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ABSTRACT

This report of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office lists salary information for chief executive officers in the California Community College System, as well as salary information for the chancellor's executive staff, for 1997-98, 1998-99, and 1999-2000. Three major configurations of community college organizational structure were observed: (1) 20 multi-college districts, administered by chancellors with an average 1999-2000 compensation of \$154,466; (2) 56 colleges in multi-college districts, administered by presidents with an average 1999-2000 compensation of \$116,749; and (3) 51 single college districts, administered by superintendent/presidents with an average 1999-2000 compensation of \$129,676. The 1999-2000 salaries for executives in the Chancellor's Office range from \$80,494 to \$169,860. Tables are included listing executive compensation by district and individual college for as well as compensation by position title for the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Executive Staff over the same three year period. Preface

The California Postsecondary Education Commission (CPEC) is required by the Legislature to annually produce a report entitled, *Executive Compensation in California's Public Higher Education*, which has information on the compensation earned by the chief executives in the California State University and the University of California. The report also includes the salaries of the executive staffs of the two systems. The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office asked that CPEC include information on chancellors and presidents in the community college system, as well as the salaries of the chancellor's executive staff.

The information in this report was developed from surveys sent on *March 3, 2000*, to chancellors and presidents within the California Community Colleges. It is important to remember that there are at any point-in-time some interim positions and some new hires in which contracts are re-negotiated. This report is shared with the Board of Governors, CPEC, local trustees, chief executive officers, and any other interested parties who may have a need for the information. It displays three years' worth of data for chief executive officers of the California Community Colleges and for the Chancellor's Office executive staff.

Compensation of Chief Executives in the California Community Colleges

1999-00

The information on executive compensation was collected from surveys sent directly to chancellors and presidents of the California Community Colleges. The total compensation of these chief executives include their annual base salaries and any stipends for extra education and duties (doctorate, serving in dual positions, etc.).

Among the community colleges are found three main organizational arrangements. The complexity and breadth of responsibility for the chief executive officers varies between these different organizational structures. The three major organizational configurations are:

- 20 multi-college districts administered by chancellors;
- 56 colleges in multi-college districts administered by presidents; and,
- 51 single colleges in single-college districts administered by superintendent/presidents as chief executive officers.

Because of the differences in organizational structure among the community colleges and the variations in the chief executives' responsibilities, the information is presented for three groups of chief executives (corresponding to the three organizational arrangements found among the community colleges). We looked at 71 districts and 106 accredited colleges.

Chancellors of Multi-College Districts: The highest total compensation for a chancellor of a multi-college district is \$186,200 in the Peralta Community College District. The lowest compensation for a chancellor in this area is \$135,000 in the San Mateo Community College District. The average compensation for the 20 chancellors of multi-college districts is \$154,477.

College Presidents in Multi-College Districts: The total compensation of the 56 presidents of individual colleges within multi-college districts range from \$101,106 at Porterville College to \$126,911 at American River and Sacramento City Colleges. The 56 college presidents average total compensation is \$116,749.

Superintendents/Presidents of Single-College Districts: The highest compensation received by a superintendent/president is \$189,140 at the San Francisco Community College District. The lowest compensation of \$99,760 is received by the superintendent/presidents at Taft College. The average compensation for the 51 superintendent/presidents is \$129,676.
