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ABSTRACT

California Community Colleges' (CCC's) Fund for Instructional Improvement (FII) was created in 1977 to support the improvement of teaching and learning in the CCC's through a program of grants and loans fostering innovative educational programs and services. This report provides information on the FII, as well as a list of the model projects supported by the Fund in the 1993-94 academic year. First, information is provided on the development and focus of the FII, indicating that the original activities related to non-traditional instruction, teaching improvement, educationally disadvantaged students, educational services for non-traditional students, and improving traditional instruction were expanded to include statewide priorities and staff development. Next, funding descriptions are provided of the FII's four major funding categories: loans, grants, special project grants, and grant/loan combinations. This section also indicates that in 1993-94, a total of \$1,107,000 was allocated through FII, including \$736,000 in grants and \$371,000 in loans. Finally, following information on types of projects funded and criteria used to award funding, two lists are provided of 37 projects receiving funding in 1993-94. The first list presents colleges, program titles, and page references to the CCC funding priorities guide, while the second includes the project number, college district, funding category, amount awarded, a brief description, telephone numbers for project contacts, and the college address. BACKGROUND AND HISTORY

Background

The Fund for Instructional Improvement (FII) was created by the passage of AB 1173 in 1977 (Vasconcellos, Chapter 714, Statutes of 1977). The purpose of the fund is to support the improvement of learning and teaching in the California Community Colleges through a program of grants and loans that foster and support innovative educational programs and services. Accomplishment of this objective is through development, implementation, and evaluation of alternate educational programs and services in accordance with the *California Education Code*, Article 7, Sections 84381-84387; the *California Code of Regulations*, Sections 56652-56682, the *Board of Governors Standing Orders*, Sections 300-470, and the *Board of Governors Basic Agenda: Policy Directions and Priorities for the Nineties*.

Pursuant to Board of Governors regulations, there is an eleven-member advisory and review council appointed by the Chancellor for the FII (current membership is shown in Appendix D). The council recommends the annual priorities of the fund, reviews and ranks proposals, and recommends to the Chancellor those to be funded. The Chancellor presents a list of recommended projects to the Board for its approval.

Fund for Instructional Improvement

Projects Recommended for Funding in 1992-93 for 1993-94

Nature and Evolution of the Fund

The original focus of FII is set forth in its enabling legislation, Assembly Bill 1173 (Chapter 714, Statutes of 1977), and encompasses five funding activities. These alternative educational programs and services include:

1. Nontraditional forms, content, and methods of instruction, such as:
 - a. instructional programs that involve internships and experimental learning opportunities,
 - b. individualized instructional programs that require student development of learning objectives through learning contracts,
 - c. instructional programs that focus on the development of interpersonal skills, and
 - d. instructional programs involving independent study;

2. Programs for improving teaching abilities of faculty members;
3. Programs addressing special learning needs of educationally disadvantaged students;
4. Educational services for new clientele, including older, working adults; and
5. Efforts to improve traditional instructional programs.

At the time of its inception, FII was the single source of state support for curricular and instructional innovation in the California Community Colleges and, until the passage of Assembly Bill 1725 (Chapter 973, Statutes of 1988), for the professional development of the system's faculty and staff. Even though the size of the fund is modest in comparison to the number of colleges in the system, it is the largest state source available to faculty for competitive grants. The governing regulations and policies adopted by the Board of Governors have emphasized the award of small grants that utilize the fund to benefit as many colleges, disciplines, and individuals as possible. This philosophy clearly casts the fund in the role of change agent, or catalyst, fostering innovation in as many community colleges as possible.

In 1986, however, a new policy direction began to emerge within the context of educational reform and the formation of the community college system. The Board expressed the view that the fund could appropriately be used to encourage colleges to address statewide educational issues consistent with the fund's original intent. In response to this new emphasis, FII resources were divided to fund two types of grants: Part A, grants of the type historically supported by the fund; and Part B, grants to address statewide priorities consistent with the Board's Basic Agenda. Since then, approximately 40 percent of the fund's resources have been allocated to Part B grants. As a result, numerous successful programs have been implemented that have yielded invaluable information to the community colleges as a system, including:

- research on student outcomes and instructional effectiveness in basic skills courses;
- identification of incentives for better teaching;
- enhancement of high school articulation in vocational fields; and
- development of empirical models to validate course prerequisites.

One of the unforeseen and unintended outcomes of Part B projects, however, was the decline in the total number of proposals in the traditional category of smaller, localized grants. This concern was raised in 1988 by a third party evaluator of the fund. As a result, a recommendation emerged to amend the 1990-91 Request for Proposal document (RFP) and funding process to ensure the ability of the small-grant writer to compete equitably, while still addressing system-wide priorities.

In 1988, the fund was further expanded in response to AB 1725. A new subsection—(f)—was added to Section 84381 of the *Education Code* that more explicitly acknowledged the increasing use of the fund as a vehicle for faculty and staff development. The new language provides that the fund may support:

Programs for the improvement of the intellectual development of faculty and staff, including, but not limited to, the following:

- (1) Intersegmental summer programs including research projects and seminars.
- (2) College programs bringing visiting scholars to local districts.
- (3) Interdisciplinary programs involving local non-college institutions in the arts and sciences.
- (4) Intersegmental research and public information projects on topics of special concern to rural and urban California regarding the environment, social history, and culture.
- (5) Summer “bridge” programs for the transition period into college life.

The Fund for Instructional Improvement has evolved and expanded significantly over its 15 years of existence. Originally, grant applications focused on rather specific curriculum development projects as conceived by individual college faculty and staff. In 1986, the Board of Governors (BOG) for the California Community Colleges used a portion of the Fund to address broader concerns as a whole that would have a greater impact on the system. In 1988, AB 1725 further altered the Fund for Instructional Improvement by more explicitly delineating the role of the Fund in the area of faculty and staff development.

Funding Categories and Funding Areas

The preceding section presented an overview of the development of the Fund for Instructional Improvement, beginning with the traditional intent outlined in the authorizing legislation in 1977;

through the emergence of the Board's Basic Agenda priorities and subsequent systemwide goals, giving rise to Part A and B projects; and finally, to the most recent inclusion of faculty and staff development projects authorized by AB 1725. Each of these developments, or purposes, is addressed in the 1993-94 RFA.

Funding Categories

The 1993-94 Request for Applications was divided into four funding categories. These funding categories are: loans, grants (regular), special project grants, and grant/loan combinations.

Loans

Loans are interest-free and are paid back to the FII through the apportionment process. Repayment takes place in three payments, beginning the funding year after the loan is made. Loans are primarily used to purchase equipment; however, other project designs are also applicable for use by this portion of the fund.

Other uses include, but are not limited to, the following: revenue-generating projects, full-time-equivalent-generating activities for districts below their full-time equivalent student (FTES) maximum allocation, and projects that need to be completed now but for which current local funds are not available.

There is \$371,000 available in this category. There are two loan-only projects being recommended (for \$85,000), which when combined with grant/loan combinations totals \$265,978.

Grants (Regular)

Regular grants represent \$577,400 of the grant funds available for both large and small grants. Large grants are defined as any grant above \$15,000 that demonstrates a significant systemwide impact. Small grants are defined as any grant \$15,000 and below. Small grants are not required to have a systemwide impact and normally are developed to address local college needs. However, small grants may and often do address systemwide needs.

Special Project Grants

There are two special project grants being recommended for funding: the Board of Governors Special Project Grant (10%); and the Fund for Instructional Improvement/Underrepresented Students Special Projects Fund (FII/USSP), Depository for Funded Projects, Special Project Grant.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS SPECIAL PROJECT GRANT (10%)

In 1991-92, under the direction of the Board of Governors, the FII set aside ten percent of the available grants funds to address a topic of special interest: the recruitment into and retention of African-American males in the California Community Colleges. This focus

was continued for 1992-93, using the *Career Beginnings* model that was used in the 1991-92 project design. (*Career Beginnings* is a national program using mentors to link students in high school with appropriate mentors, based on career choice and work experience in the career field.)

Two projects were funded last year: one at Contra Costa College (northern California) and one at Pasadena City College (southern California). Each project was funded for one year, at \$36,800. Based upon the successful implementation of project goals in their first-year performance, they are being recommended for second-year funding. There is \$73,600 available in this category; however, the FII Advisory and Review Council is recommending \$75,600 for funding (\$37,800 each) for the second year. The additional \$1,000 is to assist the two model demonstration projects in dissemination efforts.

FII/USSP FUND, DEPOSITORY FOR FUNDED PROJECTS, SPECIAL PROJECT GRANT

To aid in the dissemination of project results from the FII and USSP Fund, a special project grant combining \$15,000 of FII and \$5,000 of USSP Fund dollars is being recommended. These dollars will be used to establish a funded-project depository, for projects funded by the FII and USSP funds at a selected California Community Colleges Library and Learning Resources Program. The project will acquire, catalog, store, and disseminate information and products from the two funds. The outcome of this project will provide faculty at each college with easy access to project outcomes, designs, and products.

Combination Grant/Loan

This category is a blend of the grant and loan categories. There are six projects being recommended for funding in this category; these projects were evaluated as grants and ranked either in the large or small grant listings. There is \$180,978 recommended to be funded from this category.

Funding Areas

In compliance with legislative and Board directives, the 1993-94 Request for Applications (RFA) identifies two broad areas that apply to all four funding categories: (1) *Eligible Programs and Services* and (2) *The Board of Governors Basic Agenda Priorities*.

1. *Eligible Programs and Services*

Projects funded under this area address the six approved activities identified in Section 84381 of the *Education Code* and Section 56652 of the *California Code of Regulations*. All proposals are required to address one program or service in this area. There were 109 proposals received and they were distributed among the fifteen eligible programs and services as follows:

2. Board of Governors Basic Agenda Priorities Focus

In 1986, the Board of Governors focused its leadership and direction function with regards to issues of educational quality and academic standards through FII. The Board expressed the view that the Fund could appropriately be used to encourage colleges to address statewide educational issues. These particular projects are to focus on the major areas identified in the Board's *The Basic Agenda: Policy Directions and Priorities for the Nineties*, which is reviewed and revised annually. This document "sets policy directions and priorities of the Chancellor's Office and for California's 106 community colleges [and] delineates the basis for educational program planning and budgeting.

Applications that address an area of the *Basic Agenda Priorities* must also address only one area within the eligible programs and services.

Projects funded under the Board of Governors *Basic Agenda Priorities* will be designed to address various issues raised by the Board. The *Basic Agenda Priorities* represents the effort of the Board of Governors to present a cohesive annual documentation of the system's challenges and to frame the issues the Board will address during the year.

The related objectives of the Board of Governors *Basic Agenda Priorities* include the following:

Mission: Maintaining the mission of the California Community Colleges as described in the Master Plan for Higher Education.

- Transfer and General Education
- Economic Development and Vocational Education
- Basic Skills and English as a Second language

Access: Providing, to the maximum extent possible, access to Community Colleges for California Adults.

- Student Access and Success

Educational Quality: Maintaining quality instruction and excellent support services.

- Faculty/Staff Diversity and Quality

Proposals are required to address one area from the five areas listed within *The Basic Agenda*. Projects are grouped into these five categories and reviewed by teams of three.

The following are proposals and their respective percentages related to the five components of *The Basic Agenda* that were identified in the 1993-94 RFA:

Additional Project Criteria

In direct response to previous Board action, the Chancellor, in the 1992-93 RFP, made three basic changes to the procedures for evaluating and prioritizing FII proposals. In particular, emphasis was placed on projects that were submitted in a consortia effort; had significant impact on systemwide needs and resulted in tangible, replicable products or outcomes; and demonstrated sustained support from the parent institution beyond the period for which FII funds were made available.

These Board concerns were integrated again within the 1993-94 RFA document and were further noted within the evaluation criteria used by readers to rank submitted proposals.

Consortium Projects

The RFA provides up to five bonus points for projects that propose a consortium project design. A consortium is defined as "a joint venture of a California Community College and/or district in the implementation of a project where there is a sharing of methods, services, resources, facilities, and/or outcomes, with one or more of the following entities: California Community Colleges and/or district(s), baccalaureate-awarding public institutions, private colleges and universities, K-12 schools and districts, business or industry (both profit and nonprofit), organizations representing business or industry, and/or community-based organizations." Both large and small grants are eligible to compete in this area.

There were 39 consortia proposals received, and 17 of these proposals are recommended for funding. The 17 consortia include 76 colleges and other entities.

Systemwide Impact Projects

A proposal may be awarded up to five bonus points if that project has a significant impact on a systemwide need. There were 52 proposals received that addressed a systemwide need. Of the 37 proposals being recommended for funding, 22 have a significant impact on a systemwide need. Both large and small grants are eligible to compete in this area.

Institutional Commitment

Because the *California Code of Regulations*, Title 5, Section 56672(f) already requires that colleges address the issue of institutional support, there are no bonus points awarded in this area. However, special note of the Board's concern was made within the RFA, emphasizing the need for extraordinary care in response to this area by asking applicants to demonstrate how the project outcomes would be institutionalized within the district.

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Project Submission and Selection

The fund provides for project applications to be initiated by students, faculty members, or administrators, singly or in consort. All applications must, however, be approved by the president/superintendent of the district and the president of the college academic senate.

Outcomes

The 1993-94 Governor's Budget proposes \$736,000 for grants and \$371,000 for loans. Two Requests for Applications (RFA) were released for 1993-94 funds.

Nineteen projects are in the small-grant category and represent 28.5 percent (\$209,879) of the total FII funds available. Thirteen projects are in the large-grant category and represent 48.4 percent (\$356,674) of the total funds available. Three projects are in the Special Grant Project category representing 12.3 percent of the FII funds (\$90,600). There are two loan-only projects that are being recommended, for \$85,000 in funding. The total loan amount that is being recommended is \$265,978.

The thirty-seven projects listed will produce a variety of usable and transferable products services, and outcomes that will be disseminated to California Community Colleges. Colleges will have improved methods to deliver instruction and improve learning; meet the needs of disabled students through telecourses; develop curriculum in biotechnology; better address the needs of English as a second language students through distance learning; cost effectively incorporate multi-media instruction into the classroom; and provide improved ways of addressing basic skills instruction. The implementation and distribution of project outcomes will contribute to the institutionalization of programs and processes leading to quality educational products.
