ABSTRACT

This paper presents the Washington State Higher Education Coordinating Board's determination of approved educational costs intended to serve as the basis for general tuition and operating fees for the ensuing biennium of 1993-95. The report first explains the background of the statutory responsibilities for tuition and fee determination, followed next by an explanation of the calculations for tuition and fee rate increases, and then a list of the average budget increases in the 1991-93 and 1994-95 biennia. Increases are described as a function of increased General Fund appropriations, changes in enrollment, institutional allocation of support costs to instruction, and institutional allocation of resources between undergraduate and graduate instruction. Attachments provide: (1) detailed steps converting the educational cost per student to tuition and fee rates, (2) the statistical tables indicating how the Education Cost Study factors and ratios are used to establish the educational cost per student which in turn are used in calculating the tuition and fee rates, and (3) the composition of the "educational cost" base and enrollments used in the calculations. 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**RESOLUTION NO. 92-39**

WHEREAS, The Board is required by statute (RCW 28B.15.076) to determine and transmit amounts constituting approved undergraduate and graduate educational costs to the several boards of regents and trustees of the state institutions by November 10 of each even-numbered year; and

WHEREAS, Tuition and fees shall be based on such costs and calculated in accordance with the provisions of RCW 28B.15.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the *Tuition and Fee Rates - 1993-95 Biennium* for submittal to the Office of Financial Management, the Legislature, and the boards of regents and trustees.

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**TUITION AND FEE RATES - 1993-95 BIENNIUM**

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**Background**

The Higher Education Coordinating Board has two statutory responsibilities in the determination of tuition and fee levels. First, the Board is to establish the cost basis upon which tuition and fees are based. This is done by recommending the definitions, criteria, and procedures for determining educational costs to the legislative committees on higher education for their action prior to December of every fourth year beginning in 1989. Second, the Board then determines by November 10 of each even-numbered year the "approved educational costs" which serve as the basis for general tuition and operating fee amounts for the ensuing biennium under current law.

The 1990 Education Cost Study has been used for determining costs on which the 1993-95 tuition and fee rates are based. The educational cost base used for determining tuition and fee rates includes 100 percent of the budgeted state General Fund, general Local Fund, and Operating Fee Account expenditures for academic instruction and, for community colleges, 100 percent of the total of those fund sources used for academic and vocational instruction. In addition, the educational cost base includes proportional amounts allocated from support programs (Primary Support, Libraries, Student Services, Institutional Support and Plant Operations and Maintenance); again using only budgeted state General Funds, general Local Funds, and Operating Fee Account expenditures.

Based on the 1990 Education Cost Study, the appropriate proportional amounts from the support programs applicable to instruction, and the instruction costs derive the educational cost per FTE student. Also based on the 1990 Education Cost Study, the relationship of graduate to undergraduate cost is applied to the total educational cost per FTE student to establish the separate undergraduate and graduate costs per FTE student upon which tuition and fee rates are based.

Calculation of the tuition and fees rates is dictated by statute. The operating fee is a percentage of educational cost and varies from 23 percent at the community colleges to 33 percent at the research universities for resident students, and from 60 to 100 percent for nonresident students at the research universities and colleges, respectively. The building fee is stated in statute as a dollar amount and does not change in this calculation process. The statutory limit on changes to the services and activities fees is equal to the calculated percentage increase in undergraduate resident rates. Tables A-1 and A-2 in Appendix A show the detail of these calculations. Table A-3 indicates the three year profile of the rates as well as certain adjustments required in the Services and Activities Fees, because of bond debt costs from prior time periods.

Current law requires annual adjustments in tuition and fee levels, and a two-year "lag" in making such adjustments. The process is as follows:

- ▶ 1991-92 year budgeted expenditures and enrollments are used to calculate 1993-94 tuition and fee rates
- ▶ 1992-93 year budgeted expenditures and enrollments are used to calculate 1994-95 tuition and fee rates

The effect of this process is that rate increases lag expenditure increases by two years. This annual adjustment approach results in second year tuition increases only to the extent there are changes in expenditures and/or budgeted enrollments for the second year of the current biennium (1991-93).



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In calculating tuition and fee rates, all cost factors for Washington State University and the University of Washington are combined to reflect the average of both. Rates for the comprehensive universities and The Evergreen State College are based on the average cost factors of the three comprehensive universities, and community college rates are calculated as a system.

The technical colleges are not included in the cost base, nor are the calculated tuition and fee rates applicable to those institutions. Tuition rates at those institutions are established by the institutions under separate statutory provisions.

Tuition and fee rate increases are a function of (1) increased General Fund appropriations, (2) changes in enrollments, (3) institutional allocation of support costs to instruction, and (4) institutional allocation of resources between undergraduate and graduate instruction.

Average budget increases in the 1991-93 biennium were as follows:

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Enrollments used in the calculation of per FTE student costs reflect reporting adjustments as well as authorized increases since the 1989-91 biennium. All branch campus enrollments are included. The magnitude of these increases and adjustments are as follows:

Because enrollment changes were funded differently for each institution, the effects of these changes in conjunction with the General Fund changes are not uniform. The increases in the 1993-95 resident tuition and fee rates reflecting these combined factors are shown on Table 3.
