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ABSTRACT

This booklet analyzes the fiscal year 1991 (FY91) adult literacy projects funded under the Library Services and Construction Act, Title VI, Library Literacy program (LSCA Title VI) and discusses major developments in the program. Section I discusses major developments taking place among LSCA Title VI projects and includes selected examples. Section II discusses the characteristics common to most of the LSCA Title VI projects. Section III provides an exhaustive list of literacy activities culled from all of the projects, and Section IV presents descriptions of each project. The projects are listed alphabetically by state, giving the name of the library, its location, the director's name, the funded amount, and the activity codes. The last section, section V, presents an analysis of FY91 applications and grantees, and provides statistics on the applications received and funded. (GLR)

# Foreword

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The Library Literacy Program, Title VI of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA), makes grants to state and local public libraries to support adult literacy projects. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis, with approximately 250 grants awarded each year, involving libraries in almost every state.

This booklet analyzes the fiscal year 1991 projects and discusses major developments in the Library Literacy Program. A description of the activities of each project is also included. The projects are keyed to a list of more than 90 literacy activities that could be offered by libraries, thus showing the scope of each project and enabling the reader to identify the libraries working in specific areas of interest. This list also can be used by the reader to generate ideas for starting or expanding a literacy project.

These projects demonstrate the important role the library community plays in helping to accomplish Goal five of the National Education Goals, which states that by the year 2000, every adult American will be literate and will possess the knowledge and skills necessary to compete in a global economy and exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

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# Overview

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Fiscal year 1991 was a year of milestones for the Library Services and Construction Act, Title VI, Library Literacy Program (LSCA Title VI). The amount of money appropriated in FY 91 for this program increased to \$8 million from the approximately \$5 million appropriated in past years. Additionally, the maximum grant amount was raised to \$35,000 from \$25,000. We were able to award more grants in FY 91 than at any time since the program began in FY 86. And finally, in 1991 Congress established a priority for projects under LSCA Title VI that demonstrate need and cooperation with other literacy providers in the community.

Four hundred and sixty-seven state and local public libraries submitted proposals in competition for the \$8,162,894 grant funds. Of these, 263 libraries in 45 states and the District of Columbia received funding. The grants were awarded to 17 state libraries and 246 local public libraries.

The FY 91 applications were reviewed by a panel of 90 literacy experts representing local and state libraries, literacy councils, state departments of education, institutions of higher education, and private or other literacy efforts.

*Library Literacy Program: Analysis of Funded Projects, 1991* examines the types of projects funded in FY 91. The variety of literacy activities supported under LSCA VI reflects the diversity of literacy needs in states and communities across the nation. Many factors influence a library's choice of activities for a literacy project: demographics of the target population, economic base of the community, availability of literacy services, nature of existing literacy or adult education services, and availability of human and material literacy resources.

Section I of the book discusses major developments taking place among the LSCA Title VI projects and includes selected examples.

Section II discusses characteristics common to most of the LSCA Title VI projects.

Section III provides an exhaustive list of literacy activities culled from all of the projects.

Section IV presents descriptions of each project. The projects are listed

alphabetically by state, giving the name of the library, its location, the director's name, the funded amount, and the activity codes. Each of the projects has been reviewed and assigned codes corresponding to the activities listed in Section III. Activity codes were assigned to each project if those activities were clearly stated in the proposal as objectives or key activities of the project and if they were supported by LSCA Title VI funds. The coded projects give the reader an idea of the scope of each project. Conversely, if interested in a particular activity, such as providing a book discussion component (E7), the reader can identify the libraries that have incorporated that activity in their projects by scanning the chart, state by state, for that particular code.

Section V is an analysis of FY 91 applications and grantees. It provides statistics on the applications received and funded.

# Section I

## Major Developments


Within the LSCA Title VI projects funded for fiscal year 1991, there are major developments in library use by adult literacy students; use of electronic technologies, including computers, for instruction; family literacy; and coordination of services with other agencies. Innovative programs in these areas are being tested and the number of libraries that are strengthening or incorporating these areas into their projects is increasing. These developments are discussed below.

### Enabling Students to Use the Library

More LSCA Title VI programs are making an effort to educate literacy students about the resources available through their local libraries. Libraries are encouraging both students and tutors to increase their use of and involvement with their local libraries by orienting tutors to library services and library literacy resources, and introducing students to the plethora of information and reading opportunities available in the library. Adult students are gaining a basic understanding of the function and layout of the public library, learning how to find areas of interest such as the children's books section, the magazine section, or the job-related materials file. Also, tutors are participating in inservice workshops presented by the library staff to learn how to guide their students in using the library. In this way, libraries are helping adult students use their improved literacy skills for practical and personal purposes.

Nineteen percent of the FY 91 grantees are enabling adult literacy students to make use of the library, compared to 11 percent in FY 90 and 9 percent in FY 89 and FY 88 (see figure 1).

In Victoria, Texas, the staff of the Victoria Public Library and the Victoria Adult Literacy Council will provide training for tutors that includes the basic skills that new readers should have for using the library. The library will develop a 2-hour "Library Literacy" training module that will include orientation to the library's physical layout, introduction to library departments and staff, familiarization with available services and materials for nonreaders or functionally illiterate adults, operating the library's computers, using the card catalog, and accessing other user service information. The training module can be used in conjunction with the basic reading workshop training program for tutors.

Upon acquiring a collection of materials appropriate for adults with low reading skills, the Lexington Public Library in Lexington, Kentucky, will target low-income parents enrolled in literacy programs and will help them use their newly learned reading skills to access library resources and become informed, responsible, regular library users. To achieve this, the library's family literacy project aims to help adult students recognize reading not as a task but as a family pleasure and the library as their best free resource. The library will contract with the city for special trolley service between the low-income housing projects and the library. The service will be free to participants. Community volunteers will be recruited and trained to assist participants in getting their own library cards, using the computerized catalog system, selecting and checking out appropriate reading level materials, and keeping up with and returning library materials. Parents will participate in a series of programs to learn to read to their children and will receive special bibliographies of appropriate materials that take into consideration ethnic and cultural interests and reading ability. As a followup, participants will be placed on the library's mailing list to receive monthly calendars of library events for both adults and children.


### **Technology-Assisted Instruction**


**Figure 2.--Percentage of LSCA Title VI grantees providing technology-assisted instruction**

Libraries are providing innovative programs for learners by creatively using existing technologies such as cable broadcasting and video and the newer technologies such as CD-ROM and interactive video. Fifty-nine percent of the libraries funded in FY 91 are delivering a variety of electronic instructional services, including computer instruction, to complement one-on-one or group tutoring (see figure 2).

Libraries continue to embrace computers as a teaching tool and for data management within their literacy projects. Among the libraries that are using instructional technologies, 42 percent of the FY 91 LSCA Title VI grantees are providing computer-assisted instruction, almost doubling the

number of computerized literacy programs supported by libraries in FY 88, the first year that statistics were kept (see figure 3).

The Sara Hightower Regional Library in Rome, Georgia, will provide a 24-hour literacy television channel to broadcast commercially produced literacy instructional programs and community service programs, including videos of local inservice and training workshops for literacy tutors. The library will purchase appropriate programs, broadcasting licenses, and support materials for student use. The library will collaborate with the local cable companies and adult education program, and the state's Adult Literacy Task Force on program scheduling and public service announcements.

The Joliet Public Library in Joliet, Illinois, will establish an adult literacy center that, along with reading resources and tutoring and learning materials, will be stocked with educational technology such as computers, CD-ROM, and audiovisual equipment. Hypermedia will be purchased and used to generate teaching packages. The CD-ROM interactive software combined with the hypermedia format (sound, graphic, and video images) acts as a surrogate tutor. The library will produce a video that promotes the literacy center to the general public and will develop a user-friendly, interactive, computerized orientation to the library.

**Figure 3.--Percentage of LSCA Title VI grantees providing computer-assisted instruction**




The Pine Bluff and Jefferson County Public Library which serves a rural community in Arkansas will make literacy services and materials more accessible to residents in the outlying areas of the county. In addition to minilibraries placed in convenient locations such as markets, community centers, or cafes, the library literacy liaison will bring a laptop computer and learning software on scheduled visits to the minilibrary locations. Another computer will be placed on the bookmobile to serve learners along its biweekly route of 24 stops.

The Eastern Shore Regional Library in Salisbury, Maryland, will purchase and install computers in the regional library and in eight county libraries on Maryland's Eastern Shore. The regional library will acquire a variety of basic skills instructional software that can be examined, used, and evaluated by tutors and students participating in the eight library-sponsored county literacy programs. Computer-assisted literacy instruction will supplement students' one-on-one tutoring sessions. Students will be able to practice basic skills in problem areas at their own pace and at their own convenience.

### Family Literacy

Intergenerational or family literacy projects that offer illiterate parents the opportunity to learn to read to their children have again increased significantly with the FY 91 LSCA Title VI projects. In FY 88 only 5 percent of the projects offered an intergenerational component. By FY 90 that figure almost quadrupled to 19 percent. In FY 91, 32 percent of the projects provide family literacy services designed to improve the literacy skills of parents.

The California State Library in Sacramento will sponsor a two-day family literacy workshop that will bring together public library staff, adult learners, library directors, representatives of state and national literacy volunteer organizations, representatives of the state library, the state department of education, and the Adult Literacy Training Institute. The purpose of the workshop is to develop a shared vision of the state's recently enacted library-based family literacy initiative, Families for Literacy, and to map out processes to achieve its goals. The workshop will also focus on the training needs of volunteer tutors relative to family literacy concepts and activities, and begin developing an intensive and comprehensive model of tutor training to help overcome the reluctance of tutors to incorporate aspects of family literacy into their regular tutoring time.


The St. Louis Public Library in Missouri will collaborate with a neighborhood organization to initiate a neighborhood-based, family-centered literacy project that encourages reading and related behaviors. Neighborhood residents wishing to serve their community will be trained through the Neighborhood College to assist their neighbors in developing reading and writing skills adapted to their family, educational, and vocational goals. Family reading participants will be recruited through the tutor's outreach efforts and program publicity. The program will operate through an existing neighborhood credit-for-service system known as Member Organized Resource Exchange (MORE). Volunteers will become members of the MORE Time Dollar Exchange, which allows them to convert their time to a value that can be accrued and "spent" on other services. Members of the MORE Time Dollar Exchange use a computerized resource database to be linked and referred to other neighbor services.

### **Coordination With Adult Education Programs**

The Library Literacy Program encourages cooperation among literacy providers in a community. Although most FY 91 LSCA Title VI projects include some type of collaboration or coordination with other literacy providers in the community, 49 percent of these grantees describe a close working relationship with traditional local adult education classroom programs (see figure 5). This ranges from cooperative referral of students to the appropriate program to providing trained tutors in classrooms to assist students enrolled in pre-GED classes.

The Idaho State Library in Boise will coordinate a pilot project to establish computer-assisted learning workstations in six rural libraries in southwestern Idaho. Staff and volunteers from the Adult Basic Education (ABE)

program serving southwestern Idaho will provide publicity, student recruitment, and follow up. Library and ABE personnel will be trained in workstation management, adult literacy awareness, and literacy software applications. Both the state library and the ABE program will provide technical assistance and training to project participants. In addition to providing instructional opportunities for adult literacy students, the project will strengthen networks among libraries and literacy providers for future cooperative efforts in serving adult literacy students in rural areas.


Building on a successful cooperative program between the public library and the community-based volunteer tutoring program, the Botetourt County Library in Virginia will further develop and expand services for adult new readers by increasing cooperative efforts with the county's Adult Basic Education program. The library will work with the ABE supervisor to place trained tutors in ABE classrooms where adult new readers have enrolled to continue their education.

## Section II

### Common Characteristics

LSCA Title VI projects are designed to initiate, continue, expand, or improve literacy services. These projects share many of the characteristics shown in figure 6.

Many libraries funded in FY 91 (71 percent) recruit adults who wish to improve their basic reading, writing, and computing skills and enable them to participate in literacy programs to meet their needs. They also actively seek volunteers to be trained as tutors.

Most FY 91 LSCA Title VI projects (95 percent) coordinate their services with literacy organizations and community-based organizations that

provide similar or related literacy services. Activities include keeping other literacy organizations in the community apprised of the project, referring students to other instructional programs suitable to their needs, serving as a member of a literacy coalition, or conducting the project as a joint venture with another organization. As the public becomes more aware of the negative impact of illiteracy on the community, public schools, community colleges and other institutions of higher education, businesses, civic organizations, social welfare agencies, and individuals are becoming involved with efforts to provide adults with basic literacy skills. Libraries help facilitate involvement with and coordination of literacy activities among these various entities.

Projects funded under FY 91 LSCA Title VI indicate that libraries commonly provide public awareness activities (91 percent) to inform the public of the availability of literacy services or materials, to recruit students and tutors, or to promote awareness of the nature of illiteracy and its effects on the individual and society.

Ninety percent of the FY 91 library literacy projects use their funds to establish or increase the number of training workshops during the year. Training may consist of training volunteers to provide instruction to adult new learners, training individuals to teach others to be tutors, or training librarians to provide services to adult new learners.

The demand for more and better library literacy materials increases as community members become more involved in providing and receiving literacy services. As more students are recruited, more materials have to be added to library collections; with increased use of literacy materials, more materials have to be replaced; and as innovative methods of adult instruction are introduced, new materials have to be evaluated and selected. Eighty-seven percent of the FY 91 grantees are using LSCA Title VI funds to acquire literacy collections for their libraries, to expand and improve existing collections, or to develop their own noncommercially produced materials. This includes both print materials and software.

As discussed earlier, many libraries are providing technology-assisted approaches for literacy programs. Fifty-nine percent of all FY 91 LSCA Title VI grantees will use some kind of electronic media in their instructional program, such as audio cassettes, film, video, and computer software. The use of audiovisual materials offers another means by which adults can improve their reading, writing, and computational skills.

Forty-one percent of the FY 91 projects provide special instruction or learning opportunities. Although most of the literacy instruction offered by the projects is one-to-one instruction using volunteer tutors, and many of the literacy projects are making use of the teaching methods and materials developed by several nationally recognized nonprofit organizations, some projects are combining a variety of methods to tailor teaching to the needs of their students or to enrich the tutoring of basic skills. For example, some projects are publishing and disseminating the written work of students, conducting book discussion groups, or providing special instruction for persons with learning disabilities.
