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
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ABSTRACT

This report summarizes the activities of the South Carolina State Library for 1998-1999. Sections include: (1) library governance and mission statement; (2) brief library history; (3) details about the organization and operations of the library, including a description of each of the six service departments, a list of library staff, highlights of the year, and a financial statement chart indicating expenditures; (4) data on library services, including services to state government, interlibrary loan, state documents depository system, services to the blind and physically handicapped, and state library loan statistics; (5) a statistical summary of library materials and description of special collections; (6) library development, including consultation services and grant administration; (7) an update on the South Carolina Library Network; (8) public information services activities; (9) data on volunteer program participation; and (10) a list of recent state library publications. I. GOVERNANCE/MISSION STATEMENT

Statutory authority for the South Carolina State Library is provided by Title 60, Chapter 1 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina. Originally authorized in 1929 and known as the State Library Board, the public library extension agency was first funded in 1943. It was redesignated the South Carolina State Library with a broad range of responsibilities by Act 464 of 1969. The legislation was recodified and new functions were authorized by Act 178 of 1985.

The South Carolina State Library is an independent state agency governed by a board of seven members appointed by the Governor, with one member from each Congressional District and one from the state at large. Members serve five-year terms and may be reappointed. The Director, who is responsible for the operation of the agency, is appointed by and is responsible to the State Library Board.

The South Carolina State Library's mission is to improve library services throughout the state and to ensure all citizens access to libraries and information resources adequate to meet their needs. The State Library supports libraries in meeting the informational, educational, cultural, and recreational needs of the people of South Carolina.

To accomplish this mission the South Carolina State Library has identified five strategic issues to meet the needs of the people of South Carolina:

- Identify, organize, develop, maintain, and make accessible informational resources and services to meet the needs of the people of South Carolina.
- Provide statewide programs to support improved local library services.
- Serve as the advocate for libraries in South Carolina.
- Encourage cooperation among libraries of all types.
- Continuously improve State Library operations and services.

II. HISTORY

At the urging of citizens interested in quality county-wide library service, the General Assembly passed legislation in 1929 establishing the State Public Library Association and a State Library Board composed of five citizens. In the depths of the Great Depression, no funds were appropriated for the library extension agency, but grants from the South Carolina Library Association and the Rosenwald Foundation enabled the State Library Board to employ a field agent from 1929 to 1932 to assist communities interested in the development of public library service.

The first statewide library program was carried out under the Works Project Administration from 1935 to 1943. The WPA's major objective was to provide each county of the state some measure of area-wide public library service. The WPA library program helped establish library service in some areas and enhanced existing libraries' operations in others. The WPA program made possible the establishment of bookmobile service in twenty-three counties formerly without rural library service. At its demise in 1943, the WPA had been successful in creating public library service in some form in all counties.

The State Library Board received its first appropriation of \$3,000 in 1943 and inherited the assets of the WPA. The State Library Board initiated its program with emphasis on State Aid to public libraries and a goal of statewide public library service. County or regional libraries were established in all forty-six counties. The pattern of unified library systems, each legally established and governed by a single library board, made possible a good level of service by eliminating expensive duplication and overhead and by sharing resources and personnel.

When the federal Library Services Act was passed in 1956, the State Library Board, by executive order of the Governor, was charged with administering and implementing within the state the library programs authorized in the Act. Through this Act, the agency's functions were expanded to include service to the blind and physically handicapped, development of library service in state institutions, and interlibrary cooperation.

In 1969, as the result of action by the General Assembly, the State Library Board was redesignated as the South Carolina State Library and assumed responsibility for public library development, library service for state institutions, service for the blind and physically handicapped, and library service to state government agencies. In 1985, an act was passed providing for the recodification of the State Library's legislation. The new legislation reauthorized all functions of the State Library and consolidated a variety of authorizations found in state and federal laws and regulations, executive orders and budget provisos.

After 40 years, Congress replaced the Library Services & Construction Act with the Library Services & Technology Act in 1990. This new legislation encouraged state libraries to develop programs which utilize telecommunications and other technologies to make information available to library users regardless of the type of library used. During its first year (FY 98) the State Library created DISCUS – South Carolina's Virtual Library, which provided online access to a wide range of information services to users of public libraries and academic libraries. State funding was approved by the General Assembly to extend this service to schools as well in FY 99. DISCUS has proven to be a widely accepted information tool for all South Carolinians.

III. ORGANIZATION/OPERATIONS

A. Organization

The director, who is responsible for the operation of the South Carolina State Library, is appointed by and is responsible to the Board of the State Library. The director is assisted by a deputy director. The work of the library is carried out by six departments. A brief description of each follows.

- **Administrative Services.** Provides support services in the areas of budgeting, financial management, personnel, procurement, public relations, secretarial and clerical support, and facilities management.
- **Blind and Handicapped Services.** Provides library service to the blind and physically handicapped in cooperation with the Library of Congress, National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Reading materials are provided in special formats (recorded, large print, and braille). The service is free, as is the loan of equipment necessary to listen to the recorded materials.
- **Library Development.** Provides consultant services to public and state institutional libraries to further the development and improvement of library services statewide. Administers state and federal grants-in-aid programs.
- **Reader Services.** Coordinates DISCUS – South Carolina’s Virtual Library. Provides research services to state government agencies. Provides statewide reference and interlibrary loan service to supplement local library resources. Coordinates the South Carolina State Documents Depository System.
- **Network Services.** Operates the South Carolina Library Network through the maintenance of a computer-based library network and communications system which facilitates sharing of library resources and services.
- **Technical Services.** Acquires, catalogs, classifies, and makes available all materials used in the library program. Maintains the library's database.

III. D. Highlights

DISCUS---South Carolina's Virtual Library was extended to all public school libraries in FY99. At year's end, DISCUS was available to all public schools, all public libraries, and libraries in institutions of higher education, as well as to state government agencies. DISCUS provides all South Carolinians with equal access to an electronic library of essential information resources. These databases were accessed over 963,00 times in FY99, retrieving over 2.8 million articles and other documents.

A complement to DISCUS, the South Carolina Group Database Licensing Project enabled public libraries and colleges to purchase selected databases appropriate for their clientele. The State Library assumed a lead role in the development of this project which used the collective buying power of libraries to secure discounts on subscription prices of Internet-accessible electronic databases.

To enhance access to its resources, the State Library this year developed a Web-based interface for its online catalog, designated WebLION. This interface enables libraries to place interlibrary loan requests through the Internet. The State Library also began cataloging state government publications in electronic format and providing links to these publications.

The State Library prepared a needs assessment which led to the Gates Learning Foundation providing grants totaling \$4.3 million to the state's public libraries for the purchase of public access computers. This grant was the largest private grant ever awarded to South Carolina's public libraries. It doubled the number of personal computers in public libraries.


The Palmetto Book Alliance (PBA), an affiliate of the Library of Congress Center for the Book, is co-sponsored by the State Library and the College of Library and Information Science at the University of South Carolina. The PBA will promote and encourage participation in book-related programs and activities sponsored by various groups and organizations around the state.

The State Library published *South Carolina Public Library Standards and A Pocket Reference Manual for Public Library Trustees*. These two publications will provide valuable information for library staffs and board members as they develop local public library policies.

The career education project provides continuing education opportunities through workshops and training grants for public and institutional library personnel and for public library trustees, as well as a program for state government employees.

The State Library staff is to be commended for its hard work, which enables the agency to consistently improve the delivery of services to its various constituent groups.

IV. LIBRARY SERVICES

A. Services to State Government

The State Library provides library and information services for the General Assembly, state officers and agencies, and state government employees. To carry out its defined mission, the State Library provides a highly skilled research and technical staff as well as a well-developed library collection to assist state government officials and employees with their information needs.

Services to state government include:

- Staff of research librarians who conduct research and answer information requests for state employees to help them perform their jobs.
- Free loan of library materials, including books, journals, government publications, videotapes, and audiocassettes to state employees.
- Interlibrary loan service to locate and borrow publications that state employees need which are not contained in the State Library's collection.
- Special presentations and training programs for state government agencies and employees to inform them of the services and resources of the library as well as electronic information resources on the Internet. Hands-on training conducted in a fully equipped training facility at the State Library.
- Computerized access to the library's web-based catalog, WebLION, and to FEDCAT a catalog of U.S. government publications dating from 1976 to the present.
- Electronic request system for titles held in State Library's catalog.
- DISCUS -- South Carolina's Virtual Library, providing state employees with computerized access to multiple information databases and full-text of magazine and newspaper articles from their state offices.
- State Library web site designed for state employees – the Lion's Den - providing information on State Library services and organized links to information sources of interest to state employees.
- Electronic reference service that allows state employees to place information requests via e-mail.
- Database management services to catalog, classify, process, and create electronic catalogs of materials held in collections at state agencies.

- Centralized collection, storage, and preservation of official printed state agency publications through the South Carolina State Documents Depository System.
- Preparation of bibliographies and lists of library materials on special topics of interest to state government.
- Specialized collection of training videos on management and staff development topics.
- Public Internet workstations for connecting rapidly to the Internet.
- New Resources, a bi-monthly publication sent to over 500 state employees, to alert them to recent publications available at the State Library.
- Document delivery of library materials to state employees via the state's Interagency Mail Service.
- Deposit book collection at the S.C. Department of Archives and History for use by employees.

Statistics on use of the State Library by state government officials and employees from July 1, 1998 to June 30, 1999:

- 16,659 research questions answered for state government employees.
- 8,134 directional and assistance queries answered.
- 52,654 library materials circulated to state government employees.
- 26,385 state government employees and SC citizens visited the library.
- 6,032 state government employees registered as borrowers.
- 1,154 titles borrowed on interlibrary loan for state government employees.
- 416 videos and films booked and checked out to state government employees for both training purposes and individual use.
- 73 training and orientation programs conducted, reaching 1,009 state employees.

B. Interlibrary Loan Service

The State Library provides reference and interlibrary loan service to supplement the local resources of South Carolina libraries. Since no single library can meet all of the diverse research needs of its patrons, the collections of the State Library have been developed as a source upon which local libraries can draw to make information and materials available to South Carolinians in their own communities. The State Library also lends materials upon request to other libraries throughout the country.

Statistics on use of the State Library's Interlibrary Loan Service from July 1, 1998 to June 30, 1999:

- 24,042 requests processed from libraries.
- 21,108 title requests for books and articles handled.
- 2,934 research requests answered for public and state institutional libraries.
- 1,437 alternative library locations determined for requested materials that were not available from the State Library's collection.
- 25,340 titles circulated to libraries.
- 64 training and orientation programs conducted for South Carolina libraries, reaching 1,228 library employees.
- 17,299 books and articles supplied to South Carolina public libraries for citizens in the state.
- 984 videos and films booked for libraries in the state.
- 2,986 books and articles supplied to academic libraries in South Carolina for students and faculty.
- 564 books and articles supplied to state institutional libraries for staff, patients, and inmates.
- 680 books and articles supplied to special libraries in South Carolina for their employees.
- 2,444 books and articles supplied to high school libraries in South Carolina for students and teachers.
- 1,367 books and articles supplied to other libraries outside South Carolina.

- 313,025 visits to the SConnects website from public library users.

C. State Documents Depository System

The South Carolina State Library administers the State Documents Depository System which ensures local access to state government publications. Major points of the program are:

- State agencies/institutions supply 15 copies of publications to the State Library.
- The State Library catalogs and processes publications and retains 3 copies for its permanent collection. 1 copy is distributed to each of the 11 participating in-state depository libraries and 1 copy to the Library of Congress.

The eleven affiliate depository libraries which receive publications through this program include 9 university and 2 county libraries:

State Documents activities in 1998/99 included:

- The advent of cataloging state government publications in electronic format and providing links to these publications.
- Selection of the 10 most notable state publications of 1998. Awards were made to recipient agencies on March 16, 1999 during Freedom of Information Day activities.
- The South Carolina Information Forum was held May 6, 1999, at the S.C. Department of Archives & History. The forum focused on significant collections and electronic information resources relating to the status of education in South Carolina.
- Site visit to the College of Charleston.

FY 99 marked the 17th year of the South Carolina State Documents Depository System, following passage of the State Documents Depository Act in 1982.

D. DISCUS – South Carolina’s Virtual Library

The State Library administers DISCUS – South Carolina’s Virtual Library to provide all South Carolinians with equal access to an electronic library of essential information resources. These resources are made available through statewide subscriptions to Internet-accessible databases for participating libraries and educational institutions. A 1997/98 pilot project, funded by the federal Library Services and Technology Act, provided all of the state’s public libraries and colleges with access to four full-text periodical and reference databases. The General Assembly’s \$1.5 million appropriation for 1998/99 was used to expand DISCUS to South Carolina’s schools and to purchase subscriptions to fourteen reference and information databases. Some Federal funds continue to support the project.

Through DISCUS the state’s schools, public libraries and colleges gained unlimited Internet access to three online encyclopedias, seven full-text reference and periodical databases, and four topical databases. These databases provided several million full-text articles on all subjects from over 3,000 periodicals, reference books and government reports. These resources support student research and inquiry, teacher lesson-planning and curriculum development, teacher study and training, as well as citizen access to lifelong learning and information resources. Few libraries in the state had access to more than a few of these resources prior to the implementation of DISCUS.

During 1998/99 South Carolinians accessed the databases over 963,000 times, retrieving over 2.8 million articles and other documents. To insure that these resources are used effectively, the State Library coordinated training sessions conducted by the database vendors, as well as provided additional training sessions conducted by State Library staff. Over 1,200 media specialists, librarians, library staff members and curriculum resource teachers attended these sessions.

DISCUS publicity efforts during 1998/99 targeted staff of the participating school, college and public libraries. Representative committees of librarians from the participating institutions advise the State Library on the selection of appropriate databases and the implementation and future direction of the project.

E. South Carolina Group Database Licensing Project

The State Library assumed a lead role in the South Carolina Group Database Licensing Project during the year. This collaborative endeavor used the collective buying power of libraries and the group licensing services of SOLINET to secure discounts on the subscription price of Internet-accessible electronic databases. A complement to DISCUS, the Project enabled public libraries and colleges to purchase selected databases appropriate for their clientele. Forty-four libraries purchased over \$188,000 in database subscriptions, saving them over \$46,000 or 20% of the regular cost.

A voluntary committee coordinated the Project, with representation from the technical colleges, other public colleges, private colleges and the State Library. The State Library facilitated and administered the committee's work, served as liaison with SOLINET, and communicated with all libraries. The State Library also sponsored seven database training sessions for 77 library staff members. The cost of these sessions was underwritten by Library Services and Technology Act funds, saving participating libraries an additional \$4,000.

In addition to providing libraries with cost savings, the Project encouraged library cooperation and led to the development of numerous other group purchase initiatives among South Carolina libraries. The State Library anticipates continued involvement with this and other collaborative purchase initiatives.

F. Library Services to the Blind and Physically Handicapped

The State Library's Department for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (DBPH), in cooperation with the Library of Congress, National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS), provides free reading materials to any legal resident of the state who is unable to read or use conventional print materials due to a visual or physical limitation. Qualifying conditions include, but are not limited to:

- blindness
- double vision
- cataracts
- stroke
- paralysis
- glaucoma
- learning disabilities
- palsy
- multiple sclerosis

Collection: Reading materials in special media (cassette, large print, braille, and disc) are available in all subject areas for all age groups. The National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped provides books and magazines in braille, recorded disc, and cassette formats; playback equipment and accessories; promotional materials; and support materials such as bibliographies, reference circulars, catalogs and fact sheets. The State Library provides staff, facilities, operating costs, a supplemental collection of books in large print, and a descriptive video collection (nonverbal and visual cues are described by narrators) consisting of 173 titles. Braille service is provided through contract services with the North Carolina State Library. At the end of FY 99, there were 272 registered braille readers.

volunteer narrator programs of network libraries. A total of 11,615 copies of volunteer produced cassette magazines circulated in FY 99.

Patron Services: Materials are loaned and returned to DBPH by postage-free mail to all registered readers. Reader advisory service is also provided. An average of 106 new applications were processed per month in FY99. Total registered readers increased by 1% over FY98.

*Based on the NLS formula, using a multiple of 6 to determine estimated institutional readership, 2,514 persons represented the readership in 419 institutions.

Circulation for all media including recorded magazines and DVS tapes was 251,931 in FY99.

Playback equipment is also loaned and returned to DBPH by postage-free mail. The FY99 inventory consisted of 9,508 cassette players and 1,232 record players. Of that number, 8,008 cassette players and 1,191 record players were assigned to registered talking book readers.

Patron Contact: DBPH publishes a quarterly newsletter and offers it in braille, large print and cassette formats. Patrons have access to a toll-free In-WATS direct line to the library and enjoy free matter mailing privileges for both receiving items from and returning items to the library. Walk-ins (patrons who chose to visit the library in person) receive personal service and are assisted by readers advisors. Children, ages pre-school – twelve may participate in an annual Summer Reading Program.

In appreciation for talking book services, many patrons--as well as family members and friends--make donations to the library. In FY 99, the library received a total of \$8,165 in financial contributions (including memorial donations) and \$1,770 worth of large print titles.

A web site allows interested persons to obtain information on all aspects of the library's services and provides instant access to an online application. Links are provided to a variety of disability related web sites.

V. LIBRARY MATERIALS

To meet the information needs of both state government and the citizens of South Carolina, the State Library maintains a collection of non-fiction publications on a wide range of topics, such as history, art, applied technology, political science, and the social sciences. The collection also includes audiovisual materials and state and federal documents. The acquisition and organization of library materials is handled by staff of the Technical Services Department. Specific titles which are requested by libraries and by state employees are monitored and often serve as recommendations for purchase. By acquiring, housing, and offering these information materials in one central location, the library attempts to eliminate the need for state agencies to maintain expensive, individual collections. The library's collection also serves to supplement the collections of local public and other libraries which often lack sufficient funds to purchase extensive research materials.

- A. **Statistical Summary.** The book collection is chiefly a one-copy, non-fiction collection, except for South Carolina titles. It includes periodicals and newspapers in both paper and microfilm, and services such as Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) microfiche. Separate collections include federal and state documents and audiovisual materials. Principal additions during the year are as follows:

All materials are cataloged according to national library cataloging standards. In order to better serve users, the staff acquires and processes additions to the collections efficiently. The Technical Services staff enters the data into the State Library's automated library system and maintains the database.

As a member of Southeastern Library Network, a computerized network of libraries affiliated with the national network, OCLC, Inc., it is possible to add the State Library's holdings to the international network database, thereby enabling greater use through interlibrary loan.

B. Special Collections.

The library maintains a number of special collections which focus on specific topics to support the information needs of South Carolina's citizens. These include:

- 1. Audiovisual Collection** - A collection of materials in videotape, audiocassette, 16mm film, or slide/tape which focus on specific topics to assist the library's customers. Audiovisual materials to support programs for children in public libraries and to provide information and training in the fields of early childhood education are maintained. Training videos to help state employees improve their job and management skills are purchased and circulated to a wide variety of state agencies. Audiovisual materials which train library staff and librarians are purchased to improve the skills of staff that work in libraries.
- 2. Blind and Physically Handicapped Collection** - The collection of materials at the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped numbered 337,779. Volunteer narrators using the custom-designed recording booth and equipment have supplemented the new titles supplied by NLS in addition to the acquisition of volunteer-recorded titles from other libraries.

V. B. (cont'd)

3. **ERIC (Educational Resources Information Center)** - An extensive collection of research publications on educational topics in microfiche format. The library subscribes to the ERIC indexes in CD-ROM and paper to assist library users in locating research reports on topics relating to education and children.
4. **Government Publications.** As a federal documents depository library since 1970, the State Library receives publications in print, microfiche and electronic formats. As the official state documents depository, the State Library has the world's largest collection of South Carolina state government publications.
5. **Grants Research Collection** - Includes printed directories and guides and CD-ROM sources to assist nonprofit organizations, government agencies, and citizens in locating grants. The State Library serves as an official cooperating collection of the Foundation Center and compiles and publishes the South Carolina Foundation Directory. The coordinator of this collection makes presentations to organizations and groups on grants research.
6. **South Carolina Collection** - Includes published materials dealing with South Carolina subjects. Multiple copies of South Carolina titles are usually purchased to ensure that one copy remains in the library for long-term, historical purposes.
7. **South Carolina Fiction Cooperative** - Fiction titles, identified as the "last copy" in a particular library's collection, are cataloged and maintained as part of the State Library's collection to ensure that citizens have access to older novels.

VI. LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT

The State Library provides services to assist with the development and improvement of public library services and state institutional library services throughout the state.

- A. **Consultant Services.** State Library staff provides consultant assistance to library directors, boards of trustees, library staffs, library organizations, and state agencies and institutions. Staff serves as liaison between the State Library and forty county and regional library systems serving all forty-six counties and the thirty-three libraries maintained by seven state agencies. A combination of on-site visits, telephone contacts, and correspondence as well as workshops, small interest group meetings, and information exchanges are used in assisting libraries in identifying their needs and developing strategies to meet these needs.

During FY 99 State Library staff:

- made 3,179 consultations (telephone and personal) with local public library staff
- made 96 field trips to public, state institutional, and other libraries;
- attended 20 public library board meetings;
- administered \$5,231,815 in State Aid to County Libraries;
- supervised federal Library Services and Technology Act projects providing approximately \$863,166 grants-in-aid;
- monitored public library budgets totaling almost \$60 million in local funds;
- provided construction assistance for 23 library facilities in 18 counties;
- published *South Carolina Public Libraries Annual Statistical Summary*; and *South Carolina Public Library Standards, A Pocket Reference Manual for Public Library Trustees*;
- certified 44 professional and pre-professional public librarians; and
- represented the State Library at local, state, and national conferences, conventions, workshops, professional association meetings, building dedications, and other functions.

B. Grant Administration

1. **State Aid to County Libraries.** The program of State Aid to county libraries has been funded continuously since 1943. For FY99, the General Assembly appropriated \$1.50 per capita with a minimum of \$15,000 per county for a total of \$5,231,815 to the State Library for distribution to the county libraries. However, State support of county libraries as a percentage of total county library support has steadily declined for more than a decade making it harder for county libraries to meet the informational needs of their citizens. The regulations under which the funds are administered require that participating libraries be legally established, provide countywide service, maintain levels

of county funding, and meet certain standards of service. Qualifying libraries may use State Aid funds to supplement staff salaries, to purchase books and audio visual materials, to purchase or lease equipment and computer hardware and software, and to operate and maintain bookmobiles. State Aid's matching and maintenance of effort requirements have encouraged county governments to increase local support for libraries.

2. **Federal Aid to South Carolina Libraries.** *South Carolina Connects Through Libraries, Five-Year Plan FY 1997 – 2002 under the Library Services and Technology Act (P.L. 104-208)* details the uses of LSTA.

LSTA Uses:

To expand citizen access to information through electronic information services for all libraries: public, academic and school, access to library services for children, and staff development and training:

- establishing or enhancing electronic linkages among or between libraries.
- electronically linking libraries with educational, social, or information services;
- assisting libraries in accessing information through electronic networks;
- encouraging libraries in different areas, and encouraging different types of libraries to establish consortia and share resources;
- paying cost for libraries to acquire or share computer systems and telecommunications technologies; and

To target library and information services to persons having difficulty using a library and to under served urban and rural communities, including children (from birth through age 17) from families with incomes below the poverty line.

VI.B. (cont'd)

South Carolina's LSTA Goals and Objectives

To provide all South Carolina citizens with access to a wide variety of information.

- **Statewide Database Access Project (DISCUS):** Initiated as a pilot project with LSTA funds during 1997/98, DISCUS – South Carolina's Virtual Library received \$1.5 million in state funding. This enabled expansion of the project to South Carolina's schools and the purchase of additional database subscriptions for calendar year 1999. LSTA funds continue to support the project. DISCUS provides all South Carolinians with equal access to an electronic library of essential information resources via schools, colleges and public libraries. Database usage rose dramatically during the year, with over 2.8 million articles and other documents retrieved. Over 1,200 media specialists, library staff and curriculum resource teachers received database training.
- **The South Carolina Preservation Project:** Initiated in January 1998, and continued for a second year, the project is designed to educate librarians and citizens in the practical care and preservation of paper-based information materials in the state. This is a cooperative project involving the State Library and the Charleston County Library. The project consultant conducted workshops on the care and repair of non-book materials; made site visits to advise on the proper housing of library and other holdings; presented programs on such topics as disaster preparedness, document retention, and preservation basics; and provided telephone consultation on questions related to the care and repair of documents and printed materials. He also worked with the State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB) and the Palmetto Archives, Libraries, and Museums Council on Preservation (PALMCOP) on the production of an emergency procedures handbook for libraries and other institutions.
- **The Palmetto Book Alliance, the Library of Congress Center for the Book in South Carolina** was started by the State Library and the College of Library and Information Science at the University of South Carolina. It works to increase awareness of books, reading and the rich literary heritage of South Carolina. Its website provides citizens with a calendar of literary events in South Carolina.

VI.B. (cont'd)

To assist public libraries develop programs and services to meet the needs of their patrons.

- **Public Library Automation:** The South Carolina State Library since 1997 has been involved in a project designed to bring public Internet Access to every public library site in the state. Using federal funding to supplement state appropriations, the library has continued to work with the Office of Information Resources (OIR) of the South Carolina Budget and Control Board to connect public libraries through the SC telecommunications backbone to the Internet provider under contract to the state. In FY 99 providing online automation systems in the libraries without automated systems and enabling libraries to support remote access to electronic information became priorities. The Lancaster County Library and the Laurens County Library upgraded CD-Rom Automation systems to Web based systems capable of supporting remote access and the Saluda County Library is in the process of upgrading to a Web based system. The Chesterfield County and Williamsburg County libraries installed online automated systems. Allendale-Hampton-Jasper Regional Library, Calhoun County Library, Lee County Library and McCormick County Library are the only libraries without automated systems.

Federal funds were made available for the purchase of telecommunications hardware, internal wiring, and installation services for libraries without connectivity. Public libraries were responsible for providing a minimum of two public access personal computers at each participating site. OIR worked with local telephone companies to connect each site to the state backbone, and dealt with the state's Internet provider. OIR also provided guidelines for those aspects of the project affected by state legislation. State funds were used to pay for the installation of circuits, and they will continue to cover the cost for ongoing telephone charges and Internet provider fees. By June 30, 1999, all public libraries provided public access to information through the Internet.

- **Public Library Support:** In FY 99 the South Carolina State Library began working closely with the S.C. Humanities Council and the S.C. Arts Commission to promote the literary arts and to provide literary arts programs in public libraries. A Literary Arts Programmer was employed to coordinate activities and to increase visibility of literary arts.

VI.B. (cont'd)

- **Children and Young Adults:** Services to Children and Young Adults continued to be a priority in the FY 99 plan because of the need in South Carolina to improve children's school readiness and achievement. Grants were awarded that helped libraries provide books for babies and information to new parents about the importance of reading to children beginning at birth; for outreach programming to children in child care centers, and training for child care staff; for development of services for Spanish speaking children; and for assisting libraries with the additional staff needed to expand services to children. The statewide summer reading program helped children across the state retain and improve reading skills in the summer months. Collections of books to help teachers in child care centers plan and implement quality programs were placed in every public library in the state.
- **County-wide Access to Library Services:** Grants were available for the improvement of public library service to areas where library service is inadequate to meet the needs of the public. Grants were awarded to improve delivery of library materials to remote areas through formal planning, identifying the community library service needs and developing plans for meeting those needs, and through the purchase of bookmobiles to deliver services where needed.

To improve library services to all South Carolinians through training of library personnel and to provide for better-informed public library trustees and supporters.

Staff Development and Training

The State Library administers the career education project which provides continuing education opportunities through workshops and training grants for public and institutional library personnel and for public library trustees. The annual CE plan was developed in consultation with the state's public library directors, the State Library Staff, the University of South Carolina College of Library and Information Science, and the South Carolina Library Association. CE statistics for FY99:

3. Public Library Construction

State Library staff continued to administer construction funds carried forward from the earlier Library Services and Construction Act, Title II. During FY 99 construction of the following buildings was completed:

In FY99, Title II funds expended totalled \$503,590.40.

4. Gates Library Initiative

South Carolina's public libraries received \$4.3 million from the Gates Learning Foundation for the purchase of public access computers. This grant, the largest private grant awarded to South Carolina's public libraries in history, provided 750 new personal computers, doubling the total workstations available to the public. In addition to hardware, Microsoft Corporation donated software valued at \$1.2 to all libraries receiving Foundation grants. The South Carolina State Library prepared the original needs assessment for the state to qualify for these grants.

VII. SOUTH CAROLINA LIBRARY NETWORK

The South Carolina Library Network (SCLN), coordinated by the South Carolina State Library, supports the efforts of local libraries to meet the information needs of all South Carolinians through the sharing of library resources. The 285 present SCLN member libraries by type are:

Fifty-seven (57) new school library members were added as part of a special project to extend interlibrary loan services to South Carolina high schools. Libraries participating in the South Carolina Library Network have access to: the LION (Library Information On-line) automated catalog of the South Carolina State Library; an electronic mail component for the transmission of interlibrary loan requests; EBBS, an electronic bulletin board service reporting on current library activity in the state; the FEDCAT (Federal Document Catalog) information database which can be used to identify United States documents issued by the Government Printing Office since 1976; and the South Carolina On-line Library Directory, containing entries for more than 500 South Carolina libraries.

For the purposes of obtaining information and materials not available locally, SCLN member libraries have always used their computers to dial into the State Library automated system. Through its membership in MetroNet, the state government telecommunications network coordinated by the Budget and Control Board, the State Library offers access to its resources through the Internet as well. To enhance access to its resources, the State Library this year developed a Web-based interface for its online catalog, designated WebLION. Work began on the production of online interactive forms which libraries will use for placing interlibrary loan requests through the Internet.

Network Services conducted 24 SCLN training and technical support sessions during 1998-99. Network staff also participated in a variety of educational activities designed to support and improve reference service across the state. For public libraries serving the largest metropolitan areas in the state, the State Library organized a ninth annual Reference Exchange in August 1998. This meeting brought together reference librarians from Charleston, Greenville, Richland and Spartanburg County Libraries for a discussion of mutual concerns in the areas of public service and electronic reference. In January 1999, a System Managers Exchange was held for library automation system managers from SC public libraries to discuss planning for Y2K, technology developments, and other issues of common interest.

Network Services provided continuing support for an Internet/Telecommunications Project intended to strengthen the resources of South Carolina public libraries through public access to the Internet. The State Library cooperated with the Office of Information Resources (OIR) in providing Internet access in these libraries to South Carolina students as an extension of provisions of a statewide K-12 Internet initiative. Network Services staff provided consultation and training for the project and acted as liaison between the libraries and OIR. By June 1999, all public library systems in the state were offering public access to the Internet.

Public libraries were encouraged to obtain discounts on telecommunications services and equipment for which they became eligible in 1999. Information on the Universal Service Fund (E-Rate), including a Web page for South Carolina libraries, and application support were provided by the State Library.

The State Library continued the Preservation Information Project initiated in January of 1998 to assist South Carolina libraries in maintaining one of their most valuable assets - their collections of books and other materials. The project consultant is based at the Charleston County Public Library, which is cooperating in the project. The project coordinator offered telephone consultation, made site visits, conducted workshops on a variety of preservation topics, and worked closely with both the State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB) and the Palmetto Archives, Libraries, and Museums Council on Preservation (PALMCOP).

VIII. PUBLIC INFORMATION SERVICES

The State Library's public information service is responsible for a statewide program of publicity and public relations designed to publicize South Carolina libraries and to make the general public aware of library services. Activities include news releases, exhibits, special programs and publications. The State Library's public relations activities are planned and coordinated by the director of public information and the public relations committee.

A. Major public information activities:

- *News for SC Libraries* – a newsletter distributed six times a year to all libraries in South Carolina and public to library trustees. The newsletter is also available on the web.
- Published "South Carolina's African American Heritage – a Bibliography" for distribution to all South Carolina libraries and other interested organizations.
- Worked with Friends of South Carolina Libraries on their newsletter, annual program and other projects as needed.
- Hosted a public relations librarian exchanged for public relations staff of the public libraries.
- Distributed news releases and other marketing materials to the media and libraries to promote such programs as summer reading, National Library Week, Freedom of Information Day, and the Gates Library Initiative.
- Provided consulting services to libraries as needed.

In a continuing effort to attract more patrons and educate the general public about the library's unique resources for South Carolinians with disabilities, services of the Department for the Blind and Physically Handicapped were exhibited and promoted at 31 events across the state. Events included meetings and conferences of the: South Carolina Association of School Librarians, South Carolina Autism Society, South Carolina Conference on Aging, South Carolina Primary Health Care Conference, and South Carolina Gerontological Society. To raise the awareness of the minority community, staff exhibited at Black Expo (Columbia, S.C.), the Minorities Health Issues Conference, and the African American Opportunities Fair (Florence, S.C.). Other events included a host of health fairs targeted at South Carolinians age 55 and over. Formal presentations on the services of the library were done for 13 organizations, and in-house tours were provided for 6 groups.

B. SConnects @ the Library*

Purpose

SConnects@the Library is a three-year marketing campaign begun in FY 1998 to inform South Carolinians of the wealth of resources available in their public libraries and to encourage use of these resource.

SConnects @ the Library focuses on three areas:

- General information for the public
- Internet Access
- DISCUS - statewide database project

Web Site

To support providing general information to the public, the South Carolina State Library created a Web Site to assist South Carolina public librarians in providing useful Internet links for their patrons. The web site "SConnects @ the Library" is available for public library systems to set as their primary home page if they so choose. Initiated in August 1997, the home page includes selected links to informational web sites in topical areas such as education, business, government and general reference. C. Palmetto Book Alliance

The South Carolina State Library and the College of Library and Information Science at the University of South Carolina are co-sponsors of the Palmetto Book Alliance (PBA). The PBA is the South Carolina affiliate of the Library of Congress Center for the Book. Its mission is to celebrate reading, books, authors and the rich literary heritage of South Carolina. The PBA envisions itself as a virtual center for the book in South Carolina promoting and encouraging participation in book-related programs and activities sponsored by various groups and organizations around the state. The first meeting of the Advisory Board was held in September.

VIII. (cont'd)

Four priority areas were identified in PBA projects: serving as clearinghouse for information on book events; sponsoring the annual Read-In, a statewide celebration of reading; reactivating the "Let's Talk About It" program, a statewide book discussion series; and developing a literary map for South Carolina.

IX. VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Volunteers have made a positive impact on the South Carolina State Library and particularly the Department for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (DBPH) where 108 volunteers contributed 2,198 hours of service. Members of boards, committees and advisory councils represent user groups and aid in the development of policies and services.

Under the guidance of the Volunteer Coordinator, narrators recorded books and magazines about South Carolina. Narrators skillfully recorded issues of "South Carolina Wildlife" and "Sandlapper" magazines, the department's newsletter and a list of descriptive videos. Six publications were recorded and added to the South Carolina Collection: "Aunt Matilda's Ghost," "Constitution of South Carolina, 1895," "South Carolina Indians Today," "South Carolina, A Day at a Time," "Joseph's Charleston Adventure," and "South Carolina Alphabetically."

During the past year, the Pioneer repair group received training on NLS equipment repair standards for cassette machine reconditioning. They repaired 686 cassette machines and record players. Because of their work and a large inventory of working cassette machines, South Carolina was able to transfer a portion of our inventory to other states that were in need of equipment.

Other individuals were trained as book inspectors, receptionists, and clerical assistants. Book inspection volunteers have helped DBPH maintain its goal of 100% book inspection. Receptionists answered the telephone, assisted visitors, and prepared bulk mailings for the Summer Reading program and patron surveys, prepared newsletters and overdue book notices for mailing and weeded application files to remove inactive patron records. Volunteers from the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) also provided some much needed assistance with six projects. Public relations efforts received a boost from volunteers (including a group of youth from the Dept. of Juvenile Justice) who labeled thousands of promotional brochures and staffed exhibit booths at two events that reached thousands of adults age 55 and over. For the first time in several years, a volunteer appreciation luncheon was held in October for all volunteers.

During FY 99, 108 individuals contributed 2,231 hours of service. Based on formulas from the Governor's Office, the service value of State Library volunteers is \$32,001.
