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ABSTRACT

This volume provides comparative data for faculty salaries in public and private colleges, based on an annual survey of over 700 colleges and universities. Data cover the following disciplines: Physical Education; Physical Sciences; Physics; Political Science and Government; Psychology; Reading Education; Sociology; Special Education (General); Student Counseling and Personnel Services; and Visual and Performing Arts. Presented for each discipline is a summary of the overall average salary increase between the baseline year of 1986-87 and the year 1989-90, for both state and private institutions. Data from institutions participating in both years are compared with each other and with the consumer price index. Also included are average salaries by rank and the faculty mix percentage as well as comparisons with other disciplines. The participating institutions are listed. (JB)

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Foreword

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, DC, in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, NC, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, DC, and the other for the nation's private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data from each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines/major fields, 11 of which are included herein in alphabetical order. The disciplines/major fields were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985.

Each of the 11 disciplines/major fields herein presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in that discipline/major field from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's state (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in the 1989-90 study. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA's private study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in the 1989-90 study. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

In addition to listing the average salaries in the 11 individual disciplines/major fields for both the state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," and listing the faculty mix percentage (FAC MIX PCT) and the salary factor, comparisons are made in each of the 12 individual disciplines/major fields between the two state studies and the two private studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90) and with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living.

The list of all 36 selected academic disciplines/major fields studied is found in Appendix A of each discipline/major field included herein, and the list of all participating senior colleges and universities is found in Appendixes B (state) and C (private) of each discipline/major field included herein.

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including physical education. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of physical education in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the theories, methods, and techniques involved in teaching the subject matter of physical education.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 71.--13.1314.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of physical education from the "baseline year" of

1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This study lists the average salaries of physical education faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .26 for associate professor of physical education in the 1986-87 state study means that 26 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.99 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of physical education in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are approximately 1 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of physical education with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline 'year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physical education was reported in 179 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 2,178 faculty was \$30,091. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (0.92%) lower than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of physical education was reported in 181 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 2,174 faculty was \$35,251. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (0.92%) lower than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in physical education after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.1 percent (\$35,251 minus \$30,091 equals \$5,160). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 3.3 percent or an average of 1.1 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physical education (17.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.1 percent (17.2% minus 17.1% equals 0.1%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of physical education. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in physical education is very similar at the professor rank and the assistant professor rank in both the state studies: 0.23 vs. 0.32 (1986-87) and 0.23 vs. 0.34 (1989-90), respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of professors and a lower percentage of assistant professors compared to physical education in both of the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physical education is low in the state studies in both 1986-87: 2.4 percent (53/2,178) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS, and in 1989-90: 3.9 percent (84/2,174) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of physical education is less than for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both of the state studies.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physical education was reported in 174 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 913 faculty was \$26,563. This average salary was approximately 15 percent (0.85%) lower than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/ major field of physical education was reported in 163 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 876 faculty was \$31,413. This average salary was approximately 16 percent (0.84%) lower than the average salary of

\$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in physical education after three years in the private institutions studied was 18.3 percent (\$31,413 minus \$26,653 equals \$4,850). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.5 percent or 1.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physical education (18.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.8 percent (19.1% minus 18.3% equals 0.8%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of physical education. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

In the discipline/major field of physical education, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is less than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.15 vs. 0.33 (1986-87), and 0.17 vs. 0.32 (1989-90), respectively. This is quite different from ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of professors and a lower percentage of assistant professors compared to physical education in both private studies.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physical education in the private studies was less than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in 1986-87, 2.0 percent (18/913) vs. 5.2 percent (1,279/27,249), and in 1989-90, 3.2 percent (28/876) vs. 5.2 percent

(1,476/28,609), respectively. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of physical education lagged behind ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both the private studies.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of physical education and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 6,141 (3.8%) faculty in the discipline/major field of physical education participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of physical education is currently (1989-90) some 8 and 16 percent below the faculty salary factor of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for physical education in the private institutions was 13 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) still at 12 percent less in comparison to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in physical education, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The salary increase of the physical education faculty in both

the state and private institutions lagged behind faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Physical education faculty in both the state and private institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison to ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third, in the discipline/major field of physical education the assistant professor rank has a much greater percentage compared to the full professor rank for both the private studies. The full professor rank appears to be increasing at a similar rate in both the state and private institutions. It seems a slightly higher percentage of new assistant professors is being hired in the state institutions in comparison to the private institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in physical education, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN PHYSICAL SCIENCES

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including physical sciences. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of physical sciences in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that generally describes the major topics, concepts, processes, and interrelationships of nonliving matter and associated phenomena.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 129.--40.0101.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of physical sciences from the "baseline year" of

1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This study lists the average salaries of physical sciences faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increase is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .26 for associate professor of physical sciences in the 1986-87 state study means that 26 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-867, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.98 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of physical sciences in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 2 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of physical sciences with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physical sciences was reported in 52 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 438 faculty was \$33,306. This average salary was approximately 2 percent (1.02%) higher than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of physical sciences was reported in 52 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 352 faculty was \$38,408. This average salary was approximately 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the physical sciences after three years in the state institutions studied was 15.3 percent (\$38,408 minus \$33,306 equals \$5,102). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 1.5 percent or an average of 0.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physical sciences (15.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 1.9 percentage points (17.2% minus 15.3% equals 1.9%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of physical sciences. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in the physical sciences was higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both of the state studies: 0.44 vs. 0.24 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.46 vs. 0.24 (1989-90), respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to the physical sciences in both of the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physical sciences was greater than the hiring rate of new assistant professors in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study: 3.9 percent (17/438) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460), respectively. Also, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study was greater than the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physical sciences: 6.2 percent (22/352) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of physical sciences was greater than ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in the 1986-87 and 1989-90 state studies.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physical sciences was reported in 35 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 197 faculty was \$33,628. This average salary was approximately 7 percent (1.07%) higher than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 ,salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of physical sciences was reported in 31 of the same 265 private

institutions. The average salary of the 262 faculty was \$47,422. This average salary was approximately 27 percent (1.27%) higher than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the physical sciences after three years in the private institutions studied was 41.0 percent (\$47,422 minus \$33,628 equals \$13,794). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 27.2 percent or 9.1 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physical sciences (41.0%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 21.9 percent (41.0% minus 19.1% equals 21.9%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of physical sciences. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

In the "old" discipline/major field of physical sciences, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is more than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.47 vs. 0.26 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.55 vs. 0.22 (1989-90), respectively. This is very different from ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physical sciences in the private studies was less than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in 1986-87, 0.0 percent (0/197) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively; and in 1989-90, 4.2 percent (11/262) vs. 5.2

percent (1,476/28,609), respectively. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of physical sciences was lower than ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the private studies of 1986-87 and 1989-90, respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of physical sciences and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS fields over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,249 faculty in the discipline/major field of physical sciences participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of physical sciences is currently (1989-90) 1 and 27 percent above the faculty salary factor of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for physical sciences in the private institutions was approximately 2 percent more in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) 23 percent more in comparison to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty, in the physical sciences, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The salary increases of the physical sciences faculty in

the state institutions was slightly ahead of faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Conversely, in the private institutions the physical science faculty salaries were considerably ahead of faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. Physical sciences faculty in the state institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison with their colleagues in the private institutions.

Third, in the discipline/major field of physical sciences the full professor rank exceeded the assistant professor rank in both the state and private studies. The full professor rank appears to be increasing at the same rate in both the state and the private institutions. It seems a smaller percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in the private institutions in comparison to the state institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses studies will be effected in physical sciences, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN PHYSICS

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including physics. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of physics in the CIP is as follows:

A group of instructional programs that describe the physical properties and interactions of matter and energy, including equilibrium, power, wave phenomena, mechanics, heat, electricity, magnetism, sound, light, special relativity, and the particular nature of matter.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 131.--40.08.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of physics from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to

and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year." Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year."

In addition to listing the average salaries in physics for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," and listing the faculty mix percentage (FAC MIX PCT) and the salary factor, comparisons are made between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90) and using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living.

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .27 for associate professor of physics in the 1986-87 state study means that 27 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.00 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of physics in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are approximately the same as the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of physics with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physics was reported in 163 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1013 faculty was \$35,143. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (1.08%) higher than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of physics was reported in 166 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1,052 faculty was \$41,460. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (1.08%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in physics after three years in the state institutions studied was 18.0 percent (\$41,460 minus \$35,143 equals \$6,317). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.2 percent or an average of 1.4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physics (18.0%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.8 percentage points (18.0% minus 17.2% equals 0.8%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of physics. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

Since the discipline/major field of physics is one of the "older" disciplines, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the state studies; 0.50 vs. 0.19 (1986-87) respectively; and 0.49 vs. 0.21 (1989-90) respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies is as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90) respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to physics in both state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physics is low in the state studies: 3.6 percent (26/1013) in 1986-87 vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87. Also, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physics in 1989-90 was 3.5 percent (37/1,052) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS that same year. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of physics is equal with ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the state study of 1986-87 and less in the state study of 1989-90 in comparison to ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of physics was reported in 170 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 706 faculty was \$36,600. This average salary was approximately 17 percent (1.17%) higher than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of physics was reported in 177 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 746 faculty was \$43,212. This average salary was approximately 15 percent (1.15%) higher than the average salary of

\$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in physics after three years in the private institutions studied was 18.1 percent (\$43,212 minus \$36,600 equals \$6,612). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.3 percent or 1.4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of physics (18.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 1.0 percent (19.1% minus 18.1% equals 1.0%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of physics. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

Because the discipline/major field of physics is one of the "older" disciplines, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.47 vs. 0.21 (1986-87) respectively; and 0.47 vs. 0.23 (1989-90) respectively. This differs from ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87) respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90) respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors than physics in both private studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in physics lagged behind ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study, 3.4 percent (24/706) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249) respectively; and the 1989-90 private study, 4.7 percent (35/746) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of physics and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 3,517 (2.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field of physics participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of physics is currently (1988-89) some 8 and 15 percent above the overall average faculty salary of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for physics in the private institutions was approximately 4 percent more in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) approximately 4 percent more compared to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in physics, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. Physics average faculty salaries in the state institutions exceeded faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period, whereas the physics average faculty salaries in the private institutions lagged slightly behind faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third, since the discipline/major field of physics is one of the older disciplines, there is a marked difference between the number of faculty with the rank of full professor and assistant professor in the state and in the private institutions. The full professor rank is already "top heavy" in both the state and private institutions. It seems a similar percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in both types of institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in physics, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN POLITICAL SCIENCE AND GOVERNMENT

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including political science and government. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of political science and government in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes and analyzes political institutions and processes, including the origin, development, geographical units, forms, sources of authority, powers, purposes, functions, and operations of government.*

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in

the discipline/major of political science and government from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year." Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year."

This study lists the average salaries of political science and government faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professors," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are using with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary. The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that

reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .34 for associate professor of political science and government in the 1986-87 state study means that 34 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.94 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of political science and government in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 6 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of political science and government with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of political science and government was reported in 169 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1,157 faculty was \$33,222. This average salary was approximately 2 percent (1.02%) higher than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of political science and government was reported in 173 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1,217 faculty was \$38,689. This average salary was approximately 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in political science and government after three years in the state institutions studied was 16.5 percent (\$38,689 minus \$33,222 equals \$5,467). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 2.7 percent or an average of 0.9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major of political science and government (16.5), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.7 percentage points (17.2% minus 16.5% equals 0.7%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of political science and

government. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in political science is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both the state studies: 0.41 vs. 0.22 (1986-87) and 0.43 vs. 0.26 (1989-90). The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90). In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to political science and government in both of the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in political science and government lagged behind ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study, 2.4 percent (28/1,157) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460). However, the hiring rate exceeded ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study, 6.6 percent (80/1,217) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567). In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of political science and government was less than for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87, but greater in the current study.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of political science and government was reported in 183 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 689 faculty was \$31,674. This average salary was approximately 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of political science and government was reported in 180 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 712 faculty was \$37,807.

This average salary was approximately 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in political science and government after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.4 percent (\$37,807 minus \$31,674 equals \$6,133). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 5.6 percent or 1.9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of political science and government (19.4%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.3 percent (19.1% minus 19.4% equals -0.3%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of political science and government. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.4 percent or an average of 1.8 percent over the three year period.

In the discipline/major field of political science and government, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is more than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.34 vs. 0.30 (1986-87) and 0.36 vs. 0.31 (1989-90). In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to political science and government in both private studies.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in political science and government exceeded the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study, 5.8 percent (40/689) vs. 4.7 (1,279/27,249). In the 1989-90 private study the hiring rate of new assistant professors in political science and government exceeded the hiring rate in ALL

MAJOR FIELDS, 5.6 (40/712) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609). In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of political science and government 1986-87 and 1989-90 private studies exceeds the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of political science and government and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) and the other for private institutions were conducted for the "baseline year" and the "trend year"--a total of four studies. A total of 3,775 (2.3 %) faculty in the discipline/major field of political science and government participated and were included in the overall 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the "baseline year" and the "trend year".

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data can be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor of the discipline/major field of political science and government is currently (1989-1989) some 1 percent above the overall average faculty salary of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both the state and private studies. The average faculty salary for political science and government in the private institutions in both studies was approximately 1 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in political science and government, in both the

state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of political science and government the full professor rank has a greater percentage compared to the assistant professor rank for both the state and private studies. The full professor rank appears to be increasing at an equal rate in both the state institutions and the private institutions. It seems a higher percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in both types of institutions in 1989-90 in comparison to 1986-87.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in political science and government, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN PSYCHOLOGY

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including psychology. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of psychology in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the behavior and experience of people.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 134.--42.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of psychology from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to

and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year." Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year."

This study lists the average salaries of psychology faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professors," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus; by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .33 for associate professor of psychology in the 1986-87 state study means that 33 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.96 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of psychology in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 4 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of psychology with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of psychology was reported in 191 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 2,157 faculty was \$33,642. This average salary was approximately 3 percent (1.03%) higher than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of psychology was reported in 197 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 2,287 faculty was \$39,286. This average salary was approximately 3 percent (1.03%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 56,672 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in psychology after three years in the state institutions studied was 16.8 percent (\$39,286 minus \$33,642 equals \$5,644). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 3.0 percent or an average of 1.0 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of psychology (16.8%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.4 percentage points (17.2% minus 16.8% equals 0.4%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of psychology. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in psychology in the state studies is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank: 0.43 vs 0.22 (1986-87), respectively and 0.44 vs 0.22 (1989-90), respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to psychology in both of the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in psychology was higher in the state study of 1986-87 compared to ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 4.0 percent (87/2,157) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460), respectively. Also, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in psychology in the 1989-90 state study was higher in comparison to that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 5.7 percent (129/2,777) vs. 5.1 percent (2,865/55,672), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of psychology was reported in 236 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,154 faculty was \$30,933. This average salary was approximately 2 percent (0.98%) lower than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of psychology was reported in 237 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,173 faculty was \$36,411. This average salary was approximately 3 percent (0.97%) lower than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in psychology after three years in the private institutions studied was 17.7 percent (\$36,411 minus \$30,933 equals \$5,478). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 3.9 percent or 1.3 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of psychology (17.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 1.4 percent (19.1% minus 17.7% equals 1.4%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of psychology. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

In the discipline/major field of psychology, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is more than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.36 vs. 0.28 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.36 vs. 0.28 (1989-90), respectively. This is different from that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of assistant professors and a lower percentage of professors in both private studies.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in psychology in the 1986-87 private study was slightly higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS, 5.5 percent (63/1,154) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively. Also, in the 1989-90 private study, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in psychology was greater in comparison to ALL MAJOR FIELDS, 6.0 percent (70/1,173) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively. In other words the hiring rate of new assistant professors in the

discipline/major field of psychology exceeded the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both the 1986-87 and the 1989-90 private studies.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of psychology and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 6,761 (4.2 %) faculty in the discipline/major field of psychology participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of psychology is currently (1989-90) some 3 percent above and 3 percent below the faculty salary factor of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for psychology in the private institutions in 1986-87 was approximately 9 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) approximately 8 percent lower in comparison to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in psychology, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. Psychology faculty salary increases in both the state and private

institutions lagged behind that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Psychology faculty in the private institutions have some catching up to do in comparison to ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third, in the discipline/major field of psychology the full professor rank has a greater percentage compared to assistant professor ranks for both the state and private studies. The full professor rank appears to be increasing slightly in the state institutions, in comparison to the private institutions. It seems an equal percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in both types of institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in psychology, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN READING EDUCATION

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including reading education. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of reading education in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the theories, methods, and techniques of designing, implementing, and evaluating programs which prepare, upgrade, or retrain students in reading the language arts.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 71.--13.1315.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of reading education from the "baseline year" of

1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year". Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year".

This study lists the average salaries of reading education faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professors," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986--87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing period power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .31 for associate professor of reading education in the 1986-87 state study means that 31 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.94 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of reading education in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 4 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of reading education with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of reading education was reported in 34 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 146 faculty was \$31,671. This average salary was 3 percent lower (0.97%) than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of reading education was reported in 29 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 140 faculty was \$36,533. This average salary was about 4 percent lower (0.96%) than the average salary of \$36,562 for all 54,552 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in reading education after three years in the state institutions studied was 15.4 percent (\$36,533 minus \$31,671 equals \$4,862). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 1.6 percent or an average of 0.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of reading education (15.4%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 1.8 percentage points (17.2% minus 15.4% equals 1.8%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of reading education. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentages in reading education are much higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank for both of the state studies. The faculty mix percentages of professor and assistant professor are 0.43 and 0.21 (1986-87) respectively; and 0.36 and 0.26 (1989-90) respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are 0.34 and 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 and 0.29 (1989-90) respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of assistant professors and a lower percentage of professors compared to reading education in both the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in reading education was lower in the 1986-87 state study when compared to ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 2.7 percent (4/146) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,46), respectively. In the 1989-90 study, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in reading education was again slightly lower than that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 2.6 percent (5/140) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of reading education was reported in 16 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 41 faculty was \$34,141. This average salary was approximately 9 percent (1.09%) higher than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the major field of reading education was reported in 10 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 11 faculty was \$30,299. This average salary was approximately 19 percent (0.81%) lower than the average of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The decrease in average salaries for all faculty in reading education after three years in the private institutions studied was minus 11.3 percent (\$30,299 minus \$34,141 equals \$-3,842). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" decrease, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is -25.1 percent or 8.4 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of reading education (11.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 30.1 percent (19.1% plus 11.3% equals 30.4%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of reading education. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

The reader may note that in the field of reading education, the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the private study for 1986-87: 0.29 vs. 0.24 (1986-87), respectively. However, in 1989-90 the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank: 0.18 vs. 0.36, respectively. In contrast, the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank equals that at the assistant professor rank for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both private studies: 0.31 vs 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs 0.31 (1989-90), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in reading education in the private studies was greater than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87: 4.9 percent (2/41) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively; and in 1989-90 the hiring rate of new assistant professors in reading education in the private studies was much less than the

hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 0.0 percent (0/11) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of reading education and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year - a total of four studies. A total of 338 (.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field of reading education participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of reading education is currently (1989-90) 4 and 19 percent lower in the state and private institutions, respectively, than the overall faculty salary factor of ALL MAJOR FIELDS. The average faculty salary for reading education in the private institutions was higher, 8 percent, in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The faculty salary average in the state institutions is now (1989-90), 21 percent greater compared to that for the private institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in reading education received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The salary increases of reading education faculty in the state and private institutions lagged behind

those faculty salaries in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Reading education faculty in the private institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison with faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS and their colleagues in the state institutions.

Third, in the discipline/major field of reading education, the assistant professor rank has a much lower percentage of faculty compared to the full professor rank in the state institutions, however, in the private institutions the assistant professor rank has a much higher percentage compared to the full professor rank. The assistant professor rank appears to be increasing at the same rate in both the state and private institutions. It seems a smaller percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in the private institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in reading education, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN SOCIOLOGY

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 3645 selected academic disciplines including sociology. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of sociology in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes human society, social institutions, and social relationships, including the development, purposes, structures, and functions of human groups.*

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of sociology from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to

and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This study lists the average salaries of sociology faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-1984 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .35 for associate professor of sociology in the 1986-87 state study means that 35 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.95 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of sociology in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 5 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of sociology with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1985-86 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1985-86 AND 1988-89

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of sociology was reported in 171 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1,335 faculty was \$32,169. This average salary was 1 percent less (0.99%) than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1985-86 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of sociology was reported in 168 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 1,347 faculty was \$38,049. This average salary was approximately the same (1.00) as the average salary of \$38,049 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in sociology after three years in the state institutions studied was 18.3 percent (\$38,049 minus \$32,169 equals \$5,880). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.5 percent or an average of 1.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of sociology (18.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 1.1 percentage points (18.3% minus 17.2% equals 1.1%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of sociology. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in sociology in the 1986-87 state study is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank: 0.34 vs 0.28, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words the discipline/major field of sociology and ALL MAJOR FIELDS have a higher percentage of professors and a lower percentage of assistant professors.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in sociology was low in the 1986-87 state study: 4.5 percent (60/1,335) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. However, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in sociology in the 1989-90 state study was higher in comparison to that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 4.3 percent (58/1,347) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of sociology was reported in 210 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 756 faculty was \$29,201. This average salary was 7 percent (0.93%) lower than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1985-86 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of sociology was reported in 200 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 699 faculty was \$35,422. This average salary was 5 percent (0.95%) lower than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in sociology after three

years in the private institutions studied was 22.1 percent (\$35,422 minus \$29,021 equals \$6,401). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries in sociology over the three-year time period is 8.3 percent or 2.8 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison therefore, the faculty in the discipline/major field of sociology (22.1%), increased their salaries by 2 percent (22.1% minus 19.9% equals 2%) more than faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three-year period.

In the discipline/major field of sociology, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is less than at the assistant professor rank in the 1986-87 study: 0.27 vs. 0.32, respectively; and conversely, it is greater in 1989-90: 0.31 vs. 0.27 respectively. The faculty mix percentage is the same at the professor rank for ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in sociology in the private study was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS, 4.4 percent (33/756) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively. And, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in sociology in the 1989-90 private study was higher in comparison to that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 4.4 percent (31/699) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively. In other words, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in the discipline/major field of sociology lagged behind ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in the 1986-87 private study and

in the 1989-90 private study.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of sociology and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 4,137 (2.5%) faculty in the discipline/major field of sociology participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of sociology is currently (1989-90) equal to and 5 percent below the overall average faculty salary of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for sociology in the private institutions was 10 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The overall average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) approximately 7 percent lower in comparison to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in sociology, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. Sociology faculty salary increases in the state and private institutions exceeded faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Sociology faculty in the private institutions have some catching up to do in comparison

to their colleagues in state institutions.

Third, in the discipline/major field of sociology the assistant professor rank in 1989-90 has a lower percentage compared to full professor rank for the state and the private studies. The full professor rank appears to be increasing rapidly in both the state and private institutions. It seems a goodly percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in both the state and private institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in sociology, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN SPECIAL EDUCATION (GENERAL)

FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including special education. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of special education in the CIP is as follows:

A group of instructional programs that describe the theories, methods, and techniques of designing, implementing, and evaluating organized learning activities for students whose physical, emotional, mental, or social needs require a special curriculum and educational setting.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 68.--13.10.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in

the discipline/major field of special education from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year". Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year".

This study lists the average salaries of special education faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage), and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between 1986-87 and 1989-90.

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .32 for associate professor of special education in the 1986-87 state study means that 32 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.96 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of special education in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 4 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of special education with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90

will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of special education was reported in 84 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 605 faculty was \$31,979. This average salary was approximately 2 percent (0.98%) lower than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of special education was reported in 84 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 585 faculty was \$38,554. This average salary was 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in special education after three years in the state institutions studied was 20.5 percent (\$38,554 minus \$31,979 equals \$6,575). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 6.7 percent or an average of 2.2 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of special education (20.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.3 percentage points (20.5% minus 17.2% equals 3.3%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of special education. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentages in special education are higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both state studies. The faculty mix percentage of professor and assistant professor are 0.35 and 0.26 (1986-87) respectively; and 0.37 and 0.25 (1989-90) respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are 0.34 and 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 and 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of full and a higher percentage of assistant professors when compared to special education in both the 1986-87 and 1989-90 state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in special education in the 1986-87 state study was lower than that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 3.1 percent (19/605) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460), respectively. In 1989-90, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in special education was also lower than that of ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 4.1 percent (24/585) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of special education was reported in 40 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 83 faculty was \$27,487. This average salary was approximately 12 percent (0.88%) lower than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the major field of special education was reported in 35 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 84 faculty was \$32,506. This average salary was approximately 13 percent (0.87%) lower than the average of \$37,422 for all 28,609

faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in special education after three years in the private institutions studied was 18.3 percent (\$32,506 minus \$27,487 equals \$5,019). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.5 percent or 1.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of special education (18.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.8 percent (18.3% minus 19.1% equals -0.8%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of special education. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three year period.

The reader may note that in the field of special education, the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.20 vs. 0.27 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.21 vs. 0.38 (1989-90), respectively. These proportions differ from the FAC MIX PCT at the same ranks for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both private studies where they are almost uniform: 0.31 vs 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs 0.31 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of professors and lower percentage of assistant professors compared to special education in both private studies.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in special education in the 1986-87 private study was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 3.6 percent (3/83) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively. In 1989-90, the hiring rate was higher at the assistant

rank than for ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 7.1 percent (6/84) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,698), respectively. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/ major field of special education was lower than that for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87, and the hiring rate was higher for the discipline/major field of special education in 1989-90.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/ major field of special education and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,357 faculty in the discipline/major field of special education participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of special education is currently (1989-90) some 1 and 13 percent higher in the state and private institutions, respectively, than the overall average faculty salary of ALL MAJOR FIELDS. The average faculty salary for special education in the private institutions was considerably lower (16%) in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989 '0), approximately 9 percent less compared to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in special education, in both the state and private

institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The salary increase of special education faculty in the state study exceeded faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period but was less for the private institutions. Special education faculty in the private institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison with their colleagues in the state institutions.

Third, in 1989-90 the discipline/major field of special education has a lower percentage at the assistant professor rank compared to the full professor rank in the state but it is just the opposite in the private institutions. The professor rank appears to be increasing more rapidly in the state institutions. It seems a larger percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in the private institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in special education, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN SPEECH/LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY AND AUDIOLOGY
FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including speech/language pathology and audiology. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the nature and treatment of hearing and speech disorders, including the principles and techniques of providing therapy that restores or partially restores normal functioning.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p.96.--18.01)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This study lists the average salaries of faculty in speech/language pathology and audiology for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professors," the faculty mix percentage (FAC MIX PCT), and the salary factor. In addition comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation.. Therefore, the CPI was used to yield a more precise representation of "real" salary increases over time.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees were full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .32 for associate professor of speech/language pathology and audiology in the 1986-87 state study means that 32 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.96 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 4 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90

will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology was reported in 63 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 412 faculty was \$32,177. This average salary was 1 percent lower (0.99%) than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology was reported in 64 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 404 faculty was \$37,250. This average salary was 3 percent lower (0.97%) than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology after three years in the state institutions studied was 15.8 percent (\$37,250 minus \$32,177 equals \$5,073). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 2.0 percent or an average of 0.66 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology (15.8%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries 1.4 percentage points. In "real" or infla-

tion-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in speech/language pathology and audiology is slightly lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1986-87 state study, (0.29 vs 0.33), and is equal (0.30 vs 0.30) in the 1989-90 state study. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies is as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in speech/language pathology and audiology in the state study was less than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS: 2.7 percent (11/412) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/ 51,460), but in 1989-90: it was slightly higher, 5.3 percent (21/404) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology was reported in 18 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 72 faculty was \$29,080. This average salary was 7 percent lower (0.93%) than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology was reported in 16 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 64 faculty was \$34,019. This average salary was about 9 percent (0.91%) lower than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in speech/language pathology and audiology after three years in the private institutions studied was 17 percent (\$34,019 minus \$20,080 equals \$4,939). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 3.2 percent or 1.1 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of speech/-language pathology and audiology (17%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries slightly more than the faculty in speech/-language pathology and audiology. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three-year period.

In the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is dramatically lower than at the assistant professor rank in the 1986-87 private study: 0.15 vs. 0.35 , and is lower than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 private study: 0.14 vs. 0.36. This is quite different from ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS had a higher percentage of professors and a lower percentage of assistant professors in both the 1986-87 and the 1989-90 private studies when compared to audiology and speech pathology.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in audiology and speech pathology in the private studies was less than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in 1986-87, 4.2 percent (3/72) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/ 27,249) respectively; and in 1989-90, 4.7 percent (3/64) vs.

5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of audiology and speech pathology is less than ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both the private studies of 1986-87 and 1989-90.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of speech pathology and audiology and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 952 (.6%) faculty in the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of speech pathology and audiology is currently (1989-90) some 3 percent below the overall average faculty salaries of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the state study, and is 9 percent below ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the private study. The average faculty salary for speech pathology and audiology in the state institutions was 10.6 percent more than that in the private institutions in 1986-87. The overall salary average in the private institutions is now (1989-90), 9.5 percent below that of the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in speech pathology and audiology, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years

above the cost-of-living. Speech/language pathology and audiology faculty salaries in both the state and private institutions received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. Speech/language pathology and audiology faculty in both the state and private institutions lagged behind faculty salaries in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Speech/language pathology and audiology faculty in both the state and private institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison to their colleagues in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third. in the discipline/major field of speech/language pathology and audiology the assistant professor rank have a much greater percentage in the two state studies (1986-87 and 1989-90) or is equal to the full professor rank in ALL MAJOR FIELDS> However, in the two private studies (1986-87 and 1989-90), the assistant professor rank is far greater than the professor rank.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in audiology and speech pathology, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN STUDENT COUNSELING AND PERSONNEL SERVICES
FOR THE YEARS

1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including student counseling and personnel services. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the theories, methods, functions, operations, and services involved in the personal, social, educational, and vocational development of students and the principles and techniques of managing, directing, and developing an organized unit providing student services within an educational institution.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, DC.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 70.--13.1101.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services from the "baseline year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA's STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year". Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the "baseline year" and the "trend year".

This study lists the average salaries of student counseling and personnel services faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage), and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary. The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .25 for associate professor of student counseling and personnel services in the 1986-87 state study means that 25 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 0.92 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services in the 1986-87 state study means that their salaries are 8 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample

sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services was reported in 61 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 385 faculty was \$34,040. This average salary was approximately 4 percent (1.04%) higher than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services was reported in 58 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 447 faculty was \$40,413. This average salary was approximately 6 percent (1.06%) higher than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in student counseling and personnel services after three years in the state institutions studies was 18.7 percent (\$40,413 minus \$34,040 equals \$6,373). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 4.9 percent or an average of 1.6 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent (\$38,213 minus \$32,611 equals \$5,602). In comparison to the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services (18.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR

FIELDS decreased their salaries by 1.5 percentage points (17.2% minus 18.7% equals -1.5%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in student counseling and personnel services is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both the state studies: 0.49 vs. 0.23 (1986-87) and 0.45 vs. 0.23 (1989-90), respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to student counseling and personnel services in both of the state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in the state studies in student counseling and personnel services was higher than ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87, 4.7 percent (18/385) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460), respectively, and higher also in 1989-90, 6.0 percent (27/447) vs. 5.2 percent (2,865/55,567), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services was reported in 13 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 44 faculty was \$31,745. This average salary was approximately 1 percent (1.01%) higher than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services was reported in 11 of

the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 64 faculty was \$39,461. This average salary was approximately 5 percent (1.05%) higher than the average salary of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in student counseling and personnel services after three years in the private institutions studied was 24.3 percent (\$39,461 minus \$31,745 equals \$7,716). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 10.5 percent or 3.5 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services (24.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 5.2 percent (24.3% minus 19.1% equals 5.2%) less than faculty in student counseling and personnel services. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three-year period.

In the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage at the professor rank is more than at the assistant professor rank in the private studies: 0.41 vs. 0.26 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.39 vs. 0.21 (1989-90), respectively. This is dissimilar to ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively. ALL MAJOR FIELDS has lower percentage of professors and a higher percentage of assistant professors compared to student counseling and personnel services in both private studies.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in student counseling and personnel services in the private studies was less than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1986-87, 0 percent (0/44) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively; and higher in 1989-90, 7.8 percent (5/64) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 940 (.58%) faculty in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services is currently (1989-90) some 6 percentage points below and 5 percent above the overall faculty salary factor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies, respectively. The average faculty salary for student counseling and personnel services in the private institutions was over 7 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87. The average faculty salary in the private institutions is now (1989-90) approximately 2 percent less in comparison to that for the state institutions.

Second, the CPI of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in student counseling and personnel services, in both the state and private institutions, received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The "real" salaries of student counseling and personnel services faculty salary in both the state and private institutions was also ahead of faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third, in the discipline/major field of student counseling and personnel services the full professor rank has a greater percentage compared to the assistant professor rank for both the state and private studies. It appears that a higher percentage of new assistant professors is being hired in private institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in student counseling and personnel services, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS
FOR THE YEARS
1986-87 AND 1989-90

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1989-90. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for state senior colleges and universities which are members of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) in Washington, D.C., and the other for private senior colleges and universities. The list of private institutions is provided by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 36 selected academic disciplines including visual and performing arts. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by the Higher Education General Information Study (HEGIS) Taxonomy and by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1985. The definition of the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the creation and perception of auditory, kinesthetic, and visual phenomena which express ideas and emotions in various forms, subject to aesthetic criteria.*

[*Gerald S. Malitz, A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1985], p. 157.--50.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts from the "baseline

year" of 1986-87 to and including the "trend year" of 1989-90 for both state and private institutions. Of the 262 institutions which participated in CUPA'S STATE (AASCU) study of 1986-87, 210 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 210 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 478 institutions which participated in CUPA'S PRIVATE study of 1986-87, 265 also participated in 1989-90. Data from those same 265 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This study lists the average salaries of visual and performing arts faculty for both state and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage), and the salary factor. In addition, comparisons are made using the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two study years (1986-87 and 1989-90).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of the "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. Full-time faculty members are those who teach no less than 51 percent of the time. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is computed from all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .38 for associate professor of visual and performing arts in the 1986-87 state study means that 38 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: STATE 1986-87, STATE 1989-90, PRIVATE 1986-87 and PRIVATE 1989-90. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .91 for assistant professors in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts in the 1985-86 state study means that their salaries are 9 percent lower than the average of all assistant professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1986-87 or 1989-90). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 36 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1986-87 and the "trend year" of 1989-90 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make

RESULTS OF THE TWO STATE (AASCU) STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the STATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts was reported in 69 of the 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 743 faculty was \$29,931. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (0.92%) lower than the average salary of \$32,611 for all 51,460 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 state study.

In the STATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts was reported in 78 of the same 210 state (AASCU) institutions. The average salary of the 782 faculty was \$35,039. This average salary was approximately 8 percent (0.92%) lower than the average salary of \$38,213 for all 55,567 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 state study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the visual and performing arts after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.1 percent ($\$35,039$ minus $\$29,931$ equals $\$5,108$). The CPI reported an increase in the cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 of 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 3.3 percent or an average of 1.1 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the state institutions studied was 17.2 percent ($\$38,213$ minus $\$32,611$ equals $\$5,602$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts (17.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.1 percentage points (17.2% minus 17.1% equals

0.1%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts. In "real" or inflation-adjusted terms, faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries over the period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent per year.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in visual and performing arts was lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both the state studies: 0.26 vs. 0.30 (1986-87) and 0.28 vs. 0.33 (1989-90), respectively. The differences in the faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both state studies are as follows: 0.34 vs. 0.28 (1986-87) and 0.34 vs. 0.29 (1989-90), respectively. In other words ALL MAJOR FIELDS has a higher percentage of professors, but a lower percentage of assistant professors compared to visual and performing arts in both state studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in visual and performing arts was slightly higher in the 1986-87 study: 4 percent (30/743) vs. 3.6 percent (1,869/51,460) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. However, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in visual and performing arts in 1989-90 was 4 percent (31/782) vs. 5.2 percent (2,805/55,567) in ALL MAJOR FIELDS that same year. In other words the hiring rate in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts was more than that for ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 study but less in the 1989-90 state study.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1986-87 AND 1989-90

In the PRIVATE 1986-87 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts was reported in 58 of the 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 365 faculty was

\$28,660. This average salary was approximately 9 percent (0.91%) lower than the average salary of \$31,411 for all 27,249 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1986-87 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the field of visual and performing arts was reported in 65 of the same 265 private institutions. The average salary of the 500 faculty was \$34,716. This average salary was approximately 7 percent (0.93%) lower than the average of \$37,422 for all 28,609 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the visual and performing arts after three years in the private institutions studied was 21.1 percent (\$34,716 minus \$28,660 equals \$6,056). The increased cost-of-living between October 1986 and October 1989 was 13.8 percent. The "real" increase, therefore, in average faculty salaries over the three-year time period is 7.3 percent or 2.4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.1 percent (\$37,422 minus \$31,411 equals \$6,011). In comparison to the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts (21.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 2 percent (21.1% minus 19.1% equals .2%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts. The inflation-adjusted increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 5.3 percent or an average of 1.8 percent per year over the three-year period.

The reader may note that in the field of visual and performing arts, the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both the private studies: 0.27 vs. 0.35 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.27 vs. 0.35 (1989-90), respectively. This is quite different from the FAC MIX PCT for the professor and assistant professor ranks in ALL MAJOR

FIELDS: 0.31 vs. 0.31 (1986-87), respectively; and 0.32 vs. 0.31 (1989-90), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in the visual and performing arts in the private studies lagged behind the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS both in 1986-87, 4.1 percent (15/365) vs. 4.7 percent (1,279/27,249), respectively; and in 1989-90, 4.8 percent (24/500) vs. 5.2 percent (1,476/28,609), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of visual and performing arts and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS over a period of three years: the "baseline year" of 1986-87 through the "trend year" of 1989-90. Two studies, one for state (AASCU) institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 2,390 (1.5%) faculty in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts participated and were included in the overall total of 162,885 faculty in all 36 disciplines/major fields in all four studies. The same 210 state (AASCU) institutions and the same 265 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the faculty salary factor in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts is currently (1989-90) some 8 and 7 percent below the overall average faculty salary of ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both the state and private studies. The average faculty salary for visual and performing arts in the private institutions was approximately 4 percent less in comparison to that in the state institutions in 1986-87 and

less than 1 percent in 1989-90.

Second, the CII of October 1989, in comparison to the CPI of October 1986, indicates that the faculty in visual and performing arts in both the state and private institutions received overall salary increases for three years above the cost-of-living. The "real" salaries of visual and performing arts faculty in both the state and private institutions were equal to or lagged behind those in ALL MAJOR FIELDS during this same period. Visual and performing arts faculty in both the state and private institutions have some catching up to do in salary in comparison with faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Third, in the discipline/major field of visual and performing arts for 1989-90, the assistant professor rank has a higher percentage of faculty compared to full professor rank in both the state and private institutions. The full professor rank appears to be increasing in the state institutions, whereas in the private institutions the percentage remains the same. It seems a larger percentage of new assistant professors are being hired in the private institutions in comparison to the state institutions.

Now that a rather significant data base on individual faculty member salaries has been developed, it is anticipated that additional salary-trend analyses will be effected in visual and performing arts, and in other disciplines/major fields, on an annual basis.
