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ABSTRACT

This publication is an annual revision of a May 1976 survey to develop a profile of social studies course offerings and requirements in grades K-12 for all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Information about social studies testing for each state and the District of Columbia was added in 1988. Information about statewide assessment initiatives has been included where available. Each state is described with course offerings for the social studies programs with themes on which the curriculum is to focus, high school course offerings, state testing information, and a contact person for each state. Council of State Social Studies Specialists (CS4)

The Council of State Social Studies Specialists is an organization founded in 1965, with the primary goal of providing a vehicle for the exchange of ideas among the various states. Its members include the specialists, consultants, and supervisors who have responsibilities for social studies education in the various state departments of education/public instruction. The membership officially meets once a year just prior to the annual convention of the National Council for the Social Studies. Other meetings are planned and held as is feasible and desirable. In these meetings, a program is planned which attempts to familiarize the members with new developments and provides an opportunity for cooperative endeavors and coordination of efforts.

The members have many common roles, responsibilities, and problems; yet each has a position that is somewhat unique. State social studies specialists occupy positions that require a variety of roles to strengthen instruction for school students. At times, activities involve the specialists with local schools within the state; with the various bureaus, offices, and dimensions of the state education department; with institutions of higher education within the state; with programs established by state and federal legislation; with professional organizations; and with public and private agencies outside of the state department of education.

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Introduction

This publication, *National Survey of State Requirements, Course Offerings and Assessment in Social Studies, Kindergarten - Grade 12*, is an annual revision of a May 1976 survey conducted by Dr. Jeri M. Sutton and staff of the Social Studies Service, Virginia Department of Education. The Council of State Social Studies Specialists (CS4) commissioned an update of the survey which was published in 1986. The council's purpose was to develop a profile of social studies course offerings and requirements in grades K-12 for the 50 states and the District of Columbia. The committee that compiled the 1986 version included Dr. Thomas A. Elliot, Virginia Department of Education, and Mr. Paul G. Johnson, formerly with the Nebraska Department of Education. In 1988, Dr. Judith S. Wooster, formerly of the New York State Education Department, revised the profiles of course offerings, and included information about testing for each state and the District of Columbia.

From 1989 to 1992, this publication was revised by Dr. Cordell M. Svengalis, Iowa Department of Education. Beginning in 1993, Fred Czarra of the Council for Chief State School Officers, has assisted with the annual updates. Information about statewide assessment initiatives, where available, has been included. It is the hope of CS4 that the information contained in this publication will be of assistance to the many audiences interested in social studies education. If additional information is needed on state social studies programs, please call the state social studies contact directly.

ALASKA

COURSE OFFERINGS IN SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION

Social Studies Program:

The state of Alaska requires that each school district develop written curriculum for grades kindergarten through twelve but does not mandate any specific course of study. The Department of Education has developed model curriculum guides which are designed to guide the districts in the development of their own curriculum.

The elementary Social Studies Model Curriculum Guides (Grades 1-6) is developed around seven themes:

Identity	Citizenship/Government
Culture	Scarcity
Environment	Interdependence
Change	

These themes are developed sequentially from Kindergarten to grade 6 according to psychological closeness to the learner, that is, from the individual and family to the neighborhood, school, community, state, nation and world. The Grade 7 course offering is Geography/Alaska Geography and the 8th Grade course offering is a thematic approach to American History. The themes included are: Exploration and Expansion; Development of American Government and Political Change; Immigration and Social Change; Economic Development and Technological Change; and Foreign Policy.

Elective Courses (9-12) Most Frequently Offered:

The state requires three units of credit in the social studies for graduation from high school. Districts may offer these credits through courses of their choice. The Secondary Social Studies Model Curriculum Guide developed by the Department of Education includes the following course outlines:

ARIZONA

COURSE OFFERINGS IN SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION

The Arizona State Board of Education, in order to comply with State Law ARS 15-102.16 and 17, prescribes the following social studies requirements:

For grades K-8:

Students shall demonstrate competency as defined by the State Board adopted Essential Skills in the required subject areas. District instructional programs shall include an ongoing assessment of student progress towards meeting the competency requirements.

1. Language Arts
2. Literature
3. Mathematics
4. Science
5. Social Studies
6. Music
7. Visual Arts
8. Health/Physical Education

For Grades 9-12.

The Arizona State Board of Education, in order to comply with State Law ARS 15-701.01, requires that the following be included in the minimum credits for graduation:

1. One and one-half credits of instruction in the essentially, sources and history of the constitutions of the United States and Arizona and instruction in American institutions and ideals and in the history of Arizona.
2. One credit of world history/geography.
3. One-half credit of "essentials and benefits of the Free Enterprise System." This one-half credit may be offered in a department which the local district deems appropriate.

Elective Courses (9-12) Most Frequently Offered:

Elective courses are established by each district to meet the needs of their student population.

Current Curriculum Projects:

1. Studying the feasibility of updating the current state framework (Essential Skills - 1988) to include

U.S. emerging national standards and contemporary understanding of how students learn.

2. Develop staff development components to assist local schools and districts in moving away from coverage of material to designing instruction and curriculum which targets citizenship goals.

3. Continue on-going study of performance based social studies assessment (both classroom and statewide)

DESCRIPTION OF STATE TESTING IN SOCIAL STUDIES

Arizona has a statewide performance-based assessment system (The Arizona Student Assessment Program- ASAP) which is currently given to all third, eighth, and 12th graders in the Spring. Students are assessed in reading, writing, and mathematics. Science and social studies are to become components of the assessment program in future years.

Grade & Code Test Description

Grade 5 (D, L, S) Thirty items for a performance assessment for grades 4-5 were field tested, including a variety of short-and longer-open-ended prompts. A statewide, mandated test for the spring of 1994 is being developed from these items, together with multiple-choice items. (Sample test items are available)

Grade 8 (D,L,S) Forty items for a performance assessment for grades 6, 7, and 8 were field tested, including a variety of short-and longer open-ended prompts. Another field test will be conducted in the spring of 1994. (Sample test items are available.)

Grade 10 (D, L, S) A number of short answers and essay questions, as well as a group performance assessment, were field tested for the grade 10 performance assessment. Another field test will be conducted in the spring of 1994. (Sample test items are available)

GSE (U, L, S) The Golden State Examinations (GSE) in United States history and economics were offered at State of California expense on May 26-27, 1993. They included both multiple choice items and essays. Examinations in American Government and World History are scheduled for future development.

The GSE is an end-of-course examination available to all students enrolled in the appropriate courses. Students who achieve at the honors level receive a certificate from the state and recognition on their high school diplomas. Students achieving at the "school recognition" level are commended by their schools and the community.

Comments:

Colorado has strong local control emphasis. The above listed courses are offered in many school districts. The localities are encouraged to develop their own programs within the framework of state law.

Colorado University requires one year of high school geography and one semester geography/one semester world history as an entrance requirement in their school of Arts and Sciences---often taught in high school as a capstone course.

The state is rapidly moving toward content standards-based education in history, geography and civics and a bill to that effect has been passed by the state legislature. My belief is that districts will adopt or adapt standards that are emerging nationally. There will be a two year moratorium on statewide standardized testing from 1993-1995.

The State Law requires:

Teaching of history, culture, and civil government of the state of Colorado and the United States, including contributions of minorities.

Teaching of the Constitution of the United States not later than the opening of the junior high schools or seventh grade.

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Grade & Code Test Description

3, 6, 9, 11(M) The ITBS standardized tests were administered to all students in grades 3, 6, 9, and 11 for the last two years. The State Board of Education is currently considering a recommendation to switch the tests to grades 4, 7, and 10. Social studies represents one component of the ITBS battery.

CONNECTICUT

COURSE OFFERINGS IN SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION

Program of Instruction. The social studies program of instruction offered shall include at least the following as taught by legally qualified teachers: citizenship, economics, geography, government and history. Each local and regional board of education must attest to the state board of education that the social studies program of instruction identified above is offered, and that such program of instruction is planned, ongoing and systematic. The state board of education shall make available curriculum materials and such other materials to assist local and regional boards of education in developing instructional programs in social studies.

United States History Required. In addition, all high, preparatory, secondary and elementary schools, public and private, whose property is exempt from taxation, shall provide a program of United States history, including instruction in United States Government at the local, state and national levels, and in the duties, responsibilities, and rights of United States citizenship. No student shall be graduated from any such school who has not been found to be familiar with said subject.

Three Years of Social Studies Required for Graduation. Commencing with the high school graduation class of 1988, and for each graduating class thereafter, no local or regional board of education shall permit any student to graduate from high school or grant a diploma to any student who has not satisfactorily completed a minimum of twenty credits, not fewer than three in social studies. Determination of eligible credits shall be at the discretion of the local or regional board of education, provided the primary focus of the curriculum of eligible credits corresponds directly to the subject matter of the specified course requirements. A credit shall consist of not less than the equivalent of a forty-minute class period for each school day of a school year or part of a credit toward high school graduation earned at an institution accredited by the department of higher education or regionally accredited. Only courses taken in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, shall satisfy this graduation requirement with certain exceptions.

FLORIDA

COURSE OFFERINGS IN SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION

Florida will remain in a transition phase for the next two to three years which implementing Connections, Challenges and Choices, the new social studies program, and co-developing K-8 instructional materials. The new K-12 Program of Study rejects the traditional "expanding horizons" approach in the elementary grades and realigns the courses taught at the middle and high school levels. The Program recognizes the need for active student and teacher participation in the learning process and integrates content, skills and democratic values. It emphasizes multicultural studies at all levels of instruction and stresses an interdisciplinary approach by correlating each grade level course to the social science disciplines and to other subject areas.

The new Program of Study, developed by the Florida Commission on Social Studies Education, has been constructed around a Vision for the Social Studies that guides social studies teaching and clarifies the goals and objectives of social studies education. This vision is designed to develop well-educated people who share a body of knowledge, preserve a set of values, understand common cultural allusions, and are prepared to participate with confidence in the dynamics of political, economic and social change.

- Well-educated persons have a sense of where they are in time, in space, and in culture. They have a sense of personal and social identity.
- Well-educated persons have minds that are well-stocked with information about people in time, in space and in culture. They share cultural allusions.
- Well-educated persons associate new experiences and events with the past. This association establishes a context in which they explain, sympathize, judge, decide and act.
- Well-educated persons participate in intellectual adventures. They willingly examine established knowledge and accept intellectual risks.
- Well-educated persons recognize conditions detrimental to human development and opportunity. They promote tolerance, understanding and acceptance.
- Well-educated persons possess a range of rhetorical skills. They can narrate, listen, and persuade effectively.

- Well-educated persons possess a sense of personal, social, and civic efficacy. They accept personal and social responsibility.
- Well-educated persons know how to create, share, shape, and pursue visions. They can imagine times that are more just, spaces that are better used, and cultures that are more humane.

The K-12 Program of Study is designed as a series of three-year sequences organized around a major focus, culminating with a capstone course featuring the application of political and economic behaviors.

Elementary

Grades K-2 focus on culture and provide students with exposure to basic beliefs, customs, and traditions of their own and other countries through the use of stories, legends, myths, and fantasy.

Grades 3-5 focus on history and introduce students to their historical and geographical world, country, and state through the use of narratives and biography.

Middle Grades

Grades 6-8 focus on geography as students develop models to systematically observe and analyze the world. GEORGIA

COURSE OFFERINGS IN SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION

Standards established by the Georgia Department of Education require that social studies be taught for 11 out of the 12 grades in Georgia Public Schools. A new "Quality Core Curriculum" has been adopted by the Georgia Board of Education which specifies social studies content at grades K-8. A new high school policy specifies certain courses at the high school level. Most high schools offer an elective program at the 12th grade level.

Georgia law states that Georgia history and government be required of all students. The "Quality Core Curriculum" now places this course at the 8th grade level.

"Junior high program, grades 7-8. Social studies instruction shall include citizenship education, history, and social sciences. Democratic beliefs and values, problem-solving skills, and social and political participation skills shall be incorporated. Instruction shall encompass history, economics, geography, government including American citizenship, behavioral sciences, and the cultures of other peoples and nations. Strategies for continued development of positive self-perceptions shall be infused."

Grades 9-12:

"High school program, grades 9-12 (5 units). Social studies instruction shall include citizenship education, history, and the social sciences. Instruction shall encompass the history of the United States and the history and cultures of other peoples and nations including the analysis of persons, events, issues, and historical evidence reflecting time, change, and cause and effect; an overview of American government through the study of the United States Constitution, the federal system of government, and the structure and relationship between the national, state, county, and local governments; and voter education. Economics shall include comparative and consumer studies in relation to the market and command economic systems. Geography shall include the earth's

physical and cultural features, their spatial arrangement and interrelationships, and the forces that affect them. Sociology, psychology, and anthropology shall include the scientific study of the individual and group behavior(s) reflecting the impact of these behaviors on persons, groups, society, and the major institutions in a society. Democratic beliefs and values, problem-solving skills, and social and political skills shall be incorporated."

Grades K-12

All Iowa schools must infuse global perspectives into all subject areas and all grade levels. The social studies play a leading role in this infusion process, but all subject areas must be involved in some way.

The Department and the Massachusetts Council for the Social Studies has produced a publication in February, 1989, that provides a rationale for teaching social studies at all grade levels, and explores the key concepts that should be addressed in the various disciplines that are part of the social studies. The publication concludes with a teaching strategies section and resource directory.

The Department and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Library & Archives, in cooperation with the Massachusetts Council for the Social Studies, produced a handbook in June 1990, on the Reenactment of the Massachusetts Convention to Ratify the United States Constitution. Nebraska School Laws: American citizenship committee; created duties; required instruction; patriotic exercises; duties of officers.

79-213 "An informed, loyal, just, and patriotic citizenry is necessary to a strong, stable, just, and prosperous America. Such a citizenry necessitates that every member thereof be fully acquainted with the opportunities, and advantages of which we are possessed and the sacrifices and struggles of those through whose efforts these benefits were gained. Since youth is the time most susceptible to the acceptance of principles and doctrines that will influence men throughout their lives, it is one of the first duties of our educational system to so conduct its activities, choose its textbooks, and arrange its curriculum in such a way that the love of liberty, justice, democracy, and America will be instilled in the heart and mind of the youth of the state. (1) Every school board shall, at the beginning of each school year, appoint from its members a committee of three, to be known as the committee on Americanism, whose duties shall be: (a) To carefully examine, inspect, and approve all textbooks used in the teaching of American history and civil government in the school. Such textbooks shall adequately stress the services of the men who achieved our national independence, established our constitutional government, and preserved our union and shall be so written to include contributions by ethnic groups as to develop a pride and respect for our institutions and not be a mere recital of events and dates; (b) Assure themselves as to the character of all American form of government; and (c) Take all such other steps as will assure the carrying out of the provisions of this section. (2) Beginning with the school term in 1971, all American history courses approved for grade levels as provided by this section, shall include and adequately stress contributions of all ethnic groups (a) to the development and growth of America into a great nation, (b) to art, music, education, medicine, literature, science, politics, and government, and (c) the war services in all wars of this nation. (3) All grades of all public, private, denominational, and parochial schools, below the sixth grade, shall devote at least one hour per week to exercises or teaching periods for the following

purpose: (a) The recital of stories having to do with American history, or the deeds and exploits of American heroes; (b) The singing of patriotic songs and the insistence that every pupil shall memorize the Star Spangled Banner and America; and (c) The development of reverence for the flag and instruction as to proper conduct in its presentation. (4) In at least two of the three grades from the fifth grade to the eighth grade in all public, private, denominational, and parochial schools at least three periods per week shall be set aside to be devoted to the teaching of American history from approved textbooks, taught in such a way as to make the course interesting and attractive, and to develop a love of country. (5) In at least two grades of every high school, at least three periods per week shall be devoted to the teaching of civics, during which courses specific attention shall be given to the following matters: (a) The constitution of the United States and the State of Nebraska; (b) The benefits and advantages of our form of government and the dangers and fallacies of Nazism, Communism, and similar ideologies; and (c) The duties of citizenship. (6) Appropriate patriotic exercises suitable to the occasion shall be held under the direction of the school superintendent in every public, private, denominational, and parochial school on Lincoln's birthday, Washington's birthday, Flag Day, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day, or on the day preceding or following such holiday, if the school is in session. (7) Every school board, the State Board of Education, each county superintendent of schools, and the superintendent of each individual school in the state shall be held directly responsible, in the order named, for carrying out of the provisions of this section, and the neglect thereof by any employee or appointed official shall be considered a dereliction of duty and cause for dismissal.

Elementary (K-6)

Elementary curriculum, K-6, normally includes at least one semester of Nebraska studies at the fourth grade level. At K-3 levels, the curriculum usually focuses on the child himself/herself, the family, and the community. At the fifth grade level, United States history and geography are the key topics. Many schools teach American Neighbors (Canada, Latin America) at the sixth grade level, although an increasing number of elementary schools are focusing on world geography in the sixth grade. In addition to Nebraska studies at the fourth grade level, a growing number of fourth grades are receiving some type of introduction to geography which usually involves the study of selected geographical areas around the world and the cultures that inhabit those areas.

Nebraska, continued

Junior High School (7-8)

In most schools, Nebraska Studies is also a topic for at least one quarter of seventh or eighth grade; many schools devote a whole semester to the study of Nebraska at this level, and some still study Nebraska for an entire year. In many schools, the basic textbook has become *Nebraska Studies*, originally published by the Nebraska Department of Education in 1983, and revised and reprinted within the last year. Some type of world regional geography is included in most junior high curriculums, and many schools offer American history, at least through the Civil War, at the junior high level. The middle school concept is gaining in popularity in Nebraska, and an increasing number of schools are reorganizing to place grades 6-7-8, or even 5-6-7-8, in administrative units separate from the elementary school unit.

High School (9-12 or 10-12)

American history is taught in all high schools in Nebraska, either as a one-year course, or in two separate years, with American History to 1865 or 1877 comprising one year, and American History 1865 (or 1877) to the present making up the second year. American government is also a requirement in all Nebraska high schools, not by state mandate, but by local choice; in most schools, American government and modern problems make up the two semesters of the senior year. In a few schools, however, American government is taught at the eleventh grade level. World history is becoming a required course in a growing number of high schools, as is world geography. Where world history and world geography are not required, they are elective courses taken by the majority of the high school's students. Economics, sociology, and psychology are other popular electives; some type of global studies/international education is also becoming a popular elective choice.

General Curriculum Notes

The state of Nebraska does not mandate curriculum; it is left to each school district to write a curriculum that best fits the needs of its students. What is described above is "usual and customary practice" in Nebraska schools, and there are always exceptions where schools so desire. As new curriculums are written, schools are working to give a global perspective to their entire K-12 social studies curriculum; and we encourage integrating global studies into every year/course in a school's social studies curriculum.

In grade K-8, the content is suggested, not required. Content for grades 9, 10, 11, and 12 is required by statute and grade levels are suggested by Nevada Department of Education. Graduation from high school requires 2 years of social studies to be completed between ninth grade and graduation.

Social studies content which must be included in the elementary and secondary curriculum is that which is stated in Nevada Revised Statutes (American History, Nevada History, American Government, and the United States and Nevada Constitutions). Requirements in content such as Latin America, Africa, Australia, and the Pacific Islands to be taught in a certain grade level are no longer specified.

Content must be utilized from any areas considered appropriate in order to meet the requirements in the statutes and Course of Study required by the State Department of Education. The Course of Study requirements are concepts, generalizations, and activities in the social sciences, not specified by grade level. It is suggested, however, that the school district insure a balance in the selection of content (textbook series and audiovisual media, etc.) so that the student is exposed to many of the political areas, regions, and cultures of the world.

Ed 306.37 Social Studies

(a) Pursuant to Ed 306.21 each elementary school shall develop and offer a social studies program. This program shall include the understanding of democratic beliefs; the study of geography, including lands and peoples; the development of the skills of decision making, data gathering and critical thinking; pursuant to RSA 186:13 opportunities to practice citizenship in the school and community; and pursuant to RSA 189.11, instruction in history and government and the Constitutions of the United States and New Hampshire. Social studies education shall develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for effective participation in the life of the community, the state, the nation, and the world.

(b) Pursuant to Ed 306.22 each middle/junior high school shall develop and offer a social studies program. This program shall provide students with opportunities to acquire knowledge of the history and culture of our nation, and understanding of the democratic principles upon which good citizenship is founded, and the ability to apply this knowledge and understanding when making personal and public decisions. Pursuant to RSA 186.13, it shall include opportunities to practice citizenship in the school and community. Pursuant to RSA 189.11, it shall include instruction in history and government and the Constitutions of the United States and New Hampshire. Content shall be drawn from the chronology of our nation's heritage; the powerful ideas and experiences found in the history of the world; the disciplined perspectives of the geographer, economist, historian, social scientist, and humanist; and the perplexities of contemporary life.

(1) The middle/junior high school social studies program shall be designed to enable students to:

- a. acquire and use information to clarify issues and seek solutions to societal problems;
- b. value and apply critical thinking, interpersonal relations, and decision-making skills in both individual and group problem-solving situations.
- c. participate in and contribute to the well-being of the home and school as well as the larger communities of the state, nation and world;

d. Acquire an understanding of and appreciation for the heritage of our nation, its ideals, principles, institutions, and experiences;

e. become familiar with careers in history, the humanities, and the social sciences;

f. study the relationships among or between the past, present and future, the beliefs and practices of others and themselves, the geography, economics, politics and history of unique places and the world at large, and the creation of new technology and the dynamics of society; and

g. Apply knowledge, skills, and understandings to contemporary problems and issues.

(c) Pursuant to Ed 306.23(b) and (c), each high school shall develop and offer a social studies program. This program shall provide for the study of related knowledge and modes of inquiry selected from history, the humanities, and social science, including economics, political science, sociology, anthropology, psychology, geography and philosophy. It helps students acquire the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary for effective participation in the life of the community, the state, the nation, and the world. Pursuant to RSA 186:13, it shall include opportunities to practice citizenship in the school and community.

(1) Each high school shall provide 5 unites of credit in social studies comprised of offerings in each of the following areas:

a. 1 unit shall be in national and state history and government pursuant to RSA 189:11;

b. 1/2 unit shall be in basic business and economic education which shall include the study of the development, goals, and essentials of the American free-enterprise system, the role of the entrepreneur, labor, government and those forces that influence the production, distribution, and consumption of goods and services, the decision making processes in business, the importance of human relations skills;

c. 2 1/2 units shall be selected from the areas of geography, economics, and world history or global studies; and

d. 1 unit shall be selected from the areas of sociology, psychology, anthropology political science and philosophy.

(2) The high school social studies program shall be designed to enable students to:

- acquire the skills of critical thinking, effective decision making, and human relations;
- read or examine historical narratives, documents, and other evidences of the past;

- examine cause and effect, review chronologies, consider ideas, and analyze trends in order to better understand the past and the present and to anticipate the future;

- increase awareness and concern for the ways that the world's people, resources, and environments are interrelated and interdependent;

- know the geography of the United States and the world and its impact on political, economic, and social development;

- understand and evaluate the goals, structure, and operation of our government and other governments;

- understand basic economic principles in order to examine our free enterprise system and its contributions to the economic, political, and social development of our nation and the world;

- understand and accept the responsibilities of citizenship and share in the rights and benefits granted to citizens as expressed in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitutions of the United States and New Hampshire; and

- apply the concepts and skills of history and the field of social science to real societal issues.

New Hampshire Education Laws

189:11 Instruction in National and State History and Government. In all public and private schools in the state there shall be given regular courses of instruction in the history, government and constitutions of the United States and New Hampshire, including the organization and operation of New Hampshire municipal, county and state government and of the federal government. Such instruction shall begin not later than the opening of the eighth grade and shall continue in high school as an identifiable component of a year's course in the history and government of the United States and New Hampshire.

K - 6 Social studies, K-3, is not included in the mandate (1986), but schools must teach to the state competencies which are tested by a state-developed customized norm-referenced/criterion-referenced test. Legislative mandates require that all fourth, fifth, and sixth grade classes shall provide instruction in history and social studies, including geography.

Grade 7	New Mexico history-geography mandated and placed by the legislature (1986): 2 semesters.
Grade 8	United States history, mandated (1986): 2 semesters.
Grades 9-12	United States history-geography: 2 semesters. World history-geography: 2 semesters. Government-economics: 2 semesters.

Except for United States history which is traditionally placed at grade 11, the placement of world history, economics, and government is local option.

Comments:

In 1985, a State Board of Education task force wrote high school exit competencies. These were broad statements supported at grades 3, 5, and 8 with indicators or student behaviors. These coincided with the statewide testing program check points. The Public School Reform Act of 1985 mandated essential competencies for the core areas that students must master prior to being promoted

to the next higher grade. These were designated by small statewide task forces, and the State Board of Education approved them in the fall of 1987. Mastery criteria on which to base promotion, retention, and remediation will be effective in the 1989-90 school year and determined by the local district

Beginning in the Spring of 1990, another task force was called together to review/revise the social studies competencies in order to make recommendations to the NM SDE and NM Board of Education. Their recommendations will be considered prior to the state instructional materials adoption for social studies in 1992.

Students, upon graduating from New Mexico high schools, shall:

- demonstrate knowledge of AMERICAN HISTORY and the ability to analyze that history relative to economic, political, social, and cultural developments.
- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the AMERICAN POLITICAL SYSTEM and the individual rights and responsibilities within that system.
- the ability to analyze that history relative to economic, political, social and cultural developments.
- demonstrate knowledge of the AMERICAN ECONOMIC SYSTEM, the individual's roles in that system, and the interaction of the American system with other economic systems.
- demonstrate knowledge of and recognize the influence of GEOGRAPHY (physical, economic, political and cultural) in the development of societies.
- demonstrate knowledge of NEW MEXICO HISTORY and the ability to analyze that history relative to cultural, economic, political and social development.
- develop and APPLY critical thinking, decision-making, research, and communication skills.

Building on the general frameworks that result from the work of a State Curriculum and Assessment Council, the State Curriculum and Assessment Committee for Social Studies was asked to focus on the social studies. 4. The goals and desired learning outcomes should apply to all pupils.
5. Statements of desired outcomes should be specific enough to ensure that all students acquire a solid core of skill and knowledge in the social studies. However, they should be broad enough to permit interdisciplinary studies and local variation in specific content.
6. Providing a useful framework while setting statewide outcomes that will:
 - promote clarity and consistency of educational purposes;
 - allow for local choices and decisions in organizing the curriculum locally while meeting Regents Goals;
 - guide the development of textbooks, software, and other educational materials;
 - assist school personnel in teaching the many New York State pupils who change residence during and between school years.
7. Recommend elements of a statewide program of educational assessment.
8. In recommending elements of an assessment program the Committee should view State assessment measures as useful in promoting progress as well as fostering accountability. They should be so constructed as to be useful to teachers, counselors, students, parents, and community members as well as administrators and policymakers. Among the assessments, there should be:
 - examinations which measure problem-solving skills and the ability to analyze and synthesize, as well as factual recall.
 - portfolios illustrating the pupils' best work
 - professional evaluation of the pupil's accomplishments, made by his/her teachers. This evaluation should extend not only to basic skills and knowledge, but also to desirable qualities (such as persistence, creativity, and sensitivity to others) not easily measured by conventional means.

Preliminary reports were submitted to the Commissioner and Board of Regents in late 1992. Frameworks and assessment blueprints are now being developed.

Pennsylvania has undergone a revision of its curriculum, eliminating clock hours and replacing time constraints with student learner outcomes. Specific courses are not required for graduation. However, students shall demonstrate achievement of the student learning outcomes. Each student shall also complete a project in one or more areas of concentrated study under the guidance and direction of the high school faculty. The scope and sequence model selected or developed by local school districts should provide a variety of social studies offerings. In a quality social studies program, students should be given the opportunity to take at least one course from each category of synoptic, behavioral, and analytical studies. Local programs should offer at least two courses in each of these categories. Interdepartmental and interdisciplinary study should be encouraged throughout the K-12 program. The 9-12 social studies program must also require course work in state and local government and economics.

Students should be provided with community and civic participation opportunities, such as school or community clean-up campaigns; visits to nursing homes, cross-age tutoring, volunteer service or internships in government offices, human service agencies, or businesses. Such activities help to promote citizen action which may be carried into adulthood.

Various school activities, such as serving as class, club, or student council leaders, participating in debate and forensics, Close-Up, Wisconsin Student Caucus, Model United Nations, Positive Youth Action Team activities, or national or foreign exchange programs, should be encouraged as important and integral parts of the social studies curriculum. In these activities students have the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills learned in the classroom to other activities in different settings.

Social studies is a more difficult area to find agreement but, perhaps, the NEAP process and Governor Romer's activities will produce more continuity in the future.
