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ABSTRACT

This guide is designed to assist students who plan to transfer between the community colleges and universities comprising the University and Community College System of Nevada (UCCSN). The opening section of the guide provides general information on transfer, including admission to programs for Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, other associate degrees, and non-associate degree program admissions; the definition of transfer courses; course numbering; general education course requirements; and programs of study for transfer, including business courses, the Nursing program, and Capstone programs. The next section provides information on curriculum planning and credit by examination, and provides legal notice as to the non-contractual nature of this guide. Next, the guide provides a directory of UCCSN institutions, listing locations and telephone numbers for offices and academic divisions at each schools. The final section, comprising the bulk of the guide, provides a detailed course listing by instructional area, for courses transferable as of June 1, 1995. Included in this section are listings of all transferable courses offered in the UCCSN, including the course name and number, credits provided for the course, two-year institutions offering the course, and the type of transfer credit the course earns at each of the institutions. 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It is the policy of the University and Community College System of Nevada Board of Regents that the transfer of students among University and Community College System of Nevada campuses be as smooth as possible. A systemwide Articulation Board, with representatives from both community colleges and universities, has the continuing responsibility for maintaining community college/university relationships designed to facilitate the transfer of courses and programs. Policies and procedures are continually reviewed and revised to accommodate changes in curriculum or other conditions.

The University and Community College System of Nevada consists of four community colleges and two universities, located throughout the state. This document is published to assist students who plan to transfer between UCCSN community colleges and universities.

Online Transfer Guide

The UCCSN Transfer Guide is now available by computer through the Internet, and is updated on a regular basis. After logging on to Pogonip (or Equinox), at the prompt, type "gopher." You will see a menu of options. Select Nevada System Chancellor's Office Information; then UCCSN Master Course File and Transfer Guide. The following choices are available:

How to Use This Guide

To determine the equivalency of a community college course to the four-year institution, find the particular course in question and read across to determine at which community college the course is offered (C=Community College of Southern Nevada; N=Northern Nevada Community College; T=Truckee Meadows Community College; and WNCC=Western Nevada Community College), and the equivalent course(s), if any, at UNR or UNLV. Courses are presented alphabetically by course prefix in ascending course number sequence.

Abbreviated Codes for Transfer Status

- Equivalent course number. Example: ENG 101
The community college course is transferable and evaluated with a specific title and number considered to be a comparable course at UNR or UNLV, even though the course numbers may not be the same.
- DE — Department elective
The community college course is transferable and can fulfill major credit requirements in the specific department.
- GE — General elective
The community college course is transferable and fulfills total credits needed for graduation. It is at the discretion of the specific college or department how those courses are counted (i.e., requirements for the college or elective credit).
- Footnotes
Footnotes provide important additional information about specific courses. **Be sure to read all associated footnotes for information which may affect transferability.** The Footnotes section is located immediately following the Course Listings section of this Guide.

Course transfer status listed in this Guide is subject to change. Courses that transfer from CCSN, NNCC, TMCC, or WNCC to UNR or UNLV only as of June 1, 1995 are listed in the Guide. Please contact your counselor or offices listed in the directory for questions concerning specific courses or courses not listed in the Guide.

General Transfer Statements

The information listed below is taken from specific Board of Regents' policy originally established in 1974.

Admissions

Associate of Arts and Associate of Science Degree Graduates

Completion of the Associate of Arts or the Associate of Science degrees from CCSN, NNCC, TMCC or WNCC will be the primary basis for admission to upper division study with full junior status at UNR or UNLV. Baccalaureate level courses included as a part of the Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees will transfer to UNR or UNLV at a minimum as general elective credit. Completion of the Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees does not guarantee satisfaction of all university lower division requirements.

The receiving university will evaluate all transfer courses attempted at the community college (and any other educational institution attended) and compute an overall admission grade point average in accordance with the institution's transfer policies. If the overall transfer grade point average computed by the receiving university is less than "C," admission on "probation" may be considered. If admitted on probation, all grade point deficiencies must be removed prior to graduation.

Other Associate Degrees

Baccalaureate level courses which are taken in such associate degree programs are transferable to the universities. However, students with these degrees are not normally guaranteed junior status.

Non-Associate Degree Admissions

Approved baccalaureate level credits which are completed are transferable to the universities at a minimum of general elective credit. Universities require an overall "C" average in all completed transfer courses attempted as a minimum standard for admission from community colleges. The grade of "D" is accepted for transfer (provided the overall grade average does not drop below the prescribed "C" level), and counts toward a bachelor's degree in the same way as "D" grades obtained by students enrolled in the lower division of the universities. However, it is at the discretion of the department or college at the university offering the major as to whether courses with "D" grades in the major satisfy requirements in the major field.

All students entering UNLV or UNR are required to have completed specific high school courses. Applicants who have not satisfied these requirements upon graduation from high school must complete the equivalent of 15 semester credits in transferable courses with an overall "C" average or above at a community college or four-year college. These courses should be in general education courses which apply toward fulfillment of Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, or baccalaureate degree requirements from a regionally accredited institution.

Any student under academic suspension from a university may attend a community college, and appropriate credits and grades earned are applicable toward satisfying the requirements for readmission to a university. Courses that are not acceptable as a basis for readmission at UNR include: those courses in which credit has already been earned, nonbaccalaureate, and nontransferable courses.

Transfer Courses

A transfer course is one that is acceptable by a receiving community college or university to apply toward an approved degree program at that institution. All baccalaureate level courses are transferable. At least half of the number of credits required for a baccalaureate degree at UNLV or UNR must be earned at a four-year institution.

The Admissions Officer at each college or university determines the acceptability of general elective transfer credits. The

receiving institution also reserves the right to determine the transfer level of a course. Written justification will be provided to the institution in cases where transfer is not allowed. Transfer students should supply transcripts of their community college credit to UNR or UNLV prior to their junior status, whenever possible.

Courses which satisfy specific department and college requirements are determined by the adviser and dean concerned.

Course Numbering

The following common course-level numbering system is in effect for the University and Community College System of Nevada:

- a. Community college occupational courses and general education courses 100B-299B
- b. Community college community service courses 100C-299C
- c. Community college developmental courses 001-099

General Education Course Requirements

All University and Community College System of Nevada Associate of Arts, Associate of Science or Baccalaureate graduates are required to complete a 15 credit core of general education courses (Regents' Requirements).

In addition, both UNLV and UNR require all baccalaureate degree graduates to complete a more extensive curriculum of general education courses (University General Education Core Requirements). It is recommended that students planning to

transfer to UNLV or UNR contact their adviser to determine which community college courses will contribute toward fulfillment of these requirements.

COURSES WHICH SATISFY THE REGENTS' REQUIREMENTS MAY SIMULTANEOUSLY SATISFY THE UNIVERSITY GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS.

Programs of Study for Transfer

Since the transfer of individual courses does NOT assure satisfaction of specific curricula requirements for the various majors and degrees at UNR or UNLV, it is recommended that you CONTACT YOUR COUNSELOR AND READ THE UNR OR UNLV

Business Courses

Effective January 1, 1985 additional courses in the area of business are accepted in transfer to UNR and UNLV. The status of these courses is as follows:

ACC 203 IS ACCEPTED IN LIEU OF ACC 303 (UNR) OR ACC 401 (UNLV) UPON VALIDATION OF CONTENT AND KNOWLEDGE BY APPROVED COLLEGE OF BUSINESS EXAMINATION, OR SATISFACTORY PERFORMANCE ("C" OR BETTER) IN ACC 304 (UNR) OR ACC 402 (UNLV) DURING THE FIRST YEAR OF ELIGIBILITY TO ENROLL IN THE APPROPRIATE UPPER DIVISION BUSINESS COURSE AT UNR OR UNLV.

Students who have taken these courses prior to January, 1985 should contact the Admissions Officer at UNR or UNLV for reconsideration.

Nursing Programs

The University and Community College System of Nevada offers the following undergraduate nursing programs: one-year (Practical Nursing), two-year (Associate Degree Nursing), and four-year (Bachelor of Science in Nursing).

Community college transfer students may receive up to 28-31 nursing credits when transferring to UNLV and up to 26 nursing credits when transferring to UNR. An associate degree graduate of a National League for Nursing accredited program receives 30 lower-division nursing credits at UNLV and 26 lower-division nursing credits at UNR. The graduate of a nonaccredited program will receive 30 lower-division nursing credits upon successful completion of the nursing placement examination at UNLV and 26 lower-division nursing credits at UNR.

Students may take the American College Testing Proficiency Examination Program (ACT PEP) or the National League for Nursing (NLN) Mobility Profile II examination. The NLN Mobility Profile examination may be taken on the community college campus toward completion of the final semester. If you are seeking admission to a baccalaureate program and have taken the test five or more years ago, you will be evaluated on an individual basis.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOU CONTACT YOUR ADVISER FOR COMPLETE INFORMATION ON TRANSFER INTO UNIVERSITY NURSING PROGRAMS.

Capstone Programs

The primary transfer degree is the Associate of Arts. However, to provide flexibility in program planning, "capstone programs" may be developed which will lead to a specialized bachelor's degree. These programs are designed for a two-year community college curriculum leading to the final two years at UNR or UNLV and a degree. Such agreements are approved between community colleges and one of the universities. **CAPSTONE COURSES NOT OTHERWISE TRANSFERABLE, WILL NOT TRANSFER IF THE STUDENT DROPS OUT OF THE CAPSTONE PROGRAM.**

UNLV-CCSN Vocational Education Capstone Program:

Individuals pursuing or having completed the Associate of Applied Science degree (A.A.S.) in Vocational Education at the Community College of Southern Nevada will be able to transfer that credit into the baccalaureate Vocational Teacher Education program at UNLV.

As part of the B.S. degree requirements, 31-35 credits of general requirements in English, Social Science, Arts, Humanities, etc., are necessary. Many of these general requirements are transferable courses that may be taken at CCSN.

This capstone program is administered through the College of Education at UNLV. Therefore, for more specific information about the program, please contact Dr. Clifford McClain (895-3860) in the Department of Secondary, Postsecondary and Vocational Education in the College of Education at UNLV.

UNR-Community College Occupational Education Capstone Program:

The University of Nevada, Reno College of Education is cooperating with the community colleges in Nevada to offer a program for students seeking a career as an occupational teacher in business education, industrial education and agricultural education at the high school level. Lower division trade or technical courses are to be taken at a community college, upper division courses are to be taken at UNR, and lower division general education courses may be taken at either institution. All other UNR and College of Education requirements must be met. Specific course requirements for the various programs can be obtained by contacting Dr. Vernon Luft (784-4961) in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction at the College of Education.

Legal Notice

The University and Community College System of Nevada Course Transfer Guide describes the credits, programs, and courses which transfer from UCCSN community colleges to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas and the University of Nevada, Reno for admission to either university; however, the informa-

tion in this Guide is subject to modification at any time to accommodate changes in community college and university resources or educational plans. This Guide does not constitute a contractual commitment that the System will offer all the courses or programs described.

General Information

Curriculum Planning

Community college students should be encouraged (by counselors and academic advisers) to choose as early as possible the institution and program into which they expect to transfer. This is essential in order to plan programs which include lower division requirements of a university.

- a. A student enrolled at a UCCSN institution may elect to graduate under the catalog of the year of enrollment in a baccalaureate-level program or the year of graduation.
- b. Students who officially change their major with the registrar's office may choose the catalog of the year of the latest change of major or the year of graduation.
- c. Whichever catalog is used, it cannot be more than ten years old at the time of graduation.
- d. In the case of UCCSN transfer students, any exceptions to this policy will be handled by the Transfer Center and the transfer agreement contract process. To be guaranteed the catalog of choice upon transfer, a student must have an approved transfer agreement on file with its university.
- e. UCCSN institutions do not guarantee the awarding of a degree based upon the unchanged requirements of a particular catalog. Periodic revisions of degree requirements are made because of advances in knowledge, changes in occupational qualifications or the expectations of accrediting authorities. If such revisions have occurred, the college may require a reasonable adherence to the degree requirements of a recent or current catalog. Institutional catalogs do not constitute contractual agreements or commitments.

Credit by Examination

1. The maximum number of credits that may be earned by examination to apply toward a degree may not exceed one-half of the minimum number of credits required for that degree.
2. Credit may be granted for the satisfactory completion of College Board Advanced Placement Examination (CBAPE) with scores of 3, 4, or 5 and a satisfactory essay for English. With an objective test score of 5 on the English examination and a satisfactory essay, six credits may be granted. Refer to the respective institutional catalog for application of CBAPE credits toward degree requirements.
3. Credit may be granted for the satisfactory completion of the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) general or subject examinations.
 - a. General Examinations: A maximum of six semester credits may be granted for each of the five general examinations subject to institutional limitations for scores of 500 or above and a satisfactory essay where required. (Scores earned on the general English examination from October 1978 through April 1986 require a satisfactory essay and a score of 610 to 749 to award three credits, or 750 or higher to award six credits. Scores earned prior to October 1978 or after April 1986 require a satisfactory essay and a score of 500 to 639 for three credits, or 640 or higher for six credits, which satisfies the English requirement at UNR.) Refer to the respective institutional catalog for application of CLEP credit toward degree requirements.
 - b. Subject Examinations: In general, a maximum of three semester credits may be granted for each institutionally approved subject examination for scores of 50 or above and a satisfactory essay where required. Additional credit may be granted for selected examinations as permitted by institutional policy. With an objective test score of 64 or higher on the English subject examination and a satisfactory essay, six credits may be granted. Refer to the respective institutional catalog for application of CLEP credit toward degree requirements.
4. In general, three credits may be granted for each institutionally approved ACT PEP examination for scores of 50 or above, or a letter grade of "C" or higher, and a satisfactory essay where required. Additional credit may be granted for selected examinations as permitted by institutional policy. With an objective test score grade of "A" on the English examination and a satisfactory essay, six credits may be granted. Refer to the respective institutional catalog for application of PEP credit toward degree requirements.
5. A total of 26 lower-division credits may be granted for NLN Mobility Profile II examinations, completed with a decision score of 100 and/or an advising score of 70 percent. Upon receipt of an official score receipt, the Office of Admissions and Records grants credit, as specified, and assigns a grade of "S." The examinations may be taken at any time; scores are accepted for five years from the date of testing.
6. Other national testing organizations may be considered for the awarding of credit subject to institutional policy.
7. Special Department Examinations: An admitted and registered student in good standing may earn credit by special department examination subject to institutional policy.
8. The posting of satisfactorily completed credit by examinations to the student's permanent academic record shall clearly identify that the credit was earned by examination, name of the testing program, the date of the examination, the number of credits and the grade of "S" (satisfactory) or "P" (pass).
9. Credit earned by examination does not apply toward satisfying the minimum on-campus resident credit requirement of the institution from which graduation is sought and does not constitute an interruption of the resident credit requirement.
