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ABSTRACT

This volume provides comparative data for faculty salaries in public and private colleges and universities, based on two surveys of 738 and 485 institutions conducted in 1988-89 and 1992-93 respectively. Data are provided for the following disciplines: Accounting; Anthropology; Biological Sciences/Life Sciences; Business Administration and Management; Business Management and Administrative Services; Business/Managerial Economics; Business Marketing and Marketing Management; Chemistry; Communications; Counselor Education/Student Counseling and Guidance Services; Curriculum and Instruction; Drama/Theater Arts; Economics; Education; Engineering; Engineering-Related Technologies; English Languages and Literatures/Letters; Foreign Languages and Literature; Geography; and Geology. A summary of the overall average salary increase between the baseline year of 1988-89 and the trend year, 1992-93, for both public and private institutions is presented for each discipline. Data from institutions participating in both years are compared with each other and with the consumer price index. Average salaries by rank, the faculty mix percentage, and comparisons with other disciplines and between the public and private institutions are also included. The participating institutions are listed. (GLR)

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Foreword

TO THE EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES
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Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, DC, in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, NC, have conducted annual national faculty salary surveys by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Two separate surveys are conducted each year, one for public senior colleges and universities and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data from the 1989-90 and 1992-93 surveys were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines/major fields, 20 of which are included herein in alphabetical order. The academic disciplines/major fields were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs, 1990.

Each of the 20 academic disciplines/major fields herein presents a summary of the overall average salary increase in that academic discipline/major field from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private participating institutions. Of the 278 public institutions which participated in CUPA's public survey of 1989-90, 188 also participated in the 1992-93 survey. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's private survey of 1989-90, 297 also participated in the 1992-93 survey. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

In addition to listing the average salaries in the 20 individual academic disciplines/major fields for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including "new assistant professor," and listing the faculty mix percentage (FAC MIX PCT) and the salary factor, comparisons are made in each of the 20 individual academic disciplines/major fields between the two public surveys and the two private surveys for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93) and with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living.

The list of all 39 selected academic disciplines/major fields surveyed is found in Appendix A of each academic discipline/major field article included herein, and the lists of all participating senior colleges and universities are found in Appendixes B (public) and C (private) of each academic discipline/major field article included herein.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN ACCOUNTING
FOR THE YEARS

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including accounting. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of accounting in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that prepares individuals to practice the profession of accounting and to perform related business functions. Includes instruction in accounting principles and theory, financial accounting, managerial accounting, cost accounting, budget control, tax accounting, legal aspects of accounting, auditing, reporting procedures, statement analysis, planning and consulting, business information systems, accounting research methods, professional standards and ethics, and applications to specific for-profit, public, and non-profit organizations.*

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of accounting from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of

1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of accounting for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .28 for associate professor of accounting in the 1989-90 public study means that 28 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.20 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of accounting in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 20 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of accounting with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of accounting was reported in 141 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,334 faculty was \$44,874. This average salary was approximately 15.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of accounting was reported in 140 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,305 faculty was \$51,596. This average salary was approximately 20.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of accounting after three years in the public institutions studied was 15 percent ($\$51,596$ minus $\$44,874$ equals $\$6,722$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in accounting average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 2.1 percent or an average of .7 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of accounting (15%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 4.8 percent (15% minus 10.2% equals 4.8%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of accounting.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in accounting is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 25 percent vs. 35 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 26 percent vs. 34 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the

ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in accounting in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 7 percent (93/1,334) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.4 percent (45/1,305) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of accounting was reported in 172 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 790 faculty was \$42,835. This average salary was 13.8 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of accounting was reported in 190 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 795 faculty was \$50,722. This average salary was 17.5 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in accounting after three years in the private institutions studied was 18.4 percent (\$50,722 minus \$42,835 equals \$7,887). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 5.5 percent or 1.8 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of account-

ing (18.4%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.7 percent (18.4% minus 14.7% equals 3.7%) less than faculty in accounting.

In the discipline/major field of accounting, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 18 percent vs. 38 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 18 percent vs. 38 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in accounting was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.7 percent (53/790) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.8 percent (30/795) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of accounting and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 4,224 (3.1%) faculty in the discipline/major field of accounting participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of accounting in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 16 percent and 14 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of accounting in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 21 percent and 17 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00) respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in accounting in the public institutions, received an average annual salary increase of .7 percent above the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was 1.8 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of accounting the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that the discipline/major field of accounting in both the public and private studies is still an emerging discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in accounting in the 1989-90 public and private studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but lower in both the 1992-93 public and private studies.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of accounting is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN ANTHROPOLOGY

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines/major fields including anthropology. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of anthropology in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the systematic study of human beings, their antecedents and related primates, and their cultural behavior and institutions, in comparative perspective. Includes instruction in biological/physical anthropology, primatology, human paleontology and prehistoric archeology, hominid evolution, anthropological linguistics, ethnography, ethnology, ethnohistory, socio-cultural anthropology, psychological anthropology, research methods, and applications to areas such as medicine, forensic pathology, museum studies, and international affairs.*

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of anthropology from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of

1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of anthropology for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .29 for associate professor of anthropology in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .93 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of anthropology in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 7 percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of anthropology with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of anthropology was reported in 72 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 306 faculty was \$39,545. This average salary was approximately 1.9 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of anthropology was reported in 78 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 320 faculty was \$43,791. This average salary was approximately 2.4 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of anthropology after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.7 percent ($\$43,791$ minus $\$39,545$ equals $\$4,246$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in anthropology average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 2.2 percent or an average of .7 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of anthropology (10.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .5 percent (10.7% minus 10.2% equals .5%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of anthropology.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in anthropology is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 46 percent vs. 24 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 43 percent vs. 27 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage

at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in anthropology in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 7.5 percent (23/306) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 5.3 percent (17/320) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of anthropology was reported in 57 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 164 faculty was \$38,999. This average salary was 3.6 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of anthropology was reported in 68 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 188 faculty was \$44,823. This average salary was 3.8 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in anthropology after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.9 percent (\$44,823 minus \$38,999 equals \$5,824). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 2 percent or .6 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of anthro-

pology (14.9%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .2 percent (14.9 minus 14.7 = .2) less than faculty in anthropology.

In the discipline/major field of anthropology, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 35 percent vs. 32 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 39 percent vs. 23 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in anthropology was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 7.9 percent (13/164) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.2 percent (6/188) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of anthropology and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 978 (.7%) faculty in the discipline/major field of anthropology participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the base line year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a

few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of anthropology in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some two percent and four percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of anthropology in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were two and four percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00) respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in anthropology in the public institutions received a relative annual salary increase of .7 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .6 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of anthropology the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that the discipline/major field of anthropology in both the public and private studies is an established field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in anthropology in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies and the 1989-90 private study were higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but lower in the 1992-93 private study.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major ifeld of anthropology is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES/LIFE SCIENCES

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including biological sciences/life sciences. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the scientific study of living organisms and their systems.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 114--26.).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences from the "base-line year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from

those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of biological sciences/life sciences for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .26 for associate professor of biological sciences/life sciences in the 1989-90 public study means that 26 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .96 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is four percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences was reported in 179 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 2,286 faculty was \$39,395. This average salary was approximately 1.6 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences was reported in 180 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 2,441 faculty was \$42,808. This average salary was approximately .01 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences after three years in the public institutions studied was 8.7 percent ($\$42,808$ minus $\$39,395$ equals $\$3,413$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in biological sciences/life sciences average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 4.2 percent or an average of 1.4 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences (8.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 1.5 percent (10.2% minus 8.7% equals 1.5%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in biological sciences/life sciences is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor

rank in the 1989-90 study: 49 percent vs. 22 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 46 percent vs. 25 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in biological sciences/life sciences in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 4.7 percent (107/2,286) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/-41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 5.1 percent (124/2,441) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences was reported in 270 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,374 faculty was \$37,121. This average salary was 1.4 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences was reported in 276 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,512 faculty was \$42,755. This average salary was 1 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in biological sciences/life sciences after three years in the private institutions studied was 15.2 percent (\$42,755 minus \$37,121 equals \$5,634). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic

increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 2.3 percent or .8 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences (15.2%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .5 percent (15.2% minus 14.7% equals .5%) less than faculty in biological sciences/life sciences.

In the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 39 percent vs. 23 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 42 percent vs. 25 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in biological sciences/life sciences was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 4.5 percent (62/1,374) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 4 percent (60/1,512) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of biological sciences/life sciences and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A

total of 7,613 (5.6%) faculty in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some two percent above and one percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in biological sciences/life sciences in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were even with and one percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in biological sciences/life sciences in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 1.4 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .8 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are significantly higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies. These data show that biological sciences/life sciences is an established discipline in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in biological sciences/life sciences in the public studies was lower in 1989-90 and higher in 1992-93 than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In the private studies in comparison to ALL

MAJOR FIELDS, it was lower in both 1989-90 and 1992-93.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of biological sciences/life sciences is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION & MANAGEMENT
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including business administration and management. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of business administration and management in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that generally prepares individuals to plan, organize, direct, and control the functions and processes of a firm or organization. Includes instruction in management theory, human resources management and behavior, accounting and other quantitative methods, purchasing and logistics, organization and production, marketing, and business decision making.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 188--52.0201).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of business administration and management from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which

participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of business administration and management for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .31 for associate professor of business administration and management in the 1989-90 public study means that 31 percent of the faculty in that discipline/-major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.14 for associate professors in business administration and management in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 14 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of business administration and management with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business administration and management was reported in 138 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,884 faculty was \$42,799. This average salary was approximately 10.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business administration and management was reported in 150 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,890 faculty was \$49,441. This average salary was approximately 15.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of business administration and management after three years in the public institutions studied was 15.5 percent (\$49,441 minus \$42,799 equals \$6,642). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in business administration and management average faculty salaries over the three-year period of 2.6 percent or an average of .9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business administration and management (15.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 5.3 percent (15.5% minus 10.2% equals 5.3%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of business administration and management.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in business administration and management is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 27 percent vs. 31 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 30 percent vs. 33 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business administration and management in the public studies was the same as the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 5.5 percent (103/1,884) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 5.2 percent (98/1,890) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business administration and management was reported in 179 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,273 faculty was \$40,648. This average salary was 7.9 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business administration and management was reported in 215 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,607 faculty was \$47,982. This average salary was 11.1 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in business administration and management after three years in the private institutions studied was 18

percent ($\$47,982$ minus $\$40,648$ equals $\$7,334$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 5.1 percent or 1.7 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent ($\$43,175$ minus $\$37,657$ equals $\$5,518$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business administration and management (18%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.3 percent (18% minus 14.7% equals 3.3%) less than faculty in business administration and management.

In the discipline/major field of business administration and management, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 23 percent vs. 37 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 24 percent vs. 36 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business administration and management was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 5.2 percent (66/1,273) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.4 percent (54/1,607) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of business administration and management and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from

the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 6,654 (4.9%) faculty in the discipline/major field of business administration and management participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of business administration and management in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 10 percent and eight percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00). The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of business administration and management in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 16 percent and 11 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00) respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in business administration and management in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .9 percent above the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the faculty received an average annual salary increase of 1.7 above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of business administration and management the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that business administration and management in both the public and private studies is

still an emerging discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business administration and management in the 1989-90 public study was the same as in ALL MAJOR FIELDS, however, it was higher in the 1992-93 study. Both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies, the hiring rate was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of business administration and management is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
BUSINESS MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including business management and administrative services. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that prepare individuals to perform managerial, research, and technical support functions related to the commercial and/or non-profit production, buying, and selling of goods and services.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 187--52.).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline

year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of business management and administrative services for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major

field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .29 for associate professor of business management and administrative services in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.14 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 14 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services was reported in 74 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,061 faculty was \$43,243. This average salary was approximately 11.5 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services was reported in 54 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 911 faculty was \$47,547. This average salary was approximately 11.2 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services after three years in the public institutions studied was 10 percent (\$47,547 minus \$43,243 equals \$4,304). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in business management and administrative services average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 2.9 percent or an average of .97 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services (10%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .2 percent (10.2% minus 10% equals .2%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in business management and administrative services is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 28 percent vs. 33 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 27 percent vs. 32 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business management and administrative services in the public studies was the same as the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 5.5 percent (58/1,061) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.1 percent (28/911) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services was reported in 111 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 754 faculty was \$43,037. This average salary was 14.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of business management and administrative services was reported in 44 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 320 faculty was \$50,956. This average salary was 18 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in business management and

administrative services after three years in the private institutions studied was 18.4 percent (\$50,956 minus \$43,037 equals \$7,919). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 5.5 percent or 1.8 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services (18.4%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.7 percent (18.4% minus 14.7% equals 3.7%) less than faculty in business management and administrative services.

In the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 20 percent vs. 39 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 20 percent vs. 42 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business management and administrative services was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.8 percent (51/754) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.1 percent (10/320) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of business management and administrative services and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 3,046 (2.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of business management and administrative services in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 11 percent and 14 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in business management and administrative services in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 11 percent and 18 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in business management and administrative services in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .9 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was 1.8 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of business management and administra-

tive services the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is even more true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that business management and administrative services in both the public and private studies is still an emerging discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business management and administrative services was the same as in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90 and lower in 1992-93. In the private institutions the hiring rate was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for 1989-90 and lower in 1992-93.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of business management and administrative services is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN BUSINESS/MANAGERIAL ECONOMICS
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including business/managerial economics. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the application of economics principles to the analysis of the organization and operation of business enterprises. Includes instruction in monetary theory, banking and financial systems, theory of competition, pricing theory, wage and salary/incentive theory, analysis of markets, and applications of econometrics and quantitative methods to the study of particular business and business problems.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 192--52.0601).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's

PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of business/managerial economics for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for

a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .29 for associate professor of business/managerial economics in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.06 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 6 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics was reported in 73 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 581 faculty was \$42,535. This average salary was approximately 9.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics was reported in 58 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 506 faculty was \$48,858. This average salary was approximately 14.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics after three years in the public institutions studied was 14.9 percent ($\$48,858$ minus $\$42,535$ equals $\$6,323$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in business/managerial economics average faculty salaries over the three-year period of 2 percent or an average of .7 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics (14.9%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 4.7 percent (14.9% minus 10.2% equals 4.7%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in business/managerial economics is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank

in the 1989-90 study: 36 percent vs. 29 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 35 percent vs. 28 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93).

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business/managerial economics in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 6.2 percent (36/581) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.4 percent (17/506) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics was reported in 119 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 557 faculty was \$39,672. This average salary was 5.4 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics was reported in 95 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 433 faculty was \$47,500. This average salary was 10 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in business/managerial economics after three years in the private institutions studied was 19.7 percent (\$47,500 minus \$39,672 equals \$7,828). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time

period, is 6.8 percent or 2.3 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics (19.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 5 percent (19.7% minus 14.7% equals 5.0%) less than faculty in business/managerial economics.

In the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 23 percent vs. 37 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 27 percent vs. 30 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business/managerial economics was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.1 percent (34/557) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 2.3 percent (10/433) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of business/managerial economics and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 2,077 (1.5%) faculty in the discipline/major field of business/managerial eco-

nomics participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 10 percent and five percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 14 percent and 10 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in business/managerial economics in the public institutions received an average annual salary .7 percent above the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was 2.3 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of business/managerial economics the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, however, in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies, it is lower.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business/managerial economics in the 1989-90 public and private studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but lower in the 1992-93 public and private studies.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of business/managerial economics is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a

valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including business marketing and marketing management. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that prepares individuals to undertake and manage the process of developing consumer audiences and moving products from producers to consumers. Includes instruction in buyer behavior and dynamics, principle of marketing research, demand analysis, cost-volume and profit relationships, pricing theory, marketing campaign and strategic planning, market segments, advertising methods, sales operations and management, consumer relations, retailing, and applications to specific products and markets.

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93

for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of business marketing and marketing management for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .25 for associate professor of business marketing and marketing management in the 1989-90 public study means that 25 percent of the faculty in that discipline/-major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.18 for associate professors in business marketing and marketing management in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 18 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, business marketing and marketing management with the entire data base.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management was reported in 68 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 497 faculty was \$45,869. This average salary was approximately 18.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management was reported in 90 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 636 faculty was \$51,182. This average salary was approximately 19.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management after three years in the public institutions studied was 11.6 percent ($\$51,182$ minus $\$45,869$ equals $\$5,313$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in business marketing and marketing management average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 1.3 percent or an average of .4 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management (11.6%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 1.4 percent (11.6% minus 10.2% equals 1.4%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in business marketing and marketing management is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 35 percent vs. 31 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 32 percent vs. 31 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business marketing and marketing management in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 7 percent (35/497) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 4.1 percent (26/636) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management was reported in 55 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 269 faculty was \$46,332. This average salary was 23 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of business marketing and marketing management was reported in 69 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 318 faculty was \$54,969. This average salary was 27.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in business marketing and marketing management after three years in the private institutions studied was

18.6 percent ($\$54,969$ minus $\$46,332$ equals $\$8,637$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 5.7 percent or 1.9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent ($\$43,175$ minus $\$37,657$ equals $\$5,518$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management (18.6%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.9 percent (18.6% minus 14.7% equals 3.9%) less than faculty in business marketing and marketing management.

In the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is significantly lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 18 percent vs. 41 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 19 percent vs. 36 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business marketing and marketing management was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.7 percent (18/269) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.8 percent (12/318) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years

from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,720 (1.3%) faculty in business marketing and marketing management participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 18 percent and 23 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in business marketing and marketing management in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 20 percent and 27 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in business marketing and marketing management in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .4 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was 1.9 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are slightly higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, but significantly lower in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that the private institutions organized their curricula of business marketing and marketing management later than did the public institutions.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in business marketing and marketing management in the 1989-90 public and private studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but lower in both the 1992-93 public and private studies.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of business marketing and marketing management is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN CHEMISTRY
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including chemistry. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of chemistry in the CIP is as follows:

A group of instructional programs that generally describes the scientific study of the composition and behavior of matter, including its micro- and macro-structure, the processes of chemical change, and the theoretical description and laboratory simulation of these phenomena.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 130--40.0501).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of chemistry from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 insti-

tions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of chemistry for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major

field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .23 for associate professor of chemistry in the 1989-90 public study means that 23 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .98 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of chemistry in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is two percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of chemistry with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of chemistry was reported in 163 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,413 faculty was \$41,266. This average salary was approximately 6.4 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of chemistry was reported in 164 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,435 faculty was \$44,955. This average salary was approximately 5.2 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of chemistry after three years in the public institutions studied was 8.9 percent (\$44,955 minus \$41,266 equals \$3,689). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year period, is 4 percent or 1.3 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of chemistry (8.9), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 1.3 percent (10.2% minus 8.9% equals 1.3%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of chemistry.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in chemistry is significantly higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank both in the 1989-90 study: 53 percent vs. 23 percent, and in the 1992-93 study, 52 percent vs. 24 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both

public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in chemistry in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 4.7 percent (67/1413) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 4.1 percent (59/1435) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of chemistry was reported in 258 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,056 faculty was \$39,120. This average salary was 3.9 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of chemistry was reported in 262 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,113 faculty was \$44,543. This average salary was 3.2 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in chemistry after three years in the private institutions studied was 13.9 percent (\$44,543 minus \$39,120 equals \$5,423). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is one percent or .33 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of chemistry (13.9), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries

salaries by .8 percent (14.7% minus 13.9 equals .8) more than faculty in chemistry.

In the discipline/major field of chemistry, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is significantly higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 49 percent vs. 23 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 48 percent vs. 25 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in chemistry was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 4.2 percent (44/1056) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and higher in the 1992-93 private study: 4.9 percent (54/1113) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of chemistry and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 5,017 (3.7%) faculty in the discipline/major field of chemistry participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a

few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of chemistry in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some six percent and four percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in chemistry in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were five percent and three percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in chemistry in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 1.3 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .33 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of chemistry the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are significantly higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that chemistry is an established discipline in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in chemistry in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In the 1989-90 private study it was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but higher in the 1992-93 private study.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of chemistry is being developed, it is anticipated that future articles on this subject will become more valuable for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN COMMUNICATIONS

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including communications. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of communications in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the creation, transmission and evaluation of messages.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 68--09.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of communications from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460

institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of communications for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus, by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major

field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .28 for associate professor of communications in the 1989-90 public study means that 28 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .96 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of communications in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is four percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of communications with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of communications was reported in 129 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,220 faculty was \$34,267. This average salary was approximately 13.2 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of communications was reported in 137 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,372 faculty was \$37,913. This average salary was approximately 12.7 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of communications after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.6 percent ($\$37,913$ minus $\$34,267$ equals $\$3,646$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in communications average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 2.3 percent or an average of .8 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of communications (10.6%); therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .4 percent (10.6% minus 10.2% equals .4%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of communications.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in communications is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 20 percent vs. 36 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 22 percent vs.

37 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in communications in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 6.9 percent (84/1,220) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.9 percent (53/1,372) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of communications was reported in 171 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 878 faculty was \$33,114. This average salary was 13.7 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of communications was reported in 183 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 926 faculty was \$37,734. This average salary was 14.4 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in communications after three years in the private institutions studied was 14 percent (\$37,734 minus \$33,114 equals \$4,620). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 1.1 percent or .4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after

three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of communications (14%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .7 percent (14.7% minus 14% equals .7%) more than faculty in communications.

In the discipline/major field of communications, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 18 percent vs. 40 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 19 percent vs. 42 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in communications was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.6 percent (58/878) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and higher in the 1992-93 private study: 5.7 percent (53/926) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of communications and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 4,396 (3.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field of communications participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public

institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of communications in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 12 percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00).

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in communications in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .8 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .4 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of communications the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is even more true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that the discipline/major field of communications is still an emerging discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in communications in the 1989-90 public was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but lower in the 1992-93 study. In the private institutions it was higher in both study years, 1989-90 and 1992-93.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of communications is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN COUNSELOR EDUCATION/STUDENT COUNSELING
AND GUIDANCE SERVICES
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including counselor education counseling and guidance service. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that prepares individuals to apply the theory and principles of guidance and counseling to the provision of support for the personal, social, educational, and vocational development of students, and the organizing of guidance services within elementary, middle and secondary educational institutions. Includes instruction in legal and professional requirements, therapeutic counselor intervention, vocational counseling, and related socio-psychological foundations.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 79--13.1101).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participa-

ted in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of counselor education/student counseling and guidance service for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .30 for associate professor of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in the 1989-90 public study means that 30 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .96 for associate professors in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is four percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was reported in 46 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 332 faculty was \$39,982. This average salary was approximately 3.1 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was reported in 56 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 394 faculty was \$43,799. This average salary was approximately 2.5 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services after three years in the public institutions studied was 9.5 percent (\$43,799 minus \$39,982 equals \$3,817). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year period, is 3.4 percent or 1.1 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to counselor education/student counseling and guidance services (9.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .7 percent (10.2% minus 9.5% equals .7%) more than faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services is higher at the professor rank than

assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 45 percent vs. 23 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 40 percent vs. 27 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in counseling education/student counseling and guidance services in the public studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 5.7 percent (19/332) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 6.1 percent (24/394) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was reported in 15 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 74 faculty was \$37,336. This average salary was .9 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was reported in 19 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 73 faculty was \$41,943. This average salary was 2.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services after three years in the private institutions studied was 12.3 percent (\$41,943 minus \$37,336 equals \$4,607). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over

the three-year time period, is .6 percent or .2 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services (12.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 2.4 percent (14.7% minus 12.3% equals 2.4%) more than faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services.

In the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 38 percent vs. 23 percent (1989-90), respectively; but lower in the 1992-93 study: 27 percent vs. 37 percent. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 8.1 percent (6/74) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and higher in the 1992-93 private study: 2.7 percent (2/73) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period

of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 873 (.6%) faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were three percent above and one percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were two percent above and three percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 1.13 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .2 percent below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies.

In the private studies the professor rank is higher than the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study but lower in the 1992-93 study.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in counselor education/student counseling and guidance services was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS and indicates that although it is an established field, it continues to grow.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of counselor education/student counseling and guidance services is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including curriculum and instruction. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the study of the curriculum and related instructional processes and tools, and that may prepare individuals to serve as professional curriculum specialists. Includes instruction in curriculum theory, curriculum design and planning, instructional material design and evaluation, curriculum evaluation, and applications to specific subject-matter, programs or educational levels.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 75--13.0301.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's

PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of curriculum and instruction for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .29 for associate professor of curriculum and instruction in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .97 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is three percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction was reported in 42 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 534 faculty was \$37,464. This average salary was approximately 3.5 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction was reported in 50 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 673 faculty was \$40,278. This average salary was approximately 6.1 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction after three years in the public institutions studied was 7.5 percent ($\$40,278$ minus $\$37,464$ equals $\$2,814$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in curriculum and instruction average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 5.4 percent or an average of 1.8 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction (7.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 2.7 percent (10.2% minus 7.5% equals 2.7%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in curriculum and instruction is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank

in the 1989-90 study: 38 percent vs. 27 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 35 percent vs. 29 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in curriculum and instruction in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 4.8 percent (26/534) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and the same in 1992-93, 4.3 percent (29/673) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction was reported in 11 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 80 faculty was \$40,785. This average salary was 8.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction was reported in 14 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 90 faculty was \$45,595. This average salary was 5.6 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in curriculum and instruction after three years in the private institutions studied was 11.8 percent (\$45,595 minus \$40,785 equals \$4,810). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time

period, is 1.1 percent or .4 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction (11.8%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 2.9 percent (14.7% minus 11.8% equals 2.9%) more than faculty in curriculum and instruction.

In the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 30 percent vs. 33 percent, respectively; and higher in the 1992-93 study: 36 percent vs. 32 percent, respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in curriculum and instruction was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 1.3 percent (1/80) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/-25,703), respectively, and higher in the 1992-93 private study: 4.4 percent (4/-90) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,377 (1%) faculty in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction

participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some three percent below and eight percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in curriculum and instruction in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were six percent below and six percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in curriculum and instruction in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 1.8 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .4 percent below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies. In the private studies the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower in 1989-90 and higher in 1992-93. These data show that curriculum and instruction is an established discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in curriculum and instruction in the 1989-90 public study was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS and it was the same as ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 study. In the private studies the hiring rate was lower in the 1989-90 study and higher

in the 1992-93 study.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of curriculum and instruction is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN DRAMA/THEATER ARTS

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including dramatic arts. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that generally describes the study of dramatic works and their performance. Includes instruction in major works of dramatic literature, dramatic styles and types, and the principles of organizing and producing full productions.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 164--50.0501).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188

institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of drama/theater arts faculty for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .30 for associate professor of drama/theater arts in the 1989-90 public study means that 30 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .92 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is eight percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts was reported in 103 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 591 faculty was \$34,889. This average salary was approximately 11.2 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts was reported in 101 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 560 faculty was \$38,206. This average salary was approximately 11.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts after three years in the public institutions studied was 9.5 percent ($\$38,206$ minus $\$34,889$ equals $\$3,317$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in dramatic arts average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of dramatic arts (9.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .7 percent (10.2% minus 9.5% equals .7%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in drama/theater arts is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 27 percent vs. 36 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 28

percent vs. 33 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in drama/theater arts in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 9.3 percent (55/591) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 6.1 percent (34/560) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts was reported in 147 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 462 faculty was \$33,784. This average salary was 11.5 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts was reported in 151 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 448 faculty was \$38,538. This average salary was 12 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in drama/theater arts after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.1 percent (\$38,538 minus \$33,784 equals \$4,754). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 1.2 percent or .4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts (14.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .6 percent (14.7% minus 14.1% equals .6%) more than faculty in drama/theater arts.

In the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 25 percent vs. 36 percent (1989--90), respectively; and 25 percent vs. 35 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in drama/theater arts was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.1 percent (28/462) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/-25,703), respectively, and the same in the 1992-93 private study: 4.2 percent (19/448) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of drama/theater arts and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 2,061 (1.5%) faculty in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields of in each of the four

studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts in both the 1989-90 public and private studies were some 10 percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00). The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in drama/theater arts in both the 1992-93 public and private studies were some 11 percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00).

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in drama/theater arts in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 1.1 percent below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies. These data show that the discipline/major field of drama/theater arts in both the public and private studies is still an emerging discipline/major field in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in drama/theater arts in the 1989-90 public and private studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In the 1989-90 public study it was also higher but in the 1992-93 private study it was the same as in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of drama/theater arts is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable

reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN ECONOMICS
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted; one for public senior colleges and universities, the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including economics. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of economics in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that generally describes the systematic study of the production, conservation and allocation of resources in conditions of scarcity, together with the organizational frameworks related to these processes. Includes instruction in economic theory, micro- and macro-economics, comparative economic systems, money and banking systems, international economics, quantitative analytical methods, and applications to specific industries and public policy issues.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], pp. 144-145--45.0601).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of economics from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institu-

tions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of economics for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices a "market basket" of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Thus, comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI provides a better representation of "real" salary changes.

Reported salaries are based on a nine- or ten-month academic year contract of fulltime faculty only. Not included are faculty members teaching less than 51 percent of a typical load. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline and reflects full-time faculty only.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major

field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .30 for associate professor of economics in the 1989-90 public study means that 30 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.05 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of economics in the 1989-90 public study means an average salary of five percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of economics with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of economics was reported in 85 of the 188 public institutions reporting. The average salary of the 729 faculty was \$41,780. This average salary was approximately 7.7 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of economics was reported in 106 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 898 faculty was \$47,049. This average salary was approximately 10.1 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of economics after three years in the public institutions studied was 12.6 percent (\$47,049 minus \$41,780 equals \$5,269). The CPI increased 12.9 percent between October 1989 and October 1992. In comparison with the CPI, there was a shortfall in average faculty salaries for economics faculty over the three-year period of .3 percent, or an average of .1 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of economics (12.6%), therefore, the average salary increase for faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS was 2.4 percent (12.6% minus 10.2% equals 2.4%) less than faculty in economics.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in economics is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in both study years: 36 percent vs. 31 percent for 1989-90, and 38 percent vs. 27 percent for 1992-93. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor

and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in economics in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 6.4 percent (47/729) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 2.4 percent (22/898) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of economics was reported in 84 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 481 faculty was \$44,534 was 18.3 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of economics was reported in 130 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 633 faculty was \$50,056. This average salary was 16 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in economics after three years in the private institutions studied was 12.4 percent (\$50,056 minus \$44,534 equals \$5,522). The CPI increased 12.9 percent between October 1989 and October 1992. A more realistic comparison, therefore, is that average faculty salaries fell .5 percent behind the cost-of-living over the three-year time period (or .17 percent each year).

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518) compared to only 12.4 percent for economics faculty;

therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 2.3 percent more than faculty in economics.

In the discipline/major field of economics, the faculty mix percentage is the same at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study (31 percent vs. 31 percent); and lower at the professor rank compared to the assistant professor rank in the 1992-93 study (29 percent vs. 31 percent). The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in economics in private institutions was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 5.2 percent (25/481) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3 percent (19/633) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of economics and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 2,741 (1.5%) faculty in the discipline/major field of economics participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of economics in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some eight percent and 18 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of economics in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 10 percent and 16 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI increased 12.9 percent from October 1989 to October 1992, and indicates that the faculty in economics in the public institutions received an average annual salary which lagged .1 percent behind the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .5 percent behind the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of economics the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies. In the private study of 1989-90 the FAC MIX PCTS are the same, and in the 1992-93 study the professor rank is higher.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in economics was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for the 1989-90 public study but lower in the 1992-93 study. In the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies the hiring rate was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of economics is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN EDUCATION
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including education. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of education in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the theory and practice of learning and teaching, and related research, administrative and support services.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 74--13.)]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of education from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also parti-

cipated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of education for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or 10-month academic year salary of fulltime faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .30

for associate professor of education in the 1989-90 public study means that 30 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.00 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of education in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 0 percent higher, or the same, as the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of education with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of education was reported in 96 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,830 faculty was \$38,956. This average salary was approximately .04 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of education was reported in 138 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 2,833 faculty was \$41,464. This average salary was approximately 3.1 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of education after three years in the public institutions studied was 6.4 percent (\$41,464 minus \$38,956 equals \$2,508). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in education average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 6.5 percent or an average of 2.2 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of education (6.4%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 3.8 percent (10.2% minus 6.4% equals 3.8%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of education.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in education is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 36 percent vs. 29 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is also higher: 34 percent vs. 33 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage

at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in education in the public studies was higher than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 7.2 percent (131/1,830) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 4.7 percent (133/2,833) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of education was reported in 183 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,029 faculty was \$34,358. This average salary was 9.6 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of education was reported in 214 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,406 faculty was \$38,224. This average salary was 13 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in education after three years in the private institutions studied was 11.3 percent (\$38,224 minus \$34,358 equals \$3,866). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 1.6 percent or .5 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus

\$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of education (11.3%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 3.4 percent (14.7% minus 11.3% equals 3.4%) more than faculty in education.

In the discipline/major field of education, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 31 percent vs. 32 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 26 percent vs. 41 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in education was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6.7 percent (69/1,029) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 6 percent (84/1,406) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of education and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 7,098 (5.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field of education participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated

in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of education in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were even with and nine percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in education in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of 2.2 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .5 percent below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of education the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies but just the opposite is true for both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in education in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In the private studies the hiring rate was higher in 1989-90 but lower in 1992-93.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of education is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
ENGINEERING
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including engineering. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of engineering in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that prepares individuals to apply mathematical and scientific principles to the solution of practical problems for the benefit of society.

[A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 85--14.).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of engineering from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 insti-

tutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of engineering for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or 10-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major

field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .31 for associate professor of engineering in the 1989-90 public study means that 31 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.18 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of engineering in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 18 percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of engineering with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of engineering was reported in 54 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,503 faculty was \$47,311. This average salary was approximately 22 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of engineering was reported in 47 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,407 faculty was \$52,854. This average salary was approximately 24 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of engineering after three years in the public institutions studied was 12 percent ($\$52,854$ minus $\$47,311$ equals $\$5,543$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year period, is .9 percent or .3 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of engineering (11.7%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 1.5 percent (11.7% minus 10.2% equals 1.5%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of engineering.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in engineering is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 38 percent vs. 28 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 39 percent vs. 27 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public

studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90), and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 4.3 percent (64/1503) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and the same in 1992-93, 4.3 percent (61/1,407) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of engineering was reported in 49 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,248 faculty was \$49,032. This average salary was 30.2 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of engineering was reported in 47 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,332 faculty was \$56,123. This average salary was 30 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in engineering after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.5 percent (\$56,123 minus \$49,032 equals \$7,091). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries in engineering over the three-year time period, is 1.6 percent or .53 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of engi-

neering (14.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .2 percent (14.7% minus 14.5% equals .2%) more than faculty in engineering.

In the discipline/major field of engineering, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in 1989-90: 40 percent vs. 29 percent, respectively; and higher also in 1992-93: 41 percent vs. 25 percent, respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 3.8 percent (48/1,248) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 2.8 percent (37/1,332) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of engineering and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total 5,490 (4%) faculty in the discipline/major field of engineering participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of engineering in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some 22 percent and 30 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in the discipline/major field of engineering in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 24 percent and 30 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in engineering in the public institutions received an average annual salary of .4 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary was .53 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of engineering the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering in the 1989-90 public and private studies was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS. In the 1992-93 public study the hiring rate was the same, and in the 1992-93 private study it was lower.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of engineering is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
ENGINEERING-RELATED TECHNOLOGIES

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including engineering-related technologies. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that prepare individuals to apply basic engineering principles and technical skills in support of engineering and related projects.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 93--15).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies from the "base-line year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from

those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of engineering-related technologies for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or 10-month academic year salary of fulltime faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .35 for associate professor of engineering-related technologies in the 1989-90 public study means that 35 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of 1.01 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is one percent higher than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies was reported in 53 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 730 faculty was \$37,644. This average salary was approximately 3 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies was reported in 60 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 793 faculty was \$42,420. This average salary was approximately .8 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies after three years in the public institutions studied was 12.7 percent ($\$42,420$ minus $\$37,644$ equals $\$4,776$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year period, is .2 percent or .06 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies (12.7%); therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 2.5 percent (12.7% minus 10.2% equals 2.5%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in engineering-related technologies is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor

rank in the 1989-90 study: 22 percent vs. 34 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 24 percent vs. 34 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering-related technologies in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 4.4 percent (32/730) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 2.9 percent (23/793) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/-42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies was reported in 14 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 93 faculty was \$38,761. This average salary was 2.9 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/-major field of engineering-related technologies was reported in 11 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 89 faculty was \$44,818. This average salary was 3.8 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in engineering-related technologies after three years in the private institutions studied was 15.6 percent (\$44,818 minus \$38,761 equals \$6,057). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time

period, is 2.7 percent or .9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies (15.6), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .9 percent (15.6% minus 14.7 equals .9) less than faculty in engineering-related technologies.

In the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in: 24 percent vs. 44 percent (1989-90), respectively; and higher 29 percent vs. 26 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering-related technologies was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 1.1 percent (1/93) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.4 percent (3/89) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,705 (1.2%) faculty in the discipline/major field engineering-related

technologies participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some three percent below and three percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in engineering-related technologies in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were one percent below and four percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in engineering-related technologies in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .06 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .9 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs were lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both public studies and in the 1989-90 private study but higher in the 1992-93 private study.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in engineering-related technologies in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of engineering-related technologies is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a

valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN
ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE/LETTERS
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines/major fields including English language and literature/letters. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the structure and use of the English language and dialects, speech, writing, and various aspects of the literatures and cultures of the English-speaking peoples.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 110--23).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the

trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or 10-month academic year salary of fulltime faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .25 for associate professor of English language and literature/letters in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .94 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is six percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters was reported in 184 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 4,079 faculty was \$35,206. This average salary was approximately 10.2 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, English language and literature/letters was reported in 182 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 4,168 faculty was \$38,556. This average salary was approximately 10.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 43,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters after three years in the public institutions studied was 9.5 percent (\$38,556 minus \$35,206 equals \$3,350). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in English language and literature/letters average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 3.4 percent or an average of 1.1 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equal \$3,957). In comparison to English language and literature/letters (9.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of .7 percent (10.2% minus 9.5% equal .7%) more than faculty in English language and literature/letters.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in English language and literature/letters is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant pro-

fessor rank in the 1989-90 study: 33 percent vs. 29 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 32 percent vs. 29 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in English language and literature/letters in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 5.4 percent (219/4,079) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.9 percent (162/4,168) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters was reported in 282 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 2,356 faculty was \$34,916. This average salary was 7.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, English language and literature/letters was reported in 282 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 2,501 faculty was \$39,832. This average salary was 8.4 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in English language and literature/letters after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.1 percent (\$39,832 minus \$34,916 equals \$4,916). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries of English language

language and literature/letters over the three-year time period, is 1.2 percent or .4 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43, 175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to English language and literature/letters (14.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by .6 percent (14.7% minus 14.1% equal .6%) more than faculty in English language and literature/letters.

In the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 34 percent vs. 30 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 35 percent vs. 31 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in English language and literature/letters was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 5.2 percent (122/2,356) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and lower in the 1992-93 private study: 4 percent (100/2,501) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were

conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 13,104 (9.6%) faculty in the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some nine percent and seven percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in English language and literature/letters in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were 10 percent and eight percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in English language and literature/letters in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase 1.1 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .4 percent above the cost-of-living.

Third, in English language and literature/letters the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies. These data show that the discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters, in both the public and private studies, is firmly established and on going in the academy.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in English language and literature/letters in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private stu-

dies in lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of English language and literature/letters is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY
IN
FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES
FOR THE YEARS
1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including foreign languages and literatures. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures in the CIP is as follows:

A summary of groups of instructional programs that describe the study of languages other than English, and the study of related aspects of foreign literatures and cultures.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 99--16.).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from

those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of foreign languages and literatures for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or 10-month academic year salary of fulltime faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .29 for associate professor of foreign languages and literatures in the 1989-90 public study means that 29 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .95 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is five percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures was reported in 159 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,380 faculty was \$35,945. This average salary was approximately 7.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, foreign languages and literatures was reported in 160 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 1,500 faculty was \$38,113. This average salary was approximately 9.3 percent lower than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures after three years in the public institutions studied was 8.8 percent ($\$39,113$ minus $\$35,945$ equals $\$3,168$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in foreign languages average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 4.1 percent or an average of 1.4 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures (8.8%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries of 1.4 percent (10.2% minus 8.8% equals 1.4%) less than faculty in foreign languages and literatures.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in foreign languages and literatures is lower at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 29 percent vs. 32 percent, and in the 1992-93 study

it is 28 percent vs. 33 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in foreign languages in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 5.1 percent (70/1,380) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and higher in 1992-93, 5.5 percent (82/1500) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures was reported in 237 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,387 faculty was \$34,449. This average salary was 9.3 percent lower than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, foreign languages and literatures was reported in 246 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 1,541 faculty was \$39,238. This average salary was 10 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in foreign languages and literatures after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.0 percent (\$39,238 minus \$34,449 equals \$4,789). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries of foreign languages and literatures over the three-year time period, is 1.1 percent or .37 percent each

year above the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/majc. field of foreign languages and literatures (14.0%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 0.7 percent (14.7% minus 14.5% equals 0.7%) more than faculty in foreign languages and literatures.

In the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is lower at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 25 percent vs. 33 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 26 percent vs. 35 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in foreign languages and literatures was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 6 percent (83/1,387) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and also higher in the 1992-93 private study: 5 percent (77/1,541) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/-major field of foreign languages and literatures and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 5,808 (4.3%) faculty in the discipline/major field of foreign lan-

guages and literatures participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were some seven percent and nine percent below the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in foreign languages and literatures in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were eight percent and nine percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in foreign languages and literatures in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .9 percent each year below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .37 percent each year above the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, and the same is true both in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in foreign languages and literatures was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study and higher in the 1992-93 study. In the private studies the hiring rate was higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 studies.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the

individual academic discipline/major field of foreign languages and literatures is being developed, it is anticipated that this current information will be a valuable reference tool for interested administrators and professors.

SALARY-TREND STUDY OF FACULTY IN GEOGRAPHY

FOR THE YEARS

1989-90 AND 1992-93

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted annual national faculty salary studies by discipline and rank each year through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including geography. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of geography in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the systematic study of the spatial distribution and interrelationships of people, natural resources, plant and animal life. Includes instruction in historical and political geography, cultural geography, economic and physical geography, regional science, cartographic methods, remote sensing, spatial analysis, and applications to areas such as land-use planning, development studies, and analyses of specific countries, regions, and resources.*

[*A Classification of Instructional Programs (Washington, D.C.: National Center for Education Statistics, [1990], p. 146--45.0701).]

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of geography from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions (Table 1). Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC

study of 1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUJA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries of geography faculty for both public and private participating institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Thus by comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI, a more precise representation of "real" salary increases is yielded.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The average salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a

given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .28 for associate professor of geography in the 1989-90 public study means that 28 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank of a given discipline/major field is the ratio of the average salary to the total average salary of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .98 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of geography in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 2 percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of geography with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular import to the reader is noting the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

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RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of geography was reported in 105 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 586 faculty was \$39,234. This average salary was approximately 1.1 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of geography was reported in 99 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 573 faculty was \$43,256. This average salary was approximately 1.2 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of geography after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.3 percent ($\$43,256$ minus $\$39,234$ equals $\$4,022$). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average salaries of geography faculty over the three-year period, is 2.6 percent or .9 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent ($\$42,746$ minus $\$38,789$ equals $\$3,957$). In comparison to the discipline/major field of geography (10.3), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative annual increase in their salaries of 0.1 percent (10.3% minus 10.2% equals 0.1%) less than faculty in the discipline/major field of geography.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in geography is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 40 percent vs. 29 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 41 percent vs. 27 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks

of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geography in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 3.6 percent (21/586) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 3.5 percent (20/573) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,800), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of geography was reported in 18 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 56 faculty was \$39,478. This average salary was 4.8 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of geography was reported in 18 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 58 faculty was \$41,561. This average salary was 3.9 percent lower than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in geography after three years in the private institutions studied was 5.3 percent (\$41,561 minus \$39,478 equals \$2,083). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average geography faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is 7.6 percent or 2.5 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus

\$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of geography (5.3), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 9.4 percent (14.7% minus 5.3 equals 9.4%) more than faculty in geography.

In the discipline/major field of geography, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in the 1989-90 study is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank: 36 percent vs. 34 percent, and it was lower in the 1992-93 study: 28 percent vs. 41 percent, respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-90), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geography was higher than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: 7.1 percent (4/56) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and higher in the 1992-93 private study: 5.2 percent (3/58) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of geography and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,273 (.9%) faculty in the discipline/major field of geography participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary factors in the discipline/major field of geography in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were one percent and five percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively. The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in geography in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were one percent above and four percent below the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00), respectively.

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989, and indicates that the faculty in geography in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .9 percent below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was 2.5 percent below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of geography the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies, but in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are lower than those in the assistant professor rank.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geography in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public studies is lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS but in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 private studies the hiring rate is higher than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of geography is being developed, it is anticipated that future articles on this subject will become more valuable for interested administrators and professors.

Since 1982-83 the College and University Personnel Association (CUPA) in Washington, D.C., in cooperation with Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, has conducted national faculty salary studies annually by discipline and rank through 1992-93. Each year two separate studies are conducted, one for public senior colleges and universities, and the other for private senior colleges and universities.

Salary data for each study were collected and tabulated for full-time teaching faculty in 39 selected academic disciplines including geology. The disciplines were chosen from among those defined by A Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), 1990. The definition of the discipline/major field of geology in the CIP is as follows:

An instructional program that describes the scientific study of the earth; the forces acting upon it; and the behavior of the solids, liquids and gases comprising it. Includes instruction in historical geology, geomorphology, sedimentology, the chemistry of rocks and soils, stratigraphy, mineralogy, petrology, geostatistics, volcanology, glaciology, geophysical principles, and applications to research and industrial problems.

This article presents a summary of the overall average salary increases in the discipline/major field of geology from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 to and including the "trend year" of 1992-93 for both public and private institutions. Of the 278 institutions which participated in CUPA's PUBLIC study of

1989-90, 188 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 188 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year. Of the 460 institutions which participated in CUPA's PRIVATE study of 1989-90, 297 also participated in 1992-93. Data from those same 297 institutions were used in both the baseline year and the trend year.

This article lists the average salaries in geology for both public and private institutions by rank, including NEW ASST PROF (new assistant professor), the FAC MIX PCT (faculty mix percentage) and the SALARY FACTOR. In addition, comparisons are made with the CPI (Consumer Price Index) of changes in cost-of-living between the two studies for each of the two study years (1989-90 and 1992-93).

The CPI uses a base period of 1982-84 and is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter and fuels, transportation, medical care, entertainment, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. In examining trends in faculty salary, it is important to consider any changes in the purchasing power of salaries due to inflation. Comparing changes in the faculty salaries with the CPI provides a more precise representation of "real" salary increases.

The salary is based on a nine- or ten-month academic year salary of full-time faculty only. It does not include any faculty members teaching less than 51 percent. Salary for summer academic work, fringe benefits, and perquisites are not included in the salary data. The average salary is based on the study information with the assumption that all employees are full-time. The salary displayed is an average of all faculty salaries reported for a given rank and discipline.

The "NUM" means the number of faculty members whose salaries were included to compute the average salary.

The "N/IN" means the number of institutions that reported salary data for a given academic rank and discipline/major field.

The FAC MIX PCT is the percentage of faculty in a given discipline/major field who hold a given academic rank. For example, a FAC MIX PCT factor of .32 for associate professor of geology in the 1989-90 public study means that 32 percent of the faculty in that discipline/major field hold the rank of associate professor.

The SALARY FACTOR for a given rank is the ratio of the average salary for a given discipline/major field to the average salary for all disciplines of all institutions in each of the four studies: PUBLIC 1989-90, PUBLIC 1992-93, PRIVATE 1989-90 and PRIVATE 1992-93. For example, a SALARY FACTOR of .97 for associate professors in the discipline/major field of geology in the 1989-90 public study means that their average salary is 3 percent lower than the average salary of all associate professors in all institutions in that study.

NEW ASST PROF is the grouping of assistant professors who were hired for the first time in the fall of the study year (1989-90 or 1992-93). All information for this group was included in the ASST PROF group for reporting purposes. This group is used mainly for new hiring information.

ALL MAJOR FIELDS is the entire data base for all 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies. It is used to compare, among other things, the discipline/major field of geology with the entire data base for each study.

Of particular importance to the reader is the size of the sample on which each percentage or dollar value is based. The smaller the number in the group, the greater the effect of extreme scores on a descriptive statistic such as the average. It should be noted also that any large disparity in the sample sizes between the "baseline year" of 1989-90 and the "trend year" of 1992-93 will lessen the reliability and validity of any conclusions that one might make based on a simple comparison of averages.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PUBLIC STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PUBLIC 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of geology was reported in 92 of the 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 515 faculty was \$40,903. This average salary was approximately 5.4 percent higher than the average salary of \$38,789 for all 41,133 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 public study.

In the PUBLIC 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of geology was reported in 94 of the same 188 public institutions. The average salary of the 530 faculty was \$45,037. This average salary was approximately 5.4 percent higher than the average salary of \$42,746 for all 42,860 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 public study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in the discipline/major field of geology after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.1 percent (\$45,037 minus \$40,903 equals \$4,134). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. In comparison with the CPI, there was a relative increase in geology average faculty salaries over the three-year period by 2.8 percent or an average of .9 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the public institutions studied was 10.2 percent (\$42,746 minus \$38,789 equals \$3,957). In comparison to the discipline/major field of geology (10.1%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS received a relative increase in their salaries over three years of .1 percent point (10.2% minus 10.1% equals .1%) more than faculty in the discipline/major field of geology.

The reader may note that the faculty mix percentage in geology is higher at the professor rank than at the assistant professor rank in the 1989-90 study: 50 percent vs. 17 percent, and in the 1992-93 study it is 54 percent vs. 18 percent, respectively. The differences in faculty mix percentage at the ranks

of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both public studies are as follows: 35 percent vs. 29 percent (1989-90) and 35 percent vs. 30 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geology in the public studies was lower than the hiring rate of ALL MAJOR FIELDS in 1989-90, 3.7 percent (19/515) vs. 5.5 percent (2,249/41,133), respectively; and lower in 1992-93, 2.6 percent (14/530) vs. 4.3 percent (1,862/42,860), respectively.

RESULTS OF THE TWO PRIVATE STUDIES, 1989-90 AND 1992-93

In the PRIVATE 1989-90 salary study in the above table, the reader may note that the discipline/major field of geology was reported in 49 of the 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 164 faculty was \$43,311. This average salary was 15 percent higher than the average salary of \$37,657 for all 25,703 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study.

In the PRIVATE 1992-93 salary study in the above table, the discipline/major field of geology was reported in 53 of the same 297 private institutions. The average salary of the 176 faculty was \$48,714. This average salary was 12.8 percent higher than the average salary of \$43,175 for all 26,888 faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1992-93 private study.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in geology after three years in the private institutions studied was 12.5 percent (\$48,714 minus \$43,311 equals \$5,403). The CPI of increased cost-of-living between October 1989 and October 1992 was 12.9 percent. A more realistic increase, therefore, in the average faculty salaries over the three-year time period, is .4 percent or .13 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

The increase in average salaries for all faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS after three years in the private institutions studied was 14.7 percent (\$43,175 minus \$37,657 equals \$5,518). In comparison to the discipline/major field of geology

(12.5%), therefore, the faculty in ALL MAJOR FIELDS increased their salaries by 2.2 percent points (14.7% minus 12.5% equals 2.2%) more than faculty in geology.

In the discipline/major field of geology, the reader may note that the faculty mix percentage is higher at the professor rank in comparison to the assistant professor rank in both studies: 52 percent vs. 16 percent (1989-90), respectively; and 48 percent vs. 19 percent, (1992-93), respectively. The differences in the ranks of professor and assistant professor in ALL MAJOR FIELDS for both private studies are as follows: 32 percent vs. 31 percent (1989-1990), and 32 percent vs. 32 percent (1992-93), respectively.

Finally, the reader may note that the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geology was lower than the hiring rate in ALL MAJOR FIELDS in the 1989-90 private study: .6 percent (1/164) vs. 5.4 percent (1,382/25,703), respectively, and also lower in the 1992-93 private study: 3.4 percent (6/176) vs. 4.2 percent (1,122/26,888), respectively.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This article presented salary-trend information on the academic discipline/major field of geology and compared that information with ALL MAJOR FIELDS and with the CPI over a period of three years from the "baseline year" of 1989-90 through the "trend year" of 1992-93. Two studies, one for public institutions, and the other for private institutions were conducted for the baseline year and for the trend year--a total of four studies. A total of 1,385 (1%) faculty in the discipline/major field of geology participated and were included in the 39 disciplines/major fields in each of the four studies and in the overall total of 136,584 participating faculty. The same 188 public institutions and the same 297 private institutions in the United States participated in the baseline year and in the trend year.

Although many interpolations and extrapolations of the data may be made, a few of the more important ones are as follows. First, the average faculty salary in the discipline/major field of geology in 1989-90 in the public and private studies were respectively some 5 percent and 15 percent above the average faculty salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00). The average faculty salary factors for all ranks in geology in 1992-93 in the public and private studies were respectively 5 percent and 13 percent above the average salary factors for all ranks in ALL MAJOR FIELDS (1.00).

Second, the CPI of October 1992 increased 12.9 percent from the CPI of October 1989. This indicates that the faculty in geology in the public institutions received an average annual salary increase of .9 percent each year below the cost-of-living. In the private institutions the annual average salary increase was .13 percent each year below the cost-of-living.

Third, in the discipline/major field of geology the professor rank FAC MIX PCTs are significantly higher than those in the assistant professor rank in both the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies. These data show that geology is an established discipline in academia.

Finally, the hiring rate of new assistant professors in geology in the 1989-90 and 1992-93 public and private studies was lower than in ALL MAJOR FIELDS.

Now that a rather significant data base of average faculty salaries in the individual academic discipline/major field of geology is being developed, it is anticipated that future articles on this subject will become more valuable for interested administrators and professors.
