ABSTRACT

Fall 1993 transfer data are provided for the City College of San Francisco (CCSF), highlighting the number of students transferring to the University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU). The first section of the report provides statewide transfer data for the community colleges with the highest transfer rates overall to UC and CSU. The second section explains two different ways of calculating transfer rates, one defined by the UCLA Transfer Assembly and the other by Berman-Weiler Associates (BWA). Finally, information is presented on the ethnicity of CCSF students who transfer to the UC and CSU systems. Study highlights include the following: (1) CCSF is among the top 10 California community colleges in terms of combined transfers to the CSU and UC systems, ranking eighth; (2) CCSF ranks third in the state, in terms of students transferring to the CSU system in 1992-93; (3) CCSF has a 1994 transfer rate of 26.35% according to the Transfer Assembly, which reports a transfer rate for all California community colleges of 19% and a national transfer rate of 22%; (4) according to the BWA transfer rate formula, CCSF has a transfer rate of 18.7% for the 1989-90 school year, compared with a national average for all large community colleges of 15%; (5) although overall transfer numbers for CCSF are high, the fall 1993 transfer rates of African Americans (1.1%), Chicanos (3.2%), and Latino students (4.3%) transferring to the UC system are low; and (6) Asian students comprise 42.5% of all CCSF transfers to the UC and CSU systems combined in fall 1992. 

DATA HIGHLIGHTS

- City College of San Francisco is among the top ten California Community Colleges in the state that transfer to the University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU) systems combined. CCSF ranks eighth according to the California Postsecondary Education Commission (CPEC).
- City College ranks third among California Community Colleges transferring to the Cal State University system in the 1992-93 academic year.
- CCSF has a transfer rate of 26.35% in 1994 according to The Transfer Assembly (Center for the Study of Community Colleges, UCLA). CCSF's transfer rate is higher than the overall California Community College (CCC) transfer rate of 19%, and the national community college transfer rate of 22%.
- According to the transfer rate formula developed by the Berman/Weiler Associates, CCSF has a transfer rate of 18.71% for the 1989-90 school year. The average transfer rate for all large community colleges is 15%.
- Although overall transfer numbers for City College are high, the numbers of African American and Chicano/Latino students transferring to the UC system are low.
- Asian students comprise 42.5% of all CCSF transfers to the UC and CSU systems combined in Fall 1992.

CITY COLLEGE OF SAN FRANCISCO TRANSFER DATA

This report highlights current transfer data available for City College of San Francisco. Providing students with the preparation and opportunity to transfer to a four-year institution is a key element of the City College Mission Statement. The transfer process depends on many different services provided by the college, as well as the commitment and success of students who have transfer as their educational goal. This report does not focus on transfer services, student commitment or educational goals, but rather on the number of students who actually transfer to four-year institutions. The report highlights our transfer numbers to the University of California (UC) and the California State University (CSU) systems. Many of our students also transfer to private four-year institutions or out-of-state universities, but data is not currently available from these institutions.

The transfer information outlined in this report is divided into three sections. First, statewide California Community Colleges transfer numbers are provided. Information is presented on the California Community Colleges with the highest transfer numbers overall to both the UC and CSU systems. The second section explains two different ways of calculating transfer rates, one defined by the UCLA Transfer Assembly and the other by the Berman/Weiler Associates. Finally, information is presented on the City College students who transfer to the Cal State and University of California systems. The transfer numbers are presented by ethnicity only, gender and age information is not yet available.

STATEWIDE CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE (CCC) TRANSFER NUMBERS

The table below and the one on the following page show where City College of San Francisco ranks in the total numbers of students we transfer to the California State and the University of California systems. The first table shows that City College ranks eighth in the state as a top community college transfer institution from Fall 1990 to Fall 1992. Fall terms are used as they account for approximately two-thirds of the annual transfer totals. The second table explains the Community College transfers to California State Universities for the 1992-93 academic year. City College ranked third in the state with 1,094 total transfers to the California State system.

TRANSFER RATES

Transfer rate as defined by The Transfer Assembly (Center for the Study of Community Colleges, UCLA):

The Center for the Study of Community Colleges (UCLA) has completed the 1994 Transfer study. Last Fall, the City College Offices of Research and Information Technology Services (ITS) assembled a file of all students with no previous college experience who entered CCSF for the first time in Fall 1988, and earned at least twelve credits at CCSF. The Center selected out from those students the number and percentage who by Fall 1992 took at least one class at CSU or UC. Below are the results of the 1994 study, and also the results from the 1990 study which followed the cohort of students entering CCSF in 1984.

CCSF has a total transfer rate of 26.35% according to the 1994 Transfer Assembly study. This means that 26.35% of the students who were first time freshmen in the Fall of 1988 transferred to a UC or CSU campus, and had taken at least one class by the Fall of 1992. That compares favorably with the overall California community college transfer rate of 19%, and with the national community college transfer rate of 22%.

Transfer rate as defined by "The California Transfer Rate Study" (Berman/Weiler):

Based on the transfer rate formula developed by the Berman/Weiler Associates, City College of San Francisco has a transfer rate of **18.71%** for the 1989-90 academic year. This means that 18.71% of those students leaving City College in the Fall of 1989 transferred to either a CSU or UC campus. CCSF ranks second among the large urban community colleges in the state that participated in the study, and seventh for all large community colleges. The average transfer rate for large community colleges is 15%.

Berman/Weiler Associates defines a transfer rate as the number of Transfers divided by the number of Leavers (non-re-enrolling students) from one Fall term to the next, excluding students with B.A.s or those concurrently attending or on leave from a four-year university.

$$\text{Transfer Rate} = \frac{\text{Transfers}}{\text{Leavers}}$$

This definition identifies the transfer rate as the answer to the question: "What percentage of students leaving a community college go on to four-year institutions?" The following table compares the UCLA Transfer Assembly and the Berman/Weiler transfer rate definitions.

CITY COLLEGE TRANSFERS TO THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA AND CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEMS BY ETHNICITY

The tables on the next several pages outline City College transfers to the UC and CSU systems by ethnicity. The first table reports City College transfers to the UC system by ethnicity for Fall 1992 and Fall 1993. The ethnic percentage distribution at City College did not vary substantially from Fall 1992 to Fall 1993. The table shows both students who have been **admitted** each Fall, as well as how many of those students actually **enrolled**.

The next two tables focus on the transfer numbers to the UC system of two groups, African American and Chicano/Latino City College students because they are comparatively low. The tables rank the community colleges by the number of students enrolled at a University of California campus from each underrepresented group. The "Percent of Total Enrollment" column in each table shows what percentage of that college's student population is either Chicano/Latino or African American. Therefore, one can see from the first table that in the Fall of 1993 the University of California admitted 16 Chicano / Latino CCSF students, while almost 13% of our student body was Chicano / Latino. Santa Monica College on the other hand had 77 of their Chicano / Latino students admitted to the University of California, while approximately 15% of their total student enrollment was Chicano / Latino.

The final table highlights City College transfers over a five year period (Fall 1988 to Fall 1992). The numbers of Asian/Pacific Islanders transferring to the two University systems are much higher than other ethnic groups, but it should also be noted that they represent a larger portion of the overall student body than any other ethnicity at City College.
