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FOREWORD

THE OFFICE OF EDUCATION publishes at approximately 4-year intervals a compilation of lists of institutions of higher education accredited by nationally recognized regional and professional accrediting agencies and by State agencies responsible for accrediting within the various States. This bulletin is the tenth in the series, replacing the 1952 edition.

The purpose in issuing periodic revisions of the bulletin is to record the changes that occur and to provide information about accredited higher institutions to college and university officers, State department of education officials, and college and high-school students. Governmental and non-governmental agencies are making increasing use of the publication in various phases of their work.

Lists furnished by regional, professional, and State accrediting agencies as of the spring of 1956 are reproduced in this bulletin.

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ACCREDITED HIGHER INSTITUTIONS

INTRODUCTION

IN the United States there is no single agency having jurisdiction over institutions of higher education. Such governmental control as exists is lodged in the 48 States, the District of Columbia, and outlying possessions. It may range from close supervision over the chartering and establishing of new institutions and periodic review to determine their eligibility for continued approval to little, if any, supervision, particularly in the case of privately controlled institutions. State departments of education in most of the States, and State universities in a number of them, engage in some form of approval of institutions within their borders. Wide variation in practices among the States has led to the development of voluntary agencies which have assumed responsibility for establishing criteria and identifying those institutions which have been found to meet and maintain announced standards in the educational activities in which they are engaged. The institutions thus identified are said to be "accredited," and the process, unique to the United States, is known as "accreditation."

NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED ACCREDITING AGENCIES

The Commissioner of Education is required under Section 253 of the Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952, known as Public Law 550 of the 82d Congress, to "publish a list of nationally recognized accrediting agencies and associations which he determines to be reliable authority as to the quality of training offered by an educational institution." In pursuance of this mandate the following criteria for determining nationally recognized accrediting agencies and associations were evolved and published in the October 4, 1952, *Federal Register*:

CRITERIA

The agency or association

1. Is regional or national in the scope of its operations (regional as here used means several States);
2. Serves a definite need for accreditation in the field in which it operates;

3. Performs no functions that might prejudice its independent judgment of the quality of an educational program;
4. Makes available to the public current information covering:
 - (a) criteria or standards for accreditation, (b) report of its operations, (c) a list of accredited institutions, courses or educational programs;
5. Has an adequate organization and effective procedures to maintain its operations on a professional basis. Among the factors to be considered in this connection are that the agency or association:
 - (a) Secures sufficient and pertinent data concerning the qualitative and quantitative aspects of the work of an institution, including data on such items as the educational objectives, educational programs, admission practices, training and experience of teachers, financial stability, laboratory and library resources.
 - (b) Uses qualified examiners to visit institutions and inspect courses, programs and facilities and to prepare written reports and recommendations for the use of the reviewing body — and causes such examination to be conducted under conditions that assure an impartial and objective judgment.
 - (c) Re-evaluates at reasonable intervals the accredited institutions, programs and courses of study.
 - (d) Has financial resources, as shown by its current financial statements, necessary to maintain accrediting operations in accordance with published policies and procedures.
6. Accredits only institutions which are found upon such examination to meet specific standards for accreditation, established in advance in terms that include the factors above described;
7. Has had not less than two years' experience as an accrediting agency, or in the alternative demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that it has been organized under conditions that reasonably assure stability and permanence and that it has gained the acceptance required under 8 below during such shorter period;
8. Has gained acceptance of its criteria, methods of evaluation, and decisions, by educational institutions, practitioners, licensing bodies and employers throughout the United States;
9. Assurance is given that accreditation for the purposes of the act will not be conditioned on the payment of any sums of money: *Provided, however,* That a reasonable charge may be made by the agency or association for its services hereunder not exceeding the actual cost of the accreditation.

The Commissioner's list of nationally recognized accrediting agencies and associations includes six regional associations and 24 professional agencies and associations. The lists furnished by these agencies are reproduced in Parts I and II of this bulletin.

REGIONAL ACCREDITING AGENCIES

The six nationally recognized regional accrediting associations¹ together cover every section of the country. These admit to membership only those institutions that meet and maintain certain

announced standards. For many years the regional accrediting associations limited their accreditation to undergraduate programs of the general and liberal arts type. Gradually, however, they are assuming responsibility, with the assistance of representatives of appropriate professional agencies, for accrediting institutions as a whole.

The six regional accrediting associations have established a National Committee of Regional Accrediting Agencies for the purpose of coordinating the activities of regional accrediting agencies, and of cooperating with similar national agencies. Annually, in September, the Committee issues a list of *Accredited Institutions of Higher Education*. An institution is eligible for inclusion in this list, after satisfactory evaluation by the regional association, if it

is a state, municipal, or incorporated private institution not operated for profit, devoted to and offering at least 2 years of higher education at the undergraduate level or 1 year at the graduate level, with an enrollment sufficiently large to make possible the continuance of a cohesive and well-planned program; operating under legal authority granted by the state or national government, granting its degrees or diplomas by virtue of that authority, having already granted degrees or diplomas to one or more graduating classes.

PROFESSIONAL ACCREDITING AGENCIES

For each of the following there is at least one active, nationally recognized professional accrediting organization: Anesthesia, architecture, Bible, business, chemistry, chiropody, dentistry, engineering, forestry, journalism, law, library science, medicine, music, nursing, optometry, osteopathy, pharmacy, public health, religious education, social work, teacher education, theology, and veterinary medicine.* These organizations formulate criteria for professional education and publish lists of those institutions whose programs are adjudged to be worthy of approval. Since the publication of the 1952 edition of *Accredited Higher Institutions* the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists and the American Association of Schools of Religious Education have been added to the list of nationally recognized professional accrediting agencies.

The voluntary accrediting organizations, regional and nationwide, have no legal control over institutions of higher education. They merely promulgate standards of quality of criteria of institutional excellence and approve or admit to membership the institutions that meet those standards or criteria. The only power that the accrediting organizations have is that of giving publicity to

the lists of institutions they have accredited. Inclusion on the approved list of a nationally recognized accrediting organization is generally accepted as the most significant available indication of institutional quality.

NATIONAL COMMISSION ON ACCREDITING

With the growth in number and in influence of accrediting agencies, institutions of higher education have found themselves increasingly subject to a variety of external pressures, conflicting demands, and disproportionate expenditures. Efforts to eliminate the objectionable practices and policies of the accrediting agencies and at the same time to preserve their contributions to higher education have led to the establishment of the National Commission on Accrediting. The Commission has constituent members consisting of the American Association of Junior Colleges, the Association of American Colleges, the Association of American Universities, the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities, the Association of Teacher Education Institutions, the Association of Urban Universities, and the National Association of State Universities. Colleges and universities belonging to any of the associations named as constituent members are eligible for institutional membership.

The Commission does not accredit institutions of higher education but it does recommend to member institutions those accrediting bodies which it considers worthy of recognition. Its responsibilities as set forth in its constitution (adopted March 4, 1950) are: (1) to study and investigate present accrediting practices with a view to establishing satisfactory standards, procedures, and principles of accrediting, to correct abuses, and to support the freedom and integrity of member institutions; (2) to define the accrediting responsibility of the several agencies; (3) to prepare and distribute a list of accrediting agencies whose policies and procedures are acceptable to the Commission; (4) to coordinate the activities of the approved accrediting agencies in order to avoid duplication and overlapping of functions and to reduce costs; (5) to cooperate with foundations, agencies of government, and educational organizations in matters of joint interest in the field of accrediting; (6) to establish, promote, or direct research programs for the purpose of improving methods and techniques of accrediting; (7) to collect and publish information on higher education pertinent to accrediting; (8) to establish a method or procedure whereby member institutions may present grievances regarding actions of accrediting agencies; and (9) to study, review, and make recommendations regarding State and Federal

legislation and rulings involving accrediting as well as the legal status and powers of accrediting agencies.

ORGANIZATION OF THIS BULLETIN

The material presented in this bulletin is divided into three parts. Part I contains a compilation of institutions accredited by the six regional associations. Part II contains lists of professional and technical schools, some or all the units of which are accredited by or hold membership in the appropriate organization. Part III furnishes information about accreditation at the State level.

INSTITUTIONS BY STATES

Following the listing of each institution, the date is given of its initial accreditation as reported in each association's current list. Where this date is enclosed in parentheses, it represents accreditation prior to that reported by the agency now responsible for accrediting in the area in which the institution is located. The Western College Association, for example, assumed an accrediting function in 1948 and included on its original list institutions already accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools and institutions which were either members of or approved by the Association of American Universities.

The single date does not reflect changes in the accredited status of an institution but merely the date of initial accrediting as furnished in current reports. The North Central Association and the Northwest Association furnish the date of initial accreditation and the date of accreditation for the present status of an institution. The Middle States Association and the New England Association furnish the date of original accreditation and the date of the most recent reaffirmation of accreditation as a result of reevaluation of the institution concerned. The Southern Association furnishes a single date for each institution. The current list supplied by the Western Association includes no dates, but these are available for the brief period since the organization assumed responsibility for accrediting.

PART III

Institutions of Higher Education Accredited and Approved by State Departments of Education, State Accrediting Commissions, and State Universities

Previous editions of this publication have reported accreditation of institutions of higher education by State departments of education for (1) general collegiate purposes and (2) teacher education purposes, and by State universities for (1) unconditional admission to graduate school, (2) full transfer credit, and (3) partial transfer credit. Because of some confusion resulting from differing interpretations of such phrases as "general collegiate purposes" and "unconditional admission to graduate school," letters to chief State school officers and State university presidents for information to be included in the current edition avoided language likely to influence reporting of a pattern not conforming to actual practice.

All State departments of education and State universities were asked to furnish a statement of the policies followed in performing the accrediting function and a current list of the institutions accredited. In those States in which commissions are responsible for accrediting higher institutions, information was obtained from appropriate officials.

The term most frequently reported by State departments to describe their accrediting function is *approve*. Other designations reported are: *Accredit, admit to membership, certify, classify, license, recognize, and register*. Practice varies even more widely, different labels referring to practices which are very similar and identical terminology referring to practices lacking in comparability.

In view of the variations in terminology and in procedure, State department of education and State accrediting commission officials were requested to report as accreditation, regardless of the word used, that procedure which includes the establishment of criteria, the inspection of institutions by competent authorities, the publication of a list of institutions meeting the criteria, and periodic reviews to determine whether institutions continue to qualify as institutions of higher education. Such functions as approval or recognition of an institution for obtaining a charter, for training veterans, or for admitting foreign students were not to be reported as accreditation. Presidents of State universities were instructed not to report as accreditation the practices they follow in the

acceptance of transfer credit for work done at colleges and universities within the State.

Half of the State departments of education reported accreditation or approval of institutions for teacher education purposes. More than two-thirds of the State universities reported no responsibility, either by law or by custom, for accrediting collegiate institutions within the State. A summary of the responsibilities reported is given in the accompanying table.

Institutions listed in Parts I and II as accredited by nationally recognized accrediting agencies are not included in this section. Most of those institutions are included on State lists where State accrediting is done. It seemed unnecessary to include them here a second time. Lists of institutions accredited or approved by State departments of education for the preparation of teachers or for general purposes are readily available from the respective departments.

ALABAMA

The State Department of Education in Alabama does not accredit higher institutions. It accepts the accreditation of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as the basis for its approval of institutions of higher education for teacher preparation. The institutions accredited by the Southern Association which wish to train teachers submit their programs to the Department for approval. Some institutions are approved for the training of teachers in certain fields while other institutions are approved for the training of teachers in other areas. These institutions make various types of reports about their programs and are visited from time to time by members of the Department staff.

ARIZONA

There are seven institutions of higher education in Arizona. These include two junior colleges, two State colleges, one denominational college, an institution for foreign trade, and the University of Arizona. The denominational college, Grand Canyon College, is accredited by the State Board of Education for the preparation of elementary teachers.

The University of Arizona, by custom rather than by legal provision, has been regarded as an accrediting agency in the State. The University has accredited the work of the following institutions which are not accredited by nationally recognized accrediting agencies:

ARKANSAS

The State Board of Education is legally responsible for the accreditation of institutions of higher education in Arkansas. This function has been delegated to the Division of Instructional Services under the direction of an Assistant Commissioner of Education. CALIFORNIA

The California State Board of Education accredits institutions of higher learning for the education of teachers. The Committee on Accreditation of the State Board works in close cooperation with the Western College Association, and joint procedures and standards for accreditation have been developed. All the institutions accredited for teacher education by the State Board have regional accreditation.

Accreditation of public and private junior colleges in California is conducted by the Western College Association.

COLORADO

The Colorado Department of Education certifies that public junior colleges have qualified according to law for participation under the State Finance Act. As yet no specific standards or criteria have been established, and no well-defined procedure for accreditation purposes has been formulated. These are being developed cooperatively with the colleges themselves, and the program in the years ahead will become somewhat more formalized.

CONNECTICUT

The State Board of Education is legally authorized to license and to accredit institutions of higher learning in Connecticut. *Licensure* is the initial step required by law of all new educational institutions seeking the authority to confer collegiate degrees. A license is granted only to an institution that can present sufficient evidence that before the expiration of 2 years the minimal standards of the State Board of Education shall have been met. The State Board of Education will accredit any Connecticut university, college, junior college, or institution of similar character and purpose that is judged to have institutional excellence according to criteria established by the Board.

During the first 12 years of an institution's existence it is subject to periodic inspection by the duly authorized agents of the State Board of Education for purposes of accreditation. After the expiration of 12 continuous years of "term accreditation," the institution is usually given "continuing accreditation."

INDIANA

The responsibility for accrediting institutions of higher education for teacher-training service is vested in a Commission of the Indiana State Board of Education designated as the Commission on Teacher Training and Licensing. This Commission is composed of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and six members appointed by the Governor. Its duties are largely legislative. The actual administration of certification and accreditation rests with a Teacher Training and Licensing Division, the personnel of which is designated by the Commission.

An institution is said to have *standard* accreditation if it has qualified for membership in a nationally recognized accrediting association or maintains standards equal to those of member institutions. The accreditation is *annual*

If the institution fails to meet the requirements for standard accreditation but is approved by the Teacher Training and Licensing Division of Indiana to offer one or more curriculums for the preparation of teachers and administrators. KANSAS

The Kansas State Department of Public Instruction is specifically charged with the responsibility for accrediting institutions of higher education for purposes of teacher education. The Department also administers criteria for accrediting junior colleges which tend to encourage improvement of existing junior college programs and to characterize a minimum program which must be met and maintained by a junior college. Although the University of Kansas is not legally the agency responsible for accrediting institutions of higher education within the State, the University does serve as an accrediting organization. The situation results from two causes. When there is question outside the State about the standing of graduates of Kansas colleges, the matter is referred to the University, whose practice and evaluations are used to establish any standing in question. The State Department of Public Instruction works closely with the University in deciding matters of accreditation as far as service in the public schools is concerned, and thus the standing of Kansas colleges in this area is in practice the concern of the University.

The Senate Committee on Relations with Four-Year Institutions, through which the University deals with accreditation, has long maintained the policy that Kansas colleges approved by the North Central Association are automatically recognized by the University, but that institutions not on the North Central list must be inspected and evaluated by the University annually. Three institutions, not accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency, are partly accredited (subject to annual inspection) by the University of Kansas. They are:

KENTUCKY

The State Department of Education is responsible for the accreditation of teacher education institutions in the State which have not been accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. Junior colleges offering partial teacher education programs are not subject to National Council accreditation. All junior colleges are in the process of being evaluated by the State Department.

MASSACHUSETTS

The Massachusetts Department of Education has no legal authority to accredit or to approve institutions of higher education. Until the enactment of chapter 549 of the acts of 1943, as amended, the Massachusetts General Court granted the right to certain institutions to grant degrees and to use the words "college," "junior college," or "university," as part of the name of the institution. The above-mentioned chapter 549 of the acts of 1943 delegated the authority to approve or disapprove petitions for degree-granting privileges and the right to use the words "college," "junior college," or "university" as part of the name of an institution to the Board of Collegiate Authority. The Board of Collegiate Authority is not an accrediting agency.

There are thirteen institutions which come under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education. The Board has taken the position that these institutions are approved or accredited by the Board and has so reported them. MISSOURI

The University of Missouri, through its Committee on Accredited Schools and Colleges, accredits public and non-public junior colleges seeking accreditation with the University for purposes of admission or advanced standing. A committee from the University faculty visits the institution seeking accreditation for an inspection of facilities and an examination of the administration, instruction, finances, records, and other matters deemed pertinent. No junior college is accredited until the report of the Visiting Committee has been considered favorably by the University's Committee on Accredited Schools and Colleges. Annual reports are required of all accredited junior colleges, and the Visiting Committee makes periodic inspections. MONTANA

The Montana State Board of Education grants accreditation to those applicant institutions of higher education which meet adequately the purpose for which they are intended. These include all units of the Montana University System, private colleges, and junior colleges. After accreditation has been granted, the institutions are subject to review from time to time, as changes occur in the institutions, or additions are made thereto. The State Board of Education has full authority over the units of the Montana University system. All the institutions accredited by the State Board have regional accreditation.

The Nebraska State Department of Education is authorized by law to approve teacher-training institutions to determine their qualifications for making recommendations for the issuance of teaching certificates. The Department also accredits junior and community colleges. The criteria for junior or community colleges were prepared by the Accreditation Committee of the Nebraska Association of Junior Colleges and officially approved and adopted by the Association in December 1950. NEVADA

The State Department of Education has been authorized under recent legislation to accredit all private educational institutions within the State. The duties of the State educational agency as specified in the law are to: formulate standards for licensure; maintain a list of schools licensed and make such list available for the information of the public; provide for periodic inspection of all schools licensed under the provisions of the act; and employ such personnel as is necessary to carry out the provisions of the act.

The State educational agency has power to revoke the license of any school subject to the provisions of the act if it finds that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of the act or any of the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder; has knowingly presented to the State educational agency false or misleading information leading to licensure; has failed or refused to permit authorized representatives of the State educational agency to inspect the school, or has refused to make available to them at any time upon request full information pertaining to matters within the purview of the State agency under the provisions of the act; or has perpetrated or committed fraud or deceit in advertising the school or in presenting to prospective students written or oral information relating to the school, to employment opportunities, or to opportunities for enrollment in other institutions upon completion of the instruction offered in said school.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

The State Board of Education has the responsibility for accrediting teacher-training colleges and departments of education in New Hampshire. The Board has also established criteria and has accredited a junior college which requested State accreditation. The Department of Education arranges for a visiting committee to make an evaluation of an institution or department upon the institution's request. The Department reserves the right to make evaluations as necessary after the institution has once been accredited. All institutions of higher education in the State are accredited by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools except the two State-operated technical institutes. NEW JERSEY

The State Board of Education is authorized by statute to approve institutions of higher education within the State. Any school district which proposes to organize a junior college or any private corporation which proposes to organize a junior college, college, or professional school, under provisions of existing laws, may be licensed to conduct business provided it demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Board that it can within a reasonable time attain fully the official standards established for the type of institution concerned. Any license granted by the Board to operate an educational institution shall be for a definite period of years determined by the Board. At the expiration of this period, such license may be renewed for a specified period or revoked at the discretion of the Board. NEW YORK

The accrediting activities of the State Education Department are vested in the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York, established by an act of the legislature in 1784. The Regents have authority to incorporate colleges, are empowered and required to visit and to inspect them, and are responsible for the registration, or approval, of curriculums in all institutions of higher education within the State.

The authority of the Regents to register curriculums of institutions of higher education is found in the Education Law of the State. This authority is implemented by the Regents Rules and the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education. The registration process is the official system of State approval of curriculums offered by higher institutions and is equivalent to accreditation as conducted by other similar agencies.

Minimum standards for the registration of curriculums in higher educational institutions are contained in the Regulations of the Commissioner. Although these Regulations set forth in detail the requirements for registration, the Department of Education does not believe that institutions should conform to any standard type of pattern. Curricular experimentation under proper safeguards is encouraged, and institutions are urged to develop programs and facilities which exceed the established minimums.

The accrediting activities of the State Education Department, carried on primarily to assure a well-qualified group to provide essential professional services within the State, have formed also the basis for a legal recognition of college credentials and the transfer of credit between institutions.

PUERTO RICO

The Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools serves as the agent of the University of Puerto Rico in evaluating institutions which apply for accreditation by the Superior Educational Council of Puerto Rico. The Middle States Association is authorized to conduct evaluations under customary

Middle States procedures, modified as necessary to suit local conditions, and to furnish the Chancellor of the University background data and basis for recommendations to the Superior Educational Council, which Council makes the accreditation decision. The institutions of higher education in Puerto Rico which are accredited by the University are also accredited by the Middle States Association.

RHODE ISLAND

The Rhode Island State Board of Higher Education is responsible for the approval of applications of institutions of higher education for charters. The Board does not function as an accrediting agency.

SOUTH CAROLINA

Each senior college in the State engaged in teacher education must submit its teacher education program to the State Board of Education for approval. The Board accredits colleges for the training of teachers. The institutions so accredited, exclusive of those accredited by nationally recognized accrediting agencies, are:

SOUTH DAKOTA

The University of South Dakota, on the basis of policies and standards adopted by the General Faculty of the University on October 1, 1951, accredits both 4-year institutions of higher education and junior colleges within the State. Only provisional accreditation is given previous to the graduation of a class, some members of which must have completed the full program in the institution under consideration. Accreditation of 4-year institutions by the University is viewed as temporary, the goal being accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. TENNESSEE

The State Board of Education is charged by statute with the responsibilities of establishing a system for the certification of teachers and maintaining a list of approved teacher-preparing institutions. The Board has the legal right and the moral obligation to inspect or examine, and to evaluate on the basis of standards adopted, any institution requesting approval for teacher preparation purposes or retention on the official list of institutions so approved. The Board may approve for the education of teachers any institution of higher education in the State which, in its judgment, meets the adopted standards, or may refuse to approve any such institution which, in its judgment, fails to meet the standards. The Board is the court of last appeal regarding whether or not it accepts or rejects any institution for approval as a teacher preparation agency. On May 8, 1963, the State Board of Education adopted the standards and procedures now in use. The institutions

The University of Tennessee is not legally constituted as the accrediting agency for institutions of higher education in the State. By custom, however, it does perform an accrediting function according to the following procedure: Whenever an institution which does not belong to a regional accrediting association desires accreditation by the University, the University Committee on Admissions and Advanced Standing, or some of its representatives, visit the institution concerned and decide what credit, if any, will be allowed, and under what conditions.

The members of the visiting committee are selected with regard to their competencies relative to the characteristics of the institution under consideration. Accreditation may be granted in full for all courses offered by the institution or accreditation may be limited to certain departments or to a limited number of hours. In most cases when accreditation is granted, it is done on a tentative basis, pending the successful completion of a quarter or more of work in residence at the University by a student transferring from the institution under consideration.

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UTAH

The State Department of Public Instruction accredits colleges and universities for the training of teachers and junior colleges for the first two years of training. All the institutions accredited by the Department are accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools.

VERMONT

The State Board of Education is responsible for the approval of corporations seeking authority to confer degrees. The Board conducts an inquiry and issues, or withholds, a certificate approving the educational standing and financial status of the corporation, transmitting its findings to the Secretary of State. The criteria established by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for colleges and junior colleges are used as a guide

in determining approval. There is no statute in Vermont that would give the Department any authority to make periodic inspections.

VIRGINIA

The Virginia State Board of Education accredits higher institutions for the purpose of reassuring the people in regard to the quality of education offered. It is the policy of the State Board of Education to appoint a committee of about five persons who are familiar with higher institutions to study the institution requesting approval in the light of accrediting standards of the State and of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and in the light of the best judgment of the members of the committee.
