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SELECTED DATES IN THE HISTORY OF THE AMERICAN JUNIOR COLLEGE

- 1902** Through the influence of William Rainey Harper (1856-1906), the 13th and 14th grades were added to the high school in Joliet, Illinois, giving Joliet Junior College the distinction of being the first publicly supported junior college established in the United States.
- 1907** Through an act of the State Legislature, California's public high school districts received permission to introduce "post-graduate" courses approximating the lower division curriculums of the university.
- 1910** Fresno City College was established as the first junior college in the California system.
- 1917** California's State Legislature vote \$90 per student annually to support junior colleges.
- 1920** The American Association of Junior Colleges was formally organized at a meeting in St. Louis, Missouri.
- 1930** The first issue of the *Junior College Journal* was published in October of the year.
- 1930** The North Carolina State Supreme Court upheld the legality of levying a property tax for the support of a public junior college.
- 1948** The report of the President's Commission on Higher Education advocated the establishment of additional tuition-free, public two-year colleges and suggested the name "community college" for institutions designed to serve chiefly local community educational needs.
- 1957** The President's Commission on Education Beyond the High School again urged expansion of junior colleges in the United States.
- 1960** The W. K. Kellogg Foundation extended substantial financial support for the establishment of the Junior College Leadership Program at ten American universities, and for the expansion of the program and services of the American Association of Junior Colleges.
- 1963** The 88th Congress passed the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 incorporating special provision for matching grants to public two-year colleges for the construction of academic facilities. Private junior colleges are also made eligible for financial assistance under the general terms of the legislation.
- 1964** The Educational Policies Commission, in its report *Universal Opportunity for Education Beyond the High School* recommended the extension of free public education to include at least two years beyond high school graduation.
- 1964** Total private and public junior college enrollment in the United States exceeded 1,000,000 students for the first time.

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
