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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Organization. The North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention (NDHECSAP) is an initiative of the North Dakota University System. It is the intent of the NDHECSAP to be actively committed to the process of the reduction of high-risk drinking, with representation of the eleven campuses within the North Dakota University System (NDUS). The NDHECSAP seeks to provide campuses with skills, attitudes, abilities, and knowledge that will enable them to address collegiate alcohol and substance abuse. This will provide an environment in which students will be given the opportunity to take full advantage of their university experience and to lead productive and satisfying lives.

The NDEHCSAP advocates for stronger prevention policies, collaborates in campus-community partnerships, and assists members of the NDHECSAP to develop evidenced-based prevention programs. A key feature of the NDHECSAP's work is the promotion of prevention strategies that affect the campus environment as a whole and have a large-scale impact on the entire campus community.

<u>Mission of the NDHECSAP</u>. The mission of the NDHECSAP is to reduce substance abuse in North Dakota's college student population and reduce negative health and safety consequences related to substance abuse in that population.

<u>Vision of the NDHECSAP</u>. The NDEHCSAP seeks campus communities where student safety and success are not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances.

Purpose of Report

The Annual Report of the NDHECSAP indicates the extent to which prevention services on North Dakota (ND) campuses assist in harm reduction and student retention. Recently a number of national studies have indicated increased attention to collegiate high-risk drinking and the related consequences. ND faces the same challenges as other campuses and the state is higher than the national rate, in high-risk drinking for youth, young adult, adult and college age individuals.

Conclusions

The NDEHCSAP, with established Director and Outreach Coordinator positions, has begun essential local and state networking. As a result three developments have occurred:

- 1. An increase in campus networking and evidence-based practices for ND campuses,
- 2. A single point of contact for higher education to network in ND, and
- 3. An opportunity for the NDHECSAP to partner at the state level and be involved in statewide initiatives.

Highlights of the Past Year

1. **Funding.** North Dakota State Board of Higher Education (SBHE) allocated \$75,000 for salary and fringe benefits for a Director.

Match funding continued in the amount of \$65,000 from the Department of Human Services Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services for salary, fringe benefits, and travel for an Outreach Coordinator to work at the local campus level.

A carry forward budget of \$28,787 was used for operating expenses.

The NDHECSAP and the NDUS campuses have secured a combined amount of \$495,397 in grant funding for programming and/or research on various individual campuses.

2. **Research.** The NDHECSAP received grant funding (\$17,302.50) from the Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety for the development of a NDCORE Alcohol and Drug Survey to include state colleges and universities in a routine data collection method using a consistent state instrument. Results of Project NDCORE can be found in Appendix T. The NDCORE Survey is a state specific Core Alcohol and Drug Survey to identify high-risk drinking predictors for ND college students and used to develop evidence-based interventions specific for each campus.

The NDHECSAP received grant funding (\$30,712.50) from the Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety for Project North Dakota Freshmen Initiative. This Project will increase awareness in parents about college life and the choices students face with regarding alcohol and other drugs, as well as measure the impact of parent communication on student drinking. The anticipated completion of this project is targeted for fall 2007.

- 3. **Student Involvement.** Under the direction of Bobby Haskins, North Dakota Student Association (NDSA) President, the NDHECSAP has an NDSA student representative. The student representative attends the monthly NDHECSAP meetings. Additionally, the NDHECSAP strategic plan includes an invitation to one student to participate on the NDHECSAP per year, using an annual rotation, by campus (alphabetically starting with DSU). The hosting campus will arrange travel, etc. for the student to attend NDHECSAP meetings.
- 4. **NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator (ORC).** The ORC serves as a liaison to the campuses and a resource for local campus work. Because of limited resources at the local campus level, the ORC assists the campuses in the development and implementation of environmental management strategies. Additionally, the ORC assists the campuses in the identification of evidence-based programs and the need for evaluating effectiveness of programs and outcomes. Due to the diversity of the campuses the ORC is, at times, the only contact to assist each campus individually and to identify campus programs and best

- practices implementation appropriate to each campus vision. See Appendix P for documentation of the ORC responsibilities and contact with NDUS campuses.
- 5. *Campus Task Forces*. All NDUS campuses are involved with campus task force efforts that include: identifying student drinking and other drug use, providing prevention programming to students, and partnering with community leaders for prevention efforts.
- 6. *Community Coalitions*. Each campus community has a Regional and/or Safe Communities Coordinator. Partnerships have been formed within each campus community with the development of working campus and community coalitions. All campuses are represented at a campus coalition in their community. It is important to note that due to the diversity of campus composition and size, each NDUS campus is at a different stage of campus and community coalition participation.
- 7. *State Public Policy*. The NDHECSAP identifies an action framework with components of prevention implementation at the campus level, community level, and state level. This includes identification of how to impact public policy. The NDHECSAP has a Legislative Subcommittee charged with identifying areas of public policy that impact NDHECSAP efforts and operations. The NDHECSAP authored and provided legislative testimony for SB 2276 and SB 2269 during the 2007 session.
- 8. *ND State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet Joint Resolution.* In 2005, the SBHE and Chancellor's Cabinet voted to support a Joint Resolution developed by the NDEHCSAP for effective prevention. The Joint Resolution includes the following priorities:
 - 1. That every campus participates in the Safe Communities Coordinator and the Prevention Coordinator community coalitions.
 - 2. Presidents should appoint substance abuse prevention task forces on their campus.
 - 3. That the Chancellor, Presidents and SBHE become more vocal and visible on substance abuse prevention.
 - 4. Increased presidential communication with incoming students and their parents positively impacts substance abuse prevention efforts.
 - 5. Presidents should develop a statement of expectations concerning alcohol use that addressed students, faculty, staff, and administration.
 - 6. Presidents should provide support for evaluation, data collection and completion of the biennial review.
 - 7. Presidents should avoid creating mixed messages about alcohol on campus and policy support.

The NDUS campuses report using the Joint Resolution to lead campus task force discussion, to identify areas to be addressed, and provide recommendations about prevention to campus administration. It seems reasonable that all campuses use their campus task force as the vehicle to draft an action plan in support of the resolution.

Because there is a new NDUS Chancellor and 6 new NDUS campus presidents, the NDHECSAP 07/09 Strategic Plan is recommending an updated Joint Resolution be

developed. The NDHECSAP believes it is important to keep the Presidents and Board members engaged in the expectations from the Joint Resolution and to request a report which details progress on each campus in respect to the Joint Resolution items. It was the agreement from the NDHECSAP that the lead for expectations of the Joint Resolution come from the Chancellor (see Appendix K for a copy of the current Joint Resolution).

- 9. Environmental Management Model of Prevention. The NDHECSAP has adopted an environmental management approach, which is research supported and endorsed by the Department of Educational, as a comprehensive strategy for substance abuse prevention. The NDUS campuses provide a comprehensive range of services to enrolled students and surrounding community. The NDHECSAP uses the following environmental management strategies:
 - 1. Alcohol free options—Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, and public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs;
 - 2. Normative environment create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health-promoting norms;
 - 3. Availability of Alcohol (and other drugs) limit alcohol availability both on and off campus;
 - 4. Marketing and promotion of alcohol- Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus;
 - 5. Policy development and law enforcement develop and enforce campus policies an local, state, and federal laws;
 - 6. Other areas of strategic interventions include: Campus Task Forces, Campus and Community Coalitions, Grant Funding Opportunities and Research.

- 10. Forum for Senior Administrators. The NDHECSAP held a first time "Forum for Senior Administrators: Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary." The Forum was held in conjunction with the North Dakota Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety Alcohol Forum in Bismarck, North Dakota on February 21, 2007. Outcomes of the Forum include:
 - 1. Educate senior administrators in addressing high-risk drinking in college students using an environmental management framework.
 - 2. Showcase how senior administrator support and state resources have been put to use on ND campuses through NDHECSAP involvement.
 - 3. Inform senior administrators of recent research and/or information (problems/risks) in college substance abuse.
 - 4. Provide environmental management solutions to decrease risk factors and increase protective factors in ND student safety.

There was NDHECSAP concern over the limited number of senior administrators in attendance, however for those who participated identified that the Forum was a valuable experience. The NDHECSAP felt that the Forum was successful and the invited speakers provided valuable information to address college drinking issues: Dr. Robert Carothers, President University of Rhode Island, Dr. Beverly Ledbetter, VP and Legal Council

Brown University and Dr. Margaret Barr, VP Student Affairs Northern State University (see Appendix L for detailed information about the Forum).

Future plans

To date, NDHECSAP efforts have focused on establishing campus task forces, campus and community coalitions, and effective, evidence-based prevention strategies on ND campuses. The NDHECSAP aims at adjusting and advancing proven strategies as the initiative develops into an empirically supported, ATOD abuse prevention model. The NDHECAP strives to retain legislative and financial support.

With the progress of FY07 strategic plan, the NDHECSAP will be diligent in maintaining the successes attained. At the same time, it is prepared to address new challenges that surface.

- 1. *Research*. The NDHECSAP will continue with a routine, consistent method to collect data on college drinking, with the administration of the NDCORE Survey. This investigation will assist the NDHECSAP in the development and implementation of ND specific solutions. The NDCORE results will offer base line quantitative analysis and trend data in ND college student drinking. The NDCORE will allow the NDHECSAP to conduct data analysis and statewide utilization of the data collected to more directly measure changes in student high-risk drinking. The NDHECSAP will also rely on individual campuses to monitor and evaluate program effectiveness, ensure quality program delivery, and adjust implemented programs as needed. The NDHECSAP has identified FY08 as the time for an internal review and comparison of data from individual NDUS campuses to identify changes in student behavior, attitudes, and consequences.
- 2. Funding. The NDHECSAP will continue to explore grant opportunities, both at the federal and state level, to expand and enhance current efforts. Sustaining funding sources is vital in the NDHECSAP's continuation. Statewide efforts without a staff person dedicated to managing those efforts are often unsuccessful. Without ongoing base funding, it will be difficult for the NDHECSAP to provide leadership in coordination, assist with program implementation, offer training opportunities, secure funding and other resources, and provide support for NDHECSAP members to continue prevention work on their campuses.
- 3. *Environmental Management Model of Prevention*. The NDHECSAP's mission identifies the use of evidence-based programs for substance abuse prevention. Evidence-based programs are programs that are available for dissemination and have technical assistance available from the developer. This approach will increase evidence-based programs being implemented on ND campuses. This evidenced-based program model will offer ND conceptually sound, internally consistent, well implemented and evaluated programs. Furthermore, environmental management strategies will determine outcomes—until those strategies are fully implemented and evaluated it is difficult to consistently measure changes in student behavior. Additionally, comparison of data from individual NDUS campuses will assist to identify changes in student behavior, attitudes, and consequences and will provide information about the campus need for specific programs. Each campus is diverse, in terms of composition and size and this model will eliminate

- 4. Outreach Coordinator Services. The NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator (ORC) will continue to assist campuses in the identification of evidence-based programs and need for evaluating effectiveness of programs and outcomes. Since the addition of the ORC in August 2005, campuses have been able to define the role of this position as a liaison to the campuses and resource for local campus work. Due to the diversity of the campuses the ORC will be the contact to assist each campus individually to identify campus programs and best practices implementation appropriate to each campus vision. This will help to support the overall NDHECSAP mission and vision. Future plans include exploring funding options to support an additional ORC.
- 5. *Expanding NDHECSAP partnerships*. The NDHECSAP relies on many levels of interaction to effectively implement prevention strategies. Therefore, partners in prevention are critical to the survival of NDHECSAP and the impact on high-risk student drinking behavior. The NDHECSAP discusses the best strategy for enhancing partnerships with students, private and tribal colleges, and state agencies. The NDHECSAP involves students at each campus visit. Additionally, the NDHECSAP collaborates with the NDSA to determine the best process for student representation on the NDHECSAP.

Barriers

Three important barriers in ND are time and resources, distance, and weather.

- At the campus level, time and resources are limited and inconsistent. The NDHECSAP and Regional and Safe Communities Coordinators have identified staff whose current positions are responsible for dealing with substance abuse issues, 2 out of 11 NDUS campuses do not have identified staff and often are strained beyond primary responsibilities and with limited resources available for prevention efforts.
- 2. At the state level, the weather can disrupt plans and often without warning. The distance barrier exists for so many activities in the state that NDHECSAP members accommodate distances through Interactive Video Conferencing; conference calls; centralized meetings to alleviate vast distances; car pooling; and forms of electronic facilitation including email and public access servers, to exchange information.
- 3. At the community level, distance is identified by the rural geography of ND, the small populations in some areas result in difficulty finding individuals with time to devote to this issue.

Sustainability

Sustainability will be of paramount importance and assessed throughout FY08 by:

- 1. Campus progress in using evidence-based prevention programs, ability to sustain effective programming, and response to changes in student reported drinking.
- 2. Student participation in prevention efforts on NDUS campuses.

- 3. Senior administrative endorsement to:
 - a. <u>Be Vocal</u>: Openly and publicly acknowledge that ATOD abuse problems exist within the University System.
 - b. <u>Be Visible</u>: Take an active stand on ATOD issues, convey clear expectations and standards, and serve as role models for administrators, faculty and students.
 - c. <u>Be Visionary</u>: Make ATOD prevention a strategic planning priority; Frame ATOD prevention discussions from perspectives administrators, faculty, students and alumni care about personal health and wellness, excellence in education and retention of students.
- 4. NDHECSAP members understanding and communicating to stakeholders what evidence-based policies, programs, and practices mean and the importance to use them in terms of outcomes, environmental management model approach, and building capacity.
- 5. Identification of effective prevention practices on campus and specific to that campus community.

Relationship building and allowing the campus voice to be heard at the state level will help ensure sustainability and keep the infrastructure operating. Sustainability is enhanced through establishing a strong systemic and organizational base by 1) clarifying mission compatibility, 2) establishing administrative endorsement and influential student involvement, 3) facilitating activity, program, and strategy system integration, and 4) adapting to state/system and campus needs, conditions, and expectations.

This approach represents a shift in thinking about prevention and suggests new leadership roles that postsecondary administrators, faculty, other campus officials, and students can play to reduce problems associated with alcohol and other drug use and to promote academic achievement.

Finally, there is high interest and acknowledgement of the need to address the substance abuse problem in ND and preserve our biggest asset, our students. There will be on-going discussions with key stakeholders and partners. Due to the involvement of the NDUS which submits the budget to the Legislative branch, options will be pursued with guidance.

Infrastructure Needs

There is a need to increase the scope of services of campus outreach, especially in the area of programming and administrative support. Ideally, the NDHECSAP could benefit by funding two ORCs, one for Western ND (Regions 1,2,7,8, which include: BSC, DSU, MiSU, MiSUB, and WSC) and one for Eastern ND (Regions, 3,4,5,6, which include: LRSC, MaSU, NDSCS, NDSU, UND, and VCSU). Additionally, the NDHECSAP could benefit by obtaining funding for an Administrative Assistant to perform duties associated with aiding the Director and ORC in the management of administrative support functions and state-wide responsibilities of the NDHECSAP.

Recommendations

The NDHECSAP has been successful in its expansion with identified staff positions and membership involvement; therefore, an enhanced outreach service to all the campuses is vital given the diversity of campus composition and size. The following recommendations are being made in order to sustain NDHECSAP momentum:

- 1. Increased senior administrator support in order to make prevention a strategic planning a priority.
- 2. Increased student support for local campus prevention efforts in order to change the culture of drinking.
- 3. Funding to increase the scope of services of campus outreach, especially in the area of programming and administrative support, in order to sustain NDHECSAP efforts.
- 4. A commitment to long-term social change in order to succeed in substance abuse prevention work.

There is no quick fix; however this recommended multileveled effort can succeed in changing the culture of drinking in ND.

Goals

The outcome intended from this review is to be prepared to serve the increasing demands associated with student substance abuse. In the upcoming year the NDHECSAP goals include:

- 1. Expand the implementation of evidenced-based programming.
- 2. Provide accurate and relevant information to students, senior administrators, legislators, and other key stakeholders about college substance abuse issues.
- 3. Continue research and data collection.
- 4. Identify specific campus needs through campus data comparisons.
- 5. Continue implementation of an environmental management model of prevention.
- 6. Identify ways to impact public policy by developing a coordinated strategy during the between legislative session year and by providing education about college substance abuse issues to state legislators.
- 7. Expand community partnerships to develop campus communities where student safety and success are not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances.

ORGANIZATION

Organization. The North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention (NDHECSAP) is an initiative of the North Dakota University System. It is the intent of the NDHECSAP to be actively committed to the process of the reduction of high-risk drinking, with representation of the eleven campuses within the North Dakota University System (NDUS). The NDHECSAP seeks to provide campuses with skills, attitudes, abilities and knowledge that will enable them to address collegiate alcohol and other drug use. This will provide an environment in which students will be given the opportunity to take full advantage of their university experience and to lead productive and satisfying lives.

The NDEHCSAP advocates for stronger prevention policies, collaborates in campus-community partnerships, and assists members of the NDHECSAP to develop evidenced-based prevention programs. A key feature of the NDHECSAP's work is the promotion of prevention strategies that affect the campus environment as a whole and have a large-scale impact on the entire campus community.

Mission of the NDHECSAP. The mission of the NDHECSAP is to reduce substance abuse in North Dakota's college student population and reduce negative health and safety consequences related to substance abuse in that population. The NDHECSAP will pursue this mission by coordinating the prevention efforts of colleges and universities throughout the state and by promoting college and community environmental factors that support healthy and safe norms. The NDHECSAP will also advocate for stronger state prevention policies, collaborate in campus-community partnerships, and help members of the NDHECSAP develop evidence-based prevention programs.

<u>Vision of the NDHECSAP</u>. The NDEHCSAP seeks campus communities where student safety and success are not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances.

<u>Stakeholders.</u> The NDEHCSAP's main stakeholder is North Dakota students. The NDHECSAP strategic plan includes a SWOT Analysis and Goals/Objectives to establish relationships and partnerships with ND stakeholders (communities, state agencies, and diverse populations) to establish protocols within and between campuses and communities supporting positive prevention efforts for all North Dakotans.

<u>Organizational Chart and Infrastructure</u>. The NDHECSAP targets both the state and campus levels. See Appendix A for an outline of the NDHECSAP Organizational Chart and Campus Prevention Infrastructure.

Strategic Plan. ANNUAL REPORT

THE NORTH DAKOTA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

NDHECSAP visibility at the state level is vital, with ND is higher than the national rate, in highrisk drinking for youth, young adult, adult, and college age individuals. According to the Department of Education's Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention, the NDHECSAP mission can only be realized if there is strong presidential leadership; a campus task force that includes a broad spectrum of faculty, staff, and students; partnerships with the community through a campus-community coalition; and the active participation of college officials in public policy debates, especially at the state level (DeJong, et al., 1998). Furthermore, the concept of an environmental management approach to alcohol and other drug prevention involves college officials, working in conjunction with the local community, to change the campus and community environment that contributes to alcohol and other drug problems. Such change can be brought about through an integrated combination of programs, policies, and public education campaigns. This coordinated effort will not only take the involvement of the campus but the entire community, working together to identify solutions to

high-risk drinking. This collaborated effort not only benefits NDUS college students but all North Dakotans.

North Dakota State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet Joint Resolution (see Appendix K). In 2005, the SBHE and Chancellor's Cabinet voted to support a Joint Resolution developed by the NDEHCSAP for effective prevention. The Joint Resolution includes the following priorities:

- 1. That every campus participates in the Safe Communities Coordinator and the Prevention Coordinator community coalitions.
- 2. Presidents should appoint substance abuse prevention task forces on their campus.
- 3. That the Chancellor, Presidents and SBHE become more vocal and visible on substance abuse prevention.
- 4. Increased presidential communication with incoming students and their parents positively impacts substance abuse prevention efforts.
- 5. Presidents should develop a statement of expectations concerning alcohol use that addressed students, faculty, staff, and administration.
- 6. Presidents should provide support for evaluation, data collection and completion of the biennial review.
- 7. Presidents should avoid creating mixed messages about alcohol on campus and policy support.

The NDUS campuses report using the Joint Resolution for task force discussion, to identify areas to be addressed, and provide recommendations about prevention to campus administration. It seems reasonable that all campuses use their campus task force as the vehicle to draft an action plan in support of the resolution.

Because there is a new NDUS Chancellor and 6 new campus presidents, the NDHECSAP 2007 Strategic Plan is recommending an updated Joint Resolution be developed. The NDHECSAP believes it is important to keep the Presidents and Board members engaged in the expectations from the Joint Resolution and to request a report which details progress on each campus in respect to the Joint Resolution items. It is the agreement from the NDHECSAP that the lead for expectations of the Joint Resolution come from the Chancellor.

Forum for Senior Administrators. The NDHECSAP held a first time "Forum for Senior Administrators was held in conjunction with the North Dakota Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety Alcohol Forum in Bismarck, North Dakota February 21, 2007. There were approximately 38 participants at the forum. There is NDHECSAP concern over the limited number of senior administrators in attendance. The SBHE members were unable to attend due to campus president interviews that day. However, the NDHECSAP agrees that the Senior Administrator Forum was successful and provided excellent speakers: Dr. Robert Carothers, President University of Rhode Island, Dr. Beverly Ledbetter, VP and Legal Council Brown University and Dr. Margaret Barr, VP Student Affairs Northern State University (see Appendix L for detailed information about the forum).

Student Affairs Council (SAC). The NDHECSAP receives support from within NDUS SAC in addressing college drinking by utilizing an environmental management approach. The SAC discusses the NDHECSAP progress at each meeting and is updated on NDHECSAP business.

Four (4) SAC members also sit on the NDHECSAP. Campus visits, with the Director and new Outreach Coordinator, are met with a welcoming and encouraging reception by campus Presidents, Vice Presidents, NDHECSAP members and other key campus staff present (see Appendix M for all FY07 SAC monthly updates on the NDHECSAP).

Campus Partnership with NDHECSAP. The NDHECSAP meets monthly through the use of IVN-Audio. Additionally, face to face meetings occur approximately four (4) times a year. Each campus has one or more representative(s) who attend the monthly meetings. The NDEHCSAP works as a collaborative system with all the NDUS campuses (see Appendix N for FY07meeting attendance record, agendas and minutes).

Partnerships and Collaborations with Other Campuses. The NDHECSAP has discussed ways to identify additional key leaders to partner with North Dakota private and tribal colleges on prevention work. The Director has made contact with the University of Mary, Jamestown College, Turtle Mountain Community College, United Tribes Technical College, and Sitting Bull Community College in an attempt to inform those campuses of the NDEHCSAP mission/vision and long term strategic plan of partnership opportunities for ND campuses.

THE CAMPUSES

Program Development. The NDUS campuses provide a comprehensive range of services to enrolled students and/or surrounding community. A list of campus updates and campus/community connections and programs are listed in Appendix J. The NDHECSAP utilizes the following environmental management strategies areas to gather campus updates (these are further defined in the Outcomes section beginning on page 30 and in Appendix O):

- 1. Alcohol free options Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, and public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs;
- 2. Normative Environment create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health-promoting norms;
- 3. Availability of Alcohol (and other drugs) limit alcohol availability both on and off campus;
- 4. Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus;
- 5. Policy Development and Law Enforcement develop and enforce campus policies an local, state, and federal laws;
- 6. State Specific Areas of Strategic Interventions include: Campus Task Force, Campus and Community Coalitions, Grant Funding Opportunities and Research.

These strategies are also aligned with the expectations from the current Joint Resolution (SBHE and Chancellor's Cabinet) signed November 17, 2005 (see Appendix K).

Outreach Coordinator (ORC). The NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator began her position on July, 15, 2006 and serves as a liaison to the campuses and resource for local campus work. The ORC assists campuses in the development and implementation of environmental management strategies. Additionally, the ORC assists campuses in the identification of evidence-based

programs and need for evaluating effectiveness of programs and outcomes. Due to the diversity of the campuses the ORC will be the contact to assist each campus individually to identify campus programs and best practices implementation appropriate to each campus vision. This will help to support the overall NDHECSAP Mission and Vision. See Appendix P for documentation of the ORC responsibilities and contact with NDUS campuses.

NDHECAP Website. The NDHECSAP website was launched June 2006. The site includes sections for Students, Parents, Announcements, Research Findings, Quick Facts, and Links. The student link offers Campus Resources (ATOD policies and Campus Codes); Blood Alcohol Calculators; Research/Print Material; and FAQs. The website also includes a "Best Practices" page with information and ideas about campus programs. The website continues to be updated and the ORC is responsible for the management of the website (see www.ndhec.und.edu).

NDHECSAP Brochure. The NDHECSAP developed an informational brochure that outlines the history of the NDEHCSAP and explains the Environmental Model of Prevention. An ORC informational brochure was also developed and outlines the role of the ORC, Environmental Management Approach, and Campus Networking. These brochures are distributed at events or put on table top displays. It is a tool for marketing our mission and initiative.

Training

Outlined below are NDHECSAP training opportunities offered at the state, regional, and national level. The Director, ORC and members of the NDHECSAP participated in and/or planned various training opportunities.

State Training

North Dakota Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit. The Director, ORC, and NDHECAP members attended the North Dakota Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit, presented by the Division of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, in Bismarck, North Dakota, September 2006. This summit offers a prevention and intervention track which includes college student substance abuse issues.

Bystander Training. Consultation with Alan Berkowitz, Social Norms Consultant was held at NDSU on November 14, 2006. Dr. Berkowitz provided training and consultation to the NDHECSAP and Regional/Tribal Coordinators. See Appendix Q for recommendations from that training.

Network Biennial Review Training. The Network Biennial Review Training with Deb Walker, Regional Director was held at NDSU on November 14, 2006. Deb Walker provided training to the NDHECSAP on completion of the Biennial Review. Details of the training can be found in Appendix R and details about the Biennial Review can be found in Appendix S.

3rd Annual Governor Sinner Public Policy Symposium: Sharing Solutions to Substance Abuse. The Director, ORC and NDHECSAP members attended the 3rd Annual Governor Sinner Public Policy Symposium: Sharing Solutions to Substance Abuse in Fargo, ND on November 28, 2006.

Office of Traffic Safety Alcohol Forum. The Director, ORC and NDHECSAP members attend the North Dakota Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety Alcohol Forum in Bismarck, North Dakota in February 2007. The Alcohol Forum seeks solutions to underage drinking. This forum focused on building bridges between ND college campuses, community coalitions, and law enforcement.

Forum for Senior Administrators: Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary." The Director, ORC and NDHECSAP attended the Forum for Senior Administrators: Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary." The Forum for Senior Administrators was held in conjunction with the North Dakota Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety Alcohol Forum in Bismarck, North Dakota February 21, 2007.

Strategic Planning Retreat. The NDHECSAP Strategic Planning Retreat was held on May 17 and 18, 2007 at BSC. This SP retreat focused on FY0709 short- and long-term goals.

All the aforementioned professional development opportunities serve to provide training and support for best practice programs to reduce substance abuse according to current research and provide an opportunity for NDHECAP members to network with national, regional, and state colleagues as well as with community coalition members.

Regional Training

Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drugs Issues State Coordinators Training. The Director attended the Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues Training for Network State and Territory Coordinators. This training included the development of a strategic plan for MN, ND, and SD region.

Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drugs Issues Regional Training. The Regional Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues offered training to campuses in Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota. Travel stipends (mileage and lodging) were available to NDHECSAP members and other campus personnel. The 2006 Network Training provided by the Higher Education Center from the Dept. of Education was held in Morris, MN June 27 and 28, 2007 and titled "Evaluation: Keeping your Sanity."

National Training

National Meeting on Alcohol, Tobacco, Other Drugs and Violence Prevention. The Director and ORC attended the National Meeting on Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs and Violence Prevention in Washington, DC in October, 2006. This is the national conference for examining issues around alcohol and other drug abuse and violence prevention on college campuses and in their surrounding communities.

National Prevention Network Prevention Research Conference: The Director, ORC, and Regional Prevention Coordinators attended the National Prevention Network (NPN) Prevention Research Conference in Lexington, Kentucky in August, 2006. The NPN, an organization of State alcohol and other drug abuse prevention representatives, is a component of National

Association of State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Directors and provides a national advocacy and communication system for prevention to ensure the provision of high quality and effective alcohol, tobacco, and other drug abuse prevention services in each State.

ACPA/NASPA Joint Meeting. NDHECSAP members attended and presented at the ACPA/NASPA Joint meeting held March 31, 2006 – April 4, 2006 in Orlando, Florida. NASPA is the leading voice for student affairs administration, policy and practice, and affirms the commitment of student affairs to educating the whole student and integrating student life and learning.

NASPA Strategies Conference: Alcohol Abuse Prevention and Intervention. The Director and ORC attended and presented a poster session at the NASPA Strategies Conference: Alcohol Abuse Prevention & Intervention in Atlanta, Georgia from January 31, 2007 to February 4, 2007. Other NDHECSAP members also attended the conference.

Research

NDHECSAP participates in ongoing research projects. Outlined below are research projects either initiated by the NDHECSAP or included the NDHECSAP.

Project NDCORE. The NDHECSAP received grant funding (\$17,302.50) from the Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety for the development of a NDCORE Alcohol and Drug Survey to provide the opportunity to include state colleges and universities in a routine data collection method using a consistent state instrument. ND campuses have used the Core Alcohol and Drug Survey for data collection to measure college drinking rates. Prior to the NDHECSAP reorganization each campus administered the Core Alcohol and Drug Survey at varying intervals, which is relevant at the national level, but there had not been a collaborative effort at consistent data collection throughout the state since 1994. Project NDCORE solicited input from ND Prevention Coordinators, law enforcement, community leaders, school leaders, medical personnel, faith-based leaders, NDHECSAP members, campus and community coalition members and students. The results of the NDCORE Survey were presented at the Forum for Senior Administrators. See Appendix T for the NDCORE Survey aggregate results. This data is important to determine the unique elements that keep our state at the top of national drinking statistics as well as to identify changes in behavior by utilizing a consistent reporting system on college substance abuse. The campus NDCORE Survey results have been used to develop social norms campaigns for several NDUS campuses.

Project North Dakota Freshmen Initiative. The NDHECSAP received grant funding (\$30,712) from the Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety to fund Project North Dakota Freshmen Initiative. The purpose of this study will be to measure the effectiveness of a parent/guardian-intervention as a means to decrease underage and high-risk drinking among matriculating students to campuses within the NDUS the fall 2007. A sample of first year student parents/guardians were mailed a handbook during the summer 2007 entitled, "The Next Chapter: A Parent Handbook for Talking with College Students about Alcohol before They Enter College" Parents/families/guardians were encouraged to read the handbook and talk with their student about the contents. An evaluation will be conducted with first year students, in fall 2007,

to determine if parent/family/guardian communication has a positive impact on choices students make about drinking. The benefits of this project will be the identification of whether parent/family/guardian communication in ND, supports current national research, which could result in targeted prevention efforts and greater public health.

Message in a Bottle Project. The Red River Valley Safe Communities Coalition received funding from the Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety for the project, Message in a Bottle: Talking to your Student about Alcohol. This project is a partnership between The Red River Valley Safe Communities Coalition and North Dakota State University (NDSU) to develop a video to be shared at the NDSU summer orientation. NDSU shared a copy of this video with six campuses in the NDUS to show during summer/fall 2007 orientation sessions. The campuses participating in the project include Dickinson State University, Lake Region State University, Mayville State University, Minot State University, North Dakota State University, and Valley City State University. The project looked at parent communication about alcohol and college. The results of parents evaluation of the video are included as an aggregate in Appendix U. Overall, parents indicated that the video made them feel comfortable about talking to their student about alcohol, got new ideas about how to talk to their student about alcohol, persuaded them to see the importance of talking to their student about alcohol, and persuaded them to have a conversation with their student about alcohol prior to sending them to college.

Biennial Review

Drug Free Schools and Communities Act (Biennial Review). All campuses have completed two rounds of Biennial Reviews (due October 31, 2004 and December 31, 2006). All campuses have received a copy of the revised "Complying with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations [34 CFR Part 86]: A guide for University and College Administrators." This report will be used at the local campus level to evaluate goals and objectives, as well as outcome of the effectiveness of alcohol and other drug programs. The Biennial Review is also used to identify the consistency of policy enforcement on each campus and is a federal requirement under the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act. Failure to comply may result in loss of federal funding. The next biennial review will be due at the end of the year 2008 (see Appendix S for documentation on Complying with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations).

Evaluation. Each campus is responsible for the review of alcohol and other drug programs at the local level which includes polices, enforcement, sanctions, incidents, referrals, data collection and outcome measures. The Biennial Review assists in completion of this responsibility by an examination of the effectiveness of its ATOD abuse prevention programs, and the consistency of policy enforcement.

THE STUDENTS

North Dakota Student Association (NDSA). The Director met with Bobby Haskins, NDSA President about NDHECSAP mission, vision, strategic plan and goals, as well as, the possibility of student representation on NDHECSAP. Nickito Johnson, DSU was appointed to sit on NDHECSAP from NDSA. The student representative attends the monthly NDHECSAP monthly

meetings (see Appendix V for monthly updates to NDSA). The NDHECSAP will involve students (student government and other student leaders) at each campus visit.

NDHECSAP Student Membership. The NDHECSAP strategic plan includes an invitation to one student to participate on the NDHECSAP per year, using an annual rotation, by campus (alphabetically starting with DSU). The hosting campus will arrange travel, etc. for the student to attend NDHECSAP meetings.

Campus Student Government. Campuses have reported keeping Student Government involved in substance abuse prevention efforts. Several campuses have secured funding for alcohol and other drug programming through access of student fees through Student Government approval. FY07 campus visits included participation from student government at each campus.

Campus Student Organizations. Campuses work with student organizations in the development and implementation of student driven programming. These include educational programming, awareness campaigns, art and theater programs, peer education, alcohol free activities and others (see Appendix J for a complete list of campus specific programming).

Alcohol Policy Violations and Sanctions. Each campus has a policy in place for addressing alcohol policy violations (see Appendix W for campus specific policies and sanctioning processes). Many campuses have been evaluating and reviewing their sanction policies and making changes to support environmental management strategies. Under authorization by Congress in the 1998 amendment to the Higher Education Act of 1965, each school that is Title IV eligible is required to publish and distribute an annual campus security report to all current students and employees. Appendix X contains the Office of Postsecondary Education Campus Security Statistic-Reported Criminal Offenses for NDUS campuses. The Reported Criminal Offenses include FY03, FY04 and FY05 for the categories of Arrests – On Campus and Arrests – Non Campus. Disciplinary actions/judicial referrals for Liquor Law Violation and Arrests on campus appear to have the most reported violations within NDUS. This could be the result of improved campus policies and enforcement of those policies as well as campus-community collaborations.

EXTERNAL CONSTITUENTS AND OTHER STAKEHOLDERS

Each NDUS campus has been working to network in their respective communities and partnerships have been formed within those community coalitions. Outlined below are NDHECSAP partnerships at the level of campus/community, state, regional, and national.

Partnerships in Substance Abuse Prevention

State Partners

Prevention Coordinators and Safe Communities Coordinators. Each campus community/region has a Regional/Tribal Coordinator and Safe Communities Coordinator (see Appendix Y for

contact list). Many of the Regional/Tribal Coordinators hold joint positions as Safe Communities Coordinators across the state. Partnerships have been formed within each campus community with the formation of community coalitions.

The NDHECSAP meets with the Regional/Tribal Coordinators bi-annually to request information on partnership with the NDEHCSAP members (at the ND Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit and DOT Alcohol Forum). They support the vision that prevention efforts and strategies become a community-wide approach and not just campus centered.

A Satisfaction Survey was conducted by the Division of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services at the request of the NDHECSAP to evaluate the relationship between campus and community prevention efforts. A total of 8 out of 12 state Regional/Tribal Prevention Coordinators participated in the survey (see Appendix Z for the results). The state Regional/Tribal Prevention Coordinators have indicated that they are comfortable approaching NDHECSAP with ideas, assistance, or questions about prevention. There appears to be a need for more participation at the local campus level and with community coalition involvement. They also indicate more communication between the NDHECAP and the coordinators. The state Regional/Tribal Prevention Coordinators and Safe Communities Coordinators are invited to participate in the Networking portion of the NDHECSAP monthly meetings.

North Dakota Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit. The North Dakota Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit planning committee is supportive of NDHECSAP efforts by the inclusion of the NDHECSAP members in the North Dakota Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit, and coordinating meetings for collaboration with the Regional/Tribal Prevention Coordinators. The Director is a member of the Summit Planning Committee.

North Dakota Drug and Alcohol Commission. The Director is a member of the North Dakota Drug Commission. The Drug Commission is charged with the evaluation of substance abuse in North Dakota. The representation of higher education at this table is important and consistent with the mission of the NDHECSAP in reducing substance abuse issues in college students. However, the work of this committee has been re-evaluated since the submission of the Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant and the formation of the ND Prevention Advisory Council, which would replace this committee.

North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT). Partnerships have been formed with the NDDOT Office of Traffic Safety and Sandy Wilson, Program Manager – Alcohol Incentive Funds. Grant proposal for the development of a Freshmen Initiative proposal has been funded. The Office of Traffic Safety holds an Alcohol Forum each year and the NDHECSAP was able to partner with the 2007 Alcohol Forum and offer the Senior Administrator Forum.

North Dakota Division of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (Division). Partnerships have been formed with the Division and Charlotte Olson, Prevention Specialist. Block grant funding has been awarded to the NDHECSAP through the Division which funds the NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator position. Additionally, collaboration has begun with the

NDHECAP members and Regional/Tribal Prevention Coordinators. This partnership assists with the identification of consistent prevention efforts statewide.

State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup (SEOW). ND was awarded a grant from SAMHSA to form a State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup comprised of researchers, analysts, and program people. Higher education has been invited to sit on the SEOW which meets monthly to discuss and share information on the consumption and consequences of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. The purpose of the SEOW is to identify all data collected in ND related to substance use and then develop epidemiological profiles of these substances as they affect the state. Regional Partners

Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues (The Network). All NDUS campuses are members of the Network (including Jamestown College and University of Mary). The Network is the national organization that proactively addresses the issues of alcohol, other drugs, and violence in order to promote healthy campus environments through self-regulatory initiatives, information dissemination, and technical assistance. The Network serves as a liaison between the U.S. Department of Education and member institutions as well as other higher education professional organizations. Member institutions encourage and enhance local, state, regional, and national initiatives through a commitment to shared standards for policy development, educational strategies, enforcement, evaluation, and community collaboration. The Network has been in existence since 1987. Originally formed in partnership with the U.S. Department of Education, The Network has grown to involve approximately 1,500 institutions of higher education. The Network is a national consortium of IHE professionals aimed at sharing and disseminating information to help curb alcohol and other drug abuse as well as violent behavior among college students.

The Regional Director of North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota is available for technical assistance and planning of The Network Regional Training each year. The NDHECSAP Director sits on the Tri-State Regional Network Steering Committee and is also the Network's State/Territory Coordinator (STCs) for North Dakota. The focus of the North Dakota-South Dakota-Minnesota region is to empower colleges and universities to create positive change and reduce alcohol and drug use and violence related incidents on campus. This mission is achieved through providing training and technical assistance.

National Partners

Department of Education Higher Education Center. The Higher Education Center offers training opportunities and technical assistance for substance abuse issues. The National Meeting of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drug and Violence Prevention is offered each year and is an excellent means for networking with national key experts in substance abuse prevention. The Director and Outreach Coordinator attend this meeting annually. Others from North Dakota campuses have also attended this meeting.

NDHECSAP OUTCOMES

The NDEHCSAP has adopted an environmental management approach as a comprehensive strategy for ATOD prevention. Key responsibilities of environmental management include: leadership; assessment; strategic planning, public policy development; cross-campus coordination; advocacy and social marketing; monitoring and evaluation (DeJong, et al., 1998).

There are three areas of action in which to work for environmental change to address campus ATOD. The NDHECSAP has campus participation at one of three levels, with some campuses participating at all three levels (for a more detailed documentation of the following areas see Appendix O):

- 1. <u>Campus Task Forces</u> (addresses institutional factors) presidents; board members; deans; campus attorneys; alumni and parents; Greek officers; athletic officials; police and campus security officials; ATOD prevention coordinators; health care and counseling staff; community leaders and local officials; student leaders and activists; admissions officers and resident life directors; faculty and teaching assistants.
- <u>Campus-Community Coalition</u> (addresses community factors) college officials; law enforcement officials; liquor store owners; college students; parents; ATOD treatment providers; elected officials; other government officials; community development officials; ATOD prevention leaders; Alcohol Beverage Control officials; restaurant and bar owners.
- 3. <u>State Association of Colleges and Universities</u> (addresses state-level public policy)—college officials; other government officials; state health associations; state ATOD prevention associations; state business associations; law enforcement officials; elected officials.

Strategies focused on environmental change that are being reported by campuses and support the Joint Resolution are highlighted below (see Appendix J for a more comprehensives list of individual campus accomplishments and Appendix O for detailed documentation of the strategy, rationale for the using the strategy and tactics (examples) for campuses to employ):

1. **Alcohol-free options:** Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs.

NDUS campuses:

- National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness week activities
- Dances alcohol free
- Alcohol free athletic events

- Finals Breakfast
- Movie nights
- Welcome week activities at the beginning of the semester
- 2. **Normative Environment:** Create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health promoting norms.

NDUS campuses:

- Social Norms campaign targeting tobacco using NDCORE Survey results.
- National Alcohol Screening Day
- Student sponsored booths to promote healthy behavior (Psychology Club and Student Nurses Association)
- Promotion of Wellness model
- Coordinated with faculty to give presentations about substance abuse on campus
- Held Student Prevention Summit
- Offered a "Did you know...." Social norms campaign about protective behaviors, building social capital, and other health issues
- Participates in Methamphetamine Awareness event
- Live remote with radio station during campus Alcohol Awareness Week
- Campus Coffee Shop and Game Room
- White out day students dress in white to represent alcohol death or injury
- Flyers in campus restrooms with alcohol information and educational messages
- Project A.C.E. (Action. Commitment. Education) uses community based assets to change attitudes and behavior. Offered seminars in suicide, violence, alcohol, gambling, sex and sexuality, Meth and other drugs.
- Peer Group performs short one-act plays for students
- 3. **Availability of Alcohol**): Limit alcohol availability both on and off campus **NDUS Campuses**:
 - Alcohol is banned or restrict on NDUS campuses.
 - Students working with law enforcement to conduct community compliance checks for alcohol control
 - Assisted in drafting a Senate bill on Excessive Drink Discounting
 - Actively turn in violators to law enforcement information about sales to minors
 - Established a non alcohol section at athletic games
 - Mayor's task force developed to work with local businesses on sales to minors and restricting access to alcohol by minors
 - Enforcement of policies within residence halls
 - Resident Assistants monitor behavior

4. **Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol**: Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus

NDUS Campuses:

- Radio, print, and visual media ads produced with DUI messages
- Limitation of the sale of shot glasses, beer mugs, and wine glasses at campus bookstore.
- Offered server training.
- No marketing or promotion of alcoholic beverages is permitted in any area of campus.
- Challenge editors of campus newspaper to be more responsible with the promotion of alcohol through advertisements of business with alcohol as primary focus.
- Ban of bar ads in student newspaper promoting drink specials.
- Student Flyer does not contain drink specials or advertising.
- Any posted advertisement for an alcohol related event is removed from campus.
- No marketing of alcohol or tobacco on campus
- 5. **Policy Development and Law Enforcement:** Develop and enforce campus policies and local, state and federal laws

NDUS Campuses:

- Changes made to the Alcohol and Drug Policy
- Recommendations made to the Human Resource Officer to change the illegal drug policy to reflect state penal code and federal trafficking charges after the biennial review of campus drug and alcohol policies.
- Students attending server training provided by law enforcement and Community Action
- Law enforcement staff added to night shift on campus
- Parking lot cameras to monitor behavior
- Use of eChug for student sanctions
- Use of Choices class for student sanctions
- Tobacco-Free Campus Initiative Task Group
- Commission on Student Use of Alcohol
- Exploring the issue of pictures of alcohol violations appearing in Face Book as part of campus policy
- Use of Parental Notification for alcohol policy violations
- Random drug testing policy for student athletes
- Review of policies and sanctions
- Distribution of campus policies

It is the NDHECSAP goal that each campus will develop a campus infrastructure to support ATOD efforts with the implementation of environmental management strategies and evidence-based programs. It is not expected that campuses will be at the same level at all times. Each campus needs to be able to develop at a pace consistent with campus resources and support. The ORC will assist campuses in identification of what exists on campus, what each campus needs for implementation of programming and a plan for development or implementation of strategies.

Additionally, comparison of data from individual NDUS campuses will assist to identify changes in student behavior, attitudes, and consequences and will provide information about the campus need for specific programs. This will eliminate the "cookie cutter" type of approach to prevention programming at the local campus level.

Research. ND institutions of higher education are committed to the Core Alcohol and Drug Survey as a method of evaluation, due to its credibility as a research instrument. Therefore, the development of the NDCORE, through the Core Institute provides ND with a baseline of data that can be tracked specifically for ND students and allow for comparisons with the national Core Alcohol and Drug Survey. The development of NDCORE also helps to identify a change in binge drinking rates which will have an overall impact on decreasing consequences associated with high-risk drinking. Furthermore, other items of the NDCORE can be identified to include: student participation in campus prevention efforts, student attitude about peer usage, and parental impact on student use of alcohol.

Environmental management strategies will determine outcomes – until those strategies are fully implemented and evaluated it is difficult to measure changes in student drinking behavior. Also the NDCORE results will offer base line quantitative analysis as well as to look at trends in ND college student drinking from 1994.

Finally, there has not been an internal review and comparison of data from individual NDUS campuses to identify changes in student behavior, attitudes and consequences. This comparison of data is important in the context of the diversity of each campus and the need to identify effectiveness of prevention efforts on individual campuses. Therefore, the NDHECSAP has identified FY08 as a time to internally review and compare NDUS campus data.

CONCLUSION

Sustainability. Sustainability will be of paramount importance and assessed throughout FY08 by:

- 1. Campus progress in using evidence-based prevention programs, ability to sustain effective programming, and response to changes in student reported drinking.
- 2. Student participation in prevention efforts on NDUS campuses.
- 3. Senior administrative endorsement to:
 - a. <u>Be Vocal</u>: Openly and publicly acknowledge that ATOD abuse problems exist within the University System.
 - b. <u>Be Visible</u>: Take an active stand on ATOD issues, convey clear expectations and standards, and serve as role models for administrators, faculty and students.
 - c. <u>Be Visionary</u>: Make ATOD prevention a strategic planning priority; Frame ATOD prevention discussions from perspectives administrators, faculty, students and alumni care about personal health and wellness, excellence in education and retention of students.
- 4. NDHECSAP members understanding and communicating to stakeholders what evidence-based policies, programs, and practices mean and the importance to use them in terms of outcomes, environmental management model approach, and building capacity.
- 5. Identification of effective prevention practices on campus and specific to that campus community.

Relationship building and allowing the campus voice to be heard at the state level will help ensure sustainability and keep the infrastructure operating. Sustainability is enhanced through establishing a strong systemic and organizational base by 1) clarifying mission compatibility, 2) establishing administrative endorsement and influential student involvement, 3) facilitating activity, program, and strategy system integration, and 4) adapting to state/system and campus needs, conditions, and expectations.

This approach represents a shift in thinking about prevention and suggests new leadership roles that postsecondary administrators, faculty, other campus officials, and students can play to reduce problems associated with alcohol and other drug use and to promote academic achievement.

Finally, there is high interest and acknowledgement of the need to address the substance abuse problem in ND and preserve our biggest asset, our students. There will be on-going discussions with key stakeholders and partners. Due to the involvement of the NDUS which submits the budget to the Legislative branch, options will be pursued with guidance.

Barriers. Three important barriers in ND are time and resources, distance, and weather.

- 1. At the campus level, time and resources are limited and inconsistent. The NDHECSAP and Regional and Safe Communities Coordinators have identified staff whose current positions are responsible for dealing with substance abuse issues, 2 out of 11 NDUS campuses do not have identified staff and often are strained beyond primary responsibilities and with limited resources available for prevention efforts.
- 2. At the state level, the weather can disrupt plans and often without warning. The distance barrier exists for so many activities in the state that NDHECSAP members accommodate distances through Interactive Video Conferencing; conference calls; centralized meetings to alleviate vast distances; car pooling; and forms of electronic facilitation including email and public access servers, to exchange information.
- 3. At the community level, distance is identified by the rural geography of ND, the small populations in some areas result in difficulty finding individuals with time to devote to this issue.

Infrastructure Needs. There is a need to increase the scope of services of campus outreach, especially in the area of programming and administrative support.

- 1. *Outreach Coordinator*. Because the needs of the campuses have been redefined, the ORC supporting campuses at the local level is increasing. The anticipated travel needs for the ORC position have increased and the ORC position job description now includes 50% position responsibility for assistance directly at the local campus level.
- 2. Administrative Assistance. The NDHECSAP currently does not have administrative assistance. Given the growing demands of the Director and Outreach Coordinator to be working at the campus and state level and assisting campuses with programming and other federal requirements, maintaining office accounting and day to day infrastructure requirements has become increasingly demanding.

3. *Funding Needs*. Ideally, the NDHECSAP could benefit by funding an additional ORC. This would place one ORC in Western ND (Regions 1,2,7,8, which include: BSC, DSU, MiSU, MiSUB, and WSC) and one ORC in Eastern ND (Regions, 3,4,5,6, which include: LRSC, MaSU, NDSCS, NDSU, UND, and VCSU). Additionally, the NDHECSAP could benefit by obtaining funding for an Administrative Assistant to perform duties associated in aiding the Director and ORC with the management of administrative support functions and state-wide responsibilities of the NDHECSAP.

Recommendations. The NDHECSAP has been successful in its expansion with identified staff positions and membership involvement; therefore, an enhanced outreach service to all the campuses is vital given the diversity of campus composition and size. The following recommendations are being made in order to sustain NDHECSAP momentum:

- 1. Increased senior administrator support in order to make prevention a strategic planning a priority.
- 2. Increased student support for local campus prevention efforts in order to change the culture of drinking.
- 3. Funding to increase the scope of services of campus outreach, especially in the area of programming and administrative support, in order to sustain NDHECSAP efforts.
- 4. A commitment to long-term social change in order to succeed in substance abuse prevention work.

Goals. The outcome intended from this review is to be prepared to serve the increasing demands associated with student substance abuse. In the upcoming year the NDHECSAP goals include:

- 1. Expand the implementation of evidenced-based programming.
- 2. Provide accurate and relevant information to students, senior administrators, legislators, and other key stakeholders about college substance abuse issues.
- 3. Continue research and data collection.
- 4. Identify specific campus needs through campus data comparisons.
- 5. Continue implementation of an environmental management model of prevention.
- 6. Identify ways to impact public policy by developing a coordinated strategy during the between legislative session year and by providing education about college substance abuse issues to state legislators.
- 7. Expand community partnerships to develop campus communities where student safety and success are not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances.

There is no quick fix; however this recommended multileveled effort can succeed in changing the culture of drinking in ND and build safer and healthier campuses and communities to maximize student success. The NDEHCSAP has begun to mobilize both at the local campus level with recruitment of students to participate in prevention efforts on campus as well as at the administration level with ongoing support of senior administration.

The following is an account of the progress that the NDHECSAP has made toward the Strategic Plan goals and objectives to date. Included is progress on the Short-Term Statewide Initiative Plan through June 30, 2007, as well as, the Long-Term Statewide Initiative Plan through June, 2009.

Progress steps/success indicators: The State Board of Higher Education approved budget for the NDHECSAP is \$75,000/year (\$150,000/biennium). This year (FY07) there was a 5% increase in the Director salary which comes from the Salary/Fringe Budget. There also remains an unencumbered balance of \$540.85 in salary/fringe budget, which was request to be carried over to FY08. There is also an operating budget from a previous carry over balance of \$28,787.26. On June 30, 2007 there remains an unencumbered operating balance of \$6,264.91 (see Appendix G for monthly budget reports including carry over of unencumbered balances from salary/fringe and operating budgets. Match grant funding had been obtained from the DHS Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services for the hiring of a NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator. This funding is part of the SAMHSA Block Grant for ND. FY07 began with a balance of \$78,701.85 from the \$129,583 biennium total. During FY07 there was indirect cost rebate from two grant projects totaling \$924.00 (see Appendix H for budget reports). As of June 30, 2007 there remains an unexpended balance of \$15,707.15. This is due to the ORC position being vacant from May 15, 2006 – July 15, 2006 (see Appendix I for quarterly reports). For FY0709 the NDHECSAP has increased to \$79,630 salary/fringe and \$23,000 operating. This is an increase of approximately \$21,300 per year.

Included in Appendix E is a Minor Inventory Assessment of budget dollars.

NDEHCSAP members have been invited to participate in state (with waived fees) and regional Network (travel stipends) training opportunities.



NDHECAP Subcommittee Reports

NDHECSAP 2006-2007 Subcommittee's Updates

The NDHECSAP has five (5) subcommittees to expand the work of the NDHECAP in the following areas:

- 1. Advertising Subcommittee
- 2. Conference Subcommittee
- 3. Grant Writing Subcommittee
- 4. Legislative Subcommittee
- 5. Search Subcommittee

Outlined below are specific tasks accomplished by each subcommittee in FY0607.

<u>Advertising Subcommittee</u> (Nancy Gordon, BSU; Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Paula Berg, MiSUB, and Sandi Luck, UND)

Nancy Gordon, BSC is the chair of the Advertising Subcommittee which was established to look at campus alcohol advertising in the state (policies, newspapers, publishing boards, etc). Banning or restricting alcohol advertising on and off campus is an identified tactic in our Environmental Management Model under the area of "Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol." Campus newspapers are under the direction of the Board of Student Publications and difficult to control due to freedom of speech. It was suggested that the NDHECSAP identify where the NDHECSAP stands on this issue and/or formulate a specific action statement from the NDHECSAP, if appropriate. Therefore the subcommittee developed the following goals:

- 1. To get each student newspaper to arrive at a policy that will carry over from year to year and not be contingent on the editor.
- 2. To work with the board of student publication
- 3. To appeal to the ethics of the journalism profession (Code of Ethics for journalists).
- 4. To find precedents, examples, and policies from other schools in the United States.
- 5. The find out what student government policies are across the state regarding funding to the student newspaper.
- 6. To empower students to address this issue on campus.
- 7. To gain support from student government to form policy or standards regarding this issue.

<u>Conference Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Hal Haynes, DSU; Jane Vangsness, NDSU; and Sandi Luck, UND)

Karin Walton, Director is the chair of the Conference Subcommittee which was established to coordinate a Forum for Senior Administrators.

Forum for Senior Administrators: The Forum was held on February 21, 2007 with grant funding from Dakota Medical Foundation. The speakers recruited for the Forum were aimed at State Board of Higher Education, Presidents, Vice Presidents, North Dakota Student Association, and Senior Administration staff in higher education (see the next page for complete agenda and objectives of the SAF).

Karin Walton, Director will be meeting with Chancellor Goetz on July 9, 2007 and will talk about the possibility of holding another Senior Administrator Forum in conjunction with the Chancellors' Cabinet in 2008.

Forum for State Legislators: Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU suggested that we hold a conference to educate state legislators between sessions. Jane Vangsness, NDSU suggested that when NDHECSAP campus visits are held this fall that we also meet with the legislators from the area. This suggestion will be moved to the Legislative Subcommittee for discussion and brought back to the NDHECSAP.

In November 2005, The North Dakota State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet signed a Joint Resolution as a proposal for effective prevention and support for the following strategies to reduce high-risk behavior:

Be Vocal: Openly and publicly acknowledge that alcohol and other drug abuse problems exist within the University System.

Be Visible: Take an active stand on alcohol and other drug issues, convey clear expectations and standards, and serve as role models for administrators, faculty, and students.

Be Visionary: Make alcohol and other drug prevention a strategic planning priority; Frame alcohol and other drug prevention discussions from perspectives that administrators, faculty, students and alumni care about – personal health and wellness, excellence in education and retention of students.

The North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention (NDHECSAP) believes it is important to keep the Presidents, State Board of Higher Education and North Dakota Student Association engaged in the expectations from the Joint Resolution. Through a grant from the Dakota Medical Foundation, the NDHECSAP will host the first annual Forum for Senior Administrators. We welcome the chancellor, vice chancellor, presidents, vice presidents, student association members, and other senior administrators to join in this collegial meeting with peers to consider leadership strategies for promoting safe and healthy learning and living environments.

"Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary" is the theme of the first annual Forum for Senior Administrators and will focus on what senior administrators can do to create an environment on campus that is effectively addressing alcohol and drug misuse. Topics include the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism's report on drinking at colleges, legal issues (risk perception and reduction, liability, and compliance with relevant federal mandates), senior administrators' perspectives on alcohol and other drug issues (being proactive vs. reactive, managing alcohol and other drug issues related publicity, and how key stakeholders influence responses), and an update from the NDHECSAP about ND college drinking.

The purpose of the Forum for Senior Administrators will be to advance the agenda of substance abuse prevention in North Dakota institutions of higher education by:

- 1. Implementing evidence-based practices,
- 2. Developing policies,
- 3. Supporting pilot programs, and
- 4. Advancing academic research.

Outcomes:

- 1. Educate senior administrators in addressing high-risk drinking in college students using an environmental management framework.
- 2. Showcase how senior administrator support and state resources have been put to use on ND campuses through NDHECSAP involvement.
- 3. Inform senior administrators of recent research and/or information (problems/risks) in college substance abuse.
- 4. Provide environmental management solutions to decrease risk factors and increase protective factors in ND student safety.

<u>Grant Writing Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Jane Vangsness, NDSU; Sandi Luck, UND; and Hal Haynes, DSU).

Karin Walton, Director is the chair of the Grant Writing Subcommittee which was established to explore grant funding opportunities. The following grant projects include:

NDCORE Survey: In FY0506 this project was funded by the ND Department of Transportation Office of Traffic Safety. All NDUS campuses participated in the administration of the NDCORE Survey and each campus received an executive summary, individual campus data, and state aggregate data. The results of this project were presented at the Senior Administrator Forum February 21, 2007.

Dakota Medical Foundation: The NDHECSAP requested a one time educational grant of \$7,602.09 from DMF. This funding was used to offer a NDUS senior administrators' forum focusing on substance abuse prevention among ND college students. This senior administrators' forum, held in conjunction with the North Dakota Department of Transportation (Office of Traffic Safety) Alcohol Forum offered the NDUS presidents, vice presidents, senior administrators, and North Dakota Student Association representatives a cost effective avenue and partnership to come together to review various approaches for curbing student substance use and lend support to a comprehensive state plan of action.

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative: The Department of Transportation has funded the NDHECSAP grant application in the amount of \$30,712.50 for project ND Freshmen Initiative. The purpose of this study is to measure the effectiveness of a parent/guardian-intervention as a means to decrease underage and high-risk drinking among matriculating students to campuses within the NDUS the fall 2007. A sample of first year student parents/guardians were mailed a handbook during the summer 2007 entitled, "The Next Chapter: A Parent Handbook for Talking with College Students about Alcohol before They Enter College." Parents/families/guardians were encouraged to read the handbook and talk with their entering student about the contents. An evaluation will be conducted with first year students, in fall 2007, to determine if parent/family/guardian communication has a positive impact on choices students make about drinking. The benefits of this project will be the identification of whether parent/family/guardian communication in ND, supports current national research, which could result in targeted prevention efforts and greater public health. Jane Vangsness, NDSU, has taken the lead on this project and will use the information for the development of her Masters' Thesis.

Bremer Foundation Grant: Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, asked for support in applying for a Bremer Grant to focus on funding that could be used to bring in speakers or assist campuses with their ongoing prevention efforts (Alcohol Awareness Weeks, etc.). The Grant Writing subcommittee will help in the development of a project goal statement and writing of the grant proposal.

Other: Becky Byzewski, Region 8 stated that there was community SATP funding from the block grant going to the prevention coordinators and would be able to be available through an RFP to use for evidence-based programs.

The subcommittee met to look at options for the 2008 DOT Traffic Safety Office grant. Karin Walton, Director, talked to Sandy Wilson, DOT about the suggestion to print alcohol counterads in the campus newspapers across the state. Sandy Wilson, DOT indicated that NTHSA would not fund media or advertising. She did indicate that there are other options for funding through the Alcohol Countermeasures at a later date. It was decided that to not apply for the DOT grant funding due to the short deadline, but to look at options for various funding agencies (Bremer, Dakota Medical Foundation, and DOT).

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Mike Johnson, NDSCS; Randy Fixen, LRSC; Nickito Johnson, DSU; and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU).

Karin Walton, Director is chair of the Legislative Subcommittee which was established to identify areas of public policy that affect higher education. The subcommittee is responsible for developing a plan and strategy for the upcoming legislative session.

Responsible Choices Committee: The Intergovernmental Relations Council has been meeting between legislative sessions and Karin Walton, Director, updated the NDHECSAP on progress of the Responsible Choices Committee. There has been discussion by the Intergovernmental Relations Council about the need to use state funds for this initiative. Karin Walton, Director, indicated that Lee Erickson, Director of ND SADD, had contacted her regarding legislation he had been working on for a state allocation for prevention. Lee Erickson, ND SADD stated that the NDHECSAP will not be included in the bill. However, we will testify in support of the request for \$440,000 state allocation for youth prevention in ND.

Excessive Drink Discounting: Karin Walton, Director, updated NDHECSAP members about Legislative Subcommittee efforts. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU worked with Senator Tony Grindberg and Representative Morrie Lanning (MN) to draft proposed legislation targeting bans on drink specials, free drinks, targeting specific populations – women, etc. in North Dakota and Minnesota. Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU contacted various states with drink special bans to identify effectiveness of legislation, as well as challenges in introducing this type of legislation. The challenges identified were the enforcement of the legislation after the bill was past.

Other: Karin Walton, Director will be looking at all the alcohol bills affecting higher education and identify, which votes, from which legislators to assist in planning for the next session.

Here is a list of the 2007 session bills that affect higher education and substance abuse:

- SB 2204 Medical Amnesty. (PASSED)
- SB 2269 Excessive Drink Discounting Bill Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU testified for Karin Walton, Director in support of this bill. (DEFEATED 13 yeas and 34 nays).

• SB 2276 - State Allocation for Youth Prevention. Karin Walton, Director and Michel Hillman, NDUS testified in support of this bill. (PASSED) Amendment included the development of a ND Prevention Advisory Council appointed by the Governor and reduced the appropriation from \$440,000 to \$100,000, for allocation by Prevention Advisory Council. Additionally, prior to the bill passing Lee Erickson, State SADD Director initiated a "Penny for Prevention" to add a penny per beer tax to generate funding for prevention in the state to increase the \$100,000 allocation. The NDHECAP was asked to assist with collection of signatures, however, we are not able to collect signatures as state employees and Karin Walton, and Director suggested that Lee Erickson use the SADD CSI students to mobilize at the campus level. Lee Erickson did not obtain the signatures needed to increase the allocation of \$100,000.

There was a discussion that ND is one of few states with local control over alcohol licenses in the state. This will be a discussed further at the strategic planning retreat.

Search Subcommittee (Karin Walton, Director; Randy Fixen, LRSCS; Sandi Geddes, UND; and Nancy Gordon, BSC)

Karin Walton, Director chaired the Job Search Subcommittee. This subcommittee was formed to hire the NDHECSAP Outreach Coordinator. This subcommittee has been disbanded because the position of outreach coordinator has been filled.

I am Karin Walton, Director of the North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention. The consortium mission is to reduce substance abuse in North Dakota's college student population and reduce negative health and safety consequences related to substance abuse in that population. We pursue this mission by coordinating the prevention efforts of colleges and universities throughout the state and by promoting college and community environmental factors that support healthy and safe norms. The consortium advocates for stronger prevention policies, participates in campus-community partnerships, and assists member campuses in the development of evidence-based prevention programs.

The Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention has taken a position in support for Senate Bill No. 2276: To provide duties of the prevention advisory council and to provide an appropriation for youth prevention. We are pleased with this bill because it supports the agenda that we have been working to create. It supports the vision of the consortium, which is, seeking campus communities where student safety and success is not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances.

The following research provides evidence for the need of a continuing state appropriation for the purpose of reducing youth risk factors related to alcohol and drug abuse and associated consequences.

As indicted in Tables 1 and 2, The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (CDC, 2005) shows that North Dakota is #1 in youth heavy episodic drinking (ND 34%, National 25%), having had a drink in the past 30 days (ND 49%, National 43%), drinking and driving (ND 22%, National 10%), and riding with someone who has been drinking (ND 37.4%, National 28.5%).

The National Survey on Drug Use and Health (2004), identifies that in the past month among all persons ages 12 or older, ND had the highest rate of binge drinking, which is drinking five or more drinks in a row in one sitting (and equivalent to the definition of heavy episodic drinking). I have included all age group comparisons in Tables 1 and 2 as supportive documentation to the prevalence of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs use in ND citizens.

The national trend for prevalence of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs has remained relatively stable since 1991 with a slight decrease for all drugs between 1999 and 2003 and then remaining unchanged for the most part since 2003 (CDC, 2005).

Furthermore, there are several critical findings that appear consistently in research of youth substance abuse, particularly alcohol use rates:

- 1. Youth are using alcohol at younger ages. Nationally, over 25% of students reported having their first drink (other than a few sips) before age 13 years old (CDC, 2005). About 20% of ND youth have their first drink before they are 13 years old, long before they start college (CDC, 2005).
- 2. The number of high school students using alcohol is increasing or, at best remaining stable. In 2005, 28% of 12 to 20 year olds reported drinking alcohol in the past 30 days (SAMSHA, 2005). This figure has remained the same since 2002 (SAMSHA, 2005). For any use of alcohol in the past 30 days, 17% of 8th graders, 33% of 10th graders, and 47% of 12th graders reported drinking (Johnston, et al., 2005). According to the Youth Risk Behavior Survey 43% of 9th -12th graders report use of alcohol in the past 30 days and 74% report lifetime use of alcohol (CDC, 2005). Almost half (49%) of North Dakota youth, report using alcohol at least once in the past 30 days compared to 43% nationally (CDC, 2005).
- 3. By high school graduation, the number of youth who engage in heavy episodic drinking, that is consuming five or more drinks in a row at least once in the past 30 days, is increasing. The prevalence of heavy episodic drinking appears to gradually increase until the 12th grade. This type of drinking accounts for over 25% of high school student

drinking nationwide with about 20% of 9th grade students, 27% of 10th grade students, 32% of 11th grade students, and 37 % of 12th grade students reported heavy episodic drinking at least once in the past 30 days (CDC, 2004). The prevalence of heavy episodic drinking in ND is higher than the national average. This type of drinking accounts for about 34% of high school drinking in ND compared to 25% nationally (CDC, 2005).

Because ND universities recruit the majority of their students from within the state of ND the use rate is an important factor in understanding ND college student alcohol use. ND institutions of higher education inherit youth engaging in heavy episodic drinking and other dangerous substance abuse.

The passing of this bill will not only directly help to support the safety of our coming of age citizens, but also assist in the period of transition from high school to college. This is an important issue that needs to be addressed. Unfortunately, it will require resources above and beyond those available to carry out the core education functions of the colleges and universities. Because base funding of the NDUS is already inadequate, the highest priority of the SBHE is to achieve the base funding adjustments requested by the SBHE in HB 1003.

TESTIMONY TO SENATE POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS on SB-2269

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee,

For the record, I am Laura Oster-Aaland, Director of Orientation and Student Success at North Dakota State University and member of the North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention. I am testifying in the absence of Dr. Karin Walton, Director of the North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention.

The Chancellor, the North Dakota University System and the North Dakota Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention in Higher Education are taking a position in support for Senate Bill No. 2269: Excessive Drink Discounting.

Colleges and universities are working to identify effective strategies to address college drinking in an attempt to reduce alcohol-related problems, including death among this population. A parallel search for effective strategies to reduce alcohol-related problems is occurring in communities and states throughout the nation. Individual drinking behavior is influenced by a myriad of environmental factors, such as messages in the media, community norms and attitudes, public and institutional policies and practices, and economic factors (Wagenaar and Perry, 1994). Reductions in alcohol use and related problems may be achieved by changing such environmental factors (Toomey et al., 1993).

This bill is one such tactic that would be considered an effective environmental management strategy. The consortium operates at three levels in an attempt to change the aforementioned environmental factors: The campus level, which addresses campus issues; the community level, which addresses community issues; and the state level, which impacts public policy.

It is important to state that we are not a prohibition group. Rather, the consortium seeks campus communities where student safety and success is not jeopardized by the use of alcohol or other substances and advocates for stronger prevention policies, participates in campus-community partnerships, and the development of evidence-based prevention programs.

This includes the prevention of over-consumption of alcohol. Drink promotions, drink specials, such as happy hours, drinking contests, "all you can drink" specials, and the like, encourage over-consumption of alcohol by reducing prices – a compelling incentive to drinking large amounts of alcohol over a short period of time.

Research has documented that:

1. Alcohol consumption, intoxication and drinking/driving rates are sensitive to the price of alcoholic beverages (Chaloupka, et al., 2002).

- 2. Underage individuals and young adults are affected by the cost of alcohol and studies show that increasing the price of alcohol significantly reduces the number of drinks consumed by this population (Grossman, et al., 1998; Chaloupka, et al., 2002).
- 3. The research offers strong evidence for the negative health outcomes of happy hours and other drink specials practices, suggesting that policies restricting these practices could have a positive impact on public health.
 - a. In a happy hour research study (Babor, et al., 1978)
 - The experimental group was given a 50 percent price reduction for alcohol during a daily three-hour period in the afternoon.
 - The control group received full price drinks during the same daily three-hour period in the afternoon.
 - The results indicate that the casual and heavy drinkers in the happy hour group drank about twice as much as those in the non-happy hour group.
 - b. A College Alcohol Study by the Harvard School of Public Health studied the relationship between binge-drinking rates on college campuses and the availability of large volumes of alcohol, low sales prices, and frequent promotions and advertisements in the vicinity of campus. This included serving sizes, prices, and promotions (Kuo, et al., 2003).
 - They found that there is a significant correlation between lower drink prices and higher binge-drinking rates, which is defined as five or more drinks in a row in one sitting.
 - They also found that there was a reduction in self-reported drinking and driving rates when laws limited underage access to alcohol and high volume sales of alcohol (drink discounting) (Wechsler, et al., 2003).
 - Lastly they found that laws banning high volume sales contributed to lower rates of drinking and driving among college students, a group at risk for both binge drinking and alcohol-related traffic fatalities (Wechsler, et al., 2003; NHTSA, 2002; NHTSA, 2004).
 - c. Over half (27) of the States currently have laws that specifically prohibit happy hours, drink specials and other practices that encourage drinking to intoxication. Minnesota is working on similar legislation during the current legislative session.

Given North Dakota's national ranking for alcohol use, across all age groups, this issue reaches far beyond the college campus. The National Survey on Drug Use and Health (2004), identifies that in the past month among all persons ages 12 or older, ND had the highest rate of binge drinking, which again is drinking five or more drinks in a row in one sitting (and equivalent to the definition of heavy episodic drinking). I have included all age group comparisons in Tables 1 and 2 as supportive documentation to the prevalence of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs use in ND citizens.

There is a striking difference in the prevalence of alcohol compared to other drugs such as marijuana, methamphetamine, and all other illicit drug use combined. North Dakota citizens have a higher rate than the national rate for alcohol consumed in the past 30 days and heavy

episodic drinking (5 or more in a row in a sitting) across all age groups youth, young adults, college age, and adults. Clearly, this is not merely a youth problem in our state.

In an article dated November 30, 2006 in the Grand Forks Herald, North Dakota ranked 7th on the Fatal Fifteen list, an annual ranking of states in which 41% or more of all traffic fatalities are alcohol-related. We are listed at 47% and have made this list twice in a four year period. A quote from that article by Lt. Kelly Rogers of the ND Highway Patrol states "What we see on the highway with drunk drivers is they are not social drinkers....they are suffering from alcohol abuse." Drink discounting contributes to alcohol abuse as is documented in the studies I mentioned.

Aside from the previous data outlining North Dakota's ranking in alcohol use and abuse, I would like to demonstrate our concern in retailers promoting alcohol at a discounted price, drink specials that promote all you can drink for one price, and free drinks for a period of time. Please see Attachment A for examples of Ad that demonstrate these practices.

For the record I think we need to talk about the definition of a standard drink. A standard drink is any drink that contains about 14 grams of pure alcohol (about 0.6 fluid ounces or 1.2 tablespoons). Attachment B is a description of standard drink equivalents as well as the number of standard drinks in different container sizes for each beverage. Scientists define a standard

drink as one 12 ounce beer; 8-9 ounces of malt liquor; 5 ounces of table wine; or 1.5 ounces of 80-proof hard liquor.

As you can see there are several ads for Long Island Iced Teas at a reduced price (\$1.50 - \$2.00). Just for the record, I would like everyone here to be aware that there is no tea in a Long Island Iced Tea. A Long Island Iced Tea is typically 1 shot vodka (80 proof), 1 shot tequila (80 proof), 1 shot rum (80 proof), 1 shot gin (94 proof), 1 shot triple sec (60 proof) (a strong, sweet and colorless orange flavored liqueur), 1 1/2 shots sweet and sour mix and a splash Coca-Cola. That makes the alcohol content in one Long Island Iced Tea equivalent to 5 shots of alcohol (depending the proof of each of the shots it would be the equivalent to about 5 standard drinks).

A common phrase typically heard is, "I'm just gonna stop off and have a couple of drinks on my way home." Assuming that a "couple" is two – these two Long Island Iced Teas would contain 10 shots of alcohol, which is 10 standard drinks, which is not equal to 2 drinks rather equivalent to over a ½ pint of alcohol, all for the low price of \$3.00 to \$4.00, equal or less than the cost of a pack of cigarettes. Other ads demonstrate establishments that begin their discounting from 9:00 pm to close. And yet another ad references a dice game in which the winner gets a free drink. Based on the research, these practices have the potential to increase drinking quantity, and thus endanger individuals and the public.

The average 150 pound male can metabolize one standard drink per hour without becoming impaired. So serving two or more drinks at one time, or serving a high volume of drinks for a low price is speeding up the rate of impairment, risking individual and public safety.

The alcohol industry, specifically Anheuser Busch has a campaign titled "*Responsibility Matters*." In attachment C you will see two letters from the Vice President of Consumer Affairs at Anheuser Busch; one dated January 2005 and addressed to President Charles Kupchella at the University of North Dakota and one dated May 2006 and addressed to Dr. Robert Potts, former Chancellor of the North Dakota University System. I would like to draw your attention to the 4th paragraph "Our company's position on college drinking is clear: if students are 21 and older and choose to drink, we want them to do so responsibility; if they are under 21, we want them to respect the law and not drink."

I also have a copy of a pamphlet from Anheuser Busch, Inc. titled "Our Commitment: Community Programs to Promote Alcohol Awareness". In attachment D, I would like to draw your attention to the underlined portion of this brochure. "Today, our national campaign – Responsibility Matters – provides a clear, concise reminder that one of the best solutions to addressing alcohol abuse is to emphasize personal responsibility. That means implementing effective education and awareness programs that promote responsibility and responsible behaviors – parents talking with their children about underage drinking, adults being designated drivers, retailers checking I.D.s to prevent sales to minors, and more."

We believe that "and more" includes responsibility by the retailers. Quite frankly, we really would rather not be here today. We would really prefer the alcohol industry police themselves – however that is not the case as evidenced by the advertisements for drink specials you have just witnessed.

Responsibility does matter and this should be a joint effort between the consumer and the promoter. It creates an incredible contradiction of "use our products in moderation" or "drink responsibly." It also creates a mixed message to our youth, who coming of age believe this is

the manner in which you consume alcohol -- drink a large amount of alcohol, over a short period of time, at a reduced price. How do we expect our youth to say no when the environment around them says yes?

With all due respect, the alcohol industry is not our enemy it's our competition and the prevention field does not have the resources to compete with the revenue they generate. We simply want to be on an even playing field. Limiting excessive drink discounting by retailers is one step in which to even the playing field, not only between the industry and prevention, but also between retailers. Some retailers tell us that they would rather sell their drinks at full price, however, when their competitor down the street is discounting drinks or providing a discount to college students, and advertising those specials, retailers are pressured to use the same tactics.

I like to consider this bill similar to the legislation that was passed last session which placed a ban on the amount of pseudoephedrine that could be purchased at one time. Pseudoephedrine is the product in cold medicine that is used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine. This has been a successful environmental management tactic that has contributed to the reduction of Meth labs in North Dakota. Though we are not a prohibition group, and alcohol is legal, we must keep in mind that alcohol is also a drug. A drug that can be lethal when consumed rapidly, in large quantities.

The passing of this bill could also be a successful environmental management tactic that would contribute to decreasing heavy episodic drinking, drinking and driving fatalities, and the mixed messages in the community. It would also challenge the retailers to adhere to the statements of expected responsibility by the alcohol industry. Restricting these practices could have a positive impact on public health, because as we all know high risk drinking can be a life or death matter.

Campus Updates and Community Connections

North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention Campus Updates and Community Connections Review Period July 2006 through June 2007

The mission of the North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention is to reduce substance abuse in North Dakota's college student population and reduce negative health and safety consequences related to substance abuse in that population.

According to the Department of Education's Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention, this mission can only be realized if there is strong presidential leadership; a campus-wide coalition that includes a broad spectrum of faculty, staff, and students; partnerships with the community through a campus-community coalition; and the active participation of college officials in public policy debates, especially at the state level. Furthermore, the concept of an environmental management approach to alcohol and other drug prevention involves college officials, working in conjunction with the local community, to change the campus and community environment that contributes to alcohol and other drug problems. Such change can be brought about through an integrated combination of programs, policies, and public education campaigns. This coordinated effort will not only take the involvement of the campus but the entire community, working together to identify solutions to high-risk drinking. The NDHECSAP developed a "Proposal for Effective Prevention" with priorities to support environmental management strategies on ND campuses, which was drafted into a Joint Resolution. On November 17, 2005, the SBHE voted to support the Joint Resolution between the board and Chancellor's Cabinet to become more vocal, visible and visionary regarding alcohol and other drug prevention on NDUS campuses (see Appendix K for a copy of the signed Joint Resolution). The areas of priority, which support environmental management strategies, can be found in the campus updates and community connections in the following pages.

It seems reasonable that campuses use their campus task force as the vehicle to draft an action plan in support of the resolution, identify areas that need to be addressed on the campus, and then provide recommendations to campus administration. The NDHECSAP believes it is important to keep the Presidents and Board members engaged in the expectations from the Joint Resolution. There is support from within each of the aforementioned areas in addressing college drinking by utilizing an environmental management approach. As well, each NDUS campus has been working to network in their respective communities and partnerships have been formed within those community coalitions. Outlined below is a review of the activities that have occurred in each of the campus communities of NDUS Campuses, which support the NDHECSAP Mission, Vision and Strategic Plan.

Bismarck State College

Alcohol Free Options: Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, and public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs.

• During "Rock the Lawn" an outdoor music festival the Counseling & Career Services hosted a Drunken Driving Awareness game called "Win a Car". The game was facilitated by NDHECSAP ORC. Students were asked questions about blood alcohol level, drinking habits, and drunk driving. Students who correctly answered these questions received a matchbox car. Information on alcohol was also available in conjunction with a DUI display that utilized social norms theory. An estimated 70 cars were given away during this program.

Normative Environment: Create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health promoting norms.

- Collegiate Alcohol Awareness was celebrated October 22-27th. Displays in the Library and the Student Union, including Crosses with alcohol related mortality statistics placed around campus.
- BARF Card(Be a Responsible Friend Campaign) was done by making friendship pins with the BARF acronym and distributing a card highlighting 10 ways to BARF.
- Prize Wheel The students had an opportunity to spin the wheel win a prize after answering an alcohol awareness question (125 students participated).
- Alcohol information was distributed in the Residence Halls.
- Wellness activities included "Wear Red Day," a promotion geared towards increasing cardiac awareness.
- Blood Sugar, blood pressure, and cholesterol screenings were offered.
- A seminar on "Nutrition and Health" was presented in late February.
- Smoking cessation kits and information on tobacco were also available at Rock the Lawn.
- Healthy BSC Community provided two presentations one on 'Identity Theft'' presentations were provided by a representative from the Office of the Attorney General and one on and "Personal Responsibility" presented by an officer from the Bismarck Police Department.

Availability of Alcohol (and Other Drugs): Limit alcohol availability both on and off campus.

• BSC is an alcohol, drug, and tobacco free campus.

Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol: Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus.

• Marketing of alcohol and promotion of alcoholic events are not allowed on campus. The student newspaper does not advertise "drink specials" or other alcohol

promotions from local establishments and any posted advertisements for alcohol related events are removed from the campus.

Policy Development and Law Enforcement: Develop and enforce campus policies and local, state and federal laws.

- Changes were made to the Alcohol and Drug Policy. They were combined into one policy and penal codes were added.
- Recommendations were made to the Human Resource Officer to change the illegal drug policy to reflect state penal code and federal trafficking charges after the biennial review of our drug and alcohol policies. The health risks of alcohol and other drugs were also sent to the Director of Student Development for inclusion into our new catalog.
- The Green Ribbon campaign was promoted through student government. This increased student awareness of the legislative issues regarding education at the federal level.

Other Areas of Strategic Intervention

Campus Task Force:

- The Director of Human Resources has been involved in revising the alcohol and drug policy. She is a member of the campus task force.
- The campus counselor/drug & alcohol prevention coordinator attended the NDDOT alcohol forum and Senior Administrator Forum. Several senior members of the BSC campus attended the forum as well.
- Members of the task force were involved with the biennial review process. The review is completed and in the office of the President. Several task force members are on the Healthy BSC Community Committee as well and are planning wellness activities for the spring semester.

Campus and Community Coalition:

• AOD Counselor Sits on Safe Community Task Force.

Grant Funding:

• The \$1,500 foundation grant the Healthy BSC Community committee received will be utilized for the Susie Vanderlip Presentation in March. The allocated money was sent out in January.

Research:

- BSC received the NDCORE survey results from 2006.
- Information from the NDCORE survey is being turned into pie charts for easy comparison with 2004 statistics.

Dickinson State University

Alcohol Free Options: Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, and public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs.

- The Campus Activities Board (CAB) provides routine awareness programs aimed at students through coffee house programs, movies, comedy show and performing artists that include messages of responsible choices, decisions, and a general awareness of alcohol and other drug issues on campus. Weekly events.
- Night Hawks: Substance free weekend program every Friday evening
- Social programs are scheduled that included the theme of education around alcohol and other drugs.
- 6 foot solo cups for NCAAW with CORE data and social norms
- Created brick wall during alcohol awareness week which includes student comments written on the wall.
- Candlelight vigil to commemorate innocent victims
- Testimonials from students on "How alcohol has affected you as a student"
- ACES Day II—Workshop 6 major topics which affect the community. Project ACE program is a collaborative effort by safe communities, law enforcement, DSU, and they held six seminars.
- Completed Alcohol Awareness Month by doing a mock trial on campus, which was a collaborative effort with local law enforcement.
- Alcohol Through the Arts

Normative Environment: Create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health-promoting norms.

- National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week was held. Brett Sokolow provided training to student leaders (Resident Advisors and Orientation Leaders) and did a campus keynote
- Project A.C.E. is a collaborate effort, using community-based assets to change attitudes and behaviors, for helping young people make healthier choices. The goal of Project A.C.E. is to educate youth and the public on the six issues facing our region: suicide, violence, alcohol, gambling, sex, sexuality, Meth, and other drugs. This was Project A.C.E.'s second year.
- Clothesline project aimed at focusing on violence against women.
- Take Back the Night was done in conjunction with the Clothesline project
- Efforts to educate students were made through distribution of materials in the Freshmen Seminar classes and discussion with the parents at orientation sessions.

Availability of Alcohol (and Other Drugs): Limit alcohol availability both on and off campus.

• Four DSU students worked with law enforcement to conduct community compliance checks for alcohol control

Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol: Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus.

• Radio, Print, and Visual media ads were produced with DUI messages

Policy Development and Law Enforcement: Develop and enforce campus policies and local, state and federal laws.

- Held Mock Trial focusing on legal issues surrounding poor choices about alcohol.
- Law enforcement did DUI and MIC demonstration at the DSU campus for students, 75 students attended
- 12 DSU students attended a server training provided by law enforcement and Community Action Partnerships

Other Areas of Strategic Intervention

Campus Task Force:

- Creation of a programmatic resource library for alcohol-free community development.
- Restructured the campus programming model to include Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drugs and Wellness as required programs for all Resident Advisors

Campus and Community Coalition:

- Ongoing involvement in the Community Coalition meetings. Goal is to form a collaborative partnership with town and campus representatives to address common issues and concerns surrounding the health and safety of university students at DSU.
- Held Finals Breakfast and Midnight Breakfast—community and campus event designed to engage DSU students with key community leaders
- DSU in conjunction with Project A.C.E held six seminars. Project A.C.E program is a collaborative effort by safe communities, law enforcement and DSU. The website is www.projectacend.com and is managed by DSU and safe communities. This was the second event and was largely targeted at local area employers
- Senator Dorgan was in Dickinson to assist in promoting Meth Awareness.
- Participated in Town Hall Meeting.
- Collaborated in hosting the Project A.C.E. Conference. Presenters included Bobbi Olson who presented "Gateway Drug" as well as Sergeant Eldon Mehrer on alcohol usage.

Grant Funding:

- Received grant for a professional dance company to choreograph DSU's Alcohol Through the Arts
- Received over \$5,000 in grants each year through partnerships with Community Action Agency.

- The IRB proposal for the 2007 Freshman Initiative Grant was approved through the NDSU and UND IRB offices.
- The Back on TRAC committee is working hard at solidifying paperwork, budget and location for the program.

- The Safe Communities Coordinator and OSS are actively advertising to fill the Orientation Video Coordinator position. The video will target parents of incoming students, and highlight the importance of talking with their students about drinking. The screening of applications will begin February 2nd.
- A variety of people reviewed and provided feedback regarding the parent orientation video "Spin the Bottle: talking to your college student about alcohol." The final version of the video was completed and copies were made.
- Jane Vangsness and Karin Walton gathered information for the IRB proposal for the 2007 Freshman Initiative Grant.
- The Orientation Video Coordinator position was filled (Tricia O'Connor) and a production company (Video Arts, Fargo) was secured to create the video. A planning meeting was held with Vice President Mathew. Interviews for the video will be starting mid-March.
- A total of ten people were interviewed for the making of the Orientation Video on Monday, March 19th. One law enforcement agent, four students, four parents and Karin Walton were interviewed. The video is now being edited and a final draft will be available by mid-April.

Research:

- An evaluation of "Spin the Bottle: talking to your college student about alcohol" as incorporated in the existing Orientation Parent Evaluation.
- As part of the 2007 Freshman Initiative Grant, handbooks were mailed to incoming student's parents for their review.
- An evaluation of the Parent Orientation Video will be incorporated in the existing Orientation Parent Evaluation.
- The grant team is busy preparing for next year's study that will compare E-Chug and our "homegrown" personalized normative feedback intervention.
- Laura Oster-Aaland submitted a conference proposal regarding the findings from the first year of the NIAAA grant for the 2007 HEC Meeting in October.
- Jane Vangsness and Emily Johnson submitted a poster proposal regarding the use of choices with sanctioned students and student-athletes for the 2007 HEC Meeting in October.
- Results of the first year of the NIAAA grant are nearly ready for public viewing. A report is due to the NIAAA the first of February and will be shared with the consortium soon after. We are currently running a study to test personalized normative feedback as a way to reduce the drinking of students turning 21.
- Jane Vangsness, AOD Prevention Coordinator, presented a poster presentation at the NASPA Strategies Conference: Alcohol Abuse Prevention and Intervention, February 1 3, 2007 in Atlanta. The poster "CHOICES: An effective prevention strategy for Student Athletes and Greeks" highlighted that: 29% of participating Greek Life Students and 23% of Student Athletes plan on drinking less often than they had in the past and 43% of participating Greek Life students and 25% of Student Athletes plan on drinking fewer drinks than they had in the past.
- <u>NIAAA Study</u>: A presentation was given in February in Washington, DC to the NIAAA regarding the outcomes of the first year of the study with freshmen. Overall findings indicate that the personalized normative feedback intervention was effective in reducing

drinking (by small quantities) in freshmen students at 6 months, but little change was noted at 3 months. It was also effective in correcting perceptions of other student's drinking. A power point of the first year outcomes will be made available to the consortium. The second year study is currently in progress to study the impact of a personalized normative feedback intervention on students turning 21 years old. Next year's study will compare E-Chug and our "homegrown" personalized normative feedback intervention.

- The last of the study participants completed the 21st birthday survey March 20th.
- The grant team is busy preparing for next year's study that will compare E-Chug and our "homegrown" personalized normative feedback intervention.
- Completed the Core Drug and Alcohol Survey (569 Campus Social Norms Survey, 500+ND Core)

problems exist within the University System.

Be Visible: Take an active stand on alcohol and other drug issues, convey clear

expectations and standards, and serve as role models for administrators,

faculty and students.

Be Visionary: Make alcohol and other drug prevention a strategic planning priority;

Frame alcohol and other drug prevention discussions from perspectives that administrators, faculty, students and alumni care about – personal health and wellness, excellence in education and retention of students; and

Whereas, research further supports building strong coalitions that meet both campus and community needs and reduce high-risk behaviors, and

Whereas, research further supports that reaching out to campus, community and state groups to develop and implement comprehensive strategies for alcohol and other drug abuse prevention reduces high-risk behaviors, and

Whereas, research further supports that creating a campus environment that supports health and wellness reduces high-risk behaviors, and

Whereas, research further supports that offering and promoting alcohol-free social, recreational and extracurricular activities reduces high-risk drinking, and

Whereas, research further supports that restricting alcohol availability on campus, and restricting marketing and promotion of alcohol on campus reduces high-risk drinking, and

Whereas, research further supports that developing and enforcing stringent anti-alcohol and other drug campus policies reduces high-risk behaviors, Now

Therefore, let it be resolved that the State Board of Higher Education and the Chancellor's Cabinet proclaim support for anti-alcohol and other drug efforts, and

Therefore, let it be further resolved that the State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet will work to build support for new programs and policies designed to address alcohol and other drug abuse, and

Therefore, let it be further resolved that the State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet will convey clear expectations and standards and ensure that entering freshmen and parents are aware of these expectations; and

Therefore, let it be further resolved that the State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet will author anti-alcohol and other drug articles for campus and community publications; and

Therefore, let it be further resolved that the State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet will work to ensure that all elements of the college community avoid providing "mixed messages" that might encourage alcohol and other drug abuse.

In November 2005, The North Dakota State Board of Higher Education and Chancellor's Cabinet signed a Joint Resolution as a proposal for effective prevention and support for the following strategies to reduce high-risk behavior:

Be Vocal: Openly and publicly acknowledge that alcohol and other drug abuse problems exist within the University System.

Be Visible: Take an active stand on alcohol and other drug issues, convey clear expectations and standards, and serve as role models for administrators, faculty, and students.

Be Visionary: Make alcohol and other drug prevention a strategic planning priority; Frame alcohol and other drug prevention discussions from perspectives that administrators, faculty, students and alumni care about – personal health and wellness, excellence in education and retention of students.

The North Dakota Higher Education Consortium for Substance Abuse Prevention (NDHECSAP) believes it is important to keep the Presidents, State Board of Higher Education and North Dakota Student Association engaged in the expectations from the Joint Resolution. Through a grant from the Dakota Medical Foundation, the NDHECSAP will host the first annual Forum for Senior Administrators. We welcome the chancellor, vice chancellor, presidents, vice presidents, student association members, and other senior administrators to join in this collegial meeting with peers to consider leadership strategies for promoting safe and healthy learning and living environments.

"Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary" is the theme of the first annual Forum for Senior Administrators and will focus on what senior administrators can do to create an environment on campus that is effectively addressing alcohol and drug misuse. Topics include the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism's report on drinking at colleges, legal issues (risk perception and reduction, liability, and compliance with relevant federal mandates), senior administrators' perspectives on alcohol and other drug issues (being proactive vs. reactive, managing alcohol and other drug issues related publicity, and how key stakeholders influence responses), and an update from the NDHECSAP about ND college drinking.

The purpose of the Forum for Senior Administrators will be to advance the agenda of substance abuse prevention in North Dakota institutions of higher education by:

- 3. Supporting pilot programs, and
- 4. Advancing academic research.

The July 2006 operating budget report 30305 0041, (\$27,889.71) was distributed and reviewed, and the July salary and fringe budget report 31306 0041, (\$71,839.99) was distributed and reviewed. The Consortium budget now has a new department number. Corey Michalos, DSU (M) and Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU (S) to accept the budget reports (MC). Each campus also received a bound copy of the doctoral dissertation from Karin Walton, Director. The subcommittee has also been following the Intergovernmental Relations Committee- IRC which is meeting on this date. The IRC is meeting regarding whether the increase in revenue from alcohol tax increase can be utilized to fund prevention efforts. The IRC does not want to do this they believe that they can find money elsewhere in ND to fund prevention efforts. ND Alcohol Tax is the 2nd lowest tax nationally and has not been raised since 1967. Tobacco tax has been raised four times. Lee Erickson state director of SADD will be testifying in support of the Responsible Choices Committee today. Sandy Wilson and Char Olson will also be attending this meeting. It was also suggested by the Consortium to ask Ray Gerszewski, MaSU if he is interested in being on the subcommittee.
- **Grant Writing Subcommittee-** The Consortium has submitted a NDDOT Traffic Safety Grant which was funded. Sandy Wilson, DOT needs to talk to Karin Walton, Director about the budget request. The awards are \$25,000 and we submitted a request for over \$30,000. Included in the grant was funding to pay for incentives for students to fill out surveys. A suggestion was made that Consortium may pay for incentives if needed. Corey Michalos, DSU volunteer to sit on the Grant Writing Subcommittee.

NDCORE Survey administration has been approved. NDSU is submitting their own IRB proposal. Karin Walton, Director will send out all the information for administration of the NDCORE in classrooms. Core Institute indicated that copies of the NDCORE survey will be in Karin Walton's, Director office by August 15[,] 2006. The NDCORE needs to be done by September 30, 2006.

SPF SIG – The State SPF SIG grant for \$9 million is still pending.

State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup (SEOW) – Higher education has been asked to sit on the SEOW which will meet monthly. The purpose of the SEOW (SAMHSA funded) is to identify all ATOD data in the state.

Annual Report – in process and very close to being finished. Once the Annual Report is completed in will be placed on the website. It was suggested that the annual report executive summaries be provided to all Consortium members and be handed out during campus visits. Campus updates will be included as an appendix in the Annual Report.

Campus Visits- Karin Walton, Director asked Consortium members to review their schedules and determine a time for a campus visit. Karin Walton, Director and Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC will visit each campus this fall and the visits will be similar to past campus visits, however this year there will be meetings with student government and other student leaders on each campus.

Biennial Reviews – Hugh Long, WSC and Paula Berg, MiSUB indicated that the Department of Education requested copies of their Biennial Review as well as supporting documentation and distribution methods. Karin Walton, Director indicated that often times when the Biennial Review is requested that they request the previous year as well. Celeste Barfield, MiSU indicated that at MiSU that both financial aid and their legal counsel has copies of the report. It was stressed that it is important that senior administration staff are aware of possible requests being made. The Consortium campuses have all completed the 2004-2006 Biennial Reviews. The next Biennial Review is due October, 2006 for 2006-2008. Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU suggested that it may be valuable for each Consortium representative to go back and talk with their campus president and VP that there could be requests coming to their office for the Biennial Review and to make sure that information is passed onto Substance Abuse prevention staff.

Campus Community Connections/Campus Networking

Due to the concern that there is little time for campus networking, the Consortium will not use meeting time to formally go through a list of each campus update. Rather time will be utilized for campuses to talk more spontaneously during a campus networking following the consortium meeting. Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC will send out a reminder for each campus to submit an update following our meeting each month. She will compile the document separate from the minutes and e-mail them out to each campus. During networking time, campuses will have the opportunity to talk more specifically about their programs and ask or answer questions about the programming or other issues. Campuses are encouraged to contact Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC with questions about or help researching programs, etc. Campuses are also encouraged to contact each other directly if they see something on the campus update that interests them.

Consortium Budget: A copy of the Consortium August 2006 budget salary and fringe budget 31306-5110, (\$66,410.54) was distributed and reviewed. There was an unencumbered balance of \$772.39 from FY06 salary and fringe that was added to current salary and fringe budget, however, was requested to be moved to operating travel budget line. The budget report for August 2006 operating budget 30305-5110, (\$25,424.91) was distributed and reviewed. There was a request to move funding from Supplies line item to other categories in the operating budget. This will allow easier review of expenditures to date and to plan for unencumbered funds at the end of the FY. The budgets have been broken down into salary/fringe and operating budgets, which will make the budget easier to review. Mike Johnson, NDSCS (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) to accept the budget reports (MC).

Consortium Meetings: The Consortium discussed the conflict with the Consortium meetings being held at the same time as Student Affairs Council meeting. The Consortium schedule was sent to Gina from NDUS for future scheduling.

Consortium talked about contracting with Alan Berkowitz on ND specific prevention interventions and would use the November face to face meeting to meet in Fargo on November 15' 2006 instead of face to face in Bismarck on November 9, 2006 if that works with Dr. Berkowitzs' schedule. Mike Johnson, NDSCS (M) and Jane Vangsness, NDSU (S) to pay \$250 an hour up to 4 hours for consultation with Dr. Alan Berkowitz. (MC). Jane Vangsness, NDSU agreed to arrange a room for the meeting with Dr. Berkowitz at NDSU.

A joint meeting was held with Regional and Tribal Coordinators and Consortium members at the 2006 Alcohol and Substance Abuse Summit. Karin Walton, Director, stated that an invitation has been extended to the RTC to attend the Consortium meetings and participate in the networking agenda. Karin Walton, Director, encouraged RTC attend the meeting at a campus near their location in order to 'buddy up' on the phone lines.

Subcommittees:

Grant Writing (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Grant Writing Subcommittee meeting will coordinate an application to DMF after the Conference Subcommittee has met and discussed topic areas and speakers for the Senior Administrative Forum. Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, will be leading the grant writing efforts. She is currently working on a special needs grant to DMF for a request of \$10,000 dollars to hold a Seniors Administers Forum in conjunction with the ND DOT Alcohol Forum in February.

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative: The Department of Transportation has funded the Consortium grant application for a Freshmen Initiative to mail substance abuse information to parents of entering freshmen. Sandy Wilson, DOT asked if it would be possible to send the Parent LEAD information

along with the booklet, however may skew our data. DOT is interested in being able to distribute the Parent LEAD information at student orientation in the fall. We will discuss this further in future meetings.

NDCORE Survey: Campuses are scheduling classrooms for administration of the NDCORE. Karin Walton, Director has sent out information to all campuses and when the surveys are completed they will be returned to Karin Walton, Director and then mailed to Core Institute.

<u>Conference Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Hal Haynes, DSU; Jane Vangsness, NDSU; and Sandi Geddes, UND)

Senior Administrative Forum: The subcommittee will meet to discuss topics, goals and speakers for the Senior Administrative Forum February 21, 2006. Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, has sent out a list of possible speakers to all committee members. Karin Walton, Director, updated members on possible speakers from the *National Prevention Network Prevention Research Conference* in Lexington, KY she attended in August 2006. These speakers included Ralph Hingston from the NIAAA; Researcher Dr. Dennis Embry and Ray Daugherty from Prevention Research Institute. Mike Johnson, NDSCS, suggested that it may be beneficial to review the Core Survey at the Senior Administrative Forum if we have them back at this time.

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Karin Walton, Director, will schedule a meeting time for the Legislative Subcommittee. The subcommittee is responsible for developing a plan and strategy for the upcoming legislative session. Consortium members need to determine one or two items to focus.

Responsible Choices Committee: The Intergovernmental Relations Council has been meeting between legislative sessions and Karin Walton, Director, updated the Consortium on progress on the Responsible Choices Committee. There has been discussion by the Intergovernmental Relations Council about the need to use state funds for this initiative.

<u>Consortium Co-chair:</u> Karin Walton, Director, announced that Celeste Barfield, MiSU, took a new position outside the NDUS. Karin Walton, Director, asked for volunteers to fill the co-chair occupancy. Corey Michalos was nominated to be co-chair. Corey Michalos, DSU, accepted the nomination. Beth Larson Steckler, ORC (M) Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S), (MC).

<u>Annual report:</u> The Annual Report is finished and has been posted on the Consortium website at www.ndhec.und.edu. All Consortium members as well as presidents from each campus will receive the Executive Summary to share with their campuses. Karin Walton, Director, indicated that she will present the findings from the Annual Report to the State Board of Higher Education on September 21, 2006 at Lake Region State College, Devils Lake.

<u>Campus Visits:</u> Karin Walton, Director, is scheduling annual campus visits. During this time Karin Walton, Director, along with Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, would like to meet with Vice Presidents, Presidents, Interim Presidents, student leaders and student government. The campus visit agenda will include: Biennial Review, Joint Resolution, Environmental Management Strategies, and NDCORE results if available.

<u>Clearinghouse of Best Practices</u> – Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, is responsible for developing a clearing house for best practices. She will pull this together as she receives more information from the campuses of what programs are offered and effectiveness.

<u>Biennial Review</u>: The Biennial Report is due December 31, 2006. All members will be sent a copy of 'Complying with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations [34 CFR Part 86] A Guide for University and College Administrators' by Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC.

Karin Walton, Director has been in contact with Deb Walker, our Network Regional Coordinator about training and she has suggested a Biennial Review workshop. Consortium members would drive in for the day for a presentation on completing the Biennial Review. Consortium members agreed that this would be a topic of interest. Suggestion was made to hold both Allan Berkowitz and Biennial Review Workshop at the same time to assist with travel time and time out of the office.

NDCORE Survey: Campuses are in process of administration of the NDCORE Surveys. The additional question grid was not printed and Core Institute mailed stickers and labels to campuses to attach to the back of the NDCORE Survey, if using local additional questions.

<u>SEOW – State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup update:</u> Karin Walton, Director sits on the SEOW. They are looking at state data. This is also part of the requirement of the SPF SIG grant, however the SIG grant was not funded. Karin Walton, Director, stated that she has not seen the Score sheet. She will update Consortium members once she hears feedback from SAMHSA.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association /Student Involvement: Consortium members discussed how to ensure active involvement of NDUS students in the Consortium. Karin Walton, Director, asked Consortium members about ideas in regards to how to involve students in the Consortium. Mike Johnson; NDSCS, indicated that the current President of NDSA is Bobby Haskins from UND and that the Vice President is Dan Hanson from NDSCS. Nancy Gordon, BSC, expressed concern that it would be very difficult to have representation from all the campuses at each Consortium meeting. She would be in favor of having the President attend every meeting versus various members of NDSA. Karin Walton, Director, pointed out that the more students invited the better chance of student attendance at each meeting. Mike Johnson; NDSCS, suggested that NDSA decide who should be representative at the Consortium. Karin Walton, Director, will send a letter to of initiation to Bobby Haskin, NDSA with a request for student membership on the Consortium, and a follow-up call. Jane Vangsness, NDSU (M) Nancy Gordon, BSU (S) to send an invitation to NDSA for direction on student membership on the Consortium MC).

Karin Walton, Director, stated that she would also include in the letter a request to send NDSA a one-page overview of each Consortium meeting, similar to what is currently being sent to SAC.

Karin Walton, Director, inquired about other student membership on the Consortium. Mike Johnson, NDSCS, stated that if we want official representation that the Consortium needed to work with the NDSA and take one step at a time.

Outreach Coordinator Report/Campus Networking: Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, inquired if a specific and ongoing date could be established for campus updates to be completed and submitted to the ORC. Karin Walton, Director, indicated that if there was no activity on the campus for that month to just state 'no activity' and send to Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC. It was decided that campuses updates will be sent to Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC on the last day of each month, with a reminder email by ORC. This will be a week prior to the Consortium meetings.

- Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, has received tapes from Shorty Tapes on drinking the night before a job and heavy operating equipment. If other campuses are interested please let Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, know and she will get you information.
- NDSCS has been handing out B.A.R.F (Be A Responsible Friend) cards on campus. The cards had tips on how to identify and get help in case of alcohol poisoning. Waiting for more information from Claremont College were B.A.R.F. campaign originated and than would send out the information to campuses that were interested.

- Still waiting for Complying With The Drug Free Schools and Campuses Regulations [34 CFR Part 86] A Guide for University and College Administrators. She indicated that once she receives the reports she will send them to all campuses.
- Management of the NDHEC website will start once training is completed. ORC is to enroll in two courses from BSC for basic knowledge on operating and updating the websites.

Campuses continued to network and discuss options for speakers, events on campuses, sharing of materials and other campus specific information. Each campus will submit a campus update to Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC.

Consortium Budget: Reviewed September 2006 Salary and Fringe Budget 31306 0041 (60,198.36) and September 2006 Operating Budget 30305 0041 (\$21,320.06). Corey Michalos, DSU (M) Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to approve budget (MC).

Subcommittees:

Grant Writing (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated that the grant application for the Senior Administrative Forum is almost completed. The Grant Subcommittee will meet on Monday 16, 2006 to review it prior to submission. Karin Walton, NDHEC, asked for input on submitting letters of support for the Dakota Medical Foundation grant proposal. She inquired if one letter of support from NDUS or individual letters from each campus from SAC representative would be better. Jane Vangsness, NDSU, indicated that she felt that individual letters from each SAC representative and Michel Hillman, NDUS would demonstrate buy-in from all campuses. Senior Administrative Form - Karin Walton, NDHEC, indicated the DOT Alcohol Forum will be held at Comfort Inn February 21 and 22, 2007. The Senior Administrator Forum held in conjunction with Alcohol Forum will take place from 10am to 2pm at the Comfort Inn on February 21, 2007. The Forum will focus on National College Drinking, NDCORE Survey results, networking lunch with Consortium members, and conclude with action steps which senior administrators can implement at the campus level.

Each campus submits a campus update to Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC.

November 14, 2006 the Consortium and Prevention Coordinators meet for a morning Bystander training with Alan Berkowitz and afternoon Network Training on the Biennial Review with Deb Walker. This replaced the originally scheduled face to face meeting at BSC.

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Karin Walton, Director, updated Consortium members about Legislative Subcommittee efforts. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU will be meeting with Representative Tony Grindberg and Representative Morrie Lanning (MN) to draft proposed legislation targeting bans on drink specials, free drinks, targeting specific populations – women, etc. Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU have contacted various states with drink special bans to identify effectiveness of legislation, as well as challenges in introducing this type of legislation. The challenges basically are in the enforcement of the legislation after the bill was past.

Nancy Gordon, BSC, brought up a concern that proposing legislation may be too large a step for the Consortium. She suggested that the Consortium efforts be focused at a campus level first. She brought up the concern that Consortium should first focus on eliminating such ads from campus newspapers prior to the proposal of a bill. A lengthy discussion occurred about alcohol ads in campus newspapers and that the campus newspapers are under the direction of the Board of Student Publications and difficult to control due to freedom of speech. It was suggested that there be a discussion about this when all campuses are present (NDSU and UND were not in attendance at the time of the discussion). Banning or restricting alcohol advertising on and off campus is an identified tactic in our Environmental Management Model under the area of "Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol." Karin Walton, Director recommended to table the discussion until the next meeting and identify where the Consortium stands on this issue and/or formulate a specific action statement from the Consortium, if appropriate.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU indicated that NDSA has not had the opportunity to formally discuss his role on the Consortium with the North Dakota Student Association. He indicated that there is a concern about generalized safety and increasing awareness of alcohol and other drug abuse. The abuse of alcohol and other substances is where the safety of students at large is the biggest concern. The next NDSA meeting is January and by the Consortium meeting in February meeting he would have information about his role on the Consortium. Consortium members requested if Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU could update the NDSA on Consortium issues and vice versa. He indicated he will discuss this with Bobby Haskins, NDSA President. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU stated he was looking forward to this opportunity.

<u>Campus Visits:</u> All campus visits except for Bismarck State College have been completed. BSC will occur in March following the hire of their new president.

<u>Biennial Review</u>: Biennial Reviews are due the end of the year. If any school needs assistance they can contact Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC.

<u>Add Violence to Mission Statement:</u> Karin Walton, Director asked whether we need to look at addressing violence prevention and adding violence to our mission statement. This will be tabled until the next meeting.

<u>Use of Alcohol Industry support materials:</u> Karin Walton, Director asked about whether we need to discuss the use of alcohol industry educational materials. This will be tabled until the next meeting.

NDCORE Survey: All surveys are completed. Karin Walton, Director, is still waiting for the results. The plan is to present the results at the Senior Administrator Forum in February.

<u>Clearinghouse of Best Practices</u>: This will be worked on when Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC assumes management of the Consortium website.

Outreach Coordinator Report/Campus Networking: Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, indicated that she has completed Dream weaver training and will be taking over the management of the website by January 1, 2007. She indicated that it was a suggestion for the ORC to put together a pamphlet outlining what the ORC could offer campuses. The Consortium agreed that a pamphlet would helpful to the campuses and Hal Haynes; DSU (M) and Ray Gerszewski; MaSU (S) to allocate funding to produce an information pamphlet highlighting what can be offered as well as a fact sheet about the ORC (MC). Members indicated that the updates which were sent out by the ORC were helpful to campuses.

Consortium Budget: Reviewed the December 2006 Salary and Fringe (\$40,739.43); Operating (\$16,261.76); and 2nd Quarter ORC (\$55,493.86) budgets. Randy Fixen, LRSC (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) to accept the budget reports (MC). There is also a new account being set up for indirect cost rebates from the NDCORE Survey grant (\$70) and the period of time the ORC position was vacant (\$854).

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Karin Walton, Director, announced that Dakota Medical Foundation has funded the grant proposal for the Senior Administrator Forum (\$7,600.61).

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative Contract- The Department of Transportation has funded the Consortium grant application for a Freshmen Initiative (\$30,712.50). Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director had a conference call with Dr. Rob Turissi and his research assistant regarding the Freshman Initiative. Currently Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director are reviewing the parent handbook and survey materials. Jane Vangsness, NDSU, will work on the best way to disseminate the information. She will need assistance from all campuses this summer.

Bremer Foundation: Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, asked for support in applying for a Bremer Grant to focus on funding that could be used to bring in speakers or assist campuses with their ongoing prevention efforts (Alcohol Awareness Weeks, etc.). Basic information from each campus will be needed about personnel and budget for prevention efforts.

<u>Conference Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Hal Haynes, DSU; Jane Vangsness, NDSU; and Sandi Geddes, UND)

Senior Administrative Form - We are still waiting confirmation from Dr. Robert Carothers, President of University of Rhode Island Dr. Margaret Barr, Northwestern University about their availability to speak at the Senior Administrators Forum. Peter Lake is unavailable that date and has recommended Beverly Ledbetter from Brown University. Karin Walton, Director will contact her. Chancellor Dunn was asked to make closing remarks but is unable to attend due to the chancellor search. Vice Chancellor Hillman has agreed to make closing remarks.

- Postcards of "Save the Date" and "Register Now" have been mailed. NDUS will send out a letter
 of encouragement to board members, presidents, vice presidents and senior administrators from
 Chancellor Dunn. Karin Walton, Director, will send a personal e-mail reminder to board members,
 presidents, vice presidents and senior administrators. NDHECSAP members are asked to
 encourage senior administration on their campuses to attend the forum.

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Senator Tony Grindberg is working to draft a bill that would ban excessive drink discounting. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, indicated that a draft of the bill focusing on drink specials has started. This bill will target excessive drinking and rapid consumption of alcohol in a short amount of time. The current draft includes limits between 11pm and 12noon in the following areas: two or more drinks unlimited drinks, fixed time, fixed price, discourage alcohol being given away as a prize. Similar legislation is being coordinated in Minnesota under sponsorship of Representative Morrie Lanning.

- Karin Walton, Director, requested any advertising which encourages excessive drinking or targets specific populations. These ads can be from student newspapers, radio ads or flyers and should be mailed to Karin Walton, Director.
- Karin Walton, Director, will check to see if students can be reimbursed for gas, lodging and meals if testifying. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU (M) and Mike Johnson, NDSCS (S)that the NDHECSAP reimburse students if legal counsel approves, according to NDUS policy (MC). Karin will contact Pat Seaworth, NDUS Legal Counsel about student reimbursement.
- Karin Walton, Director, indicated that Lee Erickson, Director of ND SADD, had contacted her regarding legislation he had been working on for a state allocation for prevention. Lee Erickson, ND SADD stated that the NDHECSAP will not be included in the bill. However, we will testify in support of the request for \$440,000 state allocation for youth prevention in ND.

<u>Advertising Subcommittee (Nancy Gordon, BSU; Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Paula Berg, MiSUB, and Sandi Luck, UND)</u>

• Nancy Gordon, BSC has agreed to chair a new subcommittee which was established to look at campus alcohol advertising in the state (policies, newspapers, publishing boards, etc). This will also be included for discussion at the strategic planning retreat May 17-18, 2007.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU indicated that NDSA has not had the opportunity to formally discuss the student role on the NDHECSAP, but they will be meeting later this month. He indicated that at the next NDHECSAP meeting he will be better able to outline the relationship between NDSA and the NDHECSAP. Karin Walton, Director, asked if it was possible to have an update of the NDHECSAP efforts at NDSA meetings to assist both NDSA and NDHECSAP in collaborations. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU stated that he is working on T-shirts or other trinkets that alcohol abuse is not okay.

<u>NDHECSAP Brochures:</u> NDHECSAP Brochure has been completed. Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, is working on Outreach Coordinator Brochure.

<u>Biennial Review</u>: All campuses have completed or are on track for completion of the Biennial Review. <u>Add Violence to Mission Statement:</u> Members indicated that violence is being addressed when we address alcohol abuse. Randy Fixen, LRSC, indicated that adding violence to the mission would tap already strained resources.

Use of Alcohol Industry support materials: This discussion was tabled.

<u>NDCORE Survey:</u> Karin Walton, Director, indicated that she can send out the raw data from Core Institute to each campus.

Outreach Coordinator Report/Campus Networking:

- Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, asked members if it would be possible to use each campus individual logos on the 'About Us' page of the NDHECSAP website.
- Hal Haynes, DSU, shared 'Connections', program with the group. This program is connecting faculty with students. Faculty members, for example, may come into the halls and talk about a specific hobby. This program also connects the students to the Dickinson community.
- Scott Berry, MaSU, shared information on their drug testing policy/program. While many schools implement drug testing due to accreditation, MaSU implemented this policy as a campus decision.

The new account for indirect cost rebates from the NDCORE Survey grant (\$70) and the period of time the ORC position was vacant (\$854) is being set up 20320 0041 (\$924.00).

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

- NDDOT Freshmen Initiative: Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director edited the Parent Handbook and suggested changes to Dr. Rob Turissi and his research assistant regarding the Freshman Initiative. Survey materials are very long (102 questions) and will be reviewed with suggestions to cut questions. Jane Vangsness, NDSU will be taking the lead on this project and will need assistance with obtaining incoming student mailing lists. Sandi Luck, UND stated that UND already sends out parent booklets and questions if this will be redundant. UND's information is campus specific whereas the Parent Handbook is more general information. Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director will put together a fact sheet about the grant and discuss as a single agenda item at the next meeting.
- **Bremer Foundation Grant-**Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, will be writing a letter of intent to Bremer Foundation to ask for funding to focus on prevention efforts (Alcohol Awareness Weeks, Choices, etc.) over a three year period. The Grant Writing subcommittee will help in the development of a project goal statement and writing of the grant proposal.

Legislative Session:

• SB 2204 – Medical Amnesty bill is currently in House.

- SB 2269 Excessive Drink Discounting Bill was unanimously defeated by Senate Political Subdivisions Committee. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU testified for Karin Walton, Director in support of this bill.
- SB 2276 State Allocation for Youth Prevention pasted the Senate Human Services Committee. Will be heard in the House Human Services Committee. Karin Walton, Director testified in support of this bill.
- There was a discussion about student involvement on this subcommittee. Nikito informed NDHECSAP that NDSA has full time and part time lobbyists. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU is interested in sitting on this subcommittee.
- There was a discussion that ND is one of few states with local control over alcohol licenses in the state. This will be a discussion at the strategic planning retreat.

<u>Advertising Subcommittee</u> (Nancy Gordon, BSU; Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Paula Berg, MiSUB, and Sandi Luck, UND)

- Nancy Gordon, BSC stated the subcommittee met and developed the following goals:
 - 1. To get each student newspaper to arrive at a policy that will carry over from year to year and not be contingent on the editor.
 - 2. To work with the board of student publication.
 - 3. To appeal to the ethics of the journalism profession (Code of Ethics for journalists).
 - 4. To find precedents, examples, and policies from other schools in the United States.
 - 5. The find out what student government policies are across the state regarding funding to the student newspaper.
 - 6. To empower students to address this issue on campus.
 - 7. To gain support from student government to form policy or standards regarding this issue.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA said that NDSA met and students are concerned with safety and alcohol abuse. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, handed out a copy of a design for a T-shirt he brought to the NDSA for approval and collaboration with the NDHECSAP. He is asking for approval and assistance with printing costs from NDHECSAP. The design has a sad clown face with words "It is not funny when" (on front of shirt) "A friend dies from alcohol or substance abuse" (on the back of the shirt). There was a discussion about the costs of shirts for a single color or multiple colors. Karen Seeger, NDSCS (M) and Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to partner with NDSA for a substance abuse t-shirt project (MC). There was discussion about the best date to hand out the t-shirts. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU will get estimates of the cost for one color and multiple colors and bring to the next meeting. Funding costs to be determined based on how many shirts each campus would want to distribute.

Consortium Budget: Reviewed the February 2007 Salary and Fringe (\$28,346.64) and Operating (\$12345.35) budgets. Sandi Luck, UND (M) and Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to accept the budget reports (MC). There is a new account being set up for indirect cost rebates from the NDCORE Survey grant (\$70) and the period of time the ORC position was vacant (\$854) 20320 0041 (\$924.00).

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nickito Johnson, NDSA said that NDSA will contribute up to \$3,000 to purchase 2,200 T-shirts (200 per campus). NDHECSAP had committed up to \$4,000 to go toward the printing of the T-shirts. NDSA would like to have the commitment from NDHECSAP in writing with dollar amount and date to launch. Nancy Mickelson, MiSU said that a printer in Minot would print the shirts, 1 color, for \$3.00/shirt. The design has a sad clown face with words "It is not funny" (on front of shirt) "when a friend dies from alcohol or substance abuse" (on the back of the shirt). There is a tombstone on one side of the clown's face and a cross on the other side of the clown's face. There was a concern raised about the design including a cross. Nickito stated that he took that concern back to NDSA and that NDSA said that to go back and change the design will prolong the process, NDSA's intention is not to offend anyone, students can choose to wear the T-shirt or not to wear it, and want to go with the current plan. Nancy Mickelson, MiSU (M) to fund the current the T-shirt design up to \$4,000 Nancy Gordon (S). The motion went to roll call vote: MiSU – yes, MiSUB – no, NDSCS – no, NDSU – no, UND – absent, WSC – no, DSU – no, BSC – yes, VCSU – no, MaSU – no, LRCS – absent.

Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU (M) to support funding up to \$4,000 if the design of the T-shirt was changed to a non-religious icon, Karen Seeger, NDSCS (S). Discussion included concern about what design would be used. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU amended her motion to support funding up to \$4,000 of the current design with the cross removed, Karen Seeger (S) Paula Berg, MiSUB calls for question: BSC – yes, DSU – yes, LRSC – yes, MaSU – yes, MiSU – yes, MiSUB – yes, NDSU – yes, UND – absent, WSC – yes, VCSU – absent, NDSCS – yes. (MC).

Nickito Johnson, NDSA said that NDSA meets on March 23 and April 13. He will bring back the current decision about the cross being removed from the shirt. It was decided that if the shirts could be ready by April 13th they could be handed out to NDSA campus representatives and brought back to each campus. If smaller campuses didn't want 200 shirts the larger campuses could receive more than 200 shirts if they wanted.

• Karin Walton, Director will put together a memorandum to give to Nickito Johnson, NDSA with NDHECSAP commitment of up to \$4,000 for printing shirts.

<u>Consortium Budget:</u> Reviewed the March 2007 Salary and Fringe (\$22,152.92), Operating (\$9,809.92), Indirect Cost Rebate ((\$924.00), and 3rd Quarter Outreach Coordinator (\$37,701.80) budgets. Jane Vangsness, NDSU (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) to accept the budget reports (MC).

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Karin Walton, Director forwarded a memorandum to Nickito Johnson, NDSA with NDHECSAP commitment of up to \$4,000 for printing t-shirts. However, because Nickito Johnson, NDSA was not in attendance a decision was made to table the t-shirt discussion because this is such an important message and NDSA and NDHECSAP are both investing a great deal of money in the project. We don't want to push through a design we are not happy about (just to get something printed). As well not accomplish what we intended - a prevention message to reach across North Dakota from NDSA and the NDHECSAP. By pushing this timeline we would possibly not reach students because this week is a holiday week, finals are very near, and students are leaving campus. It was suggested to continued to work on our agreement to print the shirts, identify a plan to have the shirts printed in the fall (giving the printer more than 1.5 weeks to order, print and deliver the shirts), coordinate with the events of National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week on each campus, and hand out the shirts during National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week in October. That would give us time to take the idea back to NDSA and to the Consortium.

There was a discussion about a suggestion to add more students to NDHECSAP, however we would like input from Nickito Johnson, NDSA about this suggestion.

It was recommended to table both the t-shirt and membership conversation until the May 10th meeting or until May 17th Strategic Plan Retreat, if Nickito is not able to be at the May 10th meeting.

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

• NDDOT Freshmen Initiative: Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director talked about changes in the project. The project will now include a random sample of parents to receive the handbook (condition group) rather than all parents of entering freshmen being mailed the handbook. This will allow for comparison of the students' parents receiving the handbook and those students' parents not receiving the handbook.

Subcommittee members will establish a time among themselves to meet. Karin Walton, Director asked for suggestions for speakers. Suggestions included President of Colorado Campus as well as the President of Lincoln, Nebraska. Another suggestion was Shelly Campo whose has done research on campus riots. Karin will pull together the conference subcommittee to discuss speakers and grant.
- Legislative Subcommittee- The upcoming legislative session was discussed and the Consortium suggested looking at keg registration. The subcommittee has also been following the Intergovernmental Relations Committee- IRC which is meeting on this date. The IRC is meeting regarding whether the increase in revenue from alcohol tax increase can be utilized to fund prevention efforts. The IRC does not want to do this they believe that they can find money elsewhere in ND to fund prevention efforts. ND Alcohol Tax is the 2nd lowest tax nationally and has not been raised since 1967. Tobacco tax has been raised four times. Lee Erickson state director of SADD will be testifying in support of the Responsible Choices Committee today. Sandy Wilson and Char Olson will also be attending this meeting. It was also suggested by the Consortium to ask Ray Gerszewski, MaSU if he is interested in being on the subcommittee.
- **Grant Writing Subcommittee-** The Consortium has submitted a NDDOT Traffic Safety Grant which was funded. Sandy Wilson, DOT needs to talk to Karin Walton, Director about the budget request. The awards are \$25,000 and we submitted a request for over \$30,000. Included in the grant was funding to

pay for incentives for students to fill out surveys. A suggestion was made that Consortium may pay for incentives if needed. Corey Michalos, DSU volunteer to sit on the Grant Writing Subcommittee.

NDCORE Survey administration has been approved. NDSU is submitting an IRB proposal for their campus. Karin Walton, Director will send out all the information for administration of the NDCORE in classrooms. Core Institute indicated that copies of the NDCORE survey will be in Karin Walton's, Director office by August 15, 2006. The NDCORE needs to be done by September 30, 2006.

SPF SIG – The State SPF SIG grant for \$9 million is still pending.

State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup (SEOW) – Higher education has been asked to sit on the SEOW which will meet monthly. The purpose of the SEOW (SAMHSA funded) is to identify all ATOD data in the state.

8. Other

Annual Report – in process and very close to being finished. Once the Annual Report is completed in will be placed on the website. It was suggested that the annual report executive summaries be provided to all Consortium members and be handed out during campus visits. Campus updates will be included as an appendix in the Annual Report.

Campus Visits- Karin Walton, Director asked Consortium members to review their schedules and determine a time for a campus visit. Karin Walton, Director and Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC will visit each campus this fall and the visits will be similar to past campus visits, however this year there will be meetings with student government and other student leaders on each campus.

NASPA – NASPA will be held in Orlando in March 2007. Karin Walton, Director inquired if Consortium members would be attending and interested in a presentation. Corey Michalos, DSU indicated that Dr. George McClellan, VP DSU will be attending and submitted a proposal to present on Project ACE. Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU indicated that she also submitted a proposal to present. Proposals are due September 2^o 2006.

Clearing House of Best Practices – Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC will be working on the development of a best practices section on the website.

TIPS Training - Many campuses had. Sue Thompson, outgoing ORC had been trained in TIPS and had scheduled TIPS training to take place on several campuses. Currently, we don't have a TIPS trainer. Consortium discussed other alternatives for training RAs. An option that was discussed was CHOICES programming. The manual is \$75.00. Karin Walton, Director agreed to provide training to campuses scheduled and will contact the schools to arrange alternative training. Nancy Gordon, BSC indicated that she had already cancelled TIPS training at BSC. DSU is interested in having someone come in on the 18th to talk with their RAs. Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC will follow up with Corey Michalos, DSU regarding training needs. Karin Walton, Director will contact Paula Berg, MiSUB regarding their scheduled TIPS training.

Biennial Reports – Hugh Long, WSC and Paula Berg, MiSUB indicated that the Department of Education requested copies of their Biennial Review as well as supporting documentation and distribution methods. Karin Walton, Director indicated that often times when the Biennial Review is requested that they request the previous year as well. Celeste Barfield, MiSU indicated that at MiSU that both financial aid and their legal counsel has copies of the report. It was stressed that it is important that senior administration staff are aware of possible requests being made. The Consortium campuses have all completed the 2004-2006 Biennial Reviews. The next Biennial Review is due October, 2006 for 2006-2008. Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU suggested that it may be valuable for each Consortium representative to go back and talk with their campus president and VP that there could be requests coming to their office for the Biennial Review and to make sure that information is passed onto Substance Abuse prevention staff.

Dr. Alan Berkowitz provided training and consultation to Consortium member and Regional/Tribal coordinators. The following areas were discussed: Positive aspects in the state; challenges at the campus level and challenges at the state level.

The main themes in each area are:

Positive – working relationships across the state with coordinators and campus, working relationships with law enforcement;

Challenges campus – lack of personnel at most campuses; drinking by alumni and athletes; lace of support from senior administer

Challenges state – cultural acceptance of drinking; adult enabling; lack of resources; lack of organization overall; legislators not taking a stand.

It was identified that the risk of drinking is not been taken seriously and solutions take a long time due to the culture barrier.

Recommendations: to take a harm reduction approach and identify where do we draw the line? Where will the majority agree? And what is the norm of what people will tolerate? Those doing most of the harm are doing most of the drinking and the alcohol industry makes money on those drinking the most. We need to develop a consensus of what behavior is not tolerated (get campus consensus and get community consensus). Our NDCORE Survey will help to identify: access to alcohol, access to alcohol and harm to academics; secondhand effects (who absorbs those 30% who do not drink?) and who is paying the price?

Will have to: Rethink the binge drinking measure.

- 1. Annual Notification and Distribution of Alcohol Tobacco and other Drug programs, health risks, legal sanctions, and policies.
- 2. Biennial Review to determine effectiveness of campus policies, programs and practices through evaluation.

Biennial Review is required every two years. Failure to comply could result in loss of federal funding.

Karin Walton, Director has asked Bobby Haskins, NDSA to say a few words and introduce Dr. Boyd. He has not confirmed to date.
- Letter of invitation to the speakers will be sent by NDUS office and signed by Chancellor Dunn. Karin Walton, Director and Hal Haynes, DSU will be the contacts for the speaker confirmations.
- Save the date cards will be mailed next week to SBHE, Chancellor's Cabinet, SAC, and NDSA Executive Committee.
- Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, will be creating a registration form to place on the Consortium website
- Karin Walton, Director, asked each Consortium member to talk to their administrators about the importance of attending the Senior Administrators' Forum.
- Information packets will include a CD of the publication "Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary" from the Higher Education Center; NIAAA Report: A Call to Action Materials kit (for each campus); Consortium brochure; and participant evaluation. Additionally, a display board display about the Consortium has been requested by the Alcohol Forum Conference committee. Mike Johnson, NDSCS (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) that the Consortium empower the Director to buy CDs, NIAAA material kits, and display board because it would be a lasting value (MC).

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

• Karin Walton, Director, updated Consortium members about Legislative Subcommittee efforts. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU will be meeting with Representative Tony Grindberg and Representative Morrie Lanning (MN) to draft proposed legislation targeting bans on drink specials, free drinks, targeting specific populations – women, etc. Karin

Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU have contacted various states with drink special bans to identify effectiveness of legislation, as well as challenges in introducing this type of legislation. The challenges basically are in the enforcement of the legislation after the bill was past.

• Nancy Gordon, BSC, brought up a concern that proposing legislation may be too large a step for the Consortium. She suggested that the Consortium efforts be focused at a campus level first. She brought up the concern that Consortium should first focus on eliminating such ads from campus newspapers prior to the proposal of a bill. A lengthy discussion occurred about alcohol ads in campus newspapers and that the campus newspapers are under the direction of the Board of Student Publications and difficult to control due to freedom of speech. It was suggested that there be a discussion about this when all campuses are present (NDSU and UND were not in attendance at the time of the discussion). Banning or restricting alcohol advertising on and off campus is an identified tactic in our Environmental Management Model under the area of "Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol." Karin Walton, Director recommended to table the discussion until the next meeting and identify where the Consortium stands on this issue and/or formulate a specific action statement from the Consortium, if appropriate.

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

- *Dakota Medical Foundation:* Karin Walton, Director, announced that Dakota Medical Foundation has funded the grant proposal for the Senior Administrator Forum (\$7,600.61).
- *NDDOT Freshmen Initiative*: The Department of Transportation has funded the Consortium grant application for a Freshmen Initiative (\$30,712.50). • Senator Tony Grindberg is working to draft a bill that would ban excessive drink discounting. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, indicated that a draft of the bill focusing on drink specials has started. This bill will target excessive drinking and rapid consumption of alcohol in a short amount of time. The current draft includes limits between 11pm and 12noon in the following areas: two or more drinks unlimited drinks, fixed time, fixed price, discourage alcohol being given away as a prize. Similar legislation is being coordinated in Minnesota under sponsorship of Representative Morrie Lanning.

- Karin Walton, Director, requested any advertising which encourages excessive drinking or targets specific populations. These ads can be from student newspapers, radio ads or flyers and should be mailed to Karin Walton, Director.
- Karin Walton, Director, will check to see if students can be reimbursed for gas, lodging and meals if testifying. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU (M) and Mike Johnson, NDSCS (S)that the NDHECSAP reimburse students if legal counsel approves, according to NDUS policy (MC). APPENDIX O

NDHECSAP Outcomes Environmental Management Strategies

OUTCOMES

The NDHECSAP strategy has adopted an environmental management approach as a comprehensive strategy for ATOD prevention. Key responsibilities of environmental management include: leadership; assessment; strategic planning, public policy development; cross-campus coordination; advocacy and social marketing; monitoring and evaluation (DeJong, et al., 1998).

There are three areas of action in which to work for environmental change to address campus ATOD. The Consortium has campus participation at one of three levels, with some campuses participating at all three levels:

- 1. Campus Task Forces (addresses institutional factors) presidents; board members; deans; campus attorneys; alumni and parents; Greek officers; athletic officials; police and campus security officials; ATOD prevention coordinators; health care and counseling staff; community leaders and local officials; student leaders and activists; admissions officers and resident life directors; faculty and teaching assistants.
 - a. Environmental Strategies admission procedures; faculty advisor duties; academic requirements; service learning programs; class scheduling; residential life options; extracurricular/recreational options; alcohol availability; responsible beverage service; alcohol industry advertising; sponsorships.
 - b. Educational Strategies awareness and information training; curriculum development and infusion; peer education; student activist training.
 - c. Enforcement Strategies targeted policing strategies; disciplinary procedures and sanctions; campus judicial system.
 - d. Early Intervention Services student and employee assistance programs; counseling and support groups.
- 2. Campus-Community Coalition (addresses community factors) college officials; law enforcement officials; liquor store owners; college students; parents; ATOD treatment providers; elected officials; other government officials; community development officials; ATOD prevention leaders; Alcohol Beverage Control officials; restaurant and bar owners.
 - a. Environmental Strategies community development; zoning ordinances; permit and licensing restrictions; advertising restriction; responsible beverage service.
 - b. Educational Strategies awareness and information training; media advocacy; social marketing; leadership training.
 - c. Enforcement Strategies "sting" operations; sobriety checkpoints; bar patrols; ID checks; criminal prosecution.
 - d. Early Intervention Services- counseling and support groups.
- 3. State Association of Colleges and Universities (addresses state-level public policy)— college officials; other government officials; state health associations; state ATOD prevention associations; state business associations; law enforcement officials; elected officials.
 - e. Public policy Options lower blood alcohol limits for drivers under 21; distinctive and tamper-proof licenses for minors; increased penalties for illegal service to minors; dram shop laws; certification for commercial alcohol servers; no "happy hours" or other reduced-price alcohol promotions; key registration; limitation on hours of sale; increased funding for law enforcement programs; increased alcohol excise tax rates.

Strategies focused on environmental change that are being reported by campuses and support the Joint Resolution include (see Appendix J for campus specific information) (Zimmerman and DeJong, 2003):

1. **Alcohol-free options:** Offer and promote social, recreational, extracurricular, public service options that do not include alcohol and other drugs.

Problem: Many students, especially at residential colleges, have few adult responsibilities and a great deal of unstructured fee time, and there are too few social and recreational options.

Tactics:

- Create new alcohol-free events
- Promote alcohol-free events and activities.
- Create and publicize student service learning or volunteer activities.
- Require community service work as part of the academic curriculum.
- Open a student center, gym, or other alcohol-free settings.
- Expand hours for student center, gym, or other alcohol-free settings
- Promote consumption of nonalcoholic beverage and food at events
- Provide greater financial support to student clubs and organizations that are substance-free.
- 2. **Normative Environment:** Create a social, academic, and residential environment that supports health promoting norms.

Problem: Many people accept drinking and other drug use as a "normal" part of college experience.

Tactics:

- Change college admissions procedures.
- Increase academic standards.
- Modify the academic schedule (e.g., increase the number of Friday classes).
- Offer a greater number of substance-free residence halls.
- Increase faculty-student contact.
- Employ older, salaried resident assistants.
- Create a social norms marketing campaign to correct student misperceptions of dinking norms.
- 3. **Availability of Alcohol (and Other Drugs):** Limit alcohol availability both on and off campus

Problem: Alcohol is abundantly available to students and is inexpensive.

Tactics:

- Ban or restrict use of alcohol on campus.
- Prohibit alcohol use in public places.
- Prohibit delivery or use of kegs or other common containers on campus.
- Prohibit tailgate parties
- Control or eliminate alcohol sales at sports events.
- Disseminate guidelines of off-campus parties.,
- Install a responsible beverage service program
- Limit number and concentration of alcohol outlets near campus
- Increase costs of alcohol sales licenses.
- Limit days or hours of alcohol sales,

- Eliminate home delivery of alcohol purchases
- Require key registration.
- Increase state alcohol taxes.

4. **Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol**: Restrict marketing and promotion of alcoholic beverages both on and off campus

Problem: Bars, restaurants, and liquor stores use aggressive promotions to target underage and other college drinkers.

Tactics:

On Campus

- Ban or restrict alcohol advertising
- Ban or restrict alcohol industry sponsorship of on-=campus events.
- Limit content of party or event announcements.

Off Campus

- Ban or limit alcohol advertising in the vicinity of schools
- Ban alcohol promotions with special appeal to underage drinkers.
- Ban alcohol promotions that show drinking in high-risk contexts.
- Require pro-health messages to counterbalance alcohol advertising.
- Institute cooperative agreement to institute minimum pricing
- Institute cooperative agreement to ban or restrict low-price drink specials.

5. **Policy Development and Law Enforcement:** Develop and enforce campus policies and local, state and federal laws

Problem: Campus policies and local, state, and federal laws are not enforced consistently.

Tactics:

On Campus

- Revise campus alcohol and other drug policies
- Disseminate campus STPD policies and publicize their enforcement
- Require on-campus functions to be registered.
- Increase ID checks at on-campus functions.
- Use decoy operations at campus pubs and on-campus functions.
- Increase patrols near on-campus parties.
- Increase disciplinary sanction of violation of campus ATOD policies.
- Increase criminal prosecution of students for alcohol-related offenses.
- Notify parent of ruses violation.

Off Campus

- Enforce minimum legal drinking age laws
- Increase patrols near off-campus parties
- Establish new DUI laws
- Increase enforcement of DUI laws
- Impose driver's license penalties for minors violating alcohol laws
- Change driver's license procedures and formats
- Pass ordinance to restrict open house assemblies and noise level.
- Educate seller/servers about potential legal liability.

The NDHECSAP strategy has adopted an environmental management approach as a comprehensive strategy for ATOD prevention. Key responsibilities of environmental management include: leadership; assessment; strategic planning, public policy development; cross-campus coordination; advocacy and social marketing; monitoring and evaluation (DeJong, et al., 1998). The NDHECSAP ORC assists at the campus level to support prevention efforts using environmental strategies, educational strategies, enforcement strategies, and early intervention services.

Strategies focused on environmental change are the responsibility of the ORC. Outlined below are the FY07 ORC tasks accomplished at the local campus level.

Alcohol Free Options:

- Hosted a Drunken Driving Awareness game at Bismarck State College called "Win a Car". Students were asked questions about blood alcohol level, drinking habits, and drunk driving. Students who correctly answered these questions received a matchbox car. Information on alcohol was also available in conjunction with a DUI display that utilized social norms theory. An estimated 70 cars were given away during this program.
- Hosted a Drunken Driving Awareness game at Minot State University-Bottineau called "Win a Car". Students were asked questions about blood alcohol level, drinking habits and drunk driving. Students who correctly answered these questions received a matchbox car. Information on alcohol was also available in conjunction with a DUI Display that utilized social norms theory. An estimated 30 cars were given away during this program.
- Hosted a Drunken Driving Awareness game at Minot State University during their health fair called "Win a Car". Students were asked questions about blood alcohol level, drinking habits, and drunk driving. Students who correctly answered these questions received a matchbox car. Information on alcohol was also available in conjunction with a DUI display that utilized social norms theory. An estimated 75 cars were given away during this program

Normative Environment:

- Research statistics and information on alcohol related crashes in North Dakota, MIP laws and Drunken Driving Laws. These were provided to Dickinson State University for their National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness week.
- Compiled a list of best practices/activities from around the nation and provided it to each campus.
- Gathered Be A Responsible Friend Campaign (B.A.R.F) information and distributed it to campus.
- Researched and gathered information on drug testing for those who operate heavy machinery for Bismarck State College.
- Provided examples and specific posters for campuses of social norms from core data.
- Co-presented Choices with Jane Vangsness from NDSU to Farmhouse Fraternity
- Facilitated a Social Norm's campaign, 'Kick Butts' targeting tobacco. This was done by using stats from CORE. Took pictures of Student Senate for the campaign.

• Met with Lake Region Student Senate to do social norms and also encourage involvement in prevention efforts on campus.

Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol:

• Assisted in researching information on college newspapers and stand on whether they accept or do not accept advertisements from the alcohol industry.

Dr. Alan Berkowitz provided training and consultation to Consortium member and Regional/Tribal coordinators. The following areas were discussed: Positive aspects in the state; challenges at the campus level and challenges at the state level.

The main themes in each area are:

Positive – working relationships across the state with coordinators and campus, working relationships with law enforcement:

Challenges campus – lack of personnel at most campuses; drinking by alumni and athletes; lace of support from senior administer

Challenges state – cultural acceptance of drinking; adult enabling; lack of resources; lack of organization overall; legislators not taking a stand.

It was identified that the risk of drinking is not been taken seriously and solutions take a long time due to the culture barrier.

Recommendations: to take a harm reduction approach and identify where do we draw the line? Where will the majority agree? And what is the norm of what people will tolerate? Those doing most of the harm are doing most of the drinking and the alcohol industry makes money on those drinking the most. We need to develop a consensus of what behavior is not tolerated (get campus consensus and get community consensus). Our NDCORE Survey will help to identify: access to alcohol, access to alcohol and harm to academics; secondhand effects (who absorbs those 30% who do not drink?) and who is paying the price?

Will have to: Rethink the binge drinking measure.

Rethink Social Norms in terms of attitudes

Gap in ND is lowest in the country

High-Risk drinking is so visible and normal in ND

Find the Norm from NDCORE: Behavioral Norm (find out what is bothering students and how often students are in the bystander role)

Biennial Review is required every two years. Failure to comply could result in loss of federal funding.

Complying with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations

Executive Summary

Certification Requirements

Part 86, the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations, requires that, as a condition of receiving funds or any other form of financial assistance under any federal program, an institution of higher education (IHE) must certify that it has adopted and implemented a program to prevent the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees.

Creating a program that complies with the Regulations requires an IHE to (1) prepare a **written policy** on alcohol and other drugs; (2) develop a sound method for **distribution of the policy** to every student and IHE staff member each year; and (3) prepare a **biennial report** on the effectiveness of its alcohol and other drug (AOD) programs and the consistency of policy enforcement.

The Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations also require an IHE to submit a written certification to the Secretary of Education that it has adopted and implemented a drug prevention program as described in the Regulations.

The Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations establish a **minimum set of requirements** for college substance use policies. Colleges may also have additional obligations under state law. Equally important may be recent court decisions in lawsuits brought against IHEs by college and university students and employees. *Consultation with an attorney knowledgeable in this area is highly recommended.*

Failure to Comply with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations

If an IHE fails to submit the necessary certification or violates its certification, the Secretary of Education may terminate all forms of financial assistance, whether from the Department of Education or other federal agencies, and may require repayment of such assistance, including individual students' federal grants, such as Pell grants. The Department of Education may also arrange to provide technical assistance toward the development of a plan and agreement that brings the IHE into full compliance as soon as feasible.

The possibility of loss of federal funding exists in the provision that "the Secretary annually reviews a representative sample of IHE drug prevention programs." If the Secretary of Education selects an IHE for review, the IHE shall provide the Secretary access to personnel records, documents, and any other necessary information requested for this review.

Content of the Written Policy

The Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations require IHEs to develop a written policy that describes **standards of conduct** that clearly "prohibit, at a minimum, the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on its property or as part of any of its activities."

The written policy must also include (1) a description of the applicable **legal sanctions** under federal, state, or local laws for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol; (2) a description of the **health risks** associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol; (3) a description of any **drug and alcohol programs** (counseling, treatment, rehabilitation, and re-entry) that are available to employees or students; and (4) a clear statement that the IHE will impose **disciplinary sanctions** on students and employees for violations

of the standards of conduct.

and a description of those sanctions, up to and including expulsion or termination of employment and referral for prosecution.

Institutions of higher education have fulfilled these requirements in a number of different ways, depending on their campus environment, available resources, and creativity.

Distribution of the Policy

The Department of Education requires that each IHE distribute its AOD policy annually in writing. If new students enroll or new employees are hired after the annual distribution date, these students and employees must also receive the materials. The Department of Education has stated that merely making the materials available to those who wish to take them does not satisfy the requirements of the Regulations, as that does not ensure distribution to every student and employee. A description of what the IHE does to ensure distribution to all students and employees is sufficient to establish compliance.

Although many IHEs found it difficult at first to distribute the policy to every student and staff member each year, with experience they have found more cost-efficient methods for producing and distributing their policies and for encouraging students to read them. One successful technique has been to include the policy in materials that the school already distributes and to which students often refer, such as registration materials, academic calendars, or class schedules.

The Biennial Review

The Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations require IHEs to review their AOD programs and policies every two years. The required review has two objectives: (1) to determine the effectiveness of, and to implement any needed changes to, the AOD program; and (2) to ensure that the disciplinary sanctions for violating standards of conduct are enforced consistently.

Because the Regulations do not specify what a biennial review should include or how it should be conducted, schools have considerable leeway in determining how to conduct and what to include in their biennial review.

In practice, biennial reviews range from 2 to almost 30 pages. The more thorough biennial reviews include (1) descriptions of the AOD program elements; (2) a statement of AOD program goals and a discussion of goal achievement; (3) summaries of AOD program strengths and weaknesses; (4) procedures for distributing AOD policy to students and employees; (5) copies of the policies distributed to students and employees; and (6) recommendations for revising AOD programs.

Although IHEs produce a wide variety of acceptable biennial reviews, the most useful reviews point to areas in a program or policy that need improvement

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Core Alcohol and Drug Survey was developed to measure alcohol and other drug usage, attitudes, and perceptions among college students at two and four-year institutions. There are also several items on students' demographic and background characteristics as well as perception of campus climate issues and policy.

Key Findings from students at Multiple Selection

Following are some key findings on the use of alcohol:

- 84.9% of the students consumed alcohol in the past year ("annual prevalence").
- 73.2% of the students consumed alcohol in the past 30 days ("30-day prevalence").
- 71.3% of underage students (younger than 21) consumed alcohol in the previous 30 days.
- 52.7% of students reported binge drinking in the previous two weeks. A binge is defined as consuming 5 or more drinks in one sitting.

Following are some key findings on the use of illegal drugs:

- 22.7% of the students have used marijuana in the past year ("annual prevalence").
- 10.3% of the students are current marijuana users ("30-day prevalence").
- 7.8% of the students have used an illegal drug other than marijuana in the past year ("annual prevalence").
- 3.5 % of the students are current users of illegal drugs other than marijuana ("30-day prevalence").

The most frequently reported illegal drugs used in the past 30 days were:

- 10.3% Marijuana (pot, hash, hash oil)
- 2.0% Amphetamines (diet pills, speed)
- 1.2% Cocaine (crack, rock, freebase)

Executive Summary NDCORE Alcohol and Drug Survey

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Following are some key findings on the consequences of alcohol and drug use:

- 47.4% reported some form of public misconduct (such as trouble with police, fighting/argument, DWI/DUI, vandalism) at least once during the past year as a result of drinking or drug use.
- 28.9% reported experiencing some kind of serious personal problems (such as suicidality, being hurt or injured, trying unsuccessfully to stop using, sexual assault) at least once during the past year as a result of drinking or drug use.

Following are some key findings on opinions about the campus environment:

- 88.3% of students said the campus has alcohol and drug policies;
- 11.0% said they "don't know"; and
- 0.6% said there wasn't a policy.
- 42.4% of students said the campus has an alcohol and drug prevention program;
- 55.6% said they "don't know"; and
- 2.0 % said there wasn't a program.
- 77.0 % of students said the campus is concerned about the prevention of drug and alcohol use;
- 16.4% said they "don't know"; and
- 6.5% said the campus is not concerned.

With regard to students' perceptions of other students' use:

- 91.4 % of students believe the average student on campus uses alcohol once a week or more.
- 42.6 % of students believe the average student on this campus uses some form of illegal drug at least once a week.
- 29.9 % of students indicated they would prefer <u>not</u> to have alcohol available at parties they attend.
- 88.4 % of students indicated they would prefer not to have drugs available at parties they attend

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Use of Drugs

The following tables provide additional details about students' reported use of drugs at this institution. Unless otherwise indicated, percentages are based on the total number of students responding validly to a given item.

For comparison purposes some figures are included from a reference group of 58392 students from 145 institutions who completed the Core Alcohol and Drug Survey Long Form in 2002, 2003, or 2004 (Copied from Survey 5).

More detailed analyses can be found in A Report to College Presidents: 1995, 1996, and 1997.

In general, substantial proportions of students report having used alcohol, tobacco, and marijuana in response to the question, "At what age did you first use ______?" whereas comparatively few report having used each of the other substances. This question examines "lifetime prevalence" as opposed to annual prevalence and 30-day prevalence.

Table 2 describes lifetime prevalence, annual prevalence, 30-day prevalence, and high frequency use (3 times a week or more).

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The average number of drinks consumed per week at this institution is 6.4 drinks. The national average is 5.8 drinks (based on a sample of 57475). The percentage of students who report having binged in the last two weeks at this institution is 52.7% compared to the national average of 44.3%.

Consequences of Alcohol and Drug Use

The proportion of students who report having had problems as a result of drinking or drug use is another indicator of the level of substance abuse. The percentages of students who reported that within the past year they had various problematic experiences are given in Table 3. The top group of items represents public misconduct or behaviors that involve actual or potential harm to others. The second group represents possibly serious personal problems. The last group may consist of less serious (and more common) experiences which nevertheless may indicate excessive use.



Overview:

- This video was made possible through the collaboration and funding from the North Dakota Department of Transportation and the Safe Communities Coalition of the Red River Valley; in partnership with North Dakota State University.
- A total of six higher education institutions in North Dakota showed the video during their summer/fall orientation programs (North Dakota State University, Dickinson State University, Valley City State University, Mayville State University, Minot State University, Lake Region State College).
- 3,128 people had the potential of seeing the video, 864 returned evaluations regarding the video, for a 27% response rate.

Conclusions:

- 95.4 % of the people that viewed the video said that it made them feel comfortable about to talking to their student alcohol.
- 85.1 % of the people that viewed the video said it gave them new ideas about how to talk to their student about alcohol.
- 93.1 % of the people that viewed the video said it persuaded them to see the importance of talking to their student about alcohol
- 93.4 % of the people that viewed the video said it persuaded them to have a conversation with their student prior to them coming to college.

Consortium Budget: Reviewed September 2006 Salary and Fringe Budget 31306 0041 (60,198.36) and September 2006 Operating Budget 30305 0041 (\$21,320.06). Corey Michalos, DSU (M) Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to approve budget (MC).

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated that the grant application for the Senior Administrative Forum is almost completed. The Grant Subcommittee will meet on Monday 16, 2006 to review it prior to submission. Karin Walton, NDHEC, asked for input on submitting letters of support for the Dakota Medical Foundation grant proposal. She inquired if one letter of support from NDUS or individual letters from each campus from SAC representative would be better. Jane Vangsness, NDSU, indicated that she felt that individual letters from each SAC representative and Michel Hillman, NDUS would demonstrate buy-in from all campuses. Glen Schmaltz, VCSU, suggested a template letter that could be used. Ray Gerszewski, MaSU, stated that in the past a template letter has been provided and that it was very helpful.

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative Contract- this proposal has been funded and the contract from DOT has been received by UND Grants and Contracts Office. Jane Vangsness, NDSU has asked if she could work on this project as a master's thesis research project. She will be working closely with Karin Walton, NDHEC to oversee this project and implement the parent handbooks by fall 2007.

NDCORE Survey Update

Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated that all campuses have completed their NDCORE surveys and they have been mailed to Core Institute for analysis. As soon as they provide an invoice for services the grant will be finished and final report submitted to DOT. Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated that this project was completed under budget. She indicated that each campus will receive an executive summary, individual campus data, and state aggregate data.

<u>Conference Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Hal Haynes, DSU; Jane Vangsness, NDSU; and Sandi Geddes, UND)

Senior Administrative Form

Karin Walton, NDHEC, indicated the DOT Alcohol Forum will be held at Comfort Inn February 21 and 22, 2007. The Senior Administrator Forum held in conjunction with Alcohol Forum will take place from 10am to 2pm at the Comfort Inn on February 21, 2007. The Forum will focus on National College Drinking, NDCORE Survey results, networking lunch with Consortium members, and conclude with action steps which senior administrators can implement at the campus level.

Alan Berkowitz Consultation Training November 14, 2006

Karin Walton, NDHEC, updated Consortium on the arrangements and upcoming consultation with Alan Berkowtiz. She indicated that the Consortium had agreed to fund the consultation up to four hours. Alan Berkowtiz has indicated that he is coming in a day early to meet with our group so he is asking for \$150 travel funds, a hotel for Monday evening and meals. Nancy Gordon, BSC, (M) and Corey Michalos, DSU (S) the Consortium pay for car rental (\$150), lodging and meals (per diem) (MC). Jane Vangsness, NDSU (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen (S) to invite Regional and Tribal Coordinators to Alan Berkowtiz Consultation (MC).

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Karin Walton, Director, will schedule a meeting time for the Legislative Subcommittee. The subcommittee is responsible for developing a plan and strategy for the upcoming legislative session. Karin Walton, NDHEC presented annual report at the SBHE meeting and discussed need for direction in upcoming legislative session. Current issues are funding for operating and over-consumption of alcohol.

Annual Report - update of SBHE Meeting Karin Walton, Director, NDHEC stated that the SBHE went very well. There was a 40 minute discussion which included input from Bobby Haskin the NDSA president (indicating support from NDSA); President Vickers, DSU suggesting that the SBHE look to the state for monetary support versus looking toward the federal government particularly when there is a \$500 million surplus; and Dr. Mathew, VP NDSU for support at the SAC level. Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated a request from Chancellor Dunn to discuss this issue. She will be meeting with Mike Hillman and Chancellor Dunn to discuss next steps.

Campus Visits – Schedule/Agenda All campus visits are scheduled except BSC. Nancy Gordon, BSC, updated that the Interim president has asked for and been provided with a description of a biennial report. Nancy Gordon, BSC, stated that it would be better to wait until the new president is named before coming to BSC.

NDSA – Contact has been made with Bobby Haskins, NDSA President. Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated Bobby Haskins has said that two students are interested in being members of the consortium. Karin Walton, NDHEC will send a formal letter of invitation to NDSA and coordinate with the NDSA president. Karin Walton, NDHEC indicated that NDSA will be placed on the distribution list to receive Consortium minutes – similar to what SAC currently receives.

Mike Johnson, NDSCS (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) to approve the budgets (MC).

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Karin Walton, Director, announced that Dakota Medical Foundation has funded the grant proposal for the Senior Administrator Forum (\$7,600.61).

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative Contract- The Department of Transportation has funded the Consortium grant application for a Freshmen Initiative (\$30,712.50). Karin Walton, Director and Jane Vangsness, NDSU will meet on January 3, 2007 for a conference call with Rob Turissi from Penn State to work out the details. Jane Vangsness, NDSU, will be taking the lead on this project for her Masters' Thesis. Jane Vangsness, NDSU will coordinate with the campuses.

Senior Administrative Form - The subcommittee met on Monday December 11, 2006 to finalized speakers. The agenda includes a panel presentation by Dr. Carothers, President of University of Rhode Island and Peter Lake, J.D. Stetson University College of Law about the NIAAA Report: A Call to Action. Dr. Robert Boyd has agreed to introduce the panel. Karin Walton, Director will present the results of the NDCORE Survey. A networking lunch will include a facilitated discussion by Hugh Long, WSC and Corey Michalos, DSU. Each campus will take about 3 minutes to talk about their involvement on the Consortium (benefits to the campus and also challenges being faced). Dr. Margaret Barr from Northwester University, Keynote speaker will be introduced by Dr. George McClellan, DSU. Karin Walton, Director has asked Bobby Haskins, NDSA to say a few words and introduce Dr. Boyd. He has not confirmed to date.

- Information packets will include a CD of the publication "Be Vocal, Be Visible, Be Visionary" from the Higher Education Center; NIAAA Report: A Call to Action Materials kit (for each campus); Consortium brochure; and participant evaluation. Additionally, a display board display about the Consortium has been requested by the Alcohol Forum Conference committee. Mike Johnson, NDSCS (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) that the Consortium empower the Director to buy CDs, NIAAA material kits, and display board because it would be a lasting value (MC).

<u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Karin Walton, Director, updated Consortium members about Legislative Subcommittee efforts. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU will be meeting with Representative Tony Grindberg and Representative Morrie Lanning (MN) to draft proposed legislation targeting bans on drink specials, free drinks, targeting specific populations – women, etc. Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU have contacted various states with drink special bans to identify effectiveness of legislation, as well as challenges in introducing this type of legislation. The challenges basically are in the enforcement of the legislation after the bill was past.

Nancy Gordon, BSC, brought up a concern that proposing legislation may be too large a step for the Consortium. She suggested that the Consortium efforts be focused at a campus level first. She brought up the concern that Consortium should first focus on eliminating such ads from campus newspapers prior to the proposal of a bill. A lengthy discussion occurred about alcohol ads in campus newspapers and that the campus newspapers are under the direction of the Board of Student Publications and difficult to control due to freedom of speech. It was suggested that there be a discussion about this when all campuses are present (NDSU and UND were not in attendance at the time of the discussion). Banning or restricting alcohol advertising on and off campus is an identified tactic in our Environmental Management Model under the area of "Marketing and Promotion of Alcohol." Karin Walton, Director recommended to table the discussion until the next meeting and identify where the Consortium stands on this issue and/or formulate a specific action statement from the Consortium, if appropriate.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU indicated that NDSA has not had the opportunity to formally discuss his role on the Consortium with the North Dakota Student Association. He indicated that there is a concern about generalized safety and increasing awareness of alcohol and other drug abuse. The abuse of alcohol and other substances is where the safety of students at large is the biggest concern. The next NDSA meeting is January and by the Consortium meeting in February meeting he would have information about his role on the Consortium. Consortium members requested if Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU could update the NDSA on Consortium issues and vice versa. He indicated he will discuss this with Bobby Haskins, NDSA President. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU stated he was looking forward to this opportunity.

<u>Campus Visits:</u> All campus visits except for Bismarck State College have been completed. BSC will occur in March following the hire of their new president.

<u>Biennial Review</u>: Biennial Reviews are due the end of the year. If any school needs assistance they can contact Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC.

<u>Add Violence to Mission Statement:</u> Karin Walton, Director asked whether we need to look at addressing violence prevention and adding violence to our mission statement. This will be tabled until the next meeting.

<u>Use of Alcohol Industry support materials:</u> Karin Walton, Director asked about whether we need to discuss the use of alcohol industry educational materials. This will be tabled until the next meeting.

NDCORE Survey: All surveys are completed. Karin Walton, Director, is still waiting for the results. The plan is to present the results at the Senior Administrator Forum in February.

<u>Clearinghouse of Best Practices</u>: This will be worked on when Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC assumes management of the Consortium website.

Outreach Coordinator Report/Campus Networking: Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, indicated that she has completed Dream weaver training and will be taking over the management of the website by January 1, 2007. She indicated that it was a suggestion for the ORC to put together a pamphlet outlining what the ORC could offer campuses. The Consortium agreed that a pamphlet would helpful to the campuses and Hal Haynes; DSU (M) and Ray Gerszewski; MaSU (S) to allocate funding to produce an information pamphlet highlighting what can be offered as well as a fact sheet about the ORC (MC). Members indicated that the updates which were sent out by the ORC were helpful to campuses.

Randy Fixen, LRSC (M) and Lisa Eriksmoen, MiSU (S) to accept the budget reports (MC). There is also a new account being set up for indirect cost rebates from the NDCORE Survey grant (\$70) and the period of time the ORC position was vacant (\$854).

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

Dakota Medical Foundation: Karin Walton, Director, announced that Dakota Medical Foundation has funded the grant proposal for the Senior Administrator Forum (\$7,600.61).

NDDOT Freshmen Initiative Contract- The Department of Transportation has funded the Consortium grant application for a Freshmen Initiative (\$30,712.50). <u>Legislative Subcommittee</u> (Karin Walton, Director, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC; Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Randy Fixen, LRSC; and Mike Johnson, NDSCS.)

Legislative Session: Senator Tony Grindberg is working to draft a bill that would ban excessive drink discounting. Karin Walton, Director and Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, indicated that a draft of the bill focusing on drink specials has started. This bill will target excessive drinking and rapid consumption of alcohol in a short amount of time. The current draft includes limits between 11pm and 12noon in the following areas: two or more drinks unlimited drinks, fixed time, fixed price, discourage alcohol being given away as a prize. Similar legislation is being coordinated in Minnesota under sponsorship of Representative Morrie Lanning.

- Karin Walton, Director, requested any advertising which encourages excessive drinking or targets specific populations. These ads can be from student newspapers, radio ads or flyers and should be mailed to Karin Walton, Director.
- Karin Walton, Director, will check to see if students can be reimbursed for gas, lodging and meals if
 testifying. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU (M) and Mike Johnson, NDSCS (S)that the NDHECSAP reimburse
 students if legal counsel approves, according to NDUS policy (MC). Karin will contact Pat Seaworth, NDUS
 Legal Counsel about student reimbursement.
- Karin Walton, Director, indicated that Lee Erickson, Director of ND SADD, had contacted her regarding legislation he had been working on for a state allocation for prevention. Lee Erickson, ND SADD stated that the NDHECSAP will not be included in the bill. However, we will testify in support of the request for \$440,000 state allocation for youth prevention in ND.

<u>Advertising Subcommittee</u> (Nancy Gordon, BSU; Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Paula Berg, MiSUB, and Sandi Luck, UND)

Nancy Gordon, BSC has agreed to chair a new subcommittee which was established to look at campus
alcohol advertising in the state (policies, newspapers, publishing boards, etc). This will also be included for
discussion at the strategic planning retreat May 17-18, 2007.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU indicated that NDSA has not had the opportunity to formally discuss the student role on the NDHECSAP, but they will be meeting later this month. He indicated that at the next NDHECSAP meeting he will be better able to outline the relationship between NDSA and the NDHECSAP. <u>NDCORE Survey:</u> Karin Walton, Director, indicated that she can send out the raw data from Core Institute to each campus.

Subcommittees:

<u>Grant Writing</u> (Karin Walton, Director; Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Laura Oster-Aalund, NDSU; Karen Seeger, NDSCS, and Corey Michalos, DSU)

- NDDOT Freshmen Initiative: Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director edited the Parent Handbook and suggested changes to Dr. Rob Turissi and his research assistant regarding the Freshman Initiative. Survey materials are very long (102 questions) and will be reviewed with suggestions to cut questions. Jane Vangsness, NDSU will be taking the lead on this project and will need assistance with obtaining incoming student mailing lists. Sandi Luck, UND stated that UND already sends out parent booklets and questions if this will be redundant. UND's information is campus specific whereas the Parent Handbook is more general information. Jane Vangsness, NDSU and Karin Walton, Director will put together a fact sheet about the grant and discuss as a single agenda item at the next meeting.
- **Bremer Foundation Grant-**Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, will be writing a letter of intent to Bremer Foundation to ask for funding to focus on prevention efforts (Alcohol Awareness Weeks, Choices, etc.) over a three year period. The Grant Writing subcommittee will help in the development of a project goal statement and writing of the grant proposal.

- Senior Administrative Form Senior Admin Forum was held February 21, 2007, with about 38 participants. There was concern over the limited number of senior administrators in attendance. Legislative Session:

- SB 2204 Medical Amnesty bill is currently in House.
- SB 2269 Excessive Drink Discounting Bill was unanimously defeated by Senate Political Subdivisions Committee. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU testified for Karin Walton, Director in support of this bill.
- SB 2276 State Allocation for Youth Prevention pasted the Senate Human Services Committee. Will be heard in the House Human Services Committee. Karin Walton, Director testified in support of this bill.
- There was a discussion about student involvement on this subcommittee. Nikito informed NDHECSAP that NDSA has full time and part time lobbyists. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, DSU is interested in sitting on this subcommittee.

• There was a discussion that ND is one of few states with local control over alcohol licenses in the state. This will be a discussion at the strategic planning retreat.

<u>Advertising Subcommittee</u> (Nancy Gordon, BSU; Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU, Beth Larson-Steckler, ORC, Paula Berg, MiSUB, and Sandi Luck, UND)

- Nancy Gordon, BSC stated the subcommittee met and developed the following goals:
 - 1. To get each student newspaper to arrive at a policy that will carry over from year to year and not be contingent on the editor.
 - 2. To work with the board of student publication.
 - 3. To appeal to the ethics of the journalism profession (Code of Ethics for journalists).
 - 4. To find precedents, examples, and policies from other schools in the United States.
 - 5. The find out what student government policies are across the state regarding funding to the student newspaper.
 - 6. To empower students to address this issue on campus.
 - 7. To gain support from student government to form policy or standards regarding this issue.

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nikito Johnson, NDSA said that NDSA met and students are concerned with safety and alcohol abuse. Nikito Johnson, NDSA, handed out a copy of a design for a T-shirt he brought to the NDSA for approval and collaboration with the NDHECSAP. He is asking for approval and assistance with printing costs from NDHECSAP. The design has a sad clown face with words "It is not funny when" (on front of shirt) "A friend dies from alcohol or substance abuse" (on the back of the shirt). There was a discussion about the costs of shirts for a single color or multiple colors. Karen Seeger, NDSCS (M) and Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to partner with NDSA for a substance abuse t-shirt project (MC). There was discussion about the best date to hand out the t-shirts. Consortium Budget: Reviewed the February 2007 Salary and Fringe (\$28,346.64) and Operating (\$12345.35) budgets. Sandi Luck, UND (M) and Randy Fixen, LRSC (S) to accept the budget reports (MC). There is a new account being set up for indirect cost rebates from the NDCORE Survey grant (\$70) and the period of time the ORC position was vacant (\$854) 20320 0041 (\$924.00).

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Nickito Johnson, NDSA said that NDSA will contribute up to \$3,000 to purchase 2,200 T-shirts (200 per campus). NDHECSAP had committed up to \$4,000 to go toward the printing of the T-shirts. NDSA would like to have the commitment from NDHECSAP in writing with dollar amount and date to launch. Nancy Mickelson, MiSU said that a printer in Minot would print the shirts, 1 color, for \$3.00/shirt. The design has a sad clown face with words "It is not funny" (on front of shirt) "when a friend dies from alcohol or substance abuse" (on the back of the shirt). There is a tombstone on one side of the clown's face and a cross on the other side of the clown's face. There was a concern raised about the design including a cross. Nickito stated that he took that concern back to NDSA and that NDSA said that to go back and change the design will prolong the process, NDSA's intention is not to offend anyone, students can choose to wear the T-shirt or not to wear it, and want to go with the current plan. Nancy Mickelson, MiSU (M) to fund the current the T-shirt design up to \$4,000 Nancy Gordon (S). The motion went to roll call vote: MiSU – yes, MiSUB – no, NDSCS – no, NDSU – no, UND – absent, WSC – no, DSU – no, BSC – yes, VCSU – no, MaSU – no, LRCS – absent.

Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU (M) to support funding up to \$4,000 if the design of the T-shirt was changed to a non-religious icon, Karen Seeger, NDSCS (S). Discussion included concern about what design would be used. Laura Oster-Aaland, NDSU amended her motion to support funding up to \$4,000 of the current design with the cross removed, Karen Seeger (S) Paula Berg, MiSUB calls for question: BSC – yes, DSU – yes, LRSC – yes, MaSU – yes, MiSU – yes, MiSUB – yes, NDSU – yes, UND – absent, WSC – yes, VCSU – absent, NDSCS – yes. (MC).

NDSA – North Dakota Student Association Update: Karin Walton, Director forwarded a memorandum to Nickito Johnson, NDSA with NDHECSAP commitment of up to \$4,000 for printing t-shirts. However, because Nickito Johnson, NDSA was not in attendance a decision was made to table the t-shirt discussion because this is such an important message and NDSA and NDHECSAP are both investing a great deal of money in the project. We don't want to push through a design we are not happy about (just to get something printed). - 62.5% taking the survey believe the NDEHCSAP campus representative is available and provides information relevant to community programming.
- 62.5% taking the survey believe the NDHECSAP campus representative or other higher education representative actively participates on the community coalition in their region.
