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ABSTRACT

A survey was conducted of parents in the Wake County Public School System (WCPSS) in North Carolina. All WCPSS parents were asked their opinions on educational quality, magnet schools options, school safety, parental involvement, school environment, and school climate. Major findings indicate that generally parents expressed positive views regarding system climate with the majority of parents agreeing that the system provided high quality education and offered opportunities for success to all students. As for parental involvement, the majority of parents reported being involved in their child's education, with the greatest parental involvement at the elementary level. Most elementary parents viewed race relations and concerns related to cultural diversity as priorities. The majority of parents whose children used school transportation were satisfied. Parents' perception of their child's safety increased for all school levels in 1994. A comparison of 1994 results with those of the preceding 2 years revealed that parents' perception of the school system have remained stable. ## FALL 1994 PARENT SURVEY RESULTS

Wake County Public School System (WCPSS) parents had decidedly positive views on most issue statements (82%) concerning educational quality, magnet options, school safety, parental involvement, and school environment and climate.

This document highlights key findings and discusses those issue areas for which parents showed concern. Most of the survey items impacted climate. The actual survey items are shown in Attachment 1. Topics that follow will tap important facets of this issue for 1994-95 (for full responses see Attachment 2) and compare results to previous years (for full responses see Attachment 3).

### TOPICS FROM 1994-95

#### System Climate

Overall, WCPSS parents were pleased with the factors which affected system climate.

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### Background

The E&R Department sent out approximately 76,234 surveys. This was the fourth consecutive fall that all WCPSS parents were asked to give their opinions on issues relevant to both schools and the district.

Half of the parents (50%) returned the surveys. More elementary parents (59%) returned surveys than middle school (49%) or high school parents (31%). Because the return rate varied across grades, all results are given by school level.

The survey was fairly representative of the ethnic breakdown for the district—it varied by 2 to 9% from the district enrollment for Black and White students at each school level.

- The majority of WCPSS parents reported the system provided high quality education (from 52% high school to 63% elementary) and offered opportunities for success to all students (from 54% high school to 62% elementary).
- Over half of elementary and middle school parents believed the system promoted understanding among students (61% and 53% respectively). Parents' perception of the system was less positive at the high school level (45%).

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- Most WCPSS parents either agreed the school system was improving over time (from 42% high school to 49% elementary) or were unsure whether the system was improving (from 36% high school to 41% elementary). Few parents actually thought the system was not improving (from 22% high school to 11% elementary).
- WCPSS parents either agreed they received prompt and courteous attention when they called the central office (from 36% high school to 43% elementary) or were unsure (from 42% middle school to 46% elementary)--implying they had no contact.
- With regard to magnet schools, the majority of parents for all school levels (i.e., elementary, middle and high school) understood their options and believed magnet funding to be important. In addition, over half of WCPSS parents reported that using magnet programs to balance schools by race was preferable to increased busing.
- WCPSS parents' number one magnet program choice for future expansion was a program emphasizing principles shared by business and law (from 59% high school to 71% elementary) followed by programs preparing students for careers in agriculture, environmental industries, and the medical profession.

### School Climate

*WCPSS parents generally had positive views regarding school climate. However, these views were less positive at the higher school levels.*

- Over three fourths of all WCPSS parents reported their child's school grounds and school building were clean.
- Nearly all elementary parents reported the school staff was easy to contact (89%) and that prompt attention was given to their calls (87%). The majority of middle and high school parents reported similar views, but the positive trend was not as pronounced.
- The majority of WCPSS parents reported the climate at their child's school promoted learning (from 56% high school to 88% elementary), had a high quality education program (from 68% high school to 83% elementary) and academically challenged their child (from 59% high school to 69% elementary). In addition, over two thirds of all parents (from 65% high school to 77% elementary) thought their child received the right amount of homework.
- Middle school and elementary parents thought computers to be the most widely

used technology in their child's instructional program, whereas high school parents reported calculators were more widely used. Almost all WCPSS parents reported that classroom instruction based on computers and related technology prepares their child for the future (from 91% high school to 97% elementary).


- Over half of WCPSS parents reported they could count on the school for support regarding concerns about their child (from 50% high school to 79% elementary).
- Over two thirds of elementary parents (69%) reported students at their child's school were well behaved. This percentage decreased for middle school (46%) and was even lower for high school (35%).

### Parental Involvement

*The majority of WCPSS parents reported being involved in their child's education. The greatest parental involvement was at the elementary level with less involvement at middle school and even less at the high school level.*

- The majority of WCPSS parents were involved in their child's education both at home and school—84% elementary, 65% middle, and 53% of high school parents. A small percentage of parents reported involvement at home only or at school only (see Figure 1).

- Two thirds (63%) of elementary school parents were in the school's PTA and nearly three fourths (72%) had been contacted by the school/PTA to participate. The percentage of parents in PTA was somewhat less for secondary schools.
- Most WCPSS parents reported they were informed of their child's progress (from 69% high school to 90% elementary) and that they had seen progress in their child's learning in the past 12 months (from 70% high school to 88% elementary).
- WCPSS parents reported they were comfortable visiting their child's school (from 77% high school to 94% elementary) and that they had sufficient opportunities to be involved at their child's school (from 60% high school to 91% elementary school).
- Over one third of elementary parents (34%) and a small percentage of middle school (14%) and high school parents (14%) responded they volunteered in their child's school at least monthly. The number one reason parents gave for not volunteering was a lack of time.


## **Race Relations**

*Most elementary parents described race relations in WCPSS as good to excellent. This percentage decreased for secondary schools. Only a very small percentage of parents at any school level thought race relations were poor.*

- Most elementary parents (71%) saw race relations in their child's school as good, very good, or excellent. Parents' description of race relations was less positive at the secondary school level, with 52% of middle and 38% of high school parents rating race relations as good to excellent. The opposite trend was true for poor ratings (see Figure 2).
- Among WCPSS parents, almost equal percentages thought race relations were either improving over time or were unsure of the status on this issue. The percentage of WCPSS parents who reported race relations were improving for the district decreased 2-5% from the 1993-1994 school year. If those parents who responded "unsure" were excluded, a majority of elementary (78%) and middle school parents (64%) and about half of high school parents (49%) saw race relations as improving.

The district continues to see race relations and diversity as priorities. Staff training on these issues continues and a diversity plan for the next three years was recently approved by the Board of Education.

### Transportation

*The majority of WCPSS parents whose children used school transportation were satisfied.*


- The majority of elementary and middle school parents (53% and 55% respectively) reported the schools' transportation was good to excellent. Most high school parents responded their child's school transportation was good to excellent (33%) or that their child did not use school transportation (46%). Only a very small percentage—4% of elementary, 10% of middle, and 7% of high school parents—reported their child's school transportation was poor.
- The majority of all WCPSS parents (ranged from 57% elementary to 82% high school) responded they had no communication with their child's bus driver. Elementary parents saw communications with their child's bus driver as sufficient more often than secondary parents.

## Safety

*Parents' perception of their child's safety increased for all school levels this year.*

- The majority of parents for all levels perceived their child's school as a safe place to learn-- 92% elementary, 73% middle, and 59% of high school parents.
- The percentage of parents who believed their child's school was safe increased at all three levels this year with the greatest improvement (11%) at the high school level (see Figure 3).
- Parents' top three choices for effective measures that would decrease violence in public schools were almost identical for all school levels. Parents most often recommended:
  - 1) Stronger penalties for children who possess weapons or who are involved in violent acts,
  - 2) Training school staffs to deal with school violence, and
  - 3) Training students about conflict resolution (elementary and middle school parents' third choice) and having police officers on high school campuses (high school parents' third choice).

WCPSS has been collaborating with local law enforcement agencies and has received grants to increase efforts focused on safety. Efforts have been made to place police officers on high school campuses, enforce stronger penalties for weapons possession, train students about conflict resolution, and implement safe schools and intervention/prevention efforts. These factors may have had an impact on parents' perception of school safety. In addition, the number of violent incidents has been decreasing in WCPSS and is low relative to other large school systems.

## COMPARISON OF 1994-1995 RESULTS TO PAST YEARS

*Comparison of common items from this year to the past two school years revealed that parents' perception of the school system has remained stable. However, responses to some items (other than the race relations and safety changes already discussed) did fluctuate 3% or more and should be noted (see Attachment 3 for more details).*

- The percentage of middle school parents who thought their child was academically challenged increased from the 1993-1994 school year (3% increase). Also increasing was the percentage of high school parents who reported the school system provided opportunities for all students.
- This year, fewer middle (9% decline) and high school parents (13% decline) agreed that their child's school provided sufficient opportunities for parental involvement.
- The percentage of elementary and middle school parents who agreed the school system was improving decreased slightly (5% for elementary and 4% for middle school) from last year.
- Since the 1993-1994 school year, the percentage of middle and high school parents who agreed that their child's school grounds were clean and attractive has slightly decreased (4% and 5%, respectively).
- Similarly, there was also a 3% decrease in high school parents who preferred magnet school programs to increased busing for racially balanced schools and a 5% decrease in high school parents who understood the magnet options.
