

## I. SOME INTERPRETIVE NOTES

In 1972 the Center for Research and Development in Higher Education at the University of California, Berkeley, conducted a survey in order to find answers to questions raised by state and institutional policymakers. With the support and assistance of the State Higher Education Executive Officers Association (SHEEO), a questionnaire requesting appropriation and enrollment information for fiscal years 1963-72 was sent to each statewide coordinating or governing board through its respective member of SHEEO.¹ The data obtained was edited, placed in a more useful format and returned to each state for verification and updating to include the 1973 fiscal year. Although a brief analysis was performed in 1972, there existed a confusion between academic and fiscal years in reporting the data, as well as unreturned questionnaires from nine states, which precluded an extensive analysis at that time.²

The results of the 1973 survey, lowever, contain responses from all 50 states, although the ability of the states to report the data to the extent requested varied widely, and the overall results were in some cases disappointing. In anticipation of the inability of the states to provide the comprehensive data attendant to an investigation of the trends of state funding of higher education, a computer-based program for the analysis of the data was written so as to consider the various periods of time stratified by state, nation, academic region and census region, as well as by three random and three analytical regions. The program also considers a number of important relationships which, when viewed in toto, might allow the observer to make some statements about the patterns inherent therein.

More specifically, state appropriation and enrollment data was obtained for the years 1962-63, 1967-68, 1968-69, 1969-70, 1970-71, 1971-72 and 1972-73 in order to observe trends over various time frames: 10 years (1962-63 through 1972-73); five years (1962-63 through 1967-68/1967-68 through 1972-73); and the last six years (1967-68 through 1972-73), the first half (1967-68 through 1969-70), and the last half (1970-71 through 1972-73), as well as consecutive year comparisons. The data were arrayed within these periods of time by the basic category in which they were collented (e.g., <u>Total</u>

State General Revenue, Total State Appropriations for All Education, Total State Appropriations for Institutions of Higher Education). The array emphasized differentiation by sector--public or private-and within sectors, by type of institution (advanced graduate and research universities, other universities and colleges and two-year colleges) and was stratified by state and aggregated nationally and regionally.

The basic regional grouping was formed by dividing the United States into four geographical areas: north, south, east and west; and placing those states comprising the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) into the western region, members of the Southern Regional Educational Board (SREB) into the southern region, the New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE) member states, together with the states of New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, into the eastern region, and the remaining states into the central region. A subregional grouping utilized the nine census regions and with one exception merely subdivided the four basic regions. The exception is the state of Oklahoma which although placed in the central region, falls into the west south central census region, a subdivision of the southern region.

In completing the questionnaire, respondents were requested to place a figure in each cell, including a "zero" if such was actually the case, leaving the cell blank only if the data could not be obtained. This resulted in a significant number of blank cells in the returns which required a modification of our original computer program in order to analyze the data.

In determining total appropriations for higher education, its public and private sectors, and the three institutional types which comprise each sector, it is necessary to obtain the appropriations for three separate components: (1) the amount appropriated for institutions of higher education, (2) state funds made available through student financial aid and (3) state funds made available through other grants and aids. The sum of these three components is the total appropriation. If, however, a



blank cell should occur within any one of them, then a sum cannot be obtained without the possibility that it will be less than the true amount.

Therefore, when a blank cell occurred, the initial version of the program was designed to omit the summation using that cell as well as all subsequent calculations based upon that summation. In the modification of the program, blank cells were treated as "zeros" on the assumption that the amount, if any, would have been small or had been included in the "traditional" appropriation figure. This procedure allowed us to increase the size of our n and we were able to compare that larger n with the figures obtained from the smaller n of the original program which had omitted blank cells in performing calculations.



## II. DATA ANALYSIS

Higher education administrators during the 1960s were confronted with rapidly rising enrollments and burgeoning budgets. By the late '60s, state legislators and governors publicly expressed concern about the very high costs of colleges and universities. Budgets were examined much more closely, and the larger percentage increases of the 1960s gave way to much smaller increments in the early 1970s.

Many questions occur to planners and analysts for higher education institutions and for state planning and budgeting agencies. Have costs risen faster than inflation? Have the leading universities been treated too well financially to the detriment of state colleges and two-year institutions? Have the increases of state dollars for public institutions been commensurate with increases of state dollars for private colleges? Has the support level for elementary and secondary education suffered because of the growth of higher education? Or are both receiving smaller shares of state revenue than formerly? These and other questions can be answered in full or in part by the information and data presented in this report.

Some of the problems facing higher education institutions and their planners are quite clearly set forth in the following paragraphs describing the quandry of the University of California's Berkeley campus, from which this report emanates. In varying degrees, for the several types and kinds of institutions and for the different states, the same problems confront the higher education community at large.

In an address delivered to the board of regents of the University of California in September 1973, Berkeley Chancellor Albert H. Bowker reported that:

". . .the title 'Berkeley in a Steady State' was chosen because I want to dwell at some length upon the planning challenges which we at Berkeley face. 'Steady state' implies: (a) that total enrollment will remain about as it is now, (b) that the demand for admission will continue to be heavy, (c) that resources from state, federal and private sources will at best continue at present levels, (d) that costs will increase because of inflation, (e) that our physical plant, which is presently undermaintained, will become progressively more and more obsolete, and (f) that notwithstanding these several constraints, we must recast our academic programs to meet the changing requirements of today's and tomorrow's world, insisting at the same time that the quality of those academic programs and of Berkeley's most precious resource, its faculty, is renewed and natured."

Chancellor Bowker indicated that "one of the disadvantages of steady-state planning is that by keeping programs viable with constant resources the very real erosion that can occur in today's inflationary economy will be concealed, for in patching, adjusting and making-do to avoid immediate insolvency and dislocation, the more serious problems will be stored up for future

years." An analysis by his staff of the support received by the Berkeley campus from state general revenue revealed that while state general revenue had increased from \$130 million to \$610 million during the past 10 years and the entire university had increased from \$150 million to \$350 million, Berkeley's share had risen from \$45 million to only \$80 million. In percentage terms this represented increases for Berkeley of 78 per cent and for the university system 133 per cent, with a commensurate increase of 239 per cent in the state general revenue. When these figures are deflated to reflect the changes in the Califor is Consumer Price Index, using 1967-68 as the base year, "Berkeley's instructional support has fallen from \$8 million to \$5.9 million in the last five years; in terms of real support per student, the decline is 19 per cent, from \$256 in 1967-68 to \$411 in 1972-73."

Is this an accurate picture of what is happening to institutions of higher education? Is it descriptive of only institutions in the public sector, or of only advanced graduate and research-oriented universities? Or is it a phenomenon peculiar only to the state of California and its university? The answers to these questions can be found in the following material.

The data in tabular as well as graphic form in this document show what the trends have been over the past 10 years and for shorter time spans. National and regional trends are displayed within the text, while the appendix contains graphs depicting each state within the context of the region in which it is located.

#### State General Revenue

The revenue of a state consists of funds received from many sources, but for the purposes of this study we are concerned only with those over which the state was able to exercise discretion in appropriating them for the purposes of education, or with those funds which by previous agreement or enactment were specifically earmarked for education. "Total state general revenue" is defined, therefore, as that portion of total state revenue whose disposition and use are not restricted by statute, except that state-restricted funds for education were included and funds for capital projects excluded. Funds generated by institutions of higher education--including tuition, fees, royalties, patents, auxiliary enterprises, etc.--were omitted in order to reflect only state-generated funds and restricted funds for education. "Total state general revenue" is therefore a subset of total state revenue and its relative size to total state revenue will vary, perhaps substantially, according to previous actions of the state in designating certain receipts for specific purposes. Thus, it is important to view appropriations for higher education in the light of total general revenue funds available in a given year (Table I, on page 7), and not in

terms of the total revenue of that state in that same year. (Some states earmark revenues for various purposes which are not reflected in the tax revenue totals contained in this report.) The years cited are fiscal years and identify the closing year.

Table II, on page 8, reveals the proportion of the state general revenue which is appropriated to all colleges and universities. For comparative purposes, data are aggregated by state, region and the nation. The names of the states that constitute each area are listed on pages 2 and 3.

During the 10-year period 1963-73, total state general revenue increased 255 per cent (not including the states of Louisiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Texas and West Virginia) and 93.4 per cent during the last five years for the same 45 states (Table III).

Even when discounting for the effects of inflation, real gains occurred during the 10-year period 1963-73, in each of the 5-year periods 1963-68 and 1968-73 and in each one of the years in the last 5-year period of time, 1969-73.

#### Appropriations for All Education

Although state appropriations for education did not rise as rapidly as did total state general revenue, it did increase 235 per cent for th. 10-year period and 77.4 per cent during the last five years (Table IV).

In terms of total state general revenue, however, education's share has dropped to 48.90 per cent from 1 high in 1969 of 53.49 per cent. Although an increase had occurred between 1963 and 1969, figures for the United States as a whole and for three of the Dur major regions (the Central region is an exception) have shown a continuing downward trend since 1970 (Table V).

Institutions of higher education would seem, at first glance (Table VI), to have received favored treatment since their appropriations rose 339 per cent between 1963-73 and 87.5 per cent between 1968-73 (compared with increases in total state general revenue), while public institutions of elementary and secondary education increased but 187 per cent and 71.9 per cent for the same time periods (Table VII).

Furthermore, higher education institutions increased their share of total state general revenue from 11.24 per cent in 1963 to between 14.19-14.66 per cent during the last six years (Table VIII), while public elementary and secondary institutions were falling from 41.23 per cent



to 33.28 per cent (Table IX). This was also reflected in the larger share of the education appropriations directed towards higher education as it increased from 22.00 per cent in 1963 to 28.90 per cent in 1973 (Table X).



When the data in Tables VIII and IX are graphically represented (Graph I), the trends become even more apparent. The figures and the trend lines do not, however, recognize enrollment increases (or decreases), nor the greater cost per student in institutions of higher education; nor do they reflect shifting patterns of responsibility between the state and the local community for each type of educational activity.

## Appropriations for Higher Education

Institutions of higher education reached their high point of support in terms of their share of total state general revenue in 1971 with a 14.66 percentage, although the peak year and the percentage figure vary by both major and minor region (Tables II and VIII). The public sector differs from the private sector in that its percentage share of total state general revenue for the last six years has somewhat steadily decreased from 14.18 per cent in 1963 to 13.68 per cent in 1973, while state support of the private sector, albeit small in absolute terms, has continued to grow from .19 per cent in 1963 to .49 per cent in 1973. Graphs 1-9 (Appendix B) illustrate these percentages for the public sector, and show the variations by state, within each of the nine minor regions, from 1963-1973. As a result, although total state appropriations for higher education as a percentage of total state appropriations for all education has been increasing since 1963 (Table X), institutions of public higher education have found their share of state higher education appropriations decreasing from 98.28 per cent in 1963 to 96.13 per cent in 1973 (Table XI).

The institutional types received varying proportions of total appropriations over the 10-year time period (Graph II). While public advanced graduate and research universities saw their share of public higher education appropriations fall steadily from 62.29 per cent in 1963 to a low of 49.55 per cent in 1973, other public universities and colleges rose from 28.85 per cent in 1963 to 33.91 per cent by 1971, a level which they have almost maintained. Public two-year colleges increased their share from 6.17 to 15.51 per cent (Table 2, Appendix A).



In terms of total state appropriations for all education, public advanced graduate and research universities saw their support drop to 13.61 per cent in 1973 after rising to a high of 14.35 per cent in 1968, while their share of total state general revenue dropped to 6.66 per cent (1973) after having risen from 6.79 per cent (1963) to a high of approximately 7.60 per cent in both 1968 and 1969 (Tables 3 and 4, Appendix A).

Public two-year colleges, however, increased their share of total education appropriations from 1.32 per cent in 1963 to 4.31 per cent in 1973, and their share of total state general revenue from 1.68 per cent to 2.16 per cent in the same 10-year period. Other public universities and colleges increased their share of state education appropriations by better than 2.5 per cent, from 6.31 per cent to 8.93 per cent from 1963 to 1973, and their share of total state general revenue by better than a single point from 3.15 per cent in 1963 to 4.38 per cent in 1973, although it is falling from its high in 1971 of 4.74 per cent. (Tables 3 and 4, Appendix A)

A similar institutional pattern appears to have occurred in the private sector. Private advanced graduate and research universities share of private higher education appropriations fell from 86.1 per cent in 1963 to 40.1 per cent in 1973. In the 8-year period, 1965-71, other private universities and colleges rose from 16.72 per cent to 59.98 per cent, subsequently falling to 57.96 per cent in 1973. Private two-year colleges remained at approximately  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent after having risen from .51 per cent in 1963. (Due to the inability of many states to differentiate private higher education appropriations by institutional type, the figures contained herein are based upon an *n* of approximately 27, and the magnitude of the trends, therefore, should be considered tentative at best.)

Appropriations for public higher education also include funds for state coordinating agencies and statewide governing boards, as well as for other governing boards and agencies of higher education (such as financial aids administrative agencies). These agencies have continued to grow since 1963 and receive a small, yet increasing, proportion of the public sector's share of state appropriations. That share accounts for approximately 1.5 per cent (.51 per cent for state coordinating or statewide governing boards of public higher education, plus approximately one per cent for other governing boards or agencies of higher education) of total state appropriations for public higher education (Table XII, see page 18).

#### Enrollments and Unit Costs

In order to evaluate the changes in appropriations as they have occurred during the past 10 years, and more particularly, the last few, it is necessary to compare dollars available with changes in enrollments. The data following on dollars appropriated per student in higher education and elementary and secondary education must be interpreted very carefully. The figures are derived by dividing the appropriations by the reported full-time equivalent students. A very rough estimate results, not entirely defensible in the research world, but one which is used by policymakers in most states of the nation.

While enrollments in public elementary and secondary schools increased by approximately 20 per cent between 1963 and 1973, and private institutions of higher education increased by a third, enrollments in public higher institutions increased 153 per cent (Table XIII). Meanwhile, appropriations for public institutions of higher education were increasing 330 per cent (1963-1973) and 84.2 per cent between 1968-1973, and private institutions of higher education 757 per cent (1963-1973) and 207 per cent (1968-1973).

When appropriations are divided by enrollments within institutional types, and then viewed over time (1963-1973), one finds that larger percentage increases occurred with the private sector than within the public sector, and that the largest increases within each sector were recorded by two-year institutions (Graph III). Although the dollar amounts per student in the private sector are small, they have increased fivefold during the last 10 years and by 190 per cent in the last five years. Public figures for the same periods of time were 74.2 per cent and 30.2 per cent respectively. (The reader is reminded that since these are percentage changes, the smaller the initial base the larger will be the percentage increases derived by increments to that base.)

Percentage increases in state appropriations per student (based upon the HEGIS⁴ definition and formula for determining full-time equivalency) on a national and regional basis (1963-1973) are shown in Graph IV. Appendix B contains regional graphs illustrating individual state trend lines for the public sector. (Graphs 19-27)

Enrollment data, particularly for the private institutions, was sketchy and further unit cost analysis will be deferred until it is more complete. In interpreting the data, one should note that no inflationary factor has been applied.

# III. CONCLUDING REMARKS

As the revenue of states has increased in real dollars during the past decade, so too have the appropriations for education, although at a slower rate, particularly when viewed in the light of increased enrollments. The proportion of those education appropriations received by institutions of higher education, however, has grown, with the greatest growth occurring within the private sector. During the past 10 years, the division of that share has shifted, with public advanced graduate and research universities and other public universities and colleges receiving smaller proportions and a larger proportion received by public two-year colleges. While higher education is receiving a greater share of the education appropriations, its share of total state general revenue has decreased during the last two years (1972-1973). The percentage share of total state general revenue received by public advanced graduate and research universities has steadily declined since 1968 as has, since 1971, the share received by other public universities and colleges. Public two-year colleges, however, have shown a continual increase in their share since 1963.

It appears that state support of higher education, when adjusted for enrollment and inflation, has not so much diminished as it has shifted to newer forms of public institutions enrolling the greatest numbers of students and, to a lesser extent, provided increasing support to private institutions. The hallmark of American higher education in the past has been its differentiation of functions between the many segments comprising it. With demands for postsecondary educational opportunities becoming ever greater, the distinguishing feature of institutions of higher education of the future may be their adaptability to meet the needs of new and differing clienteles.



Graphs 1-9 Total State Appropriations for Public Institutions of Higher Education as a Percentage of Total State General Revenue: States Within Regions


Graphs 10-18 State Appropriations per Student (FTE) in Public Institutions of Higher Education (Percentage Change): States Within Regions
