## **preface**

By all indications, the 1972 Directory of Environmental Organizations was well received and widely used. The requests for copies exceeded our expectations. By September, the supply of 2500 copies was exhausted. In view of this experience, we judge it a worthwhile public service to issue a 1973 Edition with updated information. Here it is.

In preparing the 1973 Edition, we contacted all organizations listed in the 1972 Edition, and, in addition, those organizations which had indicated an interest in being included in the Directory. Therefore, some organizations have been added. But, we found that some organizations—principally student organizations—were no longer viable.

The 1973 Edition lists those organizations dedicated to protecting the environment through on-going, active programs. This approach is consistent with the basis for the listings in the 1972 Edition. Likewise, the same type of information is given for each

organization, if it was available to us. Generally included are:

- name of organization
- name, address, and telephone number of the person to contact for further information about the organization and its programs
- number of members, as reported to us by the organization
- a brief statement on the goals and purposes pursued and the specific interests, programs, and activities of the organization

Unfortunately, we are unable to include some of the details found in the 1972 Edition on the Congressional and State delegations, particularly on committee assignments. At the time of compilation of this 1973 Edition, the Congress and State legislatures with memberships somewhat altered by November's general election, had not yet convened. We decided not to delay issuance of the 1973 Edition until such information would be available.
