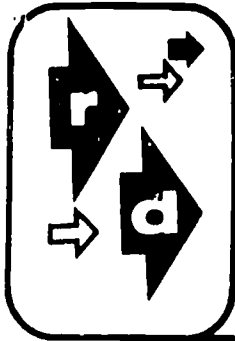

ABSTRACT

The information in this report reveals that an estimated 89,651 teachers participated in strike action and that an estimated 717,217 man-days of instruction were involved in work stoppages that varied in duration from one day to 12 weeks. Tables provide data on (1) man-days involved; (2) strikes and work stoppages by organization, month, and State; (3) strikes and work stoppages (by type of organization involved) from January 1940 to June 1971; (4) strikes and work stoppages by school year, month, organization, and by State from July 1960 through June 1971; and (5) system-by-system listing of strikes during 1970-71. A related document, EA 004 677, covers the same information for the period 1969-70. (JF)

TEACHER STRIKES, WORK STOPPAGES, AND INTERRUPTIONS OF SERVICE, 1970-71

During the 1970-71 school year, the NEA Research Division recorded 130 teacher strikes, work stoppages, and interruptions of service. They affected public elementary and secondary school systems and state-supported junior colleges in 17 states. An estimated 89,651 teachers participated in the strike action, and an estimated 717,217 man-days of instruction were involved. The strikes, work stoppages, and interruptions of service varied in length from one day to 12 weeks with a median of one week. Although some degree of strike activity occurred from August through May, nearly one-third of all strikes recorded took place in September. No strike activity was reported to have started in June.

Data in this memorandum have been compiled from published and unpublished information collected by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U. S. Department of Labor, and by the NEA Research Division and NEA state education associations.

For the purpose of this analysis, teacher strikes, work stoppages, and interruptions of service are considered to be any concerted group effort which disrupts the regularly scheduled instruction periods for at least one legal minimum school day. They may be initiated in and affect a particular school building, a local school district, or a state school system. Regularly scheduled instruction days are those days on which pupils are scheduled for classes; they do not include teacher working days before the opening of school, teacher orientation days, inservice days, or holidays.

Number of Strikes and Personnel Involved

The number of strikes recorded during the past school year was less than that recorded for the previous year and represents a decrease of 28.2 percent from the 181 strikes recorded during the 1969-70 school year. Two states that had not previously reported any strike activity, Arizona and South Carolina, reported strikes during the 1970-71 school year.

The total number of personnel involved decreased 21.1 percent compared with the number involved during the 1969-70 school year, and the number of man-days declined 21.3 percent. About 1 teacher in 25 participated in strike activity. The man-days involved amounted to less than one-fifth of 1 percent of the estimated total instructional man-days scheduled for the entire United States; four states, Illinois, Michigan, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, accounted for 77.7 percent of the total.

The number of teachers involved is not adjusted for those teachers who may have been involved in more than one strike, and some of the days recorded as lost because of teacher strike activity were rescheduled during the school year to meet state requirements of minimum attendance. The total number of man-days of instruction was calculated by multiplying the estimated total instructional staff in 1970-71 by the assumed constant figure of 180 days of instruction for the year, the minimum number of instruction days mandated by most states.

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Duration of Strikes

A comparison of the duration and the number of participants in strikes during the past four years indicates that the pattern of strike activity in 1970-71 was generally toward longer strikes but involving fewer personnel. The median length of strikes for 1970-71 was one week, not counting week ends and other noninstructional days. The following table shows the number and length of strikes in the past four years.

The number of teachers reported out on strike in each strike tended to be smaller in 1970-71 than in 1969-70. One teacher in 25 participated in strike activity in 1970-71. The number of participants recorded is an estimate based on the greatest number of teachers not reporting for work at any one time during a strike. The following table shows the numbers of participants in strikes in the past four school years.

Table 1 lists the number of man-days involved in teacher strikes in each state in which strike activity was recorded and the percentage of the total man-days involved in strikes. Table 2 gives the number of strikes, estimated number of personnel involved, and estimated number of man-days involved categorized by type of organization initiating the strike, month in which the strike began, and state in which the strike occurred. Table 6 lists chronologically all strikes recorded in 1970-71, and gives beginning date, type of organization involved, length of strike or work stoppage, estimated number of personnel involved, and estimated total number of man-days lost or rescheduled for instruction.

Trends

Table 3, which summarizes all known teacher strikes or work stoppages from January 1910 to June 1971, shows by type of organization involved, the number of strikes, the estimated number of personnel involved, and the estimated total number of man-days involved.

Table 4, which summarizes teacher strikes and work stoppages from July 1960 through June 1971, provides data by school year, by type of organization, and by month. Strikes or work stoppages carrying over from one month to the next were tabulated by the month in which the strike began. Table 5 provides the same data by state.
