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## ABSTRACT

This report is one in a series by the Food Research and Action Center celebrating the achievements of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) in its 25-year history. The report documents the growth in WIC participation nationally and in each state during the program's history. Following a brief discussion of the program, its history, and some of its achievements in reducing rates of low birth weight and infant mortality, the report consists of three sets of data: (1) a one-page national WIC profile of participation over the history of the WIC program; (2) 51 state WIC profiles (for 50 states and the District of Columbia) of participation over the history of the WIC program; and (3) data tables (appended) providing the national and state data on a year-by-year basis. 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

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# **WIC In The States: Twenty-Five Years of Building a Healthier America**

In 1999 the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is 25 years old. This report is one in a series by FRAC celebrating WIC's achievements in its 25 year history. It documents the growth in WIC participation nationally and in each state during the program's history.

Growth alone is not, of course, cause for celebration. What is cause for celebration is WIC's extraordinary record of accomplishment for the nation's nutrition and health, and that record has grown as the program has grown.

Just three of the many positive findings about WIC in its 25 years highlight its contributions to saving children's lives, to improving maternal and child health, and to establishing landmarks for the ways in which wise investments can improve both the nation's health and its economic strength:

- USDA estimates that 113,000 children and young adults are alive today who would have died without WIC intervention. WIC's positive effect on birth weight and infant mortality has saved more lives than America lost in the Vietnam and Korean Wars combined.
- The Centers for Disease Control and other researchers have found that WIC decreases the incidence of iron-deficiency anemia, a widespread problem among low-income children. This is vitally important because anemia affects a child's ability to learn. Anemia is also a health risk: the development of motor skills is delayed, memory is impaired, susceptibility to lead poisoning is increased, and the ability to combat infection is reduced.
- The General Accounting Office concluded that providing WIC benefits is extraordinarily cost-effective, generating major savings in federal, state, local and private health care and special education costs. By preventing low birth weight, WIC reduces the cost of hospitalization, medical treatment, and special education and Supplemental Security Income payments for disabled children. GAO estimated that an initial 1990 investment of \$296 million in prenatal WIC funding would save a total of \$1.036 billion over the following 18 years.

These gains were hard won. They are the victory of WIC workers, nutritionists, nurses, and paraprofessionals in thousands of clinics in hundreds of communities; of hundreds of advocates in Washington and the states who have fought for 25 years to nurture the program and help it to succeed and grow; and of the members of Congress from both sides of the aisle who have worked to begin, expand and improve WIC.

The creation of WIC was one response to the realizations that hunger and poverty were widespread in this country and that inadequate nutrition posed real dangers to pregnant women, infants and children. Congress created WIC as a preventive program, providing nutritious foods, nutrition education, and improved access to health care in order to prevent nutrition-related health problems in pregnancy, infancy and early childhood. In 1974, the first WIC clinic opened in Pineville, Kentucky. The first participant certified there was a young child named Robert Martin Holland. WIC had been authorized as a pilot program in 1972, but didn't open its doors until two years later. Vermont implemented the first statewide WIC program in 1974. Twenty-five years later WIC serves 7.4 million women, infants and children.

## **WIC: A Preventive Nutrition Program**

WIC is operated through local clinics by state WIC agencies and Indian Nations.<sup>1</sup> There are three eligibility criteria for WIC. To participate, an individual must be (1) low-income; (2) nutritionally at risk; and (3) a pregnant or postpartum woman, or an infant, or a child under the age of five. To qualify as low-income, an individual's household income must be below 185 percent of the poverty level. Nutritional risk is evaluated by a health professional, and can include problems such as inadequate weight gain during pregnancy; a history of high-risk pregnancies; growth problems in children and infants, such as stunting, underweight, or obesity; anemia; or an inadequate dietary pattern. When there are not enough funds to serve all eligible participants, states implement a priority system for serving clients based on level of risk.

WIC provides participants with supplemental foods through a monthly package tailored to meet their special dietary needs. The foods are chosen to provide protein, iron, calcium, and vitamins A and C -- nutrients likely to be missing from the diets of low-income women, infants and children. Authorized WIC foods include iron-fortified infant formula, infant cereal, milk, eggs, cheese, iron-fortified breakfast cereal, Vitamin C-rich juice, beans, tuna fish, carrots and peanut butter. The most common method of providing WIC supplemental foods is through a retail purchase system: clients receive WIC checks or coupons they can cash in for specific foods at a participating grocery store.

In addition to the food, WIC offers nutrition education, teaching mothers about their specific nutritional needs and those of their infants and children. The program provides breastfeeding support and education to new mothers. Participants also are taught how to shop for nutritious foods and how to prepare economical, well-balanced meals.

WIC is a magnet that draws many pregnant women and their families into the broader health care system as well. As part of the services that WIC provides, clients are screened and referred to other necessary health and social services, such as prenatal care, well baby care and immunization services.

## **Making a Difference: The Impact of WIC on Maternal and Child Health**

WIC has an extraordinary track record. Numerous studies have shown the tremendous success of WIC in improving the health and nutritional status of the women, infants and children it serves, and in saving health care dollars.

- ▶ WIC improves the dietary intake of pregnant and postpartum women and improves weight gain in pregnant women.
- ▶ Pregnant women participating in WIC receive prenatal care earlier.
- ▶ WIC increases the duration of pregnancy and reduces low birth weight rates.
- ▶ WIC reduces fetal deaths and infant mortality.
- ▶ WIC decreases the incidence of iron deficiency anemia in children.
- ▶ WIC significantly improves children's diets.
- ▶ WIC improves the growth of at-risk infants and children.
- ▶ Children enrolled in WIC are more likely to have a regular source of medical care and are more likely to be immunized.
- ▶ WIC helps prepare children for school: receiving WIC benefits is associated with improved cognitive development in children.
- ▶ WIC saves money by preventing costly health problems.

At the National Association of WIC Directors 1999 annual meeting, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Dan Glickman encapsulated the importance of WIC over the last 25 years by reporting that: "Without WIC, 22 percent of the 4 million children entering high school this year could have been saddled with handicaps and disabilities suffered as the result of low birth weight, but the intervention of the WIC program helped prevent this from happening. And, without WIC, an estimated 113,000<sup>2</sup> babies would have died at birth.

“WIC has spent \$5.7 billion in benefits to pregnant women over the past 25 years, for an estimated savings of \$20 billion to the Federal, State and local governments and to private health providers. The burden on the Medicaid system would be incalculable [if there were no WIC]. Just think of all those mothers and all those sick babies, flooding clinics and hospitals, and what the lives of those children might have been like. But, thanks to WIC, that’s not what happened. Thanks to WIC, these babies went on to get a good start in life.”

## History of WIC Participation

Because successive Presidents, Congresses and the states have recognized its strengths, WIC has grown from serving an average of 88,000 women, infants and children each month in 1974 to serving an average of 7.4 million each month in fiscal year 1997.<sup>3</sup> The graphs in this book show the history of participation in the WIC program nationally and in each state. The number of women, infants and children and the total number of participants served are reported.

Since WIC’s inception the program has grown fairly steadily, with two periods of slower growth related to smaller funding increases -- one period in the second half of the 1980s, and the other in the last few years. Overall, state WIC participation trends also reflect a steady increase in participation since the program began. As with any discretionary program of this size, state participation trends show somewhat more variation than national trends. These fluctuations are related to a number of factors, including the level of federal funding, the timing of federal funding decisions, the formulas for distribution of funds among states, and state-specific situations such as the level of rebates by companies to WIC of funds used for infant formula purchase, fluctuations in WIC food prices, the availability of state funds for WIC to supplement the federal funds, and even the implementation of new computer systems, state hiring freezes, or significant transitions in state health care systems to managed care.

## Investing In Our Future

Despite substantial WIC expansion over the years, funding constraints still prevent WIC from serving a significant number of mothers and children eligible for the program. This is especially disturbing in light of continuing hunger, poverty and ill health among the nation's children. Fourteen million children are hungry, or live in households that are experiencing “food insecurity” -- government terminology for the consequences of family economic disadvantage that, when they do not rise to outright hunger, include such serious problems as the family being unable to purchase a balanced diet for the child, or the parents often skipping meals so the child can eat. The pregnant women, new mothers and children left out of WIC are low-income and at nutritional risk. They need the benefits WIC has to offer.

The case for full funding for WIC is even more compelling given the numerous studies showing WIC's effectiveness and the potentially serious consequences of failing to serve the many eligible women and children who are currently not benefitting from the program. As this incredibly successful program moves into the 21<sup>st</sup> century, it is essential to bring the important benefits of WIC to all those in need.





## Total WIC Participation United States, 1974-1997




## WIC Participation by Category United States, 1974-1997





Data source: The U.S. Department of Agriculture. Over the years, aspects of USDA reporting of WIC state participation data have changed. Before 1977 only total participation in a state (not data broken down among women, infants, and children) was reported. Also, for each year from 1974 to 1976, participation data were taken from participation in the month of June — at that time the last month of the federal fiscal year. There was a transition quarter between 1976 and 1977 to change the year end from June to September. For 1977 participation for the month of September was used. For 1978 to 1982 WIC participation was kept in two forms: September participation data and monthly average participation data for the 12 months ending in September (the end of the fiscal year). USDA used September participation data for their year-end reports. In order to maximize consistency, the data used in this publication for 1978 to 1982 are the USDA reported monthly average for the 12 months ending in September. From 1983 onwards, USDA has reported participation based on the average for the 12 months ending in September.

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
