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ABSTRACT

This report describes the results of a survey on out-of-school youth's health risk behaviors. The behaviors studied include unintentional and intentional injuries; tobacco use; alcohol, and other drug use; sexual behaviors; dietary behaviors that cause health problems; mental well being; and physical inactivity. Seventy-eight percent of all the eligible residential child care and youth services' facilities participated in this survey. Of the 1,259 respondents (age 12-18), 78 percent were male and 59 percent were over the age of 15. Results indicated that in the 30 days prior to coming to their facilities, over one third of respondents had carried a gun, 60 percent had ingested at least five drinks on at least one occasion, 20 percent had used cocaine, and nearly half had consistently smoked cigarettes. Over 80 percent of the youth had engaged in vaginal intercourse, with over half indicating having had sexual intercourse before the age of 13. Sixty percent of the males and seventy percent of the females reported having had unprotected sex during their last sexual encounter. Nearly 40 percent of females and 10 percent of males admitted to having been sexually abused. Six appendices give information on participating facilities, survey methodology, a copy of the survey, and suggestions for survey revisions. (RJM)

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report describes the results of a revised Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) for out-of-school (OOS) youth. The Out-of-School Youth Risk Behavior Survey (OOS-YRBS) contains questions on the following health risk behaviors. 1) intentional and unintentional injuries, 2) alcohol and other drug use, 3) tobacco use, 4) sexual behaviors, 5) dietary behavior and physical activity, and 6) mental well being. It also contains a few questions about perceptions of self and family.

Forty nine Residential Child Care Facilities (RCCF) and Division of Youth Services (DYS) facilities participated, with 1,259 youth completing the survey from July through December, 1992. Just over 78% of survey respondents were male and 59% were over the age of 15. Over 44% were white, 15% black, and 35% Hispanic. Survey results confirm the risk factors of youth who reside in Residential Child Care Facilities (RCCF) and Division of Youth Services (DYS) facilities. They are at considerable risk of engaging in behaviors associated with violent crimes, suicide, sexual activity, and substance use -- all behaviors associated with some of the major mortalities and morbidities of adolescents. Moreover, of particular concern is the alarming rate of sexual abuse in this population.

Out-of-school youth in Colorado are engaging in health compromising behaviors at alarming rates:

### **VIOLENCE**

- Over one-third indicated that they had carried a gun in the 30 days prior to living in the facility.
- Nearly one-half of females and one-third of males indicated that they had considered suicide.

### **DRUG USE**

- Sixty percent of youth reported that they had had at least five drinks on at least one occasion during the 30 days prior to living in the facility.
- Nearly 20% indicated that they had used cocaine during the previous 30 days and 10% indicated that they had injected drugs.

### **TOBACCO**

- Nearly half of the youth indicated they consistently smoked cigarettes during the 30 days prior to coming to their facility.

### **SEXUAL BEHAVIOR**

- Over 80% had had vaginal intercourse; over 20% had engaged in anal intercourse.
- Over half indicated that they had had sexual intercourse before the age of 13.
- Over 60% of males and 40% of females had had more than six sexual partners.
- Sixty percent of males and over 70% of females had had unprotected sex during their last sexual encounter.
- Nearly 40% of females and 10% of males reported having been sexually abused by a relative, friend, or stranger.
- Over one-third of youth indicated they had experienced or caused a pregnancy.

These data highlight the immediate need for comprehensive health education programs and services. Such programs should target prevalent risk behaviors of OOS youth and be sensitive to their unique sets of problems and concerns.

INTRODUCTION

This report describes the results of a revised Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) for out-of-school youth. FOR THE PURPOSE OF THIS PROJECT, OUT OF SCHOOL YOUTH ARE DEFINED AS ADOLESCENTS WHO RESIDE IN COLORADO JUVENILE DETENTION CENTERS AND COLORADO RESIDENTIAL CHILD CARE FACILITIES. Similar to the in-school YRBS, the purpose of this survey was to collect information about priority health risk behaviors among adolescents in Colorado. However, because out-of-school (OOS) youth have additional lifestyle issues and unique living arrangements that render many of the in-school survey questions irrelevant or difficult to answer, this survey has been substantially modified. The Out-of-School Youth Risk Behavior Survey (OOS-YRBS) contains questions on the following health risk behaviors: 1) intentional and unintentional injuries, 2) alcohol and other drug use, 3) tobacco use, 4) sexual behaviors, 5) dietary behavior and physical activity, and 6) mental well-being. It also contains a few questions about perceptions of self and family.

PARTICIPATING FACILITIES

All Residential Child Care Facilities (RCCF) operated by the Colorado Department of Social Services and all Division of Youth Services' facilities (DYS) managed by the Colorado Department of Institutions were asked to participate in the 1992 OOS-YRBS. The inclusion criteria for the selected sites were those facilities 1) serving an age range of 12 to 18 years of age and 2) housing youth who are not developmentally disabled. The location and number of participating facilities within each region in the state of Colorado is shown in Appendix 1.

Of the 63 eligible facilities throughout the state of Colorado, 49 agreed to participate, resulting in a facility response rate of 78%. Of the 1,618 students eligible to participate from these facilities, completed questionnaires were returned from 1,259 resulting in a youth participation rate of 78%. Generalization of these results to all OOS youth in Colorado other than the survey respondents should be made with caution.

## Residential Child Care Facilities

Colorado's Residential Child Care Facilities accommodate youth who are emotionally and/or behaviorally disturbed. Some of these children are severely abused and/or neglected and are often delinquent, and this is the most restrictive placement for youth with psychological problems. The daily operation of the facilities is very structured, however attempts are often made to place these youth in less restrictive and regimented facilities. Wherever the public school system cannot be utilized, a school is often attached to these facilities.

## Division of Youth Services

The Division of Youth Services maintains three general types of facilities that serve youth who are in trouble with the law. The intensive secure programs detain youth who require maximum guarded care. Medium care programs provide facilities for youth who are assessed to be less serious a threat but still need supervision. The minimum secure programs serve non-violent youth and are administered much like a military style program.

## RECRUITMENT

All eligible facilities were initially sent a memorandum from the Colorado Department of Education explaining the purpose and content of the survey, and requesting their voluntary participation in the project (See Appendix 2). A few weeks following this mailing, each facility was contacted by a member of the survey team to confirm its participation. If a facility chose to participate, a date for testing was scheduled and a person not associated with the facility (off-site tester) was assigned to administer the survey to the facility youth. It was determined that, instead of utilizing personnel from within the facility (on-site tester), an off-site tester would help ensure the youths' confidentiality of the youths' responses.

## TESTING PROTOCOL

Specific instructions were provided to the off-site testers so that the survey administration was consistent throughout all facilities. A script also was provided to the testers which was to be read verbatim to the youth so that all participants received the same directions (See Appendix 3). The script stressed protection of confidentiality to the adolescents and also defined certain sexual terms. At the conclusion of each survey session, the testers were asked to complete a facility information form and a reaction sheet to describe OOS youth's reactions to the survey. (See Appendix 4).

## HISTORY AND DEVELOPMENT OF INSTRUMENT


The OOS-YRBS was developed by individuals from the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) HIV Education Program, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Center for Studies in Family Medicine, and RCCF and DYS facilities. To maximize the ability to make comparisons with in-school survey results, wherever possible a large number of survey items were constructed to match the health risk behavior categories included in the in-school YRBS questionnaire. However, survey instructions and question stems were revised to account for the fact that youth were living in facilities. Also, additional questions were included about anal and oral intercourse, sexual abuse, violence, and perceptions of self and family. Once a draft was completed, the questionnaire was reviewed by the CDE HIV Education Program High Risk Youth Advisory Committee which included administrators, social workers, and teachers from the RCCF and DYS facilities. A pilot version of the survey was then administered to a small group of youths from two facilities and feedback was used to revise the survey (See Appendix 5). This survey was then administered to 1,259 youth at 49 facilities from July, 1992 through December, 1992.

The analysis of the survey results, the feedback from the on-site testers, and the feedback from the participating adolescents have been reviewed by the evaluation team. Based on that review, suggestions for revising the survey were developed and can be found in Appendix 6.


## OOS YOUTH CHARACTERISTICS

The first four figures describe the OOS youth in terms of age, gender, ethnicity, and length of time at current facility. Just over 78% of the youth were males and 59.2% of the youth were age 16 or over. Over 44% of the youth were white, 14.9% were black, 25.1% were Hispanic, 4.3% were Asian or American Indian, and 11.6% were other. Just over 51% of the OOS youth reported they had been at the current facility three months or less. Fifty-nine percent of all OOS youth indicated they had been in another facility at some time in the past 30 days.



**Gender**





## INTENTIONAL AND UNINTENTIONAL INJURIES

Behaviors in this section of the survey dealt with seat belt usage, drinking and driving, use of weapons, fighting, and attempted suicide.

Fifty-seven percent of OOS youth indicated they rarely or never wore a seat belt when riding in a car driven by someone else (Figure 5). Just over 60% of males and 42.8% of females reported rarely or never having worn a seat belt when driving a car.


In the 30 days prior to coming to their facility, 50.3% of females and 46.3% of males reported that they had been a passenger in a car on at least one occasion where the driver had been drinking. Almost 35% of males and 29.8% of females indicated they had driven a car after drinking at least once during the 30 days prior to coming to the facility (Figure 6).

Fifty-nine percent of the OOS youth indicated they had carried some type of weapon during the 30 days prior to coming to their present facility. Sixty-two percent of males and 45.0% of females had carried a weapon. Just over 38% of the youth reported that the weapon they had carried most often was a gun (Figure 7).


The OOS youth were asked about their involvement in physical fighting during the past 12 months. Over 80% of all males and 68.0% of all females had been involved in fights initiated by themselves. Likewise, 82.5% of the males and 72.1% of the females had been involved in fights initiated by others (Figure 8). Just over 25% of males indicated that during the past 12 months they had had a physical injury resulting from a physical fight (Figure 9).

Over 49% of females indicated they had considered suicide; 42.6% indicated they had made a plan for suicide; and, 41.3% had attempted suicide. Just over 26% of males reported that they had considered suicide; 22.1% had made plans for suicide; and, 17.9% had attempted suicide (Figure 10). Almost 15% of females and 8.1% of males had required medical attention because of an attempted suicide.



**by Gender**



**What Weapon Did You Most Often Carry\***






## DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE


**FIGURE 11**

Almost two-thirds of the OOS youth had drunk alcohol at least once during the 30 days prior to coming to their present facility (65.0% males; 70.0% females). Forty-eight percent of the youth had five or more drinks on one occasion at least once during the 30 days prior to coming to their present facility (57.7% males; 61.1% females) (Figure 11).




**FIGURE 12**

Three-fourths of the OOS youth indicated they had at one time tried marijuana (77.7% of males; 72.0% of females). And, well over 50% of the youth indicated they had used marijuana at least once during the 30 days prior to coming to their present facility (55.8% males; 56.3% females) (Figure 12).

Just over 30% of the OOS youth indicated they had ever tried cocaine (30.8% males; 34.9% females) with 19% indicating they had used cocaine during the 30 days prior to coming to their present facility (16.9% males; 23.4% females) (Figure 13). LSD, PCP, and Speed were other drugs used most often (46.4% males; 50.9% females); followed by crack/freebase (22.1% males; 30.5% females); injected drugs (10.6% males; 15.4% females) (Figure 14).

**by Gender**

**by Gender**




## TOBACCO USE

Almost 87% of females and 82.6% males reported having used tobacco in the form of cigarettes. Likewise, 55.0% of females and 48.6% of males reported smoking 20 or more days out of the 30 days before coming to their current program (Figure 15). Almost 12% of males reported using chewing tobacco and 3.9% used snuff during the 30 days before coming to their current program; while 3.3% of females used chewing tobacco and 2.2% used snuff during the 30 days before coming to their current program (Figure 16).

## SEXUAL BEHAVIORS

Behaviors in this section of the survey dealt with sexual encounters, age of first sexual encounter, number of lifetime sexual partners, use of alcohol and other drugs before the last sexual encounter, condom use, and forced sexual encounters.




**FIGURE 17**


**FIGURE 18**


**FIGURE 19**


**FIGURE 20**


**FIGURE 21**

Almost 86% of the OOS youth indicated they had engaged in vaginal intercourse; 22% reported having engaged in anal intercourse and 66% reported having engaged in oral sex (Figure 17). Of the youth who reported being sexually active, 58.2% indicated that they had had sex before the age of 13; 34.9% said they had had sex before the age of 12 (Figure 18). Both males and females reported having had multiple sex partners: 61.8% of males and 43.2% of females reported six or more lifetime partners (Figure 19). The OOS youth were asked about the use of condoms during their last sexual encounter--40.6% of males and 33.3% of females indicated they had used a condom (Figure 20). Males and females reported similar percentages when asked about the use of alcohol prior to their last sexual encounter (44.7% males; 44.6% females) (Figure 21).

Just over 39% of females and 10.8% of males indicated they had been forced into having a sexual encounter. Additionally, just over 40% of females and 12.8% of males reported having been forced into a sexual encounter with a family member or relative. Similarly, 40.7% of females and 9.8% of males reported having been forced into a sexual encounter by a friend. Almost 37% of females indicated they had been forced into a sexual encounter by a stranger; 9.8% of males reported the same (Figure 22).






**FIGURE 23**

Approximately one-third of the OOS youth indicated they had been pregnant at sometime (35.3% females) or had caused a pregnancy (33.2% males). Just over 22% of females and 11.2% of males reported having had a sexually transmitted disease (Figure 23).

At least 40% of the OOS youth reported that public school and the residential facility were the best sources of HIV/AIDS information. Over 38% of the youth identified health professionals as the best source of HIV/AIDS information, followed by the media (27.0%), parents (21.0%), and friends (12.6%) (Figure 24).

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

**Best Source of HIV/AIDS Information\***






## DIETARY BEHAVIORS AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY


**FIGURE 25**

Almost 48% of the females reported themselves as being overweight; only 18.1% of males reported the same (Figure 25). Over 61% of females and 22.2% of males reported they were trying to lose weight (Figure 26). Fewer than 19% of the students reported they had not exercised for at least 15 minutes during the past seven days; 50% indicated they had done so on five or more days (Figure 27).


## MENTAL WELL-BEING


**FIGURE 28**


**FIGURE 29**

When asked about the stress they had experienced during the past 30 days, 63.1% of females and 41.4% of the males indicated it had been "a lot" (Figure 28). Over 35% of females and 22.1% of males felt the stress they had experienced during the past 12 months affected their health "a lot" (Figure 29).




**FIGURE 30**


**FIGURE 31**

Well over half of OOS youth rated their families as "somewhat" to "extremely close." Almost 73% of males and 56.5% of females rated their families "somewhat" to "extremely close" (Figure 30). Just over 60% of males and 49.7% of females rated the amount of love and caring they received from their fathers as "some" to "a lot" (Figure 31). Almost 80% of males indicated that they received "some" to "a lot" of loving from their mothers and 68.0% of the females reported the same (Figure 32).

Almost one-quarter of the OOS youth indicated they would change practically nothing about themselves; however, 44.1% indicated they would change some things (Figure 33).

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

**by Gender**

- Nearly 40% of females and 10% of males reported having been sexually abused by a relative, friend, or stranger.

- Over one-third of youth indicated they had experienced or caused a pregnancy.

These data highlight the immediate need for comprehensive health education programs and services. Such programs should target prevalent risk behaviors of OOS youth and be sensitive to their unique sets of problems and concerns.

The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) HIV/AIDS Education Project, as part of its agreement with the Centers for Disease Control, is responsible for securing information about the risk behaviors of adolescents in Colorado. This important information is needed for planning future training and for resource development for facilities that serve high-risk youth. We are interested in using this information to gather support for the population with which you work.

To gather this information, we are requesting your assistance with administering the Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS). The purpose of this survey is to collect information about priority health risk behaviors among high-risk adolescents in Colorado. The priority health risk behavior categories include 1) intentional and unintentional injuries; 2) drug and alcohol use; 3) tobacco use; 4) sexual behaviors that result in HIV infection, other sexually transmitted diseases and unintended pregnancies; 5) dietary behaviors; and 6) physical activity.

Be sure to allow yourself enough time so that you arrive at the facility well before the scheduled testing time. Check in at the front desk or reception area. When you enter the testing area, introduce yourself to the facility contact person and indicate that you are there on behalf of the Colorado Department of Education. Ask the contact person to remain in the room with you during the entire survey process or to identify another facility employee who will do so. At this time ask the contact person to identify any adolescents who cannot or do not wish to participate in the survey. Also, inquire about any adolescents who may require help reading the survey. If there are some who need help, you may suggest to the contact person that the best way to handle this situation is to wait until the group is done taking the survey and then take those who need help into a separate room and read them the survey. Lastly, once the adolescents begin taking the survey, you cannot answer any question other than those clarifying a term.

- This group became very disruptive when I went over the sexual terms.
- They were a little hesitant but once they began the survey there were no problems.
- There was no problem with them taking the test. It seemed to just be part of the process. No resistance.
- Very cooperative group. Quiet!!
- This group was very reasonable and cooperative.
- At first this group was very rude (I interrupted a video game) but then they became very serious and quiet.
- Very intelligent group. Very serious.
- Confidentiality was a major concern for the staff as well as the youths.
- The group was cooperative.
- Quiet, serious, cooperative.
- The group was fine. The facility administrators were very worried about confidentiality of the survey.
- This group (9th) was worried if they would finish in time.
