minority students enrolled during Fall Semester 1988 by 40, and exceeding the previous record of 484, set in fall 1987, by 24. The percentage of minority students within the student body as a whole was 11.4%, slightly higher than the Fall Semester 1988 figure of 11.1%.

Four-hundred nine, or 80.5%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the Fall Semester 1988 figure by 29, and exceeding the previous record, set in fall 1987, by 17. Black students accounted for 9.2% of the entire student body. Of the remaining minority students, 62 were Oriental (Asians or Pacific Islanders), 21 were Hispanic, 3 were American Indians or Alaskan natives, and 13 classified themselves as "other."

PVCC fall 1989 enrollment by race (white, black, and minority other than black) is shown in Table 1.

The sharp decline in black male attendance at PVCC, noted in fall 1988, was reversed. While a 16.1% decline in black male enrollment was noted between fall

¹As noted in previous reports, a student's racial classification is determined by what he or she indicates on the initial admission form. There are six boxes which the student may check: (1) White; (2) Black; (3) American Indian or Alaskan Native; (4) Asian or Pacific Islander; (5) Hispanic; and (6) Other. After the "other" box, space is provided for comment. Typically, an "other" student is a foreign student, uncertain which box to check. Occasionally, an "other" student is one with a sense of whimsy. On the admission form, students have written such comments as "human" or "Indiana Irish" to justify their "other" classification.
