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ABSTRACT

This volume contains 11 appendices to a user's manual that provides guidance and documentation for users of the public release data for the student component of the National Education Longitudinal Study of 1988 (NELS:88). The general aim of the NELS, a continuing long-term project, is to study the educational, vocational, and personal development of students at various grades and the factors that influence that development. The student component files contain data from the base year and the first follow-up. The appendices in this volume, appendices M through W, present student questionnaires used in the NELS:88 and some lists of critical items for the study in its base year and first follow-up. 



An Explanation of Nonresponse on the Language Items

Because they are the dependent items to the third and final filter in the language series, items F1S60A-E and F1S61A-D are the most affected by the inefficiency of the initial filter. By the time one reaches the final filter, F1S58, the number of respondents who qualify to answer the remaining items in the language series drops to 269 (from a previous 4105) while the number of missing responses, approximately 460, stays the same.

It is this ratio of qualified respondents to questionable missings (i.e., some missings are genuine and others are genuine legitimate skips) that create the inordinately large nonresponse rates on the final language items. Nonresponding has not increased; the number of individuals who qualified to answer items F1S60A-E and F1S61A-D, but did not, has not increased, solely the ratio of qualified respondents to missings has increased.

The effect of carrying missing data forward to successive filters is perhaps best understood through the following illustration of nonresponse.¹

F1S58

$$\text{NR} = \frac{487}{4105} = \frac{487 \text{ (missing)}}{269 \text{ (yes)} + 3349 \text{ (no; skip the remaining language items)} + 487 \text{ (missing)}} = 11.9 \% \text{ (unweighted)}$$

¹ Nonresponse is defined as:

$$\text{Nonresponse} = \frac{\# \text{ of completed interviews for which question was intended to be asked, but question was not answered}}{\# \text{ of completed interviews for which question was intended to be asked}}$$

The numerator is the number of illegitimate nonresponses. Illegitimate nonresponses are multiple responses to an item requiring only a single response, refusals, and missings. It does not include the legitimately missing response of legitimate skip.

$$\text{NR} = \frac{474}{756} = \frac{474 \text{ (missing)}}{282 \text{ (answering)} + 474 \text{ (missing)}} = 62.6 \% \text{ (unweighted)}$$

The effect of carrying missing responses forward to other filter items can be tempered, and a more genuine rate of nonresponse calculated (or the extent of probable nonresponse), if one assumes that some proportion of the missing responses qualify to skip the dependent items of the filter. For example, 93 percent (unweighted) of the sample members who responded to question F1S58 answered no, and therefore, qualify to skip the remaining language items. If one applied this same percentage of "NO" responses to the remaining language items, nonresponse would look like this:

If the 487 missing cases above are cleaned on the aggregate, that is, 93 percent are skipped through the remaining language items, only 34 of the 487 cases should filter through to the dependent items ($487 \times .07 = 34$). Thus, 303 respondents qualify to answer the remaining questions (34 missing + 269 "Yes" responses to F1S58).
