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ABSTRACT

This publication provides one-paragraph descriptions of projects funded by the Office of Educational Research and Improvement of the U.S. Department of Education to state and public libraries under the Foreign Language Materials Acquisition Program, Title V of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA). In fiscal year 1993, 104 applications were received and 30 grants (29 to local libraries and one to a state library) totalling one million dollars were made to support the efforts of local libraries in 13 states to develop foreign language materials collections. Thirty percent of the available funding was designated for grants of between \$35,000 and \$125,000. The rest of the grants ranged from \$8,000 to \$35,000. Seventeen projects rely exclusively on Spanish language materials; others include Asian, Russian, and multilanguage materials. Grant funds are used for the purchase of books, magazines, newspapers, audio and videocassettes, and computer software. The materials support educational and instructional library programs and services, as well as adult education programs and literacy efforts. They supplement materials available to school-age children and support preschool story hours, enabling parents to read to children in their native languages. They supply current information, particularly through magazines and newspapers, to seniors, adults, young adults, and children across the United States. (KRN)

## Library Programs

### Grants Awarded to State and Public Libraries To Acquire Foreign Language Materials – Fiscal Year 1993

In mid-July 1993, the U.S. Department of Education awarded nearly \$1 million in grants under the Foreign Language Materials Acquisition Program, Title V of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA). The 30 grants (29 to public libraries and 1 to a state library) will support projects in 13 states. Seventeen projects rely exclusively on Spanish language materials; others include Asian, Russian, and multilanguage materials. The aim of the program is to support the efforts of local libraries to develop foreign language materials collections that serve the needs of their communities.

In fiscal year 1993, 104 applications for more than \$3 million in funding were received; 30 grants totaling \$968,000 were awarded. By law, 30 percent of the funds available—or \$290,000—were designated for grants of between \$35,000 and \$125,000 (large grants). Each of the rest of the grants could not exceed \$35,000 (small grants). Since FY 91 when the program was first funded, nearly \$3 million have been awarded and 90 projects funded.

Grant funds are for the purchase of foreign language books, magazines, newspapers, audio- and videocassettes, and computer software. These materials enable libraries to establish or improve library services to people who are fluent in a language other than English. The materials support educational and instructional library programs and services, as well as adult education programs and literacy efforts. They supplement materials available to school-age children and support preschool story hours, enabling parents to read to their children in their native languages. They supply current information, particularly through magazines and newspapers, to seniors, adults, young adults, and children across the United States.

Common themes are echoed in many of the grant applications. During the last decade libraries across the nation have reported dramatic changes in populations served and significant increases in the requests for materials in a variety of formats and languages. Information from the 1990 census confirms the demographic changes that libraries report. At the same time, libraries indicate that funding and economic conditions have often affected their ability to offer new or additional services. Rather than expand and develop new materials in their collections, libraries must often respond to requirements that their collections, staff, number of buildings, and hours of service be reduced because of budgetary limitations. Libraries across the United States—large urban systems with numerous branches, suburban systems, and small community systems—are confronting the same issues: How to do more with less and how to provide traditional library services and outreach to new members of the community with reduced resources.

The projects funded will enable 30 libraries throughout the country to improve direct services to their communities. Library patrons will have increased access to informational, educational, and recreational materials in appropriate languages, in both print and nonprint formats. The Foreign Language Materials Acquisition Program (LSCA Title V) is administered by the Office of Library Programs within the Office of Educational Research and Improvement of the U.S. Department of Education.


