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

Dear Mr. President:

It is my privilege to present to you the 1991 annual report of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

This past year marked the twentieth anniversary of the Jefferson Lecture in the Humanities. Over the years, this annual event has given the nation a forum to acknowledge the work of such distinguished thinkers as Lionel Trilling, Robert Penn Warren, and Barbara Tuchman. In the 1991 lecture, historian Gertrude Himmelfarb was honored. In her lecture, she eloquently reminded us of the value of heroes and of the danger of trivializing great deeds.

The state humanities councils also celebrated their twentieth anniversary in 1991. Each year, these councils reach millions of citizens through programs as diverse as the nation itself. In 1991 state councils enabled people in the Midwest to learn more about the history of the Ohio River, in the Southeast to explore the culture of sixteenth-century native Americans, and in the West to document the Lewis and Clark expedition. Thanks to the state councils, Americans engaged in the study of topics ranging from the Bill of Rights to Shakespeare, from the arrival of Europeans on the North American continent to contemporary developments in the former Soviet Union.

Education in all its facets remains a concern of the Endowment. In 1991 NEH issued *National Tests: What Other Countries Expect Their Students to Know*. By offering sample humanities questions from examinations given to students in France, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, and the European Community, this report demonstrated the high standards that other nations are setting for their students.

As the agency entrusted to make knowledge of the humanities accessible to all citizens, the National Endowment for the Humanities shares the goal of achieving competency that lies at the heart of America 2000, your plan for our schools and our society. We hope that this past year's grants and programs have been of help in setting a standard for educational excellence.

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Twenty Years of the Jefferson Lecture

1991 marked the twentieth anniversary of the Jefferson Lecture in the Humanities. The honor, which is the highest the federal government bestows in the humanities, went to Gertrude Himmelfarb, a historian of the Victorian period and author of eight books.

Mindful of the occasion, Himmelfarb took a moment to reflect on the first of the lectures, given by critic and philosopher Lionel Trilling. "Trilling," she recalled, "said that he thought



of himself as 'a nineteenth-century person' because he still believed in the efficacy of the will at a time when few other intellectuals did.

"It is fitting for me today, on the twentieth anniversary of the Jefferson lectureship to recall those words from the first of the Jefferson lecturers—all the more fitting because they provide a text for my own theme. For without will and freedom, there can be no virtue and vice. And

without virtue and vice, there can be no heroes and villains. There can only be valets—valets who recognize no heroes whether of good or of evil, indeed who recognize no greatness of any kind: no momentous events in history, no superior works of art, literature, or philosophy, no essential distinction between the trivial and the important."

Himmelfarb cautioned against the current fashion of attacking "elitist" figures and "elitist" themes in history. "It is, in fact, at the heart of the debate about 'great books,'" she told the audience in the Departmental Auditorium. "The argument is no longer about the specific composition of the canon, the inclusion of this or that book, but about the very idea of greatness, a greatness that traditionally has been thought to transcend race, gender, and class—and genre, too—so that it was once taken for granted that Shakespeare is more worthy

of study than Superman, that high culture is higher, more elevating than popular culture, and that some events in history are more momentous than others."

Himmelfarb was born in 1922 in New York. She earned her bachelor of arts degree from Brooklyn College and her master's and doctorate in history from the University of Chicago. Himmelfarb taught for twenty-three years at Brooklyn College and the Graduate School of the City University of New York, where she was named Distinguished Professor of History in 1978. She is now professor emeritus.

Her first published work, *Lord Acton: A Study in Conscience and Politics*, appeared in 1952. Since then there have been seven more, exploring different facets of the Victorian period: *Darwin and the Darwinian Revolution*; *Victorian Minds: Essays on Nineteenth Century Intellectuals*; *On Liberty and Liberalism: The Case of John Stuart Mill*; *The Idea of Poverty: England in the Industrial Age*; *Marriage and Morals among the Victorians*; and most recently, *Poverty and Compassion: The Moral Imagination of the Late Victorians*.

Himmelfarb is a fellow of the British Academy and the Royal Historical Society, and a member of the American Philosophical Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. She also serves on the board of the Woodrow Wilson International Center and the councils of the

Library of Congress and the American Enterprise Institute.

She was chosen for the lectureship by the National Council on the Humanities, the presidentially appointed advisory body of the Endowment. The award, which carries a \$10,000 stipend, honors the intellectual and civic accomplishments exemplified by Thomas Jefferson, the third President of the United States.

Over the years a distinguished array of philosophers, historians, and other scholars have used the Jefferson Lecture as a forum for exploring humanities themes. From Trilling on "Mind and the Modern World" in 1972 to Himmelfarb on "Of Heroes, Villains, and Valets" in 1991, the lectures have presented some of the notable thinkers of our time.



"Mind and the Modern World"

"Jefferson's estimate of the intellectual capability of the whole people is part of the fabric of American history. A great scholar of our past has traced in detail the long unhappy course of anti-intellectualism in American life, but Richard Hofstadter also made it plain to us, through his studies of higher education in the United States, how strong in our culture is the opposite tendency, to conceive of intellect as a cherished element of democracy. Of this tendency Jefferson is the presiding spirit." —Lionel Trilling, 1972



"Dimensions of a New Identity"

"Just because of this once-in-history chance for self-made newness, this country has experienced greater expansiveness and yet also deeper anguish than have other countries, and few nations have seen their ideals and their youth divided, as has this country in the recurring divisions of a national identity. Was the happiness guaranteed in the Declaration that of wealth and of technological power or that of an all-human identity such as resides primarily in the free person? Is there any other country which continues to ask itself not only 'What will we produce and sell next?' but ever-again 'Who are we anyway?' which may well explain this country's hospitality to such concepts as the identity crisis which, for better or worse, now seem almost native to it." —Erik Erikson, 1973



"Democracy and Poetry"

"If the poet is disorganized, then out of disorder may emerge the organized object—the image of the 'ideal self,' the 'regenerate self,' as it were of the disorganized man. The disorganization of the poet may seem, on the record, merely personal, but more often than not what he produces embodies issues and conflict that are central to the circumambient society, so that it finds mysterious echoes in the selves of those who are drawn to the object created; that is, the object created provides a vital feedback into the social process." —Robert Penn Warren, 1974



"Liberty of Expression: The Search for Standards"

"Five hundred years after Caxton, generation by generation, struggle by struggle, we in America—writers and speakers, politicians and artists—have achieved, at least for a historical moment, a degree of freedom from official control that would, I daresay, amply gratify Milton, Locke, Mill, and Thomas Jefferson. Meanwhile a different set of problems has emerged, centering on the adequacy and responsibility of the media of communication themselves, problems of new entry into the field and access to the existing media." —Paul Freund, 1975

"Racial Equality in America"

"The position of the colonists on African slavery was rendered extraordinarily difficult by the fact that human bondage was, as David B. Davis has observed, 'an intrinsic part of American development from the first discoveries.' Blacks had cleared the forests, felled the trees, drained the swamps, removed the boulders, and planted and harvested the crops. 'To live in Virginia without slaves is morally impossible,' an Anglican priest serving in the tidewater wrote his brother in London in 1757. Patrick Henry, who preferred death for himself if he could not have liberty, spoke almost casually of the 'general inconvenience' of living in Virginia without slaves."

From the Deputy Chairman

"What keeps the humanities going," said Charles Frankel, "is that people really want to know does man have free will; that people really respond to Hamlet's predicament and to his eloquence; that people really would like to get some sense of how the past held together and why it fell apart." Speaking on the occasion of the first national meeting of state councils, Charles Frankel, for whom the NEH Charles Frankel Prize has been named, pointed out the primacy and permanency of humanities. It's true. Because thinking about people's lives, ideas, and events is a basic human impulse, the programs supported by state humanities councils have been tapping into a deep wellspring. And so, in 1991, on this twentieth anniversary of state humanities councils, no one is surprised by their extraordinary success. Vast numbers of people from across the country as well as Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and Guam have participated in thought-provoking, soul-stirring programs.

One of these in 1991 was "Always a River." This project on the history and significance of the Ohio River valley reached tens of thousands in the six states bordering the river by means of a barge converted to accommodate an exhibition. The barge made twenty-one stops along its 981-mile journey. Connected to the project were a variety of programs, including costumed recreations of life in early Indiana, a history conference in Louisville, reading and discussion programs in six Ohio communities, a documentary film, river songs and stories, and dramatic depictions of historical West Virginians.

By engaging the people where they live, state humanities programs for the past twenty years have provided focus for intellectual curiosity and authenticity to discussions in every corner of the nation.

The Division of Public Programs, in contrast to the state humanities councils, strives to support projects that will be accessible to the nation as a whole. One such program was the public television fall feature, *Columbus and the Age of Discovery*. Giving the context of the late fifteenth century—its politics, its religions, its technology—this seven-hour program portrayed the Atlantic adventure and its consequences for more than thirty million viewers.

Lifelong learning through film and by way of public programs in museums and libraries has been a continuing priority for the Endowment, but humanities education in a structured setting has become increasingly important as part of the national education goals. President Bush and the nation's governors have identified history as one of the five subjects in which American schoolchildren are to demonstrate increased competency by the year 2000. The National Center for History in the Schools, a cooperative research program between the University of California at Los Angeles and the Endowment, is designed to facilitate rigorous study of history in kindergarten through twelfth grade. In the four years it has been in operation, the history center has gathered scholars and teachers together to discuss what would be essential for American schoolchildren's understanding of history.

The idea of national standards has been on

many people's minds as they struggle to improve our education system. NEH Chairman Lynne V. Cheney released a report in the spring which made available five secondary school exit examinations. *National Tests. What Other Countries Expect Their Students to Know* revealed the range and depth of knowledge that students in France, England and Wales, Germany, Japan, and the schools of the European Community are expected to master.

The rich content that NEH public programs and education programs boast is supported by scholarship and scholarly resources. In many ways the Endowment's Division of Fellowships and Seminars, Division of Research, and Office of Preservation make possible the substance of all of the NEH programs. For example, the NEH National Heritage Preservation Program—its first two cycles completed this year—has enabled stabilization of approximately fifteen million ethnographic, archaeological, and historical objects important for education and research. By funding such projects as a new translation of Dostoevski's *The Brothers Karamazov*, a volume of *The Hittite Dictionary*, and volumes in the editions of the papers of George Washington and John C. Calhoun, the Endowment lays the foundation for future scholarly study and education. By awarding fellowships for independent research, NEH has served to bring to the American public more than 1,500 volumes of scholarly books—many of which have won prestigious prizes, such as the Pulitzer, National Book Award, Bancroft, and special awards from professional associations in the humanities.

The Office of Challenge Grants provides long-term support for efforts that have proved themselves over the years. As a capstone award for institutions and organizations that are undertaking long-range planning, a challenge grant can assure perpetuity of excellence in programs. Indeed, philanthropic organizations and individual donors have increased their support for Endowment projects. In 1991 NEH released more than \$18 million in matching funds, a 15 percent increase over last year and a greater amount than any previous year in the history of the agency.

The humanities will keep on going because the people of the United States value them, and the Endowment budget continues to rise, indicating, certainly, wide support for humanities programs.

How the Endowment Works

In order "to develop and promote a broadly conceived national policy of support for the humanities," the National Endowment for the Humanities was established by Congress in 1965 as an independent grant-making agency of the federal government. The Endowment supports scholarly research, education, and public programs in the humanities. Under the act that established the Endowment, the term *humanities* includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following disciplines: history; philosophy; languages; linguistics; literature; archaeology; jurisprudence; the history, theory, and criticism of the arts; ethics; comparative religion; and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches.

Programs. This report lists federal funds obligated for grants made in fiscal year 1991 through the Endowment's five divisions—Education Programs, Fellowships and Seminars, Public Programs, Research Programs, and State Programs—and two offices—the Office of Challenge Grants and the Office of Preservation. Grant listings are preceded by a brief introduction describing the nature and purposes of the programs administered by each division. The grants themselves are listed in alphabetical order under each grant-making program. Except for the Travel to Collections program, grants for less than \$1,000 are not listed.


Public Information. Information about Endowment programs and activities can be

found in a variety of publications produced by the Office of Publications and Public Affairs. The Endowment's bimonthly magazine *Humanities* features articles by nationally known scholars and writers on current humanities topics, a listing of recent grants by discipline, a calendar of grant application deadlines, a guide section for those who are thinking of applying for an NEH grant, and essays about noteworthy NEH-supported projects.

Matching Funds. To stimulate private support for the humanities, the Endowment uses federal funds to match funds donated from private sources. To date, NEH matching grants have helped generate almost \$1.2 billion in gift funds—more than \$899 million of which has been generated through the Challenge Grants program. Matching under the Challenge Grants program is required in a ratio of three to one for first-time awards or four to one for second-time awards. Matching under other programs is on a one-for-one basis.

In addition to federal matching funds, the Endowment stimulates private-sector support of specific projects by requiring grantees in most programs to commit their own funds for a portion of the costs of a project. In many cases, this amounts to 50 percent of total project costs.

Grants. Except in the case of challenge grants and most grants made by the Division of State Programs awards made by NEH are for specific projects in the humanities. To apply, an

individual or organization submits a proposal for a project to one of the Endowment's funding categories. A final decision can normally be expected about six months after the application deadline.


Each application is assessed by knowledgeable persons outside the Endowment who are asked for their judgments about the quality of the proposed project. About 1,200 scholars and professionals in the humanities serve on approximately 225 panels throughout the course of a year. The judgment of panelists is often supplemented by individual reviews solicited from specialists who have extensive knowledge of the specific subject area dealt with in the application.

A list of those panelists who generously gave of their time to serve on panels during fiscal year 1991 appears on pages 163-189 of this report.

The advice of the panels and outside

reviewers is assembled by the staff of the Endowment, who may comment on matters of fact or on significant issues that would otherwise be missing from the evaluation. These materials are then presented to the National Council on the Humanities, a board of twenty-six citizens nominated by the President of the United States and confirmed by the Senate. The National Council meets four times each year to advise the Chairman of the Endowment. The Chairman, who is appointed for a four-year term by the President with the consent of the Senate, takes into account the advice provided by this review process and, by law, makes the final decision about funding.

After reviewing 8,132 applications in fiscal year 1991, the council recommended a total of 1,776 awards. A list of council members may be found on page 193 of this report.



National Tests

On May 19, 1991, the Endowment published *National Tests: What Other Countries Expect Their Students to Know*, a report written by Chairman Lynne V. Cheney. *National Tests* contains examples of humanities-related questions from achievement tests given to secondary school students in France, Germany, England and Wales, Japan, and the European Community schools. Cheney says that national tests in other industrialized countries set high standards for academic achievement, while the United States has no equivalent examination.

"One of the most important points implicit in the tests...is the degree to which other nations have identified the humanities as a source of strength," Cheney states in the introduction to *National Tests*. "The high expectations they have are manifest in the demanding questions they ask, not only about their own history and culture, but those of other societies."

In Germany, for example, students are asked to describe the role and significance of Robespierre in the French Revolution. Japanese students must be able to identify European thinkers such as Euclid, Ptolemy, Bacon, Newton, and Locke. British students are asked to write an essay arguing whether Woodrow Wilson was "unbelievably naive" or "a dogged man of principle."

On the other hand, the major U.S. examinations for college entrance, the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and the American College Testing Program (ACT), measure aptitude rather than achievement.

Cheney says these American tests deliberately avoid assessing factual knowledge. "While

Japanese students are selecting the sentence that correctly explains why the United States sought open trade with Japan, and while French students are writing essays describing European resistance to the Nazis during World War II, American students taking the SAT are answering questions such as the following:

Select the lettered pair that best expresses a relationship similar to that expressed in the original pair:

YAWN: BOREDOM; (A) dream: sleep; (B) anger: madness; (C) smile: amusement; (D) face: expression; (E) impatience: rebellion."

Thus, Cheney concludes, "Our most common, high-stakes examinations are divorced from the classroom study of subjects like history. They do little to advance the notion that hard work in school matters."

Unlike aptitude tests, achievement tests convey the idea that mastery of school subjects is important and make students accountable for what they have learned, Cheney says. Further, a national system of achievement tests would make it possible to compare one school's performance with that of other schools across the country.

The report also responds to some of the most frequently asked questions about the tests administered in other countries and their application to the United States.

Would national achievement tests mean more multiple-choice testing?

Most of the exams presented in *National Tests* assess mastery by requiring students to write, Cheney observes. The tests used in the schools of

the European Community also require oral examinations. Others, such as the German *Abitur*, require students to give demonstrations in subjects such as music and science.

"Most advocates of national examinations for the United States stress the need for this kind of 'performance testing,'" Cheney says. "They argue that students should demonstrate whether they can organize their thoughts, make analyses and mount arguments; students should be tested to see whether they can use the facts they have learned."

Examinations that assess performance are more difficult to grade than multiple-choice tests, but the experience of other countries proves that examiners, with proper preparation and monitoring, can grade performance against a single standard.

Do national tests mean a national curriculum?

Although some countries with national examinations, such as France and Japan, have rigorously defined national curricula, other countries do not. Great Britain has had a system of national exams in place for years, but it is only now developing a national curriculum related to the tests. In Germany, each individual state develops its own curriculum for its *Abitur* examination.

The experience of other countries shows that "even when curriculum and assessment are under local authority, a national examination system is possible," Cheney states. "A national system of achievement testing need not entail a national curriculum. Indeed, it need not entail a single examination for everyone."

Would national examinations promote equity?

"The major difference between most of the examinations presented [in *National Tests*] and the achievement tests being proposed for the United States is that the American plans are aimed at *all* students, not just those in certain schools or classes who aspire to college," Cheney says. The high standards demanded by achievement tests and the incentives they provide should be part of every student's education. Cheney cites examples of how

achievement testing in inner-city schools has dramatically improved student performance.

Cheney notes that "Many educators in the United States are coming to believe that it is a mistake to limit achievement testing to a small group. A system that now benefits a few of our students should be put to work for all."

The report focuses on tests in the humanities because these subjects are the primary focus of the Endowment and because the humanities are sometimes overlooked. "Almost everyone immediately understands the value of mathematics and science in a competitive world," Cheney says, "but the importance of the humanities is not always so obvious. We need to be reminded from time to time that a democracy is stronger when its citizens know its history.... A society is also stronger, we need to remind ourselves, when its people understand histories and cultures different from their own."



The Charles Frankel Prize

In 1991, the National Endowment for the Humanities again awarded the Charles Frankel Prize to five Americans for their work in bringing the humanities to a larger public audience. The recipients were philanthropist Winton Blount, filmmaker Ken Burns, educator Louise Cowan, musician and radio host Karl Haas, and historian John Kuo Wei Tchen.

The awards, each of which carries a stipend of \$5,000, commemorate the late Charles Frankel (1917-79), professor of philosophy at Columbia University, assistant secretary of state for educational and cultural affairs, and first president and director of the National Humanities Center. His life and work exemplify the effective integration of humanities scholarship and citizenship. This was the third year the Frankel Prize had been awarded.

Winton Blount, chairman of Blount, Inc., an international construction firm headquartered in Montgomery, Alabama, is a business leader who is also an enthusiastic supporter of humanities programs in Alabama and nationwide. Since building the \$21.5 million Carolyn Blount Theatre for the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, Blount has served as director of the festival and has developed programs that bring Shakespeare to schoolchildren and adults across the state. He also is on the board of directors of the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C., and the Court of Governors of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre in England. Blount is a past member of the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities, and is a current member of the Alabama Foundation for Educational Excellence.

Filmmaker Ken Burns has won critical and

popular acclaim for his compelling documentary series, *The Civil War*, which was seen by more than 38 million viewers when it was first broadcast on PBS in the fall of 1990. Burns's fascination with American history is revealed in his documentary films, including *Brooklyn Bridge*, which was nominated for an Academy Award; *The Life and Times of Huey Long*; *Shakers: Hands to Work, Hearts to God*; *The Statue of Liberty*, which was nominated for both an Academy Award and an Emmy; *Thomas Hart Benton*; and *The Congress*. In 1990 he coproduced *Lindbergh*, a film biography that was part of PBS's "American Experience" series. Burns is currently working on a documentary about baseball and another about the golden age of radio.

Louise Cowan is a university professor and administrator, scholar, and civic leader who has demonstrated that the humanities can play a vital role in modern urban life. In 1980, Cowan cofounded the Dallas Institute of Humanities and Culture, which has three main areas of concentration: an academy for teachers, a center for the city, and studies in cultural psychology. Cowan is director of education of the institute. During her forty years as a teacher of English and classics and as an administrator at the University of Dallas, Cowan helped to establish the humanities curricula at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. She also inaugurated the Center for Civic Leadership on the campus. An active scholar and lecturer, she has written numerous articles, essays, and several books.

Karl Haas is a concert pianist and conductor who has shared his extensive knowledge and

love of classical music with millions of listeners through his daily radio program, "Adventures in Good Music," which is carried by more than 150 American radio stations, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, and Mexico City's classical radio station. The program has also been broadcast worldwide by the 400 stations of the American Armed Forces Network. For thirty-two years, the program has combined Haas's informal commentary on musical and cultural topics with relevant selections from the classical repertoire, emphasizing the interrelationship between the arts and the humanities. The program is intended for the general listener rather than the musical sophisticate—Haas often structures a show around such themes as the meaning of the term "symphony" or the relationship between music and other arts or literature of the same period. Haas is also the author of *Inside Music*, a reference work now in its sixth printing.

Historian John Kuo Wei Tchen has advanced Americans' understanding of immigrant history and their country's cultural richness through museum exhibitions, lectures, media productions,

and books. As associate director of the Asian-American Resource Center at Queens College (CUNY) and cofounder of the Chinatown History Museum, he has interpreted the 160-year history of New York's Chinese community for both students and the general public. Under his leadership, the Chinatown History Museum has been nationally recognized as a model of innovative community history programming and education. Tchen is the author of many essays and articles. His 1984 book, *Gentle's Photographs of San Francisco's Old Chinatown*, won an American Book Award. Tchen is a past chairman of the New York State Humanities Council and is on the Advisory Council of the Smithsonian Institution.

"These five distinguished individuals have enriched our national life by sharing their understanding and appreciation of history, music, and literature with their fellow citizens," said Chairman Lynne V. Cheney in announcing the prizes. "Each of them exemplifies the commitment to learning and to public service that characterized the work of Charles Frankel."

Division of Education Programs

In 1991 the Division of Education Programs made the first awards in its projected five-year Special Opportunity in Foreign Language Education. Aimed at strengthening language instruction in the nation's schools and undergraduate programs, the Special Opportunity especially encourages proposals for projects in critical, widely used languages—such as Russian, Japanese, Chinese, and Arabic—that are not commonly taught in this country. The Ohio State University, for example, received support for a three-year effort to train fifty secondary school teachers in the Arabic language and culture. Foreign language institutes for school teachers supported under this opportunity give special attention to using authentic texts from the foreign culture in even the initial levels of language instruction. For instance, Macon College received a grant to prepare thirty Georgia teachers to offer instruction in Spanish and French to elementary school children, making use of actual children's literature in those languages.

The division offers assistance to schools, colleges, and universities seeking to improve the content and coherence of humanities education at all levels. By awarding support for a limited number of outstanding projects, the division not only recognizes efforts that are worthy in themselves, but also furnishes examples of excellence that can be emulated throughout the country.

The Elementary and Secondary Education in the Humanities program made a major commitment in 1991 that complements the Special Opportunity in Foreign Language Education. It

awarded a three-year grant to Connecticut College to support a national program of summer fellowships for foreign language teachers. These fellowships enable elementary and secondary school teachers to study the language they teach in a country where that language is actually used.

Most projects supported by the Elementary and Secondary Education program fall into three categories. Summer Institutes provide teachers with an opportunity for intensive study and collegial exchange. Collaborative Projects promote lasting educational partnerships between schools in a given area and nearby institutions of higher learning. In an ongoing collaborative project between the University of Houston and three area school districts, for example, 240 English teachers will participate over a three-year period in seminars comparing major classic and contemporary works of literature. Among the pairs of books to be compared are Hawthorne's *Scarlet Letter* and Douglass's *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass*, and Kingston's *The Woman Warrior* and Faulkner's *The Unvanquished*. Finally, Masterwork Study grants enable small groups of teachers to study with local scholars throughout the school year. As one example, twelve teachers from the Lovett School in Atlanta received support for a masterwork study of Czech culture, in which they will read works by authors from John Huss to Kafka and Havel.

The Higher Education in the Humanities program supports a wide variety of faculty study and curriculum development projects on national, regional, and institutional levels.

Summer institutes enable faculty drawn from colleges and universities to study a broad range of significant humanities topics under the guidance of leading scholars. For example, anticipating the 2500th anniversary of Athenian democracy, twenty-five college and university faculty members will participate in a six-week institute at the University of California at Santa Cruz. They will consider new evidence and synthetic approaches to understanding the institutions and ideals, as well as the social and cultural setting of this fundamental creation of Western civilization. The Higher Education program also supports projects specific to a particular college or university, for instance, projects to establish or improve a core curriculum program in which undergraduates study, in ordered sequence, materials central to a liberal education. At Eckerd College in Florida, faculty members are undertaking a two-year study of the cultural heritage of Asia and its connection to the West so as to incorporate these perspectives into the college's general education program. Finally, the program supports conferences, consortia, and mentorship programs that address national or regional issues. By means of a 1991 award, the Association of American Colleges will sponsor a national conference and institutional mentoring network to bring together colleges

and universities that wish to upgrade the humanities content of their teacher preparation programs with institutions that have already devised successful approaches to doing so.

The NEH/Reader's Digest Teacher-Scholar program expresses the division's conviction that students benefit most when their teachers are vigorously engaged with the material they teach. This year was the third in which the Endowment awarded yearlong sabbaticals to elementary and secondary school teachers to support full-time independent study in humanities disciplines. The teacher-scholars for 1991 were selected from among applicants in their state or jurisdiction on the basis of a detailed study plan and a record of outstanding humanities teaching. The awards may include an honorarium for a mentor, should the recipient elect to work with an expert in the field of his or her study. In California, for example, the teacher-scholar, who teaches at the Heman C. Stark Youth Training School, will be undertaking a study of "Visible Men: The Artistry of Langston Hughes, Ralph Ellison, and August Wilson." Mr. Wilson will serve as a mentor to the project.



Division of Fellowships and Seminars

James Madison wrote, "Knowledge will forever govern ignorance and a people who mean to be their own governors must arm themselves with the power knowledge gives." Supported by the programs of the Division of Fellowships and Seminars, American scholars and teachers are making a vital contribution to this civic good.

Fellowship awards enable college and university teachers and independent scholars to undertake projects that promise important contributions to knowledge. Since 1979, professors and scholars have received more than 3,000 fellowships to support up to one full year of research. Similarly, more than 3,000 summer stipend awards have supported two months of full-time research and study for scholars and teachers throughout the country.

In 1991, for example, a professor of music at Brooklyn College was awarded a Fellowship for University Teachers to complete a book on new music in New York in the 1920s that will chronicle an exceptional period, when young musicians such as Aaron Copland, Richard Crawford, and Virgil Thomson formed concert societies and established publishing houses and periodicals, thus devising an imaginative and self-sufficient environment that proved crucial in American musical history.

One of the 1991 Summer Stipends went to a scholar at Purdue University to study the changing role of women in Indiana in the past 100 years, as the economy of that state increasingly moved from agriculture to industry.

Previous fellowship awards have resulted in prize-winning publications. For example, Laurel Thatcher Ulrich's book, *A Midwife's Tale: The Life*

of Martha Ballard, Based on Her Diary, 1785-1812, received the prestigious Pulitzer Prize in history and the 1991 American Historical Association's Bancroft Prize. Elizabeth Cohen's *Making a New Deal: Industrial Workers in Chicago, 1919-1939* was also the recipient of a 1991 Bancroft Prize.

Through the Faculty Graduate Study program, faculty at historically black colleges and universities have the opportunity to complete their graduate studies in order to deepen their knowledge of the subjects they teach, and thus better serve their students. For example, a scholar at Morehouse College was awarded a fellowship in 1991 to write a dissertation on contemporary Yoruba art in Ile-Ife.

The Travel to Collections program enables scholars to travel to libraries, museums, historical societies, and other research collections to consult materials essential for their scholarly work. Since 1984, more than 3,000 awards have been made. In 1991, for example, a historian at the University of Arizona consulted the records of seven rural merchant firms at the University of South Carolina library for a study that will make a major contribution to our understanding of slave family economy in the American South in the 1800s.

Younger Scholar awards provide support to high school and college students for a summer of disciplined and intensive research in the humanities. A 1991 award enabled a North Carolina high school student to study the writings of the sixteenth-century Franciscan Bartolomé de las Casas on the basic human rights of the Indian peoples of the Americas. Since 1983, more than 1,000 awards have been

made to younger scholars, many resulting in prizes and publications for the recipients.

In 1991, the Study Grants for College and University Teachers program was initiated to allow college faculty who are heavily involved in teaching to undertake intensive study that will deepen the intellectual understanding they bring to their students. The response to this program has been heartening, with 850 applications received at the initial deadline. The first awards will be made in fiscal year 1992.

Summer Seminars for College Teachers and Summer Seminars for School Teachers provide opportunities for twelve college teachers or fifteen school teachers in each seminar to undertake intensive study of important humanities topics or significant texts. Since 1973, nearly 17,600 college faculty have participated in these seminars. In 1991, a distinguished scholar of African-American literature directed a seminar at the University of Kansas, "The Slave Narrative Tradition in African-American Literature." The seminar brought together twelve teachers, six from historically black institutions, to study the development and significance of the African-American slave narrative.

Since 1983, the Summer Seminars for School Teachers have provided intellectual renewal to more than 6,600 seminar participants from every state. In the summer of 1991, the program's traditional emphasis on classical texts continued with a five-week seminar on "Virgil's *Aeneid* in Its Augustan Context," directed by an eminent scholar of classics at the University of Pennsylvania. Fifteen school teachers from twelve different states joined the seminar director in a close examination not only of the epic's literary background, but also of its political and cultural contexts.

By providing scholars and teachers with, in Madison's words, "the means of knowledge and time to deliberate," the programs of the Division of Fellowships and Seminars encourage lively and vigorous scholarship and learning that can provide the American people fresh access to the values on which humanistic knowledge is based and on which a working democracy depends.

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
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



The Bill of Rights was presented to Congress in Federal Hall, New York City, on March 1, 1789. The New England Foundation for the Humanities received a 1991 grant from Humanities Projects in Libraries and Archives to support reading and discussion programs about the Bill of Rights and the 11th Amendment.

Division of Public Programs

Public discourse about the humanities is important to the vitality of a democratic society and its scholarly community. As the distinguished philosopher Charles Frankel noted, "Humanistic scholarship grows—in the end it develops confidence, freshness, original ideas—when it is fed not by its own professional concerns alone but by the doings of human beings outside the study. Those doings are the humanities' primary material. And when humanistic scholars have been persuaded that they really are part of the larger community, they have also made the largest contributions to their own disciplines. Plato, Machiavelli, Erasmus, John Locke, Diderot, James Madison, and Ralph Waldo Emerson are not remembered for being intellectual recluses." The Division of Public Programs, through the projects it supports, seeks to engage scholars and citizens in a critical dialogue about our history, literature, philosophy, and culture. This is accomplished through interpretive museum exhibitions, radio and television programs, reading and discussion groups, symposia, lectures, and conferences.

Through Humanities Projects in Media, the division awarded grants to plan television and radio programs on such notable figures as Dwight D. Eisenhower, Duke Ellington, George Marshall, James Baldwin, and Edgar Allan Poe. During the past year, for example, millions of Americans viewed a four-hour miniseries examining the political career of Lyndon Baines Johnson. Millions more watched the critically acclaimed series, *Columbus and the Age of Discovery*, which examined the turmoil and excitement of Europe

in the fifteenth century, the accomplishments of Christopher Columbus, and the global implications of the encounter. And with videocassettes in schools and libraries, even more will benefit across the nation.

During 1991, Humanities Projects in Museums and Historical Organizations supported a variety of permanent and traveling exhibitions, using cultural and historical artifacts to interpret the humanities. The program supported national traveling exhibitions such as "Amenhotep III and His World," "African Reflections: Art from Northwestern Zaire," "Before Freedom Came: African American Life in the Antebellum South," and "1492: Two Worlds of Science." Like the film programs, these were supplemented by educational materials. American history was central to the program's activities, bringing such exhibitions as "Material Life of the American Revolutionary Soldier," "The Archaeology and History of Martin's Hundred," "Early English Colonial Settlements," "Proving Up: The History of South Dakota," "Another Mexico: Spanish Life on the Upper Rio Grande," and "Issei Pioneers: Japanese Immigration to Hawai'i and the Mainland."

Humanities Projects in Libraries and Archives supported scholar-led reading and discussion programs in more than forty states. The Utah Library Association, for example, planned and implemented a multistate project focusing upon native American literature and the mythology of the American West. Citizens in cities and rural areas in the states of Utah, Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, and New Mexico discussed and analyzed these topics with scholars.

Through Public Humanities Projects, the division recognized innovative public programs outside other divisional categories. The program supported, for example, "The American Renaissance: Summer Scholars in Residence." Traveling to five states and twenty communities on the Great Plains from Oklahoma to North Dakota, humanities scholars appeared as Nathaniel Hawthorne, Henry David Thoreau, Louisa May Alcott, Frederick Douglass, Walt Whitman, Margaret Fuller, and Herman Melville. The programs offered adults

and children the opportunity to talk about the great texts these figures wrote and to examine the values and ideas that this literature has made a permanent part of American life: our identity as a people and a culture, belief in self-reliance, the moral enthusiasm for reform, the danger of materialism, and the value of books and learning.

Division of Research Programs

"No man alone is wise enough."

Thus did Plautus (*Miles Gloriosus*, ca. 205 B.C.) express what may be considered the motto of the Division of Research Programs. As traditional boundaries among disciplines continue to blend, and as our knowledge base expands at an ever increasing rate, the division supports collaborative efforts by scholars, brings together different fields of research in the humanities, marshals the source materials needed for scholarship, and offers the fruits of this work to scholars and public alike.

Collaborative Projects bring two or more scholars together for up to three years on projects of broad significance in the humanities. Archaeology projects, for example, may assemble the expertise of a score of specialists to unearth and unravel the material culture of the past. The Humanities, Science, and Technology program perhaps expresses most explicitly the division's encouragement of interdisciplinary work, where the perspectives of the humanities help to illuminate subjects in science, technology, and medicine.

The Conferences program provides an open forum for the active exchange of ideas among scholars working on related topics. In a similar vein, fellowships made possible by the Centers for Advanced Study program promote collegial exchange at research centers both in this country and abroad. No scholar can work without access to essential resources and source material. The Tools program facilitates scholarly research through grants for reference works that codify information essential to study in the humanities. The Access program

increases the availability of research collections to humanities scholars.

Research in the humanities, no matter how well conceived or conducted, is effective only if it reaches an audience. The Editions program addresses this essential need by assisting in the production of authoritative editions of significant materials in the humanities, in the Translations program the humanities contributions of other cultures are made available to the English-reading public; and, through the Publication Subvention program, funds are awarded for the publication of superior scholarly books in all fields of the humanities.

While operating as discrete entities within the division, these programs ultimately reflect an interconnected flow of thought and information that advances knowledge in the humanities. This unity of effort is reflected clearly in the grants awarded by the division in 1991. For example, no fewer than twenty-one grants in medieval studies were awarded, with nearly every program supporting at least one project. Among these are grants for an edition of an important theological commentary by Saint Thomas Aquinas; an edition and translation of three treatises by the 11th-century music theorist Guido d'Arezzo; the *Middle English Dictionary*; an integrated study of Hagia Sophia, using supercomputers to analyze the tectonics of its design; a conference on "City and Spectacle in Medieval Europe"; and the publication of *Grammatica and Textual Culture. Literary Theory in the Middle Ages*.

This year the Division also recognized important scholarly work in both eastern

Europe and China through seventeen separate grants on subjects as diverse as an "Archaeological Investigation of Early Shang Civilization" and "Forming the Communist State in China: the Culminating Steps"; for support of the microfilming of Jewish archival records in Lithuania; for the translation of the Ukrainian poetry of Pavlo Tychna; for annotated translations of classical Chinese Tao texts; and for a study of the "Restructuring of the Soviet Past: The Politics of History under Gorbachev."

As the quincentenary of Columbus's voyage to the New World draws near, it is appropriate

that American scholars have turned their attention to the formative stages and continuing evolution of this country. This interest is reflected in more than twenty grants that explore the colorful spectrum of the American heritage: from support of archaeological investigations of an Acadian-Indian settlement in Maine and of an Apalachee village in Florida, to the publication of an analytical lexicon of Navajo and a definitive edition of the journals of the Lewis and Clark expedition; from a translation of a collection of songs of the Lakota Indians and a study of Africans in Spanish and early Louisiana to the completion of a lexicon that will illustrate the development of Spanish-American vocabulary from the sixteenth century to the present and a catalogue raisonné of sixteenth- and seventeenth-century domestic, agricultural, and commercial buildings in Maryland and Virginia.

Among many excellent classical studies supported by the division are *The Birth of Comedy*, an annotated translation of the most important fragments of ancient Greek comedy, a conference on "Democracy Ancient and Modern," which will consider the nature, origin, and meaning of democratic politics through an examination of classical Athenian democracy, and publication of an aerial atlas of ancient Crete in which stunning high-resolution photographs reveal hitherto unknown facts, forcing scholars to rethink their notions about Minoan and Greek civilization.

Advanced scholarly research increases our understanding of the humanities. The projects supported by the division in 1991 will expand the knowledge on which public, educational, and interpretive programs can be based.



Division of State Programs

1991 marked the twentieth anniversary of the NEH Division of State Programs. In two pioneering decades since the formation of the first six state humanities councils in 1971, state councils throughout the nation have worked in concert with scholars and citizens to make opportunities for learning in the humanities available to citizens everywhere. Programs supported by the councils—for adults of all ages, for school-age students, teachers, and for workers at the work-place—reach those who live in the inner city as well as those in the country's smallest towns and most remote areas.

Nationally the state councils are a key to an innovative and powerful new structure for lifelong learning, described by NEH Chairman Lynne V. Cheney as the "parallel school." Operating within a framework based on American traditions of volunteerism and local decision-making, state councils continue to record impressive achievements on behalf of public education and lifelong learning.

With annual funding from the Division of State Programs, state councils support on a competitive basis locally initiated humanities programs for the people of their state. In addition, the councils craft and conduct humanities programs themselves in order to ensure that fine humanities programs reach all regions of their states. To encourage outstanding project ideas, in 1991 the NEH again provided funding for special State and Regional Exemplary Awards. One such award made to state councils in North and South Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas has led to the revival and transformation of the traditional American

chautauqua. By providing direct access to historical personages through dramatic recreations, as well as to scholars' interpretations of the period, the new chautauqua promotes active dialogue between scholars and general audiences on issues which, though historical in their origins, continue to resonate today. For example, in 1991 small town audiences in Oregon and California attended "The Heirs of Columbus" chautauqua, which introduced them to the complex outcomes of the arrival of Europeans on the North American continent.

Increasingly, state councils have collaborated on joint projects in order to examine issues or themes that transcend state boundaries. State councils in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming worked together to produce "Trails through Time," a traveling exhibition that focused on exploration, settlement, and commerce in the West. Councils in Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia supported a major exhibition that journeyed more than 981 miles to towns and cities along the Ohio River on a refurbished barge. The "Always a River" project treated the Ohio River comprehensively, as a key factor and common thread in the human settlement and interaction of an important region of the United States.

State councils have taken advantage of national anniversaries to reexamine the current import of the intellectual and social heritage of the past. In 1991 the Idaho council mounted the "Two Constitutions" exemplary award project to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the United States Constitution. By comparing

Idaho's constitution and the federal one, Idahoans were given an opportunity to learn about their own past within a larger context. In Pennsylvania, the state humanities council supported the exhibition "To Preserve These Rights," commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Bill of Rights. Teachers' guides and newspaper supplements integral to the project have circulated throughout the country, strengthening both adults' and students' understanding of our common history.

State councils have led the way since the

early 1980s in providing elementary and secondary school teachers with the opportunity to revitalize their own commitment to learning and to enhance their classroom offerings. The West Virginia council sponsored "The Junior Great Books" program in its public schools; and in Michigan, the state council in collaboration with the Rockefeller Foundation sponsored "ROADS" (Renaissance Outreach Alliance for Detroit Area Schools), an ongoing program for Detroit school teachers which has focused on the history and culture of Americans of African, Arabic, and Hispanic descent.

Historically, state councils have provided forums for the public discussion of contemporary issues and concerns. "Perestroika: the Restructuring of the Soviet Union," a conference for the general public funded by the Oklahoma council was one of many projects taking place this year that examined the changing face of eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

The unique strength of the state councils has been the ability to forge programs in concert with the people of their states, using local interests and resources to reach audiences that may not always have easy access to the humanities. The "City Lights" project, which took place at public housing sites in the District of Columbia, and the "Moving Backward to Move Forward" project, which focused on a neighborhood on Chicago's West Side, encouraged the telling and retelling of local history, creating new scholarship on African-American communities in both cities.

Democracy is based on an informed citizenry able to participate fully in the decisions that shape our future. The state humanities councils continue to provide not only tested but also innovative means for American citizens to continue as students of the humanities throughout their lives.

Annually the Endowment makes grants to state councils in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, and the Northern Marianas in support of each council's humanities program, based on an assessment of past programming and future plans. Because individual state councils support no more than half the cost of projects, every federal dollar that a state council receives is matched with an equal amount of cash or in-kind contributions to ensure local support.

The Endowment uses a portion of its funds to support a special initiative for State and Regional Exemplary Awards and Planning Grants. All state humanities councils are eligible to apply for these awards. The purpose of this initiative is to enable councils to undertake projects of a scope that they might otherwise be unable to fund, and to provide national recognition for projects of an outstanding and imaginative nature that are appropriate for the council and that further its goals. Joint proposals from several councils wishing to undertake a regional project are also eligible for support.



Office of Challenge Grants

The development of long-term support for humanities enterprises—frequently through building endowment—is the principal purpose of the Challenge Grants program. Institutions are challenged by this program not only to raise three or four nonfederal dollars for every federal dollar offered by these awards, but also to explain what constitutes excellence in public programs, teaching, and research in the humanities and to develop long-term plans for maintaining and improving on that standard of excellence.

The awards made during the year covered a broad gamut of outreach, education, and scholarship in what is now referred to as the “regular” program as well as the second round of the special competition for endowing Distinguished Teaching Professorships in the Humanities. These endowed professorship awards went to fourteen colleges and universities in fiscal year 1991, including the University of Idaho, which was challenged to raise \$900,000 in nonfederal funds to match the Endowment’s \$300,000. The total of \$1.2 million will be used to endow two distinguished teaching professorships in the humanities, one for a teacher selected from among the current faculty and the other for a visiting professor. The current faculty member will serve a rotating two-year term, developing annual faculty seminars and coordinating programs for the general public and summer workshops for teachers. The visiting professor will spend one semester teaching undergraduate courses.

In the regular program, a grant of \$285,000 plus \$855,000 in nonfederal funds, for a total of

\$1,140,000, was awarded to the Crow Canyon Archaeological Center in Colorado. This center is dedicated to education and research on the Anasazi, a prehistoric, agricultural, Pueblo Indian people inhabiting the southwest. The center’s activities include archaeological fieldwork, scholarly research, educational programs for adult and student audiences, summer workshops for secondary school students, and workshops for teachers to train them in the development of archaeological curricula, teaching materials, and methods for their classrooms. The center involves the region’s native Americans in its programs, both as participants and as educators. The grant will establish an endowment, and its income will enable the center to hire additional staff to expand its educational programs.

A second challenge grant (requiring a 4:1 match) of \$600,000, plus \$2,400,000 in nonfederal funds, for a total of \$3 million, was awarded to Hope College in Michigan, to support the development of library humanities acquisitions and of staffing by the immediate expenditure of \$145,000, and the investment of the balance of grant funds (\$2,855,000) in endowment. The grant will add \$80,000 annually to humanities acquisitions, approximately doubling the amount currently available for that purpose. The matching funds for the first challenge grant (awarded in 1977) were raised in a period of ten months.

At the Atlanta Historical Society in Atlanta, Georgia, a challenge grant of \$467,850 is being matched by nonfederal funds of \$1,871,400 for a total of \$2,339,250. These funds will support

the costs of constructing and furnishing a new museum and will endow a curatorial position.

A challenge grant of \$400,000 was awarded to the University of Alabama in Huntsville, Alabama. When matched with nonfederal donations totalling \$1,200,000, the grant total of \$1,600,000 will be used to endow the activities of the Humanities Center. These activities include bringing distinguished scholars to the campus, offering grants for faculty development, developing library collections in the humanities, and renovating existing space for offices and meeting areas.


These examples of fiscal year 1991 awards in this program would gratify Benjamin Franklin, who may well have been the originator of the challenge grant. In 1751 the people of Philadelphia were experiencing difficulty raising four thousand pounds in the private sector for the

establishment of a much-needed hospital. Benjamin Franklin resolved the difficulty by securing passage of a bill in the Assembly that would elicit two thousand pounds of public funds from the treasury when that amount of private money had been donated to the project.

During the past fifteen years more than a thousand institutions have raised more than one billion dollars, much of which, in the form of endowment investments, will continue to support the learning, teaching, and study of the humanities well into the twenty-first century. Ben Franklin would be proud of this achievement.



Office of Preservation

A significant portion of the intellectual legacy upon which research, education, and public programming in the humanities must depend is now disintegrating in libraries, archives, museums, and other repositories across the country. Millions of books, journals, newspapers, manuscripts, and documents are crumbling into fragments because of the acidic content of their paper. Photographs, films, sound recordings and objects of material culture are similarly threatened by factors inherent in their physical structure. The Office of Preservation was established to help institutions and organizations responsible for these endangered materials contend with this crisis.

Since its inception six years ago, the Office of Preservation has provided support for the preservation of knowledge that would have been lost to future generations of scholars. In fiscal year 1991, the office completed the third year of a multiyear expanded preservation program. As a consequence of awards made during 1991, preservation microfilming projects are being implemented at the American Theological Library Association, the University of California at Berkeley, the Medieval Institute at the University of Notre Dame, Stanford University, the University of Texas at Austin, Yale University, and eleven member libraries of the Committee for Institutional Cooperation (a consortium of the Big Ten Universities and the University of Chicago). When these projects and those being undertaken with NEH support at thirty-nine other libraries and library consortia are completed, the intellectual

content of approximately 370,000 embrittled volumes will be preserved.

The Office of Preservation continues to administer the U.S. Newspaper Program, a national initiative to catalogue and preserve on microfilm the country's newspapers on a state-by-state basis. In fiscal year 1991, California, Connecticut, New York, North Carolina, Rhode Island, South Carolina, and Wyoming received support to begin or continue their statewide activities. Planning grants were made to Alaska and Arizona that will enable those states to join the program. In all, forty-one states, two territories, and eight national repositories have participated in the U.S. Newspaper Program. At the conclusion of currently funded NEH newspaper projects, more than 190,000 newspaper titles held in 300,000 locations will be available in a national data base and more than 36 million newspaper pages will have been preserved on microfilm.

In fiscal year 1990, Congress appropriated funds for the Endowment to establish a National Heritage Preservation Program within the Office of Preservation. Conceived as a twenty-year effort, this initiative provides support for the preservation of material culture collections at museums, historical organizations, universities, and other institutions. Funding will also be made available for national education programs to train conservators of material culture objects. In the second cycle of grants made from this program in fiscal year 1991, fourteen institutions received awards to stabilize collections of over 8.3 million ar-

chaeological, ethnographic, and historical objects, through improved housing and storage of materials and the installation of appropriate climate control systems.

The preservation of archival materials significant to humanities scholarship was advanced in 1991 through grants to microfilm the Dwight Morrow papers at Amherst College, the records of the WPA Federal Writers' Project at the New York City Department of Records and Information Services, a series of highly significant textile directories at the Museum of American Textile History, and an extensive collection of documents and papers at the University of Iowa relating to prominent figures in the history of American agriculture. With the addition of


projects funded in fiscal year 1991, NEH is now supporting the preservation of eighty manuscript, archival, and other special collections at institutions across the country.

Complementing support for the preservation of a variety of cultural resources were grants for projects to increase the permanent capacity of the nation's libraries and archival repositories to care for their collections. The Association of Research Libraries received an award to revise its manual on preservation planning and to create a series of technical resource packets that can be used by libraries in developing more effective preservation programs. A grant was made to the Society of American Archivists to implement a three-year education program that will train sixty archivists to serve as preservation administrators in U.S. archival institutions. The Rochester Institute of Technology received an award for research that will yield new information on the early detection of deteriorating microfilm and on improved archival storage of microfilm.

In fiscal year 1991, the Office of Preservation made grants to Maine and Rhode Island for the development of coordinated preservation programs for their cultural holdings. These planning projects build on a national conference funded by NEH in March of 1989 that discussed the challenges, programmatic elements, and potential benefits of statewide preservation planning. This new grant category reflects the Endowment's conviction that local, state, and federal government, as well as the private sector, must work together if the accumulated knowledge of our past is to be preserved for posterity.

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


