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ABSTRACT

Each year, a follow-up study is conducted to gather data on the activities and perceptions of students approximately 6 months after their graduation from Wisconsin's Technical Colleges (WTC). Specifically, the survey seeks to identify the current activities of the WTC graduates, determine the extent to which current activities are related to the graduates' educational programs, and provide data to inform career awareness and planning efforts. In 1995, the 16 colleges in the WTC system surveyed 15,560 graduates from 1994-95. Responses were received from 12,790 (82%) graduates and were compiled into a statewide report. Results of the study included the following: (1) 59.6% of all graduates were female, while minorities represented 7.6%; (2) of the respondents in the labor force, 94% were employed and 81% of those graduates were in jobs related to their training; (3) graduates of the home economics programs had the highest rate of related employment at 87%; (4) the median monthly salary for all 1994-95 graduates was \$1,608; and (5) graduates from the service instructional division had the highest median monthly salary at \$1,907. 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OVERVIEW

Introduction

The Graduate Follow-Up Survey is conducted annually to gather data regarding the activities and perceptions of students approximately six months after their graduation from Wisconsin's Technical Colleges.

The primary objectives of the survey are to identify the current activities of program graduates, to determine the extent to which current activities are related to the graduates' educational programs, to provide information to be used as tools in career awareness and planning efforts for those making or assisting in career decisions, and to provide data to facilitate program planning, evaluation and development.

Methodology

The 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System surveyed graduates of programs in their respective colleges. The survey was conducted between October and December, 1995. A total of **15,560 graduates** were surveyed statewide with **12,790 responding**, resulting in a **response rate of 82 percent**. These responses were submitted to the Wisconsin Technical College System Board for compilation of this statewide report. A copy of the survey instrument is included as Appendix A. Basic concepts and measures used throughout the report are defined below.

The **labor force** includes all employed and unemployed individuals except those who are unemployed and not seeking employment. A person is considered **employed** if he or she worked for pay or profit at the time of the survey. Individuals in any of these groups may be employed full-time or part-time. Full-time employment is defined as 35 or more hours per week; part-time employment is less than 35 hours per week. A person is considered to be seeking employment if he or she performed no work for pay or profit at the time of the survey but was looking for work.

Survey respondents who are employed classified their jobs as related or not related to the training they received. In the follow-up data tables beginning on page 9, employed respondents who indicate their job is related to their training are counted in the **employed related category**. Thus, the employed related category is a subset of the employed category.

Monthly salary figures are reported for respondents who indicate they are employed full-time in jobs related to their training. The salary range is based on the lowest and the highest reported figures. The **median salary** is the mid-point of salaries reported with half of the salaries below and half above the mid-point.

DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION OF 1994-95 GRADUATES

The following table shows the sex and ethnicity of all of the 15,560 1994-95 graduates by type of degree granted and by instructional division. There are 3,035 more females than males. Minorities represented 7.6 percent of all graduates, while 2.5 percent of the graduates did not report their ethnicity. (Please note N/R means Not Reported.)


AGE GROUPS OF GRADUATES


REASON FOR ATTENDING

Graduates were asked to give their reason for attending a technical college. The majority of respondents, 57 percent, said it was to prepare to obtain employment, while 12 percent said it was to improve existing job skills. Eight percent are preparing to continue their education, five percent attended for personal interest and 18 percent cited other or miscellaneous reasons.




SATISFACTION WITH TRAINING

Graduates rated the training they received. Of the graduates responding, 97 percent indicated that they were satisfied or very satisfied with their training, and 3 percent stated that they were unsatisfied or very unsatisfied.




EMPLOYMENT STATUS

Of the respondents who are in the labor force, 94 percent are employed and 6 percent are still seeking employment. Within the group who are employed, 81 percent indicated that their jobs are related to the training received, and 19 percent reported that their jobs are not related to the training received.



EMPLOYMENT LOCATION


As indicated below, 92 percent of the graduates who responded to the survey are employed in Wisconsin, 5 percent are employed out-of-state, and 3 percent did not indicate where they are employed. Of those employed in Wisconsin, 78 percent are employed in the technical college district where they received their training, and 22 percent are employed in another district.



EMPLOYMENT RELATED TO TRAINING BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION

As shown in the chart on the following page, the majority of graduates who responded to the survey obtained employment in occupations related to their training. Graduates of Home Economics programs had the highest percent employed related rate of 87 percent, but had the third lowest number of employed graduates, 570. Agribusiness program graduates had the next highest percent employed related rate of 85 percent. Health and Industrial program graduates had an employed related rate of 84 percent, and Health program graduates had the highest number of employed graduates with 3,857. Technical program graduates ranked next with 83 percent of the 908 employed graduates obtaining employment in a related occupation. Business program graduates had an employed related rate of 79 percent with 2,118 graduates employed. Marketing program graduates had an employed related rate of 75 percent of the 742 graduates employed. The Service division had an employed related rate of 71 percent for its 841 employed graduates. Graphics program graduates had the lowest employed related rate of 70 percent of their 176 employed graduates.


EMPLOYMENT RELATED TO TRAINING BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION


