Now more than two years into the public health crisis, our ways of life and our pathways forward have shifted. The impacts of the pandemic...



During the first two years of the pandemic, COVID-19 claimed the lives of more than 13.000 Coloradans. This number includes thousands of people who were undoubtedly beloved by the children in their lives: parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, child care providers, teachers and mentors. As of this writing in March 2022, more than 265,000 Colorado kids ages birth to 19 have tested positive for COVID-19. More than 2,200 have been hospitalized, and 31 Colorado children have tragically lost their lives to the virus, leaving behind shattered families and loved ones.²

These numbers alone are staggering, but the pandemic's true toll on Colorado kids stretches much further. Since the pandemic began, it has brought with it widespread challenges to families' economic security, mental health, and access to learning opportunities. Nearly half of all Colorado households with children have lost employment income at some point since March 2020. Hundreds of thousands of kids have experienced massive disruptions to their daily routines and their education. Emergency room visits for mental health crises have been on the rise. Thousands of children missed out on the early learning opportunities they would have otherwise received.

INTRODUCTION



Across nearly every measure of child and family well-being, one thing is clear: kids are still feeling the disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic, more than two years after the virus first appeared in Colorado. Our state must increase its investments in kids and families to buffer the potential long-term effects of the upheaval they have experienced. Many of the conditions kids experienced during the pandemic may have been temporary. However, the impacts will be lifelong unless we support children, youth and families in the years ahead.

Amid all the tragedy, grief and hardship of the pandemic, however, we also learned valuable lessons. Perhaps the most critical lesson is this: policy change can make an enormous difference in the lives of our children and families. We saw countless examples of how powerful policy change can be throughout the pandemic. In the midst of extreme economic uncertainty, an expanded Child Tax Credit at the federal level lifted nearly 4 million U.S. children out of poverty. Changes to the Medicaid program helped prevent thousands of Colorado kids from losing their health insurance coverage throughout the public health emergency. Universal free school meals ensured fewer children went hungry, even when their families were facing devastating levels of economic hardship. And stabilization funding for child care providers was a critical lifeline during an economically challenging time. Providers across the state were able to keep their doors open, allowing parents to continue to work while knowing their children were safe and supported.

The pandemic has made it clearer than ever that even when we are up against seemingly insurmountable barriers, we can improve conditions for kids when we prioritize their well-being in policy decisions. Thousands of Coloradans—mothers, fathers, grandparents, child care or health care providers, teachers, policymakers and others—have worked throughout the pandemic to do just that. We hope that the data included in this 2022 KIDS COUNT in Colorado! report will serve as a useful tool to continue making Colorado a better place to be a kid, especially in the aftermath of COVID-19.

A Note on the 2022 KIDS COUNT Report

Many of the foundational indicators historically included in KIDS COUNT, such as child poverty rates, uninsured rates, preschool enrollment and others, come from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS). Although the Census Bureau continued conducting this survey in 2020, disruptions to the survey's operations caused by the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in data that did not meet the Census Bureau's quality standards. Households that responded to the 2020 American Community Survey had very different characteristics than those who did not respond. Those who responded tended to have higher incomes, higher levels of education, and were more likely to be U.S. citizens than those that did not respond to the survey. These discrepancies suggest that the 2020 survey did not adequately capture the experiences of many Americans, particularly those who live in lower income households, those with fewer years of education, and those born outside the United States, among other groups.

In response to these data quality challenges, the Census Bureau used a new methodology to account for the bias in response patterns and created experimental estimates for 2020. These experimental estimates are not comparable to previous years of data, limiting our ability to track trends in child poverty, uninsured rates and other important measures of child well-being. The experimental estimates also cover a much more limited range of topics than a typical ACS release and are only available for the nation, states and the District of Columbia. These ACS data constraints will have implications for child advocates and policymakers hoping to understand how kids fared during the first year of the pandemic, particularly at the local level.

The 2022 KIDS COUNT in Colorado! report includes some of these experimental estimates, where available, and in each instance notes that they are not comparable to previous years of ACS data. 
THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC'S ONGOING ECONOMIC IMPACTS

More than two years after the pandemic's onset, economic challenges are still widespread among Colorado's households with children. The initial economic shock of the COVID-19 crisis has receded, but indicators point to ongoing struggles for Colorado families.


Colorado's unemployment rate soared in the first few months of the pandemic, as stay-at-home orders attempted to slow the spread of COVID-19 and many businesses closed temporarily. By April 2020, nearly one in eight Coloradans was out of work.³ By December 2021, the state-level unemployment rate had steadily fallen from that peak, yet was still 2 percentage points higher than the pre-pandemic level. All 64 counties in Colorado saw their unemployment rates increase in the initial months of the pandemic. As of November 2021, local unemployment rates remained higher than their pre-COVID levels in all but seven counties across the state.4

Colorado's economy has not yet fully recovered from the impacts of the pandemic, and many families are still struggling to make ends meet. After two years of pandemic-related disruptions, data from the U.S. Census Bureau's Household Pulse Survey show that tens of thousands of Colorado households with children still face affordability challenges when it comes to accessing essentials like food, medical care or housing.



CHILD POVERTY

The pandemic's impact on the number of Colorado children living in poverty is currently unclear due to data collection disruptions caused by the public health crisis. These disruptions resulted in 2020 child poverty estimates that are incomparable to data from previous years. Prior to the pandemic, Colorado's child poverty rate had reached a nearly 20-year-low of 11% in 2019, after falling steadily each year since 2012.5 Experimental data from the U.S. Census Bureau estimate that 10% of Colorado kids experienced poverty in 2020 (more than 128,000 children).6 Given the experimental nature of the 2020 estimate and the loss of comparability across years, it is unclear whether child poverty in Colorado rose or fell since 2019.




FAMILY ECONOMIC SECURITY

Colorado's families did not enter into the significant disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic with the same chances at economic security. For many years, poverty rates in our state have varied widely based on a child's race/ethnicity and the community in which they live. A history of policies and practices that have disadvantaged our state's families of color meant that in the years leading up to the pandemic, children of color were significantly more likely to experience poverty compared to white children. This injustice is likely to have exacerbated the financial impacts of the last two years on Colorado's children of color.

PERCENT OF COLORADO CHILDREN LIVING IN POVERTY BY RACE/ETHNICITY, 2016—2020



HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS

A safe and consistent place to call home has always been a foundational element of child well-being. Yet for many Colorado families over the past two years, the financial disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic have threatened their confidence in making housing payments. Since spring 2020, between 9% and 22% of Colorado's households with children have reported uncertainty about whether they could pay their rent or mortgage on time. The share of households reporting this significant stressor peaked in the summer months of 2020 at 22%. As of 2021 and early 2022, some families have experienced relief, but there are still too many households with children facing this uncertainty.



National data from 2020 indicate that households with low incomes and households of color were more likely to experience a loss of income and report being behind on their rent or mortgage.^{8,9} However, these indicators alone fail to fully capture the extent of financial stress to households. To afford housing payments and other necessities, new research indicates that renters with low incomes and renters of color were more likely to turn to savings, credit, and borrowing from family and friends, indicating the economic disruptions related to housing reverberated throughout other areas of their lives.10

Still, the picture of housing and homelessness among Colorado children amid the pandemic remains unclear. Colorado's count of public school students experiencing homelessness fell by 28% between school years 19-20 and 20-21, in line with a significant decline nationally. Importantly, these data are likely misrepresenting current conditions. District liaisons across the U.S. who collect the data on students experiencing homelessness report this drop in identified students was due to shifts to virtual learning, which made connecting to students more difficult.¹² While some children may have been temporarily protected from homelessness due to federal and state-level eviction moratoria, student homelessness is likely to have increased overall, given evidence of the extent of the economic crisis.

Another data collection effort in this area from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which looks at shifts to sheltered families with children across calendar years, found that the number of people in families with children in Colorado shelters increased by 16% between 2020 and 2021.13 This was among the largest absolute increases across states between those years.¹⁴ Nationally, children under the age of 18 made up 60% of people experiencing sheltered homelessness in families in 2021.15

Lifting Families Out of Poverty in a Pandemic: Expanded Child Tax Credit Shows the Power of Direct Cash Assistance for Kids

Important policy changes enacted as part of pandemic relief efforts at the federal level helped buffer the impact of pervasive job and income losses due to the COVID-19 crisis. The expansion of the Child Tax Credit kept millions of U.S. children from falling into poverty during a time of widespread economic turmoil and uncertainty. In doing so, it highlighted how much progress toward family economic prosperity is possible when policymakers prioritize direct cash assistance to families with children.

The American Rescue Plan passed by Congress in March 2021 made temporary changes to the Child Tax Credit that benefitted millions of families. These changes included the following:

- increasing the amount of the credit from \$2,000 per child to \$3,600 per child for children under 6, and \$3,000 for children 6 and older;
- raising the age limit for eligible children from 16 to 17;
- providing monthly advance payments so families could access payments when they needed them;
- · making the credit fully refundable, meaning that even those who did not owe taxes could receive the full credit amount; and
- removing the minimum income requirement to receive the credit, ensuring that families with the lowest incomes, previously excluded from receiving it, could benefit.16


As of December 2021, researchers estimated the monthly advance CTC payments kept 3.7 million U.S. children out of poverty, reducing monthly child poverty in the U.S. by 30%.¹⁷ The payments also helped millions more families with children afford adequate food. Just a month and a half after the first monthly payments, the number of U.S. adults living in households with children who reported that their household did not have enough food to eat fell by one third (approximately 3.3 million fewer people).¹⁸

Expanded Child Tax Credit (CTC) payments in 2021 buffered the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. keeping 3.7 million U.S. children out of poverty in December 2021.

As of December 2021, six out of 10 Colorado households with children reported receiving a Child Tax Credit payment in the previous four weeks.¹⁹ Unlike other benefit programs such as SNAP, Medicaid or WIC, cash payments to families allow them to use the money flexibly and prioritize their most pressing needs. The most commonly reported uses of monthly CTC payments among Colorado families who reported receiving them varied slightly based on the time of year, but food, rent, utilities and clothing were consistently among the top reported uses.²⁰

FAMILY ECONOMIC SECURITY



The expanded Child Tax Credit benefits expired at the end of 2021 after Congress failed to extend them, putting an end to the monthly payments for millions of families. After payments stopped, economic hardship among families with children appeared to increase quickly. The percent of U.S. households with kids who reported difficulty paying for usual expenses jumped from 30% to 35% after payments stopped, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's Household Pulse Survey.²¹

Looking Forward: Policy Recommendations


Family economic security and prosperity is the cornerstone of child and family well-being. As we begin to respond to the impacts of pandemic disruptions for Colorado families, we must adequately support families' ability to get back on their feet, and further, to thrive.

- Make meaningful public investments in income support for families, including TANF basic cash assistance, the Child Tax Credit, and direct cash assistance. Such investments allow families to afford necessities, work and care for their children, and support families' mental health and ability to set goals, plan for their future, and build wealth.
- Ensure that policy solutions to support housing security include a focus on families with children, including solutions that allow families to live in safe, stable, affordable housing with access to resources that support avenues to home ownership.



HEALTH COVERAGE

In the years leading up to the COVID-19 pandemic, Colorado began to see its historic progress on kids' health coverage erode. After declining steadily for years and hitting a record low of 4% in 2016, the uninsured rate for Colorado kids under 19 began to climb again amid federal policy changes and harmful, racist rhetoric from the Trump administration. This environment may have dissuaded immigrant families with children, in particular, from enrolling their eligible kids in health coverage programs out of fear of facing retribution. Between 2018 and 2019, the number of uninsured children in Colorado increased by 10,000 kids—the largest single-year increase in at least a decade.²²



The 2020 uninsured rate for children is not comparable to previous years of data due to major disruptions in American Community Survey data collection during the initial months of the pandemic. However, experimental estimates released by the U.S. Census Bureau suggest that the continuous coverage requirements in Medicaid and the Child Health Plan *Plus* (CHP+) during the public health emergency (discussed in more detail below) made a difference for Colorado kids, helping them stay covered even during levels of unprecedented economic insecurity. These



experimental data estimate that 5.3% of Colorado kids lacked health insurance in 2020 (nearly 70,000 children), on par with the national average of 5.4%.²³ Detailed estimates showing uninsured rates by race/ethnicity or by family income were not published for 2020. However, pre-pandemic data showed that Black or African-American children, multiracial children and children whose families earned between 100% and 149% of the federal poverty level experienced the largest increases in their uninsured rates between 2017 and 2019.24,25


MEDICAID AND THE CHILD HEALTH PLAN PLUS (CHP+)

Medicaid and the Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+) provide health coverage for Colorado children in families earning below 260% of the federal poverty level—approximately \$72,000 for a family of four in 2022. The programs have long been critical sources of coverage for children in families with low and moderate incomes. They became even more important during the pandemic, when job losses and employment instability affected tens of thousands of Colorado families.

Between fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021, the number of Colorado kids covered by Medicaid at some point in the year increased by more than 26,000 children.²⁶ Nearly 588,000 Colorado kids ages birth through 18 (44%) were enrolled in Medicaid at some point during fiscal year 20-21.27 CHP+ insured an additional 4.5% of Colorado kids at some point during the year, accounting for more than 7,500 children.²⁸


Together, these publicly funded programs covered nearly half of Colorado's children in FY 2020-2021.29

Bevond employment instability, some of the increase in Medicaid enrollment is also likely attributable to a federal policy change in March 2020, which barred states from involuntarily unenrolling anyone from Medicaid while the public health emergency was in effect. This shift occurred in exchange for increased federal matching funds for the program. The federal public health emergency is expected to be lifted in 2022, and advocates are concerned that millions of U.S. children could suddenly lose their Medicaid coverage when this policy change occurs.³⁰



Access to Health Care

Lacking health insurance has long been a significant barrier keeping kids and families from accessing the care they need to live healthy lives. During the COVID-19 pandemic, office closures, quarantine requirements, child care challenges and fear of contracting COVID-19, among other factors, became additional obstacles for families whose kids needed care. Initial data show declines in important health services during the pandemic among families in Colorado and across the nation:







National and state-level data point to steep declines in routine, non-COVID vaccinations for children during the pandemic. These vaccines are vital in protecting children from preventable infectious diseases like measles, mumps, rubella or whooping cough, among others. In Colorado, the number of non-COVID pediatric vaccine doses administered between mid-March 2020 and mid-March 2021 was 8% lower than the same time period one year earlier.³¹

CHILD AND FAMILY HEALTH



The share of Colorado children ages birth through 18 whose parents reported their child visited a health care professional or health care facility in the past 12 months fell from 93% in 2019 to 85% in 2021, according to the 2021 Colorado Health Access Survey (CHAS).³² The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children ages 3 and older visit a health care provider for a well check at least once every year, and visits are recommended even more frequently for infants and toddlers.³³





Among U.S. parents of children under 5 surveyed by the University of Oregon's Center for Translational Neuroscience, more than one quarter (27%) reported that their child had missed a well-baby or well-child visit since the COVID-19 pandemic began.³⁴


In early 2021, 46% of Colorado birthing parents with children ages 0 to 3 reported their mental health had gotten worse since the onset of the pandemic, and 50% of those who reported wanting or needing mental health care were not able to get it.³⁵ A lack of child care was among the most common reasons parents reported they were unable to access mental health care.

CHILD AND FAMILY HEALTH

FOOD SECURITY

Consistent access to adequate amounts of nutritious foods is essential to a child's healthy development. Even prior to COVID-19, far too many Colorado children lived in families who struggled with food insecurity, which is defined as the experience of limited or uncertain access to adequate food. On average, between 2017 and 2019, 16% of Colorado kids lived in households that were food-insecure at some point during the year.³⁶

During the pandemic, policies and programs were implemented at the local, state and federal levels to fight hunger and food insecurity among families with children. The Pandemic-Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program provided temporary emergency nutrition benefits to children whose schools or child care centers were closed due to COVID-19 and whose family incomes were low enough to qualify for free or reduced-price lunch or SNAP.³⁷ Schools were also able to provide free school meals to all students, regardless of whether their family income qualified them for free or reduced-price meals.38



While these important efforts likely decreased food insecurity among some families with children, data show that struggles to afford enough food were still widespread among households with children. Throughout the pandemic, the share of Colorado households with kids where children were not eating enough because food was unaffordable ranged from 18% in June 2020 to a high of 37% in December 2021-January 2022.39 These estimates are not comparable to pre-pandemic estimates of food insecurity.

MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Nearly 18 months into the COVID-19 pandemic, the **American Academy of Pediatrics and other partners** declared children's mental health a national emergency.⁴⁰

For two years, kids and youth have navigated childhood and adolescence while also facing unprecedented social isolation, increased levels of family stress, major disruptions to typical routines and missed rites of passage. These stressors, layered atop increasing rates of mental health challenges among Colorado kids even before the COVID-19 crisis began, have contributed to what many have called a "second pandemic" of mental health struggles for young people. Colorado must ensure robust mental health support and substance abuse treatment options for kids, youth and families across settings to help them cope with the long-term impacts of the COVID-19 crisis.

Data on a number of factors related to the behavioral health of kids and teens point to a growing urgency for increased support:


Suicide rates among Colorado kids and teens were rising before the pandemic began, with teen suicide rates reaching historically high levels since 2015.



The pandemic has exacerbated already troubling trends in youth behavioral health. According to the CDC, emergency department visits for suspected suicide attempts were 50% higher among adolescent girls and 4% higher among adolescent boys in February and March 2021 than during the same time period in 2019.

The number of Colorado kids and youth who died by suicide more than doubled between 2010 and 2020.41 Nearly one in five Colorado high school students reported they had seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year as of 2019, with much higher rates reported among students who are American Indian or Alaska Native, multiracial, female or transgender.⁴²



CHILD AND FAMILY HEALTH

The share of Colorado adolescents who reported poor mental health increased significantly between 2017 and 2021.

According to the Colorado Health Access Survey, nearly 19% of Colorado adolescents ages 11 to 18 reported poor mental health in 2021, about twice the rate observed in 2017.43


Deaths due to unintentional drug overdoses among Colorado youth ages 15 to 24 skyrocketed in 2020.

Many indicators point to increased rates of substance use or abuse during the COVID-19 pandemic as people from all backgrounds faced prolonged and often extreme levels of stress and isolation, coupled with additional barriers to treatment. For the first time. deaths due to drug overdoses in the U.S. exceeded 100,000 in one year between April 2020 and April 2021.44

Colorado-specific data also show a massive spike in unintentional drug overdose deaths among youth during 2020. In just one year, deaths due to unintentional drug overdoses among 15- to 24-year-olds in Colorado more than doubled, jumping sharply from 74 deaths in 2019 (9.4 deaths per 100,000 15- to 24-year-olds) to 152 deaths in 2020 (19.3 deaths per 100,000 people in this age group).⁴⁵ A significant rise in deaths due to synthetic opioids, including fentanyl, has driven much of the increase. The number of deaths among this age group due to synthetic opioids tripled between 2019 and 2020, rising from 36 deaths to 109 deaths in just one year. 46 In an effort to reduce overdoses, county programs and pharmacies across the state are providing fentanyl test strips, which test substances for fentanyl, and Naloxone,





which can help reverse overdoses.

Thousands of Colorado kids have experienced the trauma of losing a parent or primary caregiver to COVID-19 since the pandemic began, with children of color being particularly hard hit.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and others pointed to the loss of a parent or caregiver to COVID-19 as a critical driver of the mental health emergency among kids. Losing a parent during childhood is a life-altering trauma that can have mental health implications throughout a child's life if they do not receive the support and help they need. Nationally, it is estimated that 170,000 kids had lost a parent or grandparent caregiver to COVID-19 as of October 2021.47,48 Although the state does not formally track how many kids have lost caregivers to the virus, studies have estimated that between 1,700 and 2,100 Colorado kids lost a parent or primary caregiver to COVID-19.49,50



Given COVID-19's disproportionate impact on communities of color, children of color were more likely to lose a parent or caregiver to the virus. American Indian or Alaska Native children, Hispanic children and Black children in Colorado are overrepresented among the estimated number of children whose parent or caregivers died of COVID-19, relative to their proportion of the child population.




Hispanic children were estimated to make up more than 45% of all Colorado kids who lost a parent or caregiver to COVID-19, despite accounting for approximately one third of the state's children overall.^{51,52} Similarly, Black children in Colorado made up 13% of the estimated number of children who lost a caregiver to COVID but constitute only 4% of the child population. 53,54

Looking Forward: Policy Recommendations

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to impact both the physical and mental health of Colorado kids and families. Sustained investments in strategies that help ensure healthy development for all Colorado kids will be critical in the months and years ahead.

- Ensure strong implementation of recent policy wins to:
 - Create a special enrollment period for pregnancy, so that beginning in 2024, Coloradans will be able to sign up for individual market health insurance as soon as they find out they are pregnant in order to access critical prenatal health services;
 - Expand access to Medicaid and CHP+ to undocumented pregnant and postpartum Coloradans and undocumented children so that all families in these critical periods know they deserve access to health services and can access the physical, oral and behavioral health services they need beginning in January of 2025; and
 - Ensure that child care settings and schools support the social and emotional development of children.
- Expand access to oral and behavioral health services in more locations including primary care, child care and school settings.
- Expand access to key nutritional supports including ensuring all Colorado kids have access to healthy school meals.
- Strengthen efforts to protect the most marginalized Coloradans from severe consequences of COVID-19 by ensuring access to vaccines and testing, requiring masks in high-transmission and high-risk settings, and improving indoor air quality at schools and workplaces.





THE STATE OF CHILD CARE DURING COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has strained what was already a fragile, under-resourced child care system in the U.S. and here in Colorado. Even before the pandemic, Colorado struggled with limited child care capacity, long waitlists for care, and inadequate wages for child care educators which worsened existing difficulties with hiring, recruitment and retention. In addition, insufficient public investment in child care programs continues to result in high costs of care for families across the state. The COVID-19 crisis exacerbated nearly all of these challenges while also introducing new obstacles for families and providers.

Child Care Availability and Workforce Challenges

Extensive waiting lists for child care—particularly for infant and toddler care—have long been the norm in most Colorado communities due to insufficient capacity in licensed child care settings. Although licensed capacity in Colorado's child care centers, family child care homes and preschools has rebounded somewhat since the earliest days of the pandemic when many child care providers temporarily closed their doors, providers are still facing obstacles to operating at full capacity. In many cases, capacity challenges are due to widespread staffing issues.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic placed extra strain on the child care system, licensed child care capacity in Colorado was limited. Between 2016 and 2020. Colorado's licensed child care centers, family child care homes and preschools only had enough capacity to serve 60% of the kids under 6 who likely needed care.

In mid-2021, a survey conducted by the **National Association for** the Education of Young Children found that:



of Colorado child care centers surveyed were experiencing a staffing shortage. Of those:

47% reported they were serving fewer children as a result;

34% reported having a longer waitlist;

40% reported being unable to open classrooms; and


26% had to reduce their operating hours. 55



Employment in the U.S. child care sector dropped steeply in the initial months of the COVID-19 pandemic, falling by 36%, more than 373,000 jobs, between February and April 2020.⁵⁶ Although employment numbers have slowly risen since the summer of 2020, progress has been slow. Child care employment in the U.S. as of December 2021 was still 13% below its February 2020 levels.⁵⁷

Low wages were a considerable barrier to recruiting and retaining child care educators before the pandemic. In recent months, low wages continue to be one of the largest obstacles to hiring and retaining high-quality teachers and staff amid labor shortages across nearly all industries.

Child care providers are vital figures in the lives of young children, nurturing and teaching them during their most important years of development. They have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic to provide stability for Colorado's youngest kids, taking on the health and safety risks of working in person with children who are too young to be vaccinated and, in many cases, too young to wear masks. Yet their compensation does not reflect the essential work they do and the critical role they play in the lives of kids, parents and the economy as a whole. In 2020, the median annual wage for a child care educator in Colorado was only \$29,795—approximately 88% of what a preschool teacher in Colorado earns and only 60% of what a kindergarten teacher earns.58





The pandemic made clearer than ever the essential role child care plays in our state's economy and in the daily lives of young kids and their families. As Colorado pursues ways to strengthen the child care system in the aftermath of the pandemic, we must consider strategies to support and fairly compensate the child care workforce.



Pandemic-Related Child Care Disruptions and Employment Impacts for Parents


The pandemic has been extremely challenging for parents and caregivers of children of all ages. As of this writing in March 2022, children under 5 are the only age group still ineligible for COVID-19 vaccines. As a result, parents of young children have been especially strained during the most recent waves of the COVID-19 crisis. While most K-12 schools had returned to in-person settings by the start of the 2021-2022 school year, child care disruptions among kids under 5 have only gotten more prevalent since July 2021. Frequent child care closures due to COVID-19 cases continue to disrupt parents' employment, damaging their mental and emotional well-being.

During the height of the omicron variant surge in January and February 2022, nearly half of Colorado households with children under 5 reported that their child care arrangements had been disrupted for at least one child in the household at some time in the previous four weeks.⁵⁹ A separate study found that among

parents who reported child care closures in January 2022, 38% reported that the disruption lasted at least a week.60 Unsurprisingly, emotional distress was much more prevalent among parents who reported struggling to find care for their children than among parents who did not face this challenge.61



Child care closures have had significant employment impacts for parents of Colorado's youngest kids. As of early 2022, a quarter of Colorado households with young children reported that child care disruptions caused them to either cut their work hours or use vacation, sick days or other paid leave to care for children.62 Many households also reported that care disruptions required them to supervise one or more children while they worked, take unpaid leave or forgo looking for a job. These employment struggles were much more common among households with children under 5 than among those with school-aged children.




PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT

Decades of research have demonstrated the short- and long-term academic and social benefits of preschool participation, particularly for children in families with low incomes. Since 2020, however, the COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted many families' preschool plans. Data from the fall of 2020 showed that enrollment in Colorado's school district-run preschools had fallen by 23% from fall 2019 enrollment levels, reflecting about 8,000 fewer children attending school district preschools in the 2020-2021 school year.⁶³ Enrollment in Colorado's public kindergarten classrooms also fell in 2020, although by a smaller margin than that seen in preschool programs.⁶⁴

EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Enrollment data from the fall of 2021 show that while preschool enrollment increased in comparison to the fall of 2020, it remained about 10% lower than its pre-pandemic level, and kindergarten enrollment was still 3% below fall 2019.65 While some children may have been able to have enriching learning experiences that helped prepare them for kindergarten while at home during the pandemic, others likely missed out on the important cognitive, language and social-emotional skills that preschool and kindergarten can provide. These children will be in need of additional support in the years ahead.



Looking Forward: Policy Recommendations

The early years of a child's life are an essential opportunity to ensure their well-being for decades to come. To build a stronger system to support our youngest kids and their families, we must come together to:


- Make sustainable, adequate, long-term investments in support of children's early learning and development. This includes investing in access to high-quality child care and preschool programs, increasing access to developmental screening and referral, expanding early childhood mental health consultation, and supporting children and families as they transition to kindergarten.
- Center family, caregiver and provider voice in the implementation and decision-making processes of the Colorado Department of Early Childhood; these voices must lead our work toward an improved early childhood system that is responsive to the needs of all Coloradans, especially those children, families, and providers who are furthest from accessing the current system of programs and supports.
- Ensure the Department of Early Childhood supports sectors of the early childhood industry that are particularly underfunded and incredibly valuable to families, including infant and toddler child care and Family Friend and Neighbor (FFN) child care providers.
- Recognize the vital role that our early childhood workforce plays in supporting our children, families, communities, and economy. Make long-term, sustained investments in compensation and benefits that support the recruitment and retention of providers across all settings.
- Implement improved payment policies that support a sustainable child care sector that is affordable and accessible for families.






THE PANDEMIC'S IMPACT ON STUDENT ENROLLMENT

After declining in 2020 for the first time in more than 30 years, PK-12 student enrollment in Colorado public schools grew slightly in the fall of 2021, to 886,517 students. 66 Despite this increase, public school enrollment remains below pre-pandemic levels by nearly 27,000 students.





K-12 EDUCATION

Despite ongoing economic struggles for families across our state, fall 2021 data showed fewer students identified as eligible for free or reducedprice lunch (FRL) for the second year in a row. Only 37% of our state's PK-12 students were identified for free or reduced-price lunch in 2021. This is down from 40% the year prior—a decline of more than 25.000 kids. 67 Fall 2020 enrollment data reflected a major decline in the number of students eligible for reduced-price lunch. In fall 2021, the drop was concentrated among free lunch-eligible students—students whose families are trying to make ends meet with the lowest incomes, and who may benefit the most from a healthy school lunch.

The significant drop is unlikely to reflect increased economic security among Colorado students and their families. Rather, it is likely a reflection of several other factors, including lower enrollment



overall, a shift in federal policy to provide universal school meals temporarily to all children, difficulty collecting paper FRL forms from families in remote learning environments, and other longstanding shortcomings of the existing method for measuring student poverty.

The experiences of hunger and poverty can function as powerful barriers to learning and development among children—especially very young children. Historically, FRL eligibility has been determined by looking at student family income. The current process requires families to return income eligibility forms, or to be identified through a local Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) or Direct Certification from their household's participation in other programs. However, **income serves** as just one piece of financial prosperity. Family wealth, assets and home ownership also play significant roles.

In 2022, Colorado legislators advanced a proposal (HB 22-1202) to update the "at-risk" factor in the school funding formula, which provides additional resources for students experiencing economic disadvantage. This policy change will move Colorado away from its reliance on submission of FRL forms and towards automatic eligibility based on enrollment in other public benefit programs, including SNAP, TANF, and Medicaid. The new factor would also account for neighborhood or community-level socioeconomic factors that are more highly correlated with wealth.

STUDENT ASSESSMENTS

Colorado's statewide academic assessments, the Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS), were canceled in 2020 at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and administered on a more limited basis in 2021. In a typical year, the English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics CMAS assessments are given to students in grades three through eight. In 2021, however, ELA assessments were only required in grades three, five and seven, while math assessments were required in grades four, six and eight. These changes, coupled with lower-than-normal participation rates in many school districts across the state, limit the ability to draw conclusions about student performance on this assessment.⁶⁸ While the pandemic likely had significant impacts on student learning, the critical differences in the samples of students tested by CMAS in 2019 and 2021 yield results that are not comparable across years.





HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES

Against the backdrop of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and significant disruptions to the way students received their education, Colorado's on-time high school graduation rate dipped in 2021 for the first time in more than a decade. The percent of students graduating on time in Colorado fell slightly from 81.9% in 2020 to 81.7% in 2021.69

Although the overall decline in Colorado's graduation rate was small, it was concentrated among students who have historically faced more barriers to educational opportunity and those who were likely hit hardest by the health and economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. These student groups include Colorado's students of color, who had seen significant gains in on-time graduation rates prior to the pandemic.


Attaining a high school diploma is associated with economic prosperity, future health outcomes, and overall benefits to population health.^{70,71,72} It is essential to dig deeper into the recent reversal of progress in on-time graduation among Colorado's students who have historically been placed the furthest from opportunities.

COLLEGE ENROLLMENT

Immediate college-going rates among Colorado's class of 2020 were strongly impacted by the disruptions of COVID-19 as well. In 2020, the share of Colorado graduates who enrolled in post-secondary education for the upcoming fall semester fell to 50.5%, a decrease of almost 6 percentage points compared to 2019.73 The 2020 college enrollment rate for our state's high school seniors was significantly lower than the national average of 63%.74




K-12 EDUCATION

Colorado students in rural districts, especially those in small rural districts, also saw significant drops in post-secondary enrollment compared to their peers. Small rural districts saw 43.2% of 2020 graduates enroll in college for the fall, a decrease of nearly 10 percentage points compared to small rural graduates in 2019.75 Larger rural districts saw 47.3% of students enrolled.76 Both district settings saw enrollment rates lower than the state average.

College-going rates for students of all races and ethnicities fell in 2020 compared to the prior year.⁷⁷ The decreases were particularly harmful among Colorado's American Indian/Alaska Native and Hispanic/Latino students, who had made progress in this area in recent years. These students already faced a history of unjust policies and practices resulting in lower college-going rates after graduation; in 2020, they also experienced some of the largest year-to-year drops in post-secondary enrollment.

Looking Forward: Policy Recommendations


Colorado classrooms are important sites of child development. Adequately investing in our classrooms will be essential in buffering the impacts of the pandemic on Colorado's kids.


- Ensure strong implementation of recent policy wins to accomplish the following:
 - Enact a new, more accurate and holistic measure of students experiencing economic disadvantage for school finance purposes, and devote significantly more resources to serve these students.
 - Invest state funds to address disparities between low- and high-wealth districts to ensure educational opportunities and resources available to students do not differ based on where they live.
- Invest in comprehensive behavioral health support, services and data collection efforts that both adequately measure and respond to students' and educators' social and emotional needs. Especially as the pandemic wanes, students and teachers need multi-layered support from their schools.
- Ensure transparent and easily accessible reporting on state and local uses of funds received through various federal stimulus packages (including the CARES Act and American Rescue Plan Act), so Colorado will be able to tell a story about what worked in our pandemic recovery. While state dollars have mostly been allocated for various purposes, local education agencies can spend funds through 2024 and target dollars to address differential access to the opportunities and resources students need to thrive.
