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ABSTRACT

This directory lists 257 organizations with therapeutic adventure and experiential programs for special needs populations. The information was generated from a survey of members of the Association for Experiential Education. Special needs populations include youth-at-risk, persons with addictions, juvenile and adult offenders, inpatient and outpatient psychiatric patients, sexual victims and perpetrators, developmentally disabled persons, physically handicapped persons, and minority groups. The range of adventure and experiential activities include wilderness-based activities such as camping, backpacking, rock climbing, canoeing, rappelling, and rafting; residential camps; urban adventure programs; indoor and outdoor group initiatives and ropes courses; expressive arts; Native American ceremonies; farming and gardening; and environmental education. The directory lists organizations in alphabetical order and includes organization address and phone number; name of program director; number of staff members; populations served; average length of program; number of clients per year; types of experiential and adventure activities; program profiles; therapeutic goals of the program; counseling orientation and philosophy; and counseling education and training of the staff. 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Introduction

The *Directory of Experiential Therapy and Adventure-Based Counseling Programs* identifies those programs which use adventure and experiential activities with special needs populations for therapeutic purposes. The Directory lists 257 organizations that have missions of utilizing experiential/adventure exercises as therapeutic and educational tools.

The Purpose

The *Directory of Experiential Therapy and Adventure-Based Counseling Programs* was designed for two populations and with several purposes in mind. First, the Directory can be used by adventure-based counseling and experiential therapy professionals as a source of networking and as a means of exploring what other professionals and programs are doing.

Second, the Directory can assist mental health professionals, unfamiliar with Experiential Therapy and Adventure-Based Counseling, in learning more about the make-up of the programs in this field. The therapeutic goals, counseling orientation, and counseling background and education of the staff sections of the Directory were established to assist this population in gaining a greater understanding of the therapeutic nature of these programs.

The Surveys

In May, 1992, an initial survey (see page 3) was distributed by the Association for Experiential Education to its full membership. During June and July, 1992, a second survey was mailed to those who had responded to the first survey. The second survey (see page 4) was designed to further identify and examine the therapeutic background of the responding programs.

Criteria for Inclusion

For inclusion in the Directory, an organization needed to have two general characteristics: 1) they use experiential and adventure activities, 2) with special needs populations. The special needs populations that were identified for inclusion were: youth-at-risk, addictions, juvenile corrections, adult corrections, inpatient and outpatient psychiatric care, sexual victims and perpetrators, developmentally disabled, physically handicapped, "minority" groups (women, ESL, Native American, Gays and Lesbians, etc.). Excluded from the Directory were: a) corporate and business training programs, b) programs whose primary mission is to teach outdoor skills, and c) programs, based in schools and colleges, designed for "normal" populations. Many of the organizations listed in the Directory work with "normal" and business populations. References to these populations were also excluded.

The range of adventure and experiential activities was fairly broad as can be seen by the following list: wilderness-based activities (i.e., camping skills, backpacking, rock climbing, rappelling, caving, skiing, canoeing, rafting, kayaking), residential camps, urban adventures, indoor and outdoor group initiatives and rope courses, expressive arts (art, music, drama), Native American Ceremonies, farming and gardening, and environmental education.
