ABSTRACT

The Head Start program, a comprehensive child development program designed to increase the social competence of children in low-income families and children with disabilities and to improve their chances of school success, has been in North Dakota since 1965. This report describes the objectives of the Head Start program, the North Dakota Head Start Association, and the State Collaboration Office; presents information on the administration of Head Start in North Dakota; and describes program options in the state for 1997-1998. The report also delineates eligibility criteria and program services. Parent and staff training opportunities are described. A map details the location of North Dakota Head Start and Early Head Start grantees. The report concludes with 1-page profiles of the 14 Head Start and 4 Early Head Start programs. Each profile includes the following information in addition to contact information: (1) grantee name; (2) number of staff; (3) number of child development staff; (4) number of child development staff with degrees; (5) number of volunteers; (6) number of classrooms; (7) counties served; (8) enrollment, both ACYF-funded and total; (9) program options; (10) racial/ethnic background of children served; (11) number and location of centers; (12) medical services received; (13) head of household employment status; (14) number of families served; (15) families' income levels; and (16) family characteristics. 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

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Head Start programs in North Dakota serve approximately 2856 children and families in poverty statewide. We would like to acknowledge the dedication and hard work of the staff and families working together to improve the lives of these children. Also, special thanks to the Head Start parents and staff who shared their stories and experiences for this report.

Introduction

Head Start and Early Head Start are comprehensive child development programs, serving children from birth to age five, expectant mothers and families. The overall goal of Head Start is to increase the social competence of children in low-income families and children with disabilities, and improve the chances of success in school.

Head Start has been a pioneer in the movement to address the needs of the whole child, including the educational, vocational and material needs of the entire family. Head Start philosophy holds that parents are the primary educators of their children, and that successful child development programs must involve and empower parents in order to have a lasting impact on the lives of low-income children. This philosophy is reflected in Head Start's administrative structure which includes a parent Policy Council that has decision-making authority.

Head Start began in 1965 and has been recognized through seven presidential administrations for its effectiveness in helping children become more self-confident and successful. Though federally-funded, each program is required to provide a 20 percent local funding match. This nationwide program works through several major areas, including education, health and nutrition, parent involvement and social services.

There have been Head Start programs in North Dakota since 1965, and currently 2856 children and their families (2516) are being served by Head Start in North Dakota. The basic elements of Head Start are regulated through federal Program Performance Standards. Grantees and parents have control over their programs, and each is designed to meet the needs of families in the local community.



One third more at-risk children who attended a quality early childhood program graduated from high school than those who did not attend. This has meaningful significance to those concerned with the nation's economic health since unemployment rates for high school graduates are 75 % lower than those for non-graduates and graduates earn an average of 25 % more than non-graduates.

Objectives of Head Start

Broadly the objectives of Head Start are based on the idea that children deserve the opportunity to enter school ready to learn and that children's readiness depends on their educational experience, their physical and mental health and the involvement of their parents and families.


The following are objectives of Head Start:

1. The improvement of the child's health and physical abilities, including appropriate steps to correct present physical and mental problems and to enhance every child's access to an adequate diet. The improvement of the family's attitude toward future healthcare and physical abilities.
2. The encouragement of self-confidence, spontaneity, curiosity and self-discipline which will assist in the development of the child's social and emotional health.
3. The enhancement of the child's mental processes and skills with particular attention to conceptual and communications skills.
4. The establishment of patterns and expectations of success for the child, which will create a climate of confidence for present and future learning efforts and overall development.
5. An increase in the ability of the child and the family to relate to each other and to others.
6. The enhancement of the sense of dignity and self-worth within the child and his or her family.

One of every three children eligible for Head Start in North Dakota does not participate in the program.

Purpose

The purpose of the North Dakota Head Start Association is to accomplish the following:

- To establish communication, cooperations and an action network between the Head Start Directors, Staff, Parents, the Collaboration Administrator and Friends of North Dakota.
- To review/assess common interests, accomplishments, needs and concerns of North Dakota Head Start programs.
- To coordinate and conduct training activities designed to upgrade the quality of Head Start programs.
- To be a resource and support link between Local, Regional and National Head Start Associations.
- To develop joint policies, positions and statements for dissemination, if appropriate, to Local, Regional and National Head Start offices which reflect a consensus of the opinions of the association members.
- To establish a partnership between Head Start and the State of North Dakota through the Head Start Collaboration Office. □

Children at-risk who have benefited from a quality early childhood program spend 1.3 years less in some form of special education placement. The average costs of special education per year are approximately \$1,800 per student.

Head Start Association (Con.)

General Membership

Every Head Start program in North Dakota may become a member of the Head Start Association by paying dues. Once a program pays dues the parents, staff and director from that program automatically become members. The General Membership for the Association is at 4086 members. □

Board

The Board is elected from the General Membership. Each member program is represented on the Board by one parent, one staff and the director. Also serving on the Board is the North Dakota Head Start Collaboration Administrator. The Board is currently made up of 34 members. □

Executive Committee


The Executive Committee of the North Dakota Head Start Association is comprised of two representatives from parents, staff, and directors. These representatives are elected from the Association Board □

Children at-risk who have been enrolled in a quality early childhood program are 25 % less likely to be retained in grade. Since the current cost of public education is \$5,200 per student, per year, this can save taxpayers a significant amount of money.

Collaboration Office



The overall goals of the Collaboration Office are to:

1. Collaborate with existing public and private agencies and organizations that serve children and families.
2. Promote and support accessible high quality early care and education services for children, with and without disabilities, in Head Start programs and child care.
3. Promote access to healthcare services for Head Start families throughout the state.
4. Develop a public awareness campaign, which will inform public officials, business leaders, and general citizenry of the social, economic and educational benefits of Head Start and quality care of children.
5. Evaluate procedures and policies for accessing health, employment, education, child care and social services and assist in developing barrier-free policies for families.

In 1996, North Dakota received a Head Start-State Collaboration Project grant, funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Administration on Children and Families. The North Dakota Head Start-State Collaboration Office is located in the Department of Human Services, Children and Family Services Division.

The Head Start Collaboration Office focuses primarily on child care, healthcare, education and welfare. The vision is one of a tightly woven blanket of support, comprised of programs serving children and families, that cover the state. The establishment of this support has been initiated through a partnership between Head Start and the State of North Dakota through the hiring of a Head Start Collaboration Administrator. This partnership allows Head Start to better meet the increasingly complex, intertwine and difficult challenges of improving long-term outcomes for low-income children and their families. ■

The number of infant deaths in North Dakota has decreased 29%, from 62 deaths in 1994 to 44 deaths in 1996.

Administration

Head Start programs in North Dakota are administrated locally by Community Action Agencies, Public School Districts, private non-profit agencies, and American Indian Tribes. At the federal level, the Head Start Bureau is part of the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), United States Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). Eleven Regional Offices administer the Head Start grants. North Dakota is included in Region VIII, headquartered in Denver, Colorado. The American Indian Programs are managed by the American Indian Program Branch of the Head Start Bureau in Washington, DC. □

Program Options

Head Start programs vary according to the needs of their community. Some are center-based, with the child attending receiving Head Start services primarily in a classroom type setting. Center-based programs may be half day or full day, and the number of days of attendance per week may vary, with periodic visits by Head Start staff to the family's home. Another option is home-based Head Start. The home-based option provides Head Start services weekly to children primarily in the child's home through intensive work with the child's parents and family as the primary factor in the growth and development of their child. Some Head Start programs combine both the home-based and center-based options.

Some North Dakota communities have Early Head Start programs. Early Head Start is to provide early, continuous, intensive and comprehensive child development and family support services on a year-round basis to low-income families with children under age three and pregnant women.

Head Start programs provide a comprehensive array of services such as of health, education, parent involvement, social services and services for children with disabilities, all of which are coordinated with community based service systems.

North Dakota programs are family-centered and community-based, providing developmentally appropriate activities for children and support for parents in their work and parenting roles.

Each North Dakota Head Start program reflects the unique needs of the community it serves. But all must conform to the Head Start Performance Standards governing program administration and the core components: early childhood development and health services, family and community partnerships, program design and management, and implementation and enforcement. Every grantee must meet or exceed these standards as a condition of federal funding. □

As adults, those attending a quality early childhood program are three times as likely to be home owners by age 27, compared to those who did not receive the program. As we all know, home ownership is an indicator of successful adaptation to society.

Eligibility


To be eligible for Head Start, family income must be below the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) poverty income guidelines established by the federal government. There is also a provision that 10 percent of Head Start enrollment can be from “over income” families and that at least 10 percent of Head Start enrollment opportunities are made available to children with disabilities.

Income means total cash receipts before taxes from all sources, with certain exceptions. The period of time to be considered for eligibility is the twelve months immediately preceding the month in which application or reapplication for enrollment of a child in a Head Start program is made, or for the calendar year immediately preceding the calendar year in which the application or reapplication is made, whichever more accurately reflects the family's current needs ■

The average wage per job in North Dakota increased 17.4%, from \$17,849 in 1991 to \$20,960 in 1996. However, average wages in the state are still 26% below the national average.

The number of children eligible for Medicaid only has increased markedly, from 17,550 in 1994 to 18,685 in 1997.

Young women who have experienced a quality early childhood program are one-third less likely to have out-of-wedlock births and 25 % less likely to be teen mothers.

Health Services



It means a happier child, which means Mom and Dad are happier, too.

The nurse is always willing to answer any medical questions, and also examines the children for any concerns you may have. Some services they provide to the children are shots, hearing tests, and speech, among others.

Head Start recognizes that children must be healthy and well-nourished in order to learn. They emphasize the importance of early identification of health problems. This creates the opportunity for early treatment and often avoids the more costly procedures that might become necessary later without early treatment. Head Start ensures that all enrolled children have timely immunizations and screenings for cognitive development, as well as basic health, speech and language, hearing, vision, and dental health exams and services. Follow-up care and referrals are provided when necessary.

In a center-based program, children are served a minimum of one hot meal and snack each day, in order to meet at least one-third of their daily nutritional needs. Programs also offer a nutrition education program to teach parents how to select healthy foods and prepare well-balanced meals, and how to obtain food stamps and other community assistance when needed.


Head Start also recognizes the important of emotional and social development in the overall well-being of children. As participants in Head Start, the children participate with parents and staff in experiences that promote positive mental health, improved self-esteem, stress management and personal growth. Head Start programs have a mental health professional available to provide mental health training to staff and parents to make them aware of the need for early attention to the special problems of children. □

Education

Head Start's educational program is designed to meet the individual needs of each child. It focuses on the community's ethnic and cultural characteristics. Every child receives a variety of learning experiences that enhance their intellectual, social and emotional growth. Children participate in indoor and outdoor play and are introduced to the concepts of words, letters and numbers. They are encouraged to express their feelings and to develop self-confidence and the ability to get along with others. The Head Start programs have a low child to staff ratio. Staff members receive training in child development as well as early education. Head Start's commitment to individualization for all children includes a commitment to serve children with disabilities in a mainstream environment. At least 10 percent of the enrollment opportunities in Head Start are made available to children with a disability. □

The number of women receiving inadequate prenatal care increased 3% between 1994 and 1995, but decreased by 11 % between 1995 and 1996.

Slightly more than 1 out of every 10 public school children is enrolled in a special education program.



Head Start helped my son with playing with his peers and becoming interested in writing and coloring and learning his numbers and letters.

Parent Involvement



Be involved—know what is happening in your child's life.

Try to get involved in the classroom and all the opportunities offered for you for your child's sake. It will make you a better person and parent if you do.

Parents are the most important influence on a child's development. The key to Head Start's unique approach is its level of parent involvement. Parents may become involved in the program through parent education classes, program planning and operating activities. Many serve as members of their local program's Policy Council and Committees and have a voice in administrative and managerial decisions. Head Start recognizes that parents are a child's first teacher and empowers the parents in their role by providing them with opportunities to volunteer in the classroom, become employed by Head Start, and receive training and financial support for continued education. □

From 1994 to 1996, there has been about a 12% increase per year in the number of children identified as seriously emotionally disturbed, a 26% increase from 1994 to 1996.

By allowing me to volunteer my time and work with your Parents Coordinators, Head Start taught me a great deal.

We know that schedules are difficult, but we also know the look on our child's face, as well as their classmates, when we make time to spend an hour or the day with them at school.

Social Services

Head Start staff members work individually with each family to improve their conditions and quality of life. Staff assist the family in assessing their own needs, and then provides those services that will build upon their strengths to meet their needs. Head Start advocates for families, works within the community to help resolve issues, and more importantly, empowers the families to help themselves. Head Start programs use a number of ways to assist families to meet their needs, including community outreach, referrals, family needs assessments, emergency assistance and crisis intervention. They also provide families with information about available community resources and how to obtain and use them. □




To ensure high quality, Head Start programs provide staff at all levels and in all program areas with regular training and technical assistance. This improves job performance and provides opportunities for career advancement within the program.

The Child Development Associate (CDA) Program gives staff the opportunity to study child development and related subjects at colleges and universities in courses that can lead to academic degrees or to certification in the field of early childhood education.

Three centers provide training and technical assistance for Head Start programs in our state: the Community Development Institute of the Region VIII Head Start Quality Improvement Center, the Region VIII Disability Services Quality Improvement Center, and the American Indian Head Start Quality Improvement Center of the American Indian Institute. □

More than two-thirds of North Dakota's child population who are age-eligible for child care services are being cared for in alternative child care arrangements that are not regulated by the state, or they are in need of child care services.
