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ABSTRACT

A study was undertaken at the City College of San Francisco (CCSF), in California, to examine the decline in credit and noncredit enrollments from 1991-94 and determine possible reasons for the decline. Over the period, credit enrollment declined 32,406 in fall 1991 to 25,709 in fall 1994, while noncredit enrollment declined from 34,589 to 27,200. Credit enrollment declined for all age groups, with the 50 and older age group experiencing the largest percentage drop at 33.7%, and for all ethnic categories, with white students experiencing the highest drop at 34.3%. Noncredit enrollment declined for all age groups except the 50 and older age group, with the highest percentage drop in the 19 and under age group at 42.6%. Noncredit enrollment declined in all but two ethnic categories, American Indian/Alaskan and Other, Non-White), with Filipino students experiencing the largest percentage drop at 43%. In addition, first time student credit enrollment dropped 32.6%. Factors contributing to the enrollment decline include the following: (1) the location of noncredit classes affected enrollment due to migration of immigrants to different parts of the city; (2) drops in Asian and Hispanic noncredit enrollments may be due to current immigration policies; (3) the San Francisco population is older and may take fewer credit courses; and (4) a drop in the unemployment rate may have contributed to fewer enrollments. 
This report examines the overall decline in both Credit and Noncredit enrollments at City College of San Francisco over the past four years (Fall 1991 to Fall 1994) as shown in the chart below.

The report highlights Credit and Noncredit enrollment by Age Group and Ethnicity and where disproportionate drops occurred (enrollment by gender is not highlighted because neither group disproportionately dropped). First time student enrollment (Credit only) at City College is also reported for the same time period, as well as information on high school graduates from the San Francisco Unified School District.

Observations from the Research Office and the Master Plan Committee as to why enrollments are dropping appear at the end of the report. An appendix to this report lists the following information: CCSF Credit and Noncredit Enrollment (Fall 1991 to Fall 1994); Enrollment for the California Community Colleges, Fall 1990-1993; SFUSD high school graduates by ethnicity for the 1992-93, 1993-94 and 1994-95 school years.



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Credit Enrollment by Age Group

- Credit enrollment declined in all age groups over the past four years (Fall 1991 to Fall 1994).
- The 50 and older age group experienced the largest percentage drop in Credit enrollment from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994 (602 students representing a 33.7% drop).
- Enrollment in the 30 - 34 age group dropped by 1,147 students from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994 (a 26.5% drop).
- Enrollment only dropped by 12.5% for the 20 -24 age group for the same four year period.

Credit Enrollment by Age Group: Fall terms 1991 - 1994





Credit Enrollment by Ethnicity

- Credit enrollment declined from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994 in all ethnic categories except the Other, Non-White category (only approximately 300 students are in this category).
- White students experienced the highest drop in Credit enrollment in the four year period (3,780 students representing a 34.3% decline).
- Enrollment dropped 13.4% for Asian students, 11.7% for African American students and 10.5% for Hispanic / Latino students.

Disproportionate Drops: Credit Enrollment

- The last column on the table below shows the percentage of the total drop in enrollment for each subgroup from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994. Using the 19 and under age group as an example, 13% of the Fall 1991 and Fall 1994 enrollment belonged to that age group. Since the percentage of the total drop was also 13%, there was a proportionate drop in Credit enrollment for the 19 or under age group from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- The 30-34 age group and the 50 and older age group experienced the most disproportionate drops in Credit enrollment from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- The 20-24 age group had the least disproportionate drop in enrollment in the four year period.

% of the Total Drop in Credit Enrollment from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994



Noncredit Enrollment by Age Group

- Noncredit enrollment declined for all age groups except the 50 and older age group from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- The highest percentage drop in enrollment was in the 19 and under age group (a 42.6% drop from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994).
- The 20 - 24 age group and 25 - 29 age group also experienced significant percentage drops in enrollment (34.4% and 35.1% respectively).
- There was a 6.8% increase in enrollment for the 50 and older age group for the same time period.



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Noncredit Enrollment by Ethnicity

- Noncredit enrollment declined in all but two ethnic categories (American Indian/Alaskan and Other, Non-White) from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- Filipino students had the largest percentage drop in Noncredit enrollment (a 43.0% drop from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994).
- Asian and Hispanic / Latino Noncredit enrollment also dropped by 24.9% and 26.6% respectively during the four year period.

Disproportionate Drops: Noncredit Enrollment

- The 19 or under, 20-24 and 25-29 age groups all experienced high disproportionate drops in Noncredit enrollment from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- The 50 and older age group had an increase in the total percentage of their enrollment for the same time period.
- There was a very high disproportionate drop in Noncredit enrollment for Asian and Hispanic / Latino students over the four year period.

First Time Students (20 and Under): Credit Only

- First time student enrollment (20 and under) dropped 32.6% from Fall 1991 to Fall 1994.
- There was a 37.3% drop in first time students from San Francisco schools (a 39.5% drop from San Francisco Unified schools and a 19% drop from San Francisco private high schools).
- First time student enrollments from San Mateo county high schools also dropped over the past four years (39.2%).


San Francisco High School Graduates

- 66% of all San Francisco High School graduates (Public and private combined) enrolled as first time students in California Higher Education Institutions.
- First time student enrollment at California Community Colleges peaked in 1992 (35.8% of San Francisco high school graduates), and dropped in 1993 (31.6%).
- First time student enrollment at the University of California increased from 9.5% in 1990 to 14.2% in 1993.

Observations From the Office of Research and Planning and the Master Plan Committee

What Can The Drops Be Attributed To?

Overall drops in Noncredit may be a result of re-alignment of ESL courses (i.e. changing some Noncredit courses into Credit courses). Also, many Noncredit vocational courses were changed into Credit courses.

The location of Noncredit classes affects the enrollment drops because of migration of immigrants to different parts of the city. (i.e. no waiting lists at Chinatown/North Beach, but an increase in enrollment at the sites).

In Transitional Studies, ABE enrollments are up. This may be due to Welfare Reform (i.e. GAIN recipients are told by DSS they will need to go to school because they will probably lose their aid from the State).

Drops in Asian and Hispanic Noncredit enrollments may be due to current immigrant policies / attitudes (i.e. Proposition 187).

Aging factor. San Francisco adult population is older, may take fewer Credit courses over time, but are more interested in personal enrichment found in Noncredit programs.

Drop in the unemployment rate. More people going back to work may account for drop in enrollment.

Drop in White students in the Credit program may be attributed to the increase in fees for BA Holders. This would also account for the drop in older students (aged 30 and older) in Credit.

Issues Regarding Sources of Students

Although the drop in enrollments over the four year period are proportional in Credit for the 19 or under age group and lower for the 20 - 24 age group, these students generally take more units than older students do.

City College may be competing with other institutions for first time students (such as UC, CSU, other CCCs and/or out of state institutions).

There may currently be an increase in middle schools enrollments now (the "Baby Boom Echo") which will reach colleges / universities in 1996-1998.
