ABSTRACT

This report presents detailed information concerning the member institutions of the United Negro College Fund, comprising 41 historically black colleges and universities in the United States. Data are organized within the categories of enrollment, admissions, faculty and staff, degrees, student financial aid, college costs, institutional finances, and endowment. The data indicate that enrollments have increased by 16% since 1986. The enrollment of women has grown at a faster rate than that of men. Although about two-thirds of all undergraduate students received Pell Grants during 1988-89, the amount of student aid derived from this source accounted for only 25% of all student financial aid. Various loan programs accounted for nearly 40% of student aid dollars in 1988-89. Business continued as the most popular major for bachelor's degree recipients. Degrees in business exceeded those in the second most popular field, education, by a margin of nearly four to one. Faculty salaries trail those found at other private 4-year colleges. (JDD)

Highlights from the 1990  
UNCF Statistical Report

- \* Enrollments at UNCF member institutions have reached nearly 50,000. Preliminary figures for fall, 1990, show a total enrollment of 49,397--up two percent over fall, 1989. Since 1986, enrollments have increased by 16 percent. In contrast, enrollments at all U.S. colleges and universities have grown at about half this rate during this period.
- \* The enrollment of women has grown at a faster rate than that of men. Women comprised 59 percent of the enrollment at UNCF institutions in fall, 1989.
- \* New freshman enrollments increased to 14,374 in fall, 1989; freshman enrollments have increased by over 20 percent since 1985.
- \* The number of bachelor's degree recipients increased to 5,099; professional and doctoral degree output also increased over the previous year, but the output of master's degrees declined by some 20 percent.
- \* In 1987, over one-quarter of all bachelor's degrees awarded to black students in mathematics and the physical sciences were conferred by UNCF colleges.
- \* The percentage of full-time faculty members who held a doctoral degree exceeded 52 percent in fall, 1989, compared with 43 percent in fall, 1983.
- \* The market value of the colleges' endowment funds for the year ending June 30, 1989, exceeded \$350 million. This figure is a gain of some 13 percent over the previous year and more than double the figure reported for fiscal year 1984. The average size of the endowment fund at a UNCF institution--\$8.6 million--is, however, only about one-third as large as that found at other private four-year colleges.
- \* Although about two-thirds of all undergraduate students received Pell Grants during 1988-89, the amount of student aid derived from this source accounted for only 25 percent of all student financial aid. In contrast, various loan programs accounted for nearly 40 percent of student aid dollars in 1988-89. Three-quarters of all loan funds were made available through the government's Stafford Loan (GSL) program.
- \* Business continued as the most popular major for UNCF bachelor's degree recipients. About 30 percent of all bachelor's degrees were awarded in business. Degrees in business exceeded those in the second most popular field, education, by a margin of nearly four to one.

- \* Although faculty salaries increased by an average of 6.2 percent over the previous year, these salaries trail those found at other private four-year colleges. The average salary of a full professor at UNCF institutions was \$29,881 in 1989-90; the average salary for an instructor was \$19,248. At other four-year colleges the comparable figures for 1989-90 were \$46,830 and \$24,000 respectively.
- \* The cost for tuition & fees, room & board, and books & supplies increased by only 4.3 percent in 1989-90 over the previous year. For a student living on-campus at a UNCF college, these expenses averaged \$7,310; nationally at four-year private colleges, these expenses totaled \$13,094, some 79 percent higher.
- \* Students came to UNCF institutions from 48 states and the District of Columbia. Foreign students comprised four percent of the total enrollment.

## Introduction

The 1990 UNCF Statistical Report presents detailed information concerning the member institutions of the United Negro College Fund. These colleges are a part of a larger group of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs); together, these colleges constitute only about three percent of all colleges and universities in the U.S., but yet they enroll about 35 percent of all African-Americans attending four-year institutions; they graduate about 40 percent of all African-Americans receiving bachelor's degrees. Of the 48 privately supported HBCUs, 41 are member institutions of the United Negro College Fund.

With the exception of Wilberforce, founded in 1856, and the Interdenominational Theological Center, founded in 1958, most of the UNCF member institutions were founded by religious societies from the North during the 35 year period following the Civil War. All UNCF institutions are accredited by a regional accrediting association. Located principally in the Southeast, these institutions operate with variety of organizational structures and program offerings. Most of the institutions offer baccalaureate programs exclusively, while Clark Atlanta, Tuskegee, Virginia Union, and Xavier offer graduate/professional programs in addition to their undergraduate curricula. The Interdenominational Theological Center provides programs of study at the master's and doctoral levels.

The United Negro College Fund was founded in 1943 by Dr. Frederick D. Patterson (of Tuskegee Institute) and 27 other college presidents who were convinced that private, historically black colleges should bind together for their mutual benefit. Dr. Patterson's vision was sustained in that during its first year of operation, the UNCF raised more than three times the amount that the colleges had raised individually the year before.

The UNCF member institutions have made great contributions to the education of minority students over the past century. The list of distinguished graduates from UNCF colleges includes civil rights leaders, political leaders, religious leaders, educators, scientists, lawyers, and physicians. Four UNCF colleges consistently rank among the top ten institutions in the country in supplying black applicants for medical schools.

This report comes at a time when there is growing concern about black participation and representation in higher education. In 1976, blacks constituted 12.3 percent of the college-age population and 9.3 percent of the college enrollments in the U.S.; however, by 1988, the black proportion of the college-age population had increased to 14.4 percent while the black proportion of college enrollments had declined to 8.9 percent. During the twelve year period the ratio of black college enrollment to black college-age population declined from .76 to .62.

The report will point to reasons why the 41 member colleges of the UNCF continue to grow while black enrollments in other colleges have reached a plateau. Data for the report was generally obtained from the annual UNCF Questionnaire which was completed by the colleges during the 1989-90 academic year. Data concerning the 1990 fall enrollment was obtained from a telephone survey in late September, 1990.

## Enrollment

With increases reported by 31 of the 41 member institutions, the fall, 1990, headcount enrollment reached 49,397 at UNCF member institutions. (See Figure 1). Appendix A shows the total fall (headcount) enrollments at each UNCF member institution from 1986 through 1990. This marks the fourth straight year in which enrollments have grown. The total enrollment is up by two percent over fall, 1989, and is up by 16 percent over the past four years. The enrollment gains have occurred when the overall gain in total enrollments at all U.S. colleges and universities has been moving up at about half the rate found at UNCF colleges. (See Tables 1 and 2).

UNCF Member Institutions



The enrollment gains at UNCF colleges also stand in sharp contrast to the undergraduate enrollment figures for black undergraduate students at all U.S. colleges and universities. Table 3 shows that black undergraduate college enrollment increased nationally by only one percent during the 1982-1988 period; during this same period enrollment at UNCF colleges increased by seven percent.

Table 4 shows that black representation in higher education has been steadily decreasing over the past decade. In 1976, blacks constituted 12.3 percent of the college-age population and 9.3 percent of the college enrollments; by 1988, the black proportion of the college-age population had increased to 14.4 percent but the black proportion of the college enrollment had declined to 8.9 percent. During this period the ratio of black college enrollment to black college-age population declined from .76 to .62.

Clearly, UNCF colleges are offering a viable educational alternative to black students. UNCF institutions are successful in enrolling many students who would otherwise not be attending college. The reasons for this success can be attributed to a number of factors:

- \* a supportive environment which permits students to focus on learning and build confidence in their abilities without the hinderance of racial/social discomfort;

- \* a professional cadre of admissions officers who present information about their colleges in a positive light and who distribute literature that is attractive and informative and who make decisions in a timely manner;
- \* sensitive financial aid officers who find a way to help students from disadvantaged economic backgrounds obtain the financial means to enroll;
- \* low tuition rates. Tuition rates at UNCF colleges are only about half that found at other private four-year colleges.

Enrollment Status: Full-time & Part-time; Graduate & Undergraduate

The great majority of students at UNCF colleges are full-time undergraduate students. Only about nine percent are part-timers, while only four percent are graduate or professional students. Appendices B and C provide the institutional enrollment breakdown by full-time and part-time students and by undergraduate/graduate students.

Gender

Appendix G shows the enrollment figures by gender at UNCF institutions. The overall figures show that women constitute 59 percent of the total enrollment; men, 41 percent. (In 1988, the percentages were 58 and 42 respectively.) The enrollment figure for women is 44 percent higher than that for men. At only five of the UNCF institutions (excluding the three single-sex colleges) do men outnumber women. Comparing the 1989 men/women figures with those of a year ago, it can be seen that the enrollment of men increased by only two percent (from 19,399 to 19,818) while women increased by 7.5 percent (from 26,588 to 28,578).

The difference in college-going rates between black men and black women has been receiving increased attention nationally. A number of conferences have already been held to address this issue and a number of others have been planned. Briefly the facts as obtained by the U. S. Department of Education and the Census Bureau show that from a national perspective the enrollment of black women in higher education has been dramatically increasing over the past several years while the enrollment of black men has been slowly decreasing. Since 1976, the enrollment of black women has increased by some 22 percent (from 563,000 to 687,000) while the enrollment of black men has declined by some six percent from (470,000 to 443,000).

## Geographical Origin

Table 5 shows the geographic origin of UNCF students by state. Note that 48 of the 50 states are represented. (Montana and Wyoming are the missing states.) Appendix I shows the institutional state by state origin of students, while Appendix J shows the origin by principal UNCF market cities. As in past years, about two-thirds of UNCF students come from the twelve states in which UNCF colleges are located: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. Cities which send at least 1,000 students to UNCF colleges include: Atlanta, Chicago, Memphis, Miami, and New Orleans.



## Admissions

### New Freshmen

New freshmen enrollment continued to increase at UNCF institutions. In fall, 1989, the enrollment of new freshmen reached 14,025--a three percent gain over the 1988 figure and a 21 percent increase over the 1985 figure. The number of applications and the number of students admitted have increased substantially over 1985 figures. Applicants rose by 23 percent during this period while the number of those admitted was up by 34 percent. See Figure 2.

Although UNCF institutions show a considerable range in the percentage of applicants who are admitted to their freshman classes (31 percent to 100 percent), the great majority admit most applicants who wish to enroll. Overall figures show that over 80 percent of all applicants were admitted and that over 40 percent of the admitted applicants later enrolled. (See Appendix J).


### Transfers

Transfer students from other institutions comprise about 14 percent of all new students at UNCF institutions. As shown in Appendix F, the numbers coming from two-year and four-year institutions are quite similar. Of the four-year college transfers, over half of these students had formerly attended predominantly white institutions.

## Faculty and Staff

One of the most impressive recent accomplishments of the UNCF member institutions has been the steady academic development of the full-time faculty personnel. As shown in Figure 3 below, the percentage of full-time faculty holding the doctorate has increased from 43 to 52 percent since 1983. Many of the persons who have gained the doctorate in recent years have been assisted by various faculty development programs administered by UNCF. As shown in detail in Appendix L, men comprised 61 percent of the full-time faculty (35 percent black and 26 percent non-black); women comprised 39 percent of the full-time faculty (28 percent black and 11 percent non-black). The racial/ethnic breakdown shows that 63 percent of the faculty were black; 37 percent were non-black.

## Faculty Salaries

Faculty salaries at UNCF institutions rose in 1989 (over 1988) by some six percent. Such an increase kept pace with the salary increases reported for all private four-year colleges. As shown in Figure 4 and Table 6, average faculty salaries at UNCF institutions trail those found at other private colleges by a considerable margin. The relatively low salaries of full professors at UNCF institutions would appear the most critical; their salaries stand at only about two-thirds of the level found at all private four-year colleges; the salaries of faculty members at other ranks stand at approximately three-quarters of the national level. Many UNCF faculty members provide dedicated service to disadvantaged students at a salary far less than what they could earn elsewhere.

By Rank at Private Colleges, Fall 1989



### Faculty Turnover; Tenure

Appendix N shows that in fall, 1989, 20 percent of the faculty were new appointments and that slightly over one-quarter of the full-time members held tenured positions.

### Faculty Distribution

As has been the case for the past several years, the largest percentages of faculty members at UNCF institutions are found in the humanities and languages and in the sciences and mathematics. Table 7 shows that the proportional composition of the full-time faculty at UNCF colleges has been relatively steady over the past several years. Probably reflecting a decline in student interest, the percentage of education and vocational education and health instructors have each dropped by two percentage points over the past six years while two percent gains have been recorded in science and math and engineering and computer science.

### Staff Composition

As shown in Appendix O, there were some 8,686 full-time employees at the member institutions in fall, 1990. Faculty members comprised 32 percent of the full-time personnel; 22 percent were administrators; and 46 percent were support personnel (clerical and secretarial staff, buildings and grounds staff, security staff, and other support staff). Of the administrative personnel, some 17 percent were classified as senior administrators (the president, vice-presidents, and deans); 42 percent were identified as middle-level administrators (assistant vice presidents, directors, managers, and coordinators); the remaining 40 percent were other administrators (assistant directors, supervisors, and administrative assistants). (See Appendix R.)

## Degrees

The number of bachelor's degrees awarded at UNCF member institutions in 1988-89 slightly increased over the totals for 1987-88--5,095 vs. 5,069. (See Appendix T.) At the graduate/professional levels, the number of degrees awarded in 1988-89 showed a slight drop over the previous year; most of this decrease in graduate degrees can be traced to the decline in the numbers seeking master's degrees in education.

Although only about 7.5 percent of all U.S. black baccalaureate degree-seeking students are enrolled in UNCF colleges, these colleges produce far more of the degree recipients in certain key areas of study than would be expected from their enrollment numbers. Table 8 below shows the total number of bachelor's degrees awarded to black students by major area of study in the U.S. in 1986-87 and the number and percentage that were awarded by UNCF colleges. (Comparative data were not available for more recent years.)

Table 8 dramatically shows the vital impact of UNCF colleges in producing physical scientists and mathematicians. Clearly, UNCF colleges are able to attract and graduate a disproportionate share of these critical future scientific leaders.

## Trends in Areas of Study

Table 9 below shows the number of students receiving degrees in various fields of study at UNCF institutions since 1979-80. Note that in 1979-80, business and the social sciences were nearly equal in the percentage of degrees awarded, but since that year business has jumped far ahead of the social sciences and in 1988-89 accounted for over twice as many degrees as the social sciences.

Education is a field which continues to decline in its percentage of the total number of graduates. In 1979-80, education accounted for almost one-fifth of all graduates, but in 1988-89 education accounted for only about eight percent of the total number of graduates.

Computer science had practically no graduates in 1979-80, but grew rapidly to account for almost six percent of the total number of graduates in 1987-88; in 1988-89, the field dropped back slightly-- to four percent of the total.

## Student Financial Aid

At UNCF member institutions, 91 percent of all students received some form of financial aid in 1988-89. At some UNCF colleges, close to 100 percent of the students depended on financial aid in order to attend. The sections below will focus on the family incomes of UNCF students and the recent trends in student financial aid with particular reference to the federal government's student aid programs.

### Family Income

Coming from families with incomes standing at only about two-thirds the level of students at other private colleges, students at UNCF institutions face severe difficulties in financing their educations. Recent survey data from the Cooperative Institutional Research Program's annual freshman survey shows that the median estimated family income of students attending private black colleges in fall 1989 was \$31,666 as contrasted to \$49,729 for students attending private nonsectarian colleges. Table 10 below shows that three times as many students who attend private black colleges (24 percent vs. eight percent) come from families where the family income is less than \$15,000--a figure close to the government's poverty level index. With so many students coming from extremely low income families, adequate financial aid is crucial to their ability to stay in college.

### Aid by Category

The total amount of student aid reported for the 1988-89 academic year--\$184 million--was up seven percent over the previous year. See Table 11. This slight increase failed to keep pace with an enrollment increase of five percent and a cost-of-living increase, also, of about five percent.

In terms of the number of participants, the federal government's Pell Grant program was the most frequently used in 1988-89. Some 27,505 UNCF students (65 percent) participated in this program in 1988-89; the average amount granted through this program was \$1,645. The second largest federal grant program, the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) program, reached one-third of all UNCF students; the average award in this program was \$995. In total, these two federal grant programs provided some \$58 million in 1988-89 to UNCF students.

In terms of dollars, however, the Stafford Loan program (formerly known as the Guaranteed Student Loan program) is now the largest single financial aid resource for UNCF students. This program provided some \$51 million (30 percent) of all student aid money in 1988-89. The average amount borrowed under this program in 1988-89 by UNCF students was \$2,367. (If a student were to borrow a similar amount for each of his/her four years of college, then the total amount borrowed would approach \$10,000.) Slightly over half of all UNCF students participated in this program in 1988-89.

For the details of each member college's financial aid allocations on a program by program basis, see Appendix Y. This appendix shows the number of students aided at each college through each program, the total amount awarded, and the average amount awarded.

Trends in Student Aid

Figure 5 provides graphic illustration of the trends in participation rates in four important federal student aid programs since 1982-83: the Pell Grant program; the Guaranteed Student Loan program (now called Stafford Loans); the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant program; and the College Work-Study program. While the GSL (Stafford) program nearly doubled in terms of the number of UNCF student participants (11,000 to almost 22,000), the other three federal aid programs actually declined in the number of students who were served by these programs. During this period enrollments at UNCF colleges were increasing by almost ten percent.

Four Federal Student Aid Programs





Figure 6 shows the amounts of federal student aid dollars received by UNCF institutions since 1982-83. Note that the amount of Pell Grant money and SEOG money has remained rather constant despite the fact that enrollments have been increasing and that the consumer price index has been constantly rising. The funds available through the government's Guaranteed Student Loan program, however, has climbed in stair step fashion since 1982-83; at that time only \$26 million was borrowed by UNCF students, but in 1988-89 the amount had climbed to nearly \$52 million.

Pell Grants, GSL's, & SEOG's




As fewer students have been able to obtain grant funds and with more students having to rely on loan funds, financing a college education has become more difficult for thousands of low income students who attend UNCF institutions.

## College Costs

When compared with other private four-year colleges and universities in the U.S., the cost of attending a UNCF member institution remains much less. The data shown graphically in Figure 7 below compares the charges at UNCF institutions with charges at all private colleges in the U.S. and with private colleges in the South.

From 1988-89 to 1989-90 tuition and fees at UNCF colleges rose from \$4,049 to \$4,273--an increase of six percent. The UNCF average charge for tuition and fees was less than half the \$8,737 charged by private colleges nationally and 41 percent less than that charged by southern private four-year colleges.

Room and board charges at UNCF colleges increased by only one percent over the previous year--from \$2,533 to \$2,563. Compared to private colleges nationally, the charges for a typical UNCF student living on campus were 34 percent less; in relation to southern private colleges, UNCF colleges charged 23 percent less.

Books and supplies increased by 12.2 percent at UNCF institutions--from \$425 to \$477. This cost was approximately the same at all types of four-year colleges.

Overall, the average cost of attending a UNCF college rose by only \$302 over the previous year--a four percent increase. When compared to the national private college cost figure of \$13,094 and the \$11,110 figure at private southern four-year colleges, the average cost of \$7,310 at UNCF institutions was still considerably less than that charged by the majority of private four-year colleges in the U.S. By keeping their costs relatively low, UNCF colleges have given thousands of students the opportunity to attend a quality four-year private college.

## Institutional Finances

In 1988-89, both current fund revenues and current fund expenditures increased by nearly 14 percent over the previous year. Some 28 of the 41 member institutions reported that current fund revenues were larger than their expenditures; at 13 institutions, expenditures exceeded revenues. In 1988-89, the average amount of reported revenues was \$12,425,192; the average amount of reported expenditures \$12,225,186. See Appendix AA for each college's revenues and expenditures by category.

### Revenues

As shown in Table 12 below, the percentage distribution of the source of revenues for the UNCF member institutions has remained quite consistent during recent years. Three sources--tuition and fees, the federal government, and private gifts and grants--account for over three-quarters of all revenues received by UNCF institutions.

The percentage derived from tuition and fees, the largest single source of funds for most of the colleges, has fluctuated between 35 and 38 percent. (In 1988-89, it was 37 percent.)

Second in percentage contribution has been that of the federal government. A major part of the federal government's contributions are restricted for use in funding such student financial aid programs as Pell Grants, Perkins Loans, and College Work-Study. Also, the federal government has provided specific funding for various sponsored research programs. The federal government has contributed between 21 and 22 percent of the revenues of UNCF colleges since 1984.

Private gifts and grants accounted for 19 percent of the revenues in 1988-89. This source has fluctuated at between 16 and 20 percent since 1984.

Auxiliary enterprises accounted for 14 percent of the revenues in 1988-89. Most of these funds are derived from charges for room and board. The percentage derived from this source has fluctuated between 14 and 15 percent since 1984.

All other sources of revenue accounted for less than ten percent of the total revenues of UNCF institutions.

### Expenditures

In 1988-89, the cost of instruction continued as the largest expense category at UNCF institutions. Instruction, which includes faculty salaries and other instructional costs, accounted for 22 percent of all expenditures.

At 19 percent, institutional support was the next largest category of expense. Institutional support includes general administrative office expenses such as the registrar's office and the business affairs office.

From Table 13 note that although most of the categories of expense have remained fairly stable since 1984, the percentage expended by the colleges for student aid has expanded markedly. In 1984-85, the colleges spent only nine percent of their current funds on student aid, but during this past reporting year (1988-89), the colleges spent some 16 percent of their funds in this area.

Because of the growing importance of student aid in the colleges' budgets, Table 14 summarizes the key elements in one component of student aid--institutional scholarships--from 1982-83 through 1988-89. Note that the number of students receiving institutional scholarships has risen from 8,369 in 1982-83 to 10,481 in 1988-89, an increase of 25 percent. But in terms of dollars, the increase in institutional scholarship has increased some 75 percent over this six-year period. Clearly, the colleges themselves are having to commit more and more of their institutional funds to compensate for the continuing shortfall in other student aid categories.



## Endowment

As shown graphically in Figure 8, the size of the endowment funds at the member UNCF institutions has grown dramatically over the past seven years. During this period the market value of these funds has increased from \$147 million to over \$350, a rise of 139 percent. In the past year alone, the value increased by some 13 percent. Presently, three of UNCF institutions have endowments which exceed \$25 million while eleven have endowments which exceed \$10 million; only three UNCF colleges presently hold endowment funds of less than \$1 million. The average size of the endowment fund at a UNCF college was \$8,798,118 in 1988-89. (See Appendix DD.)

One of the prime causes for the growth of the endowment funds has been the federal government's Challenge Grant program. Under provisions of the Higher Education Act, the government provides grants for college endowments if the college will match the grant--usually on a three to one basis. Many UNCF colleges have taken advantage of this opportunity.

Endowments Compared with Other U.S. Private Colleges

Although the endowments of UNCF colleges have grown rapidly over the past several years, they are still far below the levels of other private U.S. colleges. Table 15 provides data for UNCF institutions as compared with all private U.S. colleges for the years 1983-84 through 1985-86. Note that in 1985-86, the latest year for which comparative data were available, the value of the endowment per student at all U.S. private colleges was \$19,918, while the figure at UNCF colleges was \$6,192. The value of the endowment per student at UNCF colleges in 1983-84 was only about 34 percent of that found at other U.S. private four-year colleges and had dropped to 31 percent in 1985-86.
