Dear Governor Heineman,

When I met with you last month, you asked if the Commission could provide the "college going" rate for each Nebraska high school. After consulting with our colleagues at the Nebraska Department of Education, we quickly determined that data are not available to provide that rate. I let Lauren Hill know that was the case shortly after our meeting, but I indicated to her that we were interested in the question, too, and would work to provide the most focused data we could.

The accompanying report provides our estimate of college going rates *by county* for all 93 Nebraska counties for the high school graduating class of 2005-2006. We include graduates of both public and private high schools. We provide best-available data on graduates who attended Nebraska institutions (including public, independent, and, for the first time, for-profit degree-granting and non-degree-granting institutions). We're confident of the accuracy of that data. About 56% of Nebraska's 2006 high school graduating class attended a Nebraska postsecondary institution the following fall.

Data are *not* available by county on Nebraska high school graduates who attend college outside the state. Using national data, we can, however, provide an estimate of the out-of-state college continuation rate for the state as a whole -- 12.4%. Adding those two numbers together, we estimate that about 68% of Nebraska's 2006 high school graduates attended a postsecondary institution the following fall. We provide an analysis of *where* Nebraska students go when they attend an out-of-state institution.

Finally, college going rates by county vary widely -- from 19% to 100%, with, interestingly enough, no correlation with county size. Maps and tables provide that information. As you travel the state, you'll have many opportunities to both praise past success and encourage needed improvement.

We appreciate your interest in and support of postsecondary education in Nebraska and look forward to working closely with you and your staff to maximize the impact Nebraska postsecondary institutions have on the well-being of the state. Please let us know if you have questions or comments.

Estimated College Continuation Rates for Nebraska Counties for the High School Class of 2005-06

Data are not available to calculate the college continuation rate for each high school in Nebraska. However, Nebraska's Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education (CCPE) recently collected data to estimate the college continuation rate for each of Nebraska's 93 counties.

The estimated county rates presented in this report are for students who graduated from public and nonpublic (private) high schools during the 2005-06 school year and continued on to college <u>in Nebraska</u> in fall 2006. A comparable continuation rate is estimated for the state as a whole. Each of these rates is referred to as an <u>in-state college continuation rate</u> because it is an estimate of the percentage of Nebraska high school students who attended postsecondary institutions within the state.

An additional percentage of the state's high school students continued on to college at out-of-state institutions. There are no available data to estimate this percentage by county, but an <u>out-of-state college continuation rate</u> can be estimated for the state using data from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) at the National Center for Education Statistics in the U.S. Department of Education.

The Commission estimates that, of the 21,119 students who graduated from Nebraska public and nonpublic high schools in 2005-06:

- 55.5% (11,721) attended Nebraska postsecondary institutions during the fall of 2006. (in-state college continuation rate)
- 12.4% (2,616) attended out-of-state postsecondary institutions during the fall of 2006. (out-of-state college continuation rate)
- A total of 67.9% (14,337) went to college within 12 months of graduating from high school. (total college continuation rate)

Key points based on an analysis of available data:

- For fall 2006, in-state college continuation rates at the county level vary from 20% to 100%, with about one-third of the counties having rates that are within five percentage points of the 55.5% state rate.
- There is no correlation between county in-state college continuation rates for fall 2006 and county size as measured by the number of students who graduated from high school during the 2005-06 school year, but a knowledge of county-level rates should be helpful in targeting the Governor's campaign to increase the state's overall college continuation rate.


The <u>maps</u> on the following two pages show the number of high school graduates in the class of 2006 and the estimated in-state college continuation rate for each county in Nebraska. Following these maps, <u>Table 1</u> shows the number and percentage of freshmen from Nebraska who were enrolled at each of the postsecondary institutions in Nebraska during the fall of 2006.

The third <u>map</u> in this report and <u>Table 2</u> show where Nebraska first-time freshmen went out of state to college. Of the 2,616 students who went out of state, 21.3% enrolled at colleges and universities in Iowa. Between 11% and 14% traveled to Missouri, Kansas, and South Dakota, while fewer than 6% went to college in any other state.

<u>Table 3</u> and <u>Table 4</u> provide the data to calculate the estimated college continuation rate for each county in Nebraska. In <u>Table 3</u>, the counties are listed in rank order, based on their college continuation rates. <u>Table 4</u> provides the same information but lists the counties in alphabetical order.

Number of 2005-06 Graduates from Nebraska High Schools by County¹





The in-state college continuation rate for a county equals the number of first-time freshmen from the county who enrolled within 12 months of high school graduation at postsecondary institutions in Nebraska during the fall of 2006 <u>divided by</u> the number of students who graduated from public and nonpublic (private) high school in the county during the 2005-06 school year. The resulting fraction is multiplied by 100 to express the rate as a percentage.



Technical Note:

Estimated in-state college continuation rates are not reported for Harlan and McPherson counties because the reported number of first-time freshmen who graduated from the high school in each county within 12 months of enrollment at Nebraska colleges and universities exceeded the number of graduates reported by the high school to the Nebraska Department of Education, suggesting that there are reporting errors. However, since only 19 students were reported to graduate from Alma Public Schools in Harlan county and only 9 students were reported to graduate from the McPherson County High School in 2005-06, the reporting errors do not significantly affect the estimated in-state continuation rate for the state as a whole.

The resulting fraction is multiplied by 100 to express the rate as a percentage.

Technical Note:

Estimated in-state college continuation rates are not reported for Harlan and McPherson counties because the reported number of first-time freshmen who graduated from the high school in each county within 12 months of enrollment at Nebraska colleges and universities exceeded the number of graduates reported by the high school to the Nebraska Department of Education, suggesting that there are reporting errors. However, since only 19 students were reported to graduate from Alma Public Schools in Harlan county and only 9 students were reported to graduate from the McPherson County High School in 2005-06, the reporting errors do not significantly affect the estimated in-state continuation rate for the state as a whole.
