ABSTRACT

The Graduate Follow-Up Survey is conducted annually to gather data regarding the activities and perceptions of students approximately six months after their graduation from Wisconsin's 16 technical colleges. The objectives of the survey are to identify the current activities of program graduates, to determine the extent to which current activities are related to the educational programs, to provide information to be used as tools in career awareness and planning efforts, and to provide data to facilitate program planning, evaluation, and development. In 1999, a total of 15,365 graduates were surveyed and 11,538 responded, for a response rate of 75 percent. Ninety-six percent of respondents were employed and four percent were seeking employment. Ninety-seven percent of respondents indicated that they were very satisfied or satisfied with training received at the colleges, and 83 percent of those employed indicated that their job is related to training received. The median annual salary for all respondents was \$24,594. OVERVIEW

Introduction

The Graduate Follow-Up Survey is conducted annually to gather data regarding the activities and perceptions of students approximately six months after their graduation from Wisconsin's Technical Colleges.

The primary objectives of the survey are to identify the current activities of program graduates, to determine the extent to which current activities are related to the graduates' educational programs, to provide information to be used as tools in career awareness and planning efforts for those making or assisting in career decisions, and to provide data to facilitate program planning, evaluation and development.

Methodology

The 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System surveyed graduates of programs in their respective colleges. The survey was conducted between October and December, 1999. A total of *15,365 graduates* were surveyed statewide with *11,538 responding*, resulting in a *response rate of 75 percent*. These responses were submitted to the Wisconsin Technical College System Board for compilation of this statewide report. A copy of the survey instrument is included as Appendix A. Basic concepts and measures used throughout the report are defined below.

The *labor force* includes all employed and unemployed individuals except those who are unemployed and not seeking employment. A person is considered *employed* if he or she worked for pay or profit at the time of the survey. Individuals in any of these groups may be employed full-time or part-time. Full-time employment is defined as 35 or more hours per week; part-time employment is less than 35 hours per week. A person is considered to be seeking employment if he or she performed no work for pay or profit at the time of the survey but was looking for work.

Survey respondents who are employed classified their jobs as related or not related to the training they received. In the follow-up data tables beginning on page 9, employed respondents who indicate their job is related to their training are counted in the *employed related* category. Thus, the employed related category is a subset of the employed category.

Salary figures are reported for respondents who indicate they are employed full-time in jobs related to their training. The *median salary* is the mid-point of salaries reported with half of the salaries below and half above the mid-point. Please note that salaries are now displayed as per hour and annual rates.

DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION OF 1998-99 GRADUATES

The following table shows the sex and ethnicity of all of the 15,365 1998-99 graduates by type of degree granted and by instructional division. There are 3,345 more females than males. Minorities represented 8.1 percent of all graduates, while 5.2 percent of the graduates did not report their ethnicity. (Please note N/R means Not Reported.)


AGE GROUPS OF GRADUATES


REASON FOR ATTENDING

Graduates were asked to give their reason for attending a technical college. The majority of respondents, 46 percent, said it was to prepare to obtain employment, while 20 percent said it was to make a career change. Thirteen percent said it was to improve existing job skills and eight percent are preparing to continue their education. Five percent attended for personal interest and eight percent cited other or miscellaneous reasons.




SATISFACTION WITH TRAINING

Graduates rated the training they received. Of the graduates responding, 97 percent indicated that they were satisfied or very satisfied with their training, and three percent stated that they were unsatisfied or very unsatisfied.




EMPLOYMENT STATUS

Of the respondents who are in the labor force, 96 percent are employed and 4 percent are still seeking employment. Within the group who are employed, 83 percent indicated that their job is related to the training received and 17 percent reported that their job is not related to the training received.




EMPLOYMENT LOCATION

As indicated below, 87 percent of the graduates who responded to the survey are employed in Wisconsin, six percent are employed out-of-state, and seven percent did not indicate where they are employed. Of those employed in Wisconsin, 71 percent are employed in the technical college district where they received their training, and 29 percent are employed in another district.




EMPLOYMENT RELATED TO TRAINING BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION

Statewide in all instructional areas, 83 percent of the graduates who responded to the survey obtained employment in occupations related to their training. The chart below shows the number employed and the number and percent of those employed related for each instructional area from highest percentage employed related (Technical) to lowest (Service).



MEDIAN ANNUAL SALARIES BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION

The chart below shows median annual salaries in each instructional division. The median salary reflects the mid-point of all salaries reported for each instructional division. Salary figures are based only on those respondents who report being employed full-time in occupations related to their training. The median annual salary for all 1998-99 technical college graduates is \$24,594.


