## ABSTRACT

The 919 international students enrolled at the Rockville Campus of Montgomery Community College (Maryland) for the 1974 fall semester represent 9.5 percent of the total campus enrollment of 9,624. Many members of the college community are curious as to why international students are here, what countries they are from, and in which curricula they are enrolled. This information is related through statistical tables and graphs which reflect: (1) Total number of international students on the Rockville Campus by visa status; (2) International student enrollment by country of origin; (3) Curriculum choices; (4) Enrollment status (new, re-entering, or continuing students); (5) Number of course hours carried; (6) Male and female enrollment totals; (7) Marital status; (8) Age; and (9) Residency Classification for tuition purposes. There is a general increase in the number of foreign students enrolling over the last three years, particularly for students enrolling in eleven or more credit hours. Males currently outnumbered females by a three to two ratio, but accelerated female enrollment rates indicate a trend towards more even distribution between the sexes. (Author/AH)

## REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

### International Student Enrollment

The International student population on the Rockville Campus, Fall Semester 1974 has increased slightly since the Spring Semester 1974 from 863 to 919 students. The following chart depicts the enrollment figures since the Summer Session 1971.

The International Student enrollment (919) on the Rockville Campus for the 1974 Fall Semester represents 9.5% of the total campus enrollment (9624) as of the third week of classes.

### A Description of the Fall, 1974 International Student Population

Many members of the college community are curious as to why International students are here, what countries they are from, and in which curricula they are enrolled. In an attempt to answer these questions, the following data are presented.

Table 1 reflects the total number of International students on the Rockville Campus by visa status. The largest category, 35.0%, hold student visas, and are temporarily in the United States to study. The second largest group, 32.1%, hold

immigrant visas and are permanent residents in the communities surrounding the college. A trend noted in last semester's report is still evident: the proportion of International students holding student visas continues to decrease. Fall Semester 1973, 49.2% of the International student population held student visas as compared to 42.3% Spring Semester 1974 and 35.0% Fall Semester 1974. At the same time the proportions of students holding immigrant visas, diplomatic visas, and international organization visas are continuing to increase as compared to last semester: 29.4% to 32.1%, 11.1% to 13.9%, and 12/3% to 14.3% respectively. The decrease in the proportion of "F" (student) visa holders on the Rockville Campus is due to: 1) the increased financial requirements placed upon them by U. S. consuls abroad when they apply for student visas; 2) the stricter enforcement by the Immigration and Naturalization Service of regulations pertaining to them; 3) the increasing out-of-State tuition at the college; 4) the general inflation in the cost of living in the U. S.; and 5) the enrollment of "F" (student) visa holders who prefer to live in or closer to Washington, D.C. on the Takoma Park Campus.

Table II, Part A shows International student enrollment by country of origin. Eighty-three (83) countries are represented this semester on the Rockville Campus. Table II, Part B depicts the countries which have the highest numbers of International students. A breakdown of the Takoma Park Campus most frequently represented nationalities is also listed in the table for comparison. Iran again this semester has the most students represented on the Rockville Campus, with 106 enrollees.\* The next nine countries represented, ranked in descending order, are: Thailand, 58; Peru, 39; Nationalist China, 38; Nigeria, 33; Cuba, 30; Colombia, 29; Korea, 29; Ecuador, 28; and Brazil, 26. A further examination of the International student

population by areas of the world represented on the Rockville Campus shows the following: 319 students from Central and South America; 261 students from the Far East and Pacific region; 142 students from the Middle East and North Africa; 97 students from Europe; 91 students from Sub-Sahara Africa; and 9 students from Canada. Spanish is the most frequently spoken language.

Table III depicts the curriculum choices of all International students. The largest number (332) of students in any one category are enrolled as Special students; many are admitted their first semester to study English courses only. The most popular curriculum is General Education/Humanities-Social Sciences Sequence, with 96 students choosing it. The other most frequently chosen curricula, in descending order, are: Engineering, 77; Business Administration, 66; Computer Science/Business Option, 34; General Education/Science-Math Sequence, 30; Pre-Medicine, 27; and Architectural Technology, 26.

Table IV indicates the enrollment status of International students. As of the Fall Semester 1974, 607 of the 919 International students have been previously enrolled and are classified as old students. The total number of new International students on campus is 265, with the remaining 47 being re-enrollees, that is, students who have attended Montgomery College previously and who are now returning to continue their studies.

Table V shows the number of International students by number of hours carried. Most students, 551, are enrolled full-time, while 368 are enrolled as part-time students.

Table VI contrasts the number of male and female students. The male students (571) represent 62.1% of the total International student enrollment and the female students (348) represent the remaining 37.9%.

Table VII shows the marital status of International students. The single category is most frequently represented, with 386 of the males and 196 of the females being single.

Table VIII reflects the age of International students on the Rockville Campus. The median age for both males and females is twenty-three years of age.

Finally, Table IX points out the number of International students by residency classification for tuition purposes. 538 International students pay Montgomery County fees, 8 are paying State tuition fees, and 373 pay out-of-State tuition fees.

## • ENROLLMENT TRENDS OF INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The first observation one can make is that there is very little fall to spring variation which would give the curves a raw-toothed appearance.

With respect to the Visa-Type graph (Figure 1), the enrollment of non-resident visa holders (B, F, & Other) can be seen to be holding steady at a low level or declining. The visa holders (A, G, & K) who qualify for county residency are uniformly on the increase.

The admission classification graph shows a general upward trend in old students indicating an increasing retention rate. In 1974 there is evidence that this upward trend is moderating. The new admissions are maintaining an oscillating equilibrium around a constant value caused by the fact that fall admissions tend to be higher than spring. Fall admissions dropped slightly in 1974. The re-enrolled students showed a slight increase (See Figure 2).

The credit hour load graph shows that over the past three years there has been a general increase in the numbers of students for all hours and particularly for those students enrolled in more than eleven hours. (See Figure 3).

Currently six of every ten international students enrolled at Montgomery are male and both males and females have shown an increase in numbers over the past three years. However, the increase for female students has been more rapid than for males, and if this trend continues the result would eventually be a more even distribution between the sexes. (See Figure 4).

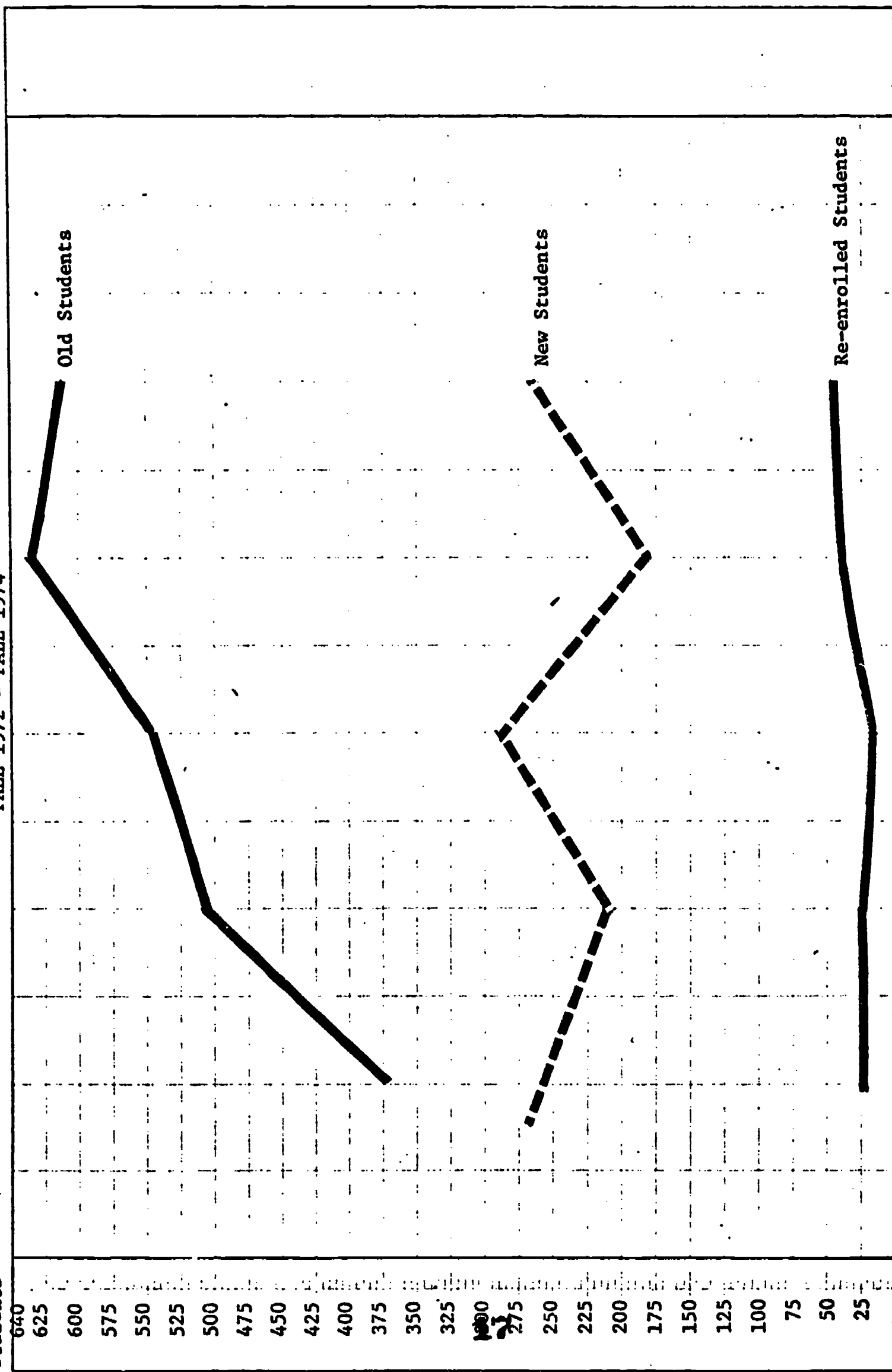

# INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS BY ADMISSIONS CLASSIFICATION

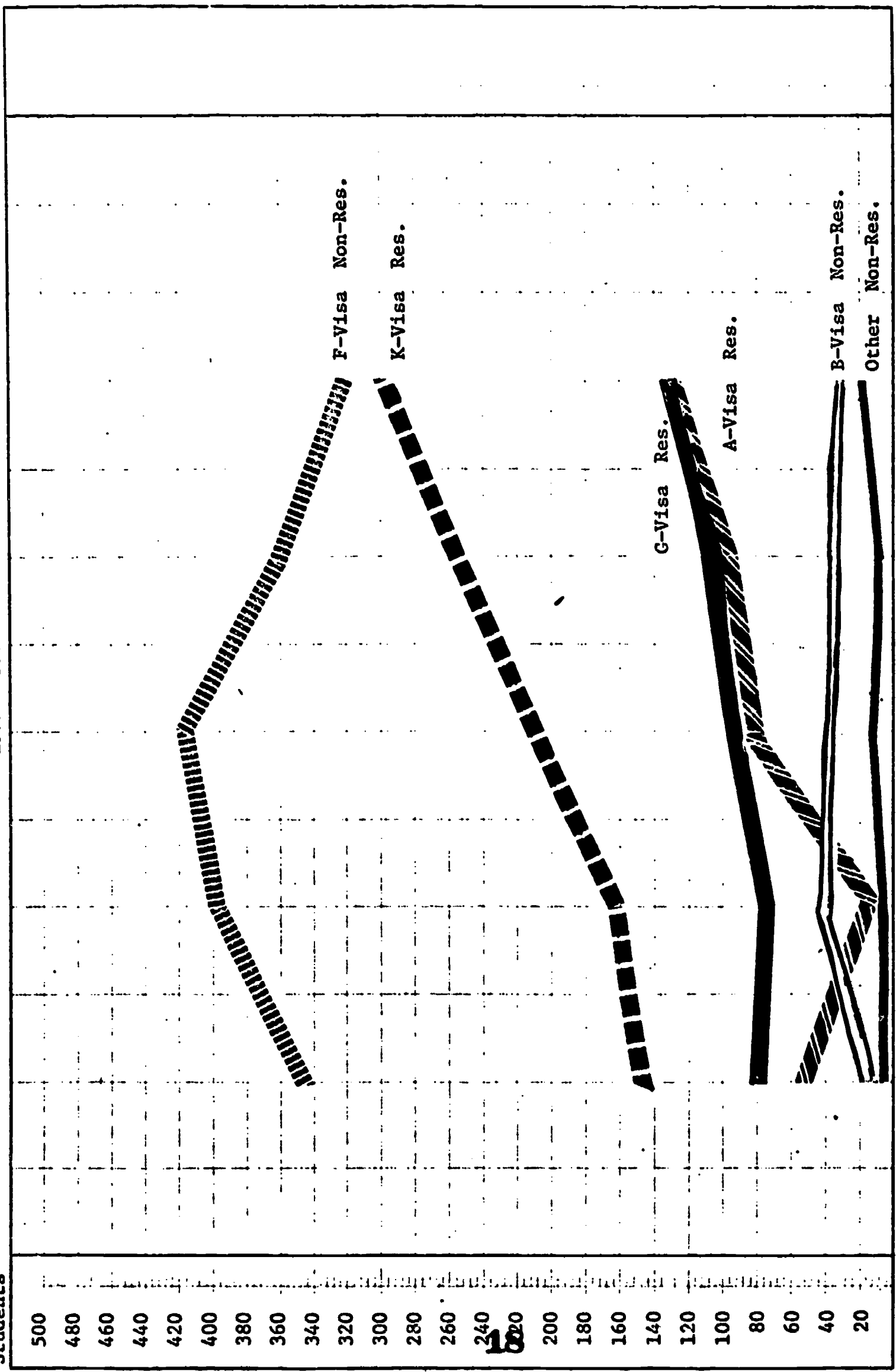

Visa Types -- A - Diplomatic B - Visitor F - Student G - International Organization K - Immigrant

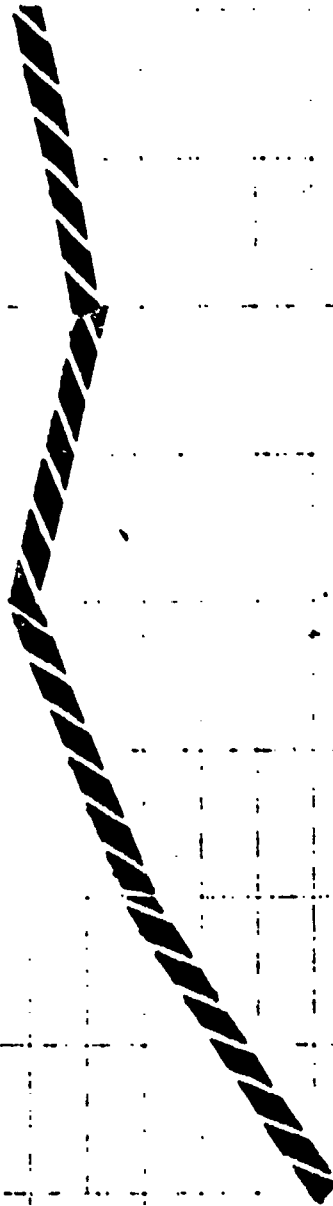

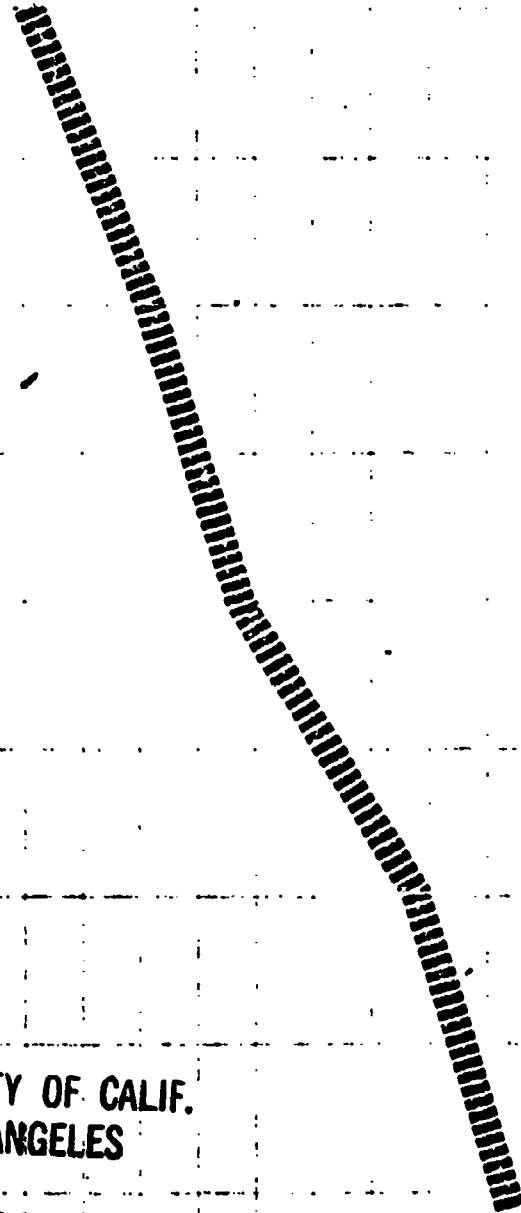

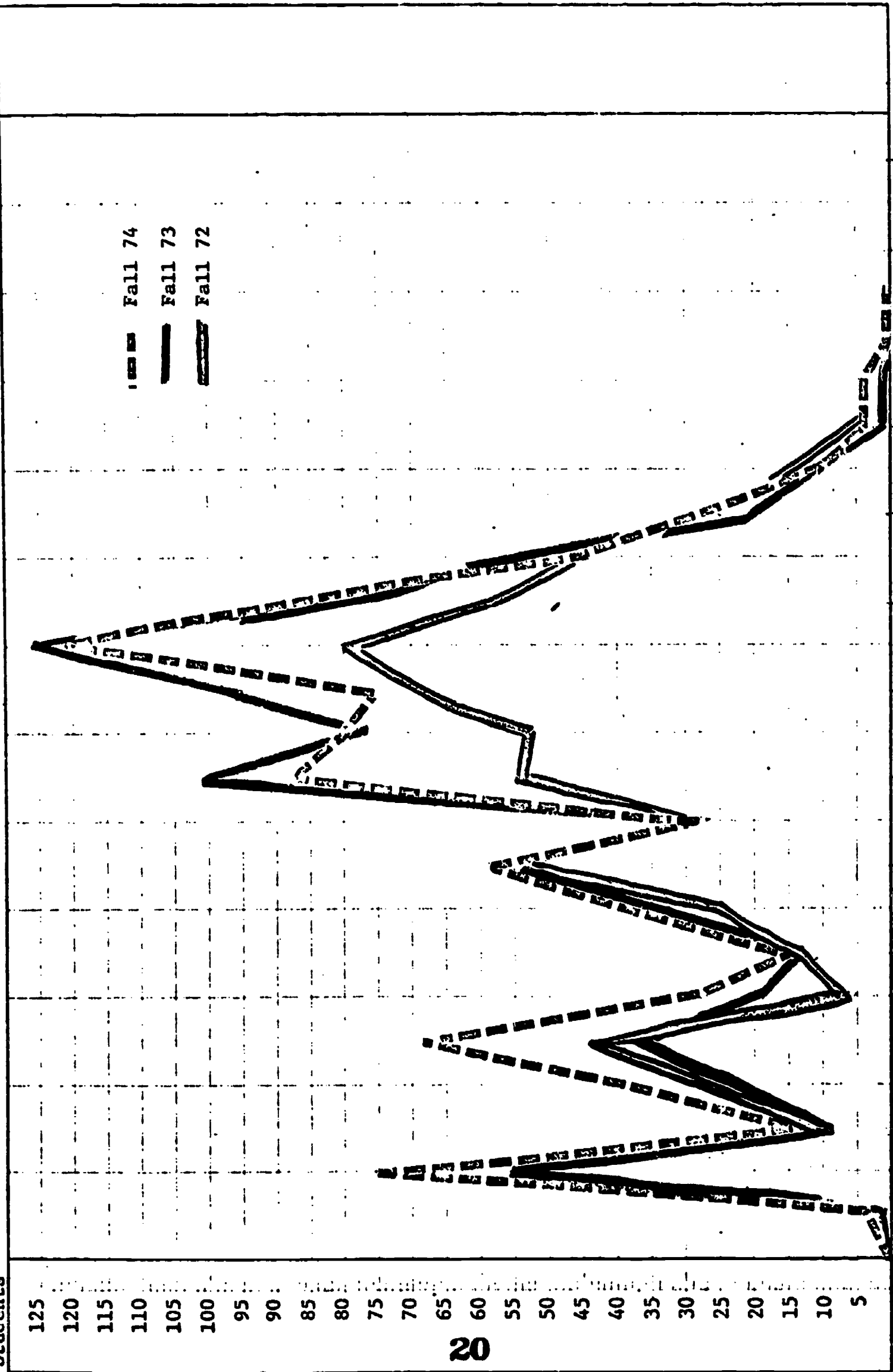
