## FOREWORD

**T**HIS BULLETIN is published as a sequel to Bulletin 1937, No. 22, which listed the publications of the Office of Education from 1910 to 1937 and of the former Federal Board for Vocational Education from 1917 to 1933. Earlier lists of Office of Education publications appeared in 1910 (Bulletin No. 3) and in 1908 (Bulletin No. 2).

The dissemination of information about education has been a major responsibility of the Office of Education ever since it was created as the Department of Education at the second session of the 39th Congress by an act approved March 2, 1867, which stated (Public Laws of the United States of America, Ch. 158, Vol. 14) :

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that there shall be established, at the city of Washington, a department of education, for the purpose of collecting such statistics and facts as shall show the condition and progress of education in the several States and Territories, and of diffusing such information respecting the organization and management of schools and school systems, and methods of teaching, as shall aid the people of the United States in the establishment and maintenance of efficient school systems, and otherwise promote the cause of education throughout the country.

The Department of Education was changed to a bureau in the Department of the Interior in 1869. In 1888 the Bureau reported on the number of publications that had been issued up to that time: 17 annual reports, 7 special reports on subjects pertinent to the times, 76 circulars of information on important questions of educational work or history, and 38 bulletins on matters of current educational interest. The present list, covering roughly another 20-year period, includes 425 circulars, 377 bulletins, and numerous other series.



It is hoped that this publication will be helpful to persons interested in educational research and other reports of Office of Education activities in the past 22 years. In addition to the numerical listing, indexes are included by author, subject, and title to make material readily available for reference. Although all but the most recent titles are now out of print, copies of many of the publications can be found in libraries and educational institutions. This list should not be used in ordering publications. A catalog of current publications may be requested from the Publications Inquiry Unit of the Office of Education.
