ABSTRACT

Designed as a recruitment pamphlet and general information guide for prospective students, this booklet contains two comprehensive charts on the 240 programs offered, and the degrees and certificates available at each of the 49 campuses in the Illinois Community College system. The first chart indicates which campuses in the system offer Associate in Arts, Associate in Science, and General Associate degrees and/or certificates. The second chart provides information on degrees and certificates available for each program at each campus. Individual programs are listed under the following broad areas of study: (1) Agriculture & Natural Resources, comprised of 6 separate programs including conservation and horticulture; (2) Business Occupations, comprised of 24 programs including accounting, food marketing, and real estate; (3) Communications, comprised of 8 programs including advertising and journalism; (4) Construction Trades, comprised of 6 different programs; (5) Food Production and Management, consisting of 6 programs including baking and meat cutting; (6) Health, comprised of 26 programs including dental services and respiratory therapy; (7) Mechanics & Repairers, consisting of 10 programs including auto body repair and watch and clock repair; (8) Public, Personal & Social Services, consisting of 19 separate programs; (9) Technologies, comprised of 32 different programs including drafting, plastics, and robotics; and (10) Transportation, comprised of airplane pilot, aviation management, and truck driving programs. The pamphlet includes a directory of all public community colleges in Illinois, and a map of the state showing the location of each of the colleges. (GFW)

Community colleges have a goal: to provide everyone with the opportunity for educational development to the extent of his or her capabilities. Within their local districts, community colleges are continuously expanding their programs to meet this goal.

Locations close to home are available at the 40 community college districts that encompass the entire State of Illinois. Each district has one or more colleges that offer programs designed to be responsive to the unique needs of the community it serves. Community colleges offer programs at branches and many extension centers in addition to their main campuses — putting educational opportunity within easy driving distance of all Illinois citizens.



Lifelong learning needs of students from all backgrounds are met through the diverse opportunities afforded by community colleges. The students who attend community colleges are a diverse group. Some are traditional college students. Some are unemployed adults and displaced homemakers. Some are

single parents, senior citizens, and high school dropouts. Others are welfare recipients, workers in need of retraining, and business owners. They are each preparing for a new or a better career, for transfer to a four-year college, for enhancement of their job skills, or for the enrichment of their personal lives.

The Illinois community colleges are student-centered. They provide a multitude of support services to assist students in successfully meeting their professional goals. These services include educational and career counseling, tutoring, job placement, financial aid counseling, testing and assessment, and study skills assistance, to name a few.

Diverse, specialized programs are also available for students with unique needs,

such as programs for early school leavers, single parents, women in non-traditional training, dislocated workers, minorities, and many others.

With benefits such as personalized attention, small class size, reasonable costs, and a location close to home, the community college is the ideal place for all Illinois residents to realize their full potential:

- for students pursuing transfer or occupational degrees
- for adults seeking continuing education or employment retraining
- for employers seeking a skilled educated workforce
- for business and industry seeking customized job training and specialized services
- for all partners in education and economic development

CHOICE OF PROGRAMS

Community colleges offer a variety of programs ranging from short-term certificates that take only a few weeks to complete to associate degrees that take two years of full-time attendance to complete. Associate in Arts (AA) and Associate in Science (AS) degrees are designed for the first two years of baccalaureate education. Students who earn these degrees generally transfer to universities.

An Associate in Applied Science degree prepares students for employment in a specific field, as do specialized certificates. Students are able to select degree and certificate programs from among 240 occupational specialties in a variety of fields.

The general associate degrees enable the community colleges to customize the curriculum to the specific career needs of the student by using a combination of academic and technical courses.

In addition to degree and certificate programs, community colleges offer a wide variety of other educational opportunities: developmental and remedial instruction — including adult basic and adult secondary education; continuing education and personal enrichment; short-term vocational and technical training; and various public service programs.

The matrix on the following pages shows the programs offered at each college.

Many programs are available at your local community college at a very affordable in-district tuition rate.

If you are interested in a program not available at your local college, your local college will make arrangements for you to enroll into that specific program at in-district rates. Therefore, if you are interested in any of the programs offered by the community college system, contact your local community college. EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES WITH TRANSFER DEGREES

The Associate in Arts (AA) and the Associate in Science (AS) degrees comprise the first two years of study in a broad range of liberal arts-related and science-related fields of study leading to a baccalaureate degree. The credits earned for the AA and AS degrees transfer to both private and public colleges and universities.

The AA degree generally places emphasis on the social sciences, humanities, and professional fields within these academic areas. The AS degree usually emphasizes the sciences and mathematics that support technical fields of study, such as engineering, agriculture, business, and science-related fields.

EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR AN INDIVIDUALIZED DEGREE

The general associate degree is a two-year program designed for individuals wishing to broaden their education. With a college advisor, a student may select courses to design a program that meets individualized needs and goals. Different community colleges in Illinois use different titles for this degree: the Associate in General Education, Associate in General Studies, or Associate in Liberal Studies.




AGRICULTURE/NATURAL RESOURCES: As Illinois is a major agricultural state, the community colleges offer a variety of programs that prepare individuals to apply scientific knowledge and methods in agricultural production and services, horticulture, natural resource conservation, and park and recreation management.

BUSINESS: Business programs at Illinois community colleges run the full gamut of management, marketing and distribution, and office occupations and systems. Marketing and management programs not only provide students with a general background (for example the purchasing, selling, producing, promoting, financing, transporting, and marketing of goods and services), but also provide a focus in specific fields such as international business, hotel/motel, labor/management relations, personnel, real estate, small business, financial services, inventory control, travel and tourism, fashion merchandising, and insurance. Office occupations programs prepare individuals for employment in administrative support functions, such as accounting and bookkeeping, banking and finance, data processing and information processing, and office management.

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

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COMMUNICATIONS: Occupational programs are available in a number of communication fields, such as in radio/TV, advertising, journalism, public relations, commercial music, and theater technology.

CONSTRUCTION TRADES: Employment in construction trades remains strong in Illinois, and the technical training needed in carpentry, brickmasonry, electrical, and plumbing/pipefitting trades can be obtained at many community colleges. Apprenticeship training is available at some community colleges.

FOOD PRODUCTION AND MANAGEMENT: Ample employment opportunities exist in food production and management, ranging from entry-level positions as waiters/waitresses to management careers in restaurants. Illinois community college programs are offered in baking, chef/culinary arts, dietetics, meat cutting, waiter/waitressing, and restaurant management.

HEALTH: Health occupations continue to grow, increasing the already strong demand for trained individuals in a variety of health fields. Community college training can lead to certification as registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, or basic nurse assistants. Dozens of different programs also are available in various diagnostic, therapeutic, preventive, restorative, and rehabilitative health occupations that serve patients in health care facilities, the home, and the community. Employment possibilities range from entry-level positions, such as home health aides, to highly technical positions, such as in radiologic technology and magnetic resonance imaging.

For example, training is available in protective services such as criminal justice/corrections and fire protection; personal services such as cosmetology, barbering, home care, and interior decorating; and social services such as child development, library assisting, and legal assisting.




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
