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ABSTRACT

A study was conducted of the entry-level basic skills performance of all credit students enrolled at Miami-Dade Community College (M-DCC) in fall 1989. The study examined demographic data and scores on the Comparative Guidance and Placement (CGP) Program Test, American College Testing (ACT) program exam, Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), Florida Multiple Assessment Programs and Services Test (FL-MAPS), and English Placement Test (EPT). Findings included the following: (1) of the 49,145 students enrolled in fall 1989, 42,970 (87%) had written at least one subtest of the SAT, ACT, FL-MAPS, or CGP; (2) of the 35,673 students who had written all three subtests of one these tests, 60% did not pass at least one subtest; (3) 5,892 (96%) of the 6,124 students who wrote the EPT failed it and were required to begin English-as-a-Second-Language courses; (4) 65% (N=27,156) of the entire cohort were required to enroll in courses below the college level; (5) of students who had written either the CGP, ACT, SAT, or FL-MAPS, 68% passed the reading subtest, 70% passed the writing subtest, and 59% passed the mathematics subtest; (6) on the reading and writing subtests, White non-Hispanics had the highest pass rates, followed by Hispanics and then Black non-Hispanics, while on the mathematics subtest, White non-Hispanics and Hispanics both had 60% pass rates and Blacks a 51% pass rate; and (7) the majority of students taking the EPT exam were Hispanic. 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Entry-Level Testing Results for All
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During Fall Term, 1989

Introduction

Miami-Dade Community College routinely reports the results of its basic skills assessment program. However, these reports typically examine the performance of a particular group of students. For example, reports have been produced which illustrate the performance of first-time-in-college students (Einspruch, R.R. No. 90-02R), students who recently graduated from high school (Belcher, R.R. No. 90-04R), and students who graduated in the upperpart of their high school class (Vorp, R.R. No. 89-24R).

This research report provides data on entry-level basic skills performance for all students enrolled during the Fall Term, 1989. It is well established that academically underprepared students have a difficult time succeeding in college (see for example various reports by Losak, Morris, and Belcher, annotated by Einspruch in Research Report No. 89-10R). Therefore, one might expect that most students who are currently enrolled are students who entered academically prepared. The present data will help the reader to gain perspective on the magnitude of Miami-Dade's continuing involvement with underprepared students.

Method

Demographic information for all Fall Term, 1989 credit students enrolled at M-DCC was obtained from the demographic research file (IRS40). Test scores for these students were obtained from the Test Master Record (TMR), and pass/fail determinations were made using cutscores specified in the current M-DCC Placement Criteria document. In keeping with the Placement Criteria, if the student wrote more than one entry-level test, the highest score on any given test was the one considered for that subtest. In other words, students could have passed reading based on one test and

writing based on another test. Tables were produced using the information obtained from these files.

Highlights

°Of the 49,145 students enrolled during the Fall Term, 1989, 42,970 (87%) had written at least one subtest of an entry-level test (either CGP, SAT, ACT, FL-MAPS, or EPT).

°A total of 35,673 students wrote all three subtests of an entry-level test (CGP, SAT, ACT, or FL-MAPS). The following analyses are based on this group. Of these 35,673, 21,264 (60%) did not pass at least one subtest, and were required to enroll in college preparatory coursework. An additional 5,892 students failed the EPT (96% of the 6,124 EPT writers) and were required to begin in English as a second language courses.

°In total, of the 41,797 students who had written a complete entry-level test, 27,156 (65%) were required to enroll in courses below the college level.

Results

Table 1 details the number of students who had written any entry-level test (CGP, ACT, SAT, FL-MAPS or EPT). College-wide, 42,970 (87%) of the 49,145 enrollees had written an entry-level test. This figure was closely paralleled on North, South, and Wolfson Campuses. However, only 72% of the students enrolled on Medical Center Campus had written an entry-level test.

There was a difference between the ethnic distributions of those who had and had not written an entry-level test. Of those who wrote an entry-level test, 23% were White non-Hispanic, 17% were Black non-Hispanic, and 58% were Hispanic. Of those who did not write an entry-level test, 46% were White non-Hispanic, 17% were Black non-Hispanic, and 35% were Hispanic. This pattern was seen on each of the campuses.

Table 2 shows the entry-level test performance in the areas of reading, writing, and mathematics. College-wide, of those students who had written either the CGP, ACT, SAT, or FL-MAPS, 68% passed the reading subtest, 70% passed the writing subtest, and 59% passed the mathematics subtest. On the reading and writing subtests, White non-Hispanics had the highest pass rates, followed by Hispanics and then Black non-Hispanics. These patterns were seen on all campuses, with the exception of Hispanics having a two percentage point higher pass rate on the mathematics subtest on South Campus, and a six percentage point higher pass rate on Medical Center Campus.

Table 3 illustrates the number and percentage passing zero, one, two or three subtests. It is clear from this table that of the 35,673 students who had written the CGP, SAT, ACT, or FL-MAPS, 21,264 (60%) were required to take at least one college preparatory course. On North Campus, 65% of the currently enrolled students began in need of college preparatory work, while the percentage was 53% on South Campus, 68% on Wolfson Campus, and 66% on Medical Center Campus. In addition, Table 4 illustrates student performance on the English Placement Test (EPT). As may be seen from this table, 96% of the 6,124 students who had written the EPT failed the exam. This resulted in 5,892 students who were required to begin their work in ESL (or ENS) courses. It is also clear that the majority of EPT writers were of Hispanic background, although on North and Medical Center Campuses about twenty percent of the test-takers were of Black non-Hispanic background (primarily of Haitian origin; see Vorp, R.R. No. 88-27).

Conclusion

Earlier research reports have described the entry-level test performance of particular groups of students at M-DCC, but they have not given readers an idea of the performance of the entire group of students attending the College. It is clear from the tables in this report that a large percentage of students who are currently enrolled tested into college preparatory course work at entry.
