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ABSTRACT

This staff development resource guide provides listings of instructional television and radio broadcasts related to major areas of the Total Teaching Act in South Carolina's Program for Effective Teaching (PET). Television program topics include: administration; adult education; the arts; career education; certificate-renewal credit courses; college-credit courses; computer education/new technology; conferences; custodial training; early childhood education; education of the handicapped; food services; guidance; health, physical education, and safety; human relations; instructional television (ITV) and audio utilization; language arts; library/media center; mathematics education; music education; parent education; science; series utilization; social studies; teacher certification; teaching techniques; television production techniques; testing programs; vocational education; and youth at risk. Radio program topics include administration; adult education; the arts; classroom management; discipline; early childhood education; education of the handicapped; environmental education; gifted and talented; health; human relations (self-concept); library/media center; parent education; social studies; teaching techniques; and youth at risk. A broadcast schedule is provided together with information on the running time for each program and a brief description of its content. The guide also includes information on district-operated distribution centers; ITFS (instructional television fixed service) school and school-related facilities; the ITFS network; the duties of the Instructional Technology Building Coordinator; and the statewide Instructional Technology Advisory System. A form for requesting additional copies of the resource guide is also included. (DB)



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District-Operated Distribution Centers

Seventeen tape and delay television and audio distribution centers and one dubbing center, serving 319 schools and school facilities with ITFS, are now in operation in South Carolina. These centers complement the statewide ETV ITFS network by providing scheduling tailored to local bell schedules and to local curricular needs. Service provided by most centers is primarily to secondary schools because of their departmentalization, however, several also serve elementary schools. Scheduling is provided by a combination of Instructional Television Fixed Service (ITFS), commercial cable television (CATV), and direct tape distribution, depending on the center. Information on these centers is provided below. The Richland 2 Center operates as a non-broadcast, tape distribution facility only.

ITFS Network Information

ITFS SIGNAL

ITFS is an over-the-air broadcast system that is somewhat similar to normal television. ITFS operates on a higher frequency, however, that must be converted for use on normal television receivers.

NETWORK STRUCTURE

The ITFS replacement network consists of 17 local area transmitters (LAT) with tape and delay centers, serving secondary and vocational schools. Twelve wide area transmitters (WAT) with six repeaters provide two channels of instructional programming to secondary schools not served by LATs during the day.

ITFS RECEPTION FOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS SERVED BY TAPE AND DELAY CENTERS

These secondary schools receive four ITFS channels of ITV programming from a local area transmitter (LAT). The program schedule is based on local teacher requests input to a particular tape and delay center. To schedule programs, teachers need to contact their school's ITV building coordinator, who will coordinate requests with their local tape and delay center. Each center has a complete library of secondary ITV programs, a partial library of the more heavily used staff development programs, and access to special programs, such as teleconferences, originating from S.C. ETV in Columbia.

ITFS RECEPTION FOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS SERVED BY WIDE AREA TRANSMITTERS (WATS)

These secondary schools are served by two ITFS channels with ITV programming originating from S.C. ETV in Columbia, and scheduled in the annual *S.C. Instructional TV & Audio Resources* book.

ITFS NETWORK COMPLETION—PHASE II

During the school year, announcements will be made should additional tape and delay centers be established and additional schools receive LAT service as a result of Phase II. Completion of the ITFS Network.

The Instructional Technology Building Coordinator

We are encouraging the principal of every school to appoint an instructional television and radio building coordinator. This person will work for the successful use of staff development television and radio/audio programs in the school. Find out who your coordinator is since it is vital for the two of you to work together in order to make maximum use of instructional television and radio in your classroom and for staff development.

Duties of the building coordinator are as follows.

Radio and TV sets, related equipment, and building distribution systems

- Survey your school for reception and equipment capabilities.
- Plan the use, movement, and secured storage of television and radio equipment.
- Coordinate the maintenance and service of television and radio equipment.
- Report reception difficulties or program errors in broadcasts.
- Coordinate the schedule for the building distribution system.

Promotion of staff development television and radio/audio

- Develop in the faculty a favorable attitude toward using television and radio/audio resources for instruction and staff development.
- Develop good community relations with instructional television and radio, particularly in the PTA/PTO.

Dissemination of information

- Distribute *Staff Development Resources* books.
- Distribute to teachers instructional technology newsletters, monthly staff development schedules, and resource guides.
- Call attention to pertinent items in the above publications by underlining, writing notes to teachers, etc.

Staff development

- Provide information on resources.
- Provide instruction in the operation and maintenance of television and radio/audio equipment.
- Develop, with the help of the librarian, a resource shelf of staff development programs for teachers, including supplementary materials for instructional television and radio/audio series.
- Inform teachers about special television and radio/audio staff development programs.
- Provide a way for teachers to share staff development television and radio/audio utilization ideas.
- Experiment with the school use of television and radio/audio for staff development.

Evaluation

- Coordinate evaluation of staff development television and radio/audio programming, manuals, and utilization.
- Collect utilization data for the South Carolina Department of Education, Office of Instructional Technology.

Audiotape Duplication Service

The South Carolina Department of Education's Audio-Visual Library provides assistance in duplicating staff development radio programs for schools. Tapes of most programs have been delivered to that office. To obtain costs and to use this service, please contact: South Carolina Department of Education, Audio-Visual Library, 1513 Gervais Street, Columbia, South Carolina 29201 (phone. 734-8918). Refer to the number of minutes for each program. More than one program can be recorded on most cassettes and reels, if desired.

The following chart shows the total minutes that can be recorded on each side of the different lengths of cassettes and reels. Please indicate on the order form how many programs you want on each tape. For example, you may want only one 15-minute program on a C-30 cassette, or you may want one 15-minute program on Side 1 and a different 15-minute program on Side 2. If you request a C-60, you can request two 15 minute programs on each side of the cassette, with a total of four different programs on one cassette.

We cannot duplicate at high speed a tape on a reel less than 600' in length. You can have the option of having programs on reels recorded at 3¾ i.p.s. or 7½ i.p.s. Schools may provide the blank tapes or cassettes on which the recordings are to be made. If the tapes are provided, there is no charge. When the blank tapes or cassettes are furnished by the Audio-Visual Library, the school will be charged for the cost of the tape only. Prices will change whenever new state contracts are received.

Used tapes or cassettes in good condition may be sent in and erased with new series recorded on them. Some adjustment may need to be made if the number and sizes do not match exactly with the new series. New tapes or cassettes may be purchased according to size or length. Any defective tape should be returned to the AV Library with a note explaining the problem. If the tape itself is good, it will be erased and the desired program reduplicated. If there are other problems, you will be advised. Except for postage, there is no cost unless new tapes must be supplied to replace older, worn-out, or damaged tapes.

The district taping centers have been provided copies of most radio programs. Schools located in districts having a taping center may request dubs from their district center.

Instructional Technology Advisory System

An advisory system provides lines of communication between the Office of Instructional Technology and the schools to ensure that the instructional resources described in this book are responsive to the educational needs of teachers and students. The system has four components—12 curriculum committees for the various curriculum areas, a principals' committee, an ITV building coordinators committee, and a state advisory committee.

COMMITTEES

Appointments of the committee members are based upon their knowledge of the content areas and/or their use of ITV/A programs. The committees review new and existing ITV/A programs and the other services offered by the Office of Instructional Technology. Recommendations from each of the committees are presented to the state advisory committee.



Dr. Jim Oglesby, director of Facilities Utilization at the University of Missouri and vice-president of the National School Boards Association, conducted a seminar on school board leadership at the 1987 annual convention of the S.C. School Boards Association. Dr. Oglesby delivers a message to everyone who is a school board member, is interested in becoming a school board member, works with a school board, and/or is affected by school boards' decisions and actions. Effective board leadership is the result of such qualities as energy, decisiveness, and persistence.

COACHING FOR IMPROVEMENT IN TEACHING

34 Minutes

Gerald Runager, principal of Marshall Elementary School, gave this speech at the 1987 S.C. School Administrators' Conference. Beginning with Showers' definition of coaching, Mr. Runager emphasizes the need for coaching in PET. He then discusses the concept of peer coaching, which is non-threatening. He asks the group to consider the next five years as the most exciting times in teaching, with the pervasiveness of computer technology, school-based management, the master teacher concept, and the philosophy about critical-thinking skills for children.

CURRICULUM ALIGNMENT AND QUALITY CONTROL

34 Minutes

Dr. Aretha Pigford, associate professor at USC's College of Education, made this presentation at the 1987 School Administrators' Conference at Myrtle Beach. Dr. Pigford defines "Curriculum Alignment and Quality Control" as matching the *written* curriculum with the *taught* curriculum with the *tested* curriculum. After a review of students' test results, Dr. Pigford spent her first year looking at how teachers were teaching. The next year's tests showed only minor change, so the faculty and Dr. Pigford looked at the curriculum from three perspectives: the curriculum guide (skills and objectives), what was on the *taught* (textbooks), and what was being tested. She used a team approach for alignment. A curriculum committee reviewed the data and looked at demographics and subskills. The faculty set goals and objectives and schoolwide strategies. This process was then implemented on each grade level. The faculty developed collegial relationships. They analyzed texts and correlated them to BSAP. They also analyzed their teaching habits. The principal monitored the process by reviewing and offering feedback on BSAP folders, by visiting regularly in classrooms, and by reading student papers.

EFFECTIVE SCHOOLS—RESEARCH AND PRACTICE

28 Minutes

Dr. Dale Mann explains the research on effective schools and translates it using school examples, making comparisons within the fields of defense and medicine. Teachers, principals, and policy-makers would benefit from his presentation, which was given at the 1985 Conference on Effective Schools.

MANAGING FOR RESULTS

45 Minutes

Dr. James A. Wilsford, superintendent of Orangeburg School District 5 and 1989 National Superintendent of the Year, delivered this speech in two parts at the school district's conference on "Effective Educational Practices for Excellence" on April 26, 1989. Dr. Wilsford outlines and gives specific examples of how technology is the great "enabler" for teachers, as the way to improve leadership and management and as the tool for making learning more efficient for different kinds of students.

1. Be a partner/peer
2. Collaborate on classroom problems
3. Make conferences productive and positive
4. Encourage teachers' professional growth
5. Upgrade principal skills
6. Give teachers the opportunity to practice new skills
7. Be open to new ways suggested by teachers
8. Solicit ideas for staff development activities
9. Change faculty meetings to staff development meetings
10. Enhance pride of self-efficacy

He stresses that professional growth is a career-long process and emphasizes the philosophy statements in the Department of Education publication, *Staff Development Handbook*.

Dr. Lezotte challenges local schools and council members to accept the responsibility of creating and improving schools, collaboratively, based on research and on locally developed and controlled planning.

THE "ARTS" AND EDUCATION

Frank Hodson, chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, delivered this speech in support of effective arts education in the schools at the 1988 S.C. School Boards Association Convention. After praising South Carolina's Arts in Basic Education program, Mr. Hodson cites the weaknesses in arts education across the country, although significant resources are being devoted to it. He supports strengthening the arts in the school curriculum to give students a better education.

ON CIRCUIT-RIDING, BRUSH ARBORS, THE LAYING ON OF HANDS: SOME METAPHORIC ANALOGIES THAT MIGHT BE WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION IN A QUIET PLACE, AT THE DAWN OF A NEW DAY

30 Minutes

Dr. Bryan Lindsay, professor of fine arts and humanities at USC-Spartanburg, delivered this speech at the meeting of the S.C. Alliance for Arts Education on March 29, 1988. Dr. Bryan helps listeners take an extensive look at the impact of the Arts as Basic Curriculum plan (ABC) as developed by the S.C. Arts Commission, S.C. Alliance for Arts Education, and the State Department of Education. He gives particular consideration to improving the quality of life in the state through an enriched and expanded arts education curriculum.

CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

33 Minutes

Space as an important variable in the consideration of instructional procedures is presented by Dr. Gary Houmes. He suggests how the teacher can analyze the space in the classroom and emphasizes that every child has a need for territory to which he can lay claim. Examples are cited on what a teacher can do to protect a child's personal space. Dr. Houmes also mentions lighting, traffic territory, visual privacy, negotiable space, and auditory privacy.

DISCIPLINE

CURRENT TRENDS IN DISCIPLINE

47 Minutes

Dr. Arthur W. Combs, professor of education at the University of Florida, favors term changes in discipline. He explains that punishment results in only a temporary change in behavior. A permanent change in a person's behavior requires a change in one's attitudes, feelings, beliefs, and values. Teachers must also consider the person's self-concept and his view of the particular situation. The method of discipline is not as important as the message delivered.

DISCIPLINE AND DELINQUENCY

41 Minutes

Dudley E. Flood discusses how the role of teachers has changed since the 1950. He believes a teacher's attitude is communicated and reciprocated. That is, whatever a teacher believes about a student will affect how much success the teacher has with that student. He stresses the demeaning nature of some school discipline-- teachers need to treat students as people of worth, dignity, and value.

DISCIPLINE AND DELINQUENCY

23 Minutes

Gordon A. Raley talks about the need to reduce school violence and keep children in school. He calls our attention to the Department of Education's lack of funds for providing alternatives to school suspension or programs dealing with school violence and vandalism. Program funds, he says, come from the local level.

Jan 29, 3:15

LAW-RELATED EDUCATION: PREVENTIVE APPROACHES TO PROBLEMS OF DISCIPLINE AND DELINQUENCY

29 Minutes

Norman Gross talks about a curricular approach to addressing problems of delinquency and discipline. He believes citizenship education in our schools should be an overriding concern because students need to deal with the realities of the amendments to the Constitution. Teachers must address the needs of children in terms of their present and future lives.

Feb. 25, 3:15

STUDENT DISCIPLINE

60 Minutes

Dr. Kevin Walsh, professor at the University of Alabama and a member of the Jefferson County School Board in Birmingham, delivered this speech to a seminar at the 1987 annual convention of the S.C. School Boards Association. Discipline is an essential part of education. Dr. Walsh gives a comprehensive overview of "discipline" that includes three equally important dimensions of education: (1) development of knowledge, (2) training of mental abilities, and (3) development of character. He goes on to outline a four-step procedure to change the school: (1) control exercised by the principal, (2) achievement, (3) esprit de corps, and (4) community involvement.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

INVITATIONAL INSTRUCTION AND LEARNING

60 Minutes

Dr. John Novak, professor of education at Brock University in Ontario, made this presentation at the 1987 Early Childhood Summer Institute, co-sponsored by the State Department of Education and the University of South Carolina. Dr. Novak describes the process of inviting children to learning. He examines this approach through verbal, nonverbal, formal, and informal interactions between teachers and children. By providing a theory of practice, Dr. Novak challenges teachers to create school environments that invite children to learn and flourish.

PLEASE LISTEN TO WHAT I'M NOT SAYING

45 Minutes

In his speech presented at the Early Childhood Summer Institute in 1986, **Dr. Charles Galloway** focuses on the way people negotiate relationships, emphasizing the nonverbal communication between adults and children during the learning process. This motivational speech is excellent for teachers and parents, and is especially useful for counselors.

EDUCATION OF THE HANDICAPPED

MAINSTREAMING

43 Minutes

Dr. Virginia Brown discusses the responsibility of the classroom teacher for mainstreaming--the process of integrating special education students within a regular class. The problems and progress of mainstreaming are reviewed, and three basic areas of mainstreaming are considered: (1) academic, (2) extracurricular activities, and (3) noncurricular aspects of school. The organization and management of mainstream programs are discussed.

Feb 27, 3:15

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

40 Minutes

Doug Echols discusses why and how education should concern itself with the environment. He suggests that educators take into consideration the various things one can do to utilize the world outside the classroom as a teaching location. Mr. Echols cites activities students can do to put themselves at the center of the learning process in order to enhance the development of basic learning skills.

Feb. 6, 3:15

GIFTED AND TALENTED

GIFTED CHILDREN

50 Minutes

Dr. Bryan Lindsay discusses four main topics--orientation, training, indoctrination, and education. He also talks about the interrelated and interconnection of gifted programs and mainstreaming. He believes effective educators give classroom instruction practical meaning and value. He reminds educators that the contemporary school is an artistically constructed environment. Dr. Lindsay warns educators about the mistake of forgetting to extend to the student the opportunity to interrelate all learnings toward one end.

Sep. 25, 3:00

LEADERSHIP GIFTEDNESS

43 Minutes

Dr. Bryan Lindsay surveys various forms of giftedness, with emphasis on psychosocial or leadership-gifted children. His talk includes the artistically talented, the creative, the productive, and the psychomotor gifted children. He defines a leader as one who brings about change. Three classifications of leadership are discussed: (1) attempted leadership, (2) successful leadership, and (3) effective leadership. Dr. Lindsay says, "The effective leader has the best interest of all followers at the center of his planning and style. The leader must have a real sense of task commitment and task identification."

Feb 26, 3:15

HEALTH

HANDLING STRESS

50 Minutes

Dr. Rigdon discusses the need to teach children and teachers how to cope with stress. Our safety and security, says Dr. Rigdon, is the #1 concern in the United States today. Thus, the structure of American society places much stress on people of all ages. He analyzes and defines stress in terms of recognizing and accepting one's emotional needs, values, and behavior. Dr. Dudley Flood believes there is only one valid assessment of teaching—are the students learning and consuming the product? He advocates that teachers assign practical value to facts to make them useful in everyday life. In other words, facts must be conceptualized before they become learning. Dr. Flood summarizes his talk by saying, "If teachers speak to students as if they were important persons of worth, dignity, and value, students will believe they are special and then become that way."

AN INVITATION TO LEARN/SUCCEED

Dr. William Purkey advises teachers on the essential need to believe in students by inviting them into the classroom. He cites examples of ways to do this, and he discusses ways to recognize which students haven't been invited. His central idea is: "We create each other. What an educator thinks of students predicts what students will accomplish. Invitations are subtle acknowledgements of students as individuals."





Serving the in-school program are 11 broadcast television stations carrying elementary school programs. Many locations can receive both the "red" and the "green" networks, as shown above. Regional ETV studios are located at Beaufort, Rock Hill, Spartanburg, and Sumter.

During the school year, staff development programs are broadcast from 3:00-4:00 p.m. on open-circuit and from 3:00-4:30 p.m. on ITFS, Monday through Friday. The programs are scheduled on both broadcast networks and on the ITFS system.

S.C. ETV ITFS System



The South Carolina Instructional Television Fixed Service (ITFS) replacement network became operational in 1988.

DISTRIBUTION


Approximately 319 secondary schools, vocational schools, and other school-related facilities are served by 17 tape and delay centers and the ITFS LAT system. Each ITFS tape and delay center generates four channels of programming from prerecorded tapes or by switching to one or more of the WAT channels for "live, real-time" programs.

Additionally, 12 WAT transmitters and six repeaters, interconnected by way of a state owned microwave system to the Columbia studio, serve approximately 153 primarily secondary schools, the 17 tape and delay centers, and approximately 150 non-public school facilities, such as hospitals, technical education centers, law enforcement centers, health-related facilities, and colleges and universities. Each of these non-public school locations receives the four statewide channels of programming.

South Carolina Educational Radio Network




The South Carolina Educational Radio Network, established in 1972, broadcasts staff development and public programming on eight FM stations across the state. The eighth radio station, WLJK-FM (89.1) in Aiken, became operational in early 1989.

All stations operate at a power of 100,000 watts. The coverage map indicates the general coverage area for the existing stations within the Educational Radio Network, but by no means represents every school district that will be able to receive an adequate signal. Many schools beyond the areas indicated will be able to receive instructional radio with and often without the aid of antennas.
