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This study of the 1968 graduates of Manatee Junior College, Florida, showed that: (1) it is not necessary to be in the top 40% of grade 12 to succeed in junior college, (2) students in the lowest percentiles at entrance can earn a degree, (3) the average candidate for a degree should expect to spend more than four terms at the junior college, (4) probation should not prove to be an insurmountable handicap to graduation, (5) part-time students can earn a degree, too, (6) the program followed had little effect on the final average GPA, (7) in general, those in the higher percentiles at entrance had higher GPA's at graduation, (8) students transferring credits in to the college had to earn 15% more total credits, on the average, to graduate, (9) graduation from a junior college is an incentive to continue at a senior institution. 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IMPORTANT FACTS DEVELOPED

1. It is not necessary, even though desirable, to have a Florida 12th grade score of 300 (top 40%) to succeed at the junior college.

42% of the graduates who offered 12th grade scores had less than 300.
2. It is possible for students in the lowest percentiles to earn a degree through perseverance.

4% of the 1968 graduates were in the lowest percentiles (3) at entrance.
3. The average candidate for a degree should expect to spend more than four terms at the junior college.

84% of the 1968 candidates not transfers required more than four terms.
4. Probation should not prove an insurmountable handicap

during their stay, 31% of the 1968 graduates averaged 2.4 terms on probation.
5. Part-time students can earn a degree too.

6% of the 1968 graduates entered the college before 1964 and five students were in attendance for more than 10 terms.
6. The program followed had little effect on the final average G.P.A.
7. In general, those in the higher percentiles at entrance had higher G.P.A.'s at graduation.
8. Students transferring credits in to the college had to earn 15% more total credits, on the average, to graduate.

Many transfer students enter the college on probation.

9. Graduation from a junior college is an incentive to continue at a senior institution.

87% of the A.A. graduates planned to do so.
If Nursing is omitted, 3 out of 4 graduates were college bound.

In May 1968 MJC conferred degrees on 398 individuals divided between men and women as follows:

324 or 81% of these graduates earned all their credits at Manatee Junior College.

Six percent of these students entered the college more than four years before graduation with an average stay of 8 terms. Many of these were part time students. A few who transferred to the college spent just two terms previous to graduation. The entrance dates for the graduating students is given in Table 1.

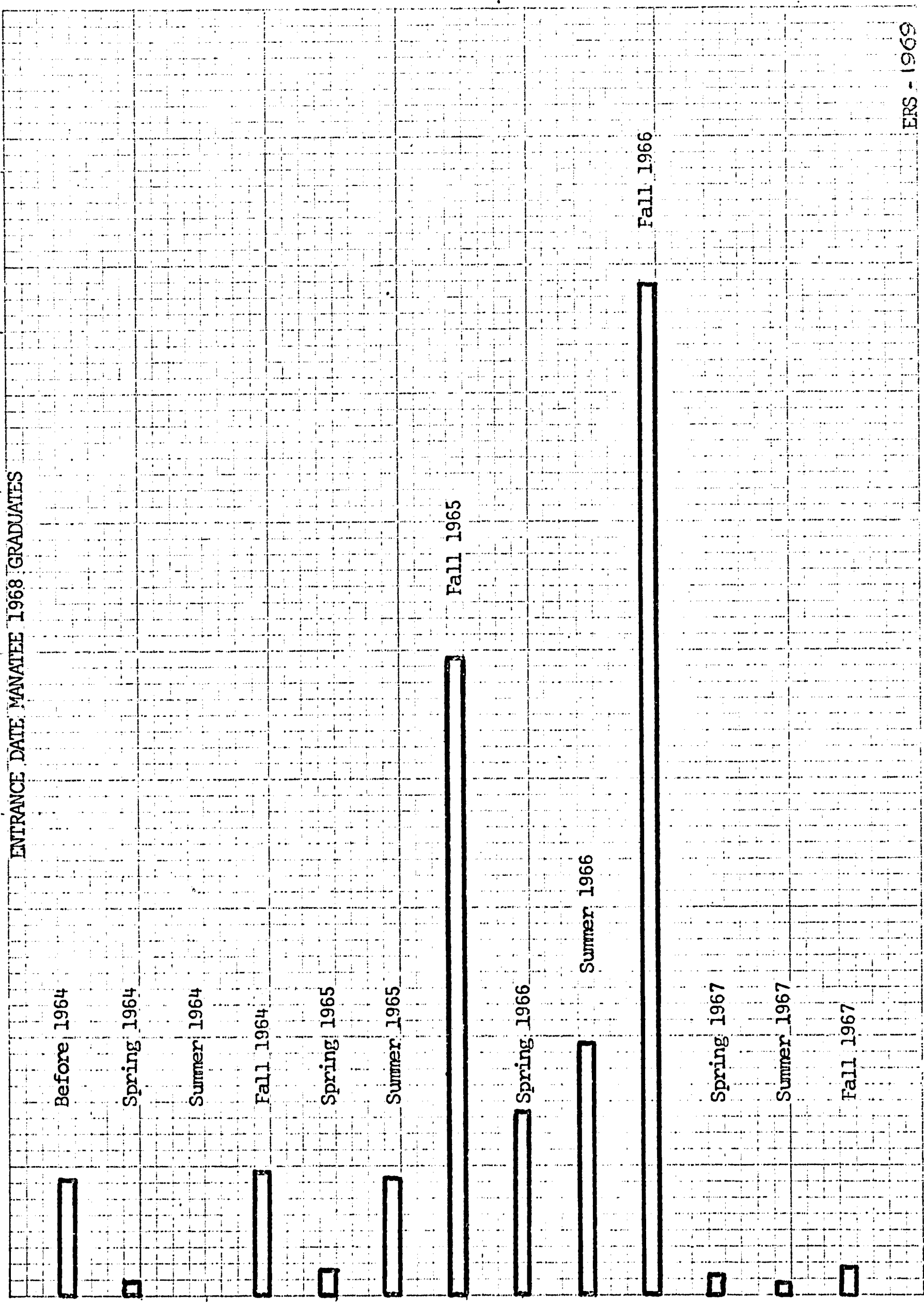

The Florida 12th grade test has a top score of 500. Florida Universities require a student to have a score of 300 to be eligible for entrance. Manatee Junior College has no such limitation. However, students who fail to score 150 on the 12th grade test are admitted to Basic Studies courses only. Entering students also take a SCAT test at the college and the minimum score for admission to college credit courses is 281. Students in Basic Studies can establish eligibility for admission to college courses by successively completing this preliminary work.

It is interesting to note that of the 1968 graduates who offered 12th grade scores at entrance, 42.4% were admitted to Manatee Junior College with test scores less than 300. Perhaps even more surprising, 4% who succeeded in earning a degree entered with scores in the 3 lowest percentiles.

Entrance scores are listed in Tables 2 and 3.

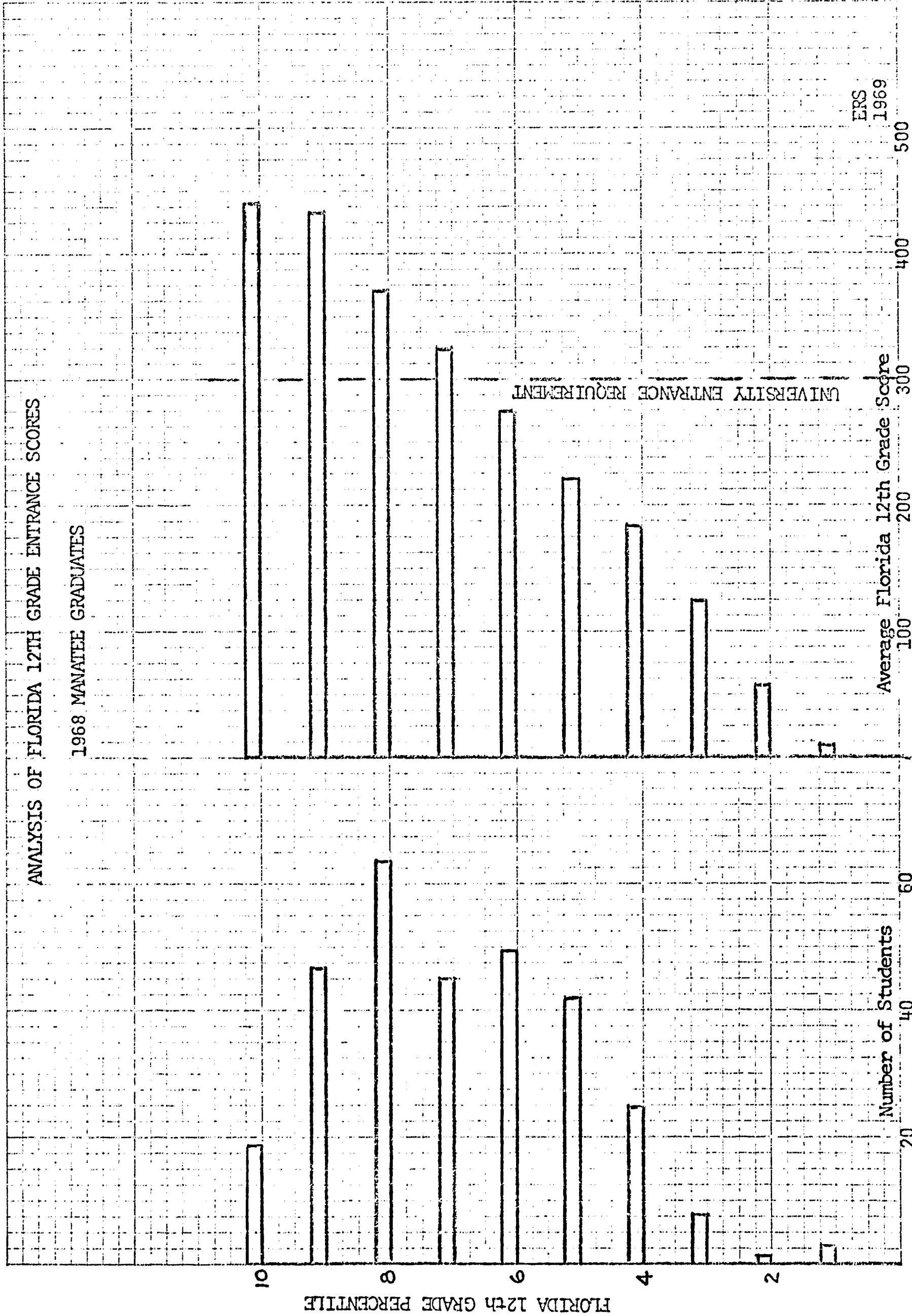

1968 MANATEE GRADUATES



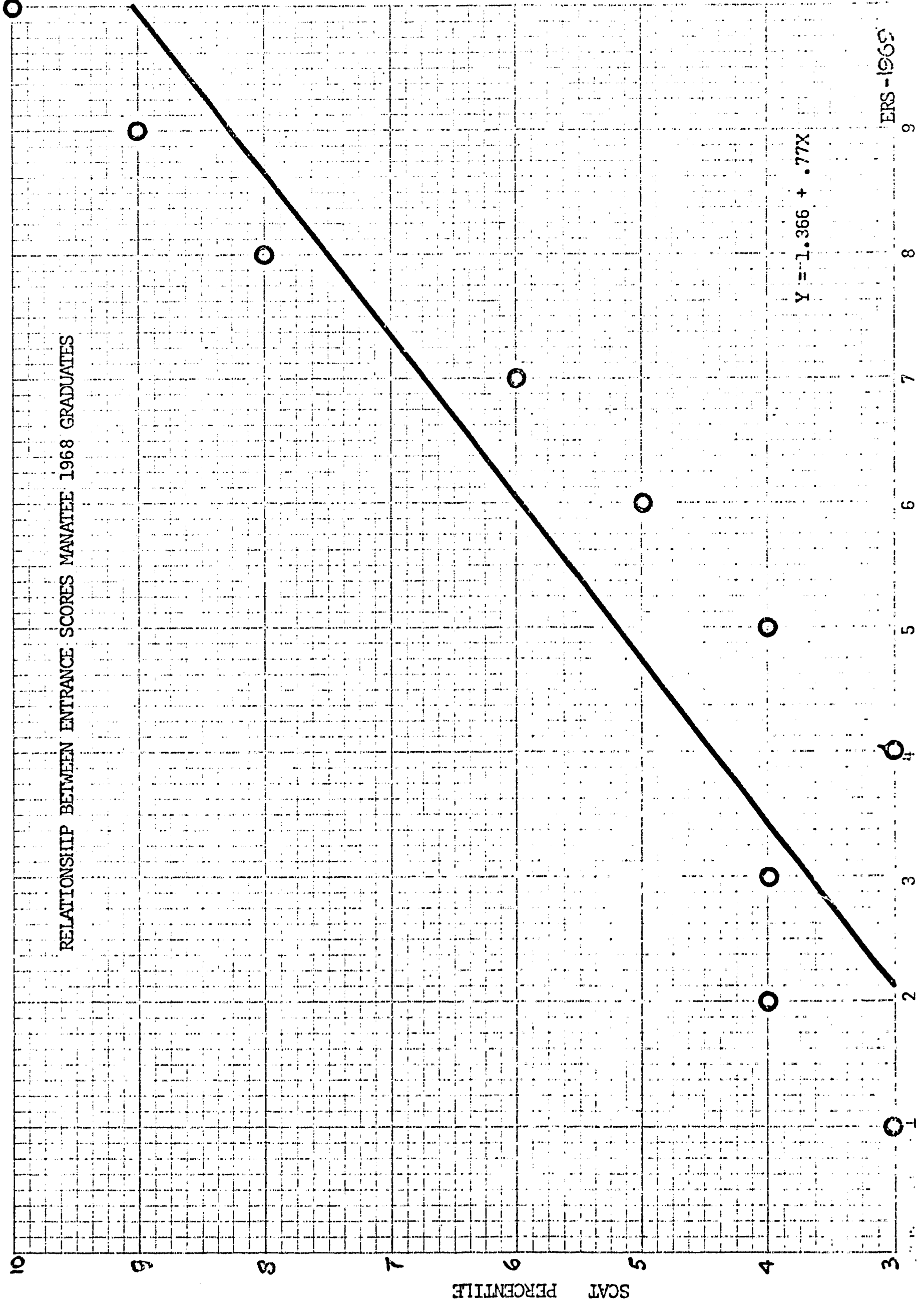

Not every student finds smooth sailing in college, in fact, of the 1968 graduates, nearly one-third were on probation for from one to nine terms. Tables 4 and 5 list these by percentiles with the number of terms required to graduate.

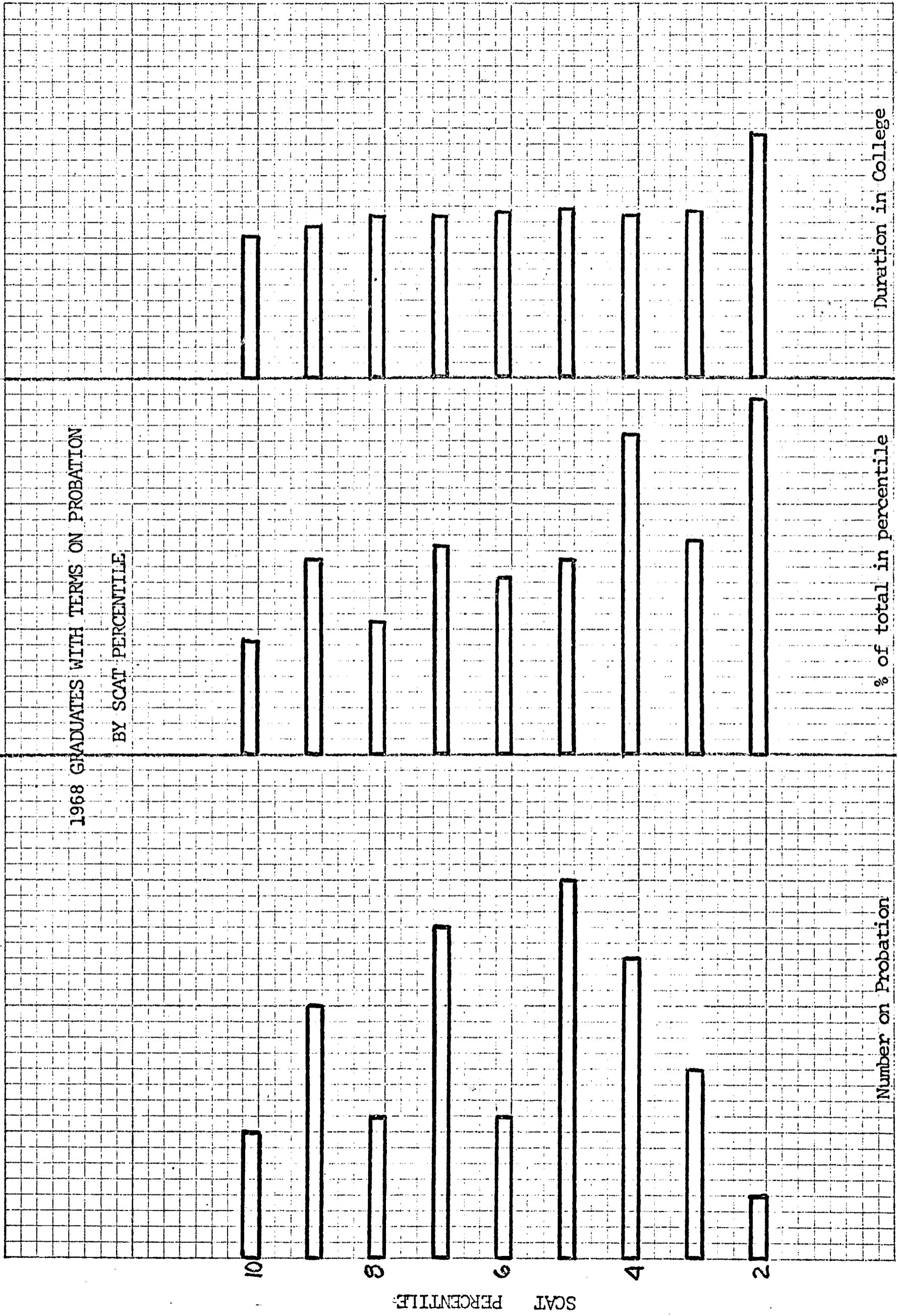

There appears to be a definite relationship between terms on probation and duration in college for those who graduate. Table 6 shows this expectation.

The credits earned for graduation are given in Table 8. Both the Nursing and Technical Programs require more credits, on the average, than the other programs and those transferring credits in still average just about as many at MJC as the native students in all programs and more in some programs.

SUGGESTION . FOR ACTION

By June 1969 most MJC graduates who entered senior institutions after receiving their Associate degree will have completed one or more quarters at the senior institution.

A list of transfer students has been prepared for each senior institution to which graduates have applied. It is possible that some did not follow through. However, a follow-up of the transfer students should be undertaken to compare records at the junior and senior colleges and be made a supplement to this report.
