ABSTRACT

A study was conducted to evaluate the career programs at William Rainey Harper College (WRHC) (Illinois) through a local follow-up of WRHC career alumni. Alumni who earned 48 or more credit hours during the 1991-92 year in a career major were surveyed. After two mailings and a telephone follow-up, a 73% response rate was achieved. Study findings, compared to findings about 1987-88 and 1989-90 career alumni, included the following: (1) 39.2% of the alumni were employed full time and not attending school, compared to 52.7% of the 1984 alumni; (2) 19.5% of the 1992 alumni were employed part time, and 41.9% of these indicated that they preferred part-time employment; (3) 17.3% of the 1992 alumni were presently enrolled in college full time, 23% were enrolled part time, 17.3% planned to enroll next year, and 20.7% planned to enroll at some time; (4) 37.8% of the 1992 alumni had received an associate degree in applied science, 14.8% an associate degree in science, 12.8% an associate degree in arts, and 30.4% no degree; (5) 58.4% of those who had not received a degree were still attending WRHC, and 16.8% preferred attending another college; (6) 50% of the 1992 alumni were employed in a health field, 8.2% in an office or clerical position, and 7.9% in business or finance; (7) 50.5% assessed their present position as "starting professional"; (8) 50.7% were working in a field identical to their major, and 34.4% of those not working in a job related to their major indicated that they were working in a temporary job while in transition; and (9) the average alumni salary of \$28,087 represented a 13.7% increase over the results of the 1989-90 career alumni survey. The survey instrument is included. (KP)

ABSTRACT

THE PURPOSE OF THIS STUDY WAS TO EVALUATE THE CAREER PROGRAMS AT HARPER COLLEGE THROUGH A LOCAL FOLLOW-UP STUDY OF HARPER CAREER ALUMNI. THE FOLLOW-UP STUDY OF THE 1992 HARPER CAREER ALUMNI PRODUCED A RESPONSE RATE OF 73 PERCENT. AN ANALYSIS OF THE RESULTS OF THIS SURVEY CAN BE SUMMARIZED AS FOLLOWS:

SURVEY RESULTS INDICATE THAT HARPER CAREER ALUMNI ARE GENERALLY SUCCESSFUL IN OBTAINING EMPLOYMENT WITH AN 86 PERCENT EMPLOYMENT RATE. A GOOD NUMBER OF OUR CAREER ALUMNI WORK IN AREAS THAT ARE RELATED TO THEIR MAJORS. MOST WORK IN AREAS WITHIN OUR DISTRICT AND ONLY A FEW WORK OUTSIDE OF THE STATE. LESS THAN HALF OF THE CAREER ALUMNI SURVEYED ARE CURRENTLY ATTENDING SCHOOL EITHER AT HARPER OR AT ANOTHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION. OF THOSE WHO TRANSFER TO A FOUR-YEAR INSTITUTION, MOST ATTEND EITHER NORTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY OR THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AT CHICAGO. FEW PROBLEMS WERE CITED BY STUDENTS IN TRANSFERRING THEIR COURSE WORK TO THE NEW SCHOOL.

THE AVERAGE ALUMNI SALARY OF \$28,087 WHICH REPRESENTS A 13.7 PERCENT INCREASE OVER THE RESULTS FROM OUR LAST CAREER ALUMNI SURVEY. THE MEAN SALARY HAS INCREASED STEADILY SINCE THE 1984 ALUMNI STUDY AND JOB SATISFACTION IS RATED "ABOVE SATISFIED". ABOUT 50 PERCENT OF THOSE WORKING CONSIDER THAT THEY ARE AT JOBS THAT EITHER ARE STARTING PROFESSIONAL OR HIGHER.

HARPER'S FACULTY WAS RATED AS "VERY GOOD" TO "EXCELLENT". ALSO RATED WELL WAS THE "LEARNING ATMOSPHERE" AND "COURSE SELECTION" AT HARPER. THE ALUMNI ENJOYED AND BENEFITED MOST FROM GUEST SPEAKERS ON CAMPUS. A MAJORITY OF THE ALUMNI REPORTED NEVER MAKING AN EDUCATIONAL OR VOCATIONAL CAREER CHANGE.

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PURPOSE

The purpose of this study was to evaluate the career program at Harper College through a series of follow-up studies of career alumni conducted every two years. This report summarizes the findings of the 1992 Career Alumni Study and relates them to earlier studies conducted by Harper College.

POPULATION SURVEYED

Follow-up studies were conducted among alumni who earned 48 or more hours during the 1991-1992 year at Harper College in a career major field. After two mailings of the survey form and a telephone follow-up, the return rates were:

This return rate of 73 percent insures an unbiased profile of the career alumni.

METHOD

The 1992 career alumni target population was mailed the survey instrument shown in the appendix. This form was a modification of forms developed by the Office of Planning and Institutional Research and used for past career alumni. Before being used, these forms were sent to College deans for review and revisions. The results of these surveys are compared to results of similar surveys taken in past years.

DISCUSSION OF RESULTS

There is a slight trend toward fewer career alumni students working full time. At the same time, there are more career alumni working part time. (See Chart A). However, most of the students working part time indicated a preference for part-time work or that part-time work is only temporary while the student is in a transition period of their life. The percentage of career alumni students currently enrolled in school either full time or part time decreased over the last study of the 1990 alumni but is still higher than the earlier 1988 alumni. (See Chart B).

The number of career alumni students not receiving a degree is 30.4 percent which is similar to the last three alumni studies. The most stated reason for not getting a degree is that they are still attending Harper College. The second reason is that they preferred transferring to another school. These reasons for not getting a degree are similar to our past studies.

Over 86 percent of the alumni surveyed indicated they were working. Half of the working alumni surveyed are in the health fields. This is because of the emphasis placed on the sample to survey all the nursing graduates. Business, finance, office and clerical are the next most prevalently cited areas of work. Practically one-half of the working

alumni are in jobs they consider as beginning professional. (See Chart D). Fewer of the 1992 alumni stated they were in positions less than professional when compared to prior studies. In addition, more of these students are working at jobs that are related to their major at Harper. Although there are more students working in related fields, more of the students who are not working in fields of their study said they could not find jobs in their area of study. Most of the working alumni rated their preparation of job knowledge, technical job skills and communication skills as helpful. The least helpful were managerial and job search skills. Again, this is not much different from our previous studies. Similar to prior studies, just under one-third of the working alumni supervise regularly. The mean salary of the full-time working alumni is \$28,087. (See Chart C). Chart C reflects the gradual increase of annual full-time salaries which represents a 13.7 percent increase from our last study. Two-thirds of the working alumni are employed in the Northwest suburbs and this location of employment is similar to past studies. There has been very little change in the location of employment throughout the years of this study. The job satisfaction level for the alumni has increased for the last three studies. Overall, the level of satisfaction is slightly above satisfied. As compared with past surveys, most found their jobs either on their own or through the help of friends or relatives.

Slightly less than 50 percent of the career alumni surveyed are still enrolled at Harper or at another educational institution. Other than Harper College, most of the career alumni who are currently enrolled are at Northern Illinois University or the University of Illinois at Chicago. Most of the students currently enrolled consider themselves as juniors; however, in contrast to prior studies, a large percentage of the alumni (37.9%) stated their status as sophomores. Of those enrolled, 40 percent are in the nursing and business study fields. Over half are in coursework that was identical to what they studied at Harper. The degree of course major relatedness between Harper and the current school of enrollment has remained stable throughout our studies. The experience of transferring coursework to other schools found 9 out of 10 Harper College courses transferring to the new institution. The average cost of attending the current school is \$6,484 per year. The average GPA at the new institution was 2.74 compared to the 3.20 GPA at Harper College. Normally, our past studies reflected higher GPAs at the new institution. These students rated Harper's faculty as "very good" to "excellent". Also rated well was the "learning atmosphere" and "course selection" at Harper. Rated lower were their dealings with counselors; however, even these ratings were considered "average". The most favorably rated courses that provided the most benefit to the students were nursing, data processing, biology, word processing, psychology, and dental hygiene. Courses that the students wished they would have taken centered on business, computer, and health courses.

The most common place the students used computers on campus was the instructional computers in Building D. Other locations where computers were used were the micro labs in Buildings J and I, and the word processing labs in Building I. The courses where the students used terminals or computers most are mathematics, word processing, chemistry, physics and the health fields. The 1992 career alumni reported fewer problems in getting access to computers than the past alumni. Less than 10 percent experienced access problems and when problems were cited they related to availability of labs and lack of PCs.

Three-fourths of the career alumni used the Learning Resources Center (LRC) regularly. One-half of them stated they found the LRC was easy to find and check out the material which was needed. Close to one-third found the LRC a good place to study and most of these findings are not different than what was found in prior alumni studies.

When the alumni were asked to evaluate student activities, one activity stood apart from all the rest. The most identified and beneficial student activity was guest

speakers. Other beneficial activities identified were field trips, films, and the Harbinger.

As found in past studies, two-thirds of the alumni never made an educational or vocational goal change. About one-fifth made one or more major goal changes. When asked about the Financial Aid Office, 62 percent stated they did not require or qualify for financial aid. Normally this percentage is in the 70 percent range. Close to one-fifth of the alumni received financial aid and were very satisfied with the Office.

When the alumni were attending Harper, over 85 percent were employed. On an average, the alumni worked 20 hours per week while taking classes. The nature of the work was related to the coursework at Harper. Due to their employment, most of them did not participate in school activities. In addition, the number of hours students spent in informal activities on campus per week was less than 2 hours. Only half of the alumni actually spent time studying on campus. Those who studied on campus mainly studied in the hallways throughout the campus. When asked to rate the study environment, most rated it as satisfactory. The degree of satisfaction was the same as those in prior alumni reports.

Major Conclusions

Survey results indicate that Harper Career Alumni are generally successful in obtaining employment with an 86 percent employment rate. A good number of our career alumni work in areas that are related to their majors. Most work in areas within our district and only a few work outside of the State. Less than half of the Career Alumni surveyed are currently attending school either at Harper or at another educational institution. Of those who transfer to a 4-year institution, most attend either Northern Illinois University or the University of Illinois at Chicago. Few problems were cited by students in transferring their coursework to the new school.

The average alumni salary of \$28,087 which represents a 13.7 percent increase over the results from our last career alumni survey. The mean salary has increased steadily since the 1984 alumni study and job satisfaction is rated "above satisfied". About 50 percent of those working consider that they are at jobs that either are starting professional or higher.

Harper's faculty was rated as "very good" to "excellent". Also rated well was the "learning atmosphere" and "course selection" at Harper. The alumni enjoyed and benefited most from guest speakers on campus. A majority of the alumni reported never making an education or vocational career change.

Percentage of Career Alumni Working




Chart B

Percentage of Career Alumni Currently Enrolled



Mean Annual Salary of Career Alumni Working Full-Time




- Re: Teacher rating form - I find it interesting that we are only asked to rate the excellent teachers and are not asked to rate the incompetents. Is Harper afraid to hear some teachers are worthless?

- I think it is wonderful that the community has a junior college such as Harper. Harper benefits young and old alike, there seems to be no age discrimination - keep up the good work! It meets many people's needs.
- I was a BS in Chemistry and at Harper I went into Data Processing. Unfortunate thing is that many top banks and companies in downtown Chicago do not recognize Harper College studies. So at times I feel disgusted - Harper is excellent.
- Harper is a fine school to attend.
- I expect most of my work related answers to change this spring after my graduation from the Nursing program. My AS Degree was obtained so I would be able to go on to a four-year colleges for my BSN. The instructors have been great! I found the LRC a good place to study, especially for small group study in private rooms.
- I think the Nursing Program - for RNs - should be made a 3-year program. It has been a 2-year course forever and have added so much along the years - it's overwhelming. Should become 3-year - could retain material better.
- Taking the Accounting classes were very discouraging and hard and for a secretarial student you felt they were unnecessary.
- Very good school.
- I have told all my friends at college that were entering freshman last semester how good all the teachers were at Harper, and that I was able to learn the material easily in the much small classes than they have at Northern.
- Child Development Program was very good.
- Parking is terrible and the campus is too open for the Winter season.
- The survey was not filled out because of the type of questions. Why do you think you have a right to this information - employees salary. When you can write a survey that has to do with education, I will take the time to fill it out.
- I enjoyed the "mature" aura of the campus during night classes.
- The Publications Department is the best department on the campus, but the Editorial Supervisor's Office is way too small.
- I found Harper provided me with a wonderful learning experience. I was extremely disappointed in class withdrawal procedures. Four of my classes were canceled and I was never notified ahead of time. It was an inconvenience and was difficult to find classes to make up for the lost hours.
- It needs to remember that it works for the community and the students - get rid of the politics.
- I enjoyed my learning experiences while at Harper.
- You should expand the telecourses. I took several through Chicago Citywide and transferred them back because I was recuperating from an illness and it better suited my situation. ENG/101 and 102 were excellent courses and should be available to Harper students also.
- Concerning my program, Fashion Design, for the amount of work we had to complete at home and even in class, I feel we were not given a fair amount of credit hours for our courses. The homework I received in this class surpassed all homework I received in other classes like English and Social Sciences by far. I don't think the school really realizes how much work the program takes and ought to review it.
- For the AS Degree in Supr. Adm. Mgmt., there were too many courses, not always offered or available. Because of the quantity and lack of class offerings I am at Harper longer than I would have liked to be. I was 18 when I started and when I am finally done I will be 23! Harper should consider condensing some of the programs! The only other "complaint" I have of Harper is the parking lot conditions when there is snow and ice. Since I am not transferring, Harper has been a good choice for me.
- In my field I go to school part time. They did not offer a lot of classes both semesters/hours.
- Have a program or degree for CAD with new software 3D studio, rendering different CAD software, and equipment, C-scanners, Desk Jets.

- I was very glad for Robert Laws because without his help would not have been able to further my education -- Thank You.
- I was very pleased with the way Harper handled almost everything. It was very easy to register - the facilities were enjoyable and clean. I wanted to be at Harper. The Fashion Department was wonderful.
- They were very mean in the Financial Aid Office. Also, I think it would have been more beneficial to you if I could have filled this form out after I graduated in May and found a job related to the degree I am obtaining - just a thought!

Re: Study space, the new furniture is very comfortable. The hallways are usually a quiet, nice place to study.
- Great junior College - price is right. Needed more group work and student feedback in some courses. I believe the grade a student receives almost always reflects the teacher's teaching ability. Elmhurst is an excellent example.




