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ABSTRACT

This Kids Count data book is the fourth to examine the well-being of Arkansas' children and notes trends from 1990 to 1995. The report's introductory sections include discussions of the potential impact of welfare reform on Arkansas' children, and present figures detailing the number of children affected by particular risk factors each week. The statistical report is based on 13 core indicators of well-being: (1) unemployment rate; (2) per capita personal income; (3) Aid to Families Profiles with Dependent Children (AFDC) participation; (4) Food Stamp Program participation; (5) School Lunch Program participation; (6) Women, Infants and Children's Nutrition Program participation; (7) high school dropout rate; (8) percent births to women with less than 12 years of education; (9) teen birth rate; (10) infant mortality rate; (11) child maltreatment rate; (12) teen arrest rate; and (13) teen violent death rate. The bulk of the report presents state and county profiles and, in tabular format, county and statewide data for indicators of safety and security, socioeconomic status, health, and education. Appended are indicator definitions and data sources. Findings indicate that for core indicators, between 1990 and 1995, there were improvements in per capita income, unemployment rate, AFDC participation, high school dropout rate, percent of births to women with less than 12 years education, and the infant mortality rate. Arkansas' children fared less well

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in 1995 in terms of participation in other assistance programs, teen birth
rate, child maltreatment rate, and teen arrest and violent death rate. (KB)

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Foreword

The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996: What Impact Will It Have on Arkansas' Children?

In 1996, actions taken by the U.S. Congress forever changed the role of Kids Count and the Children's Research Center. It passed the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 (also known as the Welfare Reform Act), a comprehensive piece of legislation with far reaching implications for numerous social safety net programs, including Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), child care, the Food Stamp Program, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) for children, the Child Support Enforcement Program, child nutrition programs, and the Social Services Block Grant. Since two-thirds of the Arkansans benefiting from the AFDC program are children, the impacts of this legislation may potentially impact their well-being. One of the most dramatic changes made in the AFDC program eliminates the open-ended federal entitlement program and creates a block grant of a specific and time-limited amount with which each state can determine how and to whom it will provide assistance (the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant, or TANF). The TANF program shifts from the AFDC emphasis of reducing poverty through cash assistance to reducing government dependency by getting parents a job.

Because the new welfare reform law contains provisions that may substantially affect the well-being of children, it also imposes new data collection and statistical reporting requirements to track what happens to the children and families who use TANF. States will be required to provide, on a quarterly basis, new data on clients including (1) demographics, (2) employment, educational, and income status, and (3) usage and status on public assistance programs such as Medicaid, food stamps, subsidized child care, subsidized housing, and cash assistance. In addition to these requirements, the act presents an ideal opportunity for the state of Arkansas to collect new and better outcome data about children. Kids Count and the Children's Research Center are uniquely suited to assist the state as it implements new systems for monitoring the impacts of welfare reform on Arkansas' children and their families. In addition to the data already collected as part of the Kids Count effort, the Children's Research Center is involved in several cooperative ventures with state agencies in collecting and analyzing data on child well-being. This role is likely to grow in the future as welfare reform is implemented in the state.

TANF provides states the flexibility to determine eligibility, benefit levels, and the types of assistance/services pro-

vided. Two features of the legislation will be especially prominent. One is the notion of time limits. The legislation imposes a five year (60 month) lifetime limit on receiving assistance (note: states may exempt 20 percent of total families from this requirement, these are likely to be families where the breadwinner is disabled or a child is disabled and needs constant care). States may opt to impose lifetime benefit limits shorter than five years. The second feature is that of work requirements. Adults in families receiving assistance are required to participate in work activities after receiving assistance for 24 months or less as determined by the state. Even if recipients are not working, they will be required to participate in community service within two months of receiving benefits.

The challenge facing states in implementing welfare reform will be to help those whose personal and economic fortunes force them to use the program for long periods of time. These are the families whose economic prospects are the bleakest, as they tend to be the least immediately employable of all AFDC recipients. They tend to have the lowest job

Prohibitions Under TANF

- No assistance to families without a minor child (exception pregnancy).
- No assistance to families not assigning certain child support rights to the state.
- No assistance for teenage parents who do not attend high school or equivalent training program.
- No assistance for teenage parents who do not live in an adult supervised setting (if unmarried and under 18).
- No assistance to individuals convicted of drug-related felony. Other family members can still receive assistance.
- If adult family member refuses to work, state must reduce or terminate benefits.
- New immigrants are denied cash assistance for five years.

Options Under TANF

- States can sanction a family if children are not attending school.
- States can sanction adults without a diploma if they are not working towards a high school degree or the equivalent.
- States can deny increases in benefits if an additional child is born while the family is receiving benefits.
- States can deny assistance to unmarried teen parents and their children.
- States can deny assistance to current legal immigrants after January 1997.

skill levels and most fragile family support networks to help them get off welfare. These are the families likely to face the greatest obstacles in obtaining employment once they lose their AFDC eligibility.

At present, no one really knows what impact the new welfare reform legislation will have on the economic circumstances of AFDC children and families who lose their AFDC eligibility. Proponents hope that restrictions on eligibility will act as an incentive for families to obtain employment, and eventually work themselves out of poverty. Ultimately, the success of the new welfare reform legislation will depend on numerous complex factors, such as (1) the strength of the state economy, (2) the local availability of jobs, (3) wages that lift people out of poverty, and (4) the success with which states are able to help welfare recipients find work and stay employed. More than likely, recipients will fall into one of three groups: those that remain unemployed after exhausting their benefits; those that find employment but still live at or near poverty; and those that, over time, find employment and eventually work themselves out of poverty.

Many TANF parents will find employment; however, it is likely their family will remain poor. Consider these facts. A recent study by the Institute for Research on Poverty (IRP) examined the economic prospects of women five years after they left welfare. They found that about a third (33 percent) experienced several transitions in and out of poverty during the five years after leaving AFDC; 18 percent remained poor during all five years; and 8.0 percent achieved incomes above the poverty level during the first year of exit from AFDC but slipped back into poverty during the remaining four years after leaving AFDC. A fair percentage of AFDC recipients were successful in escaping poverty. About 19 percent went from being poor during the first year of exit from AFDC to nonpoor during the remaining four years, while about 21 percent were able to lift themselves out of poverty immediately following the exit from AFDC and remained so during all five years.

These findings are tempered by the fact that IRP's study included only women and children fortunate enough to exit AFDC, ostensibly through employment or marriage. Their study did not include those still on AFDC. Most recipients who use the AFDC program do so for a relatively short time during their lifetimes (even after taking into account multiple stays on and off welfare, only 34 percent of all those who use the AFDC program do so for more than 60 months over the course of their lifetimes.) It is also true that because long-term users tend to accumulate on the rolls, the AFDC caseload is at any given point in time made up disproportionately of those in the midst of a long-term spell on welfare (recent research by Linda Pavetti of the Urban Institute found that nearly

76 percent of the caseload on a given day is made by families in the midst of 60 month or more stay on welfare).

Nearly everyone agrees that it will take a concentrated effort of government, business, nonprofits, communities, churches, and families to help this segment of the AFDC population obtain employment, stay off welfare, and eventually lift themselves out of poverty. The real danger in implementing welfare reform, however, would be to focus all our efforts and resources on families who have been unable to get off AFDC. We must not forget that these families make up only a small part of all poor families in the state. Consider these statistics from the Current Population Survey, conducted annually by the U.S. Census Bureau, about those who are poor in Arkansas:

- There are 71,000 poor families with children in the state. Of these, 12,000 families (or 16.9 percent), the parents are disabled, ill, or retired.
- Of the 59,000 poor families with children whose parents are not ill, disabled, or retired, 43,000 families (73.1 percent) have a full-time, year-round worker.
- There are an additional 157,000 families with children, whose parents are not ill, disabled, or retired, that might be considered near-poor, i.e. they have incomes between 100% and 200% of poverty. Of these, 138,000 families (88.1 percent) have a worker. Sixty-one percent (96,000 families) have a full-time, year-round worker.

These numbers suggest that the problem of poverty is not limited to those who are unable to leave AFDC, but also affects working families as well. Most children, in fact, do not live in families in which the parents don't work, but in families with a worker. We must not neglect the fact that most families are working, even as they live in or near poverty. As we struggle to meet the requirements of welfare reform and move families from welfare to work, we must not neglect policies that help children in poor working families.

For these reasons, the Children's Research Center and specifically Kids Count, have an obligation to report on the indicators at state and local levels that record the well-being of our children. To do so will permit us to see if this latest experiment in social engineering is rendering the results that keep Arkansas' children sheltered, healthy, and safe.

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Core Indicators

Introduction

According to the Kids Count Data Book 1996, produced by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, "nothing predicts bad outcomes for a kid more powerfully than growing up poor." The 1990 census reflected that 155,399 of Arkansas' children 0-17 years of age were living in poverty. They made up 25.3 percent for all children of this age in our state. Nationally, 17.9 percent of this age group were living in poverty. "Today, fully one-quarter of the nation's population under age 6 live in poverty." (*Kids Count Data Book 1996*, The Annie E. Casey Foundation)

"Poor children are more likely to be sick and underweight as toddlers; they are less likely to be ready for kindergarten; they are more likely to fall behind as grade schoolers; they face a much higher prospect of dropping out of high school; they are more likely to become teen parents; they face far greater odds of being either a victim or a perpetrator of crime; and they are far less likely to be economically successful as adults." (*Kids Count Data Book 1996*, The Annie E. Casey Foundation)

Primarily, Americans tend to think only those children whose parents are out of work and on public assistance are living in poverty. The truth of this is that there has been a tremendous growth in the number of children who live in poverty "despite the fact that one or both parents worked all year....Since 1989....the number of children in working-poor families has jumped 30 percent. Today more than a third of all America's poor children belong to families where at least one parent works all year." (*Kids Count Data Book 1996*, The Annie E. Casey Foundation)

The Core Indicators in the Arkansas Kids Count Data Book 1996 are divided into three groupings, Economic Security Indicators, At Risk Indicators, and Children in Danger Indicators. Those included as Economic Security Indicators are Per Capita Personal Income, Unemployment Rate, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Food Stamps, School Lunch, and the Women, Infants and Children's Program. The indicators included in the At Risk category are High School Dropout Rate, Percent Births to Women with Less Than 12 Years Education, and Teen Birth Rate. The Children in

Danger Indicators are Infant Mortality Rate, Child Maltreatment Rate, Teen Arrest Rate, and Teen Violent Death Rate. These indicators have been chosen as Core Indicators due to the ability of providing a yearly measurement of progress thereby allowing for the monitoring of trends. Also, these indicators are considered to be most indicative of the well-being of Arkansas' children and families.

The measurements included as Economic Security Indicators have either a direct or an indirect effect on determining whether children will become statistics reflected in the At Risk Indicators, or ultimately, as statistics in the Children in Danger Indicators. While the economy in Arkansas has been improving over the last several years, there are areas of the state which are not enjoying the same levels of improvement as other areas and many of our citizens are still much in need of a variety of supportive services to allow for an enhanced quality of life.

Comparing the 1990 statistics to those of 1995, it may be noted that the economic indicators Per Capita Income, the Unemployment Rate, and the use of AFDC are improving, while the use of Food Stamps, School Lunch and WIC are increasing.

Social indicators such as High School Dropout Rate and Percent Births to Women with Less Than 12 years of Education are improving, while Percent of All Births to Teens (Ages 10-17), Infant Mortality Rates, Child Maltreatment Rates, Teen Arrest Rates, and the Teen Violent Death Rates are getting worse.

So what does this say about our most vulnerable population, our children, the hope of tomorrow? What does this say about the ability to reach our adults and youth, to help them walk a path that is ultimately less dangerous and creates a better world for all of us? Take a look at the state as a whole and then your particular county. How does your county compare with the state and the nation? What can be done to help those who are least able to help themselves...our children?

Economic Security Indicators

Per Capita Personal Income

Definition: The total personal income of the residents of a given area divided by the resident population of the area.

The state's per capita personal income continues to increase, from \$13,784 in 1990 to \$16,863 in 1994, an increase of 22.3 percent over the four year period. This compares to the per capita income of \$21,696 for the U.S. in 1994.

Whatever the increase for the state, there are still large variances from one county to another, and from one region to another. In 1994, per capita personal income ranged from a high of \$21,798 in Pulaski County to a low of \$11,132 in Newton County.

"In many instances, an unusually high (or low) per capita personal income is the temporary result of unusual conditions, such as a bumper crop, a major construction project, or a natural disaster....a construction project may attract a large number of highly paid workers who are included in the population, but who send a substantial portion of their wages to dependents living in other areas....a county with a large institutional population, e.g., residents of a college or correctional institution, may show an unusually low per capita personal income, which is not necessarily

indicative of the economic well-being of the noninstitutional population." (*Arkansas Personal Income Handbook, 1996*, Economic Research, Institute for Economic Advancement, University of Arkansas at Little Rock)

According to the Economics and Statistics Administration, Bureau of the Census, 14.9 percent of Arkansans were living below the poverty level in 1995 as compared to 15.3 percent in 1994. Nationally, 20.8 percent of children under 18 live below the poverty level. (A comparable number is not available for the state.)

Income and the amount to which it is shared across a state is a measure of the success of economic development efforts of the various entities participating in such an effort.

Unemployment Rate

Definition: The number of unemployed workers as a percentage of the civilian labor force (included are those persons working or actively seeking employment).

Since 1992, Arkansas has had a lower unemployment rate than the nation as a whole. In 1995, Arkansas had an unemployment rate of 4.9 percent as compared to the national rate of 5.6 percent. In Arkansas counties, Benton County had the lowest rate of 2.3 percent while Ouachita County had the highest rate of 10.8 percent. There were in 1995, however, only two counties with unemployment rates over 10 percent.

While this appears to be good news to Arkansans, it may actually indicate labor shortages in some areas of the state. This means, that unless additional people can be found who are skilled at the occupations which will be available should other companies locate there or expansions occur, there will be no additional growth. Also, for some counties, a number of persons may simply have dropped out of the labor market altogether due to frustration at the lack of opportunities.

In 1994, the youth unemployment rate for youths 16-19 was 15.8 percent in Arkansas compared to 17.6 percent for the nation as a whole. (*The State of America's Children Yearbook 1996*, Children's Defense Fund)

Even though most people are employed in Arkansas, they tend to be employed in lower wage, lower skilled jobs, and many may be living in poverty. "Educational attainment and literacy level are both positively associated with higher annual earnings and lower unemployment rates." (*Indicator of the Month*, January 1996, National Center for Educational Statistics, Office of Educational Research and Improvement, U.S. Department of Education.) Additionally, the employment situation is not level with respect to age, race and other factors, such as location in the state.

Aid To Families With Dependent Children

Definition: Aid to Families with Dependent Children is a program administered and funded by federal and state governments to provide financial assistance to needy families.

Currently, in order to be eligible to receive AFDC payments, a family must have a dependent child who is

*under age 18 and living with them (an 18 year old who is expected to complete secondary school or its equivalent before turning 19 may also be covered).

*deprived of financial support from one of its parents due to the parent's death, continued absence, or incapacity (including children in two-parent families where the principal family earner is unemployed).

*a resident of the state they live in.

*a U.S. citizen or an alien who is permanently and lawfully residing in the United States.

In Arkansas, the percentage of children receiving AFDC continues to decrease slightly, from 13.8% in 1990/91 to 12.2% in 1994/95. In 1994/95, the percentage of children receiving AFDC ranged from a high of 39.4% in Phillips County to a low of 3.7% in Faulkner County.

What does this mean? Are there really fewer families who need AFDC due to better economic conditions, or are the dollars available for these families in need decreasing? More families were denied AFDC in Arkansas in state fiscal year 1995 than in state fiscal year 1994, and there were actually \$4 million dollars less available for the AFDC program in Arkansas in 1995 than in 1994.

What about welfare reform? With the current labor market, how realistic is it to expect that those persons with the least amount of education, training, and job experience will have a chance at a job, particularly one at a living wage? And what about their children? What happens to the children when there is no job and no "cash assistance to help them meet their most basic survival needs?" (*The State of America's Children Yearbook 1996, Children's Defense Fund.*)

Food Stamps

Definition: The federal Food Stamp Program is designed to provide nutrition to low income individuals and households through the use of coupons.

"Research shows that children who experience even temporary spells of malnutrition during infancy or childhood may suffer health and learning setbacks that limit their potential growth and development. Poor nutrition can retard physical growth, brain development, and cognitive functioning permanently." (*The State*

of America's Children Yearbook 1995, Children's Defense Fund, p46)

The food stamp program is the most widely used public food assistance program in the country. More than half of all food stamp recipients are children, as is the case in Arkansas. The number of children receiving food stamps nationally has increased from 9.4 million children in Fiscal Year 1989 to more than 14.3 million in Fiscal Year 1994, a 52.6% increase.

In Arkansas, the number of children receiving food stamps reached a high of 222,066 in State Fiscal Year 1994 which was an 18.8 percent increase over the number of children in State Fiscal 1990. In

State Fiscal Year 1996, however, there were 18,670 fewer children receiving food stamps or 8.4 percent less than in 1994.

In State Fiscal Year 1996, 32.2 percent of our state's children ages 0-18 were receiving food stamps. The percentage of children in Phillips County who received food stamps was 78.0 while there were 14.4 percent of the children receiving food stamps in Saline County.

Mothers who receive food stamps also tend to receive other forms of assistance. According to the Bureau of the Census, during the summer of 1993, nationally, three in four mothers on food stamps also received assistance from AFDC and/or WIC.

School Lunch

Definition: The National School Lunch Program is an entitlement program providing nutritious meals to children at participating schools. Meals provided by the schools must meet specific nutritional requirements in order for the school to qualify for federal funds.

This program began in the U.S. in 1946 as a result of the U.S. Army determining that many of its draftees were malnourished. Providing a nutritious lunch at school every day seemed to be the best solution to this harmful situation.

According to the Center on Hunger, Poverty and Nutrition Policy, in 1991, 26 percent of children under 18 in Arkansas were hungry. Nationally, 18.3 percent of children were hungry.

USDA research shows that children who participate in school lunch programs have better nutritional intake than those who do not. For some children, a school meal is their only nutritious meal of the day. Children from low income families depend on this program for one-third to one-half of their nutritional intake each day. Undernutrition during any period of

childhood can have detrimental effects on a child's cognitive development. The longer a child's nutritional and developmental needs go unmet, the greater the risk of cognitive impairment.

To receive a reduced price meal, currently, household income must be below 185 percent of the federal poverty level. For free meals, household income must fall below 130 percent of poverty. Children living in households receiving food stamps or AFDC are automatically eligible for free meals. In Arkansas, according to the Arkansas Department of Education, the percent eligible for the free/reduced lunch program during the 1995/96 school year was 43 percent, the same percent as in 1994/95, however, there were actually 2,376 more children eligible.

Women, Infants And Children's Program

"The Arkansas WIC Program"

Definition: The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is designed to improve the health of infants, children and childbearing women by providing nutritious food, nutrition education and counseling, and increasing the access of participants to other services. WIC is not an entitlement program.

This federally funded program serves pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women, infants and children under age five. Applicants must have an identifiable nutritional risk such as anemia, abnormal weight and/or growth conditions or patterns, inadequate or inappropriate dietary patterns, or other conditions which can benefit from nutritious food or counseling. Household income must be at or below 185 percent of poverty. In 1995, nationally WIC served a monthly average of 6.9 million people per month, about 73 percent of those eligible for the program.

Immunizations are available in all Arkansas clinics which provide WIC services. In 1995, most clinics also provided prenatal care, child health screening, family planning, and other health services.

Over 70 research studies have examined health outcomes which can be attributed to WIC. Some of

the most consistent findings are these:

- WIC contributes to a lower incidence of anemia in children.
- WIC reduces the likelihood of low or very low birthweight babies for participating pregnant women.
- WIC contributes to the prevention of infant mortality.
- WIC reduces medical costs for infants and new mothers.

Based on a review of several studies, the U.S. General Accounting Office estimated that WIC could save federal, state, and local governments \$3.50 for every dollar spent on a pregnant woman enrolled in WIC.

In Arkansas, there were 122,408 people certified during 1995, down 165 from 1994. Of those persons certified, 65.2 percent were certified at 100 percent or below the poverty level. There were thirty counties with percentages above the state average. Phillips County, at 82 percent, serves the greatest percentage of those most in need. This county also serves 30 percent of the population who are in the appropriate age ranges, the highest percentage of all counties.

At Risk Indicators

High School Dropouts

Definition: The number of students dropping out in grades 7-12 from October 31st of one school year through October 31st of the next school year (current year), divided by the number of students enrolled in grades 7-12 as of October 1st of the current year.

High school graduation is critical in pursuing a job or pursuing post-secondary education. Yet, a high school diploma doesn't ensure success in the job market. For instance, "a study of fast-food jobs in Central Harlem by Columbia University researchersfound fierce competition for....low wage jobs. For every person hired in fast-food jobs, 13 applicants were turned away. Many of those rejected had high school diplomas...." (*The State of America's Children Yearbook 1996, Children's Defense Fund*) Teens who drop out of high school have an extremely difficult time achieving financial success in life.

In any given year, the likelihood of slipping into poverty is about three times greater for high school dropouts than for those who have finished high school; and while high school dropouts may intend to obtain a GED, only a small share actually do so. "Over a lifetime, high school dropouts will earn only 75 percent as much as high school graduates, and less than

half of what college graduates are likely to make.

Jobs in the 21st century will require advanced skills and technical knowledge, so those who have limited education and skills will have dismal prospects and this situation is likely to worsen over time. On a good note, the number of Arkansas students enrolled in tech prep continues to increase, which indicates that more students are taking advantage of the opportunity to learn job skills while in high school.

The dropout rate is continuing to decrease in Arkansas. The 1990/91 dropout rate was 4.0 percent or 7,723 young people left school. In 1994/95, slightly fewer students, 7,620, dropped out of our public schools, and the rate was 3.8 percent. The highest dropout rate was in Mississippi County at 8.03 percent, while the lowest rate was 0% in Calhoun and Izard counties.

Percent Births To Women With Less Than 12 Years Education

Definition: The percentage of all births to Arkansas residents who have fewer than 12 years of formal education.

The economic outlook for a person with less than 12 years of education is not encouraging, much less when you add to that the children that they bring into this world.

The pregnant mother without a high school degree is more likely to be a teen, smoke during pregnancy and engage in other behaviors which could be detrimental to her unborn child, and less likely to get early and complete prenatal care. This young mother is more likely to experience complications during pregnancy and at birth, which could be detrimental to her unborn child resulting in low birth weight¹¹ and the extraordinary costs associated therein. (1996 Kansas Kids

Count Data Book, p30)

Teen mothers often have difficulty completing high school and acquiring the skills necessary to get and keep a job, which could assure their economic well-being and that of their children.

The children born to these mothers often face extreme barriers to their own long-term success: they are more likely to live in poverty, become teen parents themselves, and "are less likely to experience academic success" than those whose mothers have a high school degree. (1996 Kansas Kids Count Data Book, p30)

Thus the cycle continues. Communities must find ways to keep their children in school, learning, pregnant or not. Educating teens on the short- and long-term effects of pregnancy must continue so that we can discourage this downward spiral. Some teens will be successful despite such adversity, but for those who do not have this tenacity of spirit, ways must be found to build self-esteem and avenues for success.

Teen Births (Ages 10-17)

Definition: The percentage of all births to Arkansas residents age 10-17.

Children having children is particularly problematic because it diminishes the opportunities of both the child and the parents. Teenage mothers and fathers are often unmarried, undereducated, much more likely to have grown up in economically disadvantaged families, come from inner city neighborhoods or isolated rural communities, and be medically disadvantaged. They are also more likely to have low aspirations.

The children who are born to unmarried teenage mothers will have real difficulty in developing the resources they need to become independent, productive, and well-adjusted adults. (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p12) Children of teen mothers are more likely to be victims of child abuse and neglect. Research shows that these children tend to repeat the parent's cycle.

Children who are born to these young mothers tend to be born prematurely or at a low birthweight. That ends up costing someone a lot of money. "The

average cost of a delivery of a full-term, healthy baby is about \$3,000. The average cost of a low birthweight baby (one weighing under 5.5 pounds or 2,500 grams) is \$30,000" and "health care costs throughout the first year of that baby's life can easily reach \$150,000." (*Babies and You Program Can Save Your Business Money*, *Babies and Your Business*, Summer 1995) Prenatal care for teen mothers is critical. Every \$1 invested in preventive care during pregnancy may save \$3.38 in high tech intensive care following birth, as well as additional costs later for special education, mental health, and health care.

The teen birth rate for Arkansas was 7.5 percent in 1990 and 8.0 percent in 1995. Woodruff County was the highest rate at 17.7 percent, while Grant County was the lowest at 3.3 percent.

Children In Danger Indicators

Infant Mortality

Definition: The number of deaths occurring to infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births.

"The most prevalent causes of infant death are premature births and low birthweight, respiratory problems and other pregnancy complications. Early prenatal care represents an effective strategy for reducing these contributors to infant mortality." (1996 *Kansas*

Kids Count Data Book)

Nationally, the infant mortality rate was 7.9 per 1,000 live births for 1994. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has a lower rate of 7.0 per 1,000 as an established goal.

Arkansas has fluctuated in its infant mortality rate. In 1990, the rate was 9.3 per 1,000 live births and rose to a high of 10.4 in 1992. Since then, the rate has been steadily decreasing, until in 1995, it reached 9.0 per 1,000 live births, or 317 deaths.

The highest infant mortality rate in 1995 occurred in Van Buren County at 39.5 per 1,000, or 6 deaths, while the counties of Calhoun, Carroll, Cleve-

land, Perry, and Randolph reported no infant mortality deaths. Pulaski County, however reported the highest number of deaths at 57 and the infant mortality rate for Pulaski County was 10.1 in 1995. In the smaller counties, the number of deaths may be small and the rates high, due to so few births, comparatively, during the year.

Once again, early prenatal care and good nutrition can vastly reduce the number of deaths to infants. This will mean that fewer families will suffer the anguish of the death of their child and medical costs will be curtailed substantially.

Child Maltreatment

Definition: The rate of children for whom an allegation of maltreatment has been founded (substantiated) per 1,000 children.

"According to the National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect, 1993 data indicate that among the one million children suffering substantiated maltreatment, nearly half (49 percent) were neglected, 24 percent were physically abused, 14 percent were sexually abused, 5.0 percent suffered emotional mistreatment, and 2.0 percent suffered medical neglect. More than one in five victims were younger than three, and about half were seven or younger. Twenty percent were teenagers." (The State of America's Children Yearbook 1996, Children's Defense Fund)

During State Fiscal Year 1995, in Arkansas, there were 17,612 assessments conducted of alleged child maltreatment by the Division of Children and Family Services, and other approved agencies. This was a decrease from the 18,420 assessments conducted in 1994. Of these, 5,364 (30.46 percent) were founded, that is, some credible evidence was gathered which would cause a reasonable person to believe that a child was maltreated. These founded assessments included 8,169 children, ages 0-17. There were 2,361 children who were victims

of abuse, 3,874 children who were victims of neglect, 1,494 children who were victims of sexual abuse, 289 children who were victims of abuse and neglect, 35 children who were victims of abuse and sexual abuse, 109 children who were victims of neglect and sexual abuse, and 7 children who were victims of abuse, neglect, and sexual abuse. (Abuse means any nonaccidental physical injury, mental injury, sexual abuse, or sexual exploitation inflicted on a child by anyone legally responsible for the care and maintenance of the child, or an injury which is at variance with the history given. The term encompasses both acts and omissions.) (Child Maltreatment Annual Statistical Report, Arkansas Department of Human Services, Division of Children and Family Services)

During State Fiscal Year 1996, the founded assessments included 8,534 children, or a 13.7 per 1,000 (ages 0-17) child maltreatment rate, up slightly from the 13.2 rate in 1994.

Teen Arrests (Ages 15-17)

Definition: Juvenile arrest rates are calculated for all types of offenses for youths under the age of 18 per 1,000 children. The arrest rates are separated by violent crime, property crime, and alcohol and drug related crimes. Violent crimes consist of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes consist of burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Alcohol and drug related crimes consist of drug sales/manufacturing, drug possession, driving under the influence, violation of liquor laws, and drunkenness.

A child's arrest for any reason is important and should not go unnoticed. When looking at arrests and arrest rates, caution must be exercised in interpreting this measure. Differences in these rates over time and county to county may actually reflect changes in law enforcement activity or public policy rather than changes in juvenile behaviors. Additionally, an arrest does not make the person guilty of the crime.

In Arkansas, there were 19,789 arrests of juveniles under 18 in 1995; 14,253 involved juveniles from 15-17 years of age. Miller County had the highest violent crime arrest rate of 42.4 (81 arrests), with twenty-three counties reporting no arrests. Grant

County had the highest property crime arrest rate of 79.8 (54 arrests) with seven counties reporting no arrests, and the highest alcohol and drug related crime arrest rate of 87.1 (59 arrests) with eight counties reporting no arrests.

Juvenile Offenders and Victims, (prepared by Howard N. Snyder and Melissa Sickmund of the National Center for Juvenile Justice, August 1995) provides the following information on juveniles involved with the justice system nationally (pp46-65):

- Juveniles have committed at least one delinquent act.
- Black juveniles are twice as likely as white juveniles to come in contact with law enforcement.
- Most juveniles who come in contact with the juvenile justice system do so only once.
- Serious offending increases as the delinquent ages and as the career lengthens.
- A small number of juvenile offenders are chronic, or persistent, offenders.
- Less than one-half of 1 percent of juveniles in the U.S. were arrested for a violent offense in 1992.
- Some juvenile offenders continue offending as adults.
- Probability of adult arrest increases with the number of juvenile arrests.
- Serious adult offenders are likely to have more serious juvenile careers.
- Juvenile offending is less predictive of adult offending as an adult ages.
- Gun possession is common for serious juvenile offenders and some inner-city high school students.
- The growth in homicides involving juvenile offenders has surpassed that involving adults.
- Nearly one-third of juvenile murder victims are strangers.
- A growing number of juveniles kill in groups of two or more.
- One-third of juveniles entering detention centers test positive for at least one drug.

Teen Violent Deaths (Ages 15-17)

Definition: The teen violent death rate is the number of deaths from causes other than illness, primarily homicide, suicide, or motor vehicle accidents, among teens ages 15-17 per 100,000 youth.

"Every two hours in America today, a child dies of a gunshot wound. The average hospital bill for treating a child wounded by a gun is \$14,434 - enough money for a year of college." (1995 Kids Count

Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p14)

The incidences of homicide and violence generally are indicators of "delinquent behavior, hostility, and anger," often resulting from feelings of isolation, alienation, and hopelessness. "It is also a reflection of access to firearms and an indicator of community safety. The incidence of suicide is an indicator of stress, mental health, and community and family support. Accidental deaths, or unintentional injuries are indicators of children's health and risk-taking behaviors, especially among older adolescents. These unintentional injuries are also a measure of a broad range of public health and accident prevention strategies including public education, product development and use (e.g. bike helmets, safety belts, smoke detectors, etc.), and risk reduction and treatment sources." (The State of the Child in Pennsylvania: A 1995 Kids

Count Fact Book, Pennsylvania Kids Count Partnership, p9)

The No. 1 killer of 15-17 year olds in Arkansas in 1995 was death from accidents/adverse effects, the No. 2 cause of death was homicide, and the No. 3 cause of death was suicide.

Accidents accounted for 52 percent (56) of all deaths in this age group. The most likely 15-17 year old victims were white males, followed by black males.

The 19 homicides in 1995 accounted for 18 percent of all deaths in this age group. Black males were the victims in 68 percent (13) of the deaths. Homicides represented 20 percent of all external causes of death in the 15-17 age group.

Suicide represented 14 percent of all deaths in this age group. Seventy-three percent of the suicides were committed by white males with white females accounting for the remaining 27 percent. There were no reported suicides by black teens. Guns were used in approximately 67 percent of suicides.



Appendix

Definitions and Sources

Demographic Profile

TOTAL POPULATION: the total number of people residing in a specific area as enumerated by the decennial census on April 1. A geographic area may be a city, township, county, state, nation, census tract, block group, or block.

POPULATION UNDER 18: the total number of people between the ages of one day and eighteen years as of April 1 of the census year.

MINORITY POPULATION UNDER 18: the number of people between the ages of one day and eighteen years as of April 1 of the census year who are black; Asian or Pacific Islander; American Indian, Eskimo, or Aleutian; or any other unspecified race (not Hispanic, since Hispanics may be of any race).

The 1990 population counts used in the Children's Data Book do not match those published in the 1990 Census of Population and Housing reports and tape files. The population has been "modified" by age, race, sex, and Hispanic origin to meet the needs of many data users, especially those involved in population estimate and projection work.

A review of the detailed information indicated that respondents tended to provide their age as of the date of completion of the questionnaire, not their age as of April 1, 1990. In addition, there may have been a tendency for respondents to round up their ages if they were close to having birthdays. It is likely that approximately ten percent of persons in most age groups are actually one year younger. For most single years of age, the misstatements are largely offsetting. The problem is most pronounced at age zero because persons lost to age one may not have been fully offset by the inclusion of babies born after April 1, 1990, and because there may have been more rounding up to age one to avoid reporting age as 'zero years.' Age in completed months was not collected for infants under age one. Therefore, the age data from the 1990 census were adjusted to correspond with the April 1, 1990 census date.

In addition, 9.8 million respondents nationwide reported their race as 'Other' on the census questionnaire and were not included in one of the fifteen racial categories listed on the form. In order to serve the needs of the user community, it was necessary to assign each of these persons to a specified race, and thus the race statistics were modified to be consistent with the classification used in data sets other than census.

SINGLE MOTHER OR SINGLE FATHER FAMILIES: families in which no spouse is present.

Any of these families may contain children under eighteen years to whom the householder and/or spouse are related by birth or adoption. The number of children in each of the three categories divided by the total number of children determines the percent who are children in each type of family. These three categories may not sum to 100 percent because not all children are in families.

If the family income was less than the corresponding cutoff, the family was classified as "below poverty level." The number of children below poverty was the sum of all children in families below the poverty level. The percent of children in poverty was the sum of children below the poverty level divided by the total number of all children in families.
