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Introduction to Student Access Programs

The Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) operates three Student Access Programs that together saved over 45,000 students more than \$460 million in AY 2020-21. Each program supports one of three educational levels: undergraduate, graduate, and professional healthcare studies. Details that govern each program vary, but all operate to lower the cost of tuition.

- ► Students gain from increased educational choices and tuition savings.
- ► Schools gain by optimizing enrollments.
- ➤ States gain by growing the skills of those they serve strengthening their workforce.
- ► It's a true "triple-win."

The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) – the nation's largest regional tuition-savings program – is celebrating its 33rd year. The program allows students from a WICHE state or territory to enroll in participating two- or four-year public colleges or universities located in another WICHE state or territory and pay reduced tuition. Students can choose from hundreds of majors at more than 160 institutions. Students also pay no more than 150 percent of that school's *resident* tuition (often much less than the nonresident tuition they'd normally pay).

The Western Regional Graduate Program (WRGP) allows graduate certificate, master's, and Ph.D. students who are residents of WICHE states and territories to affordably enroll in more than 1,350 graduate programs at 60 public institutions in the West. Participating students can enroll as nonresidents, but only pay up to 150 percent of resident tuition, though the majority of WRGP institutions charge students resident tuition. A WRGP student typically pays about half of what they would have had to pay as a nonresident.

Through the **Professional Student Exchange Program** (**PSEP**), students from Western states and territories can pursue careers in 10 health fields, ranging from optometry to dentistry to veterinary medicine. They may enroll in participating programs across state lines, receiving substantial tuition support from their home state or territory. These high-demand professionals are vitally important, especially in underserved rural areas of the West. Educating more of them is crucial. Since it doesn't make good fiscal sense for less populated states and territories to create their own programs in every healthcare field, WICHE reduces the financial strain for students pursuing their professional healthcare degrees.

WUE and WRGP Savings Finders

WICHE makes it easy for students to find information about institutions participating in two tuition-savings programs: the Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) and the Western Regional Graduate Program (WRGP). Using the online Savings Finder search portals, prospective students can refine their college searches by major, degree type, eligibility requirements, online course availability, and other filter criteria. And admissions, recruitment, and enrollment managers at WICHE partner institutions use the Savings Finders to connect with prospective students and inform them about the many affordable options they offer to nonresident students from other WICHE member states.

The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) – the nation's largest regional tuition-savings program – allows students from a WICHE state or territory to enroll in participating two- or four-year public colleges or universities located in another WICHE state or territory at a discounted tuition rate. Students can choose from over 160 participating WUE institutions that offer hundreds of

majors and pay no more than 150 percent of that school's *resident* tuition.

In academic year (AY) 2020-21, over 42,000 WUE students and their families saved nearly \$412 million in tuition.

Despite the unprecedented challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic brought upon higher education, WUE enrollment

dropped only slightly in AY 2020-21 – just 0.1 percent. However, in the five years prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, WUE enrollments grew an average of 4.4 percent per year (from AY 2015-2019).

The significant savings WUE offers Western students is just one benefit of WUE. Some students can gain affordable access to majors not offered in their home state. For most students and their families, when varying tuitions and cost-of-living are factored in, WUE makes out-of-state study more affordable than in-state study.

Most WUE institutions make all or most majors available at the WUE rate, but some may exclude select high-demand majors. Transfer students can also qualify for the WUE rate at nearly all participating institutions. And though institutions may choose to set more stringent admissions standards for WUE students, many award the WUE rate to all nonresident WICHE-region applicants who would qualify

under normal admissions criteria.

Western states also benefit greatly from their public colleges and universities' participation in WUE. WUE helps these schools meet their recruitment and enrollment goals. WUE schools determine their WUE admissions requirements and which majors are WUE-eligible. Students apply directly to their preferred WUE institution(s). Some graduates end up staying in the

state where they studied – a bonus for states seeking to bolster and diversify their college-educated workforce. For states with more demand for public higher education than capacity, WUE serves as an effective relief valve, allowing their residents access to a postsecondary education without having to entirely bear the financial burden of increasing capacity at home.



Western Regional Graduate Program (WRGP)

The Western Regional Graduate Program (WRGP) allows students who are residents of WICHE states and territories to affordably enroll in more than 1,350 graduate programs (graduate certificate, master's, and Ph.D. levels) at 60 public universities in the West.

Through WRGP, students enroll in participating schools as nonresidents, yet pay no more than 150 percent of resident tuition. Nonresident applicants apply directly to a participating institution's school of graduate studies to apply for the WRGP discount – often receiving tuition savings that generally exceed 50 percent.

In AY 2020-21, 2,441 students saved nearly \$35 million in tuition through WRGP. This marks a WRGP enrollment increase of 28 percent from the prior academic year.

Participating public universities in WICHE member states and territories also benefit from WRGP. The program helps attract and incentivize a broader and more diverse pool of students to pursue varied disciplines at their public institutions. WRGP allows residents of WICHE member states and territories


to take advantage of niche programs regionwide without having to pay nonresident tuition premiums. During a time of significant budget cuts triggered by the pandemic (when some universities are considering eliminating under-enrolled graduate programs), WRGP and regional sharing of limited higher education resources is more important than ever.

The pandemic has underscored the need for professionals in high-demand fields, including instructional design, supply chain management, cybersecurity, health care, and more. WRGP remains a noteworthy option for students pursuing advanced degrees in high-need fields, particularly for healthcare related degrees not offered through WICHE's Professional Student Exchange Program (PSEP). As an added plus, a growing number of WRGP programs are offered online, enabling place-bound students to grow their educational credentials.

Professional Student Exchange Program (PSEP)

The global COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the need for health professionals across a range of fields. Underserved urban and rural communities alike are facing shortages of practitioners. The Professional Student Exchange Program (PSEP) has been a critically important mechanism for Western states to increase the supply of physicians, dentists, optometrists, veterinarians, and other healthcare professionals since the early 1950s.

Through PSEP, students from Western states and territories can pursue careers in 10 health fields and may enroll in participating programs across state lines, receiving substantial tuition support from their home state or territory. This enables aspiring health professionals to lower their tuition costs and have a better chance of reducing their overall student debt loads.

For nearly 70 years, WICHE member states have supported the education of 15,450 Western residents with affordable access to professional healthcare degrees through PSEP. In AY 2020-21, 10 WICHE states and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands invested nearly \$14 million to

grow their healthcare workforce by reducing the educational costs of almost 600 students. More than 130 accredited programs are offered through PSEP at 60 institutions. Participating healthcare programs benefit from the geographic, economic, and demographic diversity that PSEP students bring to their classrooms.


Thanks to PSEP, a student can save between \$33,000 and \$130,000+ on tuition over the lifespan of a professional health degree program, depending on the field of study. This reduced fiscal strain enables students to afford to work in rural areas that typically have lower salaries compared to urban areas, or to pursue professional options that are less lucrative but sorely needed. Most states and territories that support PSEP students require graduates to return home and practice for up to four years, ensuring that the state's investment supports the healthcare professions its residents need most.

At the supporting states' request, WICHE continues to administer these legacy arrangements.



"I grew up in a copper mining town known to be "a mile high and a mile deep." In its heyday, Butte had swelled to 150,000, but by the time I was growing up, it had collapsed into a small, impoverished town defined by a Superfund waste site, urban decay, and a raging meth epidemic. I left Butte for college, but struggled during that first year, having come from an environment that did not require much in terms of academic rigor. That first summer, I returned home and set off for the mines myself. I am descended from a long line of blue-collar workers, and I, too, was now working in the same mine that my grandfather had worked to feed my mother and her nine siblings, the mine in which my grandfather had watched his brother die.

After experiencing but a fraction of what my forefathers had experienced in that mine, I returned to college reinvigorated to pursue a dream I had formerly regarded as unachievable: to become a physician. The motivation I found following my experience underground drove me to pursue academic excellence and, after completing my undergraduate studies and being accepted at several medical schools, I faced yet another challenge: the staggering financial cost of medical education.

By subsidizing my loans to an in-state tuition rate, PSEP made it possible for me to pursue my interest in allopathic medicine at the institution of my choosing. Programs like PSEP serve the ever-important role of ensuring that students who have earned admission to an allopathic or osteopathic medical school are allowed the opportunity to pursue their dreams with a reduced financial burden. This is especially important for members of impoverished communities or those without significant financial stability. I will be forever grateful for the opportunities afforded me through this program."

"I worked for the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless for four years at the front desk of the Stout Street Health Center, and then as a patient navigator in the Stout Street Eye Clinic. My work there inspired me take night and weekend classes to attain the prerequisites necessary to apply to optometry school. Cost is a huge barrier, as the average optometrist graduates with over \$175,000 in debt. Knowing that Colorado provides financial support for optometry studies through WICHE'S PSEP solidified my decision to go back to school in the first place.

When I graduate, I hope to return to the Stout Street Eye Clinic and become their first full-time eyecare provider. If that's not possible, I'd love to work in another community-health setting with other underserved communities, such as Indian Health Services. With Colorado having defrayed a significant portion of the cost of my professional education through WICHE's PSEP, I'll be in a much better financial position to practice in a community health setting."

PSEP Graduate Return Rates, AY 2007-2016


Because states supporting students through PSEP want their investments to bolster their health care workforces, every five years they calculate the percentage of PSEP graduates who return home to serve their communities. Return rates for students who graduated between AY 2007 and AY 2016 held relatively steady compared to the prior reporting period. The average student-return rate for PSEP states is now 67 percent.

Seven states supporting PSEP students – Arizona, Colorado, Hawaiʻi, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, and Wyoming – now require graduates to return home to practice or reimburse funds plus interest paid by states on their behalf. Hawaiʻi, North Dakota, and Wyoming recently implemented this requirement, known as "service payback," so they were not included among service-payback states in this cycle's calculations.

WICHE's service-payback states get higher returns on investment from PSEP participation, averaging an 83 percent return rate. Washington required its graduates to return when it was still using the program through 2014, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands will require service payback for its future PSEP graduates.

"Honor-system" states (Alaska, Montana, and Utah) do not contractually require service payback, and their average return rate is 51 percent. Hawai'i, North Dakota, and Wyoming were included in this group for the most recent year statistics, but WICHE anticipates their return rates will improve markedly in future reporting cycles due to their switch to a service-payback model. Idaho was an "honor state" when it was using the program through 2013.

WICHE'S Projections of High School Graduates

In the 10th edition of *Knocking at the College Door: Projections of High School Graduates*, released in December 2020, WICHE discusses how COVID-19 impacts may factor somewhat in the future number of graduates. But, a coming trend of fewer graduates is solidly predicted by underlying youth population changes – the nation and the West could produce 8 to 10 percent fewer graduates from 2025 to 2037, even if high graduation rates of recent years persist and classes continue to diversify.
