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
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ABSTRACT

This directory of social programs that focus on the African-American male lists 145 programs grouped by state. Information for each program includes the sponsoring organization and contact person and a brief description of program goals and the target population. The programs deal with a variety of issues, but there is an emphasis on sex education and pregnancy prevention, as well as on dropout prevention and crime prevention. Programs are for elementary and secondary school students, but many concentrate on the adolescent. (SLD)


