A hidden camera shows how we treat two young people of different races differently. Abrahamson, Brent

Prejudice in Group Relations. GSP, Inc. 1991. These books take an analytical approach to the subject of prejudice. First, carefully defined terms examine how prejudice develops within social groups, then delineating its effects on both perpetrators and victims. The text concludes by challenging the reader to take a stand against prejudice and offering practical suggestions for making a difference. The teacher's manual includes a daily schedule for using the text in a 15-day unit, project ideas, role-playing exercises, reproducible quizzes/exams with answer key. Student workbook. Grade Level: 9-12.

Addison-Wesley Publishers

Multiculturalism in Mathematics, Science, and Technology: Readings and Activities. Addison-Wesley Publishers. 1993. Each unit begins with a reading on the achievements of the individual or culture highlighted. Accompanying the unit is one or two activities designed to give students an idea of the mathematical or scientific reasoning used by the subject. Critical thinking questions follow the reading that encourages students to reflect upon the reading and, often, use their imagination to formulate answers. A wall chart included.

Friends Don't Hurt Friends. Anti-Defamation League. New York, NY. 1980. When Peter calls his best friend Brian "a dumb-Niger," Peter stuns Brian and runs home. As he talks with his father, he learns an important lesson about prejudice and bias. Grade Level: Elementary. Filmstrip/cassette kit w/teacher's guide. 7 min.

Hate-Crimes-Laws: A Comprehensive Guide. Anti-Defamation League. New York, NY. 1994. In 1993, the U.S. Supreme court upheld a hate crime statute from Wisconsin that was based on model legislation originally drafted by ADL in 1981. This update identifies statutes from each state where the legislature has created a specific provision to address bias-motivated crimes against persons and each state where a general prohibition on civil rights intimidation. Also reviews are state and federal case law decided under these statutes and describes briefly the results of each challenge.

An African American's View: Brown VS. Topoka Desegregation and Miseducation. African-American Images. Chicago, IL. 1993. Forty years after the landmark decision, we ask ourselves if African American students, teachers, principals, administrators, and schools, have reaped the benefits of desegregation? The author examines the psychological and social effects desegregation not integration had on African American students. "Is the Black Community moving toward integration or separation or revolution or liberation?" "What is its future in Americans' society?"

Blume, Judy

Uggle's House. Dell Publishing. New York, NY. 1970. This is a story about the prejudice and animosity experienced by a Black family when they moved into a white neighborhood.

Bode, Janet

When the family's happiness is threatened by a bounty hunter, they can be saved only by raising enough money to purchase their freedom. The winner of Chicago International Film Festival. VHS. 24 min.

Unequal Education. Films for the Humanities. Princeton, NJ. 1995. This program with Bill Moyers compares the everyday experiences of two New York City middle school students and contrasts the political rhetoric of the 1992 national elections with the reality of American schooling. Cooperative Learning: Student Teams. NEA Publication. Washington, D.C. 1987. This monograph discusses the history and development of cooperative learning techniques. First, it describes the background and classroom applications of various Student Team Learning methods. Then it evaluates the research findings on the achievement, attitudes, and behavior of students who have used these methods.

Sleeter, Christine

Empowerment through Multicultural Education. State University of New York Press. Albany, NY. 1991. This book reframes questions about student diversity by probing the extent to which society serves the interests of all, and by examining the empowerment of members of oppressed groups to direct social change.

Sleeter, Christine E. & Carl A. Grant

Making Choices For Multicultural Education - Five Approaches to Race, Class and Gender. Merrill Publishing Co. Columbus, OH. 1988. This book offers the educational community a way of thinking about race, language, culture, class, gender and disability in teaching. The book grew out of a chain of inquiry to investigate multicultural education, how it is defined, how it is taught in school, its conceptual base and reasons for its development.

Teaching About Cultural Awareness. Center for Teaching International Relations. Denver, CO. 1985. This collection of 25 lessons and activities on perception, culture, discrimination and institutional racism fits equally well into the study of anthropology or a multicultural unit. The book contains directions for conducting each lesson and photocopy masters of forms and readings which are used in the lessons. Lessons include a rumor clinic, a study of changing images of different races, a family research project, and a test once used to determine literacy in a southern state.

Smith, Jean

Lil Tuffy and His A B C's. Johnson Publishing Co. Inc. Chicago, IL. 1973. An alphabet book describing objects used by pre school children. Grade Level Pre K-3.

Smith, Laura

Creation of a California Tribe. Sierra Oaks Publishing Co. Sacramento, CA. 1988. The Maidu creation story is recreated. The coyote painting the earth red, how Earthmaker made the world larger.

Smitherman, Geneva

Talkin & Testifyin: The Language of Black America. Houghton Mifflin Publishers. 1977. This book provides an understanding of Black English in the larger context of African American culture and its historical roots, and discusses attitudes toward Black English, particularly as they affect educational policy. 285 pg.

Social Studies School Service

Broken Treaties: American Document Series. Social Studies School Service. Culver City, CA. 1993. The case of the Indian People VS. United States is a trial which never took place in a courtroom which never existed. Calling to the stand witnesses William Henry Harrison, Chief Joseph, Red Cloud, a scout with the Seventh Cavalry, an Indian agent, and a homesteader who lost her family to Native American marauders, the Indian plaintiff tries to prove that the treaties were unjustly broken. The government's defense lawyer argues that irreconcilable cultural differences made the treaties impossible to keep, asking: Should we apologize for the "Manifest Destiny" that made this country great? In this thought provoking courtroom dramatization, the final verdict rests with the viewer. Grade Level: 7-12. VHS. 34 min.

Homeboys. Social Studies School Service. Culver City, CA. 1990. From behind the bars of a penitentiary, gang members "D Dog," "Big Rod," "40 Oz," "Hollywood," "O.G.," and "Reg" offer frank reflections on life and death on the streets as they talk about drugs, gang fights, exploiting young-boy "wanna-be's," guns, money, murder and their blind loyalty to the "homeboys" in their gang. This chilling program offers valuable insights on the attraction of "gang bangin" (many saw gangs as surrogate families) and the "gangsta" mentality. The tape also provides a societal context by intercutting the testimonies of the prisoners with heart-breaking interviews of their victims' parents. Grade Level: 7-12. VHS. 27 min.

Kwanzaa Set. Social Studies School Service. Culver City, CA: 1994. Kwanzaa is commemorated at year's end to celebrate the fruit of the year's labors, to give thanks, to evaluate achievements, and to set goals for the next year. Life of Sojourner Truth. Social Studies School Service. Culver City, CA. 1993. Born a slave in 1797, Sojourner Truth escaped from bondage and went on to become not only one of the most stirring abolitionist orators of her time, but also one of the first advocates of women's rights. Dramatizations re-create the most famous events of her life (including meetings with Frederick Douglass, Abraham Lincoln, and Harriet Beecher Stowe). Undercut with original photographs of slaves to create an indelible portrait of a remarkable American woman. Grade Level: 7-12. VHS. 26 min.

Social Science Education Consortium

Tolerance for Diversity of Beliefs: A Secondary Curriculum Unit. Social Science Education Consortium. Colorado. 1993. Emphasizing active learning through case studies, role playing, simulations, and mock interviews, this curriculum unit engages students in exploring issues associated with freedom of belief and expression.
